Store Robbery Suspect Held

Joseph Fred Starnes, 38, transient, was apprehended on suspicion May 22 about 8 A. M. in connection with the breaking and entering of Vega's Feed Store, Carrizozo, during the early morning hours on Monday.

The break in was reported to Sheriff S. M. Ortiz about 7 A. M. by Vega, who estimated his loss at about \$75. Ortiz said Starnes at first denied participation in the robbery. After a day and a half of questioning, the officers said he admitted it and offered to show them where the articles were.

Ortiz said it took about a half day to recover the loot which was buried on the prairie about five miles north of town. The recovered merchandise has been returned to its owner.

Starnes is scheduled to appear in district court May 29 to answer charges of breaking and entering in the nighttime, which charges carry a maximum penalty of three years.

The sheriff's office reports Starnes admits the charges and told them he will enter a plea of guilty. They also report Starnes has admitted being wanted in Nevada for armed robbery, robbery, forgery and car theft.

New 4-H Camp To Open Sunday

The new \$30,000 4-H Club in Scott-Able Canyon, Sacramento Mountains, will open officially Sunday, May 28. A large crowd is expected to attend the ceremonies. The route will be posted with markers for the convenience of the public.

The camp will serve 4-H clubs from 13 southern New Mexico counties, including Lincoln, and has facilities for 216 persons during each camping period. It includes a large mess hall, six barracks and a bath house.

"What I See in the Future for Scott-Able Camp," by G. L. Boykin, acting director, New Mexico Extension Service.

Special music by Beverly and Dallas Clark. Lea County, will precede the dedication ceremony and presentation of the camp by Mrs. Leroy Evans, Las Cruces, president Southern New Mexico 4-H Club Foundation.

The 4-H club members attend the camp as a reward for completing their projects and records, and to further their education. Eddy County 4-H Clubs have drawn the first camping period, to start immediately after the dedication.

It will be recalled Lincoln County raised \$1,000 toward the construction of the Scott-Able Camp.

Lyman Strickland, Corona, is on the committee in charge of the foundation.

Rex Werner Assigned To Local Conservation Work

The New Mexico Soil Conservation Service announces the appointment of Rex B. Werner to the Carrizozo Soil Conservation District, to work with the supervisors of the district.

Werner is a New Mexico native, and grew up around Ruidoso and Capitan. He is a graduate of New Mexico Agricultural College where he specialized in range management. Werner will move his family to Carrizozo as soon as suitable quarters can be found.

The appointment of Werner enables Tom Utterback, Capitan, to again devote full time to the Upper Hondo Soil Conservation District, with headquarters in Capitan. Utterback has been giving part time to the Carrizozo district since January 1, when Ernest Wellington, who had been in charge, left on an educational leave of absence.

The New Mexico Soil Conservation Service commends Utterback for the fine work he has done in serving these two large districts until a replacement could be found for Mr. Wellington.

The service is also announcing the personnel of the Carrizozo, Upper Hondo and Otero Soil Conservation districts are now administratively responsible to work group headquarters in Alamogordo. James G. Wayne, work group conservationist, is in charge of the Alamogordo headquarters office.

This move was designed as an economy measure on the part of the soil conservation service as it unites the work groups of Carrizozo and Alamogordo. It is their thought that in addition to more economical administration of the programs in the three districts, the new setup will afford an opportunity for more and better service to the districts.

Do We Remember?

Did you say, "I did you think that the crash of guns, the rattle and crackle of small arms, the deadly thudding of grenades, the swish of iridescent water against the sides of blacked out ships, the scream of dive bombers, the shrill insistence of boatwain whistles, the trilling whirr of rockets, the blunt crash of bombs, the shrieks of dying men, are all in the past?"

Most folks think that those days are layered over with the press of current events and the pressure of day to day living in peace and what goes for security these days.

Yes, most folks think the hell and horror of war is over. Most people are glad that the stink and the mud and the terror is all part of history now.

