INTERNATIONAL CHRISTMAS

Set up at Gatun Locks of the Panama Canal Zone is an international Christmas tree. Although grown in the United States, purchased and decorated by American workers, and erected on American property, it stands as a symbol of Christmas good will to all nations.

This international tree was inaugurated last year to bring Christmas joy and a feeling of amity to all ships transiting the Panama Canal. In addition to the tree, there was another greeting. On the broad sides of the control house, 30-foot banners proclaimed "Merry Christmas - Happy New Year." At night these words were illuminated with lights.

The Gatun Locks workers conceived the idea of sending special greeting cards to all ships transiting the Panama Canal between Christmas and New Year's Day. All expenses for these cards were paid by the workers.

Much favorable comment rewarded this expression of American good will to all nations. The bulletin board at the locks contained many letters of thanks to the Americans' gesture of Christmas friendship, and more than three continents sent expressions of appreciation in return.

Christmas, 1949, is almost here and at Gatun Locks—American operated crossroads of the world—the workers will again offer greetings of good will toward all men.

**TIGHTEN REQUIREMENTS
FOR NAVY PROMOTIONS**

Naval reserve officers selected for promotion after January 1, 1950, must complete required correspondence courses covering basic and specialized subjects, either before selection or in a reasonable period following notification of selection.

In recent postwar years, naval reserve officers have been promoted solely on their records and qualifications. Under the new system, promotion units will be earned by taking correspondence courses. Basic courses, to be required of all officers, will include such subjects as Navy regulations, naval orientation, and naval command and administration. Approximately 100 specialist courses will cover different officer classifications and specialties.

Units may be earned by completion of certain seminars, classroom courses or other equivalent instruction, all of which must have previous bureau personnel clearance.

**NAVY SETS DEADLINE FOR
RESERVISTS APPLICATIONS**

A deadline of January 1 has been set by the Navy for accepting applications from naval reservists to compete for 160 special appointments to the U. S. Naval Academy at Annapolis, Md., Eighth Naval District headquarters in New Orleans announced recently.

High men in a competitive examination to be given next April will receive the reserve appointments, the announcement said.

Both organized and volunteer reservists with good records and under 21 years of age may apply through commanding officers of naval reserve units.

A special order has been issued authorizing two weeks of active duty training for volunteer reservists seeking to qualify for examinations.

**OLDSMOBILE REDUCES
PRICES ON 1950 MODELS**

S. E. Skinner, vice president of General Motors and general manager of Oldsmobile division, this week announced important new low prices on newly styled Series "88" cars for 1950, as the highlight of a press preview in Lansing, Mich. He said that price reductions on the "Rocket" engine-powered models will range from \$55 to \$65 throughout closed and convertible body styles for 1950. The reductions are in addition to a \$25 reduction announced by Oldsmobile November 25 on Hydra-Matic drive.

Other newsworthy announcements followed as editors, automotive writers, and radio commentators were taken behind the scenes on Oldsmobile's 1950 plans. Chief news items of the press meeting were as follows:

Nineteen new body styles in three new "Futuramic" series including an entirely new Series "98" with a brand new body design, the lowest and widest body ever offered by Oldsmobile.

A new, exclusive Whirlaway Hydra-Matic drive, especially designed to team up with the high compression "Rocket" engine to give Oldsmobile's eight cylinder cars an outstanding "power-package" for the new year.

Holiday coupe body types in all three series.

A new final assembly plant of more than 500,000 square feet which permits stepped-up production to a minimum of 350,000 cars in 1950.

A prediction of continued record demand for automobiles, with resultant heavy employment, next year.

The 1950 models will be shown for the first time early in January. Oldsmobile's 3,800 dealers are completing plans now for local introductions and the presentation of complete details through newspaper advertising.

**TWELFTH AIR FORCE
ASKS FOR ADDRESS CHANGE**

Air Force reservists living in New Mexico, Texas, Arkansas, Oklahoma or Louisiana who have changed their permanent address since becoming Air Force reservists are requested to notify Headquarters Twelfth Air Force, Brooks Air Force Base, Texas, of the change, or of any future change they may make.

This notification is essential as the records of the U. S. Air Force reserves are now undergoing a screening and consolidation, according to information released at Headquarters of Twelfth Air Force.

Records of AF reservists in the above states will be kept in Twelfth Air Force Headquarters at Brooks AFB, Texas.

Air Force reservists who have moved into the Twelfth's five state area should notify their former Air Force reserve unit or Air Force headquarters which will automatically transfer their records to Twelfth headquarters.

This new system will provide both the Air Force and the AF reservist with an easily accessible source of information regarding pay, retirement, qualifications and other pertinent data.

