### MAYOR OF CAPITAN PROCLAIMS MAY 7, AS POPPY DAY

Saturday, May 7th, was set aside as Poppy Day in CAPITAN in a proclamation issued by Mayor THEOPHILE LARAMIE. The proclamation urged all citizens to observe the day of wearing memorial poppies in honor of those who gave their lives in the two World Wars. It stated:

"Whereas, many men and women of CAPITAN gave their lives in defense of the United States of America in World War I and World War II; and

"Whereas, Memory of their service and sacrifice is a source of great inspiration to all citizens as our nation faces new difficulties and dangers; and

"Whereas, This memory is kept bright by the annual wearing of memorial poppies in their honor and in honor of all other American who died in world war service;

"Now, therefore, I, THEOPHILE LARAMIE, Mayor, of the Village of CAPITAN, do hereby proclaim Saturday, May 7th, to be Poppy Day in the Village of Capitan, and urge that all citizens observe the day of wearing the memorial poppy of THE AMERICAN LEGION AND AMERICAN LEGION AUXILIARY."

### MUNICIPAL GASOLINE TAXES

Forty of the incorporated cities, towns and villages levy a gasoline tax. Thirty-one municipalities levy one cent per gallon, eight levy one-half cent and one levies one-fourth cent. The total amount collected during the calendar year 1948 was \$487,090.54. These figures are taken from a report compiled by Executive Secretary Fred Linn of the New Mexico Petroleum Industries Committee.

The Kelt No. 1 oil well which has been drilling on White Oaks Oil Dome since the first of this year has been temporarily closed down. We are very sorry to be constrained to adopt this method of procedure with reference to the oil development of this vicinity; however Mr. Ray Sipple and the Rice Brothers who came to this locality last October are primarily wheat ranch operators in the large wheat belt of Eastern Colorado and it is first-hand business there to get the year's crops going this time of year, thus necessitating the holding up of well drilling operations at present with the White Oaks Oil Dome Kelt No. 1, bottomed at 1,000 feet. ### FEDERAL-AID HIGHWAY PROGRAM

According to the March, 1949, number of Public Roads, \$6,700,000 is the unprogrammed balance December 31, 1948 for New Mexico Federal-aid highways. The active program involves \$12,110,000 as the total cost of 376.2 miles, of which Federal funds will amount to \$7,700,000. There is included in this total \$5,350,000 for highways programmed only (220.7 miles), \$2,605,000 (77.9 miles), plans approved, and \$4,150,000 for highways under construction (77.6 miles).

# Farm Topics

## Wisconsin Grower Wins Barley Test Contest Conducted In Seven-State Area

Vernon H. Moore, of Rock county, Wisconsin, was named winner of the 1948 malting barley contest conducted in seven midwest states by the Midwest Barley Improvement Association.

As an award for his accomplishment, Moore received \$1,000 in cash, a handsome trophy, and a special ribbon of honor, as well as an all-expense trip to Minneapolis.


In addition to the regional award, Moore received the first Wisconsin state prize of \$500, a county prize of \$25, and state and county trophies. In the final judging, Moore's Barley completed with samples from more than 125 carloads of the grain grown by contestants in the seven-state area. The prize-winning barley was of the Kindred variety, and was grown on 59 acres of Moore's 185 acre farm.

The prize-winning barley was selected by a committee of judges which included representatives of the U. S. department of agriculture.

Each farmer taking part in the competition was required to enter a full carload of barley, or to join with not more than four other barley growers in making up a carload shipment. Only varieties of barley approved for malting purposes in each of the seven states was accepted in the competition. Samples from contest cars were used as the basis for judging the grain.

Sons or daughters of cash prize-winners who assisted in growing the crop and who were between the ages of 12 and 21, received special farm youth award prizes equal to 10 per cent of the cash prizes won by the parent.

### Dry Crib Corn



Farmers with corn in the crib are beginning to have a few questions in their minds. Some of the corn may be quite high in moisture content and warmer weather will add to the problems of handling the corn.

