

In Accountancy

NEW YORK.—The honeymoon in job placement is over, and the boys are actually letting the employers interview them, says Robert F. Moore, director of placement, Columbia university.

Job placements, Moore reports, are a little better than the last normal year, 1939-40. The greatest demand seems to be in accountancy. Salaries range from \$225 to 450 a month, depending upon the profession and the educational qualifications of the student.

Each year Moore conducts a career clinic at Columbia. For eight weeks college students hear leading industrial, management, personnel and professional figures. get down to cases in advising which job to seek, what to study to prepare for a career, where to look

for a job and how to get a job.

These clinics have proved so written a book. How to Blueprint Your Success, which probably will be the basis of a credit course he plans to offer at Columbia. Only one other university in the country
—Indiana, offers such a course for credit.

Should Study Aims

Here's what Moore tells the boys in his career clinics: Ask yourself: "What am I? What do I want?

Most people fail in a job, he says, not for lack of skill, but for failure to possess such personal qualities as the ability to express oneself orally and in writing; ability to get along with people; patience in attaining job goals; perseverance; alert minds, not necessarily Phi Beta Kappa, but more than merely willing to bet by; proper attitudes and mobility.

The interview is the first important step in getting a job. It's a 50-50 proposition. The employer finds what you have to sell that he can use. The interviewee discovers whether the company offers op-portunities to satisfy his aims, interests and qualifications.

Certain Qualities

The employer wants to know about such perconal qualities as appearance, manners, grooming, ethical make-up and how well you meet and impress people.
You want to know if the job gives

you an opportunity to make the hest use of your qualifications; whether If is a worthwhile investment in terms of selling, your services, loyalty and the best hours of your life. What are the drawbacks and disadvantages of this fob?

Moore offers come practical tips on how to get ready for an interview. He tells the boys to learn something about the jeb and the company. This calls for self-analysis of your objectives, aims and interests.

Psychologists estimate that 20 per cent of the population is illusion blind and can't recognize them. If one sees an Illusion it proves nor-

malcy. It's time to worry when one doesn't see them.

The illusions at the institute were baffling, until they were explained. It was puzzling to pass your hand through a pot of roses and never touch a rose. They weren't in the pot. They were behind it. It was ridiculously easy to understand, once it was explained. Mirrors.

The same explanation discolsed the secret of the talking head, the trick seen at nearly every sideshow. The body belonging to the head was cleverly concealed in a glass case.

Altogether they caught & rides, one of them on a truck in Pennsylvania. The longest ride was 346 inlies from Rogersville, Tenn. ic Birmingham.





Southern Pacific Orders 67 Diesels


Southern Pacific announced unday that orders have been placed for 67 diesel locomotives of various types, at a cost of more than \$28,000,000,in furtherance of its extensive improvement program.

In making the announcement A. T. Mercier, passidert of the railroad, said the new orders will approximately to raise \$241,000 000 the company's postwar expenditure for new rolling stock, nearly \$90,000,000 being for 268 diesel locumotives.

Dollveries of the newly ordered diesel locomotives are scheduled to start in October of this year, and when the current order is completed in June, 1950, Southern Pacifie will have a total of 402 diesel locomotives of types in operation on its lines Mercier said

Of 196 diesel locomotives prev-Honely ordered since V-J day, the railroad had recived 158 by mid-June of which number 54 are of (6000 horsepower. The company's present fleet of 288 diesel switch. ers is one of the largest of its kind n the country, the railroad presdent pointed out.

Included among the 67 diesej just ordered will be 28 of 6000 horsepower each, for main line service: 17 road switch locomotives each 1500 horsepower; and 22 awitchers, each 1000 horsepower. The company also is acquiring an additional passenger disel unit.

Truman Asks 45 Millions to Spread U.S. 'Know-How' Throughout World; A-Bomb Urged as Defense Weapon

U.S. KNOW-HOW:

Share for World

Back in January. President Harry Truman delivered in his message to congress, a multiplepoint program. In that program was mentioned "point four" - one of the proposals he made and one which raised some eyebrows and set off no end of speculation on "when and how."

"POINT FOUR" was a proposal to share United States "know-how" in varied fields with other friendly nations of the world. In that proposal, the President asked congress to go along with a plan to let such nations in on how the U.S. does things economically, mecharically, industrially.

After speculation died down there was nothing more said about "point four" until recently. Then, President Truman told congress exactly what he wanted. First, he asked for 45 million dollars to help the backward countries of the world through U.S. ald.

CALLING that a first step, he listed some other factors also as "preliminaries." These included: Technical assistance to be provided through the United Nations

or directly by the United States. Private investment to turn undeveloped areas into producing for the world economy.

Authority delegated by the congress to the President to give him power to administer the program and authority to delegate it to the secretary of state and to other government officers as he deems appropriate.

"We are here embarking on a venture that extends far into the future." he told congress. He added that "grinding poverty and the lack of opportunity for many millions of people in . . . certain regions . . . constitute the greatest challenge of the world today."





Produce Magic Mud With Multiple Uses

Ever since Belle Fourche, S. D. was a rip-snorting cattle town at the end of the old Chisholm trail its residents have been damning the "soap holes" that plagued the

Fast-riding cowboys often took a nasty tumble in this super-slippery mud and cattle were forever getting bogged down in them. But now, like a man discovering

his hives are really a blessing, Belle Fourche has found its soap holes are one of its biggest assets. Every one of them is filled with a magic mud called bentonite, It's an odorless, tasteless, soapy mud with a thousand uses and scientists

Most of us already are using it a half dozen times a day, but aluse it in shoe polish and hand cleaners. Women use it in face



Bentonite is the most absorbent material found in nuture. When moistened it swells to several times its normal size. This quality makes it useful in waterpronfing housing foundations and many other industrial

Bentonito also is found in many types of paint, plaster and cleaning agents. It's handy for filling holes Lugoslavia now attending? in giant dams and for casting moulds for molten metal. Forced dawn thousands of feet into the earth this magic mud lubricates the drills in oil wells and sends the debris up to the drillers.

Its new uses and increasing poputo a boom such as Belle Fourche hasn't seen since the gold rush.

In the past 10 years the population has practically doubled and bentonite now pours \$600,000 a year into the town in the form of additional purchasing power.

Fifteen years ago Belle Fourche shipped out three carloads of bentonite. Last year its production was 6,187 carloads and this year siderably higher-

Insect Killers Made. By Synthetic Means

New pyrethrum-like chemicals that kill insects have been made synthetically for the first time in the laboratories of the bureau of entomology and plant quarantine, it has been announced by the U. S. department of agriculture.

The chemical makeup of the synthetic materials is almost identical with that of the insect-killing prime ciple in pyrethrum, according to the chemists.




