V. F. W. Party Commemorates Sinking of USS Maine

The night of February 19, 1949 saw another highly successful party at the Norton Pepper Post, No. 7688, Veterans of Foreign Wars, in Captain. The occasion for the party was the fifty-first anniversary of the sinking of the Battleship Maine in the harbor of Havana, Cuba, 15 February 1898. It is hardly necessary to make any references to the party because just about everybody was there. That is, everybody who had an invitation to it, and by "everybody" we mean members of the VFW and their guests. However, the sinking of that great and famous battleship and the war that resulted is deserving of comment because there was in that war another good example of the United States resenting oppression and are always quick to go to the assistance of the downtrodden people of the earth. Everything written here can be found in any high school text book of American history, but to those of us who have forgotten our history, these things may be of interest.

For many years before the outbreak of the Spanish-American War the people of Cuba had been covered over by the governing heads of the mother country. The common people of Cuba had no voice whatsoever in their own affairs and were taxed almost beyond endurance. The government of the United States had excused a "hands off" policy, but the people and the press of the United States were growing more violent in their belief that something should be done about it. It is a typical American custom to do something about any situation which causes hardship to either people or individuals. President Cleveland refused to recognize the Cubans as belligerents, but did recognize them as insurgents battling for political rights. Such recognition prohibited the United States from legally making up a military force to go against Spain in defense of the Cubans, but the law was difficult to enforce in the face of the attitude of the American people. During the three years between 1895 and 1898 over sixty expeditions left the ports of the United States to go to the aid of the Cubans. Nearly thirty of them landed safely.

Early in February 1898 the Spanish minister in Washington, D. C. wrote in a letter which soon became public, words to the effect that McKinley, who had become president the year before, was a "bigger for the administration of the crowd, a would-be politician." This comment in itself was enough to promote a war. Almost immediately thereafter on February 15, the USS Maine was blown up and sunk in the harbor at Havana, Cuba, with the loss of 266 officers and crew. Everyone was willing to believe that sinking was the work of the Spanish governing body. The famous cry, "Remember the Maine" was the fan that whipped the flames and the public demanded from the congress that we should go to war against Spain. On April 20 1898, President McKinley signed the resolution, and made the announcement to the rest of the world on the twenty-second, that a state of war existed between the United States and the government of Spain.

Commodore Dewey was at that time laying off the coast of China in command of the Asiatic Fleet. He received orders to proceed at once to Manila Bay and "capture vessels (of the Spanish Fleet) or destroy." "Use utmost endeavors." The details of that brief struggle on May 1, 1898, and of Dewey's classic command, "you may fire when ready, Gridley," are common knowledge to every American citizen. In considerably less than one day, the entire Spanish Fleet in the Pacific was rendered useless, nearly four hundred of the enemy were killed. The American Navy was as efficient then as it is now. On July 3, Captain Sampson and Commodore Schley bottled up the Spanish Fleet in the Atlantic and destroyed them completely when they attempted to escape to the open sea. Again the score was hopelessly in favor of the American Navy—one sailor wounded, one killed. The Spanish defense was broken completely.

Spain agreed to the surrender July 17, 1898. Porto Rico was taken

In August without a fight and became a possession of the United States; the Philippine Islands became United States possessions on payment of \$20 million to Spain and Cuba won her independence. This war, requiring only 114 days of actual fighting, was the shortest but most decisive of all the wars the United States has been formally engaged in.

It is noteworthy the date of formal entry into the Spanish-American War came only one day after the anniversary of the Battle of Lexington and Concord (19 April 1775) and the first spilling of blood in the War between the States (19 April 1861 in Baltimore).

The Norton Pepper Post, No. 7688, Veterans of Foreign Wars, considers it a privilege and a community duty to commemorate outstanding activities of the Military Forces of the United States and is the sponsor of his article.

NUGENT GETS TOP S. P. SAFETY POST AS LOWE RETIRES

Appointment of M. A. Nugent to succeed A. A. Lowe as superintendent of safety for the Southern Pacific in six western states effective March 10, was announced today by the railroad. Nugent's headquarters will be in San Francisco.

Lowe is retiring after a railroad career of 44 years. Through directing safety activities among Southern Pacific employees he has gained nationwide recognition as a leader in accident prevention work.

Nugent is promoted from assistant superintendent of the company's Los Angeles division. He began railroading in 1915, and because of experience in many positions, is particularly well qualified for his new post. Starting with Southern Pacific in 1921, after six years with other western roads, he advanced from yardman, brakeman and conductor to a succession of important supervisory positions, principally in the Los Angeles terminal area.

SOLOMON FRESQUEZ FUNERAL

Mr. Solomon Fresquez, age 64, former resident of Lincoln County, passed away at his home in Roswell last Monday. Funeral services were held at the Catholic church in Roswell, Tuesday afternoon, March 2nd, followed by interment in the Roswell cemetery.

Mr. Fresquez had been a rancher most of his life.

