



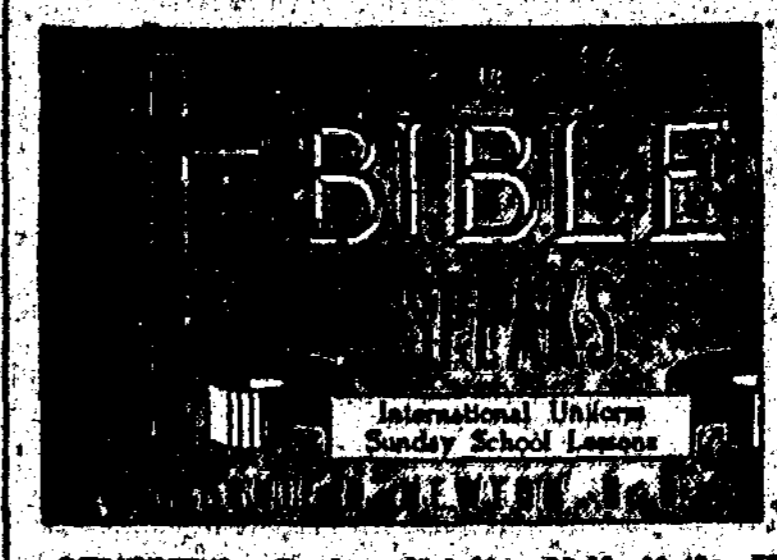

Bezalel, The Craftsman

Lesson for July 11, 1948

THE dignity of labor, the source of artistic ability, the secret of mechanical skill, and the service of good workmanship—these are the facets that break across the ages, pointing us to worthier effort, as we study again the achievement of Bezalel and his associates in the construction and furnishing of the Tabernacle at Sinai.



Dr. Newton You will wish to read the scripture passages for the lesson and the devotional reading, Exodus 20:1, 17, and the golden text: "Whatever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might," Ecclesiastes 9:10.

A MAN WHO DID FINE WORK BEZALEL, grandson of Hur, son of Caleb, was called of God to superintend the building of the Tabernacle. His name means "under the shadow of God." He knew how to do fine work, having been trained in Egyptian art and handicraft—metallurgy, carpentry, weaving, embroidery, leather-dyeing, gem-cutting and confections. He even knew the art of apothecary.

Best of all, he loved to do fine work. It is one thing to possess the know how, it is yet another thing to love the execution of a great design.

"My Father worketh hitherto, and I work," said Jesus. "Work, for the night cometh when no man can work."

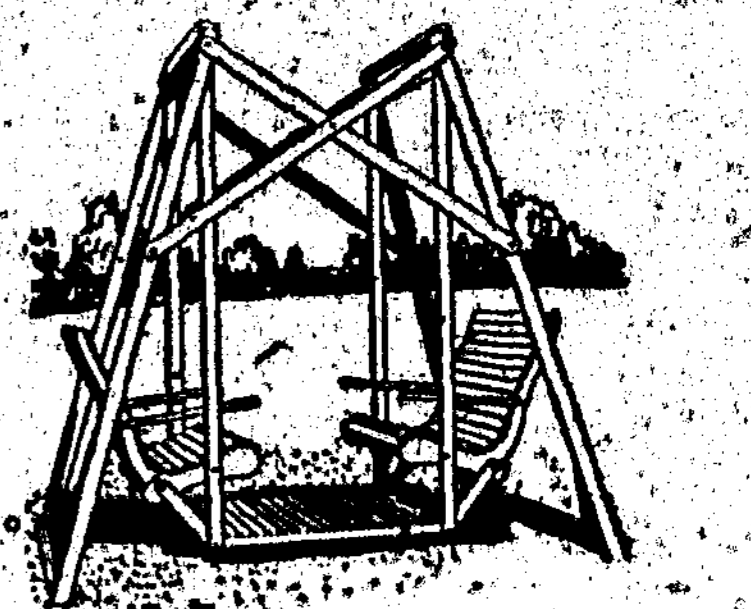

Some are beneficial; others innocuous; but more than 100 species attack the cotton crop in one way or another, including some of the most destructive pests of agriculture. The list includes the boll weevil, bollworm, cotton leaf worm, pink bollworm, cotton flea hopper, tarnished plant bug, rapid plant bug, cotton aphid, cochineal, southern green stinkbug, cotton leaf perforator, yellow-striped armyworm, fall armyworm, beet armyworm, red spider mite, grasshoppers, crickets, wireworms, and thrips.

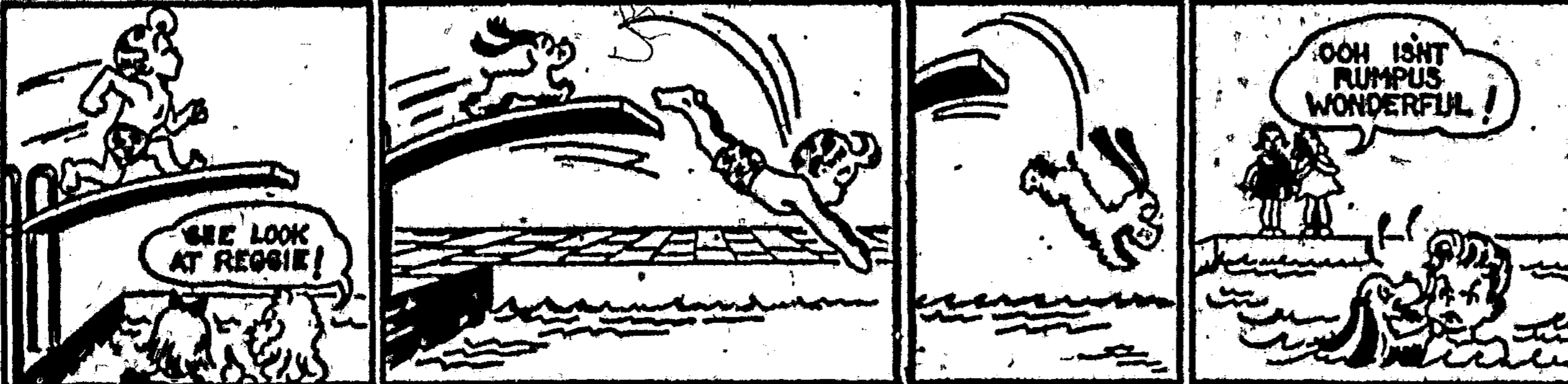
