### Cancer Crusade Support Urged

Cancer, our number two killer, takes a life every three minutes. The great tragedy of this mass murder by bands of outlaw cells that run wild is that one-third of last year's 200,000 cancer deaths may have been spared by early diagnosis or detection.  
Figures for last year indicate that 278,164 persons were treated for the first time for cancer, 879,550 others were living in various stages of the disease, ranging from impending cure to impending death. The Sloan-Kettering Institute, New York, followed up 229,765 cases for five years with no indication of recurrence.

Only knowledge can lick our cancer scourge. It must be remembered that neglected cancer continues to grow and seek new fields to conquer in healthy tissue. Galen, the eminent second century Roman physician, is attributed with giving the disease the Latin name of Crab, or cancer, from a fancied resemblance of the disease to the claws of a crab, as it extends itself into adjacent healthy tissue. Doctors call this process of reaching into healthy tissue, metastasis or "change of place." As you know cancer, are outlaw bands of cells which suddenly increase abnormally on the skin or internally, and produce a useless localized mass or tumor. This mass often breaks up into smaller groups because cancer cells lack the cohesion of normal cells, which makes them stick together. They move about through the colorless body fluid, known as lymph or the blood stream. If not removed they eventually destroy their host by blocking the blood supply to the tissues or by ulcerating the tissues. Degenerative changes of advancing age, chronic inflammatory conditions or repeated injury or irritation can lead to cancer by producing cellular changes, which apparently furnish the soil favoring abnormal cell growth. Advancing age is an important factor—the death curve rises sharply after 45. The declining tissues apparently have less resistance to abnormal growths. Learn to recognize cancer's danger signals—any sore that doesn't heal; a lump or thickening or difficulty in swallowing; persistent hoarseness, cough or any change in normal bowel habits; or you may have none of these symptoms. Above all do not be afraid to learn that you have cancer. One mother left her home and youngsters because she feared she was suffering from cancer. She was sought by the police in 14 states at her husband's request to tell her that she did not have cancer. Regular examination by your own competent physician or at one of the cancer detection clinics dotted over our country, is the only answer and the only way to turn up silent cancer.

Do not patronize miracle healers or cancer quacks that have mushroomed all over, some not as qualified as the lampooned medicine man of the carnival circuit. They are flourishing with their get-rich-quick schemes that are paying off high stakes, far greater than the wildest dreams of our plodding doctors and laboratory men. Whether or not you have cancer, you need the best medical advice that you can find to tell you.  
Research is our greatest weapon against the mounting death rate which, in more than 35 years, has risen 300 per cent for a population that has increased only about 50 per cent. Research requires money—a lot of money, which is why Congress has set aside April as Cancer Control Month. All this month, the American Cancer Society will campaign to raise \$14,500,000, 25 cents of every dollar you contribute pays for nationally planned research projects; 60 cents remains in the local community where it is contributed and 15 cents (Continued on Back Page)

### Carrizozo Residents Visit Clauch Farm Class

Four Carrizozo residents recently attended a GI institutional "on the farm" training class at Clauch. They were L. Z. Manire, Bill Nickels, F. O. Brown and Vernon Petty.  
Plecho, Hondo, Capitlan and Corona are included in this "on the farm" training program, and the GI trainees receive one year's training for each year of service. However, if they are making progress, they are allowed some leeway in the training period.  
Don Chappell is the instructor for the Clauch program, and from the interest evinced by the students and others in the vicinity, it is evident he is a capable one. At the recent meeting it was reported approximately 15 farmers, in addition to the regular class of 25, were on hand because they are so interested in the class discussions.  
The GI trainees attend classes two nights a week, for three hours a night. The discussions include theory as well as the practical aspects of farming.  
Chappell is permitted to instruct only 25 students at one time, and there is a long waiting list for his classes.

