## Dexter Hi Takes BB Tourney

Dexter High's "Demons" took home the coveted District 5 championship at the close of a tourney full of upsets and surprises.

Carlsbad, seeded 1, was nipped out by Artesia, 49-48, who, in turn, lost to Dexter, 43-32, in the final game of the series. Carlsbad placed third, defeating Hagerman 51-29, and was awarded the sportsmanship trophy, while Roswell drew consolation honors for their defeat of Wept, 48-30.

Awards were made by Travis Stovall, Artesia principal and vice president of the board of control in charge of the meet.

In comparison to the semi-final games, which were both overtime sessions, the final game saw Dexter leading from the start. Artesia was in the running right up to the final period when the Demons caught their second wind and pulled away.

Named to the all-star tournament team were Loyva, Carlsbad; Cummins, Captain; Giceno, Dexter; Rlogley, Hagerman; Balkin, Artesia; Andres, Dexter; Keith, Roswell; Brown, Artesia; Herrera, Carrizozo; Pfutzenreuter, Carlsbad; Cunningham, Dexter. Jerry Bear, Roswell, was reported to have suffered a slight concussion when he fell while attempting to make a basket near the end of the consolation game. He was rushed to St. Mary's Hospital, but returned to his home on Sunday to convalesce a few days before resuming his school work.

Artesia pulled two upsets in the series by defeating Carrizozo, 51-48, and nipping out Carlsbad. Roswell had a rough time to wrest consolation honors from Captain, being forced to an overtime session with the final score 52-49. Zamora of Captain scored 17 points in this tilt. Huldosa lost to Honou, 33-30, and Carrizozo after having defeated Captain twice during the past season went down 53-33. The following are the games as played and their scores.

Lincoln County winners were Fuller Ranch, Picacho, champion territory fleeces; the award for the best exhibit of fleeces by an individual was also won by the Fuller Ranch; Cedric Eus, Hondo; Fred McTeague, Hondo; George Slaughter, Picacho; Bobbie Peables, Nogal, and E. W. Nelson, Tinsale.

In addition to all the champion awards, 56 ribbons were taken by New Mexico entries. Fourteen of these ribbons were for first place awards.

Lincoln County winners in the Albuquerque show were T. J. Sutherland, Ruidoso; Fred McTeague, Hondo; Fuller Ranch, Picacho; and Bobby Peables, Nogal.

## Local City Council In Special Session

Last week's News-Outlook announced a definite date for a special meeting of the Carrizozo City Council would be published later.

This meeting was to be held so the council might consider the recent increase in the city's water rate, which was imposed by the Southern Pacific Company. The city dads were also to consider the results of the conference held with P. D. Robinson, superintendent, Rio Grande Division of the Southern Pacific Company, Robinson was in Carrizozo on February 23, 1950, to discuss the water situation.

It was learned last Saturday a special meeting had been held, to which the press did not receive an invitation. However, a copy of the minutes of this meeting was requested by The News-Outlook for the information of the public. The following is a copy of the unapproved minutes which was received through the mails by this newspaper.

"Minutes of special meeting held at City Hall, February 23, 1950.

"Members present: Vernon Petty, mayor; T. E. Kelley, C. A. Snow, Leandro Vega and Roy Shafer, members; Gussie E. Johnson, clerk.

"Motion made by Roy Shafer and seconded by T. E. Kelley that the village water rates be increased, the rate enough to cover the cost to the city, leaving the minimum 3,000 gallons.

"Motion carried.

"There being no further business, meeting adjourned."

## Oil Distributorship Acquired By Clifton B. Zumwalt

Of interest to C. B. (Cliff) Zumwalt's friends—and customers—is the announcement he has purchased the Phillips 66 wholesaler distributorship from W. A. Nicholas, Carrizozo. Final arrangements were completed on March 1.

The distributorship has been owned by Mr. Nicholas for the past 11 years. Zumwalt stated the bulk storage plant is located just west of Carrizozo on Highway 230. The storage capacity of the plant is 25,000 gallons, and Mr. Zumwalt stated that is sufficient for the present.

The new owner of Phillips 66 products will continue to serve the territory which has previously been managed by Nicholas. This territory includes all of Lincoln County and parts of Socorro and Otero counties.

"Naturally," said Zumwalt, "we will be glad to serve all others who may care to patronize us."

