Funeral services for Mrs. Julian Taylor, Las Cruces, were held at 4 P. M. Monday from Saint Paul's Methodist Church, Las Cruces, with interment at the Masonic Cemetery, under the direction of the Nelson-Fulmer Mortuary. The Rev. Dr. A. C. Douglas officiated.

Mrs. Taylor passed away Friday evening July 8, 1949, in her Las Cruces home after a long illness. She was born at White Oaks, N. M., April 26, 1883, and moved to Carrizozo with her husband Mr. Julian Taylor in 1908. Mr. Taylor operated a hardware and blacksmith shop in Carrizozo until 1925 when he moved his business to Las Cruces.

AEC MAKES SURVEY OF TRINITY SITE

Los Alamos, N. M., July 15, '49

A small crew of University of California scientists under contract with the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission will continue during the summer to survey Trinity the site of the world's first atomic bomb explosion, which took place near Alamogordo on the morning of July 16, 1945.

Similar surveys of the Trinity site and environs have been made over the past two summers to study the fate of radioactive materials deposited in or on a desert soil. Many interesting problems of the redistribution of radioactive materials in soil, plant and animal life cycles are under study.

Since August 1948, the Trinity site, which is part of the Holloman Bombing Range, has been under the jurisdiction of the Department of Air, National Military Establishment.

Four years ago the test bomb blast in this desert area denuded the soil of vegetation in an area several hundreds of feet in radius. This area now has been reinvaded by woods and grasses and will apparently in due time become reestablished with the typical desert vegetation.

Field parties have studied mice, rats, rabbits, snakes, lizards and birds captured in the immediate area of the crater and in the area contaminated by "fall-out" from the detonation. "Fall-out" refers to radioactive bomb particles and dust which gradually settled out of the atmosphere after the explosion.

A total of 78 head of range cattle inadvertently exposed to the "fall-out" immediately following the explosion, is being studied at the University of Tennessee, Knoxville. Of 60 cows exposed, 49 produced normal calves.

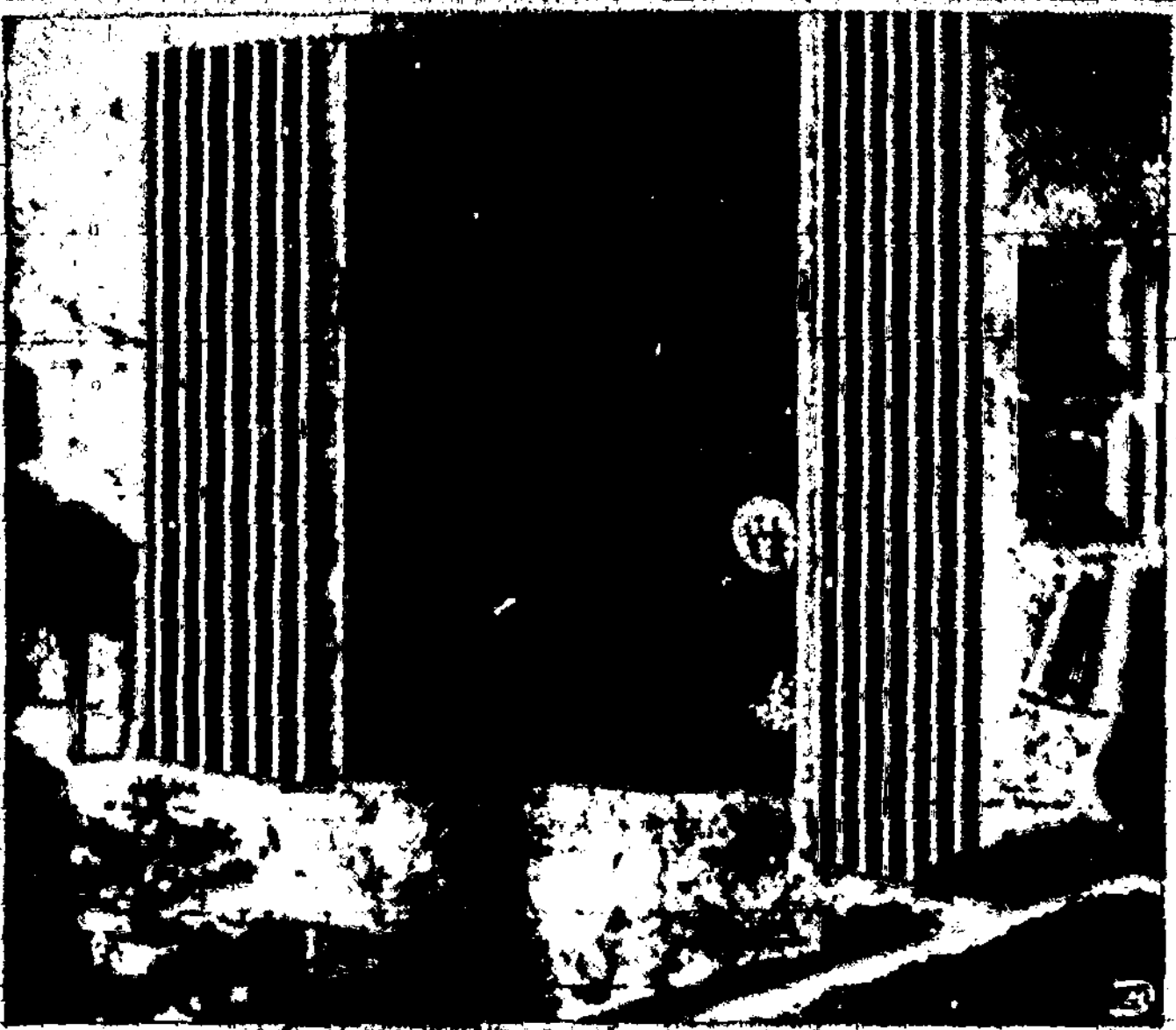
Following the test, the area of approximately a hundred acres around the site of the explosion was fenced and ample warning signs were posted to deter any casual visitors from entering. At the present time, radioactive decay has progressed to the point where daily visits of eight hours each would be within the prescribed minimum exposure.