### Easter Services To Be Held At Nogal Camp Grounds

Easter sunrise services are to be held at the Nogal Camp Meeting grounds on Nogal Mesa at 5:45 A. M. Easter Sunday. Rev. Ralph Hall of Albuquerque will give the address, and Capitlan choirs under the direction of Mrs. Fred A. Pierce will furnish the music.  
The services will be short, during the portion of the hour when the sun can be seen rising over the Capitlan mountains. Breakfast will be served at the camp from 6:30 to 8 A. M., giving everyone ample time to return to their own churches for the mid-morning services.  
Everyone of all denominations is invited to enjoy this inspiring spectacle, and breakfast with the Lincoln County ranchers and friends.

### Council Considers Safety Measures

Mayor Vernon Petty met with Councilmen R. E. Shafer, C. A. Snow, Leandro Vega and T. E. Kelley on April 4 at 7:30 P. M. Mrs. Gussie Johnson, clerk, read the minutes of the previous meeting, which were approved by the council.  
A letter from the Public Service Commission was introduced. The letter concerned safety measures at the local locker plant, and stated the natural gas burners presently in use were not the proper ones for the type of gas used by the city. The commission recommended proper burners be installed, together with automatic safety controls and proper venting of all gas appliances.

It would appear if these safety precautions were taken there would be no necessity for building a separate smoker room. Council was in accord and Fred Schlarb was authorized to comply with the instructions insofar as he was concerned.  
When all safety measures have been adopted, another inspection will be made by the Public Service Commission.  
A letter from the Public Health Department was read. This department is asking the cooperation of the public in restoring the cut made in the hospital budget. The budget was cut from \$159,000,000 to \$75,000,000.  
The council decided to go on record to wire their congressmen, as a group, as being in favor of restoring this cut to the hospital budget.

Two companies offered to submit bids for laying the city's water pipes, but council is in favor of work being done locally.  
Community Public Service recently inquired regarding whether Carrizozo light plant for sale and submitted rate chart. Council was not in favor of quoting a price to them. The general consensus of opinion appeared to be that if the Community Public Service could buy "cheap juice," it was reasonable to assume the local village could do likewise.  
It was brought out REA has made several separate surveys of the plant recently but no offer has been made. The council was not sure they wanted REA and Snow cited an instance where he felt REA had not been too successful.

**Tourist Bureau Receives 7,000 Vacation Queries**  
New Mexico got its first indication recently that 1950 will be a big year for the tourist trade.  
State Tourist Director Joseph Bursey reported that the number of inquiries received in a single week at his office had reached a record high. During the week, the bureau received 7,000 inquiries from prospective New Mexico vacationers.  
The tourist bureau's information service always has its busiest days in March and April. Bursey said the state's advertising campaign is at its peak.

Mr. Stephens came here from El Paso six years ago, and is round house foreman for the Southern Pacific Railroad, for whom he has been employed 25 years.

**Alamogordo Man Named To Lincoln Commission**

Governor Mabry appointed Hunter to succeed C. W. Morgan, who resigned. The commission administers the Old Lincoln County Courthouse, a state monument.

At the regular meeting of the Lincoln County commissioners on April 3, routine business was the order, and nothing of especial importance was up for consideration.  
Mrs. Shafer, acting for Mrs. Bumgardner, county nurse, turned in the latter's report and requested Roy Shafer be appointed to the County Health Board in place of L. A. WATKINS, who resigned.

The home and complete furnishings of Mr. and Mrs. Ramon Padilla were completely destroyed by fire on Friday, March 31. The cause of the fire has not been determined. However, it was first discovered in the ceiling.  
Mrs. Padilla is a maternity nurse and said she was preparing a dinner tray at 11:30 A. M. for a young mother and her three day old baby who were confined in the front part of the house. Just as she was about to deliver the dinner tray, the mother with her new baby came towards the kitchen to tell her that the house was filling with smoke. Mrs. Padilla dashed to the front room where she had a freshly ironed stack of clothes on a table. A part of the wall fell towards her. Seeing the danger was too great, she went to the telephone to notify the fire department, then took the mother and child to a neighbor's home where she was put to bed.  
Neither mother nor child suffered any ill effects or shock from the incident. The fire had a tremendous start before the fire department received their call and even though the home was gutted and all its contents destroyed, the house next door was saved from the flames.  
The family saved nothing from their home except the clothes they were wearing. However, they are thankful no one was burned or injured.  
Mrs. Padilla was taken to the hospital at Fort Stanton the same night for treatment because of complete exhaustion over the loss of her home.  
Unfortunately, neither the house nor its contents were covered by insurance. Mr. and Mrs. Padilla have expressed their gratitude to the people in Capitan and Fort Stanton for their immediate aid in helping them to a new start.

