



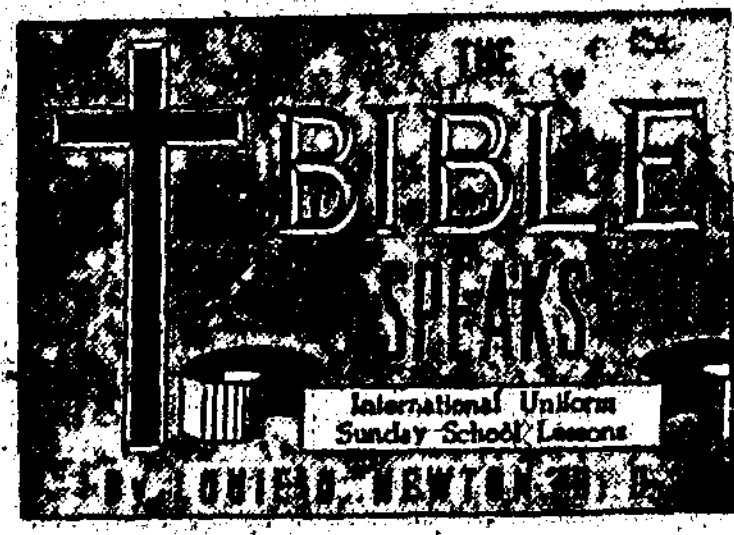

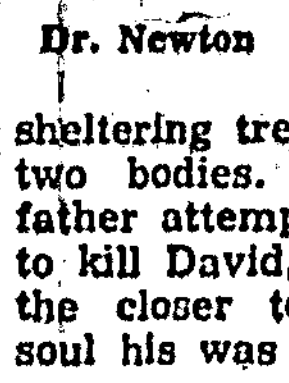


THE BIBLE International Union Sunday School Lessons

SCRIPTURE: I Samuel 18-20; 23:16-18; II Samuel 1:1-7; 3:17. DEVOTIONAL READING: I Corinthians 13:1-13.

Jonathan, Loyal Friend Lesson for July 25, 1948

WELL might we term this a lesson on the facets of friendship. Rarely will one come upon such a splendid example of friendship in all literature. 'Cote-ridge put it well when he wrote, 'Friendship is a sheltering tree.' Diogenes Laertius, writing on Aristotle, says, 'He was once asked what a friend is, and his answer was, 'One soul abiding in two bodies.'"



Dr. Newton Such was the friendship of Jonathan and David—a sheltering tree—one soul abiding in two bodies. Although Jonathan's father attempted at least ten times to kill David, Jonathan was drawn the closer to David, with whose soul his was knit.

The record of this friendship is found in our scripture and devotional readings for the lesson, with the golden text from Proverbs 17:17, "A friend loveth at all times."

A PRINCE SHARES WITH A SHEPHERD

JONATHAN was the crown prince apparent. David was a shepherd boy. Saul expected to place Jonathan on the throne. God had selected David. Jonathan would, no doubt, have made a better king than Saul, his father; but he had no desire to be king when he discovered the kingly qualities in his friend, David. Not once did Jonathan ever indicate any disappointment in not becoming king.

JONATHAN STANDS UP FOR HIS FRIEND

WHEN Saul openly plotted the death of David, Jonathan begged his father to reconsider his course and spare the life of the man who had killed Goliath and had proved himself the valiant friend of Saul. This was the final test of Jonathan's sacrificial love for David. He might have remained silent, thus aiding in the death of the one man who stood between him and the throne. But Jonathan was made of the stout stuff which counts no sacrifice too dear for a friend. He was willing to stand up and be counted when it meant that he would not become king. Thus we see that true friendship is not always easy. It usually is very costly, but it pays big dividends in the coin of eternal wealth.

FRIENDSHIP THAT COSTS

AND like as Jonathan stood up and witnessed his lasting friendship for David, at a very great cost, so are we today summoned to this ennobling type of friendship for Christ. "Ye are my friends if ye do whatsoever I command you," he once said.

Young people find it rather costly to be loyal friends of Christ today. There are many siren voices that invite young people to take the low road—social drinking, gambling devices of one sort and another, satisfaction of sensual desires. But the true friend of Christ will withstand these voices, choosing rather the high road of Christian gentlemen.

