SEND GIFTS EARLY

The deadline for mailing gifts to many foreign countries in order to assure their delivery prior to Christmas is rapidly approaching, according to T. U. Purcell, District Manager for the U. S. Department of Commerce in El Paso.

"In just a little more than six months Christmas will be with us, and joy of giving will be our chief hobby," Mr. Purcell said, "and to make sure that we reap the full enjoyment of giving and just as important, that our friends and relatives in foreign countries receive our gifts promptly with a minimum of delay and without expense to themselves, all of us should fully understand the regulations of our country and other countries relating to the shipment of gift parcels."

Many countries make no provision for the duty-free entry of gift parcels, and others have certain restrictions which prohibit some items from being included in gift parcels. Mexico, for instance, has a limit of \$500 on the value of temporary imports. Gifts should also be properly marked with the recipient's name and address and should be sent by registered mail.

Import duties cannot be prepaid by the sender, but for many countries to which Americans regularly send gift parcels, international money order facilities are available so that it is possible to send the recipient money to offset expense of duty and delivery charges.

Purcell suggests that anyone thinking of sending Christmas gift parcels to foreign destinations should ask his office for a copy of the Commerce Department's gift package memoranda for the country to which the packages are going. The memoranda contain regulations of the particular country affecting the treatment of gift packages, and may be obtained from the El Paso District Office of the U. S. Department of Commerce, in the El Paso Chamber of Commerce Building, without charge.

ANNUAL SUN CARNIVAL

The annual celebration, designed to focus attention on the pleasant year-round climate of the Southwest, is climaxed with the Sun Bowl game—the oldest bowl in Texas and fourth oldest in the nation.

A feature program is the lighting of Old Man Winter, a giant statue of ice that this year will be annihilated during a festival of ice dances on the night of December 31. Thousands pack El Paso's downtown streets for this night of revelry alongside the city's famous Sacramento Plaza.

On the morning of Jan. 2, before the Sun Bowl game, a city parade, based on the theme of Fairyland Fantasy will wind through streets lined with celebrants from throughout the Southwest. Princesses and cities will ride on individual floats for this first annual Sun Bowl parade.

Floats are being built on Hollywood-scale by professional designers. Themes include: The Magic Carpet of Bagdad, Jack and Jill, Aladdin and his Lamp, The Sleeping Beauty, the Crooked Man in a Crooked House, Rip Van Winkle, Cinderella, the Wizard of Oz and Humpty-Dumpty.

Other events include a Southwestern tennis tournament, Rancho breakfast, the International Bridge ceremony, and a sun tan and freckle contest. Nearby attractions for tourists are Juarez, a stone's throw from downtown El Paso; White Sands; Carlsbad Caverns and Chihuahua City, 200 miles south in Old Mexico.

This business of certain "I do's" covers a lot of territory. Take that pertinent section about "in sickness or in health." With my mouth wide open and a dentist peering downward, it occurred to me that one "I doer" in the Stuart household must be getting weary of writing checks to our teeth expert.

Between "ahhh" and a few "ows" I managed to ask the man at work why the dental profession hadn't come up with something to do away with tooth decay and help out family budgets—to say nothing of aching molars.

"You can stop biting the drill now," says he. "I'm finished. You must be psychic. I was just going to tell you about a discovery that may be an answer to your problem."

There's a new toothpaste that looks like the most promising approach to the prevention of tooth decay yet found. He proceeded to explain that only a month or so ago a scientist presented a report before the International Association for Dental Research on the dramatic results achieved with a new toothpaste containing chlorophyll. Checking on my high school chemistry I was assured that chlorophyll was the wonder-working substance that gives grass and other green plants their color and upon which all living things depend. Chlorophyll is the name given to the natural green paste and sitting out the scientific jargon, it does three main jobs with only two brushings a day. First, it lowers the acid bacteria count in the mouth more effectively than any other known substance. Second, it also acts to prevent breakdown of protein parts of tooth enamel. The third and most quickly apparent achievement of the green paste is the ability to completely deodorize the mouth. Unlike other pastes or powders which merely mask odors with strong, biting flavors, the new dentifrice actually destroys offensive odors and retards their return.

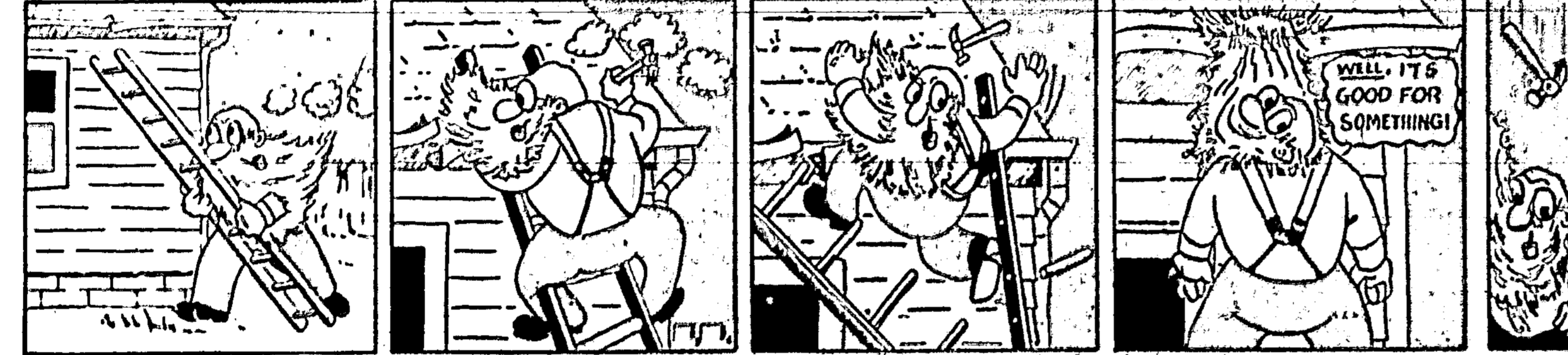

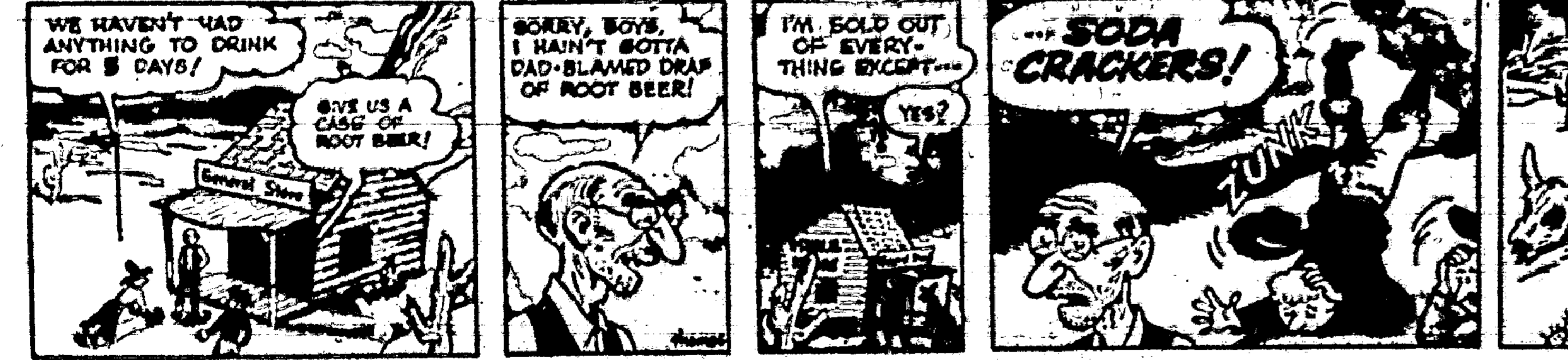

THE BIBLE SPEAKS International Union Sunday School Lessons By DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

God's Open House

Lesson for November 20, 1949

IT IS A WARM chapter, this 55th of Isaiah. Some false ideas about God melt away fast when they are brought close to it. Let us take a look at some of these notions and see how they will in the light of God's word. Sometimes these notions are held sincerely, sometimes they are mere excuses to keep from facing God. One of these mistaken notions is the idea that God has two lists: one is a list of people on whom he intends to have mercy, and will save; the other list being a private one, of those on whom he intends to have no mercy and will not save. If your name is on the first list, fine; but if it is on the "second" list, you are in a hopeless fix; for if God is not going to help you, who can?