But it isn't—not at all.

THOSE THINGS live today almost as fresh and terribly terrifying as they were five, six or seven years ago. Those things happen again every night and tear the soul with as cruel slashes as they did on the beaches of a thousand islands, in the hedgerows, mountain passes and deserts of the fronts all around the globe.

The hurt and the memory of the hurt still lingers. In the minds of the men whose bodies and minds were torn in the holocaust the recollection never grows dim.

Those thousands who have spent every day since then in hospitals have had to live with it. They have not had the grace and goodness of civilian life to spread a thin veneer of insulation over scars and burns of those days.

OH, I KNOW HOW easy it is to forget things which are painful to remember—unless such have been branded so deeply that conscious thought is never free from the ugly recollection.

Thus it comes as a shock, a hurting shock, that more than fifty two thousand disabled American veterans have been in the hospitals for an entire year without a single visitor.

The gray walls, the gray corridors, the gray bathrobes, the gray ceilings and the gray faces of the patients in the veteran's hospitals are so easy to forget. So easy to put out of mind in the rush and color and goodness of life in these United States.

But we must not forget. We must not forget so soon. We promised a lot of things that we wouldn't forget them. Now it is time to pay the debt—and it is a real debt.

IT IS THE TIME NOW when the veteran who has been awarded a compensation payment under the law is looked upon as a tax liability and moves under way in both houses of congress to effect some economies in this part of governmental expense.

This, too, is further evidence that we are forgetting.

Good to realize is the fact that the Disabled American Veterans (the DAV) are organized in order to help each other. No other program or project is on their agenda. The idealism of the organization is not left to walk on clouds. It is practical and hard headed in its approach to the problems of the disabled veteran. Of course there are some mistakes made, but they are few and hundreds of worthy, needy, and honest veterans are honestly helped.

So it behooves us who are fortunate to remember—to remember that the war isn't over—that it won't be over—that it comes back again and again and again, into the lives of those it hurt in body and mind.

Fifty two thousand completely forgotten disabled American veterans are a national disgrace. Add to that figure those other hundreds of thousands who still bear the burden of war with a tiny money payment as compensation.

Memorial Day Services At Capitan

Officer of the day for Capitan's Memorial Day services at City Park is Thomas Utterback, captain, infantry.

Assembly will be sounded by Buglers Frank Taylor and Odell Hickman at 9:45 A. M., after which Utterback is scheduled to deliver a short address honoring the memory of those who directly and indirectly lost their lives in the service of their country.

Rev. H. L. Graves, Ruidoso, was originally scheduled to deliver the invocation and benediction, but due to his recent transfer to Anthony it was unknown at press time who would speak in place of Rev. Graves.

After the invocation is delivered, Mayor S. E. Greisen will read Grand Order No. 11 from the VFW manual, and place the traditional wreath on the monument.

Dr. D. H. Reed, University of New Mexico, will speak on the subject of Memorial Day after the placing of the wreath.

At the conclusion of Dr. Reed's speech, the following program is scheduled:

Benediction.

March to cemetery.

Order of march: Colors, past commanders of American Legion; Veterans of Foreign Wars; and Disabled American Veterans; firing squad; members of these three organizations; auxiliaries of the three organizations; other veterans and procession.

Memorial prayer.

Officer of the day will ask post commanders to place flags upon the graves of their comrades as a token of enduring memory.

When flags are placed and post commanders return to their stations, officer of the day will command the officers in charge of the firing squad for a three-gun salute. The buglers will then sound taps after which the assembly will disperse.

Program '54' Now: Chavez

U. S. Senator Dennis Chavez, in Carrizozo on Tuesday, told The News-Outlook the situation of Highway 54 is such there is no reason our State Highway Department should not program it for the near future.

Chavez, who bears little resemblance to his brother, David Jr., now seeking Democratic nomination for New Mexico's gubernatorial race confined his statements to road construction and availability of federal funds for such purpose.

