Zozos Win Two More

Carrizozo won its second game of the season by defeating Ruidoso on December 2 with a score of 42 to 31. The halftime score was 17 to 11 in favor of Carrizozo. Bobby John Huffmyer was high man for Carrizozo with 13 points. Jack Veeter was Ruidoso high man with nine points. Of the total of 41 fouls called, Carrizozo was charged with 21, and Ruidoso 20.

The local second team defeated Ruidoso's second team by a score of 34 to 19. David Lueras of Carrizozo was high with 19 points. Ruidoso's man, Joe Gallegos, scored 12 points.

The Carrizozo-Lake Arthur game ended with a score of 57 to 20 in favor of Carrizozo. The halftime score was 16 to 9, Carrizozo. Cogdill of Lake Arthur made 12 points, while Jake Herrera and Bobby John Huffmyer of Carrizozo got 12 points each. Zozo's Sabino Vidauri was next up with 11 points.

Carrizozo will play Hagerman here on December 9, and Tularosa there on December 10. Hagerman has defeated both Roswell and Hondo this year, and the fans are looking forward to an exciting game. No information is available at present on the Tularosa competition.

CAPTAIN WINS FIRST OF SEASON ON DEC. 2

Capitan High School was successful in its first game of the season on December 2 against Corona to the tune of 37 to 27. Capitan's second team also won, but with the smaller margin of 33 to 30.

On December 3, Capitan's first team was defeated by Dexter, 50 to 36, but the second team had better luck and beat Dexter 26 to 20. The games were played at Dexter.

Capitan will play Ruidoso on December 9 and Socorro on December 10 at Capitan.

Holiday Workers Must Have SS Nos.

"Even Santa Claus must have a social security account number if he works for a local department store," stated J. Hassler Strickland, manager of the Roswell Social Security Administration. "All extra workers employed for the holiday season must have social security account numbers," he continued, "and Saint Nick himself is no exception."

With the Christmas rush getting under way, Mr. Strickland urges each person who has a job or who expects to be employed, part time or full time, to get a social security account number card from the Social Security Office immediately, if he does not already have one. He should show it to the employer at the time he is entered on the payroll—or if already employed.

Strickland requests employers to see that each person hired has a social security account number. A record of the number should be made at the time the person enters the service of the firm.

It was explained that persons who do not have a job and do not expect to become employed in the very near future should not apply for social security account numbers since they are used only for identifying the wage earner's old-age and survivors insurance account maintained by the Social Security Administration. Strickland also reminded businessmen who receive checks for cashing, or in payment of Christmas merchandise, that they should not accept social security account numbers as positive identification of the individual holder.

N. M. PROFESSOR ELECTED PRESIDENT OF FRATERNITY

A report from the New Mexico A. & M. News Bureau states that J. Paul Boushelle, A. & M. professor of Journalism, was elected president of Alpha Phi Gamma, national honorary journalism fraternity, at their national convention November 25 and 26. Convention headquarters was Concordia College, Moorehead, Minn.

In addition to the national presidency, Boushelle secured the national convention in 1951 for the New Mexico A. & M. campus.

Dr. Paul Conklin, assistant professor of English at A. & M., is a former national president of the fraternity.

This is one of several honors acquired by A. & M. chapter of Alpha Phi Gamma. Although organized for only two years, the chapter has been co-winner of the National Achievement Cup, installed a similar chapter at Texas Western College, and conducted a high school journalism scholarship contest.

CAPTAIN MAN DELEGATE TO NATIONAL 4-H CONGRESS

Robert Peebles returned last Sunday from Chicago where he had gone as a delegate to the twenty-eighth national 4-H Club Congress. He reports a very enjoyable week was spent with some 1,200 other delegates from all sections of the United States, and several foreign countries.

The delegates were taken on a sightseeing trip to many places of interest, including the livestock exposition, the Planetarium, museums, and the oldest church there—the Chicago Temple. The 4-H members were dined and entertained during the week by a group of well known business firms. And last, but not least was their invitation to attend a broadcast of the National Barn Dance, and a shopping tour through the Marshall Field department store.

1950 State Fair 9 Days; Expansion Gets OK

The State Fair Commission voted unanimously Wednesday to expand the 1950 State Fair to a nine day event, scheduling it for September 23 through October 1, and laid the groundwork for a \$250,000 expansion program during the next nine months.

In an all-day session, the board also gave Fair Manager Leon Harms a resounding vote of confidence by (1) giving him a three year contract; (2) boosting his salary 10 per cent—from \$7,200 to \$7,920 a year; and (3) authorizing Harms to seek applications for a fulltime assistant.

It was the first session of the group since the 1949 fair and all members were present.