He is survived by a son Jake Fresquez; and two daughters, Mrs. Candelaria of Dexter and Mrs. Amelia Fresquez of California, and twelve grand children. He is also survived by two sisters and five brothers, one sister and 3 brothers live at Arabela, one sister and one brother live in Roswell.

Bud Williams, Clovis rancher has been named Chairman of the General Resolutions Committee to serve during the New Mexico Cattle Growers Association in Albuquerque, March 27 and 29, according to G. W. Evans, Magdalena, President. The important policy committee will include a representative from each of the 31 counties.

Other committee chairmen to serve during the annual cattlemen's event include: Albert K. McNeil, State Lands; A. D. Brownfield, Deming, Public Lands; Walter Hanna, San Antonio, National Forest; Burton Roach, Hot Springs, Legislative; Lee S. Evans, Marquez, State Taxes; E. G. Hayward, Cimarron, Land Conservation; John B. Wooten, Clayton, Traffic and Transportation; August G. Sols, Albuquerque, Brand, Theft and Reward; W. R. Thompson, Santa Rosa, Tariff; H. J. Burns, Lovington, Beef Cattle Improvement; Roy K. Stallard, Cutter, Junior Livestock Activities; Huling Means, Silver City, Entertainment and T. A. Spencer, Carrizozo, Finance.

Public Land proposals are expected to receive special attention at the annual meeting, Evans continued. Recommendations in the Hoover Commission report now pending before the national congress indicate that an effort will be made to transfer administration of the Taylor Grazing Law from the Department of Interior to the Agricultural Department. "The proposal is of vital interest to every cattleman using public lands in New Mexico," Evans said.

Carlsbad to Hold Forum

Carlsbad has put out programs for Agriculture, Labor and Management Forum to be held March 25 and 26. Luncheon, introduction of guests, panel discussions, sight seeing trips, and a banquet will keep sessions interesting.

"AN IDEAL EXAMPLE"

A short time ago the largest utility in California, the Pacific Gas and Electric Company, put a huge new power plant into operation with appropriate ceremonies. This particular plant cost \$30,000,000, all of which was paid with private funds, a part of a great expansion program. On that occasion, the San Francisco Bulletin had this to say in lead editorial: "All in all, the program of unprecedented growth and what's the reason for it? simple: California growth in a few years is unprecedented. We need more people, more homes, more industries—and we're going to still more in the future."

"So, the PG&E has gone to work to meet these needs, and is making them—an ideal example of what private industry can and will do. It is left reasonably free from bureaucratic interference and confiscatory taxation, and so allowed to accumulate capital reserves and do its job, to the betterment of our standard of living, and the enrichment of our people."

What gives this a particular significance is that it isn't unique—it isn't just an interesting development that is confined to one state. Throughout the nation—in every region where tax-subsidized government competition and the threat of socialization hasn't blocked private development—utilities are involved in major projects which create every branch of government from local to national.

The regions where the government has moved in present a very different picture. In the Southeast TVA has an air tight monopoly over power—and that means it has a monopoly over the very life of the local governments and local people have nothing to say—they take what TVA decides is best for them. The same thing will happen in the Middle West and the Pacific Northwest if the proposed Columbia Valley Authorities are authorized. The politicians, the bureaucrats and the administrators in Washington will make the decisions.

The people control private development. In the case of business managed utilities, they exert this control locally through public service commissions, which prevent discrimination and monopoly. But under socialism local rights must disappear. The government's present power policy is socialism.