CORONA—Mayor, G. Cleve Brown (elected on the Peoples ticket. Received 95 votes); councilmen, L. H. Burgess and Santiago Torrez. Burgess drew 84 votes and Torrez 73; city clerk, Mrs. W. A. Mays, elected by a count of 99 votes. A total of 184 votes was cast in Corona. The water bond was defeated 49-23.  
CAPITAN—Mayor, S. E. Griesen (received 89 votes); councilmen (4 year terms), Fred Chavez 93, James R. Province 91; councilmen (2-year terms), Lewis E. Cummins 95, D. O. Murphy 69; (clerk (unopposed), Mary F. Werner, 114 votes.  
CARRIZOZO—Mayor (unopposed) Vernon Petty, 156 votes; councilmen (4-year terms), C. A. Snow 141, Roy E. Shafer 135; clerk (unopposed) Gussie E. Johnson 153 votes. A total of 178 votes was cast in Carrizozo election.  
RUIDOSO—Mayor, Ike N. Wingfield, 189 votes; trustees (4-year terms), Lewis M. Smith 190, Raymond C. Buckner 184; trustee (2-year term), O. A. Luallin 209; clerk, L. F. Dryden 237 votes.  
Total number of votes cast, 398.  
The \$125,000 tax bond for water carried, 107 to 18.

The entire action of the play takes place in the lobby of the "Roarin' Dog" Hotel in Red Canyon, somewhere in the West.  
The first act opens on a discussion of the arrival of the new barber from the East by Dusty Dawson, owner of the hotel, and some of his friends.  
However, when V. Marshall finally makes an appearance, it develops the new barber is a woman. Dusty, a widower, has allowed his hotel, restaurant and barber shop to get seedy and in need of repair.  
Mrs. Marshall, a widow, immediately inaugurates improvements much to the disgust of Seattle Sal, cook and general worker at the hotel. Sal thinks it a waste of time and energy to do so much cleaning. Her friends more or less agree until they realize their boy friends are attracted to the new barber.  
Jim Andrews, also from the East and now living in Red Canyon, is an old friend of Mrs. Marshall. The natives of Red Canyon are inclined to look upon Andrews with suspicion, and openly wonder whether he has had any connection with the stage coach holdups that have occurred.

An amusing by play throughout the scenes is Profane Bill paying fines to Mrs. Marshall for his profanity.  
Cherokee Carrie, his girl friend, is happy in the end, however, when she learns that Mrs. Marshall has been saving this money towards the coming marriage of Carrie and Bill.

**New Mexico Motor Carriers Join In Clothing Drive**

The New Mexico Motor Carriers Association Inc. has joined hands with the state's school children in New Mexico schools' greatest effort to raise clothing, according to Charles L. Rose, state superintendent of public instruction and state chairman of the Ninth National National Children's Clothing Crusade.

An estimated 125,000 New Mexico school children will bring bundles of good used clothing to school during Bundle Week, April 16-22.

The carriers' association will pick up the clothing at all city and town schools and transport it without charge to El Paso, Texas, Lordsburg, N. M., and Flagstaff, Ariz., where it will be shipped to clothing centers of Save The Children Federation for sorting and reconditioning for distribution.

Charles H. Washam, manager of the association, today urged generous public support of the New Mexico school children's service project and added, "The members of our association are very happy to take part in this great humanitarian cause."

Save The Children Federation as part of its child service program, distributes clothing in devastated war areas of Italy, Austria, Holland, France, Greece, Finland, West Germany; on the Navajo reservation and in handicapped rural areas of the South.

Leland D. Carmack, regional director of Save The Children Federation, today stated, "We look upon the voluntary action of New Mexico schools and the New Mexico Motor Carriers Association Inc. in collecting and transporting the clothing as a splendid example of American democracy in action to aid the needy."