Greatest Call For New Workers In Accountancy

NEW YORK—The honeymoon in job placement is over, and the "boys are actually letting the employers interview them," says Robert F. Moore, director of placement, Columbia University.

Job placements, Moore reports, are a little better than the last normal year, 1939-40. The greatest demand seems to be in accountancy. Salaries range from \$225 to 450 a month, depending upon the profession and the educational qualifications of the student.

Each year Moore conducts a career clinic at Columbia. For eight weeks college students hear leading industrial, management, personnel and professional figures get down to cases in advising which job to seek, what to study to prepare for a career, where to look for a job and how to get a job.

These clinics have proved so successful, says Moore, he has written a book, "How to Blueprint Your Success," which probably will be the basis of a credit course he plans to offer at Columbia. Only one other university in the country—Indiana—offers such a course for credit.

Should Study Alma

Here's what Moore tells the boys in his career clinics: Ask yourself: "What am I? What do I want? Where do I fit?"

Most people fall in a job, he says, not for lack of skill, but for failure to possess such personal qualities as the ability to express oneself orally and in writing; ability to get along with people; patience in attaining job goals; perseverance; alert minds, not necessarily Phi Beta Kappa, but more than merely willing to bet by; proper attitudes and mobility.

The interview is the first important step in getting a job. It's a 50-50 proposition. The employer finds what you have to sell that he can use. The interviewee discovers whether the company offers opportunities to satisfy his aims, interests and qualifications.

Certain Qualities

The employer wants to know about such personal qualities as appearance, manners, grooming, ethical make-up and how well you meet and impress people.

You want to know if the job gives you an opportunity to make the best use of your qualifications; whether it is a worthwhile investment in terms of selling your services, loyalty and the best hours of your life. What are the drawbacks and disadvantages of this job?

Moore offers some practical tips on how to get ready for an interview. He tells the boys to learn something about the job and the company. This calls for self-analysis of your objectives, aims and interests.

Illusions Shown as Normal, Ofttimes Are Lots of Fun

PHILADELPHIA, PA.—If you think you're seeing things, you're normal. If you don't, you're not. That is the state of affairs at Franklin Institute here.

The institute put on the largest collection of illusions on earth to prove that illusions are normal, and fun.

There was an uphill golf ball, a room that tilted the rest of the world crazily, a stationary automobile that moved and roses that were there, only weren't. Or you could watch a talking head—with no body to support it—or a motionless flag appearing to wave.

Psychologists estimate that 20 per cent of the population is illusion blind and can't recognize them. If one sees an illusion it proves normalcy.

It's time to worry when one doesn't see them.

The illusions at the institute were baffling, until they were explained.

It was puzzling to pass your hand through a pot of roses and never touch a rose. They weren't in the pot. They were behind it. It was ridiculously easy to understand, once it was explained. Mirrors.

The same explanation disclosed the secret of the talking head, the trick seen at nearly every sideshow. The body belonging to the head was cleverly concealed in a glass case.

Elderly Ladies Hitch-Hike Distance of 1,616 Miles

MOBILE, ALA.—A Canadian mother and grandmother, both in their 50's, completed a 1,616-mile trip that cost them only \$11.75.

The sisters made the entire trip from Ottawa to Mobile by thumbing it, thereby fulfilling a lifelong ambition to take a hitchhiking trip.

The two, Mrs. Hattie E. Thompson, 54, and Mrs. Pearl Embrey, 52, live in Ottawa. They came to nearby Theodore to visit a brother, W. W. Mackie, whom they hadn't seen in 47 years. Mrs. Thompson has five grandchildren.

"Everyone was very nice to us," they said, "and nothing eventual happened."

Altogether they caught 43 rides, one of them on a truck in Pennsylvania. The longest ride was 344 miles from Rogersville, Tenn., to Birmingham.

They covered the entire distance in five days.

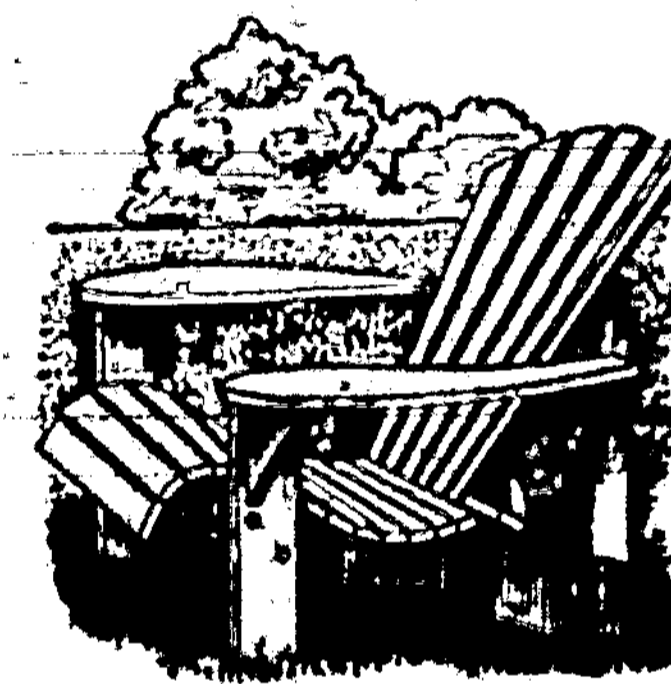

International Union Sunday School Lessons

Why Church Music?

Lesson for July 17, 1949

WHY church music? Hymn books are expensive, learning new hymns is a bother, choirs are a lot of trouble. Most preachers need more time for their sermons; why not cut out the music and let them have fifteen minutes extra? No, sir; it won't do. Say what you please, but the average church-goer knows better than that. He may never have thought it out and he might not have heard of the word "hymnology," but Mr. Average Churchman likes music in the church, even if he never opens his mouth himself.