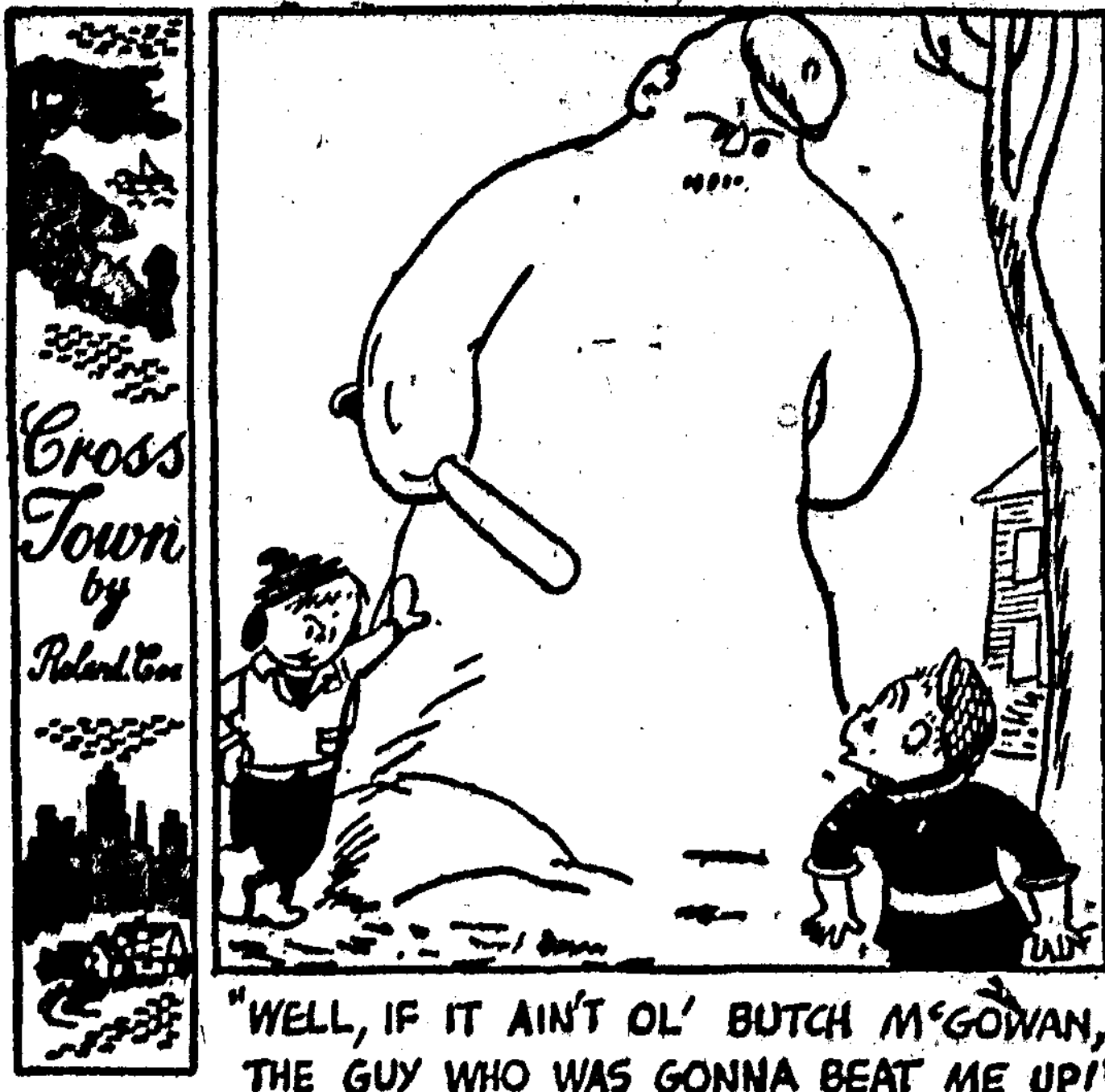

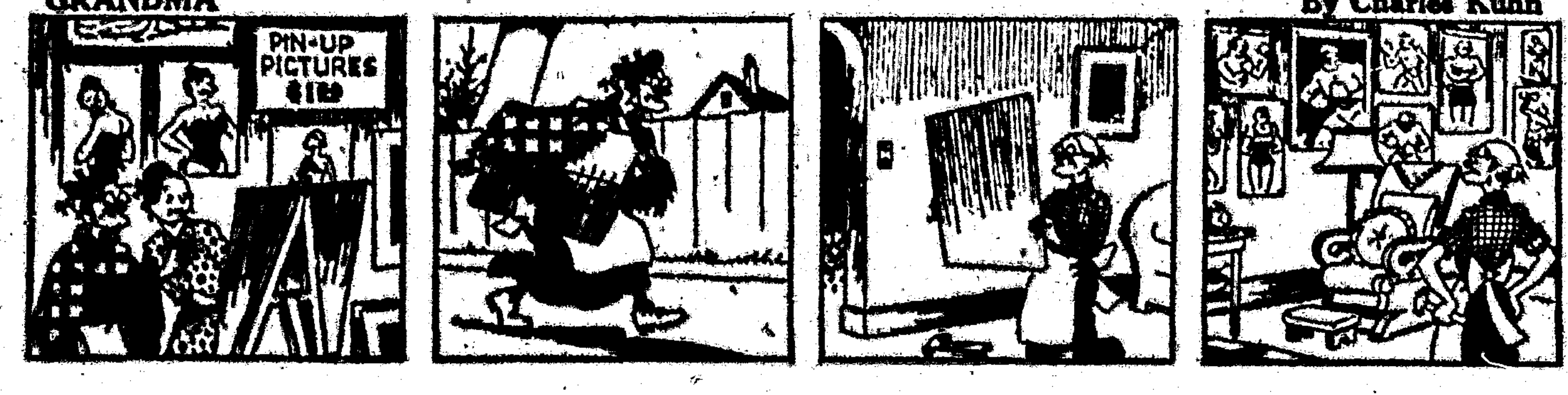
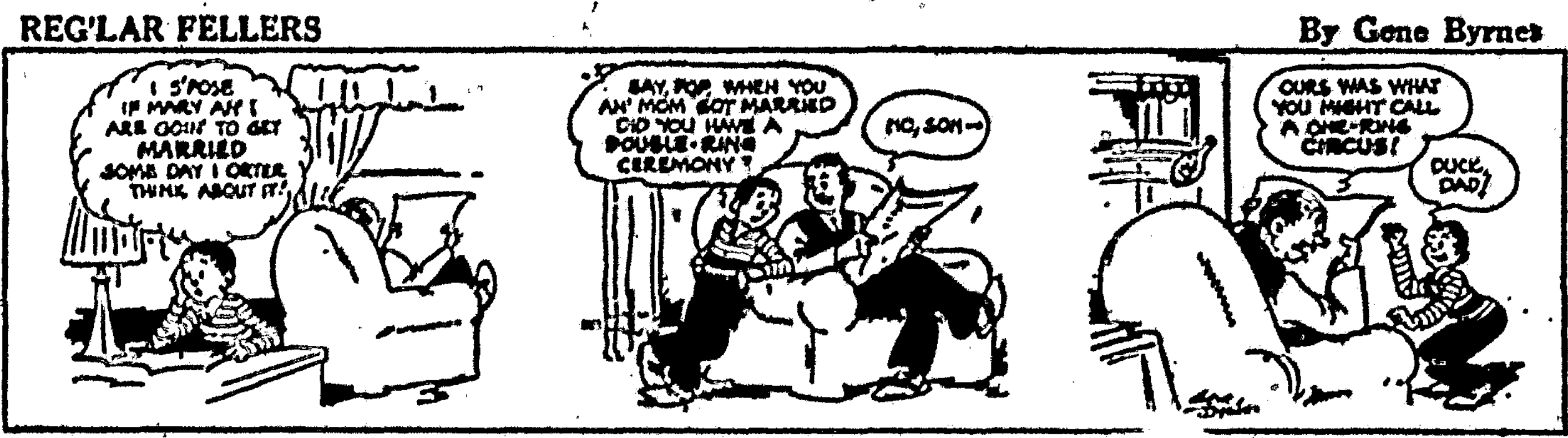

