### Fire Razes Elementary School At San Patricio

The community in and around San Patricio suffered a severe loss in the fire which completely destroyed the elementary school. The fire occurred about 8:30 A. M. on November 21, and it is believed to have been caused from a defective fuse.

Fortunately, the building was unoccupied at the time, as the children had not yet assembled for their classes. Nearby residents were able to save only a few desks and school supplies.

Mrs. Ben Sanchez, the wife of the school bus driver, and who happened to be substituting for Mr. Sanchez that morning, displayed exceptional alertness at the scene of the fire. As she was driving up to the school, she noticed the flames and did not stop. Her bus was filled with youngsters, and due to Mrs. Sanchez's quick thinking, they were saved from possible injury.

The writer was at the scene of the fire the following day, and was impressed by the efficient manner in which Messrs. Tom Babers and Ben Sanchez handled the necessary retooling of the students of San Patricio school. Mr. Babers is the postmaster of San Patricio.

Mrs. Elva Wilson has made several trips to San Patricio in order to render all assistance possible and insure smooth functioning of the classes for the children from this school. Teachers and children are working together in a close spirit of co-operation so that the misfortune they have suffered will not be too heavy a burden.

San Patricio elementary school has four teachers and 88 students. The primary grade is being housed in the old lunch room on the San Patricio grounds. Classes for the other grades are conducted in the basement of the gymnasium at the Hondo grade school.

Mrs. Elva Wilson, county superintendent of schools, and the Board of Education are most appreciative of the assistance rendered by the grade and high schools of Hondo, the Ruidoso grade school at Ruidoso, and the people of San Patricio in the emergency.

According to a press release this week, Lon D. Merchant of Carrizozo will continue to serve as president of the Southeastern New Mexico Grazing Association.

Mr. Merchant was originally elected president in 1934, when the group was organized by ranchers in southeastern New Mexico. At that time, they were interested primarily with grazing problems.

Mr. Scharf was born March 14, 1864, at Baden, Germany. He came to the United States in September of 1882. He resided in New York state and was married to Anna Barthell in February of 1890. Four children were born of their union—Joe and Leo of Elizabethtown, N. Y.; Albert of Carrizozo, and Laura M. King of Roswell. He came to Occura in 1913 and worked on the Three Rivers Ranch for a number of years. In 1930, he moved to Carrizozo to make his home with his son, Albert.

For the last 15 months he has been living with his daughter in Roswell.

He is survived by three sons and one daughter, 12 grandchildren, 10 grandchildren, two brothers, Carl and Joe Scharf of Buffalo, N. Y., and two sisters, Wressa Sparks of Gowanda, N. Y., and Anna Thurburst of Springvale, N. Y.

### Ranchers Win In Fight With Uncle Sam

Southern New Mexico ranchers have scored an important victory in their litigation with the U. S. government over property involved in the condemnation action taken by the military.

The government has agreed to pay three times as much annual rent for their land as it first offered. And the ranchers have the prospect of getting their land and back some day.

The government condemned some 4,000,000 acres in southern New Mexico during the war for testing rockets and other military uses. It took over exclusive use of some of the land and worked out co-use arrangements with occupants on the rest.

Since the war the government has sought to take title to part of the land. The ranchers teamed up with the State of New Mexico to fight permanent acquisition of the land by Uncle Sam.

State Land Commissioner Guy Shepard signed the first 16 leasing agreements in Santa Fe last week. More will follow.

Terms of the leases were explained by Horace Henning, secretary of the New Mexico Cattle Growers' Association.

He said the leases run for 25 years and are renewable by the federal government. The government can cancel them at any time.

Holders of present grazing and mining leases on state land will continue to pay the annual fees in order to hold their leases in good standing. In turn the military will sublet the land, paying the lessees for exclusive use. Rent is based on the lands carrying capacity. The land is evaluated at \$125 per animal unit annually, with the rental being 10 per cent of this.

