### Cattle Growers Oppose Land Plan

The New Mexico cattle growers and the ranch owners have lined up together in opposition to the governmental action to take their lands for a rocket and bombing range in Southern New Mexico. The Cattle Growers are also opposed to some of the Hoover commission recommendations for placing all Federal lands under special agency in the Department of Agriculture. The cattlemen refused the Government's offer of \$100,000.

Mr. T. A. Spencer, Sr., of Carrizozo and Three Rivers has been named chairman of the contest. If owners lose in the matter of the rocket and bombing range they prefer to sell rather than rent.

### BLIND VETERAN MAKES FURNITURE

Charles D. Bowers of Muskegon, Michigan, blinded World War II veteran who started a woodworking shop with the aid of a GI business loan, is earning a comfortable living by producing custom-made furniture, entirely by sense of touch.

He has built, without help, vanities, end tables, chest of drawers, radio cabinets, coffee tables, knick-knack shelves and snack bars. With his GI loan, he equipped his shop, adjoining his home, with a variety of power tools, including a drill press, electric hand sander jointer, grinding wheels, electric drill, a selection of power saws and many other tools.

"As for my techniques in working with power machinery," he said, "I count my fingers," then put them in a safe place before turning on the power."

Before the war, Bowers was employed as an automobile mechanic. He entered the Army early in the war and was blinded by shell fragments on May 22, 1944.

### State Legislatures Study Personnel Bills

A study of job classification and salary schedules for State employees is under way in Iowa, Washington, Florida, Oklahoma, Nebraska, North Carolina, and Texas. In New Mexico, a proposal to carry on a survey along this line was defeated. The purpose of the bill was to direct the State Budget Director to make such a survey and to report to the next legislature.

### 4-H FEED SACK CONTEST OFFERS SEWING MACHINE AWARD

Here's a chance, 4-H club members to win a sewing machine for your club house or schoolroom.

The state 4-H feed sack contest, sponsored every year by the El Rancho Milling Company of Clovis, will award a sewing machine to the 4-H club in New Mexico which prepares the most outstanding exhibit of articles made from feed sacks in 1949, according to Miss Travis Hughes, associate state 4-H club leader.

All 4-H club members interested should contact their county agents, who will supervise the county contests, the 4-H leader says.

The best county exhibit will be sent to the State Fair, where the state-winning exhibit will be selected.

Exhibits will be judged on originality and imagination in making useful articles from feed sacks, variety and value of the article made, construction of articles, and percentage of club members making articles for exhibit, Miss Hughes explains.

Last year, the Blacktower 4-H club in Clovis was awarded the sewing machine.

### MORE CLASS LEGISLATION

The Federal minimum wage and hour law, as laid down in the Fair Labor Standards Act, has always contained certain exceptions and exemptions. One exemption applied to retail trade, for the very sound reason that this job has various enterprises which are suited to beginners, young people, and totally unskilled labor, and which do not justify higher rates of pay.

Under the revised version of the Act, as approved by the House Labor Committee, the retail sales exemption would be restricted to employees whose total volume of sales does not exceed \$500,000.

This change is more important than may be generally realized. First of all, it is definitely class legislation. It says, in effect, that smaller stores need not pay the Federal minimum wage, but that larger stores must. The dividing line is purely arbitrary, and without basis in reason. Stores operating side by side, on the same street in the same town, would have a different standing in law.

Secondly, it is entirely possible that his provision—when coupled with a high minimum wage—would produce unemployment. If a store were forced to pay 75 cents an hour for inefficient, untrained help, it would naturally seek ways and means to reduce the number of people on the payroll. The cost of labor is a heavy factor in retail business. It has, as we all know, gone much to force commodity prices up. The pending law might well destroy opportunity for the marginal worker.

In any event, fair labor standards should apply with equal force to all the elements within any given industry and region. To single out either a large business or a small business for punitive treatment is indefensible.

### Santa Fe City Schools Report

The clerk of the Santa Fe Municipal Board of Education prepares a monthly report showing the approved budget for the fiscal year, the expenditures for the previous month, the expenditures for the current month, the expenditures from the beginning of the year to the end of the current month and the budget balances at the end of the current month. This report is in considerable detail, showing the items by the maintenance and direct charge funds. For the month of February the total budgets are shown as \$646,010 for the maintenance fund and \$56,526 for the direct charge fund. The expenditures at the end of February amounted to \$318,008.01 from the maintenance fund and 48,118.90 from the direct charge fund. The budget balance for the maintenance fund on this date was \$327,999.10. The report shows also the cash receipts for the current month and the cash balance at the end of the month. Building expenditures and balances are also shown and the additions to buildings since June 1, 1947.