Esteron 44 Results In Wild Onion Curbs

Wild Garlic also Found Vulnerable to Solution

Wild garlic and wild onion long have been two of the most troublesome weeds in southern lawns, pastures and certified grass and grain seed production fields.

As lawn weeds, these plants give the lawn an uneven, ragged appearance and produce a very disagreeable onion odor when mowed. In pastures, dairy cattle feeding on these plants produce milk with an off flavor which is of great concern to dairymen in several states. Seed production has been limited by the presence of wild potential contamination.

During the past three years many experiments have been made with varied forms of 2,4-D to control wild garlic and wild onion. Tests with sodium salt of 2,4-D were unsuccessful. Esteron 44 and the amine liquid salt formations, however, gave good control when used at the rate of three to four pounds of 2,4-D acid equivalent per acre.

Apparently the amount of water used makes little difference in the results obtained. As many as 125 gallons per acre and as few as five gallons per acre were applied with equal success.

For pasture work, observers agree that Esteron 44 may be somewhat more effective than the amine salts, but because of the possible danger from volatility of the esters of 2,4-D, it is suggested that the amine liquid salt be used where susceptible plants grow in immediately adjacent areas. (Lawns, for example, with adjacent flowers and shrubs).

Moisture Conservation Helps With Wheat Crop

A 30-acre field that had produced little during the last few years, even with favorable moisture conditions, produced a good wheat crop, according to the Kansas state college extension service.

"A combination of things made the land productive again," a conservation district cooperator said. "Use of sweet clover, seeded in the spring of 1946, for green manure and terracing, and contour farming for moisture conservation were important."

The land, he explained, was badly eroded. The soil was thin, dense and hard to work. It had not produced a decent crop in the previous six years and was practically idle land.

Gullies were plowed shut after the terraces were built, so that the whole field could be contour farmed. In addition, grass waterways were developed and more terraces planned.

New Hay Chopper



This combination hay chopper and ensilage cutter, which can be operated by one man, has been introduced by the New Holland Machine company. The new machine feeds, cuts to desired length and blows corn, hay or other crops to mow or silage in one operation. Cutting in lengths ranging from 3-1/2" to 1 3/4", the chopper can handle up to 20 tons of silage an hour.

Bathtub Fairly Recent Innovation in America

Although many Americans consider the daily bath essential to good health, most of their predecessors of a century ago never saw much less bathed in a bathtub in the home. For pre-Civil War Americans, bathing was a luxury indulged in a hot alongside the house. The White House got its first bathtub during Lincoln's term. The first all-iron tub was installed in New York City in 1870.

Bread Stuffing Makes Fish Savory (See Recipes Below)

Lenten Favorites

IF YOU HAVE only a slight acquaintance with how savory meat less foods can be, then Lent is the time to let your ingenuity go to work. You may discover, as have many homemakers through the years, that small acquaintance can lead to enduring friendships.

Fish may readily become a year-round favorite just because you discovered a special way to prepare it during Lent. Although the family may already like and expect eggs for breakfast, you may discover that creamed, deviled or hard-cooked eggs combined with other foods make delightful luncheon or supper dishes.