This is a terribly wrong notion. It confuses the true God with some sort of sultan in the sky who has a "social register" of persons he will admit to his palace. "Use this invitation as your card of admittance." No, it is not at all like that. If you really think that admission to heaven is by card only, then cut out Isaiah 55 and present it at the gate. Cut out any verse in the Bible that says "Whosoever,"—John 3:16 for example—and present that. God keeps open house, he does not employ butlers or strong-arm men to keep out the crowds, he wants all to come who will. Do you want God? Then come. Are you thirsty for the living water? Then drink. It is as simple as that.

No Waiting THERE IS ANOTHER notion that keeps people away from God. It is a kind of shyness. It is the feeling that maybe it isn't any use hunting for God. It is the feeling a boy has when he is lost in the woods and has about made up his mind that there is no use in walking any more, he will just sit down and wait till somebody finds him.

It is the feeling that God may be sensitive and doesn't want people coming bothering him. It is the notion that if God wants me, he will knock me down and drag me where he wants me to be. A man with a notion like that, of course, isn't likely to meet with God.

He spends his life paying God no attention whatever, not even thinking about him, perhaps. He may even go as far as he can from the Father's house, believing that God's long arm, like the long arm of the F.B.I. or the Mounties, will reach after him and get him in case God ever wants him.

Now this is a ridiculous idea and a bad one too. Isaiah would not think it true for a minute. "Seek ye the Lord," he says. "Call on God... return to the Lord." "Incline your ear and come!" This means you—if you will. But if you won't, God will not force you. He forces no man. He wants willing obedience, loving service, not slavery. God will have no chain on you but the chain of love. God keeps an open house, not a prison farm.

No House Of Horrors

ANOTHER WRONG NOTION, for which, alas, many a church member is partly responsible, is the notion that the nearer we get to God, the gloomier we shall be. All the talk about sacrifice and suffering for others, such as we were thinking of last week, all the emphasis in the church on the death of Christ, all the solemnity of most church services, make people think: "God may be all right for solemn people, but not for me; I like life with a smile."

Now that is just another mistaken notion. The very persons who know the deeper meanings of sacrifice are just the persons who don't like to use that word about themselves.

In fact, it could be said that in general it is only Christians who have a right to be gay. Jesus himself, on the same night in which he was betrayed, spoke to his friends about sharing his joy to the full.

Isaiah 55 is certainly no invitation to gloom. Joy, peace, the clapping of hands are there. But how do we know Isaiah was right? There is only one way, and that is not to sit arguing about it. You never know what a party is like by staying at home.

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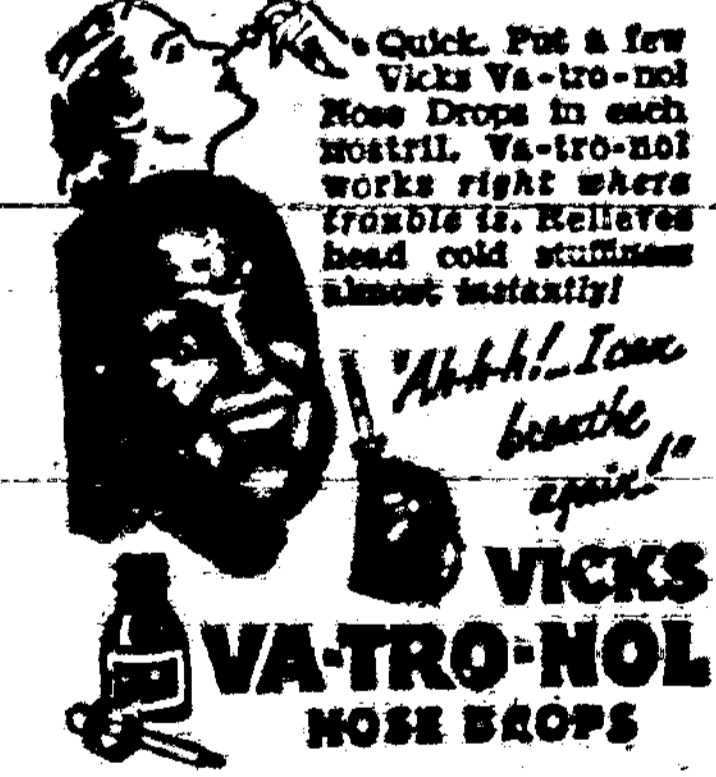

IT WON'T BE LONG now before one of the biggest of the holiday meals will grace your table: golden brown, done to a turn turkey, chicken or other fowl, with the trimmings, topped off with a dessert of glistening pumpkin pie or spicy mince-meat.
The market list will be a long one, the preparations extensive and the planning careful. Start early and make an outline of all ingredients to have, and just what should be done when. Then even a Thanksgiving dinner will be well organized and efficiently executed.

FOR TURKEYS weighing 8 to 10 pounds, use an oven temperature of 325°. For turkeys over 18 pounds, use an oven temperature of 300°. Plan to "rest" the turkey 15 to 20 minutes after roasting to make carving easier.

***Sweet Potatoes with Oranges (Serves 8)**
8 boiled sweet potatoes, sliced thin
2 oranges, peeled, sliced thin
1 lemon, peeled, sliced thin
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup water
Arrange potatoes and fruit in layers in a buttered casserole. Sprinkle with sugar, dot with butter and add water. Cover. Bake in a moderate (350°) oven until tender.

***Gingerale Fruit Salad (Serves 8)**
2 tablespoons unflavored gelatin
2 tablespoons cold water
1/4 cup boiling water
1/4 cup lemon juice
2 tablespoons sugar
1 cup gingerale
1/2 cup red grapes, seeded and halved
1/2 cup celery, finely chopped
1/2 cup apple, cored and cubed
1/4 cup pineapple cubes
1/2 cup cubed, canned pears
Dissolve gelatin in cold water, add hot water, lemon juice, sugar and gingerale. When mixture thickens, fold in fruit. Chill in one large or in individual molds. Serve with mayonnaise.

Chiffon Pumpkin Tarts (Makes 8)
1 envelope unflavored gelatin
1/4 cup cold water
1 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon ginger
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup brown sugar
firmly packed
1/2 cup rich milk
2 cups canned or cooked pumpkin
1 cup heavy cream, whipped
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
8 baked tart shells
Soften gelatin in water. Combine spices, salt, sugar in top of double boiler. Mix well. Stir in milk and pumpkin. Place over boiling water

Stuffings will have a more nut-like and appetizing flavor, when the cubes of bread are toasted lightly before using.
Carve an equal amount of light and dark meat so that everyone may have his preference.

and heat to boiling point, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat; add gelatin and stir until dissolved. When cool, fold in whipped cream and vanilla. Pour into baked and cooled tart shells, if one large pie is desired. Chill until firm. Garnish with toasted pecans. Serve with additional whipped cream, if desired.

