



News of Peace

ONE of the best kinds of news there is is to learn that someone we thought was an enemy, is actually a friend. The end of misunderstanding, of estrangement-what a rush of warmth to the heart it brings!

That is the news of the first Christmas-that God is our triend. Christ did not come to assure men that there is a God. That was well known, indeed few doubted it. He did not even come to announce that there is but one God, for that was already known to the wiser sort of men. Neither did his coming unveil the God of justice. The Greeks and Romans, as well as the Jews, knew such a God only too well.

No wonder a Roman poet, looking about on the religions of his time, concluded that fear is the great god-maker. His notion was a mistake; but it was a natural one. For all the religions of the ancient world, even the religion of the Jew, were attempts to ward off the anger of offended gods.

The coming of Christ was to put an end to all that. This was mpro than a friendly gesture, it was an act of love. Those who have discovered God in Christ have found that God is not only our Maker but our heavenly Father and Friend. There is no better news!

News of a Gift

T IS good news also when we hear of a legacy or gift of some sort, especially when it is something we could not have expected. And the story of Christman is the news about God perconally entering the life of man. It is God giving us him-self. True, the world is full of the gitts of God.

In the Child of Bethicken, in the Man he was to become, in the work he was to de, there was a new thing—the self-giving of God. That is one reason why Christmas means infaltely more to a Christian than to any one clse.

For the non-Christian, the story of Christmas, for all its charm, is only another story of a child born to poverty, doomed to pain-another chapter in the long agony of man. For the Christian, the story of Christmas is the Good News of how God gives himself, for our záke.



#### Yule Crooks Fool Millions

Christmas is a time of joy among-men of good will—and the busy sea-son for Christmas racketeers. Every year millions of innocent and careless people are duped by these meanest of crooks.

Christmas racketeers take advantage of people's normal tendency to be charitable during the Christmas season. These fakers often fool the public by imitating famous charities or religious institutions. A few years ago groups of men and women appeared on the streets of several cities in blue uniforms trimmed with red. They used the word "Army" in their name, and at first glance appeared to be members of the Salvation Army, With tambourines in hand, they went up and down residential streets soliciting at Christmas time. They took in a lot of money, for themselves. Not a penny of this money helped bring a merry Christmas to a needy one.

Using such ruses, it is estimated that Christmas racketeers annually rake in over \$100,000,000 during the Christmas season.

To avoid being "taken in" by Christmas racketeers, make the bulk of your contributions to established agencies, such as the Red Cross, Community Chest, churchsupervised charities and local institutions which have proved merit and permanency.







College of Pharmacy will grant tuition scholarships to ten New Mexico high school graduates for both numerters of the 1949-50 academic year to study pharmacy, Dean Roy A. Bowers has announced.

"Nover before—has there—been such a need for skilled pharmacists in New Mexico", said Bowers, "Dug to the ever-increasing emphasis on heatth requirements of the Ameri can people, there is every indication that the need for pharmaceut cal services will increase"

Bowers stressed the desirability of having pharamacy graduates return to their own communities to practice. This, he avers, given them a better opportunity to be of real service to the people they know.

"The ccholarship fund is a gift from the phamacists of the state," Dean Bowers declared. "Their help will assist deserving New Mexico boys and girl, who might otherwise lack sufficient money for college to obtain a college education in pharmacy."

Letters have been sent to all high school principals, county cchool superintendents, and parmacists in the state, the dean said, announcing the availability of ccholarships.

Applications chould be sent to Dean Bowers at the College of Pharmacy, University of New Mexico Albuquerque.







What the Russians stand for has lately come under heavy attack from almost every group and individual in America. We are almost unanimous. Current Congressional investigations at last seem to be hitting pay dirt. Russia herself, by strangling little Czechoslovakia and conducting the "cold war." has been losing some of her friends. Influential Communists are deserting, once they see what Russia's "ideol-Wednezday, December 29, he will ogics" really are like.

In Our Generation No matter by what name you gall it, state control has grown in almost every country you can name. This has happened in our generation. After World War I, politicians in many nations sensed their opportunities for power. Usually, this power was obtained through ecomoney, and tinkering with production and distribution kept the tyranny in power. Finally, it was Germany, Italy, and Japan that brought on another terrible war.

They were the "statist" nations. In each of these nations aggression against other countries followed aggression against the individual at 6.00 home. Little nations, weakened by \_ 16.00 statism of their own, were easy victime. When their people did not worthwhile, totalitarianism could

> Recognize the Infection The infection of statism is at its worst in Russia, but we have not

fortunately is now nor arways wear the name. Yet its effects are unmistakable. It demoralizes everything. Those in government can then justify a growing hunger for more and more power. Statesmen lose their vision to become mere politicians. They come to believe that the state can do everything.