ELABORATE CEREMONIES AT SANTA RITA CHURCH

The feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe, the Queen of the Americas, was celebrated with elaborate ceremonies in the Santa Rita Church.

DISABILITY INCREASES DUE IN DECEMBER

Increases in disability and death compensation paid to veterans and their dependents, as provided in Public Laws 339 and 436 of the Eighty-first Congress, in most instances will be reflected in benefit checks issued for the month of December, Veterans Administration said recently.

The law grants increases in certain cases of service connected disability and death payments. It does not affect any pension benefits, payable for disability or death not due to service, VA emphasized.

The largest group to receive increases is composed of about 1,882,000 veterans with service connected disabilities rated from 10 per cent to 100 per cent in degree. It includes the service disabled of World Wars I and II and veterans disabled as the result of peacetime service subsequent to July 15, 1903.

Amounts paid monthly to this group under the old rates ranged from \$13.80 to \$138 for war service and from \$11.04 to \$110.40 for peacetime, based upon the percentage of disability. The new rates are, respectively, \$15 to \$150 and \$12 to \$120, an increase of 8.7 per cent.

Some 58,000 widows receiving compensation because of the service connected death of a veteran, and who have one or more children, will get increases. The law raises from \$100 per month to \$105 the amount payable to a widow with one child, and from \$15 to \$25 the allowance for each additional child, where the veteran's death was due to war service. Where death resulted from peacetime service, the widow receives 80 per cent of the war rates.

Public Law 377 of the Eightieth Congress will provide veterans, drawing compensation for service connected disabilities rated 60 per cent or more, with additional allowances for their dependents. The new law makes eligible for dependency allow-

ances those veterans rated from 50 through 59 per cent disabled. Veterans disabled due to peacetime service will receive 80 per cent of the above rates.

The new law also grants an increase in disability compensation payable to some 20,000 World War I veterans whose disabilities are classified under law as "presumed" to be due to service. These veterans previously were entitled to but 75 per cent of the rates payable for direct service connected disabilities. Public Law 339 restores them to the full rate.

More liberal, statutory disability ratings are provided in cases of service-connected, arrested tuberculosis. Under the new law such veterans will receive ratings of 100 per cent for the first two years following arrest, 50 per cent for the next four years, and 30 per cent for an additional five years.

of 30 per cent will be assigned in far advanced cases. Less severe cases will be rated 20 per cent where there is continuing disability.

The law also provides that the 100 per cent rating during the first two years may be reduced to 50 per cent for failure to follow prescribed treatment or to submit to examination when requested.

Public Law 339 also liberalizes "line of duty" requirements as they apply to service personnel whose diseases, injury or death was incurred (not due to willful misconduct) while in confinement under sentence of court-martial or civil court. Such cases will be adjudged line of duty provided the court-martial sentence did not involve an unremitted dishonorable discharge, or a civil court sentence not involving a felony.

WEATHER BUREAU REPORTS COLD-WAVE TO CONTINUE

The Weather Bureau reports that New Mexico's cold wave is not yet ended. However, generally clear skies are expected for the next few days. The present chilly weather is prevalent over the country. It was reported that on Tuesday Los Angeles was but two degrees warmer than Albuquerque.

The writer had some personal experience with last weekend's blizzard, while on a business trip to El Paso. Next time we'll listen to the weather reports before we start out.

An exceptionally high wind was blowing when we left Carrizozo on Saturday evening, but thought nothing of it until after we were past White Sands and saw the first flakes of snow.

From there on, it was rugged, with snow coming in waves against the windshield.

We still thought we'd be out of it when we got over the pass, but not so. The wet snow just packed against the windshield—one was afraid to stop and afraid to go on. One stop was made to catch our breath, but the place was colder inside than it was out, so once more we ventured on. By watching the side of the road, we managed without accident. Fortunately, the lights of cars passing in the opposite direction were bright enough to see in time to get back on our side of the road if we had strayed too far to the left.

It was really a nightmare of a ride and we fought the rough weather right into El Paso. The trip which should, ordinarily, be made in about three hours, took about six, and the journey's end was most welcome.

When a pig in a dirty lot turns up its nose, the chances are that it isn't being snooty about its surroundings. Instead, the trouble is probably "bull nose," according to veterinary medical authorities. This disease, which causes swelling and deformity of the nose and face, usually can be traced to filth in the hoglot and quarters. The "bull nose" germs enter the body through scratches or other wounds. Keeping quarters and grounds clean is the best way to prevent the disease.

Some animals die of rabies without ever showing the furious symptoms of the disease.
