He added a large percentage of their recent patients have been from the Glanuch and Corona areas.

The drilling of the well at the hospital has been temporarily postponed because of an accident suffered by George Perry, who was in charge. Mr. Perry is in the hospital at Fort Stanton as the result of injuries suffered in a recent automobile accident. 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## Navy Reports Unidentified Sub Off California Coast

The Navy reported recently that one of its planes and a fishing vessel independently sighted an unidentified submarine off the northern California coast.

The submarine was seen by the Navy plane and the fishing boat 12 hours apart, but in the same general vicinity.

The Navy plane sighted the periscope of the undersea craft about 40 miles off Cape Mendocino. The fishing boat saw the sub about four miles south of Blunt Reef Light, close inshore.

quince, To write such an article as this one was considered daring just a few years ago in 1913. This society continued its useful work and in 1937 Congress established the National Cancer Institute, Bethesda, Md. By 1949 Alaska and Puerto Rico were added to its 59 divisions, a grant-in-aid program was begun and a total of 240 cancer detection clinics and 434 clinics were in operation.

Last year the National Cancer Institute received over \$25,000,000 in appropriations, of which \$13,553,000 was allotted to 23 states for building, lab., etc.; \$3,020,032 in grants-in-aid in 30 states and approximately 150 fellowships averaging another half million.

Recently the World Health Organization revealed that radioactive gold was flown 3,500 miles to aid a Colombian woman suffering from cancer. The Oak Ridge, Tenn., atomic energy plant hopes that its cancer research center "will be one to which a large number of patients can be sent from various institutions throughout the southeast for treatment that they cannot get in their local areas." Of course, the success of the radioactive iodine isotopes in the treatment of thyroid cancer is well known. Radioactive cobalt has been found to be of value in the external treatment of cancer and costs from 500 to 1,000 times less than radium. Medical men aren't showing their enthusiasm until these cured or arrested cases are followed for a number of years.

pays for all media of professional and public education in cancer control, as well as administrative, statistical and consultative services. Of the estimated \$24,000,000 collected during April of 1949 campaign \$180,333 went for fellowships in 12 states; \$1,717,343 for grants-in-aid in 32 states; and \$1,491,700 for institutional research grants in 18 states.

The American Cancer Society has charge of the Babe Ruth Cancer Fund, which provided \$107,500 during 1948-49 for cancer research in four states. The society cooperates with, but does not control, the Damon Runyon Memorial Fund and two federal projects, the National Cancer Institute and the Atomic Energy Commission.

The American Cancer Society is the only voluntary health agency devoted exclusively to cancer control. It was formed in 1913 when an interested group met in the New York home of Dr. Clement Cleveland. The first public subscription was \$10,000 raised largely through the efforts of his daughter, Mrs. Robert G. Mead. It took a great deal of courage to breathe life into an organization that nobody else believed in, even many doctors didn't believe that cancer could be controlled. The disease was very hushed and considered a disgrace and approached in fear, shame and ignorance, which offered a wedge for