He explained this plant sells petroleum products for wholesale only. Zumwalt has been engaged in the retail gasoline business for the past 10 years, but said this is his first experience in the wholesale line. His son, Tom, will continue in charge of the Zumwalt Auto Service station, while the older Zumwalt takes over the management of the storage plant.

Mrs. C. B. Zumwalt will handle all bookkeeping and clerical work for the two business firms.

Clifton Zumwalt was born February 11, 1909, in Benito City, N. M. This town is now buried beneath Benito Dam, but at one time it was a thriving community of about 600 residents. Zumwalt said it had churches, hotels and a school, together with some business places. Its growth dwindled, however, and it became a ghost town before it was selected for the site of Benito Dam.

Except for a period of about 20 years when he lived in southern California, Zumwalt has resided in New Mexico. He returned to Carrizozo in 1940, and has resided here since.

## S. P. Restaurant Under New Management

The management of the Southern Pacific Hotel and Restaurant is now under the direction of Dwight A. Clarke, El Paso.

Mr. Clarke will spend considerable time each week in Carrizozo, but states John Carey has been appointed resident manager. Carey has been in the hotel and restaurant business approximately 40 years and has formerly been associated with the Ritz Hotel in Philadelphia.

Clark was with the Threlkeld Company, San Francisco for 17 years, part of which time he served as division supervisor.

One of the projects of this company was the serving of 27 camps of the California Packing Company, employing from 150 to 300 men. Clarke formed the Western Commissary Company in 1940 with headquarters in El Paso. This company is presently serving construction camps of the El Paso Natural Gas Company.

Clarke was born and reared in El Paso.

## Pete Nalda Murdered; Capture Two Suspects

On Sunday night, February 26, Pierre (Pete) Nalda was killed in one of the most cold-blooded crimes of modern civilization.

Gratien Ernaut, nephew of the slain man and who was with him the night the crime was committed, stated they had retired when they were awakened by two men about 11 or 11:30. The men first requested gasoline and coffee, left and again returned and asked Pete to give them a push. When he went outside to comply, he was faced with a gun and told to write some checks.

They went into the house and after the checks were written, the men forced them outside and said they were going to kill them.

Nalda and Ernaut made a break and ran. Ernaut was shot at but missed since he zig-zagged as he ran. He later made his way safely to the ranch of his uncle, Mike Nalda. After he had told his story his uncle called Sheriff "Sally" Ortiz and Pete's body was found in a small arroyo with a bullet in his back and another in his head.

A widespread search for the attackers was instituted immediately, engaged in which were Sheriff Ortiz of Lincoln County and his deputies, about 15 units of state police and sheriffs and their deputies from Eddy, Otero, Guadalupe and Torrance counties, and the mounted border patrol.

On February 23, two men were arrested by State Police Chief H. W. Beasley, State Police Captain C. A. White, and Sheriff J. Wayne McCormick, Otero County, and charged with the murder of Pete Nalda.

They surrendered without resistance after they had been surrounded in an abandoned house on a lonely mesa about eight miles past Pastura. They had spent the night in the place and built a fire to keep warm.

When they saw the officers, one of the hunted men tried to hide his gun in a niche back of a doorway. The other man was upstairs in the abandoned house but offered no resistance. They came out with their hands in the air. The suspects told officers they had had nothing to eat since Sunday. The men were identified by the police as Esteliano Alonzo, old Mexico, and Luis Campos, Corona.

Assistant District Attorney E. E. Chavez, Las Cruces, told the Lincoln County News-Outlook and the Associated Press on Wednesday Alonzo had pleaded guilty, waived preliminary hearing and bond had been set at \$50,000. Luis Campos pleaded innocent and his bond was also set at \$50,000. The men are being held for district court trial next week.

The area of search for these men was narrowed when an abandoned pickup truck, believed to have been used by the hunted men, was found near Pastura.

## Legion Oratorical Contest To Be Held Tomorrow

The American Legion District 5 oratorical contest will be held on Saturday, February 4, at 10 A. M. in the Carrizozo School Auditorium.

Contestants from high schools in Lincoln and Otero counties will give 10 to 12 minute talks on subjects of their choosing, and dealing with either the Constitution or the Bill of Rights.

The winner will be eligible to compete in the statewide contest, to be held at the Carrizozo High School on March 8 at 11 A. M. The statewide contestants will be conducted on a tour of the Carrizozo Caverns; the winner at Carrizozo will compete in the national contest, which is scheduled in April.

Information concerning the location of the national contest is not available now.