Both fish and eggs are nutritious foods. Fish and egg yolk contain protein, that important body building and repair substance which everyone needs daily.

In both vitamins and minerals, both of these foods rate as excellent sources. Egg yolks are rich in iron, builder of red blood cells; they also supply calcium needed for bones and teeth. You'll appreciate the fact that eggs are a good source of phosphorus, riboflavin, and vitamins A and D.

Fish are very active, and since the B vitamins (thiamine, niacin and riboflavin) are necessary for energy production, their flesh is rich in these. All fish are rich sources of phosphorus and ocean fish and sea foods are excellent sources of iodine, the element necessary to the prevention of goiter.

COMPARED TO MEAT, fish has little fat and, therefore, it requires little cooking time. A short cooking time for fish is also essential so that you will lose few of the important B vitamins which are so readily destroyed by heat.

Long slow cooking time breaks down the muscle fibers of fish which leaves it dry and unappetizing. Cook it as directed in these recipes and serve as soon as it is taken from the oven, and you'll have fish so delicious no one can resist it.

*Stuffed Fish (Serves 6 - 8)

Select a fish weighing 3 to 4 pounds. Clean. Rub salt inside and out. Stuff with bread stuffing made by mixing 1 1/2 cups bread cubes with 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 1/4 teaspoon thyme or marjoram and 1/2 onion, minced. Slowly, add 3 tablespoons melted butter.

Close the cavity of the fish with toothpicks or skewers and draw edges together by lacing with string. Brush with melted fat and place in baking pan. Bake for 15 minutes in a very hot (450° F.) oven. Then reduce heat to 400° F. and bake for 45 minutes longer.

Garnish fish with parsley and lemon wedges. Serve with a sauce made of 1 cup white sauce to which has been added 2 hard-cooked eggs, chopped, or 2 tablespoons capers or 1/2 cup mushrooms, chopped.

Stuffed Fish Fillets (Serves 4)

2 cups salt bread crumbs
1/2 cups chopped, cooked or canned mushrooms

1/4 cup butter or substitute, melted
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1/2 teaspoon poultry seasoning
4 haddock fillets

Mix crumbs, mushrooms, butter, salt, pepper and poultry seasoning. Add egg and mix well. Spread fillets with mixture. Roll and fasten with toothpicks. Broil, turning once, until fish is golden brown. Serve immediately.

Shrimps, Louisiana Style (Serves 6)

- 4 tablespoons butter
- 1 teaspoon minced onion
- 1 pint shrimp, peeled
- 4 tablespoons flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups milk
- 2 tablespoons minced parsley
- 4 tablespoons tomato catsup

Melt butter, add onion and shrimp; brown. Stir in flour and add seasonings. Gradually add milk and cook about 10 minutes. Add parsley and tomato catsup; cover and let steam until sauce is thickened. Serve over hot boiled rice.

Escalloped Corn and Oysters (Serves 5 - 6)

- 1 No. 2 can corn, kernel style
- 1 pint oysters
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- Few grains of pepper
- 1 1/2 cups milk
- 1/2 cups oyster liquor
- 1 cup buttered crumbs

Heat corn. Drain oysters and add enough water to liquor to make 1/2 cup. Make white sauce of butter, flour, salt, pepper, milk and oyster liquor. Arrange layers of corn, oysters and white sauce in a buttered baking dish. Top with crumbs. Bake in a moderately hot (400° F.) oven for 15 to 20 minutes.

Stemish Fillets (Serves 6)

- 2 pounds haddock fillets
- 1/4 pound bacon
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 3 tablespoons chopped parsley
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 cup tomato paste or drained, canned tomatoes

Partially cook bacon in skillet. Pour bacon fat into bottom of shallow pan. Add half of onion and parsley. Place fillets in this and add remainder of onion and parsley. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and place slice of bacon on each fillet. Bake in a moderate hot (375° F.) oven for 45 minutes. Remove fish to hot platter and add tomato pan mixture. Heat, adding a few tablespoons of water if necessary. Pour sauce around fish on platter. Serve with squash or sweet potatoes.

Ever scrambled eggs with crabmeat? They're wonderful this way. Sauté crabmeat in butter in skillet, then pour in the egg-milk mixture. Stir gently until eggs are cooked.

Serve three salads on one plate for luncheons: one of shrimp or crabmeat, another of well-seasoned cottage cheese, and a third of chopped vegetables.

Don't toss away leftover green vegetables such as asparagus, peas or green beans. Mix them with chopped celery, hard-cooked eggs and mayonnaise. Serve in lettuce cups. Sautéed bean sprouts, sliced mushrooms, celery and onion may be added to eggs while you scramble them for a delicious Chinese diet.

FIRST AID to the AILING HOUSE

by Roger C. Whitman

QUESTION: "My bedroom has two doors with opposite faults; when unlatched, one will not stay open, the other will not stay closed. Can this be corrected by adjustment of hinges? Is it something an amateur can do?"