SACRIFICIAL FRIENDSHIP

"FRIENDSHIP is the loveliest flower in the garden of humanity," according to my cherished friend, Dr. Hight C. Moore. I would add this thought—true friendship flowers in the garden of humanity, but it finds its life in the Garden of God's Perfect Eden.

I have not known one single friendship that has impressed me that did not stem from above. "How can two walk together except they be agreed?" And the only cement that will hold human hearts together—one soul in two bodies—is the grace of God.

"Friendship is as God, who gives and asks no payment," said Richard Hovey, and not until the humar will is yielded to the will of God, even as was the will of Jonathan, can sacrificial friendship come to flower and to harvest.

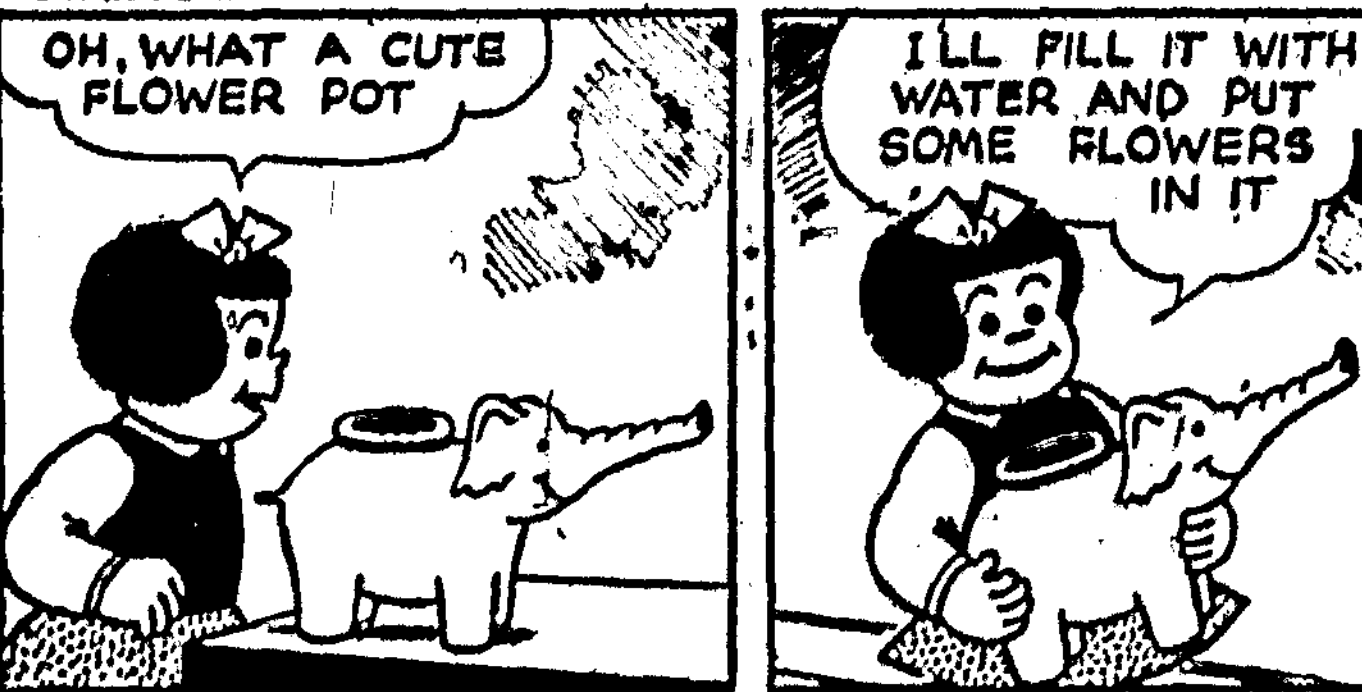

BACKWARD GLANCES

40 YEARS AGO FROM 1908 CARRIZOZO NEWS

Plans for a new depot for Carrizozo have been drawn, submitted and approved, so we have been reliably informed. The work of construction is to begin in a few days, the structure is to be a two-story frame, the first story to be used for baggage and express, office and waiting room. The second story is to be utilized by the trainmaster, the dispatcher, and assistants in these departments. The new building will adjoin the old depot on the west.

A party of automobilists made the trip to Gran Quivera and return Sunday, a distance of 45 miles. They left here about 6:30 in the morning, arrived at the ruins about noon, took lunch there, and, after exploring this ancient and silent city for two hours, started on their return, reaching Carrizozo at seven in the evening.