How to Prepare Turkey
CLEAN TURKEY by removing all feathers. Singe and use tweezers on pin feathers, if necessary. Wash and drain well. Rub cavity with salt. Stuff neck and body cavities lightly as stuffing expands during roasting.

For a turkey over 12 pounds, wrap strips of clean cloth around end of each leg bone and tie with string. Cover cloth with shortening. This prevents lower leg from drying. Tie leg bones together and fasten string under the tail to hold legs upright to the body. Rub surface of the turkey with softened butter. Roast turkey in a slow oven following the times given here:

8 pounds	3 hours
10 pounds	3 1/2 hours
12 pounds	4 hours
14 pounds	4 1/2 hours
16 pounds	5 1/2 hours
25 pounds	6 1/2 hours

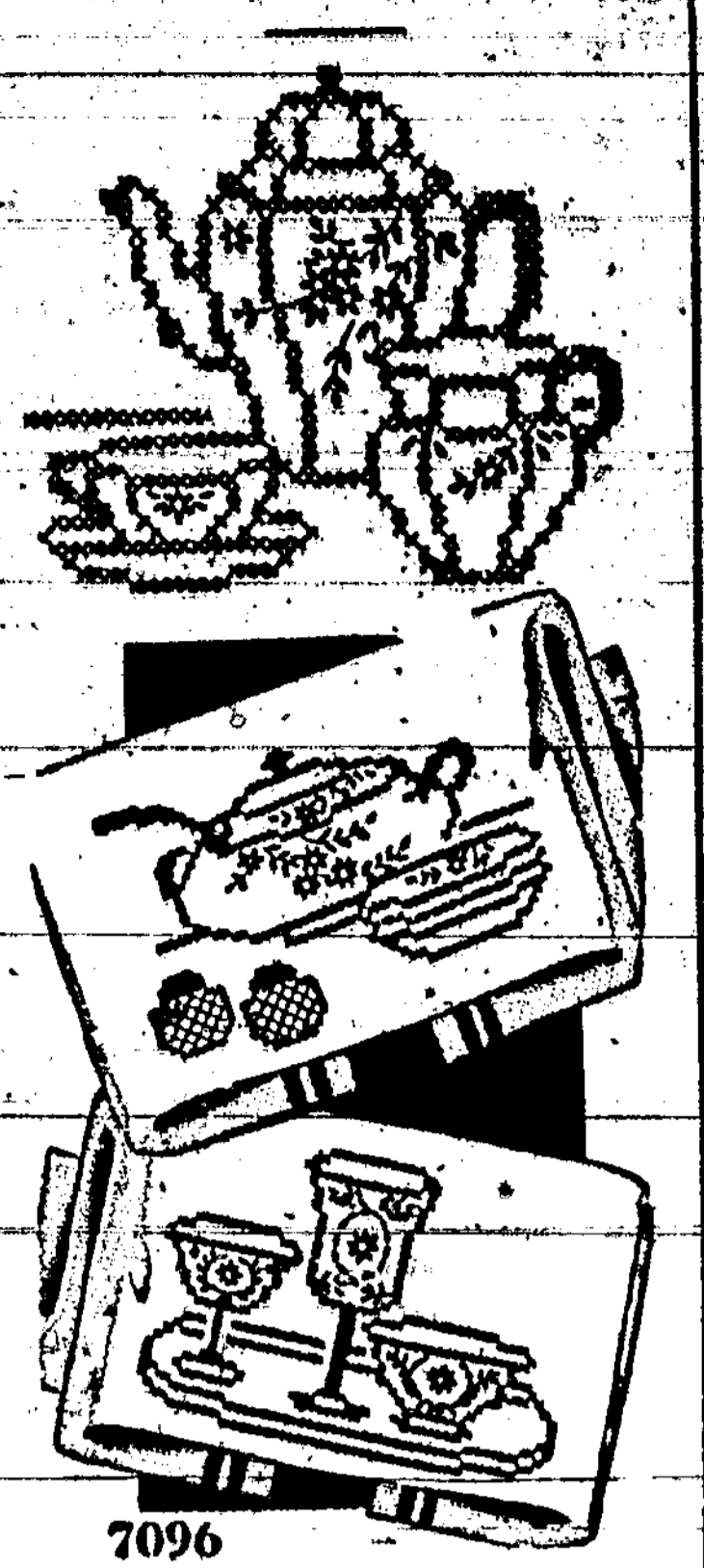

***Oyster Soup (Serves 8)**
2 tablespoons onion, grated
1 tablespoon celery, minced
1 tablespoon parsley, minced
2 tablespoons butter
1 tablespoon flour
1 pint bouillon
1 pint oysters
Simmer vegetables lightly in butter. Add flour and brown. Gradually add oyster liquor and bouillon. Season and cook for five minutes. Just before serving, add oysters, either cut or whole, and cook only until they curl.

***Fresh Cranberry-Apple Bread Stuffing (For 16-pound turkey)**
1 quart fresh cranberries, chopped
1 quart peeled, chopped apples
2 teaspoons lemon juice
2 cups sugar
1 cup finely chopped celery
1 gallon 1/2-inch bread cubes
1 cup water or broth
Combine all ingredients in order given. Add water or broth and mix well.

Turkey and stuffing will both keep better if the stuffing is removed from the bird before storing in the refrigerator, after the meal is over.
If you are depending upon a roast meat thermometer to guide you in testing the "doneness" of the turkey, it should register at 180°.
When the turkey is done, the drumstick can be moved up and down rapidly. The meat feels soft when the thickest part of the drumstick is pressed between the fingers protected with cloth or paper.