W. H. Sheldon, agricultural engineer at Michigan state college, says that wet corn will keep indefinitely while frozen. The problem is what to do with the wet corn that is still in the crib when warmer weather returns.

One solution is to feed it out before the weather warms up. However, in many cases large quantities may be on hand and cannot be used rapidly.

Experiments in Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and Iowa, have shown that heated air can be used to dry wet corn. Blowing unheated air through the crib, with a hay drier fan will not take out very much water, but it will keep the corn as cool as the air and greatly retard mold growth.

### Fruit Jars Usable In Fumigant Spray

If the garden plot is small, J. C. Ford, Auburn Polytechnic Institute extension services garden specialist says, the correct amount of fumigant per row can best be applied by using a fruit jar.

A 16- or 24-penny nail hole should be made near one margin of the jar lid through which to pour the liquid. A somewhat smaller hole is necessary near the opposite side of the lid.

# HOUSEHOLD MEMOS



Select Seasoning to Suit Meat (See Recipes Below)

### Meat Tricks

THE FIELD of seasonings, especially as applied to meat cookery, is a wide and interesting one. If you want to have fun with cooking, and serve the family foods with fine flavor, follow some of the tips given here; then, go further and do some experimenting on your own.

Certain seasonings are ideal for different cuts of meat. For mild cuts of meat such as veal and lamb, the seasoning may be a little sharper than those used for beef. Spicy seasonings are favored for pork.

**SOUR CREAM** has long been a favorite with veal. When combined with a dill pickle relish and served with steaming hot egg noodles, veal can indeed be a treat.

#### Veal in Dill Sour Cream (Serves 4)

- 1 tablespoon salt
- 3 quarts boiling water
- 6 ounces egg noodles
- 1 pound veal, cut thin, from leg
- 4 tablespoons butter or substitute
- 1 tablespoon flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 4 tablespoons dill pickle relish
- 1 1/2 cups sour cream

To cook egg noodles, add salt to boiling water and gradually add egg noodles. Do not let water stop boiling. Stir occasionally with a pancake turner. Boil rapidly about nine minutes, until tender. Drain thoroughly.

Have butcher cut veal 1/4-inch thick. Dredge in flour and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Melt butter in skillet; add veal and saute until golden brown. Cover and cook until tender. Remove from pan; keep warm in oven. Add two teaspoons flour to the drippings, blend well. Gradually stir in sour cream, pickle relish, salt and pepper. To serve, arrange veal in center of platter and surround with buttered egg noodles.

#### LAMB BREAST is among the more economical cuts of meat, but it's a real favorite when prepared with barbecue sauce:

#### Barbecued Lamb Breast (Serves 4)

- 2 pounds lamb breast
- 1 medium onion, sliced
- 1/2 cup chili sauce
- 1 teaspoon salt
- Pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon red pepper
- 1 tablespoon vinegar
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1 cup water

Cut lamb into five pieces. Season with salt and pepper. Place in hot skillet and let fatty sides brown. Mix remaining ingredients and pour over lamb. Cover and simmer for one and one-half hours. Remove cover and cook for 20 minutes longer, until sauce is absorbed.

Vegetables, cloves, bay leaves

#### LYNN SAYS: Know these Facts About Cooking

When brown sugar hardens, place in the refrigerator until the sugar softens. If the sugar is very hard, wrap a damp towel around it before refrigerating.

If you add barley to soup or stew, the mixture will thicken naturally without the addition of flour and water.

Heat cocoa with an egg beater to prevent lumps from forming on its top.

and tomatoes add wonderful flavor to round steak. A low temperature is used in baking so the meat will be properly tender.

