


Religion and Habits

Lesson for September 18, 1949

TF RELIGION is not moral, it is a poor, flimsy, no-good religion. If morality is not religious, it soon cracks. Religion has to be moral

and morality has to be religious, or else both of them their excuse existence. This is not a new idea. It was in the Bible long ago. Our Psalms for this are among those that bring out this truth: God interested

how people live.



He is interested in what they do days and seven nights a he is interested in their habits as much as their souls. Psalms 15 and 24 are so plain on this point that they need no explaining.

Churches and Liquor Don't Mix

THIS truth, that right religion and right behavior are twins, lights up all of life like a floodlight; but since this is our temperance lesson, let us focus it more or less on one spot.

It is a sore spot: the drink habit. Why does the church make such a fusz about people drinking? Catholic churches are opposed to liquor in excess, and most Protestant churches are opposed to liquor, period.

The movies have made the "binge," the hangover, almost respeciable; but the church knows better. .Why? Will the time ever come when the churches are not opposed to the liquor business? No, it will not; because the churches know what liquor does.

The minister is usually the man (along with the lawyer and doctor and the sheriff) who has to pick up the pieces when drink gets a man or a woman and breaks up a family. The minister gets behind the ocenes, he knows that some funerals would not have been funerals if it had not been for drink.

The car that "went out of control," the dicence that should not have been fatal, the family quarrel that grew to hatred and violence -he sees enough of these caused by alcohol, to have no illusions about the stuff.

A Psalm in Reverse

TF THERE is a single reader of these lines who imagines that religion is only a "matter of the soul" and has nothing to do with what people eat or drink, then let him try a little experiment with the 15th Poalm.

As it stands in the Bible, it is a description of the kind of man who can appear without shame before God-in short, of the religiousand-moral man.

Now beginning with verse 2, take the Psaim phrase by phrase, and see how false and ridiculous it is if you try to make the description fit the man with the drink habit. "The victim of drink walketh uprightly, and worketh rightcommess-"! Quite the contrary, he seems to be doing his best to ruin his own happiness and that of others.

"The drunkard speaketh the truth in his heart"-! There is one truth he never speaks in his heart: I am a drunkard. The one thing the victim of alcohol never admits till it is too late (if ever) is the hold which alcohol has on him. "He that backbiteth not with his tongue, nor taketh up a reproach against his neighbor"-1

Contempt Is No Cure

WELL, read on for yourself. The W slave to alcohol (and many a man is chained to it, who would feel insulted if you called him an alcoholic) certainly does not fit the description of the man whose life God approves.

But the Christian will by no means think his duty done merely by sitting in the scorner's seat, or being an abstainer himself, or even by helping those who have fallen into the pit. He will remember that an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.

The liquor business has no conscience. It sometimes comes out with plous remarks about temperance-but it keeps right on advertising, it knows no law but profit. The only whole-hearted workers

for temperance will always be the people who make no money out of intemperance. And the most effective workers for temperance will be those who themselves, in all their habits, give examples in life of what they preach,

Serve Fish Often For Meal Variety (See Recipe Below)

ISH do not swim in the ocean just to be eaten on Friday," says the old adage. If you've had the good fortune of eating fish prepared properly, then you certainly will adhere to the adage, for fish cooked to perfection is truly delicious.

But, there are other reasons for eating fish, too! You may have abundant bodybuilding proteins,

minerals and vitamins when you have a fish

Fish are modestly priced whether you buy them fresh, quickfrozen or canned, so they'll help you with food budgeting problems, They're plentiful and amazingly versatile, if you'll just give them a chance.

If you don't particularly enjoy fish, try a new way of preparation. One of the recipes in today's column might start you on a new food adventure. Or, if you tend to get tired of fish, try other methods of preparation with a dash of spanking brand new flavor tricks. You'll be surprised at how many new ways there, are for preparing the same foods.