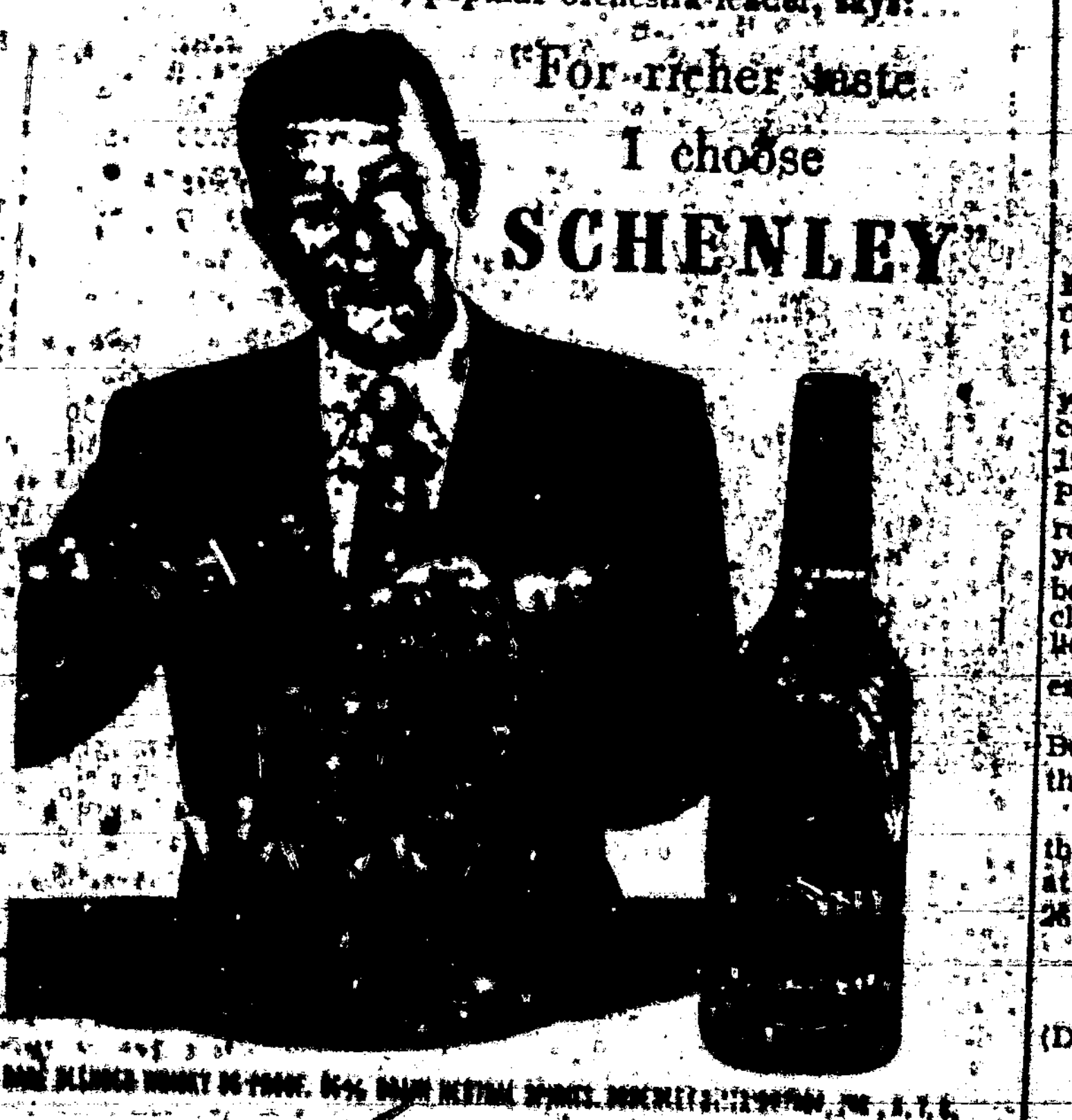

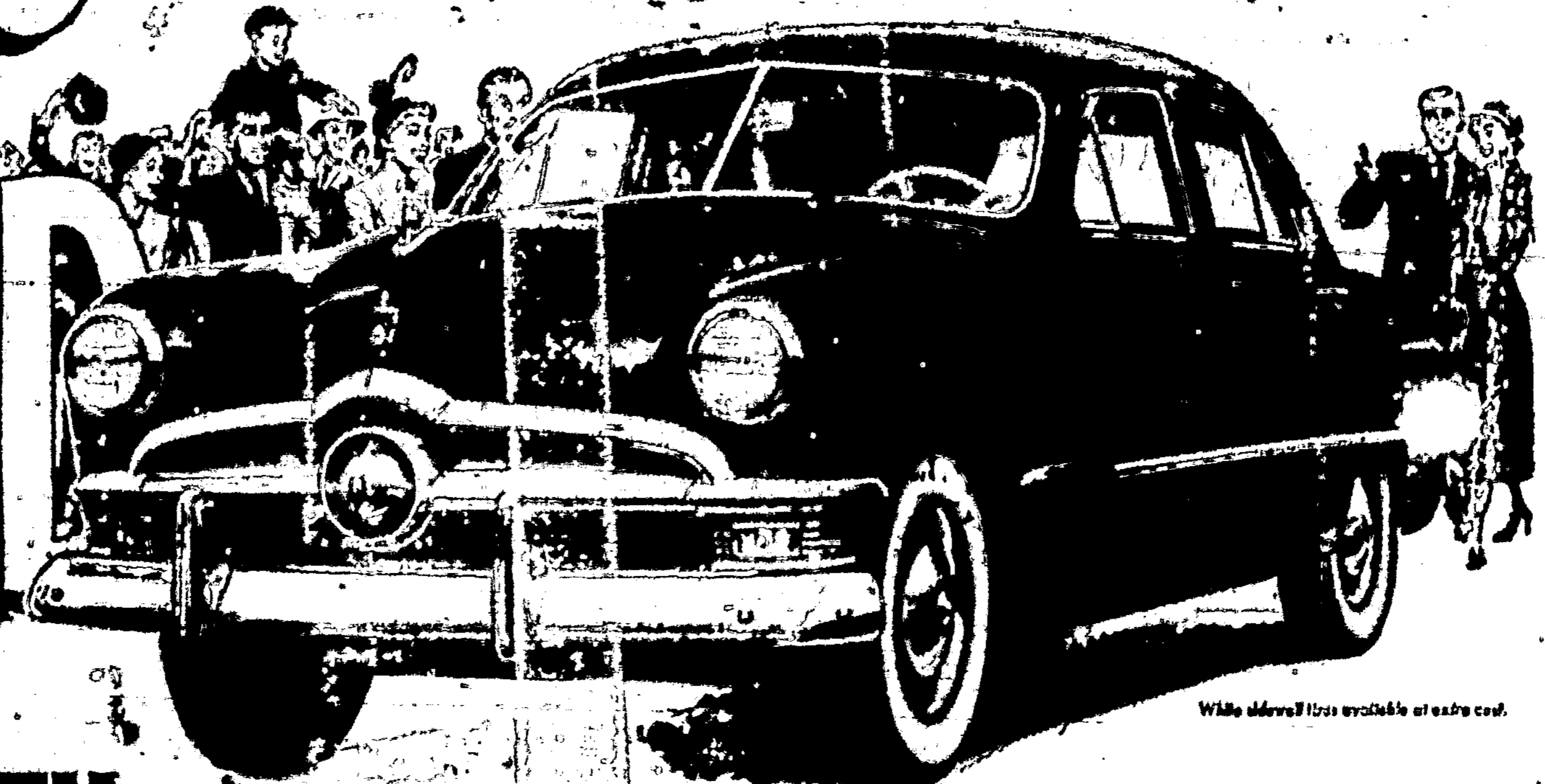

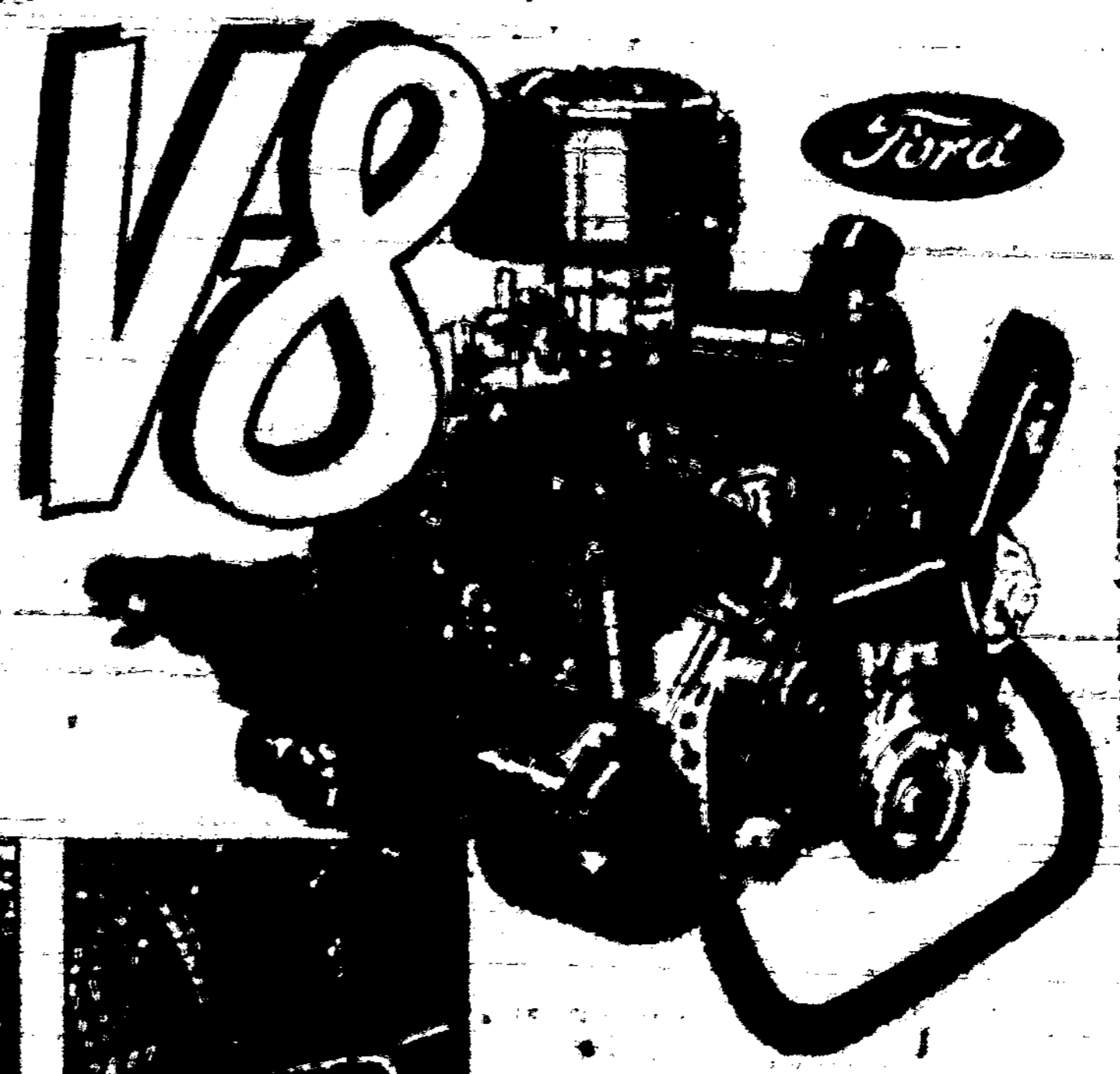

The total 1949 assessment of general property for Lincoln County is \$9,111,887, as compared with \$8,895,616, an increase of \$216,271, or about 2 percent. For municipalities the comparative assessments are as follows: Capitan, 1949, \$195,427 and 1948, \$185,335; Ruidoso, 1949 \$1,084,042 and 1948 \$990,051; Greentree, 1949 \$86,507 and 1948 \$78,180; Carrizozo, 1949 \$482,130 and 1948 \$472,800; Corona 1949 \$137,303 and 1948 \$132,678.

The table below shows the 1949 assessment and total tax rate for each school district. In district 3, Ruidoso is included in the municipal levy of \$2.13; in district 7, Carrizozo \$2.18; and district 13, Corona, \$1.49 on property within the corporate limits.

The levy is shown in dollars, beginning July 1, 1949 and ending revenue for the fiscal year beginning in October 1949 and the second half in April, 1950. The state rate is \$5.75 and the county rate is \$11.89.