Superintendent Rose reported that schools daily were sending in participation cards for the drive and added "We hope this year that every single school in New Mexico takes part in the Children's Clothing Crusade." Last year over 90 per cent of New Mexico schools participated in the drive which raised 66,000 pounds of clothing.

L. Z. Manire, superintendent of Carrizozo schools, stated all clothing contributions may be sent to the local high school where arrangements will be made for delivery.

**CHURCHMEN WANT ENFORCED BENEVOLENCE**

A politico-economic credo which should be disturbing to all straight thinking Americans has been adopted by a group of prominent Protestant churchmen assembled in Detroit under the sponsorship of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America. The Associated Press reports the churchmen voted to recommend to the public "the extensive use of taxation to reduce inequalities in income." This advocacy is contrary to the fundamental principles of the American way of life and our historic American concept of taxation.

Taxation in America was conceived as a fair and sound method of financing government—and for no other purpose. But Socialists long ago found it to be their handiest instrument for achieving abolition of private property and subjugation of a people. The book "Elements of Socialism," by Spargo and Arner (MacMillan) says (p. 352): "Taxation is of course a form of confiscation, but we have long been accustomed to it, and it makes it possible for the process of confiscation to be stretched over such a long period of time as to make it easy and almost unnoticeable."

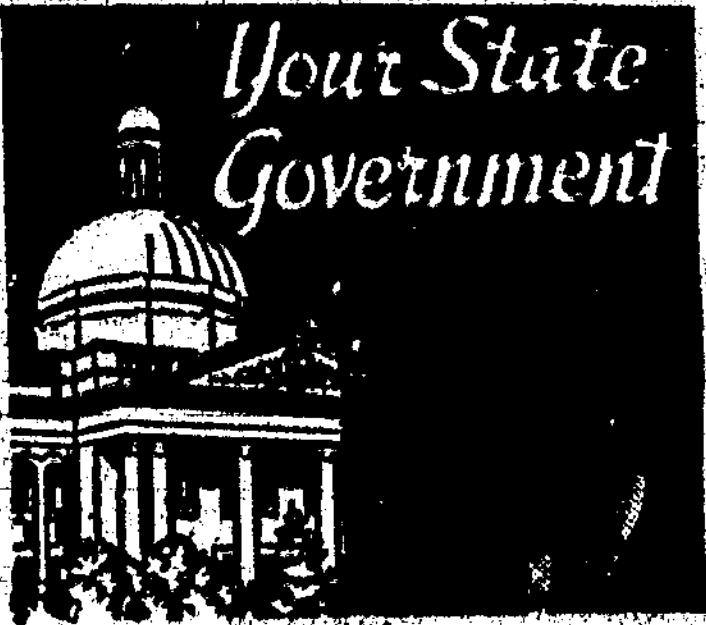
When it is understood that delegates to the Detroit convocation came from 30 states and represented the leading 22 Protestant denominations and 10 allied religious bodies, the economic principle advocated becomes one of the most significant formal actions taken by an American ecclesiastical body since the founding of religious freedom on these shores more than 400 years ago. It moreover serves to emphasize how far astray intelligent, well meaning people may be led.

**Karl Marx Wrote It**

It would be ridiculous to assume that any substantial number of these leading American churchmen who attended the Detroit meeting are Marxist Socialists. No doubt some few of the delegates are avowed Socialists and a few are fellow travelers in some of their thinking; but most of them undoubtedly are 100 per cent loyal Americans dedicated to the fundamental principles of the American system and staunchly opposed to Marxist Socialism or any other brand.

However, their economic credo adopted at Detroit comes straight from Karl Marx. I have on my desk a copy of the "Communist Manifesto," by Marx and Engels. Point 2 of the Marx's 10 basic measures for establishing communism says: "A heavy progressive or graduated income tax." Marx and all of his succeeding camp-followers have written the Socialist economic credo thus: "The ideal to be aimed at is approximate equality of income." Some Marxist writers state it classically: "From each according to his ability, to each according to his need."