The board consists of: Joe Heaston, Albuquerque, chairman; John Morrow of Raton, Floyd B. Rigdon, Carlsbad, Nick Krannawitter, Encino, and Elias Lee Francis, Cubero.

Heaston suggested the one-day extension of the State Fair with opening day on Saturday instead of Sunday as in previous years. That would provide school children, and out-of-town visitors with two full weekends in which to attend the fair.

All other fair commissioners favored the idea. Some of their arguments: The extra day of "practice" for fair employees would provide a smoother running operation on the first Sunday, traditionally the fair's biggest day; exhibitors caught short of building materials on opening day could purchase materials (stores close on Sunday); additional revenue would be derived from the extra day.

The Fair Commission held a brief joint session with the Racing Commission and voted approval of several improvements for the fair's race track. These included rebuilding of the paddock, and construction of a new stand for racing judges and stewards.

To finance the 1950 expansion program, Chairman Heaston announced the fair will have to borrow an estimated \$180,000. This sum will be added to a \$55,443.13 balance from the 1949 fair and a surplus which the State Racing Commission indicated it would turn over to the fair. Amount of the surplus was estimated at \$6,000 to \$7,000.

Although they took no official stand, the board members agreed that top priority in the expansion program would be given to an extension of the grandstand, and remodeling of the parimutuel rooms.

Also high on the construction list are a youth livestock building, estimated at \$35,000, and completion of the new administration building near the turntable gate.

NEW MEXICO WESTERN DEFEATS WAYLAND, 43-36

New Mexico Western College defeated Wayland College, 43-36, on December 3 in a thrilling double overtime game at Silver City. At the end of the game, the score was knotted at 27-27. At the end of the first overtime period, it was 32-32. Halftime found Wayland leading by a sub-scoring total of only 11-8.

Gene (Mike) Haynes, Mustang forward, with one second to go in the regulation gametime, potted a one hand push shot from the edge of the circle to tie Wayland at 27 all. In the second overtime period, he scored two field goals to help provide the victory margin.

Pioneer forward G. Goodson provided the spark which forced the teams to go into the second overtime as he netted a long, arching push shot from beyond and to the left of the charity circle to tie the Mustangs' 32 points with only two seconds remaining.

High scorer for the evening was Mustang center Dick King who scored 20 points, 18 of them in the second half and overtime. Teammate Haynes ran third with 12 counters, following Wayland's E. Billings who netted 13 points. Wayland's center Leon Bush scored 10.

Vets Must Pay On Wives' Half

According to an interpretation by C. C. McCulloch, attorney for the State Tax Commission, New Mexico war veterans must pay taxes on their wives' share of community property for 1949 or until the Legislature can act. This interpretation of the state's exemption amendment affects property of the state's 50,000 veterans of both wars.

This is due to the fact that the Legislature proposed to extend exemptions of wives' share of community property. However, it did not pass an act to put the exemption into effect if the amendment were approved; as was done at the September 20 special election.

Under New Mexico's community property law, the wife owns half of her husband's property. This half, the State Supreme Court has held, is taxable. The taxes go back to 1948 only; inasmuch as the 1949 Legislature specifically permitted both husbands' and wives' property to be exempted through 1947.

Under the tax commission's interpretation, the property is again divided on an equal basis between husband and wife for tax purposes.

RELEASE REPORT ON MINING INDUSTRY

Dr. Eugene Callaghan, director of the New Mexico School of Mines, announces the release of the bureau's annual report covering the fiscal year ending June 30, 1949. This report was prepared by E. C. Anderson, head of the mining department of the bureau.

The 60-page booklet covers projects underway and completed during the year, and has a section on New Mexico's mining industry. Activities of the bureau are divided into reports by the oil and gas section, the geological section, the editor of publications and the business office. The thirty-seventh annual report of the state inspector of mines, by John A. Garcia, covering activities for the year ending June 30, 1949, is printed as a part of the report. A new price list of Bureau of Mines publications is included.

According to the report, the metals produced in New Mexico showed a substantial increase in value over the preceding year. Copper led the way, followed by zinc, lead, molybdenum, silver, iron-manganese, and gold, in the order named. The total value of the metallics, as reported to the state mine inspector, amounted to \$42,601,429.02 as compared with \$42,350,200.31 for the year ending June 30, 1948. Coal production was slightly less than reported last year but the value increased more than \$350,000. Colfax County accounted for 85 per cent of the total production. The total reported value of minerals produced during the year was \$84,897,075.73, as compared with \$92,693,429.04 for the preceding year. Expenditures for plant improvements and new equipment were reported to be \$10,407,449.08, as compared with \$3,080,258.45 for the previous year.