The citizen is demoralized by statism. He gets to the point where he does not resist inroads on his liberties. He becomes a slave of the state. He is willing to follow evil courses no matter whether his heart tells him they are wrong. Resistance is simply not worthwhile. This is an exact picture of the German people before and during World Wars I and II. It fits also the Italians and the Japanese in World War II.

America's Danger The picture fits Russia, too. It is the statist, government-controlled countries that soon take their people down the road to war. Nations do not foment wars when the people have a say-so. The greatest danger in America today is that we shall adopt one by one the ways of statism, even while denouncing Communism. This is what Russia would like to see us do. Instead, we must learn to identify the infection, no matter what label it may carry.

One label we are learning to avoid is Communism, but our understanding of it is usually pretty sketchy. Read and study "Communism in Action," a 140-page booklet, prepared by the Library of Congress. Copies may be obtained free from: American Wage Earners Foundation, 30 N. La Salle St., Chicago, Ill. This is a factual study that will show the results of statism in Russia. It will convince you that neither you nor America could be better off under government managed economy.

#### Does Government

Management Work? For a decade before World War II, France was moving toward control and management of her major industries. Private employers were unduly criticised. The profit system was represented as being abused. There were those who apparently found it easy to foment confusion and strife. Employees were set against employers. Production went down, standards of living went lower and lower. The security of France became doubtful, as dangers arose.

Then came the attack from Hit-

ler. France fell quickly. Her divided condition, her hatreds and fac-tionalism, made defense feeble and weak. Then five years later, libera-tion came. France again estab-lished her own government. But in-dustrial confusion was still everywhere. Employers were so discredited by the propagandists that production couldn't get going.

From Chase to Worse

The trouble was that the French people in general, freited by the propagandists, couldn't get down to straight thinking. The public wanted more and more for doing less and less. The call for government to take over major industries became louder and louder.

. Certain industries were therefore 314 N. Richardson taken over in 1945 and 1948. One of these was the coal industry, in which the government took over ownership of the mines. It employed the management, and hired all the workers. The government was placed in full and complete control. Three years passed.

No Happy Family in recent weeks. Government employed miners went out on strike against their government employer. These government employees so seriously damaged government owned mines that government soldiers had to be sent out to protect the property and the mines. You might think that under Socialism, everybody would be just one happy family.

Not at all. Fighting, has been going on between the government miners and the government soldiers. Property has been so damaged that some mines cannot be reopened for many months at best. Lives have been lost in the fighting, and many persons wounded. All this at a time when France is in a critical hour, when her people need coal and fuel. This is all wrong, and it certainly proves that government manage-ment cannot insure industrial peace. Keep Industry Safe

There are other important observations. Very important is the fact that government ownership and. management of mines did not increase production per man day. On the other hand, 4 million tons of ceal have been lost, and the price has risen about 50 per cent. This has led to the diversion of 18 million Marshall Plan dollars from other purposes, to buy fuel for the French people.

Many who wanted government management are still not satisfied. Many of them are promoting a Communistic state, now. That would happen in America. There is no indication that government manage-ment would work any better here. It is only a step toward Communism, which we do not want. Let us work in every way to preserve private management, a system which has helped America to achieve the highest wages and best

**VETERANS' NEWS** 

The Holiday season is being observed this week in seven Veterans Administration hospitals through out Colorado, New Mexico, Wyoming and Utah.

corations, special visiting privile- geles Examiner. ges, entertainments and Christmas parties. In some hospitals, patients will be allowed a free telephone home, paid for by service organizations. Gifts will be distributed to each of the 3,000 patients. Special religious services are scheduled throughout the week.

At Fort Bayard, New Mexico, a gigantic lighted "Scene of the Nativity" has been set up in the courtyard to offer a happy welcome to visitors. Volunteer workers from veteran's orginzations and civic groups are taking an active part to see that every patient has as merry a Christmas as possible.

The V A has reported that one out every eight veterans in the four state area is receiving monthly disability compensation. Of an estimated veteran population of 348, 000, a total of 45,701 were on the compensation list on December 1 World War II veterans numbered 34,254.

In New Mexico 10,020 out of 65,. 000 veterans are receiving compensation, of which 7,443 are World War II.

More than 29,400 veterans in Colorado, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming received outpatient medical treament in one year, either at the VA regional office clinics or thru private doctors at V A expense under the V A hometown medical program. This does not include Veterans in VA hospitals.