Thus, if a rancher's land carried 100 cattle, valued at \$12,500, he would receive a \$1,250 annual rental from the government.

The ranchers—and with them mine owners in the region—won two points. They gained a rental rate which Henning says is much more fair than the original offers and they blocked permanent loss of the land.

But they lost their third stand. The ranchers and miners had urged the Defense Department to take its weapons elsewhere. The Army, Navy and Air Force said no. They had tried other locations and New Mexico was the best of the lot.

### Lyric Has Oils By Local Artist

The four oil paintings on the lobby walls of the Lyric Theater were done by Mrs. A. P. Sifton, Sr., during her girlhood days.

One of the pictures was painted in 1892, two in 1893, and one in 1894, which makes the first picture 57 years old.

Two of the pictures depict castle scenes somewhere on a coast. One is a sheep grazing scene along a coast also. The motif of the fourth picture might be "Fishing in the Moonlight." The painting indicates a lake by moonlight with a figure fishing from a pier.

Mrs. Sifton has derived much pleasure from her hobby of painting, although she has not attempted to pursue it as a career. She says she has not done much painting lately, but plans to do another picture when inspired by just the right scene or event.

Mrs. Sifton is the mother of A. P. Sifton, Jr., owner of the Lyric Theater.

She came to New Mexico from Louisiana in 1911. Her native state is Texas. Mrs. Sifton came to Carrizozo in March of 1947. The majority of the intervening years were spent in Tularosa.

The state had joined forces with the land owners, contending that permanent loss of one-fifteenth of its area would cripple the state's economy and nearly cut it in half.

In recent months the fight had hinged on the matter of fair rental.

Henning said about 80 ranch families and 1,200,000 acres are involved. The agreements will cover most of the land between the White Sands Proving Ground and the San Antonio-Carrizozo highway.

Still unsettled is the question of more than 1,000,000 acres in the Orocoti strip in the same region. The Army has been using it on a co-use arrangement, permitting ranchers to enter the restricted area two or three days a week. It is now bargaining for exclusive use.

Provision also has been made for special compensation where a rancher lost so much land by the military acquisition that he was unable to make a living on what was left.

It is reported that the Lincoln Elementary School was broken into recently and a small supply of "milk nickels" taken. This fund is for a very worthy cause and it is most regrettable that anyone would deliberately prevent the money from being used for the purpose for which it was intended.

S. P. TO BUY NEW CARS

Southern Pacific announced plans recently to acquire 3,100 new freight cars and give 900 box cars a general overhauling as the latest steps in the railroad's continuing program for expansion of its freight carrying facilities.

In making the announcement, President A. T. Mercler said consideration is being given to constructing a substantial number of the new cars in the company's own shops, where the overhauling program also will be carried out.

The new freight cars will consist of 3,000 steel box cars, including 1,000 automobile cars of which half will be fitted with the latest type auto-loading racks; and 100 drop-end gondola cars 65 feet in length to accommodate extra long loads, it was stated.

The reconditioning of 900 box cars, in the railroad's general overhauling program for 1950, will be carried out at an average rate of 90 cars a month, Mercler said.


Southern Pacific has ordered 20,530 freight train cars of various types in the postwar period and has taken delivery of them as fast as the builders could turn them out, it was explained. All but about 1,000 of the new freight cars on previous orders will have been delivered by end of this year, and of those remaining all will be delivered by end of next March.

The railroad's total expenditures for all kinds of new rolling stock since V-J Day approximate \$238,000,000, not including cost of the 3,100 new cars just announced, it was pointed out. Freight service equipment of the railroad has been augmented in the postwar period by receipt of 70 diesel main line freight locomotives, with 28 more remaining on order for expected delivery by the end of next March; its fleet of diesel switchers has been increased to 247 with 43 more still to be delivered; and 8,000 cars have been added to the Pacific Fruit Express refrigerator fleet.