PONTIAC ANNOUNCES '50 MODELS WITH GREATEST ADVERTISING CAMPAIGN

To announce its 1950 models Pontiac Motor Division has embarked upon the largest new model advertising campaign in its history, according to Harry J. Kilgler, general manager.

"Dollar for Dollar You Can't Beat A Pontiac" is the 1950 theme song of announcement advertisements appearing in 2,915 newspapers with a readership exceeding 47,000,000. Full-page space was used in 29 key cities on announcement day with other newspapers carrying advertisements ranging downward from 1 1/2 inches. A heavy newspaper follow-up campaign is scheduled.

Pontiac announcements were carried by 1,001 radio stations in 820 cities and over 48 television outlets, probably the most concentrated use of these media by an automobile manufacturer.

Seventeen national magazines with a combined readership of 27,000,000, will carry Pontiac announcement advertisements. Full color spreads will be used in several publications and others will carry full-color single pages.

NEW MEXICO A. & M. TO BROADCAST DEDICATION

According to Cecil Herrell, extension radio editor, part of the official dedication of the Southwest Branch Cotton Ginning Laboratory at NMA&M will be broadcast over the American Broadcasting Company on December 17. The broadcast will be at 10:30 A. M. (MST) on the day of the dedication.

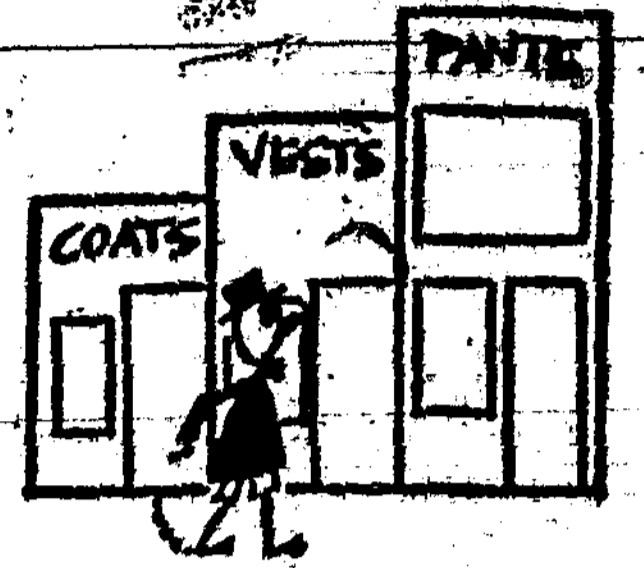
Herrell will be master of ceremonies, and will interview Charley Bennett, director of the Stoneville Research Laboratory at Stoneville, Miss. A local cotton producer, not selected as yet, will also be interviewed.