### NEW 4-H CONTEST FEATURES CONSERVATION

New Mexico 4-H boys and girls who are interested in soil conservation will have an opportunity to put their knowledge to profit in 1949. This year, for the first time, a state soil conservation demonstration contest will be included among the many events which 4-H'ers will compete at the annual encampment at New Mexico A. & M. College in August. Sponsor of the contest is the R. L. Harrison Co. of Albuquerque.

According to Leonard Appleton, state extension soil conservationist, the purpose of the contest is to enable 4-H club members to (1) acquire information regarding methods of conserving soil and water, (2) demonstrate to others what has been learned regarding soil and water conservation, and (3) contribute to the betterment of their communities by promoting interest in conservation and encouraging the application of recommended conservation practices.

The contest will be divided into junior and senior divisions. The junior division will be open to 4-H'ers who are between the ages of 10 to 13 or to older club members who are in their first or second year of club work. The senior division will include members who are 14 years old or older and have been in club work for at least three years. Demonstration teams will be made up of two members.

Prizes totaling \$200 in savings bonds will be awarded as follows:

- Winning senior team members—\$50 bonds
- Second-place senior team members—\$25 bonds
- Winning junior team members—\$25 bonds

"Demonstrations in the contest may deal with any subject relating to the conservation of soil and water," Appleton said. "For further details, see your county extension agent."

### State Tax Commission Report

The State Tax Commission of New Mexico has recently issued the 17th biennial report of the Commission, covering the years ending June 30, 1947 and June 30, 1948. The report consists of 127 pages of financial statistics, showing valuations of the various classes of property for purposes of taxation, budgets and tax levies. There is much material of information value concerning oil and gas production, bonded indebtedness of the state and its various subdivisions. Also there are several tables showing the cost of administration of the Commission's functions, the total being \$105,445.08 for the year ended June 30, 1948. This does not include the amount spent for reappraisal of property for purposes of taxation in the amount of \$100,225.

### SCHOOL OF MINES ACCREDITED BY N.C.A.

The New Mexico School of Mines, Socorro, has received fully accredited membership in the North Central Association of colleges and Secondary Schools, it was announced today by James H. Russell, President of the board of regents of the school. The decision was released by the Commission on Colleges and Universities of North Central Association. Mr. Russell said. Membership in the association serves as a certificate of quality of the institution, placing it in the country. The high standard set by North Central facilitate transfer of students between the school and other institutions without loss of academic credit, and serve as a measure of efficiency in school administration.

New Mexico School of Mines, being primarily an engineering institution offering specialized work in mineral technology, has not until recently made application for accreditation by North Central. In 1929 initial steps were taken, but they were not completed. School of Mines students who have transferred to other institutions, have on occasion been penalized by devaluation of their credit because of the lack of such recognition.

Recently an examination of the curriculum and administration of the School of Mines was requested and on the basis of the report of a Board of Review which visited the school and made a thorough examination of the facilities, the School of Mines has been duly accredited by North Central Association.

### FISH AND CITRUS JUICES FOOD LIST FOR APRIL

Fresh and frozen fish, canned citrus juices and grapefruit sections are new-comers to the April Foods List, according to U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration.

Oranges are the only fruit included on this List and cabbage has been dropped after being in the spotlight for several months.

Fresh foods on the List are carrots, fish, potatoes, spinach and onions, supplemented by canned corn and lower grade peas.

Processed dairy foods include cheese, butter, evaporated milk and no-fat dry milk solids while the principal crop products are meal, grits and sirup.

Seasonal production places eggs near the top of the Pictorial List. Other foods listed for the month are dried beans and peas, peanut butter, oatmeal, honey and dried raisins and prunes.

# HOUSEHOLD MEMOS

## Ice Cream, Cake Make Acceptable Desserts For Nearly Every Meal

THERE'S NOTHING FANCY about ice cream and cake, but they make a wonderful dessert for any occasion, plain or fancy. Then, too, there are few who can resist turning down a heaping bowl of creamy ice cream and a slice of feather-like cake, so you have no worry about pleasing family or guests.

For youngsters who have difficulty getting their daily quota of milk and other dairy foods, ice cream is the perfect answer. The same is true, too, of adults who cannot drink their pint of milk.

Ice cream is a highly nutritious dairy food that furnishes energy as well as minerals such as calcium and phosphorus. It also gives significant amounts of vitamins A and B2 and quality protein, all of which are needed for proper growth, strong muscles, bones and teeth.