The following statement was given The News-Outlook by Senator Chavez:

"As chairman of the committee on public works of the U. S. Senate, naturally I am interested in the entire country's highway system authorizations for moneys to be contributed by the federal government to the different states for roads coming through my committee.

"Last Wednesday (May 17), Senator John L. McClellan, Arkansas, chairman of the subcommittee on roads, started hearings on the new authorization bill for the years 1952 and 1953. The bill that is being considered, I introduced as chairman of the full committee, and provides for an appropriation of 500 million dollars a year for the federal aid highway system, and 475 million dollars for the farm to market or country roads.

"Highway 54 is on the federal highway system. The mechanics of programs and construction are as follows: Out of the total money that a state has on its own and from federal contributions, local highway departments make the designation of programs and determine where moneys are to be spent, as it is known with the money available it is impossible to build all roads at the same time. Hence, the highway departments or commissions determine what they think might be the most necessary road.

"The situation of Highway 54 now is such that there is no reason why our local highway department should not program Highway 54 for the near future. Highway 54 has been worked over fairly well as a whole, and little remains to be finished. I feel confident that while it is still most annoying to go over certain sections of Highway 54, especially in this area, it won't be long before the highway department will determine it, and I feel certain also that the Bureau of Public Roads which is under the jurisdiction of the committee I head will lend all its aid and effort to a quick conclusion.

"I am talking now strictly of road construction and nothing else because I do know the program from the whole national standpoint. I also happen to belong to the committee on appropriations that furnishes the money, and if and as soon as the thing is programmed, I know that money will be available as far as the federal government is concerned.

"The committee is also deeply interested in getting the farmer out of the mud and concentrating and emphasizing the necessity of getting into the country so that the farmer may bring his produce into town."

The "little smoke" seen a week ago up in the Gap of the Capitan proved to be the beginning of a large fire that destroyed most of the good timber on the north side of the mountain. Poppy Day in Capitán

Preparation for the observance of Poppy Day here on Saturday, May 27, has been completed, according to Mrs. Don Murphy, chairman of the poppy committee of the James A. Hipp Unit of the American Legion Auxiliary. The poppies have been received from the Fort Bayard Veteran Hospital, where they were made by disabled veterans of both world wars. They are crepe paper replicas of the wild poppies which grew on the battle fields of Europe where so many American boys have given their lives.

Contributions given in exchange for the poppies are used in Legion and auxiliary work for the welfare of the disabled and needy children of the veterans. Fitness of veterans is one of the major causes of distress which the auxiliary relieves with its poppy funds. When a veteran is forced to go to a government hospital for treatment, often his family is left without means of support. Even if he is eligible for compensation, time is required to establish his claim, and a hungry family cannot wait. The auxiliary must be ready to give emergency aid, and on Poppy Day we invite the public to help us carry out our work of mercy and relief. All workers on Poppy Day are volunteers and all money goes into the rehabilitation and child welfare funds, none being used for organization overhead.

Wearing a poppy is an individual act of tribute to the war dead and shows that the wearer is a member and is grateful for their service and sacrifice.

We are sure that every one in Lincoln County holds deep in their hearts the memory of those who died for our country, and we want to see a poppy over every remembering heart on Poppy Day.

Let us remember the words of John McCrae:
 If ye break faith with us who died
 We shall not sleep though poppies grow
 In Flanders Field"

Survey Shows Convention Profitable To Host City


A survey recently completed by the New Mexico Cattle Raisers Association shows that ranchers attending the thirty-fourth annual convention of the organization in Albuquerque last March spent an average of \$13.10 per person per day, according to Roy Forehand, Carlsbad, president. "We conducted this survey among the 2,500 members attending the last convention at the recommendation of the convention committee of the Albuquerque Chamber of Commerce," Forehand said.