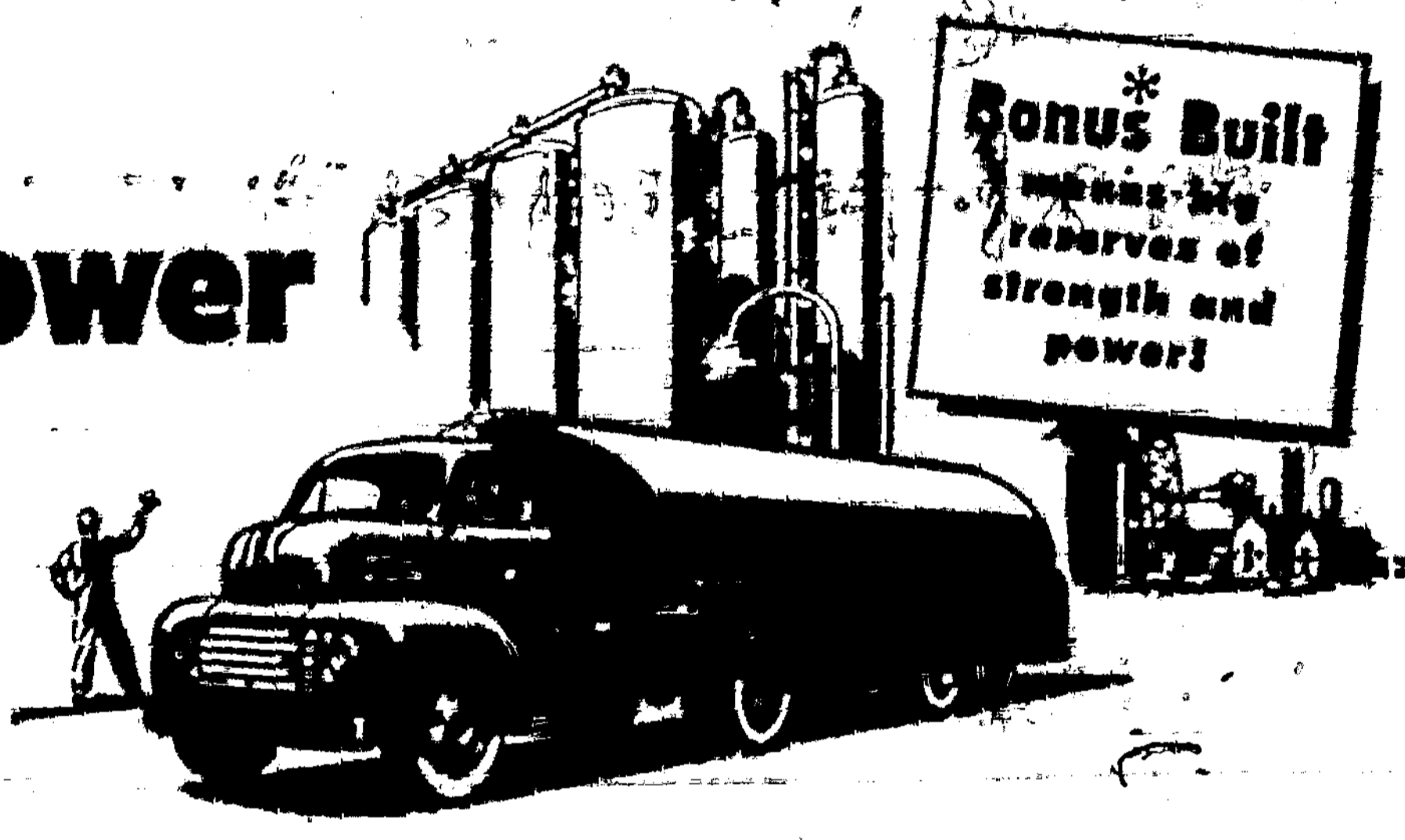

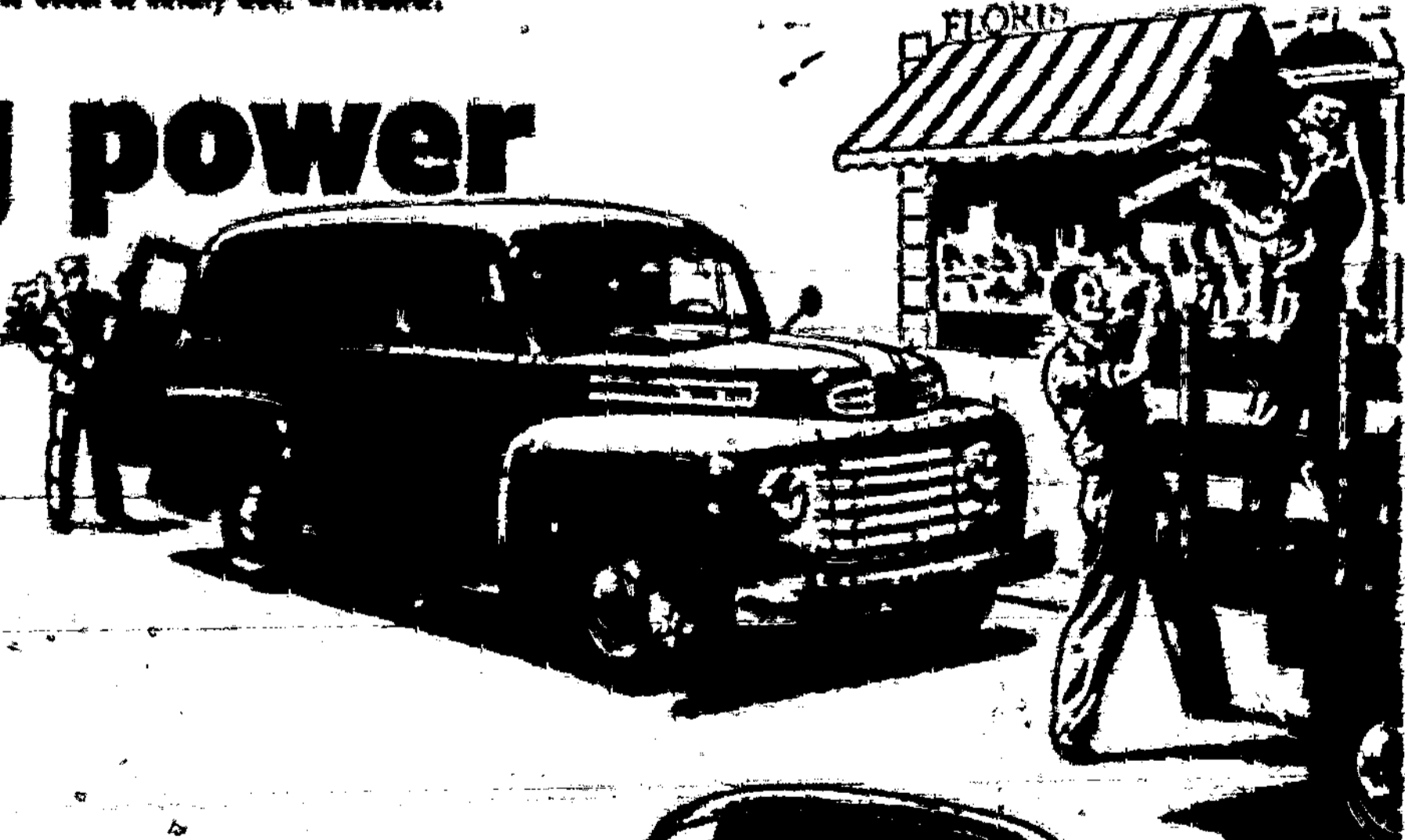

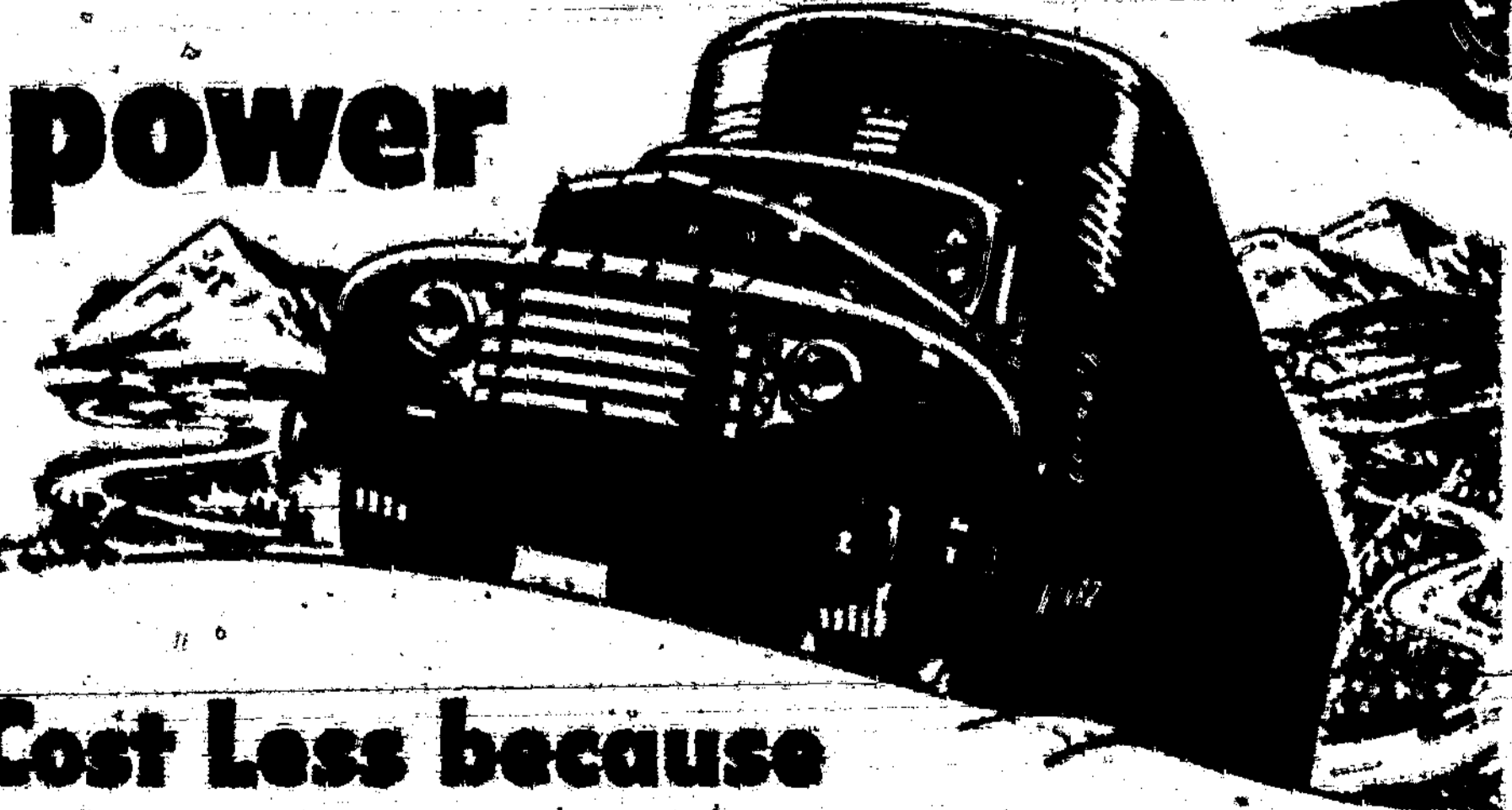

CATTLE GROWERS REJECT RAIL RATE FINANCING PLAN

New Mexico cattle growers have in effect rejected a proposal they join financially in a study of state freight rates. The ranchmen called for passage of a bill to fence the international boundary from El Paso to the Pacific Coast. Speakers at the cattle growers executive committee meeting in Albuquerque urged less dependency upon state and national government. The executive board said it would tell the New Mexico Economic Development Commission it cannot participate financially in a program which it has been carrying out for 20 years. The action came after cattle growers were told by their commerce expert that "New Mexico cattle shipment rates are too

high, but they are not discriminatory." The Economic Development Commission is organizing a freight rate bureau, seeking adjustment of freight rates on commodities shipped from the state to a level with other states. Charles Blaine, commerce expert, told the cattle growers there now is pending a proposal to eliminate all livestock rate hikes since 1946. He said if this happens, the rate will drop approximately 60 per cent.

HUNTING NOTES

State Game Warden Elliott Barker has expressed his appreciation of sportsmen during the recent prairie chicken season. There were very few violations. Scales were set up at main checking stations, and each bird brought out was checked for age and sex by department biologists. This check will enable the department to ascertain what per-

centage of birds killed were of this year's young, and know whether the hunting pressure was too great.