Liturgy

SINGING in church was not invented yesterday. In the Psalms, as in our own hymnals, some of the poems were originally written and intended for use in public worship. The word "liturgy" simply means the order of manner of service, and all churches have liturgies whether they give them that name or not. Our familiar "Holy, Holy, Holy" was written for use in an early morning service; "Bread of the world" was written as a Communion hymn; "Break Thou the Bread of Life" while often used at Communion was not so intended, as you can tell by reading it carefully; it was meant for use just before the reading of the Scripture.

"Day is Dying in the West" is best used in an out-door service, "Ivory Palaces" was written one Sunday afternoon in North Carolina for use in an evangelistic meeting that night. It might interest you to leaf through your own hymnal and see how many hymns were written purposely for church use.

Songs of the Temple

THREE liturgical Psalms are our lesson selection. Use your imagination when you read them: As you read Psalm 24, think of a great procession marching through the streets of Jerusalem on a holy day and approaching the tall temple shining on the city's highest hill. Singing as they climb, perhaps one part of the congregation sings the question: "Who shall ascend into the hill of the Lord? Who shall stand in his holy place?" Perhaps another group of voices takes up the answer: "He that hath clean hands, and a pure heart..." As the great gates swing open, the chant rises: "Lift up your heads, O ye gates!" for the King of Kings, the Lord of Lords, is marching.

The little kings (in Israel and over the world) have come and gone; only the Lord of Hosts is the King of Glory. Singing the glory of God brings it before the mind far better than reading about it in a book!

Then the 84th Psalm is taken from what they called the "Chief Musician's Collection," evidently a part of what we now would call the choir library. It is the song of a man who loves the church and loves the people whom he finds there. Psalm 95:1-7 is also obviously a song for public worship, and still is sung every morning in churches around the world.

The Best is Not Too Good

IF in ancient times when God's people were learning to sing, the noblest poems of inspired men were set to the best music available and used for the honor of God and the help of man; then surely Christians ought to do no less.

If you had a friend, coming to see you, one whom you respect and wish to honor, you certainly would not set the table with all the shopped-up old kitchen china and you wouldn't put wilted flowers on the table and you certainly wouldn't keep the radio tuned to the tinziest trash you could find on the dial.

No, if you have anything for him you want it to be of the very best. Why not so with God? The house of God is no place for cheap, bad music, jingly meaningless rhymes, instead of noble hymns and psalms, tiresome grind-organ tunes or jazzy swing stuff instead of music that has real power and beauty. If nonsense is bad in a sermon, it is worse in a prayer and worst of all in a hymn. If mere noise is bad in a sermon, it is worse in a prayer and unbearably bad in a hymn.

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Aussie Males Said to 'Wow' American Girls

MELBOURNE, AUSTRALIA.—A graduate of Hunter college in New York who married a New Zealander but has lived in Australia since 1941 says Australian men are "better bets—as bachelors or husbands"—than American men.

She is Mrs. Violet Colbert, who was born at "and always moved back to" New Rochelle, N. Y. She said American girls "go" for Australian men.

Mrs. Colbert wrote "In Defense of the Australian Male" under the name of Carol Coleman in the Melbourne national fortnightly, Woman's Day.

The wife of a corset and brassiere factory manager in Melbourne, she said in an interview that she formed her opinion of the United States male in four years spent getting her B.A. degree from Hunter college.

She met her husband aboard the Matson liner Monterey coming to Australia, worked as a dietitian in the Melbourne Alfred hospital, for six months, then married.

Often "Surprised" "The Australian male," she wrote, "is often surprised, pleased and flattered by his success abroad. When he gets back home he is full of his glory and fond of telling the lass next door that she doesn't appreciate him the way American girls did."

"Why do American girls 'go' for Australian men? Why does the local product look so good away from home? Let me go right on the record, please, and maintain that it looks all right on its own home ground."

"You Australian girls who are fed on dazzling Hollywood versions of American womanhood and who recently were awed and blinded by American uniforms and wealth, lend an ear to one who speaks straight from the heart. You always take an Australian male any time or place, always."

Why? Because he has no "line"; because he's not messed up and hedged in by fraternal ties. Because he doesn't suffer from a surfeit of sophistication.

"Every American male is convinced that his line is unique, devastating and sure-fire, and that it effectively disguises the inner wolf. Attitude of Conceit

"This bespeaks an attitude of conceit in the American male, and that is why Australian men are better bets—as bachelors or husbands. The American man expects to hunt, or to be hunted, while there is less self-consciousness between the sexes in Australia, and more genuine friendliness."

"I attribute this to three causes: the early age at which boys and girls go out on dates in America; the early age at which American boys are allowed to own or to drive cars, and the accessibility; and fraternal ties."

"My first 'date' was when I was the ripe age of 14, and my escort a seasoned 16. He had his car, and a junior license. In Australia boys and girls go to parties and dances in groups."

"Girls of 15 in New York talk about their 'steadies,' and refer to other children of similar age as 'going steady.'"

Atomic Time May Take Place Of Current Measure Systems

PHILADELPHIA.—The world is about to face a choice between two kinds of time, because the earth's rate of rotation is slowing.

This is the message of the world's chief timekeeper, Britain's royal astronomer, Sir Harold Spencer Jones, chief of Greenwich time. He is having trouble with the length of the day, he reported to the American philosophical society.

He said that because of the gradual slowing in the earth's rotation time today is not the same as in Babylonian days. Records of Babylonian astronomers show this. Time is slower now because the earth takes longer to reel off 24 hours.

That will go on, Sir Harold said, until it will take 47 of the present days for the earth to make one turn on its axis.

In that day, too, the earth will always present the same face to the moon, because the moon's motion around the earth will be slower. You will have to travel half way around the world then to see the moon if you happen to live on the wrong side.

Sir Harold said that although this long day is too remote to be important now, its beginnings are about at the parting of the ways.

