### Noted Surgeon Ends Service

Thirty-three long years of faithful, medical, surgical and administrative service to his country terminated on March 15 when Medical Director E. M. Townsend retired from the U.S. Publie Health Service.

Dr. Townsend interned at the Lamar City Jiospital, Augusta, Gr. Completing his internship, he "hung up his shingle" in Iliton, Ga., and practiced both medicine and surgery for three years. At Norfolk, Dr. Townsend intraduced a new pre-operative technique by having a more thorough operation area preparation. This accounted for the almost zero number of second-



Ever since the automobile became available to the average wage carner, travel has become a major factor in our economy. The growth of recreational travel has done much to help the prosperity of New Mexico and to help develop our state. It is estimated that tourists spent in New Mexico last year alone \$135,000,000.

Boveral years ago (in 1035) the state itself look action to encourage t larger flow of recreational travel to New Mexico, This was done by means of a national advertising campaign. We all can see the scores of how bushnesses which have grown up along the highways directly to corvice the tourists. The many millions of dollars which our visitors spend have, in one way or another, helped every community and almost every individual.

The growth of this non-resident travel has been consistent over the years. In 1936, about 900,000 non-resident motor vehicles entered the state By 1949, this number had increased to 2,211,000. These vohicles carried nearly 6,000,000 people. The expenditures made by this great host of travolors increased from around \$40,000,000 in 1035 to more than \$135,000,000 for 1049. Tourists pay approximately one-third of our gasoline tax and this way helpfinance our highway construction program Our visitors also holp finance our public schools through their purchases and their payment of the 2 per cent school tak Incidentally, gasoline tax collections, on a 5 cent per gallon basis, have increased from \$3,124,000 in 1933 to \$10,107,523 in 1943 more than 220 per cent. I think this points up better than any one thing, the tromendous growth and volume of this business.