You don't need to do anything special to make a festive dessert out of ice cream. Simply pile it in a glass bowl for easy serving



A large serving bowl of ice cream surrounded with luscious fudge cup cakes topped with swirls of chocolate frosting and pecan halves make a gala dessert for a festive occasion. Pass this with assorted sauces or jams and jellies for sundae.

and to get the full benefit of its luscious appearance. Around the bowl you may have bought or homemade cupcakes or several bowls of assorted jellies, jams or sauces for make-your-own sundaes.

HERE ARE SOME delicious cupcakes which you may want to serve:

- Fudge Cupcakes (Makes 12 cakes)**  
 2 squares unsweetened chocolate  
 1/2 cup sugar  
 2 tablespoons milk  
 1 teaspoon vanilla  
 1/2 cup butter  
 1/2 cup sugar  
 1 egg  
 1 1/4 cups sifted cake flour  
 1 1/4 teaspoon baking powder  
 1/4 teaspoon baking soda  
 1/4 teaspoon salt

Melt chocolate over hot water, add one-fourth cup sugar and two tablespoons milk; stir until very smooth. Add vanilla and remove from heat.

Work butter and sugar to a soft cream, add egg and beat hard until blended. Stir in milk, then the flour-mixed and sifted with the other dry ingredients. When mixed, stir in chocolate mixture and pour into buttered cupcake pans. Bake in a moderate (375°) oven for about 25 minutes. Cool and cover tops with:

- Apple-Raisin Sauce (For Ice Cream)**  
 2 cups sweetened, strained apple sauce  
 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon  
 1/2 cup seedless raisins  
 1 tablespoon orange marmalade

Mix apple sauce with all other ingredients and heat slowly to the boiling point. Simmer 10 minutes over a slow fire or until raisins are plump. Cool before serving.

- Coffee Cream Sauce (For Ice Cream)**  
 1 cup light brown sugar  
 1 tablespoon instant powdered coffee

**LYNN SAYS:**  
 Make the Most Of your Meats  
 When you roast beef or lamb, cut small slits in the fat of the slivers of garlic. This adds a lot of flavor to the meat that many like. Remove garlic before serving. Honey mixed with orange juice and grated orange rind may be poured over the scored fat of ham for interesting flavor. Basted musketeers may be added to beef gravy to provide interesting flavor.

- Baked Fish Fillets, Tomato Sauce  
 Buttered Asparagus  
 Baked Potatoes

1/4 teaspoon salt  
 2 tablespoons butter  
 1 teaspoon cornstarch  
 1/2 cup coffee cream  
 Mix sugar with cornstarch, coffee and salt. Add butter and cream and stir over a slow fire until boiling. Boil for one minute, remove from fire and cool slightly. Add one teaspoon vanilla. Serve cold.

Another delicious way to serve ice cream and cake is to arrange two slices of spice cake for a serving. Place a portion of ice cream in the center and top with fruit sauce, an apple-raisin sauce, as given below, or crushed pineapple, pineapple and ginger or mince-meat sauce.

- Chocolate Frosting**  
 2 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted  
 2 tablespoons hot milk  
 1 1/2 cups sifted confectioners' sugar (about)  
 1 teaspoon vanilla  
 pecan nut meats

Melt chocolate over hot water, add hot milk, sugar and vanilla to make a thick frosting. Beat vigorously to make it creamy and more sugar, if necessary, to make frosting spread easily, without running.

Coffee flavor goes beautifully with vanilla ice cream. If you like a sauce, here's just the one:

HERE ARE SOME excellent uses for leftover cake that are served with ice cream. A bit of dressing makes them glamorous desserts.

- Quick Alaskan (Serves 6)**  
 4 leftover cup cakes  
 2 egg whites  
 6 tablespoons granulated sugar  
 1 teaspoon lemon juice  
 1 quart vanilla ice cream  
 Cut the centers from the cakes, leaving a wide center to hold the ice cream. Save the cake centers for another dessert. Beat the egg whites until stiff enough to hold peaks. Fold in sugar, one table-



spoon at a time, then lemon juice. Just before serving, place the cakes on a bread board, fill centers with ice cream and cover the ice cream and all the outside of the cake with a thick layer of meringue. Bake in a moderate (375°) oven for five minutes and serve immediately.