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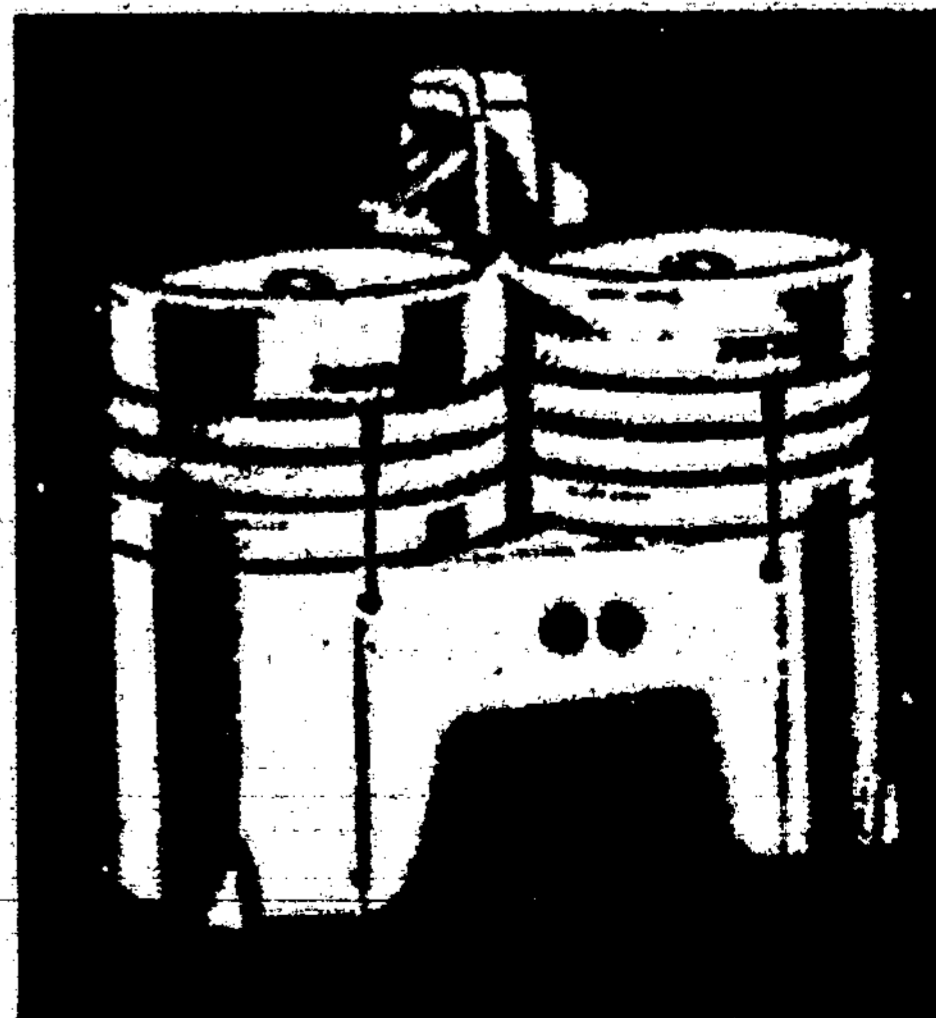