Until now clocks haven't been accurate enough to be bothered. But Sir Harold said the new atomic clock about to be built by the national bureau of standards, Washington, will really differ from the time shown by present Greenwich methods of relying on the earth's rotation. The atomic clocks will be correct. Mother earth will be wrong.

The slowdown is due partly to the drag, that is friction, of tides in shallow seas. The moon raises these tides. It works just like the moon using a rope to hold back the earth.

Freeze Foods for Future Use (See Recipes Below)

Freeze your Foods

ROAST TURKEY in mid-summer, broiled chicken in January and strawberry shortcake in December, these are some of the items which are a real possibility on menus if you have facilities for freezing your food. This may be a freezer right in your own home, or it might be space rented at one of the large lockers that are now available in so many localities.

Foods know no season when it's possible to freeze them, and, this, of course, is one of the best ways to avoid meal monotony. You simply freeze the food when it's at the peak of the season, then eat it when you want it.

Freezing food is one of the simplest of preserving methods since foods require only a minimum of preparation, and they retain their freshness until thawed and prepared.

How to Prepare Meat For Freezer

IT'S a simple job to freeze meat for future meals and you need follow only a few, simple rules to do it successfully.

When choosing animals for freezing, select those healthy ones of size and weight which will produce the quality of cuts preferred by the family. Excessive fat is unnecessary, but an ample covering of fat protects the lean from drying out during the frozen storage. This latter does not apply to veal since that meat has little fat.

These rules apply whether you purchase meats from a market or produce house. Ask for quality cuts from prime cattle, and mention that you intend freezing them and the butcher may be more careful in his selection.

Once the carcass is prepared, chill the meat immediately as bacteria grow rapidly at the high temperatures. Molds, bacteria and yeast may ruin the flavor of the meat unless it is chilled at once.

Meat cutting is no job for a novice and should be done by the butcher or an expert meat cutter at a locker plant. You, however, should specify cuts you want, if you've purchased a carcass or part of one. It's a good idea to have the meat cut in family size portions to eliminate waste, since the meat cannot, or should not be frozen once it has been thawed.

It's popular, too, to have meat boned since it requires less freezing space, and since the bones cannot puncture wrapping paper once they're eliminated.

Proper Wrapping Saves Quality

IT'S UNWISE to economize on wrapping paper for frozen foods since the meat may dry out and "freezer burns" often result. Regular butcher paper, ordinary waxed paper or grocery store type paper are not used. Moisture and vapor-proof paper bags or cartons made especially for this purpose are best. They should be easy to fold, wrap or handle, tough enough to resist tearing, and capable of receiving an ink or china pencil mark for labeling.

Use These Freezing Tips to Help You Varieties are of great importance in the successful freezing of fruits. Apples for sauce, for example, should be Baldwins, Greenings, Northern Spy or Yellow Transparent types. Study the freezing space which will be available to you, and plan how much of each fruit, vegetable, meat or poultry you will have. Don't overstock one item so that you can't freeze something you want.

Each bundle of meat in the freezer should contain enough meat for your family for a meal. Waxed or waterproofed paper may be used between each hamburger, steak or chop since this makes them easy to separate and hastens thawing once they come out for use. Or, in this case, you may readily remove two or three chops without thawing the whole package.

Pull the proper wrapping tightly around the meat to smooth out all possible air and eliminate air pockets. The package should be smooth and firmly packed to conserve storage space.

Seal the paper with a "drugstore fold" which means bringing one edge over the other and folding it over the shorter sheet. Now twist or fold the ends and seal with acetate (scotch) tape. This tape is not affected by moisture or cold.

Label all packages so you can easily identify them when you want them. The label should contain the type of meat enclosed, the number of servings or the weight in pounds, and the date on which it was wrapped for freezing.

As soon as the meat is wrapped and labeled, place in the freezer. If you do not have a freezer at home, store the packages in the refrigerator until you can take them to the locker, but this should not be more than a few hours.

Frozen Poultry Keeps Well

Frozen poultry is one food which keeps well in its frozen state, and requires even less attention than freezing meat since you, yourself can prepare it for freezing with no special tools. Clean the bird and disjoint it, and in place of cooking it, wrap it for freezing to be cooked several months later.

Birds are killed, bled, plucked, chilled and dressed before they can be packaged. If you desire, it's a great convenience to stuff the poultry and freeze it in that state, so the poultry is ready to pop in the oven for Christmas or Thanksgiving dinner. Do not use sage in the dressing if you expect to keep the bird more than three months since the flavor permeates the meat.

Here's a guide for chicken to be frozen: broilers should not weigh over two and a half pounds dressed, or be over 12 weeks old; frying chickens should weigh from three to three and a half pounds and be 20 weeks old.

Fowl for fricassee may weigh from four to six pounds and can be from one to two years old. A roasting chicken should weigh four to five pounds, but is best if not more than a year old. Capons should weigh from 7 to 10 pounds but should not be over 8 to 10 months old.

Fruit juices for breakfast or beverages are easily frozen. Select good juices from well-matured fruits and chill thoroughly. Extract the juice and pour into paraffin coated tubs or cylinders. Freeze immediately. Water used for washing fruit, berries and vegetables should have ice in it unless the temperature is lower than 5°.

Speed the harvest to the freezer just as you speed food to the can for canning to prevent food value loss and deterioration.