A V A report for the fiscal year 1948, ending June 30, showed that 29,412 veterano received 77,490 treatments on overage of 2,6 treatments per veteran compared with the national averag of three per veteran

The report shows that 18,777 veterans received 30,809 treatments in VA clinics and 10,635 veterans reccived 40,681 treatments on a fee basis from hometown doctors. Total fees for private treatments were \$137,038. Through contract with the state medical societies in Colorado and Wyoming and through individual certification in New Mexico and Utah., the VA pays many expenses of veterans for hometown medical treatment for service connected disabilities.



## U. S. Cooling to Chiang Kai-shek; Russians Agree to Blockade Talks; Truman Wary on Deflation Prospect

#### HOLE CARD:

China's Missing?

With stakes terrifically high and the Communists having him beat showing, China's Chiang Kai-shek fingered the pasteboards for a look at his hole card. In a quick doubletake, he looked again. Was it gone, or had it dwindled to a deuce?

That's the way poker players might have described the tense situation which faced beleaguered China and her generalissimo. The United States, China's only and allpowerful ally, appeared waning in ardor for the generalissimo's leadership. No less an authoritative U. S. foreign-policy spokesman than Senator Tom Connally (D., Tex.), who will head the senate foreign relations committee in the 81st congress, had spoken.

PUTTING IT BLUNTLY, Senator Connally had said, in effect, that China generally, and Chiang Kaishek especially, should have done more to help themselves in the battle against Chinese Communist forces before pressing an 11th-hour appeal for American aid.

The senator emphasized his viewpoint: He stated that the visit of Madame Chiang Kai-shek to the United States was "not by invitation of the United States government." He made it clear that Madame Chiang was "just a protagonist of the Chinese government."

WOE PILED UPON WOE for the Chinese. Coincident with Senator Connally's statement, press services carried the following despatch from New Orleans: "William Mc-Chesney Martin, president of the U. S. Export-Import bank, said the bank would not even consider a loan now to Nationalist China. He said the Export-Import bank does not have on hand as much money as China probably will want, and that China is a 'poor business risk'."

Why was Connaily giving the back of his hand to the generalissimo? Hear the senator: "Chiang is a generalizzimo except that he deesn't go out and generalize. . .

If he took command of one of his armies in the field, he would do more to revive the morale of his people than anything else."

The Texan was but voicing publicly what other administration officials have been saying privately -that they are not too keen about Modame Chiang's all-out propaganda drive to divert more money and materials to China, possibly at the expense of the Marshall-plan DEFLATION: countries. Connally summed up by saying that he was not prepared at this time to pass any opinion on increasing the aid to China, but added, "I am not in favor of sending combat troops to China."





## "Punishment, not reward! - Pun' Plants, Like Humans,

#### Isotopes Tell Amounts Of Fertilizer Utilized

Atomic scientists have learned that some plants, like some human beings, are finicky eaters.

This new knowledge, important commercially, is the result of exhaustive tests with radioactive iso-, topes of phosphorous in fertilizers. Radioisotopes, sometimes called

"tracers," are atoms whose nuclei emit high-energy rays that can be detected by sensitive instruments. Thus, the movement of substances containing such atoms may be followed or traced at all times. Before radioisotopes were used, it

was impossible to tell how much fertilizer a plant would absorb. But by using radioactive phosphorous in phosphate fertilizer, for instance, scientists know the amount each plant takes. As a result, a scientist now can-

tell a farmer who spends \$50 to put phosphate fertilizer on his land whether the plant only "nibbles" or takes a bite big enough to replay

During these experiments, scientists were surprised to discover that plants sometimes have distinct likes and dislikes for certain "meals."

For example, it was learned from tests in North Carolina that cornliked the phosphate from fertilizer





for a time, then would switch to the phosphate which had been present before fertilization. In Maine, the potatoes preferred the fertilizer phosphate all the time.

In other cases, plants would seem always to prefer the phosphate already present in the ground, instead of the meal prepared by the farmer.

One of the world's foremost producers of baby foods, chewing gum, coffee and peanut-butter recently became the first representative of the food industry to become a member of the atomic research program at the University of Chicago.

#### Summer Milk Slump Costs Farmer Plenty

"Bummer slu.ap" in milk production costs farmers plenty in good, hard cash. On the average farm there is about a 30 per cent drop from May until early fall.

Some of the loss in production arises because a higher percentage of cows are dry or approaching the end of their lactation, period, but many dairy specialists believe that much of the loss could be prevented by better management.