Information compiled from a questionnaire mailed to members attending the convention shows that each member stayed in Albuquerque an average of three days and that the average number of persons representing a family was two and a half.

A division of expenses into three principal classifications indicates that ranchers spent 33 per cent for hotel, meals and travel; 49 per cent for ranch equipment, supplies and home equipment and 17 per cent for clothing and miscellaneous personal expense.

"Our organization has always felt that conventions of this kind add a good deal to the financial economy of the host city, however, this survey is the first comparative study we have ever made," Forehand continued.

Annual conventions of the association have been held in Albuquerque for the past 10 years because "facilities here appear most adequate to house the large number of people usually attending these events," Forehand said. "However, our quarterly executive board meetings in June, September and December which usually attract between 300 and 500 members are always well distributed among the many cities and communities of New Mexico."

Your State Government

I feel that a splendid improvement has been achieved by my administration in the creation of the office known as "State Budget Director," which was established by law and started operating August 16, 1947.

Since the operation of the office of Budget Director, we have been able to keep in close touch with all state institutions and agencies helping them with their financial problems and forcing them to operate within their budget. The small expense required by this agency has paid for itself many times over.

Mr. J. D. Hannah, former state auditor and a very competent public servant, has been in charge of this office directly and indirectly since its organization. Even now, as comptroller, he has taken over the work of the budget director without additional salary.

It has been the policy of the budget director to visit the various state institutions from time to time and confer with them on the ground as to their needs, and inspecting their operations at first hand. He has set up a system of requiring monthly reporting as to expenditures which reports are carefully checked and analyzed as they come in and which enables him to be informed at all times as to the status of budgets.

The monthly reporting of state institutions is a new innovation, an heretofore such institutions had been making only quarterly reports to the state comptroller.

Probably one of the most outstanding examples of the value of this program is that of the State Hospital for the Insane at Las Vegas. For many years this institution had been in financial difficulties and had expended far beyond its budget and its income; and, as a result, the board has come before the legislature year after year asking for deficiency appropriations to pull them out of the hole. That's bad business for any state agency. That has not happened under my administration.

The budget director and the comptroller have, under my administration, kept a very close watch on the operations of this institution. At the close of business June 30, 1949, for example the state hospital closed its books with a \$62,000 cash balance and with expenditures far under their budget estimate. They also had on hand an operating inventory of more than \$33,000; in addition, they showed a budget saving of more than \$20,000.

Maybe here is a place where too much economy has been practiced—a rare thing in public institutions—since there is a general feeling that the medical staff, always hard to get, and the attendants are underpaid.

However, even though our splendid board at the hospital may have over-stepped itself in saving money rather than in