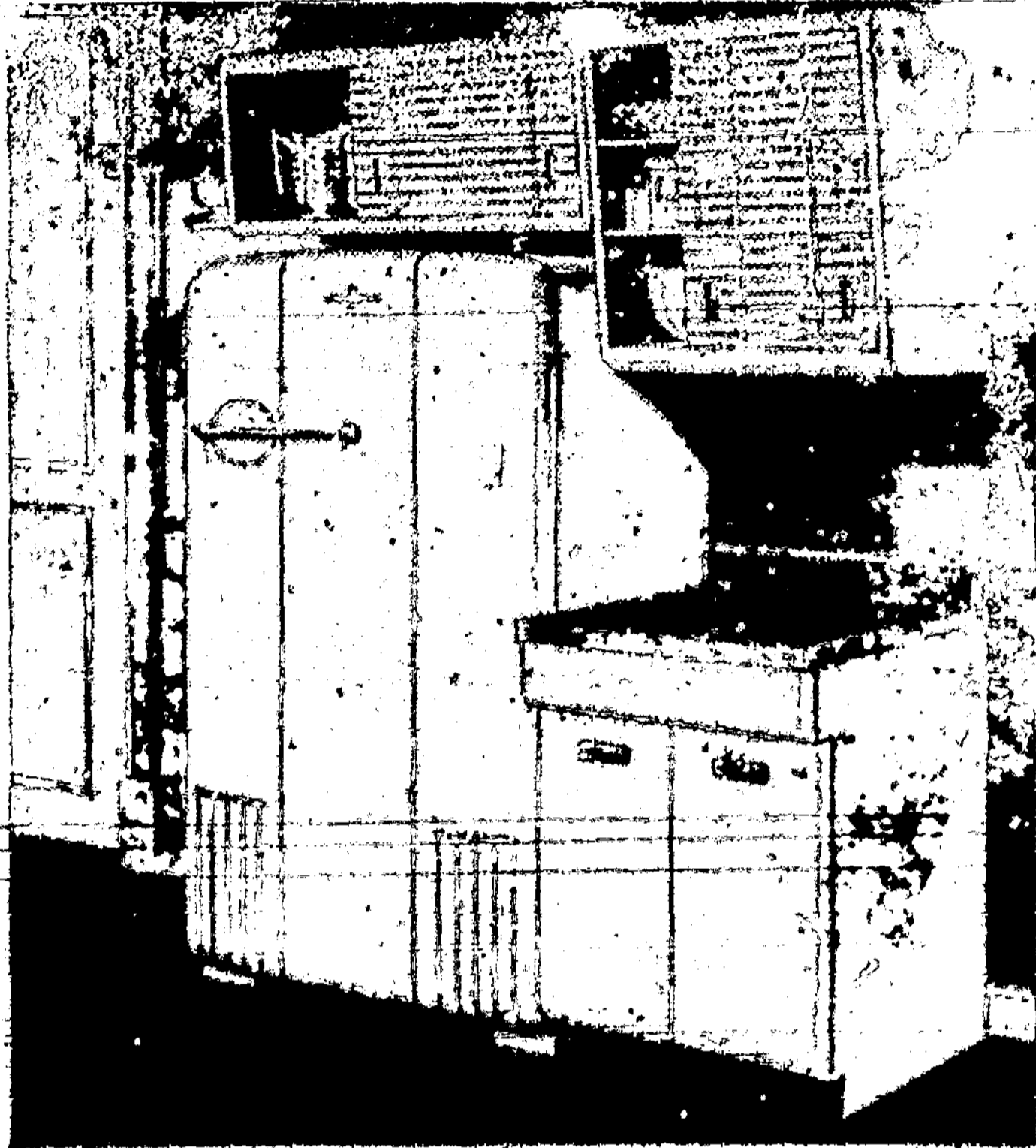

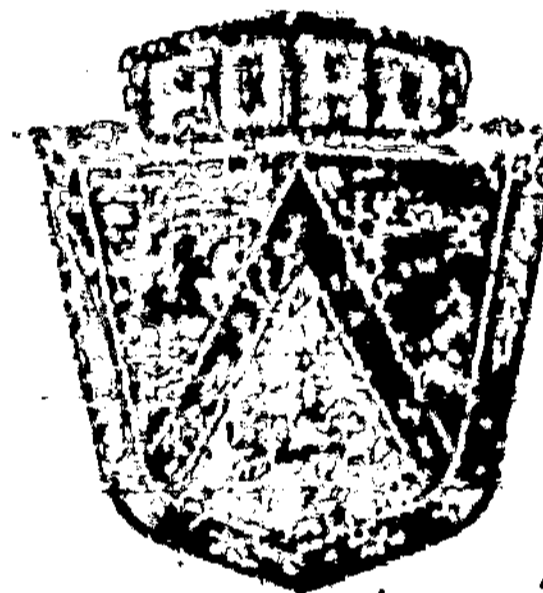

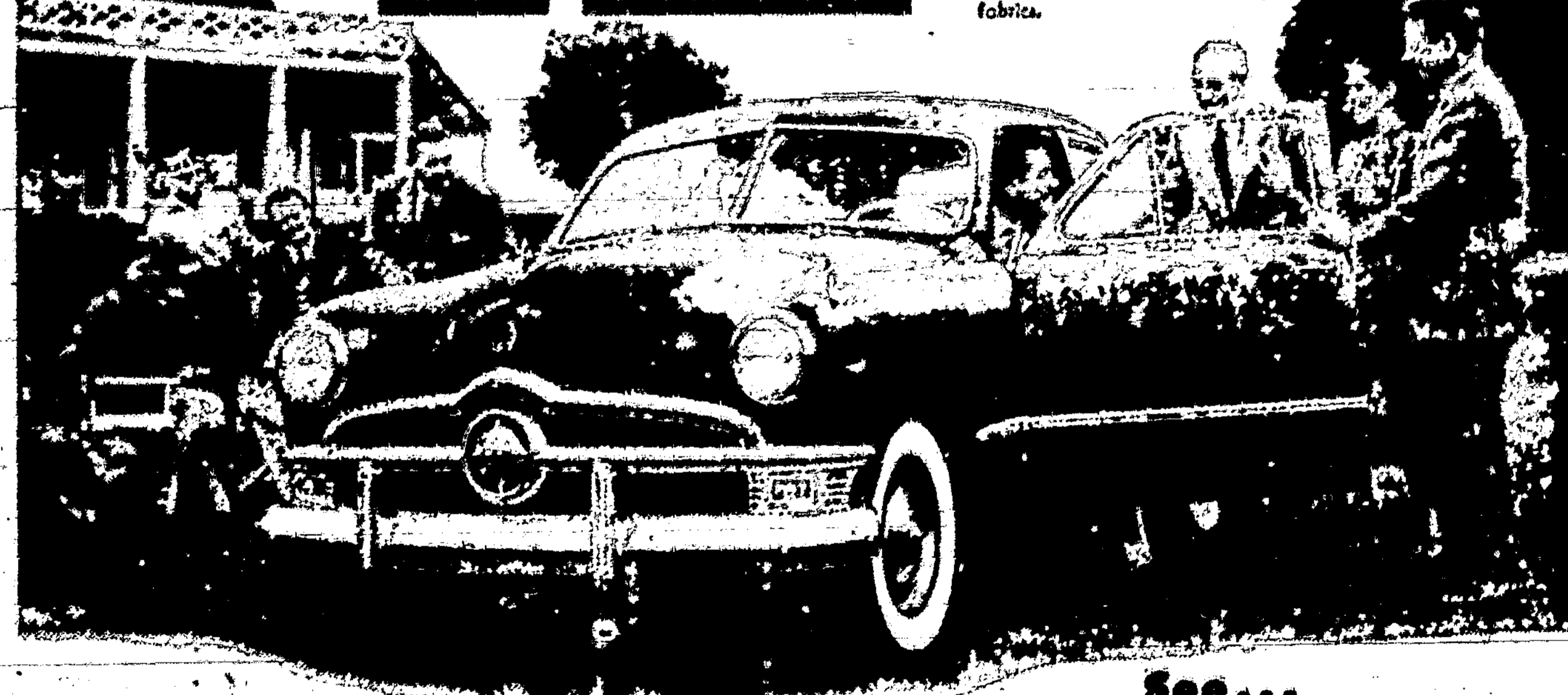

the VA regional office for New Mexico, added that no lender in this state has to date lost one dime on a home loan guaranteed by the Veterans Administration.

The VA regional office has guaranteed payment of approximately half the face value