Frank C. Boyce, chairman of District 5 oratorical contest, and L. Z. Manfre, adjutant of the local American Legion Post, extend a cordial invitation to all interested persons.

## Churches Not Soliciting Advertising In Carrizozo

The News-Outlook received a report from Mayor Vernon Petty, Carrizozo, Thursday, advertising was being solicited in Carrizozo allegedly under the sponsorship of the local churches.

The News-Outlook talked with Rev. Jesse Allen, who stated a young woman was offering the local churches five fans which would contain advertisements. Allen said he had conferred with Rev. Harry Webb and learned the latter had heard a slightly different version. Allen said he was willing to accept a donation of fans, but that the church was not soliciting advertisements.

## Ambition Realized In New Carrizozo School Library

At the end of the last school year the faculty of the Carrizozo Elementary School agreed that one of its main objectives beginning with the opening of the 1949-50 session should be to build toward a central library.

The school budget helped toward this goal by providing 100 paper bound volumes for the primary grades. Then the ever faithful PTA took over. This organization put on a rummage and bake sale for the purpose of buying library books and realized from this sale about \$135. By careful selection, 100 books have been purchased with about \$95 of this money. It is anticipated that at least 40 more books may be purchased with the remaining money. Furthermore, the PTA sponsored an American Book Week recently and many interested patrons donated books. There are approximately 250 books in the library at present.

The ability to read is a basic necessity for advancement in school. Most educators agree that reading habits are formed in the lower grades. This is only one reason a library is essential to the Carrizozo Elementary School. A child must have a desire to learn and interesting books create that desire.

To illustrate the interest the elementary children have in their new library, 75 per cent of them have library books checked out. Someone will learn to read if this interest continues.

## Stolen Car Recovered; Drivers Apprehended

Because of the alertness of Lincoln County's sheriff, "Sally" Ortiz, State Patrolman H. Douglas and the Lincoln County Mounted Patrol unit, two drivers of a stolen 1941 Buick sedan were quickly apprehended last week-end.

Participating in the search were state police from Socorro and Alamogordo. The search started, the officials said, when Joe Trujillo, Socorro police officer, noticed the car south of that town and gave chase.

The Lincoln County authorities were alerted and joined in the search. The drivers of the car attempted to wreck Trujillo's car by pulling into his lane of traffic as he overtook them. They eluded Trujillo about three miles east of Bingham, where the wrecked car was found about 100 yards off the highway.

The Lincoln County police apprehended the two as they returned on foot to the highway about two and one-half miles east of Bingham. They were attempting to ditch-hike and had been at large for more than seven hours.

The local authorities stated they were taken to Albuquerque for questioning and named Edwin Lovato as one of the two. The other involved was a 19 year old juvenile. The car belonged to Corporal Ignacio Vileman, Irtland Field. As the paper went to press, it was learned the 19-year-old juvenile had escaped from Albuquerque.

## State 54 Association To Meet In Ancho March 17

Herbert Rags, Alamogordo, state president, Highway 54 Association, has announced an all-day meeting will be held in Ancho on March 17, 1950.

Officers for the coming year will be elected, and the budget will be given consideration.

Rags also pointed out the public is welcome and urged to attend this meeting. Their interest and cooperation towards the completion of Highway 54 is necessary, also.

## Nalda Funeral To Be In Roswell on Saturday

Funeral services for Pierre Nalda will be held Saturday morning, March 4, at 9 o'clock at the Catholic church in Roswell.

The Ballard Funeral Home of that city will be in charge of the services, and interment will be in Roswell.

Mr. Nalda is survived by four brothers, J. P. Nalda, Mexico; Juan of Gardavilla, Nev.; Louis of Carrizozo; Michel of Vaughn; two sisters, Mrs. Grace Larzer, Raza, Nev., and Mrs. Jennie Edwards, Orono, Nev.

## Archbishop Byrne Visits Local Parish

Most Rev. Edwin V. Byrne, archbishop of Santa Fe, will arrive in Carrizozo on Saturday, February 4, at 5:30 P. M. From the Mal Pais a police escort will lead the archbishop, accompanied by Father C. de Baca and the Society of Our Lady of Guadalupe.

The colorful "entrada" will take place near the church. His excellency will be met by the Sisters of St. Casimir and the people of the parish. After the pastoral visitation and benediction he will be the dinner guest of Mr. and Mrs. Nick Vega. In the evening the archbishop will hear confessions at the St. Rita Church. Confessions will be heard on Friday and Saturday evenings.

