The deadline for the regular brake and light inspection was January 1, according to H. R. Douglas of the state police.

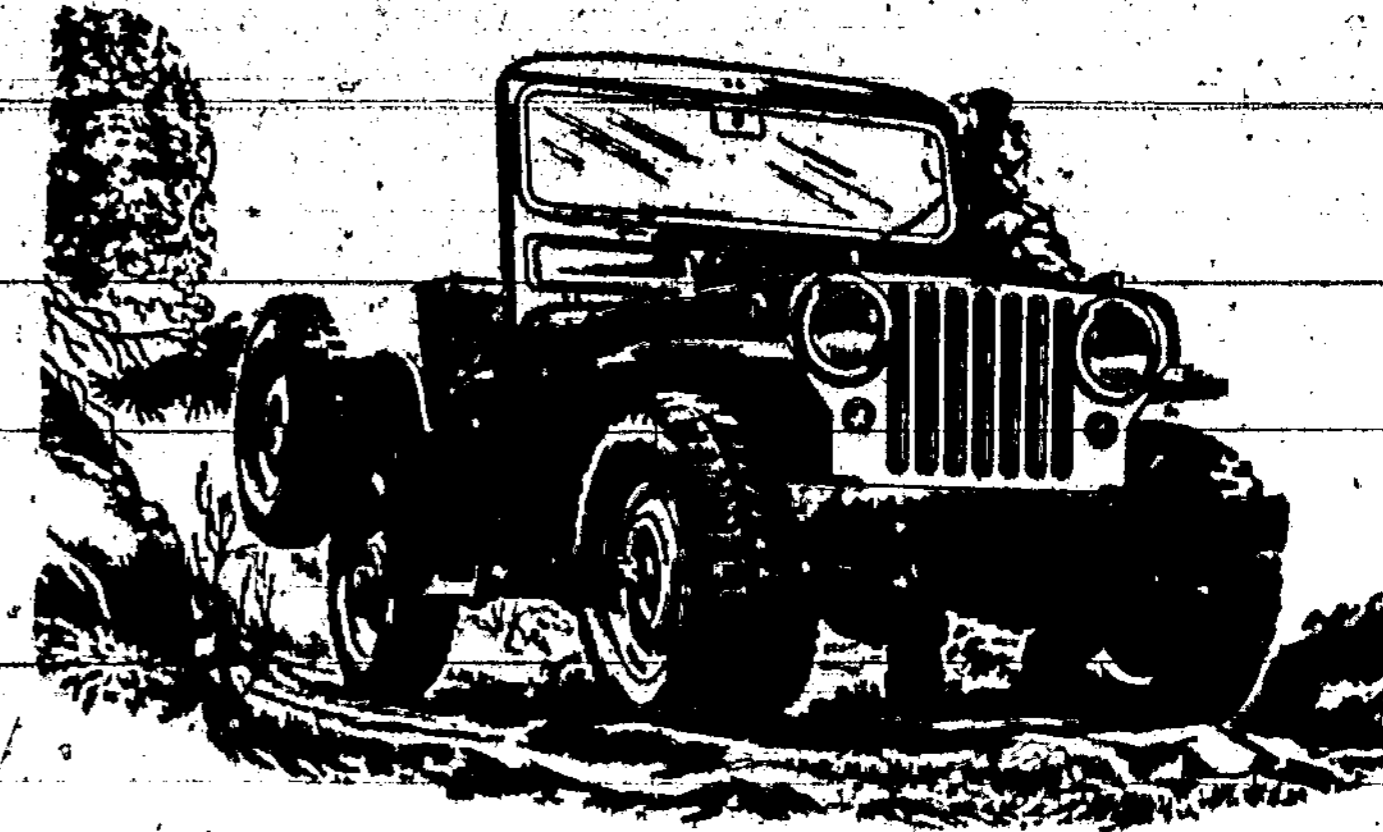
State regulations call for inspection of brakes and lights three times a year, and the public's cooperation in securing such inspection is requested.