of 5,787 home loans amounting to \$20,924,034, according to Martin

J. May, loan guaranty officer. Total losses to the government have averaged about 80 cents per loan. The percentage loss has been .0002 per cent, considerably lower than the national average of .001.

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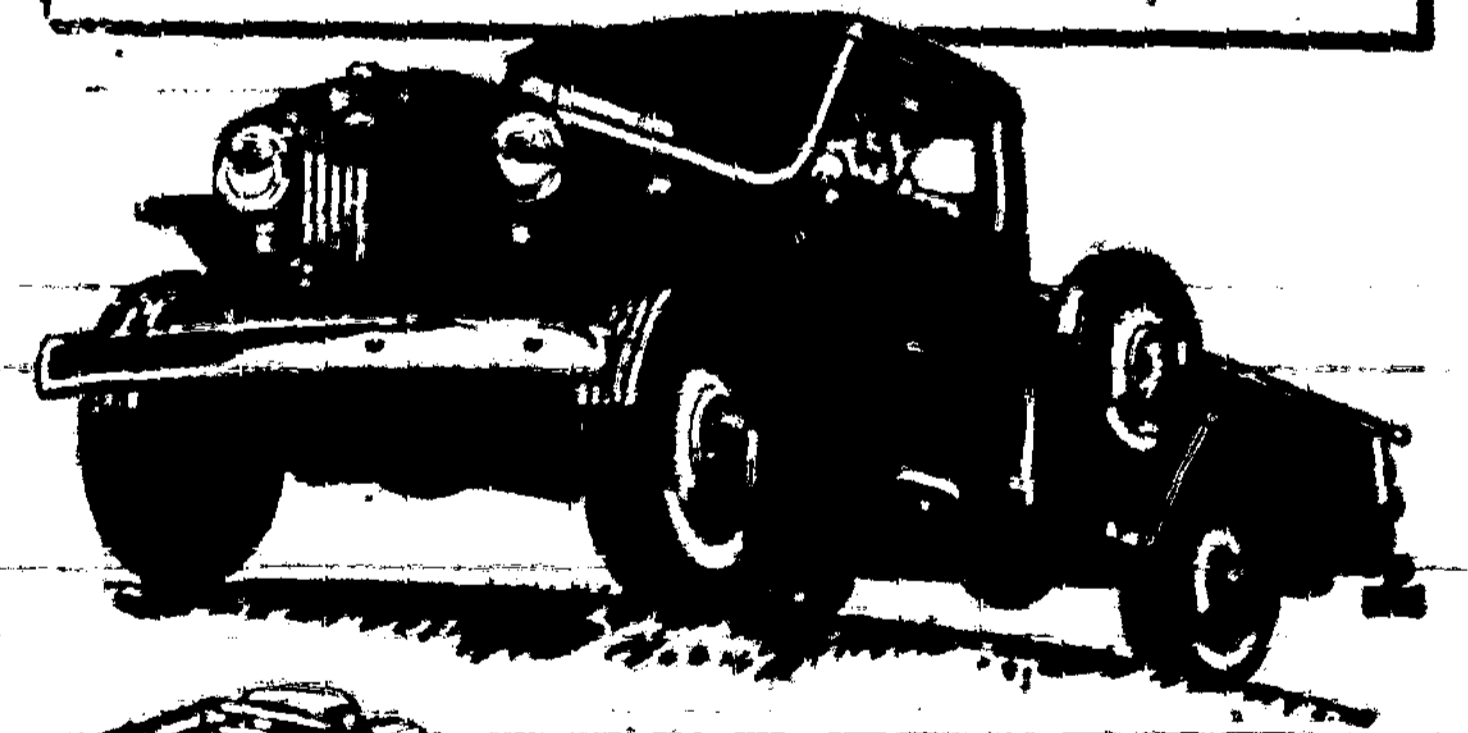