- Ice Cream Trifle**  
 3 cups crumbled spice, pound or sponge cake  
 1 cup orange juice  
 1 cup chilled pineapple juice  
 Ice cream  
 1/2 cup chopped nuts

Place cake crumbs in a large serving bowl, and pour mixed fruit juices over them. Let stand for at least one-half hour. Fill bowl with small scoops of ice cream, then sprinkle with chopped nuts.

Leftover beef, like lamb may be curried and served on hot, fluffy rice.

If hamburgers tend to look skimpy, place a thick slice of cheese on them before broiling. Add drained horseradish to medium white sauce if you want to bring out delicious beef flavor in a boiled cut of the meat. Mincéd scallions and parsley may be added to melted butter to bring out the full flavor of chicken, steaks or chops, which have been broiled.

## Singing Coach Says Margaret Has Fine Voice

NEW YORK.—Margaret Truman is learning to frown, to smile, to bow "loosely" and to sing distinctly under the gay, benign direction of a ruddy-cheeked Dutchman.

But, Coenraad V. Bos wants it understood, he's not teaching her how to sing. He's the singing coach of the nation's best known music student—not her singing teacher.

Coaching the daughter of the President of the United States is not a novel experience for the 73-year-old musician. An earlier pupil with professional ambitions was another Margaret, daughter of Woodrow Wilson.

In the course of a 52-year career Bos has been closely associated, as coach or accompanist, with some of the music world's outstanding performers. He is coach and accompanist to Helen Traubel and has been for 10 years. He thinks the blond soprano from St. Louis is the greatest living singer.

Only Beginning  
 He's enthusiastic, too, about his new pupil from Missouri.

"Of course she is only beginning," he said of Margaret Truman, "but she has a lovely voice. Her French is beautiful and she's very industrious and ambitious. But she needs help with her German. I'm going to start her on Schubert's 'Ave Maria'."

Bos isn't prepared to say how long Miss Truman will work with him except that she intends to study "a long time."

"It's uncertain how soon she will sing in public," he said, "but what experience she already has had will stand her in good stead. Every young artist has to go through the business of stage fright, acquire stage presence. Now she wants to become a really fine artist and come out again."

Bos said his job includes correcting the language of the singers, working on their facial expressions.

"Many singers work hard on foreign languages—they'll sing perfectly in French or German or Italian—and then neglect their own language," he continued.

"Also many singers—especially American girls—sing with no expression on their faces at all. They don't know how to use their brow to frown, if they're singing about death. Or to smile, if they are singing a gay song."

**Training Is Thorough**  
 Bos trains his students thoroughly in the "art of talking bows."

Answer: Radio interference from oil burners, motors and other electrical equipment can be eliminated, but this calls for the service of an expert electrician or radio serviceman. The manufacturer of your oil burner might be able to take care of the nuisance.

**OUR PUBLIC BUSINESS**

Digest of Legislation, 19th, Legislature

The State Planning Board, of which Vincent Jaeger is the Chairman, has issued a digest of legislation of the 19th Legislature, which shows the number of various measures introduced in the Legislature with a brief statement of the subject of each bill, the name of the legislator introducing it, and the committee to which the bill was referred. The information states also the action taken on each bill. In recapitulation it is shown that there were 714 measures introduced, of which 285 died in committee, 115 were killed, 180 were signed by the Governor and became laws of the 19th Legislature. Nine bills were vetoed by the Governor. The number of laws enacted is 180, as compared with 221 laws enacted by the 1947 Legislature.

**Franklin Roosevelt on Taxes**

In his acceptance speech at Chicago, July 2, 1942, Franklin D. Roosevelt said: "Just one word or two on taxes. Well, I know something of taxes. For three long years, I have been going up and down this country preaching that government federal and state and local cost too much. I shall not stop that preaching. An immediate program of action we must abolish useless offices. We must eliminate functions in fact that are not definitely essential to the continuance of government. We must merge, we must consolidate, sub-divisions of government and like the private citizen, give up luxuries which we can no longer afford." This is quoted at this time when the Hoover Commission reports are under consideration, with recommendations to reorganize executive departments in the interest of government efficiency.

**A Growing Industry**

According to NEW MEXICO, pumice for building purposes is found in western states only. "New Mexico, with 17 known deposits, is believed to have larger reserves than any other state." One company is shipping approximately 20,000 cubic yards a month to buyers in 20 states enough to build 1300 two-bedroom homes, it is stated. "If demand continues to grow as in the past few years, pumice may become as valuable to New Mexico industrially as are copper and potash today."