The archbishop will celebrate the 6 A. M. mass on Sunday. Father Sigmund Charewicz, secretary to the archbishop, will say mass at 7 and Father C. de Baca will celebrate the 8 o'clock mass. The archbishop will preach at the three masses and distribute Holy Communion. For breakfast, Archbishop Byrne will be the guest of Mr. and Mrs. Sabino Vidaurri.

At 9 A. M. the archbishop will confer the Sacrament of Confirmation on the boys and at 10:30 the girls will be confirmed.

At noon Sunday the archbishop will be honored at the new St. Rita School by the building committee, the Society of Our Lady of Guadalupe and their wives. Father de Baca will be the toastmaster. The speakers will be Daniel Chavez, president of the Society of Our Lady of Guadalupe; Vernon Petty, mayor of Carrizozo; Nick Vega, president of the Santa Rita School building committee, and the archbishop.

Sunday evening at 8 o'clock his excellency will continue in Ruidoso, Monday at 9 at Picacho. Holy mass will also be celebrated at Picacho on Monday, March 6, at 8 A. M. Confirmations will be administered at 2 P. M.

At 6 P. M. the archbishop will be the guest of honor at a banquet given by Mr. and Mrs. Manuel Miller at Captain in his honor and the Captain building committee.

At 8 A. M. Tuesday Archbishop Byrne will say mass at the Sisters' Chapel and will confirm in Captain at 8 A. M. and Lincoln at 10 A. M. A dinner will be given in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Gomez. In the afternoon the archbishop will visit the Santa Rita School and return to Santa Fe.

## Local Teachers Believe Federal Aid Imperative

W. K. Myers, president, Carrizozo Teachers Association, announced the local group as going on record in favor of Senate Bill 249 (federal aid to education), an older legislation which may be endorsed by the National Education Association.

He stated the local association's resolution was passed at their regular meeting on February 23.

While some teachers feel that with federal aid might also come federal control of schools, the NEA is definitely asking for federal aid without federal control, or with limited control, and the local faculty confidently expects the national association to fight to the finish for that stipulation. It isn't the feeling of the local faculty that any federal money should be turned over to state and local groups with absolutely no requirements or restrictions; but it is the opinion of the teachers that too much federal control could be harmful.

The bill passed the Senate last May 11 and is now pending in the House committees on education and labor. Any parent or other layman who is interested in securing better schools through federal aid should write to Senator John E. Miles immediately, urging passage of Senate Bill 249.

The secretary of the local teachers association has written to Speaker Sam Rayburn of the House of Representatives, to Majority Leader John W. McCormack of the House of Representatives, to Chairman John Leshinski of the House education and labor committee, and to Congressman John E. Miles urging immediate passage of this bill.

## J. B. and Betty Howell Take Over Dude Ranch

## Victim's Family Describe Crime

The following version of the murder of Pete Nalda as told by Gratien Ernaut, 22-year-old nephew of the slain man, was confirmed for The Lincoln County News-Outlook by his uncles, Louis and Jean Nalda, Ernaut

has recently arrived in the United States from France and does not speak fluent English. He was with Pete Nalda the night the latter was murdered, but managed to escape his attackers and make his way safely to the ranch of his uncle, Mike Nalda.

"Pete Nalda and Gratien Ernaut had retired Sunday night, February 26, when they were awakened about 11:30 by two men. They asked Pete for some gasoline which he supplied, and then Nalda was requested to make them coffee. After the men left the house, they drove about 100 yards and apparently killed the motor of their vehicle. They returned to the house and asked Pete to give them a push. As Nalda came out of the house, he was faced by one of the men with a gun, who demanded that Pete write some checks.

"The three men returned to the house, at which time the nephew was threatened with a knife. Pete was forced to write four checks, using fictitious names, the total of the checks being more than \$1,000.

"The nephew was forced to endorse the checks with the same fictitious names. Nalda and Ernaut were then taken outside by the two men and told to get in a pickup truck, but first tried to force them to take a drink from a bottle they had. When Nalda and Ernaut refused, the men said they were going to kill them. Pete said to his nephew in French their only chance was to break and run, which they did with Ernaut going in one direction and Nalda in another. Gratien was shot at but missed as he zig-zagged as he ran (he had learned that trick through military service).

"Nalda had on house slippers and one of them was found about 60 feet from where he started to run. His body was found later in an arroyo a short distance from the ranch. There was a bruise on his forehead and a hole in the back of his head, which led the relatives to believe he had fallen and perhaps been shot as he lay stunned.