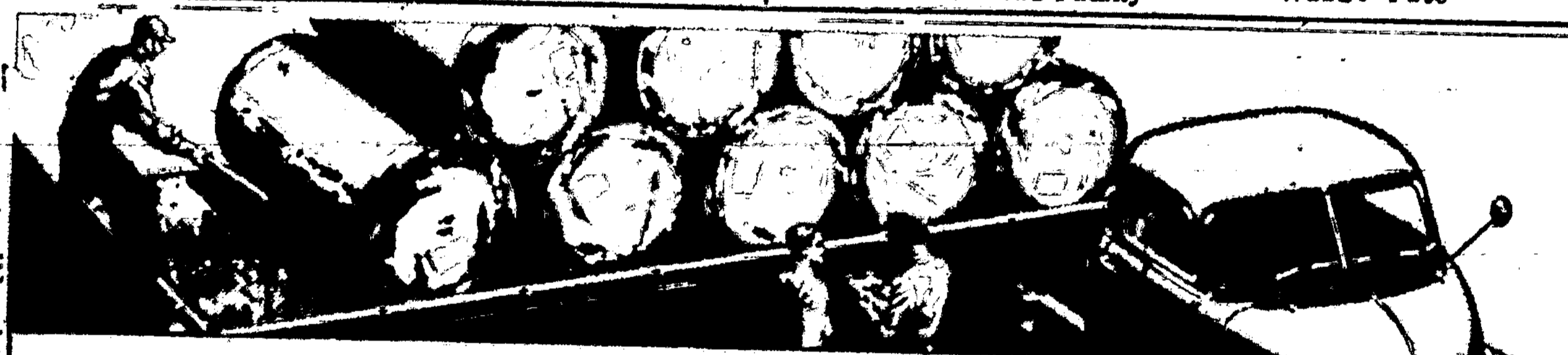

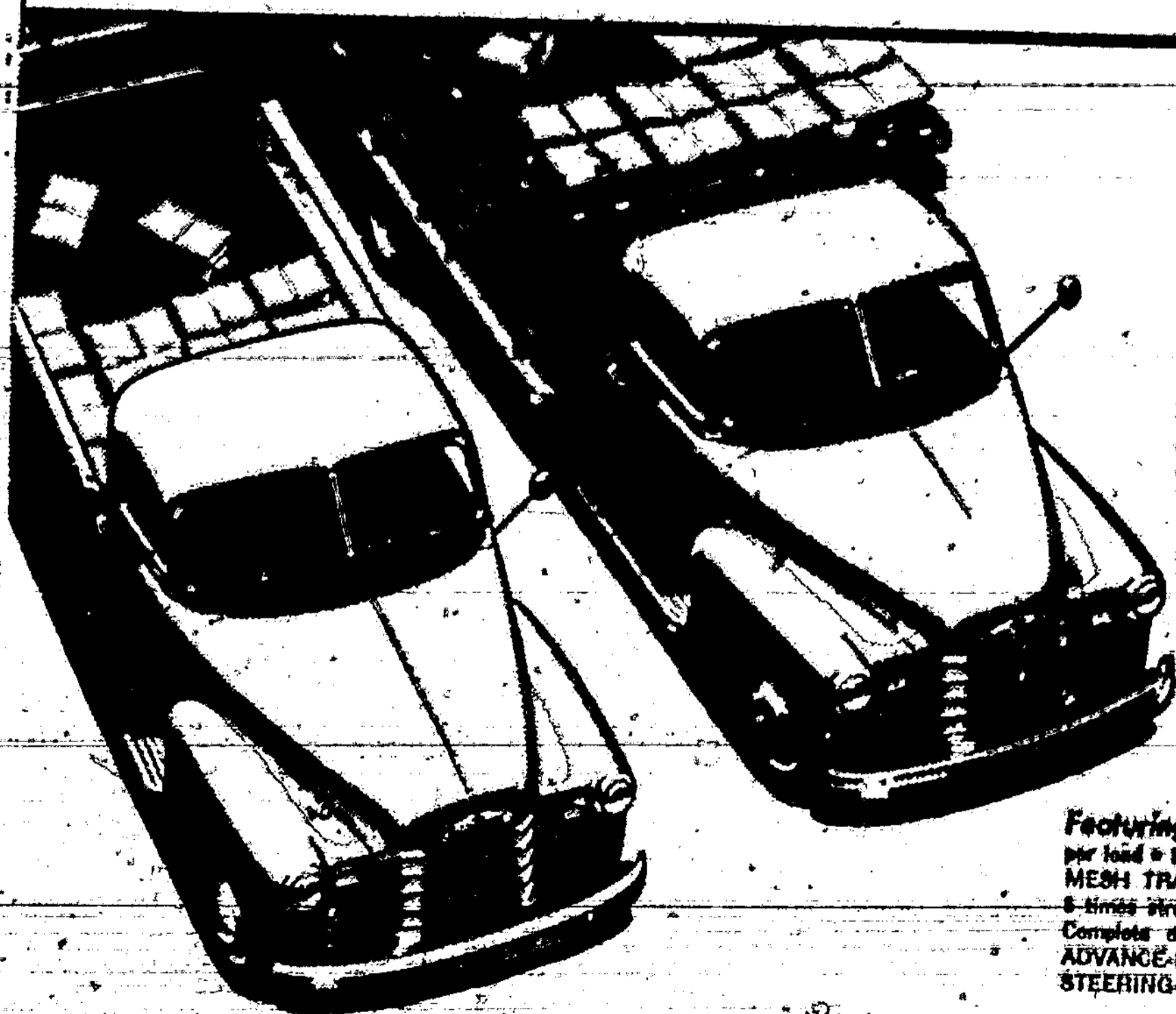

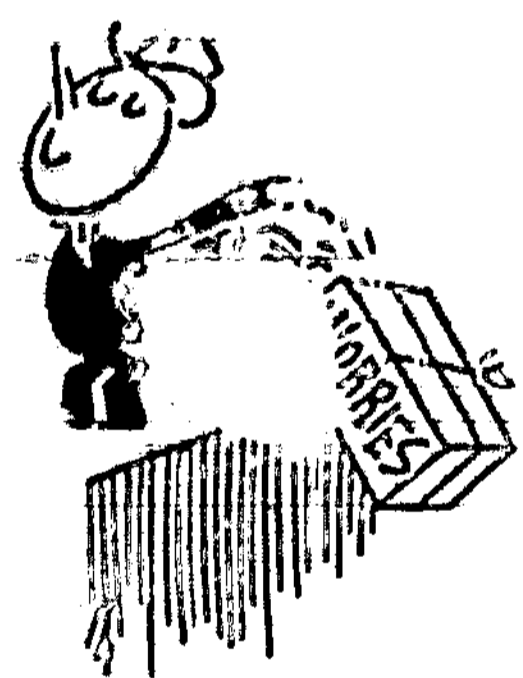

OUTLOOK FOR BEEF CATTLE
IN 1950 IS GOOD

With demand for beef likely to continue strong, and supplies of beef about the same, the economists don't expect average cattle prices to be much lower and will have more calves, cows and heifers on feed.

The economists doubt that as big a share of the feeder cattle will be steers next year. Since to get as many good steers as they did this past season, steer slaughter has run high this year and since cattlemen are tending to hold back their calves, feeders may not be able to get as much grain feed as at the beginning of this year.

If the weather proves favorable next year, farmers and ranchers will have enough feed to keep up the present level of beef production and make another increase in cattle numbers.

Economists of the U. S. Department of Agriculture point out that not only will feed grains be plentiful, but beef cattle will have less competition for range and pasture. Numbers will continue high the rest of this year and in 1950. Farmers had more feeder cattle the first of this year than ever before. When the first of January rolls round, farmers seem likely to have at least as many of sheep and horses and mules have been going down for years

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS

Bethlehem Steel Signs With Union; Confusion Shrouds Defense Policy; Industry Profits Reflect Up-Trend

BIG STEEL:

The Break Comes

The break had come in the steel strike.

The United Steelworkers had signed an agreement with the Bethlehem steel corporation ending the strike for that company's 80,000 workers and breaking the otherwise solid front that had been maintained by big steel in the strike issue.

IT WAS A TRIUMPH for CIO's President Philip Murray who announced that the agreement called for Bethlehem to pay the full cost of minimum \$100-a-month pensions for all employees 65 or over with 25 years of service. A social insurance plan also was included in the agreement.

Bethlehem, the industry's second largest producer, was the first unit of big steel to capitulate to union demands for a company-financed pension and welfare plan.

No one could say just how much the pension program would cost the steel company per hour for each employee once it begins operating. It was expected the pension plan would start to function in January and the social insurance program would get underway at about the same time.

Murray told newsmen that a "very conservative" estimate of the pension cost to the company would be about 10 cents an hour, but added actuarial studies would have to be made before the cost could be determined definitely.