#### Tomato Steak (Serves 6-8)

- 3 pounds round steak, cut 3 inches thick
- 3 tablespoons fat
- 1 pint tomatoes
- 2 carrots
- 1 large onion
- 1 turnip
- 2 cloves
- 3 bay leaves
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 2 tablespoons water

Score the steak by slashing with a sharp knife. Sear in heated fat in skillet. Prepare vegetable and put through coarse knife of the food chopper. Add them as well as the other seasonings to the meat. Cover carefully and bake in a slow (275°) oven for three hours or until tender. Remove meat from liquid. Combine flour and water. Add a little of the hot liquid to this, then add to remaining liquid. Roll together until thickened, then pour over meat and serve.

Apples and raisins are tucked into a sage-seasoned dressing for roast pork.

#### \*Stuffed Shoulder of Pork

- 1 4-5 pound pork shoulder
- 1 cup bread crumbs
- 1/2 cup raisins
- 1 egg, beaten
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- Dash of pepper
- 1 grated onion

Have the butcher cut a pocket in a shoulder of pork, from which the blade has been removed. Make the dressing as follows: Mix ingredients in order given and fill the pocket. Skewer or tie with coarse string. Rub the roasting pan lightly with a clove of garlic, if desired, and dust the pork shoulder with salt and pepper and paprika. Place in a 350° oven and cook two and one-half to three hours.

#### LIVER HAS little fat of its own, so bacon and pork are used with it to provide juices for cooking it. Here's an unusual way to prepare liver that's certain to be a favorite:

#### Liver Rolls


Have desired number of slices of calves' or beef liver cut in one-fourth inch slices. Sprinkle with fine bread crumbs and spread with a mixture of sauteed onions, celery and chopped parsley. In the center of each slice, place a finger-length piece of salt pork. Roll each slice tightly and tie or skewer together. Dust with salt and pepper and roll in flour. Place in a baking pan to which a small amount of water mixed with bacon drippings has been added.

To keep yolks from which the whites have been used, place in a cup of water to prevent a hard crust from forming. Store in the refrigerator.

Never beat muffin or pancake mixtures too thoroughly. Slight lumps should be left in the batter so the finished product will be really tender.

When heating ice cream rolls place in the oven in a paper sack or in a heavy skillet on top of the range. Do not sprinkle with water since this may melt the icing.

Report from Idaho—Since announcement that the Atomic Energy Commission will build a multi-million dollar atomic reactor testing plant near Blackfoot, Idaho, many workers have gone into eastern Idaho to seek work on the project and thousands of others have written to the Idaho Employment Service for information regarding jobs in the construction. Idaho authorities warn prospective job-seekers that this is not a rush job, that the peak employment of 6,000 workers on construction will not be reached before 1953. Employment this year will probably not exceed 100 workers, since all that will be done in 1949 is the sinking of test wells to determine water supply. Employment in 1950 and 1951 will not exceed 2,000 workers. Idaho will need a large supply of workers in the cultivation and harvest of potatoes and sugar beets this year, but workers seeking high-pay construction jobs in the atomic development program will be disappointed if they make a journey to Idaho at this time.

Contest—The President's Committee on the Handicapped is sponsoring a national essay contest for 11th and 12th grade students with \$2,000 in prizes and trips to Washington for the five national winners. In New Mexico the contest is under the direction of Superintendent of Schools, Charles L. Rose. The essay subject is "Why Not Hire The Handicapped?" and New Mexico students must have their entries in by April 30. The national winner of the \$1,000 first prize will be chosen from first place winners of the states and territories. Information about the contest can be obtained from high school principals or from any local office of the New Mexico State Employment Service.

Still Open—The Civil Aeronautics Administration is still trying to fill available openings for aircraft communications in Alaska. Salary begins at \$3718 per annum, with promotion to \$4054 possible. To qualify, men must be single, have military or civilian aeronautical communications experience. The need for aircraft communicators in Alaska has been urgent for over a year, and while 250 men were placed on the job during 1948, the CAA would still like to recruit about 25 additional men per month this year. Information on the available jobs can be secured at any state employment office.