**Taxes For Government Expense**  
The taxing principle now advocated by this important group of church leaders in America could

As we look about us and see the financial and other serious problems facing our neighboring states of the Southwest and Rocky Mountain region, I think we should take courage from the picture of economy and progress our own state presents—and we ought to be excused if we brag a little in New Mexico.

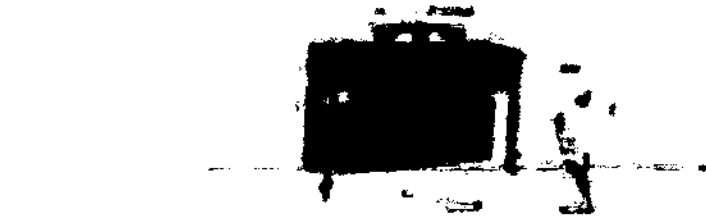

health, public welfare, highway construction and particularly in common school education.

The picture recently presented by the economic and tax survey conducted by university experts shows that while the over all cost of government in all states averages \$118.67 per person that New Mexico gets by with a cost of only \$78.07 per person.

But because this economic picture may thus look good for New Mexico in comparison with other states it does not mean that we should cease our effort to cut cost of government from the local to the highest state level.

I feel that we have some overlapping and duplicating services in the state which, by a change in the law, can result in further saving in government costs.

Let's find out if there be other places we can still further economize. And, now as always, I solicit the support and suggestions of the taxpayer in my endeavor to achieve these further economies. And my successor in office and the next legislature will likewise need and desire your help just as much.

Without appearing to be bragging too much on our state progress in this connection let's notice briefly what this sparsely settled state of 121,686 square miles has to offer the homemaker, the citizen, the taxpayer and the industrialist, wanting to get away from the congested centers of the East.

We have more than 8,000 miles of improved highways of which 5,150 miles are paved. We have seven institutions of higher learning with a total enrollment of 10,500 students, housed in plants which cost more than \$18,000,000. We have some 1,000 public school buildings and 5,500 school teachers, of high qualifications. We have a low property tax rate.

We have 74,000,000 acres of grazing land, including more than 13,000,000 acres of wooded lands, some 3,000,000 acres of cultivated lands, of which more than 400,000 acres are under irrigation.

We have several producing oil fields, great reserves of gas which can be used for industrial development, vast amounts of copper ore, coal and potash and many other minerals.

Best of all, perhaps, we have the finest climate on earth and a hospitable, friendly, tolerant people of three racial backgrounds who live and work together in harmony and understanding. Let's keep New Mexico moving forward!

pay for all media of professional and public education in cancer control, as well as administrative, statistical and consultative services.

Of the estimated \$14,000,000 collected during April of 1949 campaign \$180,233 went for fellowships in 12 states; \$1,717,342 for grants-in-aid in 32 states; and \$1,491,700 for institutional research grants in 18 states.

The American Cancer Society has charge of the Babe Ruth Cancer Fund, which provided \$107,500 during 1948-49 for cancer research in four states. The society cooperates with, but does not control the Damon Runyon Memorial Fund and two federal projects, the National Cancer Institute and the Atomic Energy Commission.

The American Cancer Society is the only voluntary health agency devoted exclusively to cancer control. It was formed in 1913 when an interested group met in the New York home of Dr. Clement Cleveland. The first public subscription was \$10,000 raised largely through the efforts of his daughter, Mrs. Robert G. Mead. It took a great deal of courage to breathe life into an organization that nobody else believed in, even many doctors didn't believe in, even many doctors didn't believe that cancer could be controlled. The disease was very hush-hush and considered a disgrace and approached in fear, shame and ignorance, which offered a wedge for

quacks. To write such an article as this one was considered daring just a few years ago in 1913. This society continued its useful work and in 1937 Congress established the National Cancer Institute, Bethesda, Md. By 1949 Alaska and Puerto Rico were added to its 49 divisions, a grant-in-aid program was begun and a total of 240 cancer detection clinics and 434 clinics were in operation.