THE CIO LEADER said the Bethlehem action would set a pattern for the steel industry, but declined to say what companies he was talking to privately.

"Big Steel," speaking through U. S. Steel corporation President Benjamin F. Fairless said:

"We renew our earlier proposals to sit down with the steelworkers union in an endeavor to negotiate a mutually satisfactory program of course we will study the Bethlehem settlement."

The question was: How long would the remainder of "big steel" hold out? The Bethlehem pact was a forceful argument for the unions for, they could argue, if Bethlehem can do it, so can you.

STETTINIUS:

Was Hard Worker

With the death of Edward R. Stettinius, another major figure of the Roosevelt era passed from the American scene. The former secretary of state died of a heart attack at the age of 49.

STETTINIUS' contributions to his government were many and valuable. A rich man's son, he earned a life of leisure and, instead, determined to make his own way, which he did rather well. He was chairman of the U. S. steel corporation at the age of 37. At 44, he was U. S. secretary of state, the top cabinet post. He was lend-lease administrator, taking over the post in 1941, a job in which he directed the \$3-billion-dollar flow of supplies that played a major role in defeat of the axis powers.

Youngest secretary of state since the administration of George Washington, Stettinius held the post only 11 months. He resigned to become the first U. S. delegate to the United Nations general assembly. He was one of Roosevelt's advisers at the Yalta conference with Winston Churchill and Joseph Stalin.

ALBANIA:

New 'Strong Man'

The Communists were beginning to throw their weight around in Albania. A new Communist "strong man," Lt. Gen. Mehmet Shehu, Moscow-trained army chief of staff, was reported gradually taking over control from Premier Hoxha.

ACCORDING to reports reaching western diplomats, Shehu appears to be the actual ruler of the country. Hoxha, Albanian leader for five years, was reported to have been shoved into the background although he retains the title of premier.

The "strong man" is only 34 and he not only is the boss of the army, but also chief of the secret police, interior minister and vice-premier. He is described as the most ruthless Communist in Albania. He gained considerable fame in Albania during the war by leading the first Albanian partisan division in many deadly raids against Germans and Italians.

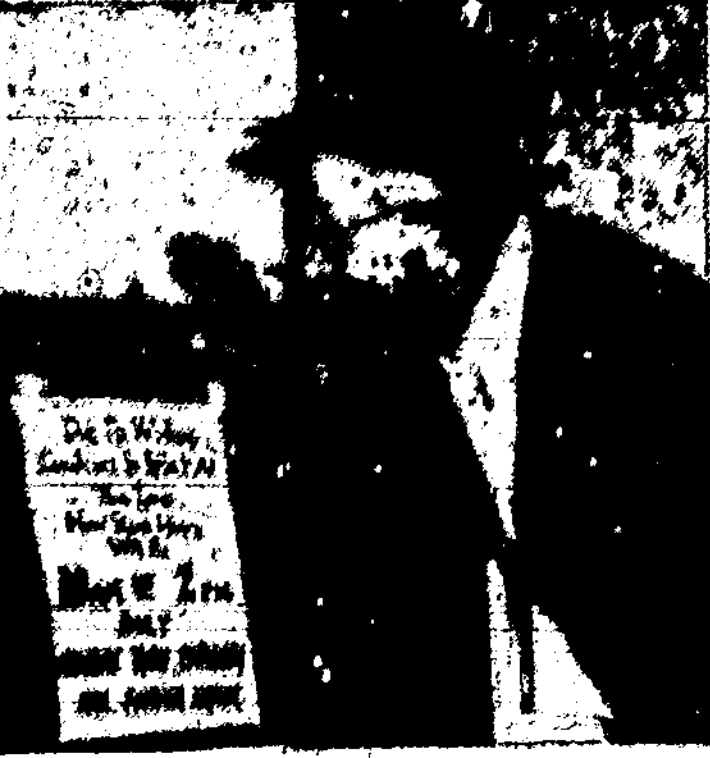
NICKEL CUT:

DEFENSE:

Some Confusion

It was difficult to reconcile Mr. Truman's constant emphasis on the grave defense problem, that he said confronts the nation, with his slashing of the air force budget which limited the groups to 80, and the more recent decision of the navy to cut 31 warships from the active fleet.