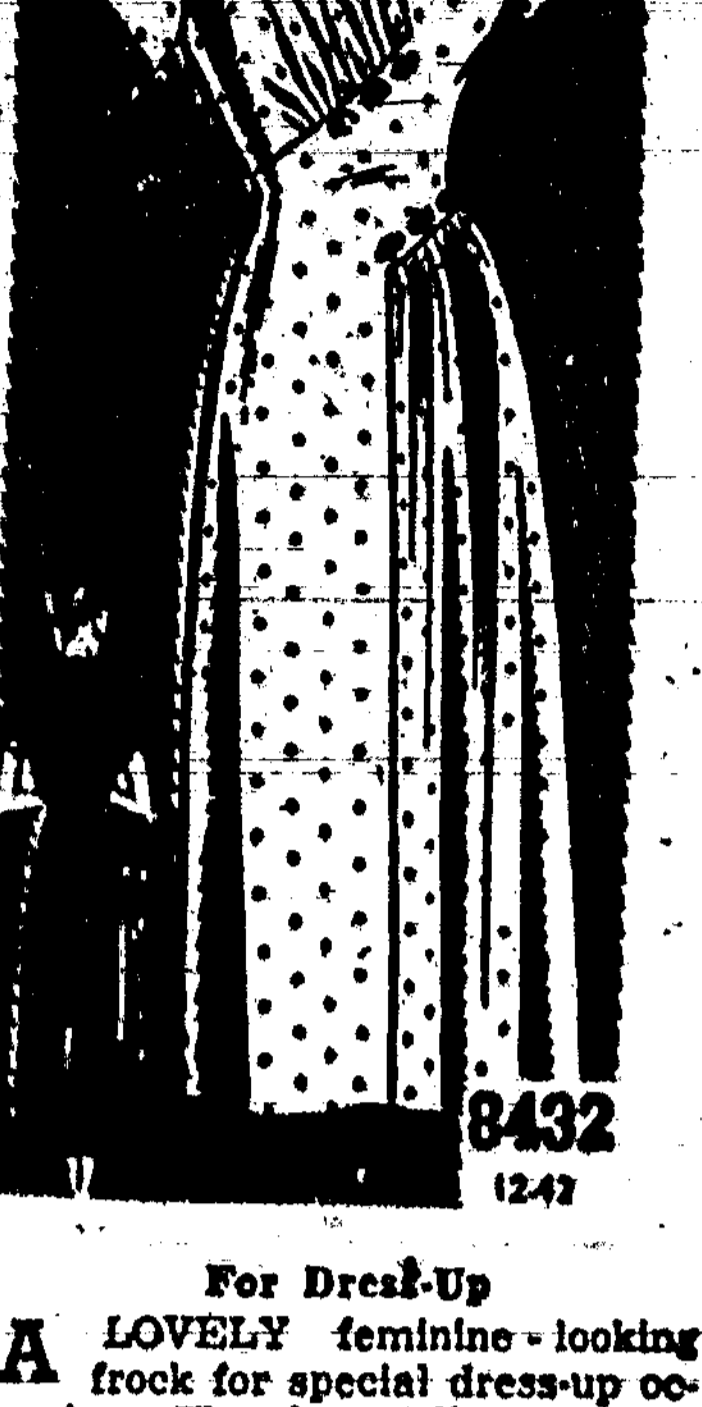

The meat grinder helps make meat tender. After grinding, any meat cooks as quickly as a tender cut.

Next time the youngsters hint at "having something different for supper" try serving mashed and seasoned sweet potatoes baked in the shells of tart apples.

Mix chopped tongue and hard-cooked eggs, season with salt and pepper and mix with salad dressing for a sandwich filling. Serve on a plate with shredded cabbage and cucumber topped with dressing.

Since frankfurters are cooked when manufactured they need only be heated; cover them with boiling water and simmer (do not boil) for about 5 to 10 minutes until they are thoroughly hot.

In addition to the convention, the ACBA and SWCBA will hold their official show and exhibition. Dates for the show are Sept. 25 through Oct.

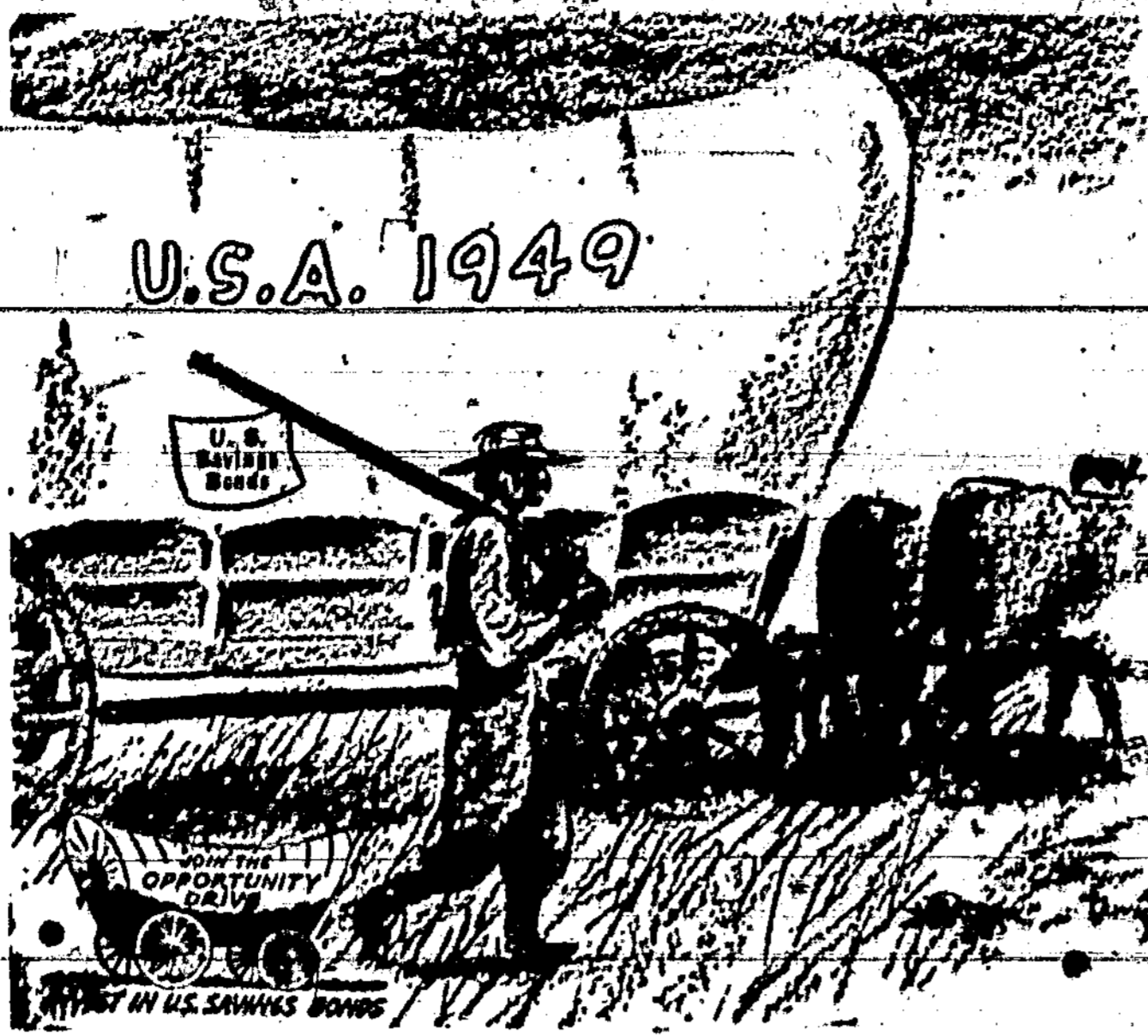
Convention dates are Sept. 25-28.