ANSWER: The trouble in both cases is because the pin of the lower hinge is not directly in line with that of the upper hinge. To check on this, use a plumb line—that is, a string with a small weight tied to one end. If you hold the loose end of this at the bottom of the upper hinge pin, the weight will show you which hinge needs resetting. The door originally was set with the hinges in line, and the trouble has come because of settlement that has somewhat distorted the door frame. It may be that moving one hinge will be enough, although possibly a small adjustment of both hinges will be easier.

When you have decided what to do, open the door part way, and jam books or blocks under the outer corner to take the weight. You then can remove the hinge pin of the hinge that is to be shifted, and do whatever is necessary. Take off the hinge plate on the door frame, and pack the screw holes with wood putty. You might find it necessary to place a shim (in the form of a piece of cardboard or a thin piece of wood) under the offending hinge.

MOTORISTS REMINDED TO DEDUCT AUTO LEVIES IN COMPUTING INCOME TAXES

Albuquerque, Feb. 10.—Motorists computing their Federal income tax were today reminded that they can deduct their payments on the 5 cent a gallon State gasoline tax and state motor vehicle registration fees for last year. This reminder was issued by T. H. Joyce, Chairman of the New Mexico Petroleum Industries Committee.

Although New Mexico Motorists actually pay a tax of 6 1/2 cents on each gallon of gasoline, the Federal gasoline tax of 1 1/2 cents a gallon is not deductible for income tax purposes, he added.

For the average motorist, the Federal income tax deduction for State gasoline tax payments in 1948 will amount to about \$50.00, he said but for those whose use of the highways is above average the State gasoline payment deduction will be considerably higher. As examples of those who should have a much higher deduction he cited physicians, real estate agents, farmers, commercial travelers, lawyers, truckers, bus and taxicab operators and workers who regularly drive to their jobs.

He pointed out that the deductibility of the State gasoline tax "is not an actual savings to the taxpayer. Deducting it simply means that he does not have to pay a Federal tax on a state tax.

It will pay you—and all of us—to make that water walk downhill.

New Grass Varieties
by Wilkie Collins, Jr., Soil Conservation Service, Lincoln, Nebraska

Good pasture is the key to production of more meat, milk and wool, at lower cost. In addition, a good cover of grass protects your soil against wind and water erosion. When you have improved pasture, or range, good livestock and a sound conservation program, you have a profitable combination.

Many new grasses have been developed in recent years. Several of these promise to become real money-makers for livestock men. They out-yield old grasses, give a longer grazing season, and provide better soil protection.

1. Smooth Brome—The Lincoln, Auchenbath and Fisher strains give higher yields, are easier established and withstand summer heat and drought better in the central, eastern and southern brome areas.
2. Intermediate Wheatgrass—A high-yielding, sod-forming, cool-season grass that is easier to establish than most varieties. It is highly palatable and does exceptionally well in the central and northern plains and western mountain area.
3. Sand Lovegrass—Highly palatable, especially well adapted to sandy soils.
4. Tall Wheatgrass—A high-yielding cool-season bunchgrass that does better than other grasses under alkaline conditions.
5. Ky-31 Fescue—High-yielding, supplies longer grazing, especially good for southern and southeastern states.
6. Russian Wild Rye, Blackwell Strain of Switchgrass, Hays Buffalo Grass, Yellow Bluestem and Sweet Sudan are other new or improved grasses for adapted areas.

Grasses usually give higher yields and better quality forage when grown in association with an adapted legume.

Martha Logan's Recipe for BEEF PLATE WITH HORSE RADISH SAUCE

(Yield: 3 to 4 Servings)

1 1/2 pounds beef plate floured	1/2 cup sliced onions
2 tablespoons shortening	1/2 cup chopped celery
1 teaspoon salt	or celery leaves
	1 1/2 cups water

Cut meat into serving pieces and dip in flour. Melt shortening in heavy kettle. Brown meat well on both sides. Add salt, onion, celery, and water. Cover and cook 3 hours. Serve with Horse-radish Sauce.

HORSE RADISH SAUCE—Melt 2 tbsp. butter or margarine in a saucepan, blend in 2 tbsp. flour, mixing well. Slowly add 1 cup milk, stirring until well mixed, and thick and smooth. Add 1 tsp. salt, 3 tbsp. lemon juice, 1 tbsp. sugar, 3/4 cup horseradish. Cook over low heat until thoroughly heated.

Look at the Label

A lot of persons, who like to think that they think, are bandying about a couple of terms that mean less than a whole lot to a whole lot of people. I refer to the terms: "liberal" and "reactionary." May I put in my two cents worth in hopes that you may know these modern labels better?

What I mean is that armchair commentators and soapbox spellbinders throw these terms at you, without any apology. Sure, you can get their meaning, whether they are for it or against it, by the way their lips are curled and their epithets hurled. But that's not enough. We need to know what the labels mean. A man can't think straight unless he can know his ideas as he picks them up.