A staunch republican from the Santa Fe side of the territory was in Carrizozo one day this week. Asked his opinion on the political situation he stated his opinion was that Bryan would be the next president and that he would be supported by a democratic house. Regarding the republican nominee for delegate he was of the opinion it would be either Spies or Andrews, the chances favoring the latter; and yet there was a chance for a dark horse from his side of the territory bobbing up. But it doesn't matter who is nominated, as those on the inside concede the election to Larrazola; for he holds an unassailable position, and is much stronger than two years ago, when the returns had to be doctored to defeat him.

THIRTY YEARS AGO FROM 1918 CARRIZOZO NEWS

C. A. Snow left last week for New Orleans to enter the naval service. He enlisted in the reserv-

es some time ago and expected his call before it finally arrived.

The operations on the Vera Cruz mine have been interrupted quite a little recently because of difficulty with the power line. However, the management made a clean-up after a 11-day run, and R. R. Foster, president of the company, showed us the result. It was a brick weighing just three pounds having a value of almost \$1,000.00. The owners feel quite satisfied with the returns and feel confident that the property will justify every expectation.

TWENTY YEARS AGO FROM 1928 LINCOLN COUNTY NEWS

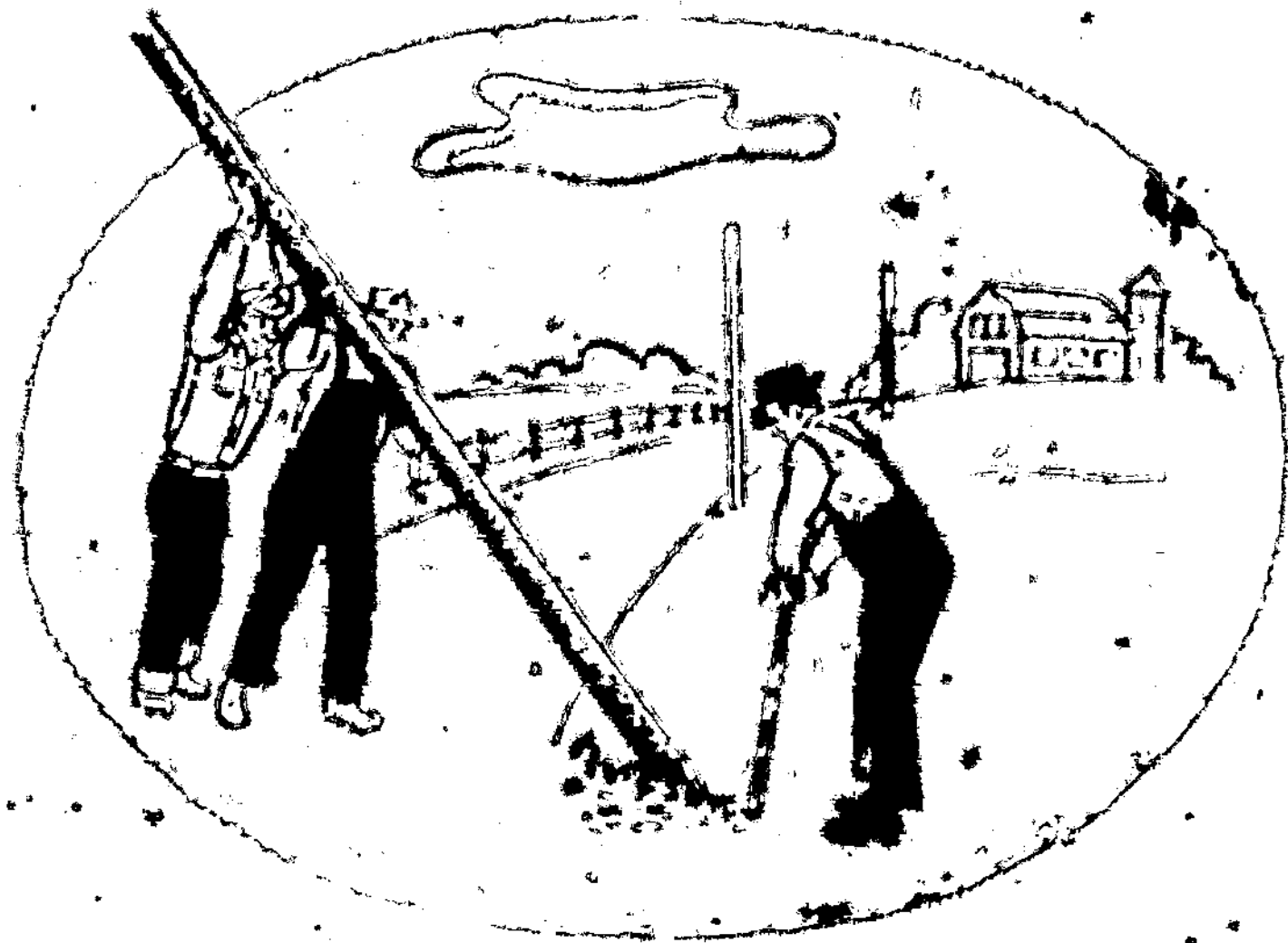

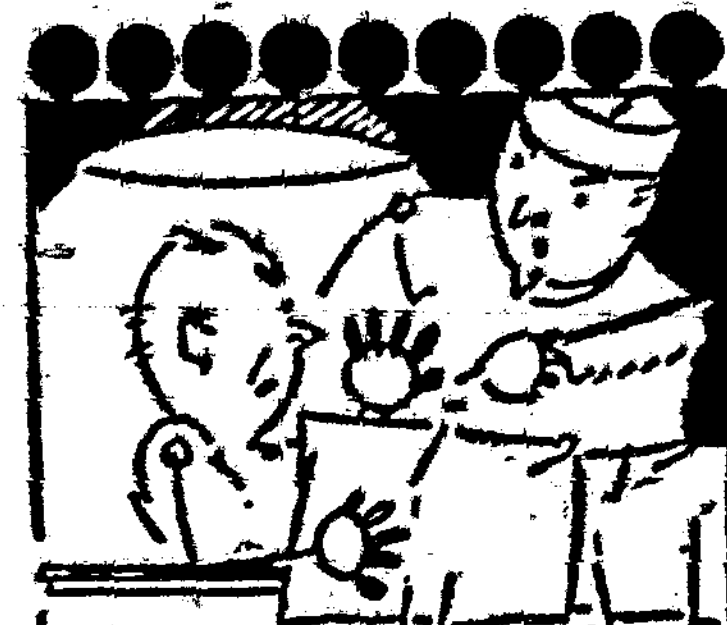

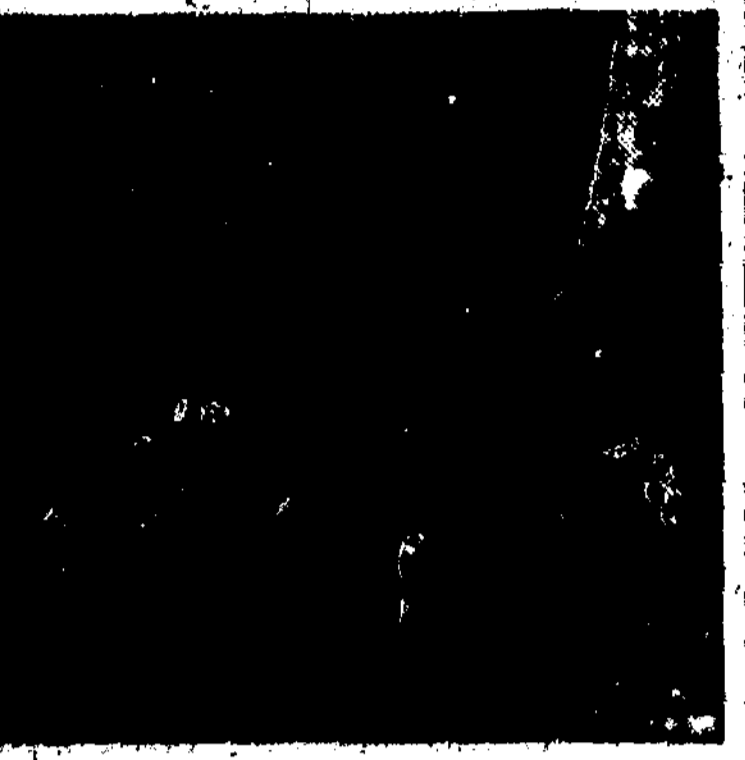
Farm Topics

'Starter' Fertilizer Boosts Tomato Yield

Best Results Obtained With Cannery Produce

Tomato yields have been increased greatly by scientists who used starter solutions at transplanting time. Completely soluble, high analysis fertilizers now are available which will make excellent "starter" or transplanting solutions for cannery tomatoes, according to the New York state experiment station.