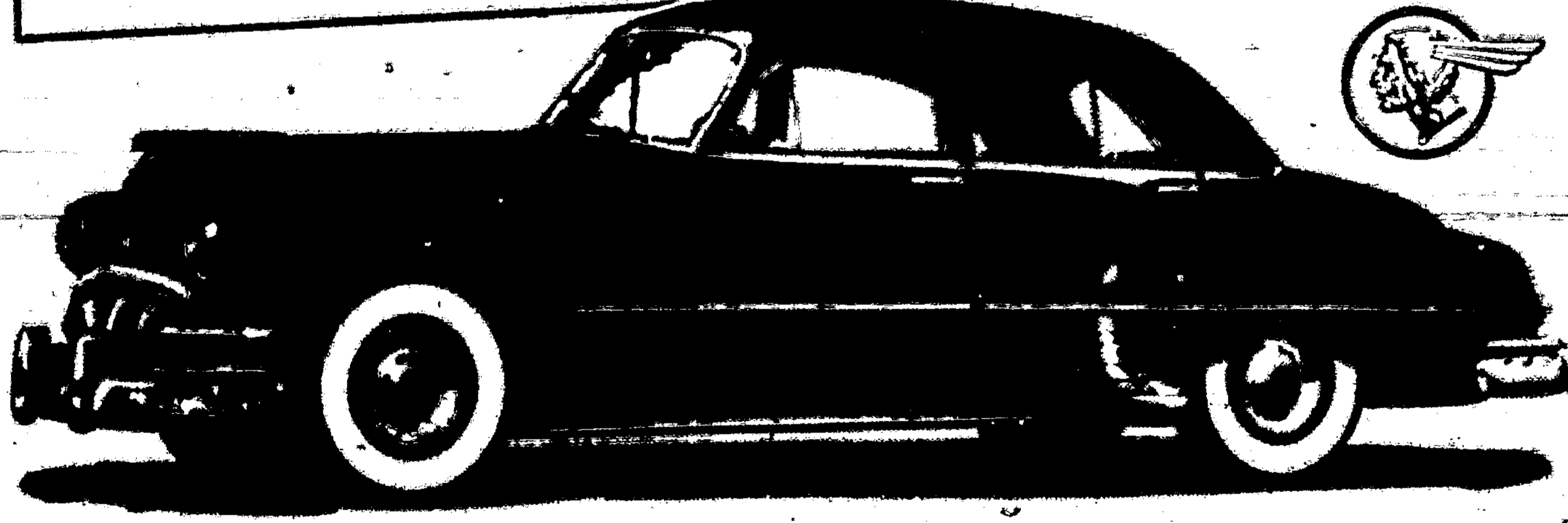

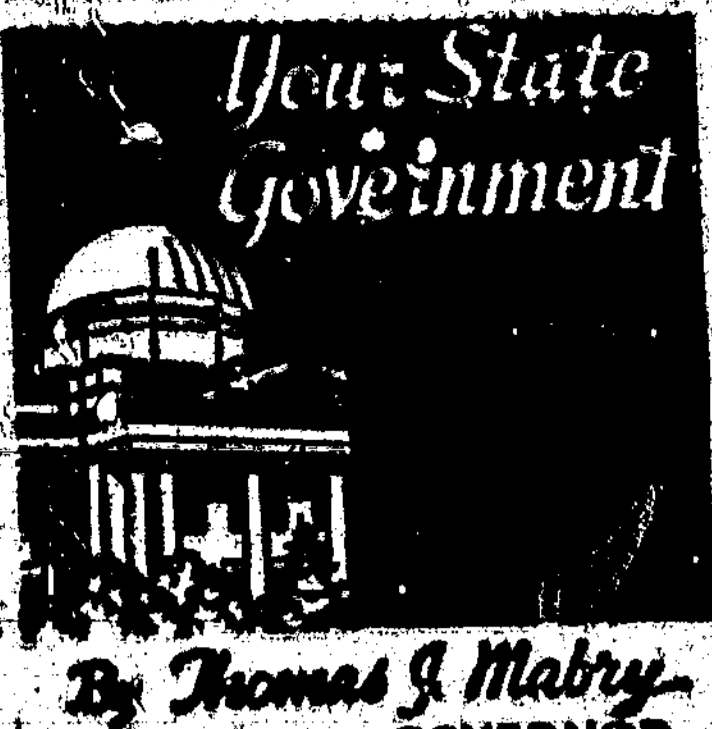

"The less men think the more they talk. One of the hard things about business is minding your own." New Mexico is to have one of the beautiful state capitols of the nation—and we are getting it without the levying of a single dollar of tax or issuing one bond. We are paying for it as we build and spending only what we have on hand from savings. The building and remodeling program is proceeding rapidly. The new office building which went under construction last fall is a little ahead of schedule. By the joint remodeling and new addition plan, we are going to have a new state capitol at a cost of less than three million dollars and with a replacement value of around \$7,000,000.

When the building program is completed, it will be possible then to consolidate the state offices in one central location. At the present time, offices of various departments are scattered all over the city. The departments that have to rent space outside the Capitol pay thousands annually. This will now be saved. The new building will be a beautiful structure, in territorial style architecture. It will blend with the Supreme Court and the Welfare Buildings which were constructed some years ago.

We will begin this summer the second phase of the capitol building and remodeling program. This next step calls for an addition to the old Capitol. When that phase is completed, it will leave only the remodeling of the original Capitol and the two annexes to complete the plan. The remodeling will also be in territorial architecture. The work that is now being carried on, and that which will be done later, will all be financed out of savings without levying any additional taxes or issuing bonds. I believe every taxpayer will appreciate that we obtained all these buildings through savings. We were also fortunate in getting a contract for the first unit for \$100,000 under the architect's estimate.