The Real Test

Jesus said of false teachers: "By their fruits ye shall know them." That is still the best way to size up a man and his idea. It is even possible to put that test to labels. That way, a man cannot call himself one thing and be another.

The word liberalism comes from the same basic word that gave us the term liberty. The ancestors of this label, therefore, are of the best blood. The term has the finest possible background, for it implies all sorts of freedoms and puts strong stress upon human liberty. Then how is it that those who claim liberalism as their doctrine are found waving the banner for the very worst enemies of all liberty?

State Supreme

We Americans declare that we hold sacred the right to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. We have said that man is to be as free as possible, while also being responsible. The nation's founding fathers clearly insisted that government must be set up to serve man, and not man to serve the government.

But here and now we have the sorry mess of the liberals today, wanting to change all this. They propose to improve this arrangement by "planning" us into either a socialist or a communist or a fascist society in which all signs of human freedoms must certainly vanish. These planners and plotters would have the society (government or state) to be supreme in all things. Even God they would replace by the State.

A New Sermon

What need would we then have to guarantee personal rights and freedoms, if the state is to assume all the responsibility for everybody? No need, at all, if the State is supreme. These liberals (I am now applying the label test to their works) care nothing for the Constitution. They are all totalitarian at heart. Their aim is political power to suppress the personal liberty that belongs to the individual. Here we have the strange spectacle of dangerous "liberals."

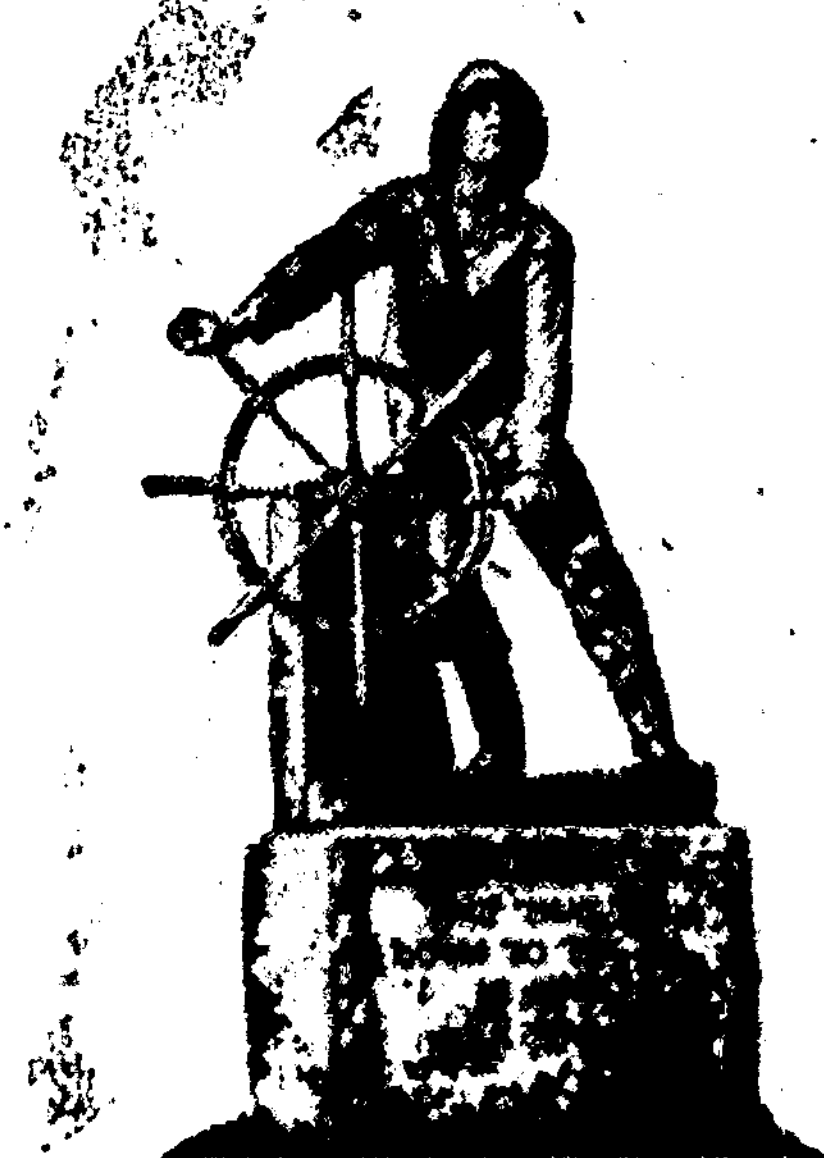

Gloucester... "down to the sea in ships"

For three centuries—ever since the dawn era of the New World in 1628—the durable fishermen of this picturesque New England city have sailed the chill Atlantic as far as Iceland, cutting its depths with their nets for the fish upon which they depend for their lives and livelihood.