"Subsequently, John Nalda, the son of Mike Nalda, who was returning from Vaughn, discovered the gates open and thought something was wrong since the gates were always kept closed. He went immediately to Pete's home but could find no one there although things were out of place. He felt something had happened as his uncle was always careful to have everything in order when he left on a trip. John went on to his home and told his father how he had found things. They returned but could find no one although all the vehicles owned by Pete were at the ranch.

"They returned to their home, but in the meantime Gratien Ernaut, who had walked and ran some 12 miles, reached his Uncle Mike's home and went directly to his cousin John's room. He did not find him and concluded they relatives had also been killed. He then went to the corral to hide and was there until almost morning when he saw the lights go on and realized the Mike Nalda family had not been murdered. He immediately went to the house and told them what had happened, and Mike Nalda informed the police."

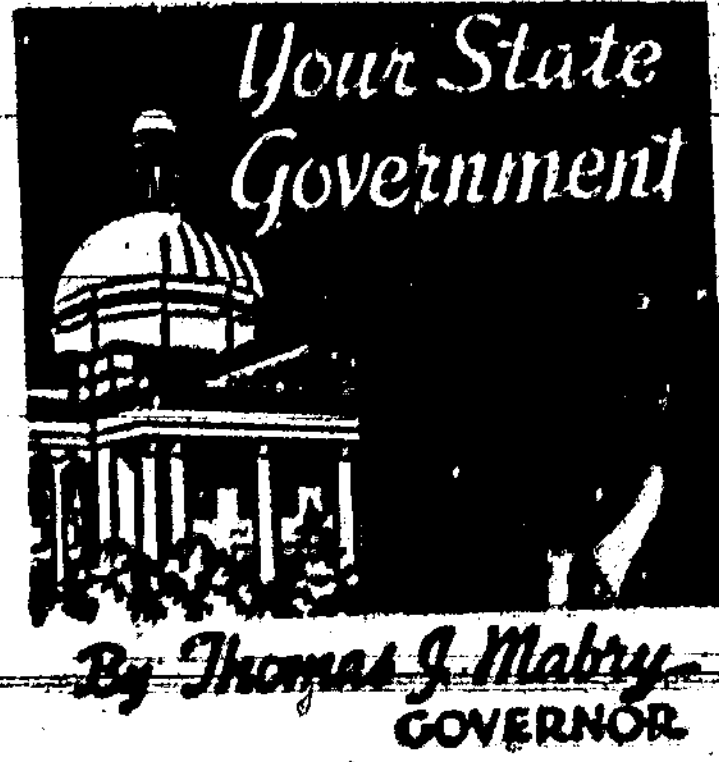

"Force never changed anybody's mind, but education and understanding have won a lot of victories, even though they take longer."—Charles E. Wilson.  
 The educational budget auditor next month will begin his annual tour of the state to make budgets for the various school districts. I have been advised that in past years very few taxpayers have attended these budget hearings although it is their money that is being set up for expenditure during the coming school year.

Perhaps a few facts on government costs at this time would be of interest to taxpayers and might even encourage a larger attendance and greater interest on the part of the individual at these school budget hearings.

Two professors at the University of New Mexico have recently completed and published a study which they have entitled "Patterns of New Mexico State Finance." This study brings out several facts regarding our financial structure. These, in a general way, I have sought to emphasize in previous articles and in previous statements. One of these points is that our government in New Mexico is run economically and that we obtain, on the whole, fair return for our expenditures. The report from the university shows that the per capita cost of government for all the states is \$118.67, compared with only \$78.07 in New Mexico. I believe that is an excellent showing and one that will be appreciated by the taxpayers.

Another finding of these professors demonstrates very clearly another fact that I have pointed out in previous columns, that is the high percentage of our tax money which goes for schools and highways compared with similar expenditures for other states. Their study shows that in New Mexico 29 per cent of all government expenditures went for highways, compared with an average of 18.8 per cent for all of the states; and that 31.4 per cent of all expenditures went for support of our common schools compared with an average of only 21.4 per cent for all other states.

Our expenditures for highways are naturally large in comparison with total expenditures because of our great area and relatively small population, and, because we haven't yet completed our highway system—the survey emphasized that fact also. The people of New Mexico have always been willing that the major portion of their tax money be spent for schools and highways.