Many states may not build their state capitol or make improvements without levying taxes or issuing bonds. We will have one of the most beautiful capitols in the nation and it will be completed with a present outlay of some three million, or less, without resorting to either method, without going into debt a dollar, or without paying one penny in interest charges. To quote from a recent article in the Santa Fe New Mexican:

"As in the first phase of the improvement program, the work now coming up for contract will be paid for with savings accumulated by state offices . . . 'If that pendulum will just keep on swinging the same way a little longer New Mexico will have a worthy capitol that all the state will be proud of and nobody will pay an extra dime in taxes for its construction.' Just to show how much it means to erect a new capitol office building from savings rather than from the proceeds of bonds: the debt of \$250,000 incurred to erect the present capitol annex in 1922 was paid off only this year. In fact, the state has paid more in interest than the principal sum amounted to."

Incidentally, New Mexico has one of the lowest tax rates in the nation—20 mills on the dollar, for general purposes. I would advise keeping this low rate (which is now fixed by the Constitution) however hard up we may get for money at times.

If this tax limitation is ever removed, I fear there will be a desire on the part of institutions and departments to want more money than we can afford. Economy works best when the revenue available for expenditure is limited—and even hard to get.

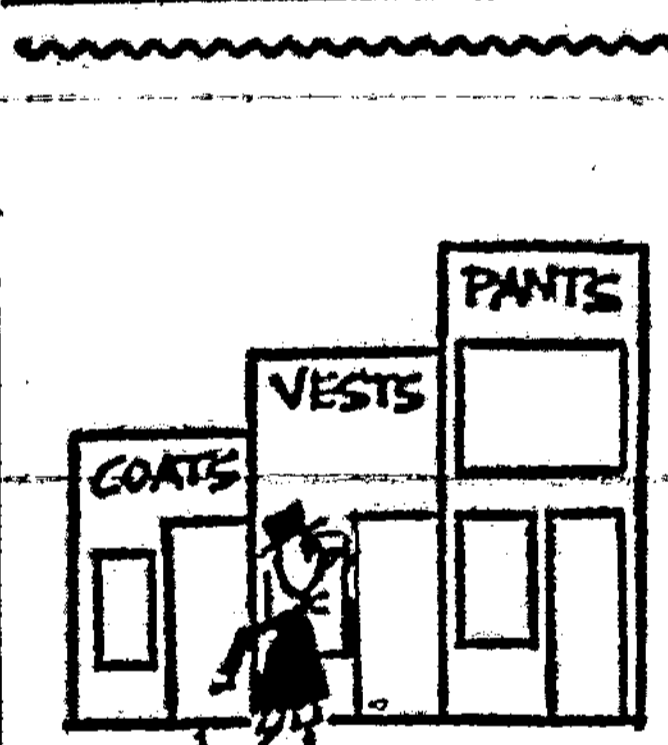

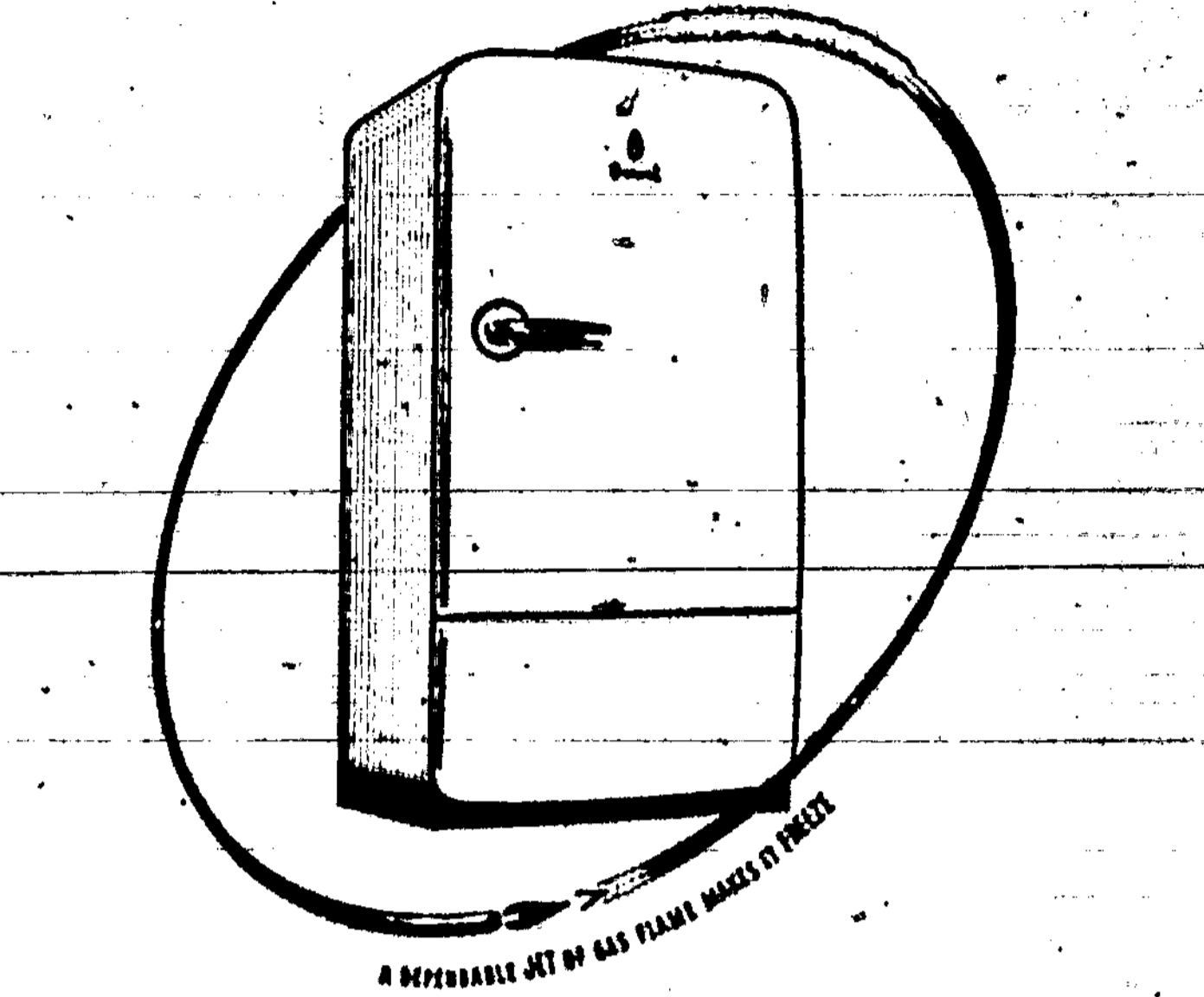

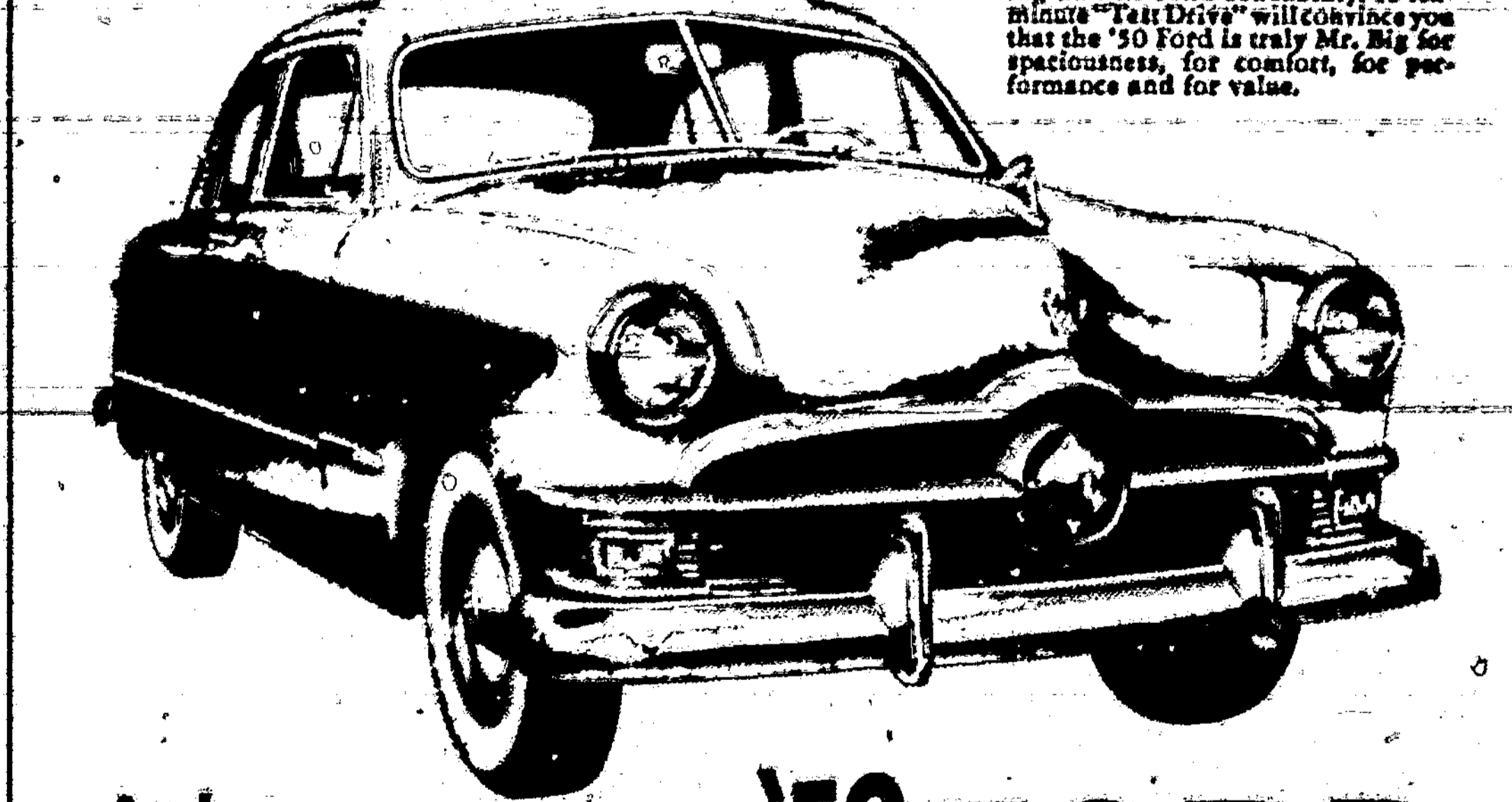

Tells Of Early Days In Alaska

On Monday of last week, Mr. and Mrs. Eric Ness, who have been visiting their son, Carl and family, Captain, started the return journey to their home in Petersburg, Alaska. They plan to make several stops along the way, including Oakland, Calif., and Seattle, Wash., where they will visit with relatives.

Mr. Ness moved to Alaska a number of years ago and has observed the remarkable progress made by its citizens since that time. He came to the United States from Molde, Norway, in 1895 at the age of 18, and settled in Bayfield, Wis. He returned to Norway in 1901 where he remained until 1903, when he returned to Bayfield. He engaged in the fishing business there until 1906 when he moved to Alaska.

On the steamer returning from Norway in 1903, he had met a Swedish girl, Agnes Anderson, who was traveling to New York. Mr. Ness went to Minnesota in 1909 where he and Miss Anderson were married. They returned to Alaska to make their home. To them were born a daughter, Hagga, and two sons, Leo and Carl.

Agnes Ness passed away in 1925. The daughter, who now lives in Seattle, did not change her name with marriage. Her husband's name is Ness also, although the families are not related. Leo Ness resides in Petersburg, Alaska, while the other son, Carl, makes his home in Captain, N. M.

In 1933, Eric Ness was united in marriage with Anne Fosse, also of Norway and a resident of Petersburg since 1916.

When Ness first arrived, Petersburg had 200 population, with about six families of the Caucasian race. There were two small grocery stores and a salmon cannery. Halibut fishing had been a big industry. Fishermen from Seattle went to Petersburg in the fall to take advantage of the protected waters there in which to fish until spring.

In these waters could always be found herring for bait. Barges were anchored in the vicinity, and the fish were unloaded from the calling boats to the barges. The fishermen ground ice obtained from the nearby glaciers and packed the fish in it. The boxes of fish were then picked up from the barges by the steamer. Some of the glaciers are no longer active and remain stationary until they gradually melt away.