Out of the Kitchen—For the first time in U. S. history, the number of married woman workers now exceeds their single sisters. The increase in the number of married women working is tied up, to some extent, with the high cost of living. Some of the married girls have to

**SELECTIVE SERVICE REQUIREMENTS OF REGISTRANTS.**

Asserting that officials in Washington are expecting the summer vacation season to see a record-breaking number of student-tourists off for Europe, Col. Russell C. Charlton, State Director of Selective Service for New Mexico, said today that the selective service law in specific requirements that all registrants keep their local boards informed as to their whereabouts—after they become twenty-six as well as before.

"Departure from the country does not relieve them of these obligations," said Col. Charlton, "even though Selective Service is inducting men at present."  
In order to comply with the law and leave with a free hand, Col. Charlton said, student-tourists before departing should report the following information to their local boards:

1. Date of departure
  2. Approximate itinerary
  3. Date of expected return
- "This may be done by mail," Col. Charlton said. There is no printed form.
- Within five days of return the registrant should report to the local board (by mail if more convenient), giving his old address (where he may no longer be reached by mail) or—in case it has been changed—his new address. If he becomes 18 years of age during the tour, the law requires that he register at a convenient board office within five days of the date of his return to this country.

"It is not necessary that he return to his home to do this," Col. Charlton pointed out. "He may register at the local board office most convenient, but he must be sure to give the place he considers his home—as well as his temporary address—to the local board registering him so that his card may be forwarded to the appropriate local board."

While he did not ascribe to any widespread intent to violate the law, Col. Charlton declared that the halt in inductions had caused misunderstanding in the minds of some registrants as to certain legal obligations. He emphasized that the obligation of the registrants to keep local boards informed as to their whereabouts does not cease when they become 26.

"Selective Service registrants are required by law to keep their local boards informed when they change their address after they become 26 years of age, as well as before," said Col. Charlton. "Men cannot be inducted without their consent after they reach twenty-six under the Selective Service Act of 1948, but that does not mean they are relieved from obligation to keep their local boards informed as to a new address, where they may be reached by mail, in other words."



Integrity and Contracts

One of the qualities in human beings that our civilization today needs so desperately is integrity. What is integrity? The word comes from a Latin term which meant "untouched" or "whole." That's about the way it is today. A man who has integrity is so morally sound that he is not to be touched—in a way that will affect his honesty and uprightness.

Many labor-management disagreements would disappear, if we honestly would undertake to solve them with each side of the conference table keeping its integrity. If each party to an agreement keeps his word—that is integrity. It used to be said of a neighbor I had: "His word is his bond." That's the kind of neighbor this world needs. It will require integrity from each one of us, if this world is to become a better place.

An Example Let me illustrate—with a labor management example. Less than a year ago, the General Motors "cost of living" wage agreement with United Automobile Workers was claimed as a solution to the frequent wage battles that upset industrial communities.


Under terms of the contract GM can raise or lower wages according to government statistics. As living costs rise or fall in reports of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the company can adjust wages accordingly. While the formula did not rule out wage increases for other reasons, it was an honest attempt to solve the cost-of-living problem.

Pay Cut Due Last year under the contract GM employees got a flat 6-cent hourly raise, plus a "cost of living" increase of 5 cents. What are the prospects this year? Employees are in line for an increase not related to living costs, but under the formula will get a pay cut of 2 cents because the Bureau of Labor Statistics index of living costs has gone down. The effect would be to hold wages at about the same levels as last year.

Employees still would have the advantage of the decline in living costs. However, according to a recent Associated Press dispatch, a GM local in Cleveland wants to reopen the contract, which has more than a year to run. This local of 2,500 workers wants UAW headquarters to block the carrying out of the contract. According to the AP story the local's president said that workers' living conditions "ought to be of greater meaning than the sacredness of a contract."

Moral Issues Moral issues are involved when you talk about speaking contracts. As against a pay increase of two or three cents, a contract should have plenty of sacredness. What is involved is integrity. The contract was made in good faith. It has more than a year to run. If it does not meet the needs of the UAW, the parties will have determined this by the time for expiration. There are few human relationships that have greater meaning than do contracts. The courts of the land expect contracts to be kept. Good neighbors are made by men who keep their word. This applies to groups as well. Good citizenship requires integrity.