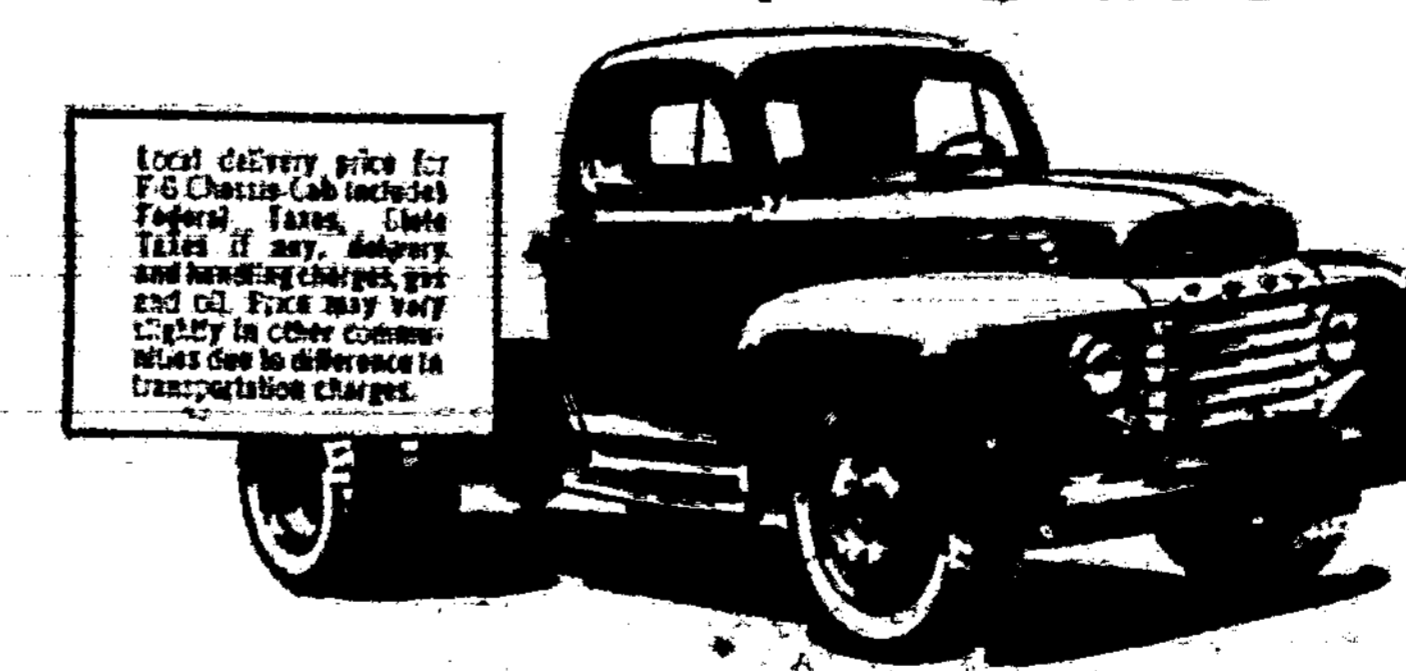

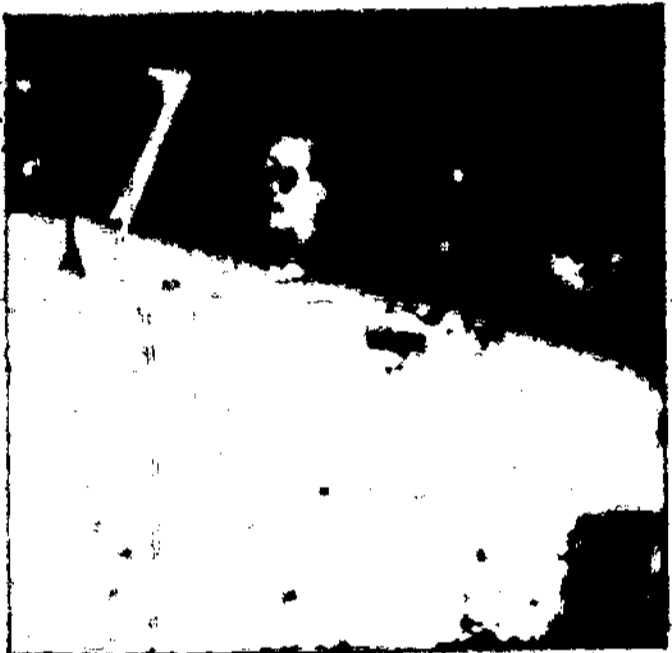

4-H Safety Workers in All-Out Attempt to Reduce Accidents on Farms in 1949



MR. FARMER, has the 4-H Club member in your family checked your farm and home for accident and fire hazards lately? If not, you can expect him to do so any day now. 4-H'ers are making an all-out attempt to reduce the annual cost of accidents affecting farm folks--including motor vehicles, fire and property damage--which totals more than one billion dollars, or also trying to cut down the number of accidental deaths, which kill 51 farm residents in the U. S. every day in the year.