Near Juneau there is a road that leads to within a short distance of the glaciers in front of which is a lake.

As cold storage for fish has been developed, a large industry has grown up and there are two cold storage plants in Petersburg. Between the two

plants, an average of 3,000,000 fish is purchased yearly.

There are three shellfish and four salmon canneries. Last year 250,000 cases of salmon were packed.

Mr. Ness spent his first two years in Alaska fishing for halibut and salmon. For the next eight years, he operated a logging camp. He next purchased a small general store that was eventually to become the largest store in town (now known as The Trading Union). After two years of operation by Ness, the store was destroyed by fire. It was subsequently reorganized, with Ness as one of the stockholders. They recently completed a modern steel and concrete building to house the store at an approximate cost of \$200,000. The store handles all kinds of merchandise, and last year did a \$400,000 volume of business.

In 1920, Ness started a shellfish cannery which he operated four years, as well as buying fish for shipment to Seattle. He also operated a herring saltery for about five years. Ness last engaged actively in the fishing business in 1933. He had been selling general insurance as a sideline up until that time, but in 1933 he began to devote full time to this work.

Ness was elected mayor of Petersburg in 1918, and served that year and part of 1919. He has also served for a number of years on the City Council as well as the school board.

Petersburg has a number of lodges, including the Masons, Elks, Moose, American Legion, Sons of Norway and their auxiliaries. The population of the town is now about 1,600. Churches include the Catholic, Presbyterian and the new Lutheran one which was built about two years ago. The Salvation Army has a hall there also.

Ness reports there is very little labor trouble in Petersburg. He also states the people in Alaska have a high rate of literacy. He believes this is due to the extensive reading done by the citizens.

During the long winters when their work hours are short, they have considerable leisure time

which is devoted to reading, according to Ness. He added the average winter temperature at Petersburg was two below zero, since the Japanese currents make it a moderate climate.

Alaska's territorial governor and federal judges are appointed by the President of the United States. There are four judicial districts which are under the jurisdiction of the United States government, and four district judges. Each district has a marshal who is under U. S. federal jurisdiction, as well as the district attorneys and the justices of the peace. The justice of the peace in Petersburg is paid on a commission basis but is given an office free of charge.

Ness related there were only shacks in Petersburg when he first arrived, and it was not until 1908 the first real homes were built and the town's development started. There was no city water system prior to 1914, and their electric plant was not secured until 1916.

Ness thinks his most thrilling experience was one that occurred shortly after he went to Alaska. One night, during a fishing expedition when their sailing schooner was anchored near

Tuberculosis Association Convenes In Duke City

Final plans for the annual meeting of the New Mexico Tuberculosis Association to be held in Albuquerque April 14 and 15, with the Alvarado Hotel as headquarters, were announced by Miss Myrtle Greenfield, president of the association.

The state. Matters relating to the control of tuberculosis will be discussed by authorities in the field of health and welfare.

The meeting will be climaxed with a banquet and reception Saturday evening at which U. S. Senator Clinton P. Anderson will be the principal speaker and honored guest. Senator Anderson was executive secretary of the New Mexico Health Association in 1919. The New Mexico Health Association later became the present Tuberculosis Association.

New Mexico Writer's Book One of 50 Best

A book, "The Journey of Fray Marcos de Niza," by the late Cleve Hallenbeck of Roswell, has been awarded a place in the American Institute of Graphic Arts Exhibit of "Fifty Books of the Year." Announcement comes this week from New York City where the collection is being exhibited at the New York Public Library. Inclusion in "Fifty Books" is an accolade highly prized by publishers and book manufacturers.

"The Journey of Fray Marcos de Niza" was published by Southern Methodist University Press in Dallas and was designed and printed by Carl Hertzog of El Paso, a book designer who has gained much prominence in recent years.

Hallenbeck was in charge of the U. S. Weather Bureau's work in southeastern New Mexico for many years. He lived in Roswell from 1915 until his death in February, 1949.