**CHEVROLET SAFETY CHECK**

"In line with the traffic safety drive of the National Safety Council being conducted this spring, motorists should give their automobiles a thorough safety checkup," E. L. Harrig, director of service for the Chevrolet Motor Division said today.

"A thorough examination of brakes, tires, wheel alignment, steering, glass and light can easily mean the difference between life and death on the highway," said Harrig. "A preliminary examination of these potential danger points on the car can be made by the motorist himself. Chevrolet dealers are well equipped to make a more detailed inspection of those items on the car that the owner may think need attention."

Harrig listed the various points of the car that have a bearing on its safety, and how to ascertain whether they are functioning properly:

**Brakes**—If you can push the brake pedal to within one inch of the floor it should be inspected. If the brake pull the car to either side when stopping they should be inspected and brought up to standard. If, under customary driving conditions, it takes you longer to stop than previously, this also is a danger signal. Have the brakes inspected.

**Tires**—If they are worn smooth they will skid more easily. If irregular-wear spots show on some tires it is an indication of improper wheel alignment. It is well in any case to have wheel alignment inspected in a regular service department.

**Steering**—If there is more than an inch or so of play in the steering wheel, or if the front wheels are slow to react to a turn of the steering wheel, this feature should be inspected and brought to standard.

**Glass**—Check windshield and all windows for discoloration which sometimes is found in old cars. If your vision in any direction is restricted by faulty glass it should be replaced for protection of passengers and other cars. Never drive with a

dirty windshield.

**Lights**—Make certain that both headlights burn on both upper and lower beams, and that tail and stop lights are working. Stand in front of the car with headlights on the lower beam and be certain that they do not blind approaching motorists. Keep headlights and tail lights lenses clean at all times.

"At this time," said Shepard, "my office is studying the gas situation in New Mexico to determine whether we should take early steps to stop the waste of gas and the tremendous energy that is wasted with it each day in our fields where gas is run off into the air by the million of feet and from which the tax payers derive no benefit whatever.

"It seems to me that the gas which is now wasted should be put to use and made to bring income for the school children of New Mexico," concluded Shepard.



WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS

Effect Disputed as Pact Signed; Bradley Urges European Fortress; Senate Okays More Aid for Chinese

PACT SIGNED:

Hopes & Fears

For better or worse . . . for a hope of peace or a step toward war . . . the North Atlantic pact was now a reality.

STRIPPED of its mumbo-jumbo phraseology, the intent of the pact is simple: It declares that an act of aggression against any of the signatory nations shall be construed as an attack against all.

Therein, as many observers have pointed out, lies the pact's strength and its weakness. The strength inherent in the proviso lies in its leaving to signatory nations exercise of their own judgment regarding the degree of emergency in the event of attack.

THERE WAS STAUNCH denial that the pact was aimed at any particular nation, but only a moron would concede the truth in that. The pact definitely was aimed at blocking Russian aggression against the smaller signatories.

Pact signatories were the United States, Belgium, Canada, Denmark, France, Iceland, Italy, Luxembourg, Netherlands, Norway, Portugal and the United Kingdom.

DEFENSE:

Arms for Europe

The United States was urged to follow up swiftly its peace-insurance action in signing the North Atlantic pact.

Bradley rejected the idea widely held among some military men that it would be impossible to stop Russia from conquering all Europe if it chose.

BRADLEY flatly contended that such strategy would breed despair among potential allies in Europe and render them impotent.

He took a hefty swing at the Soviets, although omitting them by name, when he declared: "If to be resolute is to be hostile, then we shall have to endure the slanders of those who call us hostile."

HE DECLARED the Atlantic pact had removed the world crisis from a "cold war" stage, and warned that America could all "too readily become the victim of our own slogans . . . if we do not soon renounce our catch-word addiction in all too many minds that 'cold war' is the overture to real war, we may find ourselves with a mentality that accepts real war as inevitable."