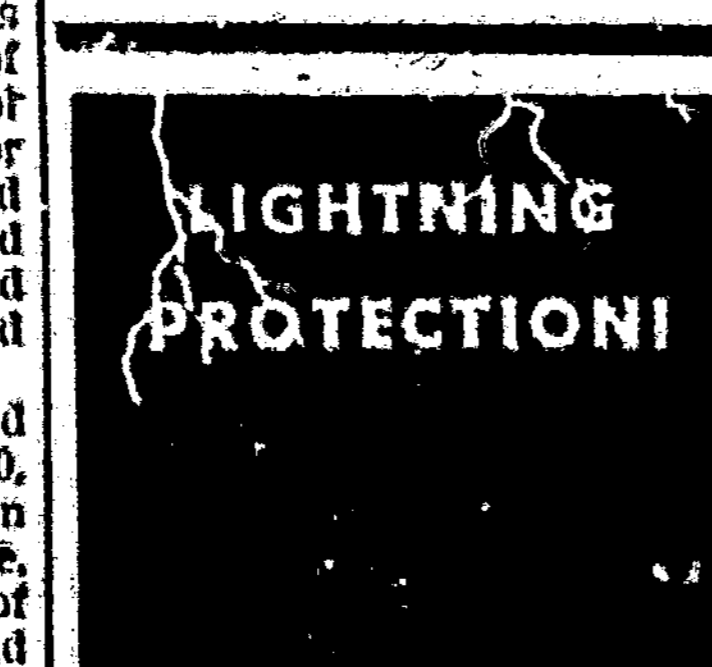

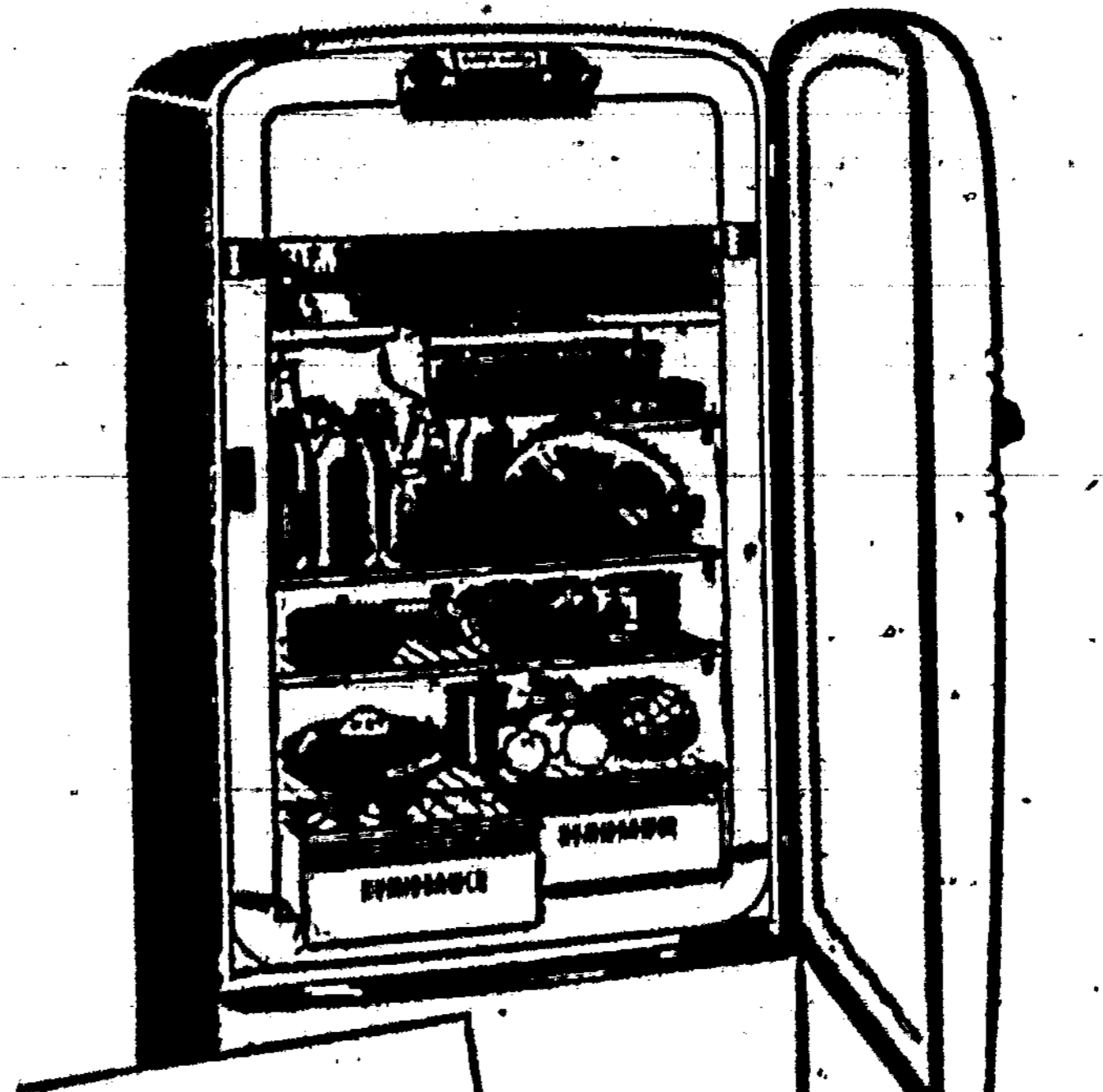

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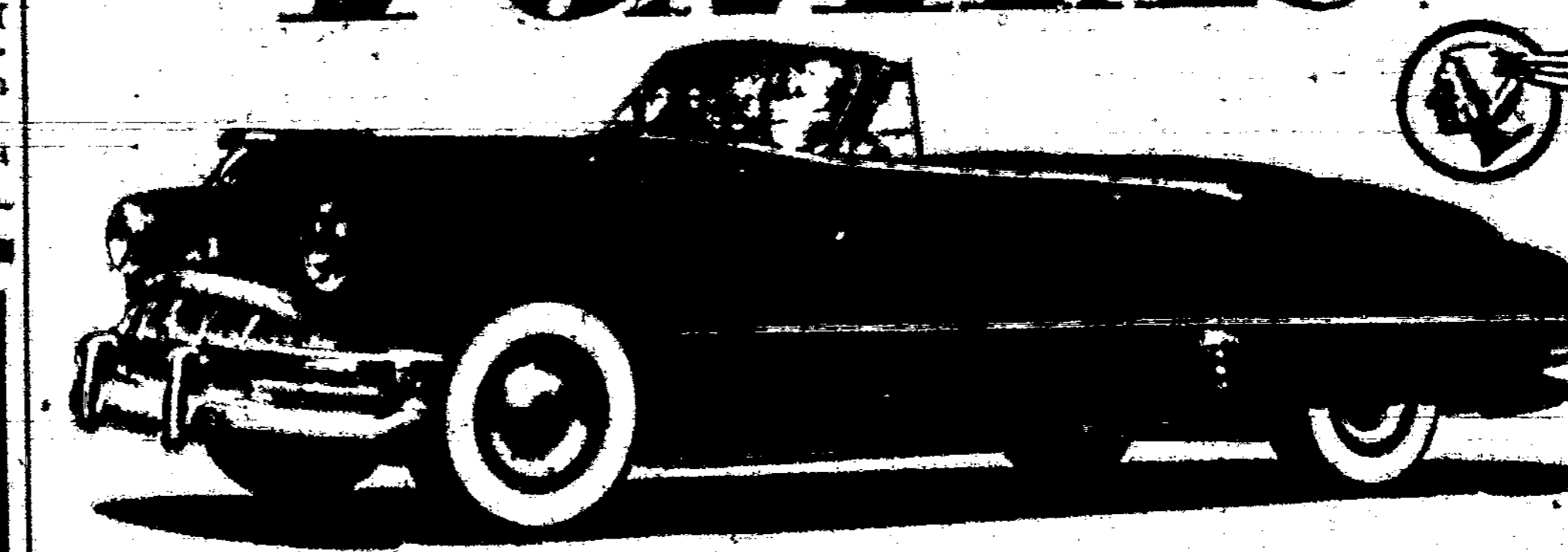

WHEREAS, it is provided by the Primary Election Code of the State of New Mexico that the Board of County Commissioners shall at least 15 days before the election by proclamation and publication as therein provided, give notice of the election, the objects thereof, the offices to be voted for, the names of the candidates for each of the said offices as the same have been certified to the County Clerk as provided by law, the names of Judges of Election and Counting Judges and Poll Clerks, and the places where said election is to be held in each precinct and election district; and

WHEREAS, said Primary Election Code provides that said Act shall apply to all political parties for any of whose candidates there was cast at the last preceding General Election as many as fifteen percentum (15%) of the total number of votes cast for the Candidates for Governor by all parties at such Election; and