Last year the National Cancer Institute received over \$25,000,000 in appropriations, of which \$13,533,000 was allotted to 23 states for buildings, labs, etc.; \$3,020,652 in grants-in-aid in 32 states and approximately 150 fellowships averaging another half million.

Recently the World Health Organization revealed that radioactive gold was flown 3,500 miles to aid a Colombian woman suffering from cancer. The Oak Ridge, Tenn., atomic energy plant hopes that its cancer research center "will be one to which a large number of patients can be sent from various institutions throughout the southeast for treatment that they cannot get in their local areas." Of course, the success of the radioactive iodine isotope in the treatment of thyroid cancer is well known. Radioactive cobalt has been found to be of value in the external treatment of cancer and spurs from 500 to 1,000 times less than radium. Medical men aren't showing their enthusiasm until these cured or arrested cases are followed for a number of years.

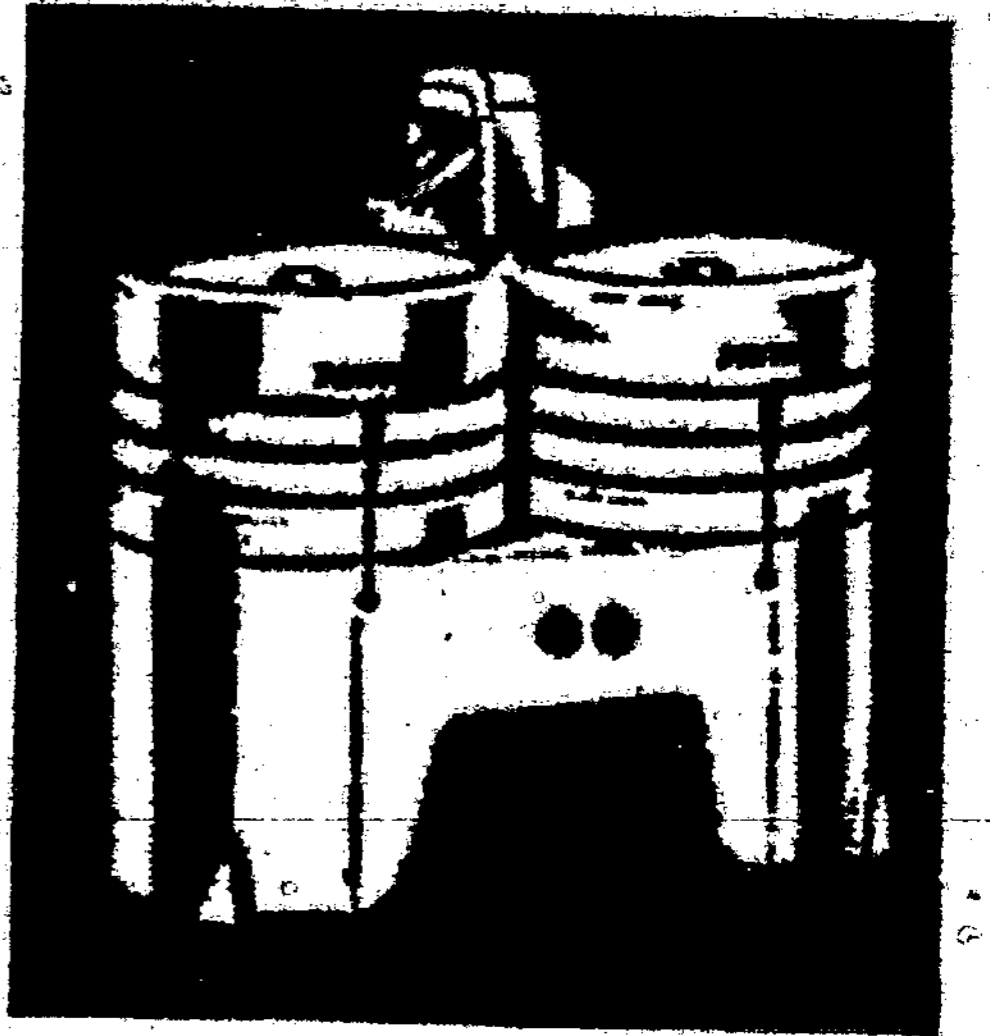