But did his urging to strengthen the "ramparts" of Europe in favor of air power and liberation later, mean strengthen the pact countries' defenses with men as well as guns and munitions.

That was a possibility the people of the U.S. would have to consider.

RUSSIANS ON RAMPAGE

Soviet Troops Attack Army Post in Iran

Even as the North Atlantic pact was being signed in an actual, though disavowed, effort to stem the spread of Russian imperialism, a military informant in Tehran reported Russian forces had attacked an Iranian army post.

Israel's Miracle

ARMISTICE:

Jews in Dissent

Amid verbal strife and dissension, the government of Israel consummated an armistice with Trans-Jordan.

WHATEVER ELSE the armistice may have effected, a foreign office spokesman said it had added 100 square miles to Israel.

But the armistice was not effected without bitterness. Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion's opponents charged the armistice was tantamount to recognizing the incorporation of the Jenin-Tulkarm-Nablus bulge north of Jerusalem into the Hashemite Jordan kingdom of monarch Abdullah.

The vote followed a stormy five-hour debate. Opponents charged the armistice opened Israel to Anglo-American influence.

CHINA:

More Aid

There would be more aid from the United States—but, locking the door too late—there was a condition. The senate wrote into the aid bill a ban on shipments to Communist-controlled areas.

IT LONG HAD BEEN public information that much of the supplies and munitions sent by this country to aid the Chinese Nationalists in their fight against Communism had fallen into Communist hands.

Now, congress had moved to stop a procedure which must have afforded no little amusement to Russia and her Communist hordes in China.

THE U. S. SENATE accepted an amendment to the aid measure to make available \$4 million dollars in "frozen" China aid funds—provided it is spent only in areas controlled by the Nationalist government.

ARMED UNITY:

A Contradiction?

Unity of the nation's armed forces was promised, but where was the unity in defense-preparatory thinking?

LATEST EXAMPLE was the cruiser Roanoke — "the world's most powerful light cruiser"—and described by enthusiastic builders as being "practically unsinkable."

The hull, it was said, renders the ship practically unsinkable. She has a main battery of 12 semi-automatic six-inch guns.

Speaking at the commissioning of the Roanoke, Louis Johnson, U. S. defense secretary, said the vessel was joining the "greatest fleet we have ever maintained in time of supposed peace."

HE DECLARED the ship would be "kept in training for its primary mission," and carefully omitting the word "war," Johnson described the mission as "one we all hope and believe it will not have to discharge."

Referring to armed service unity, the defense secretary said: "Our safety lies in the combined contribution of them all, each service in the sphere it is best equipped to control."

NEW FEEDS:

Mighty Potent

Could an animal burst its seams by eating?

That is an academic question, of course; but some of the new livestock feeds are reported to be so powerful that animals literally "burst their seams" if fed too much.

DR. H. J. PREBLUDA, nutritionist, stated that scientists simply would have to breed new animals with greater capacities.

The new high-energy feeds are rich in vitamins, especially a new vitamin B-12, found in what is called the animal "protein factor."

HE ADDED that when these feeds are given to poultry it is like pouring rich coal into a furnace.

Dr. Prebluda said that when these feeds are given to poultry it is like pouring rich coal into a furnace. Rich coal needs a draft, but the birds are not capable of burning rich feeds under draft.



### Methoxychlor to Replace DDT For Dairy Animals

Entomologists of the United States Department of Agriculture have announced that DDT should not be used for insect control on dairy cows. Even small amounts of DDT in a food such as milk, a universal diet especially for infants and small children, might prove harmful in time. This conclusion has been reached after several years of study by toxicologists of the Food and Drug Administration.

The entomologists now recommend that methoxychlor (known as "Marlate") another effective insecticide, be substituted for DDT to control insect pests on dairy cows.

The federal entomologists make no change in their recommendations for the use of DDT in controlling insect pests on other livestock including beef cattle.