**Federal Aid to Education**

The Taxpayers' Association of New Mexico has suggested to New Mexico representatives in Congress that if Federal aid is granted the restriction as to construction of schools should be removed. In replying, Congressman Fernandez writes: "I agree with you also that if Federal aid is to be provided, it should be available for construction of schools and other capital outlays. As a matter of fact, there is more precedent for the latter, since during the Roosevelt Administration large sums were granted to the states for that purpose." Other New Mexico representatives replied to the same effect.

NEW MEXICO NOTES

More attention is to be directed by the state administration to travel and school safety this year and next. A full time safety director has been given the Department of Education who will travel most of the time working with safety groups, particularly those which interest themselves in school children safety.

New Mexico's record for school child safety is remarkably good. The men and women who drive the one thousand or more school busses have done a remarkable job and should have from us all the applause they so deserve. The bus drivers compete for the job of driving the school busses, they secure the contract after open bidding for the job, and then furnish their own equipment for the service. They, like many others in the school work, are not in the least overpaid, but they are doing a wonderful job. If everyone who, as a driver of a car, would show the same concern for the safety of children as those who drive the school busses to and from school, we would have few if any accidents involving our school children.

We all want to be law-abiding but how easy it is to let down our guard and forget to slow down—or forget to care whether we do or no—as we pass school zones, or school busses as they load and unload on the public highway. Let us all resolve to make this year 1949 the outstanding one for school-child safety, if indeed not for safety for all travel. If every one of us, over the careful driver, would make an extra—many lives in the next nine months.

In addition to other plans, the budget for the State Police has now provided for an additional fifty car patrolmen, and accent is being placed more and more on highway safety. Although New Mexico did beat some of our neighboring states in highway safety in 1948—the governor won a prize from Idaho in the contest you may remember—we have not done nearly well enough. When we kill over three hundred each year on our state highways, that is too many. Please, let's try to be more careful!

I am receiving many kind letters from members of the Legislature since their departure from Santa Fe. They come from Republicans as well as from members of our own party. They all seem to feel that I contributed much to making them feel at home and as having an important piece of work to do.

I wish I had been able to have done more, but one cannot very well meet all engagements from an invalid's bed and a wheel chair, I did like the Legislators and, on the whole, they did a pretty good job I think. I have said as much in this column before.

I also appreciate receiving the many letters which come from the readers of my weekly column. Please feel free to write me. You will always get a reply I have more time for letter writing than for many other chores while I am waiting for my broken hip to be over. When I am well again, and will perhaps have dropped this column for your favorite paper, you will be visiting me more; and I hope to be visiting you with the governor about the state is I revive the practice of traveling in the meantime your letters will be welcome.




The black tip of this new type mower blade sharpener is made of carbonyl cemented carbide, hardest metal commercially available. Mower blades can be sharpened quickly and easily in the field with this sharpener.

The sharpener consists of a steel Shank one-half inch square and about 6" long, chrome plated against rust and having rounded edges so that the tool can be carried safely in the pocket. The tip which does the actual sharpening is made of ultra-hard carbonyl cemented carbide metal, which is attached securely to the steel shank.

To sharpen mower blades with this "carbide tipped" tool, the edges of the blade to be sharpened are uncovered. The sharpener is held in the hand, palm down. The carbonyl tip is placed on the mower blade at about a thirty-degree angle, and drawn from back to front on the blade three or four times. This produces an extremely sharp edge. Any small burr which may develop on the blade may be removed by drawing the carbide tip across the bottom of the blade.

Horses Are Dangerous



Never approach a horse without speaking to him.

As a rule, farmers do not consider horses as especially dangerous animals, yet they account for more accidents of a serious nature than any other farm animal. According to the National Safety Council, approximately three times as many accidents occur with horses as with any other farm animal.

Only strong harness should be used and these should be inspected regularly and kept in good repair. Dry leather has low tensile strength and it should be cleaned with mild soap and warm water and treated with oil. Attention to equipment such as neck-yokes, tongues, single-trees, double-trees and eveners is also very necessary.

The NSC suggests that many serious farm accidents can be prevented by following these simple rules:

Never approach a horse without speaking to him. When cleaning a stall, make no sudden movement. Enter the stall on the left side of the horse. When driving or leading horses, never wrap the lines around body.

Male Youngsters Drink More Milk Than Girls

Results of a recent study should be of interest to dairy farmers. The study revealed that teenage boys drink more milk than teenage girls. Eating habits of school boys and girls, 15 years of age and over, in both city and rural high schools were studied for three years.

It was found that 28 per cent of the boys and only 22 per cent of the girls drank a quart a day.