THESE ACTIONS served only to intensify the average citizen's confusion and puzzlement as to what actually is the status of the country's defense needs.

The navy's top admiral had been ousted because he contended present defense policies would destroy navy value and effectiveness. Other navy officials were facing probable punishment for speaking out. Uncertainty and harmony were urged on all sides as a desperate need if this nation is to protect itself in the world of today.

Despite all that, the air force was to be less than it generally declared it should be and the navy was being deprived of much of its strength. This left still hanging the question of who was right in the row over armed service unification and the proper defense setup.

THE NAVY was taking 77 ships out of active service—cutting the operating fleet by 31 warships in line with fund reductions. The fleet by mid-1950 will be made up of 237 combat vessels, instead of the 233 it had on September 1. Most of the cut was to be in the Atlantic force.

It was also reported that 64,631 men will be whittled from the navy and marine corps by next July to correspond with the reduction in ships.

INDUSTRY:

Profits Climb

The first upward trend of U. S. industry profits since the peak of earnings was reached in the third quarter of 1948 was reported in New York.

Profits turned around and headed upward in the third quarter of 1949, the report said, and pointed out that 1948 was a banner year that surpassed even the fabulous 1929. Thus it appeared that industry earnings were at a record peak.

BUT THE PICTURE was not quite as bright as it may have appeared. Washington had a different report. Commerce Secretary Sawyer reported that the coal and steel strikes had increased the number of jobless by 225,000 in the week ending October 8, as compared with early September. It was quite possible that the strike effect had not been felt strongly enough as yet to influence the roseate report concerning earnings in industry.

The future was uncertain. As strikes continued, so would purchasing power dwindle, and with that fall-off would come an inevitable decline in industry earnings.

HE EMPHASIZED that the figures released do not show the full effects of the strikes because they were compiled while the walkouts were in their early stages.

As for industry profit, a compilation by the Associated Press showed net profits of 314 companies amounted to one billion, three million, 661,061 dollars in the third quarter of this year—an increase of 4.3 per cent over earnings of 962 million, 102,819 dollars in the second quarter of 1949.

Bethlehem Appeal

Protestant churches during the Christmas holiday season will seek funds to provide clothing, education, recreation and spiritual leadership for refugees in the Near East. Church World Service, Inc., overseas relief agency for Protestant and Orthodox denominations, said a special Bethlehem Appeal committee would seek gifts to aid refugees stranded in Bethlehem and other Near East areas.

RELIGION:

New Concept Urged

When man finds himself unable to cope with the myriad problems that beset him, when there seems to be no avenue toward solution within himself, he is wont to turn to the concept of Divine aid for the help he needs.

AS THIS IS TRUE of most individuals, it is essentially true of this nation, as evidenced by the motto on its coins, the frequent allusions to the Divinity in its constitution and laws.

But, it seemed, a new concept, a new dedication to religion was needed. President Harry Truman himself went on the air to emphasize that need. His broadcast was part of the program, "Religion in American Life," sponsored by the Federal Council of Churches, the Synagogue Council of America, and 18 other religious bodies.

The President urged every American to take an active part in the religious life of his community and give generous support to religious institutions.

Turning to the perplexed world situation of today, he declared that every problem in the world could be solved "if men would live by the principles of the ancient prophets and the Sermon on the Mount."

BUT, he added, that religion is like freedom—"we cannot take it for granted."

"Man to be free," the President said, "must work at it. And man—to be truly religious—must work at that, too. Unless men live by their faith and practice their faith in their daily lives, religion cannot be a living force in the world today."

BARKLEY:

He Made It

He said he had no way of knowing whether he'd "make the grade," but he made it. On Halloween eve, Vice-President Alben W. Barkley's plans to marry his Missouri sweetheart, Mrs. Carleton Hadley, were announced. With the wedding would culminate a romance that had the entire nation looking on with eager and excited interest.

THE VICE-PRESIDENT is 71 and a widower. Mrs. Hadley is 38 and a widow. Mr. Barkley's age, however, was no apparent obstacle to his courtship, just as it hasn't been to his political and governmental accomplishments. An ardent and active suitor, he squirmed Mrs. Hadley to numerous social affairs, almost commuted to Missouri from Washington as the courtship progressed.

Mrs. Estell Rucker, mother of Mrs. Hadley, was all smiles when she was told of the proposed nuptials. "I've been sitting on a volcano," she said, "it suddenly blew up. All this excitement!"

The Hadley-Barkley romance began last spring at Washington when the two met at a party in her honor by Clark Gifford, presidential adviser.

PRESIDENT TRUMAN was duly notified of the event and, it was said, would be present at the wedding.

GYPSIES:

Free as Ever

In Belfast, Ireland, there was sounded a new and lighter note in the dismal refrain of world confusion.

Gypsies, with freedom of movement since time immemorial, were supported by the minister of home affairs when efforts were made to crack down on them and other itinerants in northern Ireland.

THE MINISTER of home affairs took the view that proposed legislation was "rather too drastic to meet a situation which is more of an annoyance to individuals than a threat to community well-being." One complaint, issued to bolster the proposed legislation, was that the gypsies tramped down crops.

Stuart Benson, 77, internationally known sculptor, was reported missing when the Polish liner "Gebieski," on which he was a passenger, docked in New York. The ship's master said the ship was searched for 24 hours but no trace of Benson was found.

ASIA:

How Much?

Top policy makers in the U. S. government were beginning to talk about a "little Marshall plan" for Asia, hoping that congress will appropriate approximately a billion dollars to "start off" the program designed to stop the spread of communism in Asiatic countries. The news was in line with an announcement of a meeting early next year to set up a non-Communist union of Southeast Asian countries. It shows also on the main account.

So Wilson Held Up the War For Fast Shorthand Lesson

During the closing days of World War I, I took the President of the United States out of play for 15 minutes. I did it with my little shorthand pencil.

At the time, I was working for the War Industries Board in Washington as a stenographer, and running out to get chocolate sodas for Mr. Baruch, its chairman.

A few days before the Armistice, a Board executive handed me a letter and told me to deliver it to the proper party. The proper party was Woodrow Wilson.

The White House that day was a jumble of senators, Cabinet members, ambassadors and important brass. News of the Armistice was expected any hour, and the tension was like the last few seconds of the Dempsey-Firpo fight.

I handed the letter to one of Mr. Wilson's secretaries, and was asked to wait in case of a reply. A few minutes later the secretary returned, looking puzzled. "The President would like to see you," he said.

I got trembly inside, I was pushing 18 at the time—fresh out of the East Side, and also plain fresh. But my dealings with Presidents had been limited to the one I had seen on dollar bills.