Your 4-H'er doubtless will caution you to drive carefully on highways, and use proper signals when turning or stopping (top right). More than 7,300 rural people are killed annually in motor vehicle accidents. In fact, more fatal automobile accidents occur in rural areas than in any other location.

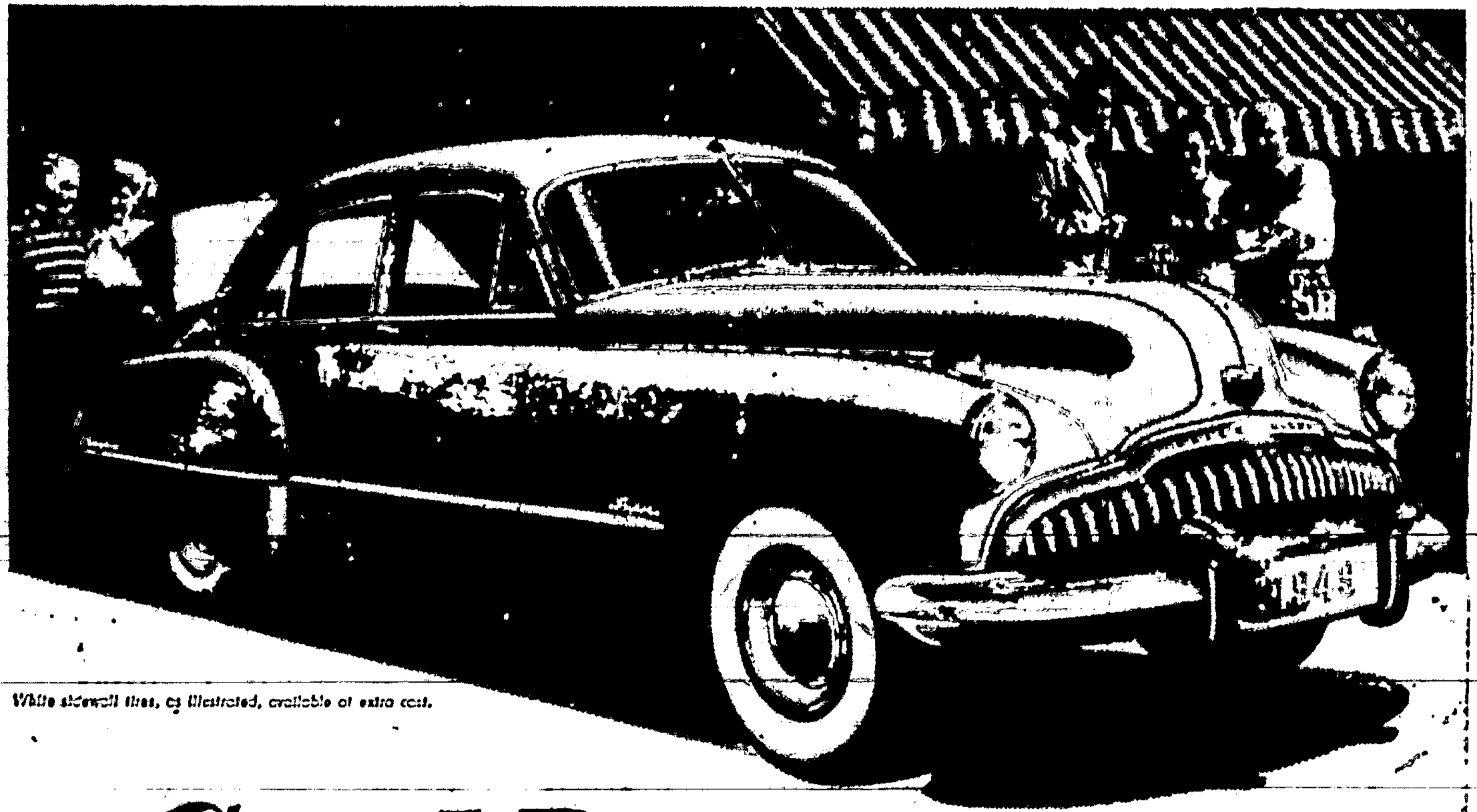
Falls rank second in farm accident causes. So watch your step when carrying a clothes basket. Like the girl shown in right photo. Your 4-H safety worker probably will suggest you fasten safety straps or put them on the side of the bag, and keep stairs well lighted. Are your lightning rods properly grounded? The 4-H'ers shown at top left found the ground wires broken and therefore worthless. Lightning, which is one of the greatest causes of farm fires, each year destroys 20 billion dollars worth of farm property, kills 560 farm residents and injures 1,200 others.

National Farm Safety Week will be observed July 24-30. Rural boys and girls taking part in the National 4-H Farm Safety program

want to make you, your family and neighbors safety minded so that accidents mentioned above won't happen.

For achievements in safety work, the 4-H boy or girl may receive a prized sterling silver medal of honor as county winner. General Motors also provides an educational trip to the National 4-H Club Congress, Chicago, next November, for the state winner, and \$200.00 college scholarships for each of the eight national champions. By practicing safety from this time on, you'll not only help your 4-H'er in his safety work, but help save a life--which may be your own.

Southern Pacific Orders 67 Diesels

Southern Pacific announced today that orders have been placed for 67 diesel locomotives of various types, at a cost of more than \$28,000,000, in furtherance of its extensive improvement program.

In making the announcement A. T. Mercier, president of the railroad, said the new orders will raise to approximately \$241,000,000 the company's post-war expenditure for new rolling stock, nearly \$80,000,000 being for 263 diesel locomotives.