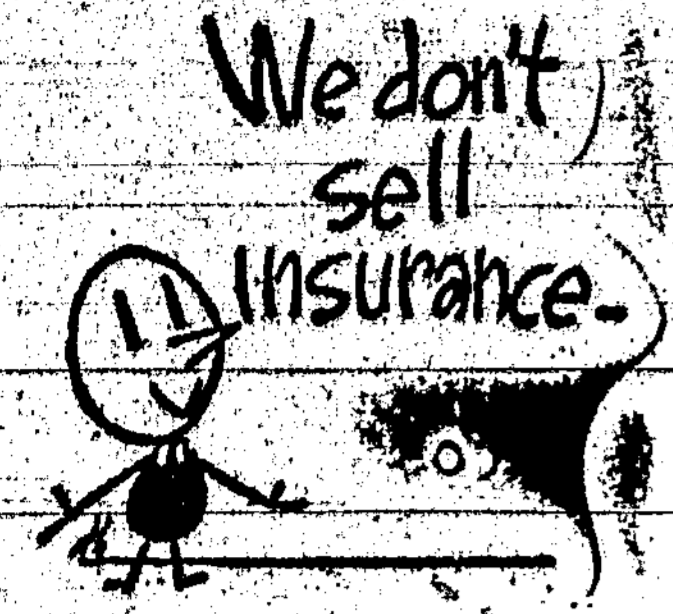

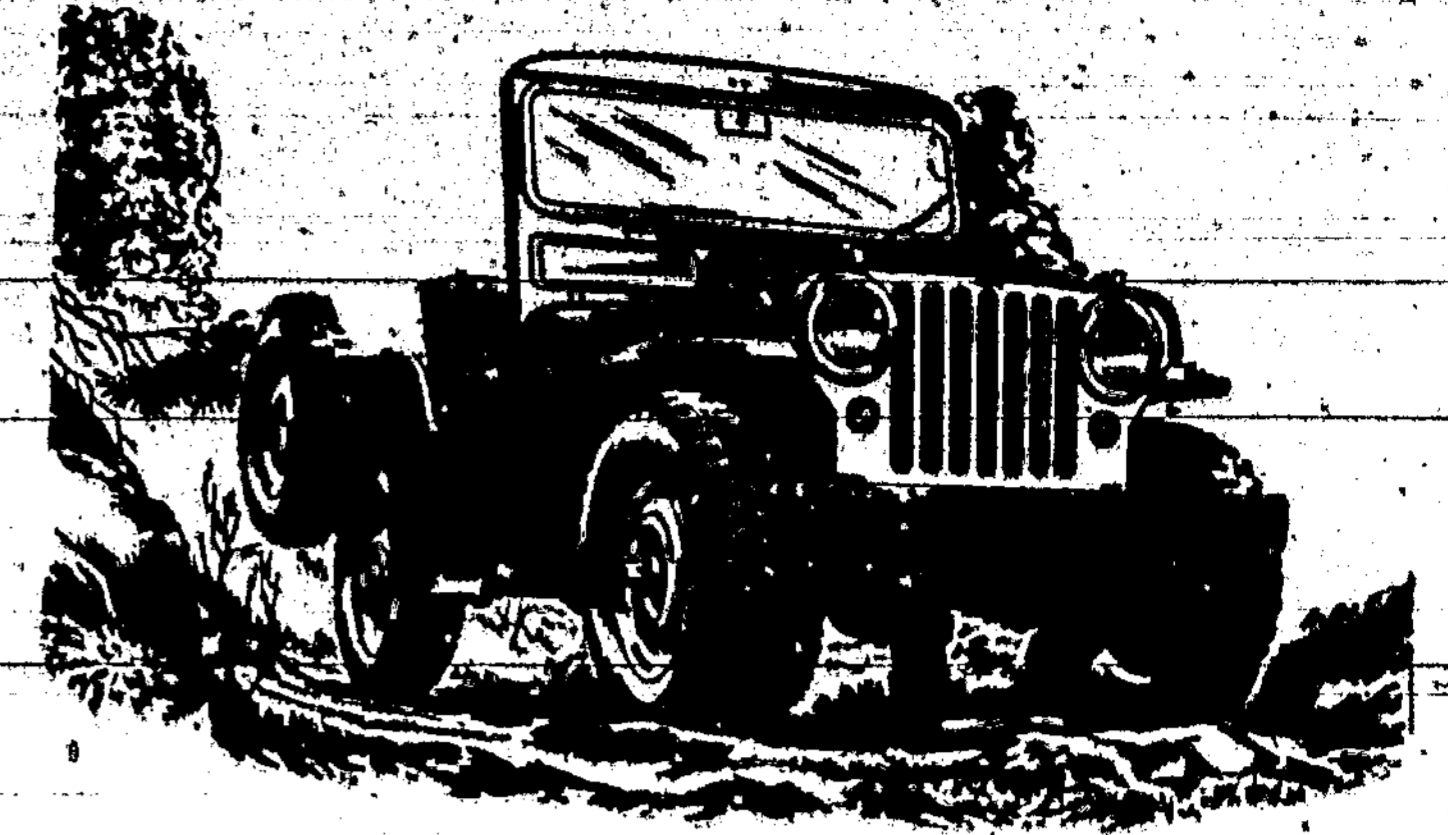