One of the best of three new formulas is a 15-30-14 combination of chemically pure ingredients, which dissolves completely in water, thus avoiding the time and trouble



of straining out the insoluble residue which results if ordinary fertilizers are used for this purpose. Excellent results may be obtained from using the 15-30-14 formula at the rate of four pounds to 50 gallons of water, or 10 pounds to a 5-10-5 to the same amount of water.

The solution is applied at transplanting time at the rate of one-fourth pint to the plant. Increased yields of a ton and a half of tomatoes are not uncommon from the use of these solutions, which cost less than \$1 an acre for materials. The beneficial effects are especially marked at the first picking of cannery tomatoes. Market gardeners are not likely to find the practice so beneficial because of the more intensive fertilization of their land and the better nourished plants they usually employ.

Precautions Suggested To Cut Haying Mishaps

Haying mishaps annually account for a large percentage of the mounting farm accident toll. National Safety council points out in urging farmers to take extra precautions during the haying season.

To reduce hazards and thus avoid disastrous losses, here are a few suggestions:

Carefully check all equipment for defective hitchers, ropes, pulleys, lifts, hay racks or ladders. Loft floors should be put in good repair and hay chutes guarded.

Make starts and stops gradually in all haying operations and watch out for falls from hay racks, hay stacks and hay mows.

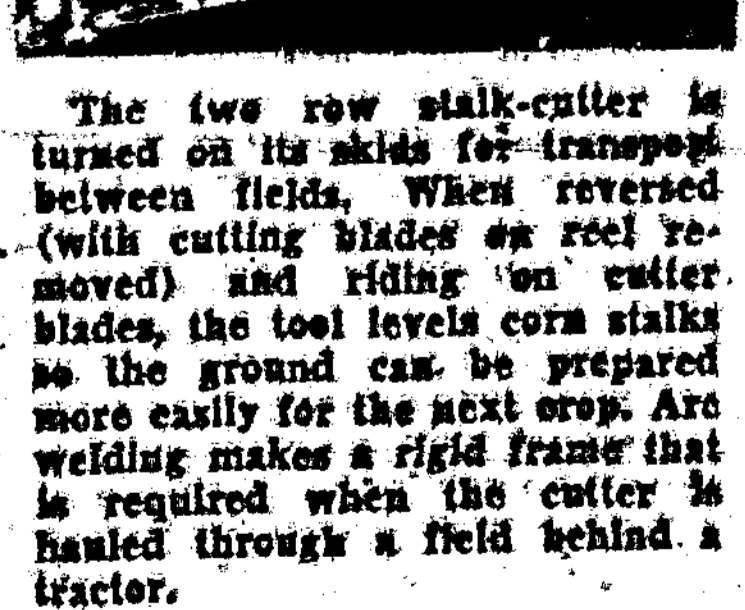
Machinery should be stopped and thrown out of gear before oiling, adjusting or unblocking, and safety guards should be kept in place at all times.

Pitchforks are dangerous; always place them where they are in plain sight of all workers. Never throw a pitchfork.

Do not wear loose or ragged clothing which may catch easily in moving machinery.

Damp hay is one of the principal causes of barn fires. Be sure the hay is well cured before storing and check regularly for several weeks for any signs of heating.