Well known in his profession, he contributed many articles to national scientific publications, and was a Fellow in the American Meteorological Society. He was the author of several books on the Spanish period in southwestern history before writing "The Journey of Fray Marcos de Niza."

One of the factors which determined AIGA's selection of "The Journey of Fray Marcos de Niza" was the outstanding craftsmanship shown in its manufacture. The type face, medieval feeling, is appropriate for the book which is an account of exploration in the sixteenth century. The parchment colored paper is reminiscent of old Spanish documents, and the cloth used for the binding is deep brown, similar in color to the habits of Franciscan monks, the order to which Fray Marcos belonged.

The style of the early Spanish period is further carried out by the book's illustrations and maps by Jose Cisneros, a young Spanish artist of El Paso.

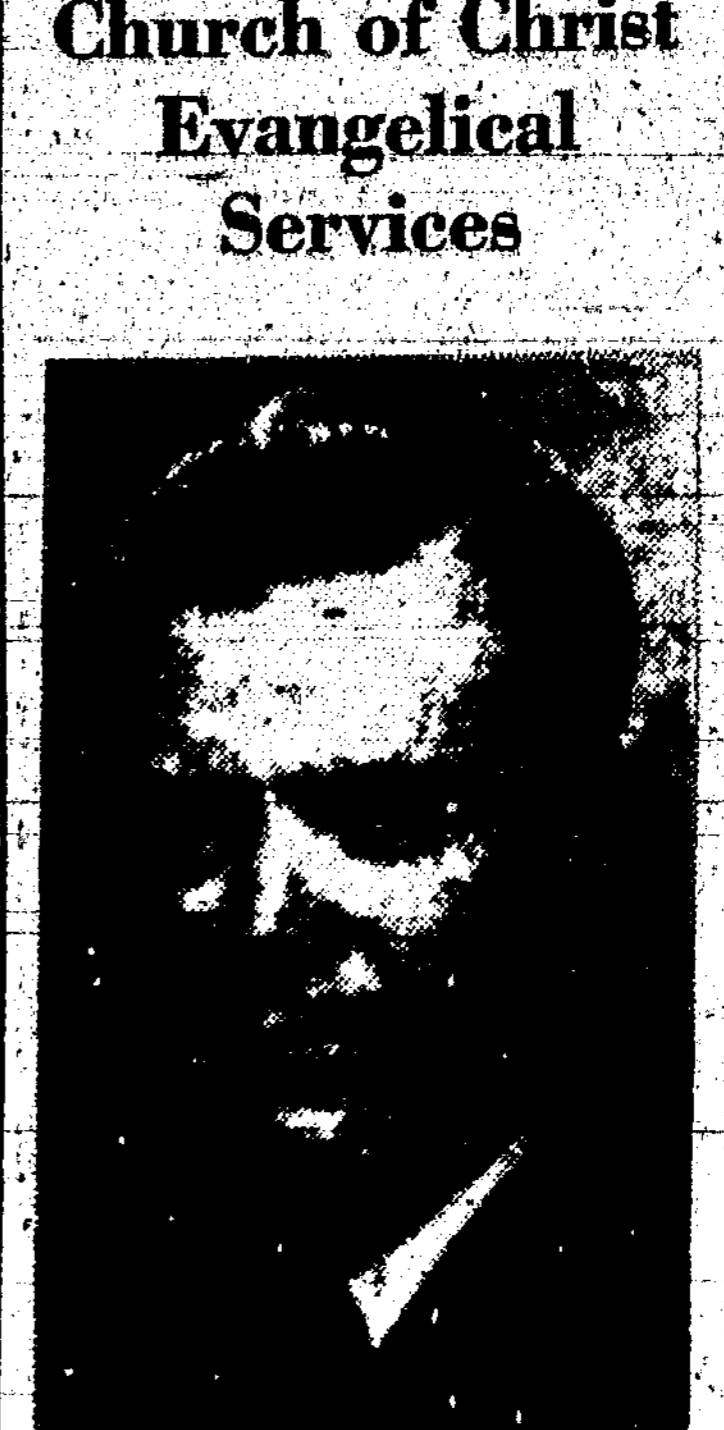