Many have heard of "fish and chips," but have you ever tried them at home? Use filets of fish which have been cleaned, then season with salt and pepper. Roll them in flour and dip in a thin batter, and fry in deep fat (260°) Served with shoe string potatoes, also fried in deep fat until golden and crisp, a hearts of lettuce solad and a generous serving of lemon quarters, you'll have a really delicious dinner for any night of the week.

DO YOU OBJECT to the odor of fish? Fish which is not overcooked will not have that odor to which you may rightfully object. It's wise to remember that fish is delicate and does not need long and use for fish filets which have cooking to make it tender.

Baked fish is popular, especially when it's stuffed with a nicely seasoned celery mixture, then served with a longy lemon-butter sauce.

*Stuffed-Baked Fish (Serves 6) 3 to 4 pound whole fish

3 tablespoons chopped onion % cup chopped celery I tablespoon minced parsley 14 cup bacon drippings

4 cups dry bread cubes 1 teaspoon salt % teaspoon pepper

I teaspoon sage, marjoram or thyme 4 slices bacon

Have fish cleaned but leave on head, tall and fins. Wipe dry. Rub inside and out with walt; let

stand about 10 minutes. Cook onion, celery and parsley in drippings until golden brown. Combine with bread cubes and seasonings.

Toss lightly and stuff fish loosely. Fasten fish with skewers and lace with string. Place fish, seam side in individual casseroles. Mix down in a shallow, well greased oysters with bread crumbs, then baking pan, Brush with melted fat top with vegetable mixture. Dress or salad oil. Bake, uncovered, in with lemon juice. WHY MISSOURI PACIFIC RAILROAD STRIKE?

Over twenty years ago, the Congress of the United States passed the Railway Labor Act. It was hailed by union leaders as a model for the settlement of labor disputes.

Frink LEADERS of the Brothechood of A Locomotive Engineers, Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, Order of Railway Conductors, and the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen on the Missouri Pacific Hailroad have refused to avail themselves of the peaceful means provided by this Act for settling their disputes. They insist that they be the sole umpire of their own disputes over the meaning of contracts.

There is no Need for Strikes

With all of the available methods for the interpretation of contracts, there is no need for a strike or even a threat of a strike, but the leaders of these railroad unions have ignored the ordinary procedures established by law and insist upon imposing their own interpretations of their

contracts by means of a strike. The wheels have stopped rolling on the Missouri Pacific. They may stop rolling . on other railroads at any time. Recently the Wabash Railroad was forced to discontinue operation for several days under similar circumstances.

What are These Strikes About?

. These strikes and strike threats are not about wage rates or hours. They result from disputes over the meaning of existing contracts. They cover claims for a full day's pay for less than a day's work, or for payments for services performed by others who were fully paid for the work done.

President Truman's Board · Condemn**s** Strike

There is an established legal method for handling disputes involving existing written contracts-just as there is such a method of settling any contract dispute

which you may have in your daily life. The President of the United States appointed a Fact Finding Board to investigate and adjust the Missouri Pacific dispute. This Board reported, in part, as follows:

". . . it is with a deep sense of regret that we are obliged to report the fallure of our mission. It seems inconceivable to us that a coercive strike should occur on one of the hation's major transportation systems, with all of the losses and hardships that would follow, in view of the fact that the Railway Labor Act provides an orderly, efficient and complete remedy for the fair and just settlement of the matters in dispute. Grievances of the character here under discussion are so numerous and of such frequent occurrence on all rallroads that the general adoption of the policy pursued by the organizations in this case would soon result in the complete nullification of the Rallway Labor

Obviously the railroads cannot be run

efficiently or economically if the leaders of the unions ignore agreements or laws.

Provisions of the Law which are Disregarded

There are five ways under the Railway Labor Act to settle disputes over the mean-

ing of contracts: I-Decision by National Railroad Ad-

justment Board. 2—Decision by System Adjustment

Board for the specific railroad.

3-Decision by arbitration. 4-Decision by neutral referce.