Gloucester remembers its men who have died in the waters of the Atlantic. The statue of a helmsman gripping the wheel and straining into the gale has inscribed on its base the simple and unadorned phrase: "They that go down to the sea in ships."



It is the business of the men who sail the fishing fleet out of Gloucester to harvest the sea for such fish as haddock, halibut, cod and mackerel. Fishermen aboard the Lizza C. Riggs free fish caught in the nets (left above), and on the way into Gloucester port they keep busy cleaning their catch.



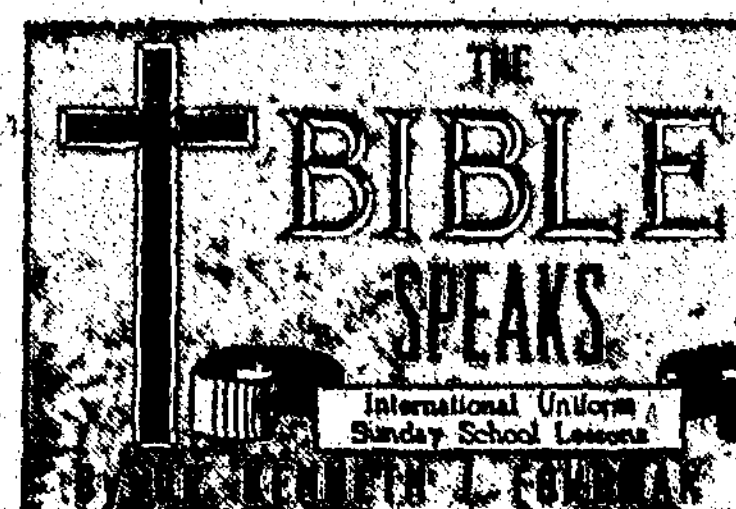

Wild Oats Harvest

Lesson for March 6, 1949

ALL RELIGIOUS teachers of Jesus' time used parables. But the great difference between Jesus' parables and those of his contemporaries, as Rabbi Klausner says, is that his were remembered and theirs were not. People will remember a story who cannot take in a lecture. Jesus almost never told "wonder-tales." His parables are not in the least like Dr. Faustus Grimm's fairy tales or Alice in Wonderland. Mostly they are about simple ordinary happenings, and practically always about living people or things.

The Kingdom of God is a kingdom of law, not of happen-so or of magic wands. Jesus was fond of comparing God's Kingdom to growing plants. Every plant is a miracle. It is evidence of God's creative power; but plants do not grow overnight, they grow by the laws which the Creator made in them.

WILD Sowing AS WE SAW last week, the most important feature of the Ideal World, or of any world, is the quality of the people in it. So most of Jesus' parables were about people, one of the most famous being this one of the "prodigal son." ("Prodigal" of course does not mean wicked or repentant, but wasteful, reckless with money or other things.) You could find many faults in that young man. One of them—the fault that nearly killed him—was that if he had a calendar he never looked at it. If you take a good look at a calendar you will always notice that there is another day after this one—another month, another year. But the prodigal never thinks about tomorrow, only about today. He sows his wild oats because he has fun doing it. He can say "So what?" fast enough but he has never asked the question, "—and then what?" Childish, isn't it? Yet all about us are prodigals old enough to know better.

Some people even argue that it is a good thing to sow wild oats, on the theory that the prodigal gets it out of his system and is afterwards a better man.

Nonsense! Is it better for your education to spend several years learning things wrong? Is it better for a garden to let it grow up in weeds for the first three weeks? Is it better for a man's health to spend his childhood years on a sickbed? That's no more silly than to say that a man is morally better for having been immoral for a while first.

Prodigal Nation IT HAS even been said that we have a prodigal-son civilization. Our generation is pretty busy sowing wild oats. We waste the natural resources of the earth. Drinking has become encouraged by law and made glamorous by the movies. We spend more on liquor than on schools. More money is spent on a single day's horse-racing at a big track than a whole state or province spends on education in a year. The ties of marriage have grown so weak, especially outside the Christian church, that it has not been long since one American city was boasting that its marriage rate had "caught up with" its divorce rate!

Wild Harvest THE PRODIGAL son in Jesus' story went home—but he had to reap his wild harvest first. The modern prodigal, whether individual or nation, seems to misunderstand Jesus' meaning. If God is thought of at all, he is pictured as a benevolent Being who after all doesn't mind our enjoying our little fling. "He will forgive," said Voltaire, "that's his business." That is a total misunderstanding of God.

The Heavenly Father does love every one of his children, yes. But he will not hold back any one who insists on wasting his substance. He will not interfere with the man's freedom even if that freedom is wickedly used.

He will not suspend his own law: "Whoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap." The prodigal will never get back what he threw away. Time that is killed stays dead. The poverty and pain created by personal or national extravagance and intemperance, God will not magically conjure away. To prevent seam puckers in sewing sheer fabrics, loosen sewing machine tension and use a longer stitch. Or with regular setting, stitch seams over strips of paper, then pull off paper. Test scraps of fabric before starting on garment.