Two Row Stalk-Cutter

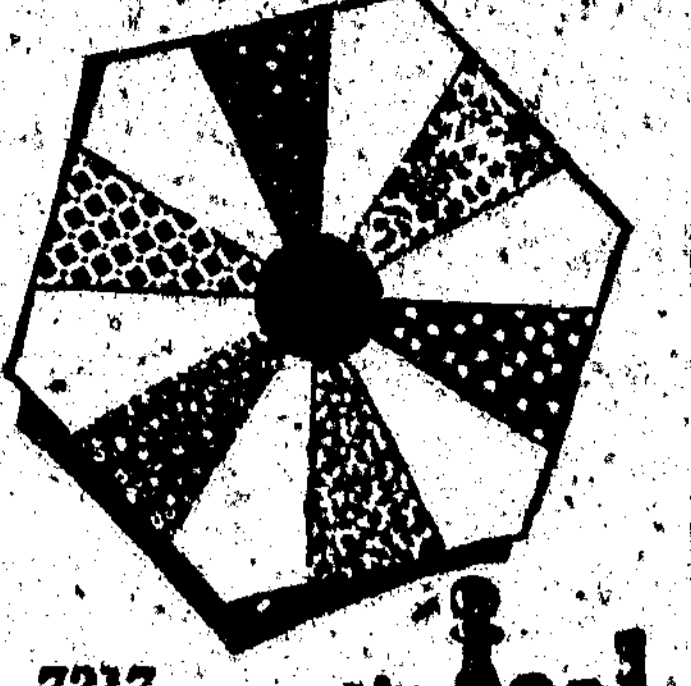


The two row stalk-cutter is turned on its skids for transport between fields. When reversed (with cutting blades on reel removed) and riding on cutter blades, the tool levels corn stalks so the ground can be prepared more easily for the next crop. Arc welding makes a rigid frame that is required when the cutter is hauled through a field behind a tractor.

2, 4-D Spray Proves Fatal To Some Woody Plants

Many woody plants, including willows, are partially killed by 2, 4-D sprays. Killing of large shrubs or trees cannot be expected. The spray may be used, however, to prevent resprouting of susceptible species by applying as a concentrated spray to sprouts after the trees and shrubs have been cut. Repeated applications will be necessary to prevent further growth.

That short distance to the corner goes a long way toward keeping people alive. American pedestrians are warned by safety experts striving to reduce the huge annual traffic death toll by curbing unsafe pedestrian acts. Approximately 11,000 persons are run down and killed by motor vehicles every year—and half of them are crossing streets and rural roads between intersections. Coming from behind parked cars and crossing the street at places other than designated crosswalks are the most dangerous things the man on foot can do in traffic, according to the accident prevention department, Association of Casualty and Surety companies. Jaywalking killed over 2,200 and injured 51,000 pedestrians in this country in 1947, the department pointed out. Walking in the roadway and crossing against the traffic signal are the next most important reasons why so many persons lose their lives or are crippled for life.

NEW MEXICO EMPLOYMENT UP FOR THIRD MONTH

Total employment in New Mexico mining, manufacturing, transportation and utilities, trade, finance service and regular government industries continued its upward trend for the third consecutive month and increased 900 workers according to a release by Benjamin D. Luchini, Chairman-Executive Director of the Employment Security Commission.

Workers employed in the above industries now number 108,000 compared with 107,100 in May 1948, and 102,000 in June 1947. Increases occurred in manufacturing, transportation and trade; mining, finance, and service retained, their May levels while government declined.

Manufacturing establishments show the greatest gain, 609, from May, half of which is due to lumber and lumber products production. An increase of 200 is noted in manufacture of food products.

The decrease of 100 in gas and petroleum mining, caused by a shortage of material is offset by an increase in small metal mines. Contrary to previous seasonal fluctuation coal mining employment had remained stable since the March reduction.

Extra gang track crews raised transportation employment 200. Dispersing of gasoline, food and general merchandise, largely for tourist consumption, upped retail trade 200 workers from May, to 1,200 more than a year ago. Wholesale trade gained 200 workers during the last year and 200 since May.

118,324 HUNTING AND FISHING LICENSES ISSUED

There were 118,324 hunting and fishing licenses and miscellaneous permits issued by the State Game Department during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1948, for an increase of 5602 over the previous year, according to figures released by Elliott S. Barker, State Game Warden. The figures also show an increase \$20,374 in revenue from licenses, the total for the fiscal year being \$456,327 as against \$425,953 last year.

The Warden said that fishing licenses and the fishing proportion of combination licenses made up 42.35 of the revenue, Bird licenses 12.8% and Big Game 45%.

Resident fishing licenses showed the greatest gain, the number being 4,739 over the previous year, while non-resident fishing licenses decreased by 2,345. On the other hand the \$2.00 20-day non-resident permits, good only at Elephant Butte, Caballo and Conchas Lakes, increased from 4,008 to 7,404, a gain of 3,396.

There was a loss of 2,484 non-resident big game hunters for a 60% decrease, while resident big game hunters increased by 2,781.