5-Decision by courts. The Missouri Pacific Railroad has been and is entirely willing to have there are putes settled in accordance with the re-

quirements of the Railway Laker Act. Regardless of this fact, the union leaders have shut down that railroad.

Innocent Bystanders Suffer Losses and Hardships

There are about 5,000 engineers, firemen, conductors and trainmen on the Missouri Pacific. They are known as "operating" employes, and are the most highly paid of all employes on the nation's railroads, but their strike action has resulted in the loss of work to 22,500 other employes of the Missouri Pacific. In addition, they have imposed great inconvenience and hardship upon the public and the communities served by that railroad.

The Railway Labor Act was designed to protect the public against just such interruptions of commerce.

If these men will not comply with the previolens of the law for the settlement of such disputes. then all thinking Americans must face the question, "What is the next step?"







What's phosphorus to a pig?

Just a half a pound of your 250-lb. pig is phosphorus. This seems a small amount. But without it, your pig would die. And there are other minerals just as vital to livestock. Some they need in quite large amounts... calcium and sodium as well as phosphorus. Others we call trace elements. These they need in very small amounts ... Buch an cobalt, iron, copper and manganese.

But your animals do need these trace elements. The people at the agricultural colleges have proved that past all doubt. Some minerals are a "must" if you want to raise healthy, fast-gaining cattle. That goes for lambs and hogs, too. For example, these mon find that grass and grains in Dade County, Florida, are short of copper and fron. Chillam County, Washington, needs iodine to check goiter. They know that San Diego County, California, hasn't enough phosphorus. In Aroostook County, Maine, the scarce mineral is cobalt. Ranchers and farmers in these four corners of the country have this problem. Their feeds and forages are chort of one or more vital minerals. Many other areas share the problem, including parts of the great Corn Belt.

But you ask, "How can I spot animals which suffer from mineral shortage?" It's not too easy. If the lack is scrious, your stock may have rickets, "big neck," anemia

or other ailments. But there are some early symptoms you can spot. These are bone chewing, loss of appetite, slow gains, rough and scrubby coats. Or just a general unthrifty condition gives you the clue. If you start feeding a mineral which contains the essential trace clements, you may bring them around fast. But if this doesn't work, then you should consult your veterinarian, county agent or agricultural college.

The common mineral desiciencies in your area are known. By feeding mineral-balanced rations, you can correct these lacks. Or you can build up the mineral content of the soil. Either, or both, of these will help you grow healthier livestock, at a lower cost.



Supplemental Mineral for Wintering Range Ewes by William H. Burkitt Mentana State College


Thirteen mineral elements are William II. Durklit known to be necessary for normal functioning of an animal body. However, this does not mean that all 13 must be supplied in a mineral mixture. Many of them are present, under usual feeding conditions, in sufficient amounts for breeding ewes. Those lacking in Montana include sodium and chlorine (salt), iodine, phosphorus, and possibly cobalt.

Lack of sufficient jodine in the ration of pregnant owes results in lambs being born with "big neck" (goiter). Thin wool in lambs may also result. If dead or weak lambs have shown "big neck" or thin wool at birth in past years, stabilized iodized salt should definitely be fed the ewes this winter.

Phosphorus deficiency may exist in wintering range ewes, particularly if there is little or no supplemental feeding. Abortions and weak lambs may result from deficient phosphorus. Pregnant ewes should have from 0.16% to 0.18% phosphorus in their feed. Many grass have and mature range grames contain less than 0.15% phosphorus and some contain as low as 0.04% phosphorus. Bone meal, defluorinated rock phosphates, and monosodium phosphate are satisfactory sources of phosphorus. Palatability and consumption may be improved by mixing with salt.