Deliveries of the newly ordered diesel locomotives are scheduled to start in October of this year, and when the current order is completed in June, 1950, Southern Pacific will have a total of 402 diesel locomotives of types in operation on its lines. Mercier said

Of 196 diesel locomotives previously ordered since V-J day, the railroad had received 163 by mid-June, of which number 54 are of 6000 horsepower. The company's present fleet of 238 diesel switchers is one of the largest of its kind in the country, the railroad president pointed out.

Included among the 67 diesels just ordered will be 28 of 6000 horsepower each, for main line service; 17 road switch locomotives each 1500 horsepower; and 22 switchers, each 1000 horsepower. The company also is acquiring an additional passenger diesel unit.

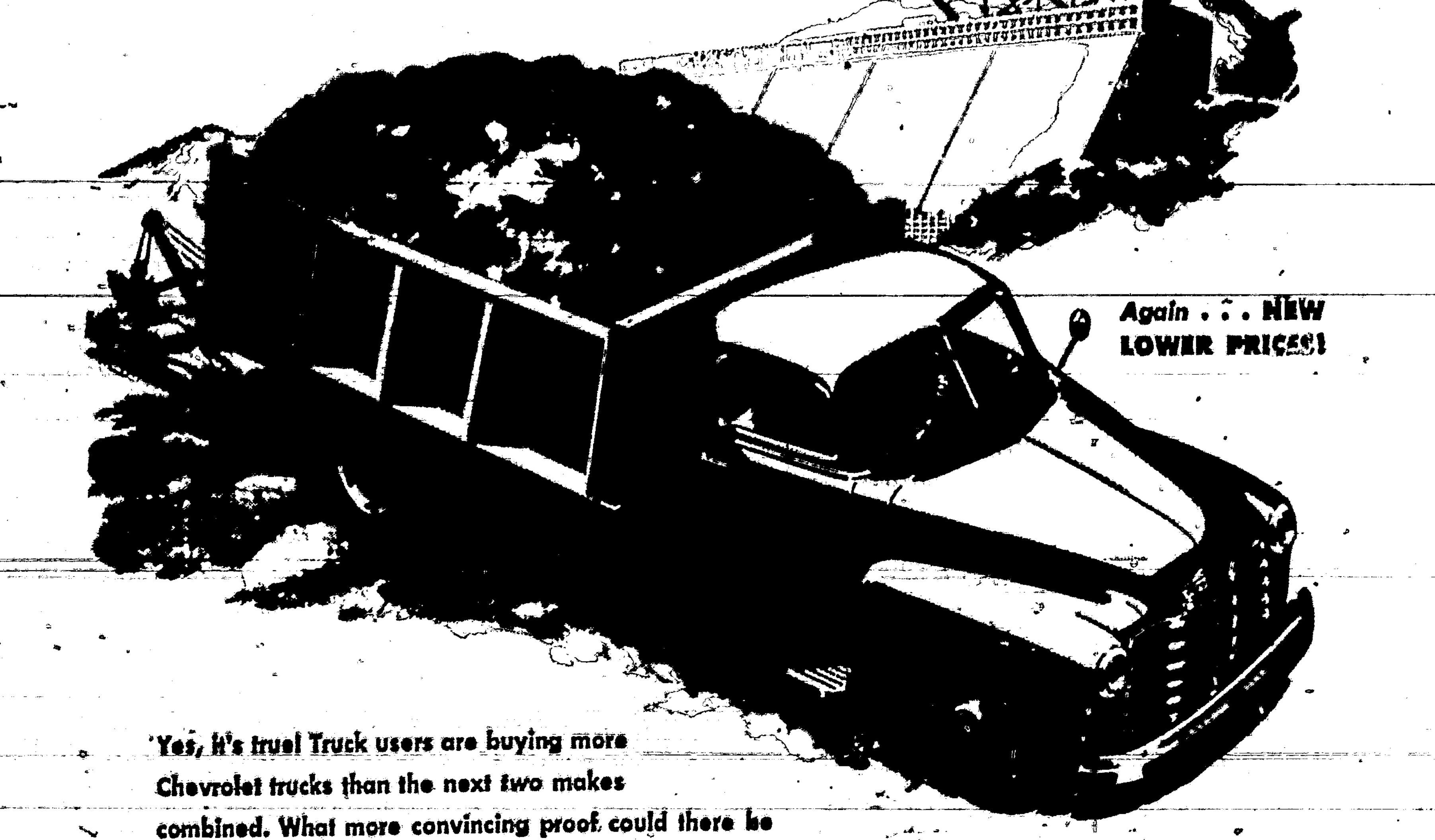

Soap Holes Found Value in Disguise

Produce Magic Mud With Multiple Uses

Ever since Belle Fourche, S. D. was a rip-smorting cattle town at the end of the old Chisholm trail its residents have been damning the "soap holes" that plagued the area.

Fast-riding cowboys often took a nasty tumble in this super-slippery mud and cattle were forever getting bogged down in them.

But now, like a man discovering his hives are really a blessing, Belle Fourche has found its soap holes are one of its biggest assets.

Most of us already are using it a half dozen times a day, but almost nobody has heard of it. Men use it in shoe polish and hand cleaners. Women use it in face powder, lotions, beauty cream.



Bentonite is the most absorbent material found in nature. When moistened it swells to several times its normal size.

Bentonite also is found in many types of paint, plaster and cleaning agents. It's handy for filling holes in giant dams and for casting molds for molten metal.

Its new uses and increasing popularity for its older uses all add up to a boom such as Belle Fourche hasn't seen since the gold rush.

In the past 10 years the population has practically doubled and bentonite now pours \$500,000 a year into the town in the form of additional purchasing power.

Scientists say that bentonite, a strange mixture made up mostly of dust from prehistoric volcanoes, is found almost nowhere in the world except in the Black Hills of Wyoming and South Dakota.

It is the most absorbent material nature ever has devised, they say, and a half dozen teaspoonful will soak up a glass of water.