School budgets have increased tremendously during the last few years. For the 1941-42 school year, the total budget for public schools was about \$3,500,000. For the present year the total budget for schools has jumped to the tremendous figure of \$30,923,083—an increase of 223 per cent in eight years!

Our state is growing rapidly. There are more children to educate and we are trying to pay our teachers a salary in keeping with their responsibility. New Mexico ranks high among the states in the average salary paid her teachers; we are hopeful that we can do even better.

But we should remember that New Mexico ranks first among all the states in the amount of money allotted our public schools in proportion to the people's ability to pay. I am sure it would be of great interest to all taxpayers to attend the school budget hearings and to learn at first hand how the money is raised for the support of their schools and how this money is spent.

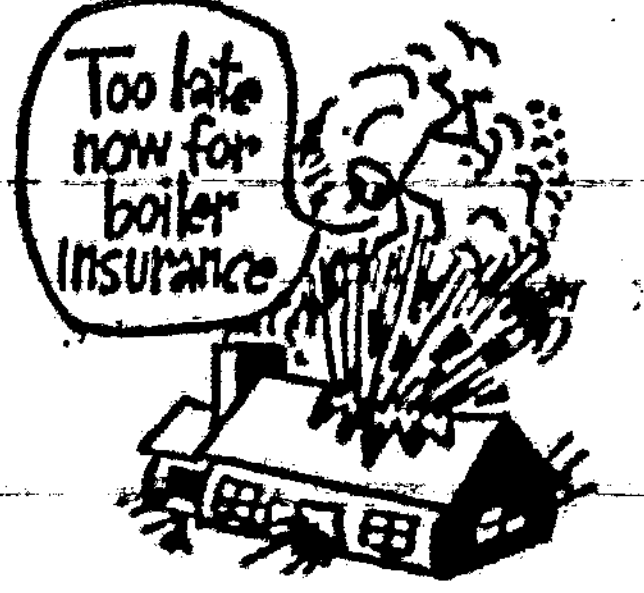

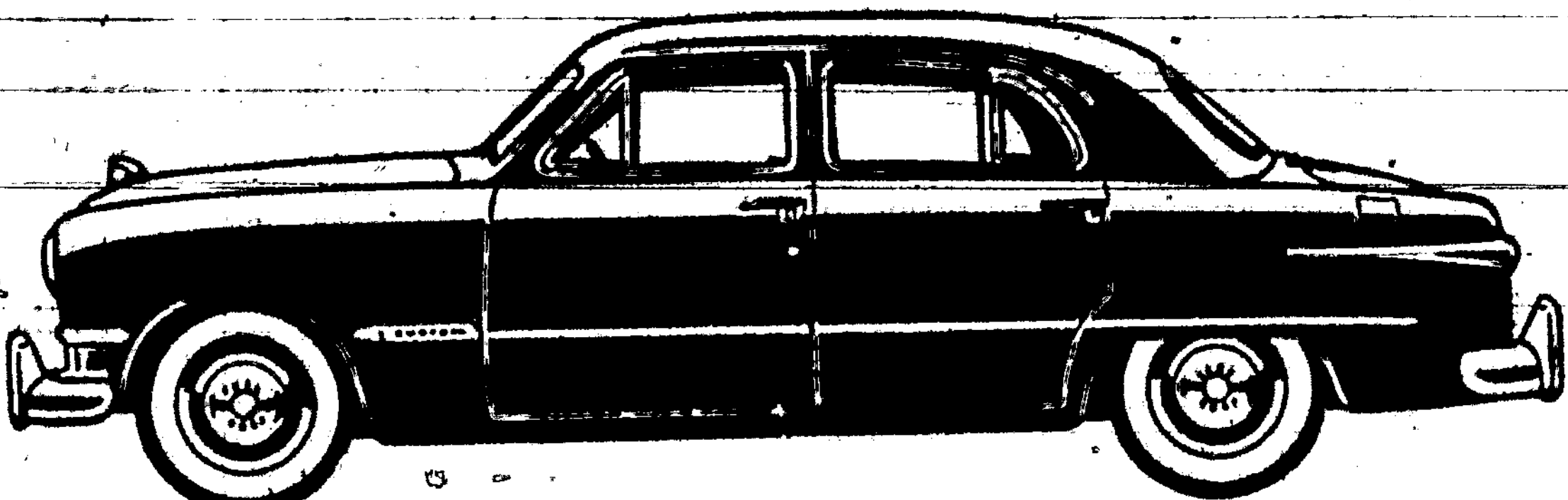