Cobalt is believed to be needed by microorganisms in the paunch. A lack results in loss of appetite, less feed consumption, and eventually starvation. WA possible cobalt deficiency may beguarded against by mixing I ounce of cobalt salt with each 100 pounds of stock salt. Cobalt carbonate, chloride, or sulfate are all satisfactory. (Editor's note: The principles of nutrition discussed above apply to meet hinds of bisecoch and in all parts of the country.)

know, times change-but some folks don't change with the times. I'm thinking of the type of man who always thinks that someone is getting the best of him in business. He sells a load of steers. No matter what his return, he's not satisfied—the packer, the commission man, the retailer—somebody else always gets a "bigger slice." But, during this past summer, I talked to lot of people about the livestock-meat industry and our mutual problems. And I found a refreshing, encouraging attitude-"Sure, we got problems. Who hasn't these days? But if producer, packer and retailer work together as the 'meat team,' we'll work things out ... "It's just good business to have a decent regard for the contributions made by other members of your team. Thope you have followed the "Meat Team" advertisements of the American Meat Institute and will talk to your neighbors about them.

FACT CONFIRMED—Out in the West, whenever I passed a town with a local meatnacking plant, I thought, "This town, out here division is lots of livestock, is well served by that local plant. But what about the distant cities filled with meat eaters and no nearby livestock production to speak of?" I know for a fact that meat has to travel an average of more than 1,000 miles to reach those consumers. The only way they can get meat is through the low-cost processing and marketing services provided by nationwide meat packers, like Swift & Company.

MONEY and MEAT—In the fall months we run into an unusual situation in the livestock-meat packing industry. At that time we often see the year's high market for top finished beef cattle. And this top price usually is being paid when the average price for all cattle is moving in the opposite direction.

The high price is explained by the fact that during the fall we usually have the shortest supply of the year of well finished, long fed cattle. Brisk demand for this short supply naturally will force the price up. The lower average price results from the annual move to market of huge num-

bers of grass-fed cattle. About 20 per cent of all the cattle and lambs slaughtered during a whole year must be handled in September and October. Meat from these animals being slaugh tered any given day generally is on the dinner table in less than 14 days.

Folks aren't likely to have any more money to spend on food during the fall months than in February, when fewer meat animals are being marketed.

Since beef and lamb is largely a fresh

meat business, there's a lot of meat to eat during the fall months. Consequently, since consumers have no more money to spend, meat prices have to be lowered. And that's just what happens, as it usually does with an increased amount of meat to be sold and no increase in the amount of money with . which to buy it. These lower meat prices are most noticeable, of course, in the large conguming centers where surplus supplies always can be moved at a price.

Naturally, then, livestock prices follow meat prices. Producers should keep in mind that the prices they receive for their livestock are governed by what the packer can get for

the meat and the by-products. This is perfectly demonstrated, as we have pointed out above, when the price for one kind of cattle, in short supply, is moving up at the same time that prices of other cattle, in heavy supply, are moving down.

Martha Logan Recipe for FRENCH MEATWICH

Make sandwich of 2 slices of bread, using I slice of cold meat and a slice of chaese as the filling. Dip each sandwich into a mixture made of I slightly heaten egg and 1/2 cup milk. BRITISH LOAN:

True to Form

Even before the talks got fully underway, the trend of the discussion concerning British-American finance deals was becoming familiarly clear.

THE PROBLEM was Britain's current financial crisis. The hope rested with U.S. procedure as it affects assistance. That the U.S. was thoroughly under the spell of British need and personsion was shown in the statement that this government is hospitable to a proposal to relax terms of the British loan pact.

Under the current preliminary proposal, the U.S. would grant Britain permission to discriminate temporarily against American goods. Under the British loan pact. Britain got 3.75 billion dollars from the United States in return for a promise to treat American exports the same as those from British empire countries and Europe.

. Now, the British want that requirement knocked out. Here's how the British plan would work:

BRITAIN could, for instance, refuse to license British buyers who want to buy American goods, but SPENDING: it could give "open licenses" to Britishers who, for example, want- | Slash Rejected ed to import Italian goods. 