Mr. Wilson smiled when he saw me. "I understand you're quite a shorthand writer," was his greeting.

MY TREMBLES vanished. I knew the President was a shorthand writer of sorts—the tachygraphy magazines were always bragging about it. "I hear you're pretty good yourself, Mr. President," I blurted out.

Mr. Wilson blushed faintly. "I don't get much chance to practice these days," he said, like a fiberman apologizing for a

six-inch trout. "Mr. Baruch tells me you can write 200 words a minute. I wonder if you'd give me a little demonstration."

He handed me a pad and a pencil, and picked up a New York newspaper on his desk. Then, in his clipped, precise speech, he read one of the editorials at about 150 words a minute. When he had finished, the President said, "Now let's hear you read it back."

Well, as every stenographer knows, it's the reading back that counts. I shot the editorial back at him a good deal faster than he had dictated it. And then I started at the bottom of the page and read the editorial backwards.

Wilson chuckled. He asked me questions about Gregg shorthand—he was a Pitman writer. By this time, I was patronizing him a little—the caddy who shoots a 61 isn't self-conscious when he discusses mashie shots with a Rockefeller.

I PICKED UP the New York paper and handed the pad and pencil to Mr. Wilson. "I wonder if you'd mind writing for me, Mr. President," I said.

Wilson rubbed his glasses on his sleeve. "Don't go too fast," he warned.

I read the editorial at about one hundred words a minute, and then asked him to read it

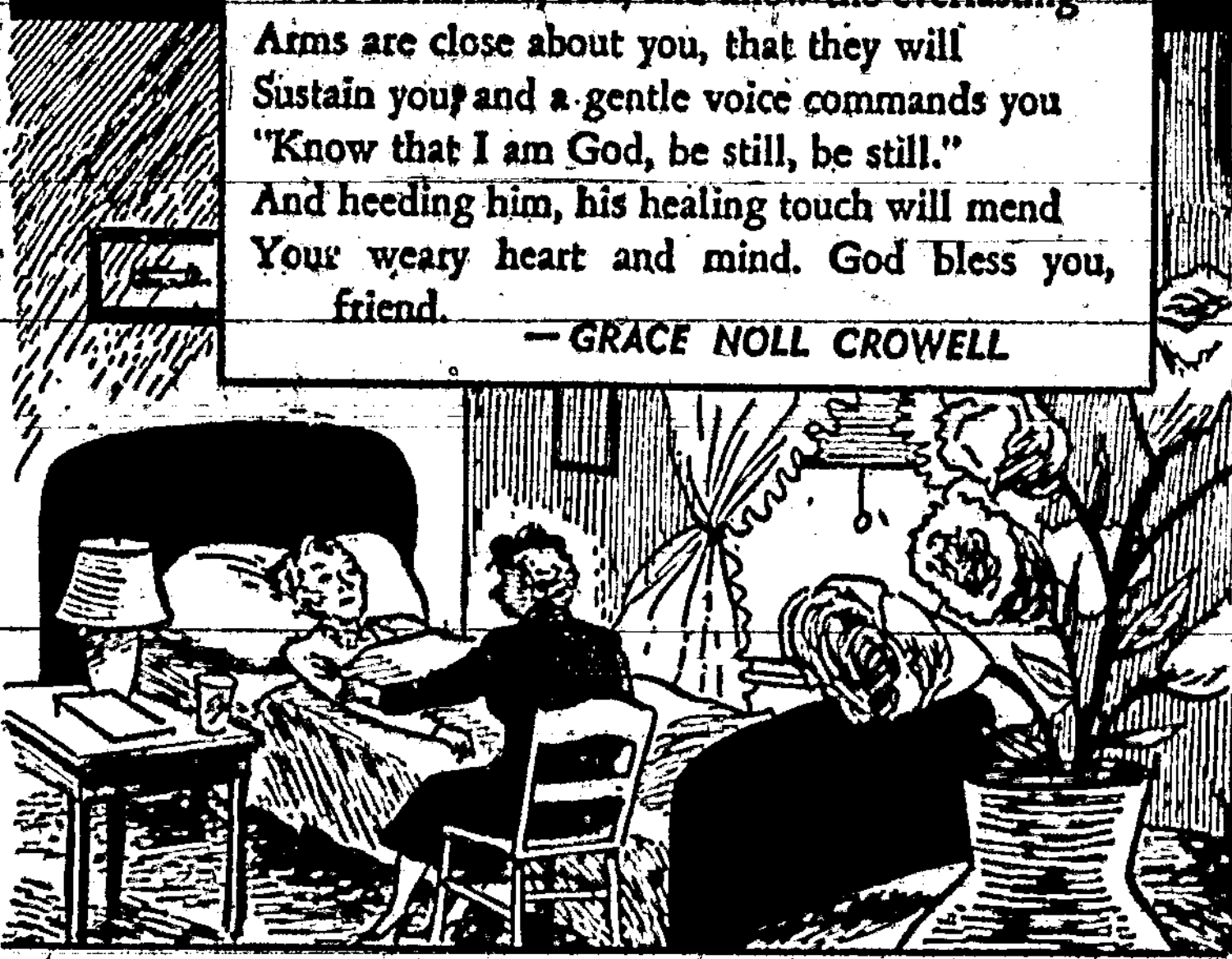

FIRST AID to the AILING HOUSE by Roger C. Whitman Making Screens QUESTION: I would like some advice on the best way of making full-sized screens. Can you supply this information? I am planning to use California redwood for the lumber, and also white pine, which I wish to stain to match the redwood. Can I do this successfully? ANSWER: I do not have any plans for making screens; but you can get the lumber at your dealer's and then stretch the mesh to cover it. After cutting the screen cloth to fit the frame, tack it in place along one end holding the cloth taut as the tacking proceeds. The screening then is fastened on the opposite side of the frame. Keep it stretched and be careful that the strands of wire are kept parallel to the frame to prevent the cloth from bulging. After tacking the other sides, the thin moulding strip then is placed over the edges of the screening.

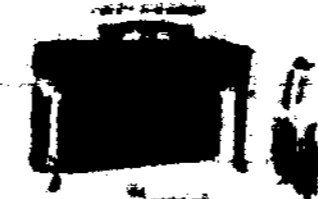

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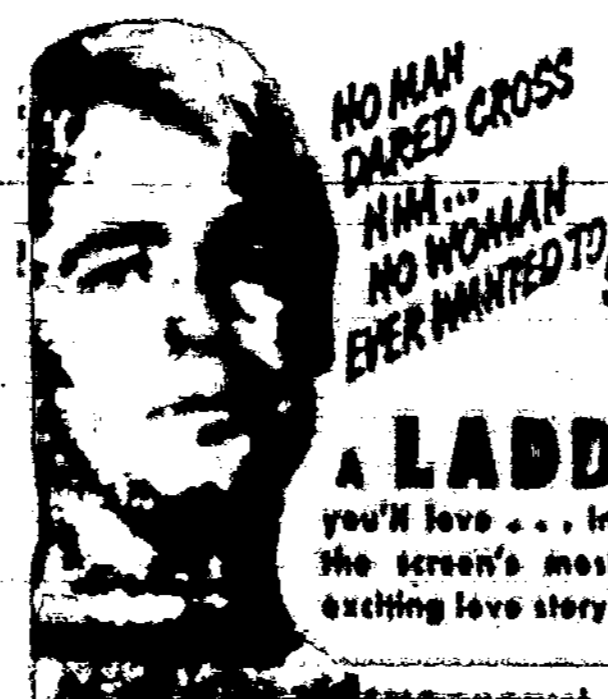


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
