(Continued from Page 1) part of U. S. citizens with Truman's foreign policy. The vice president left immediately following the dinner to return to Washington.

The Democrats adopted a state platform pledging a 1-cent a gallon reduction in state gasoline tax, and a special convention to rewrite the state constitution. Other parts of the platform: Pledges full support to the national administration "in the prosecution of the police action or actual war in Korea" and "any commitments deemed necessary to sustain the dignity and policies of the United States of America, anywhere in the world."

The Democratic party recognizes the current need for calling a constitutional convention and pledges the calling of such a convention for the purpose of studying, revising and modernizing our state constitution.

Favors "non-partisan governmental survey commission" to study possibility of streamlining the state government.

Pledges measures to reduce infant mortality rates in New Mexico "including improved water supplies and sanitation," and "continuation of the hospital program" to make available needed hospital beds.

State assistance for small irrigation projects; continuation of the study of underground water; continuation of regulations of the state Oil Conservation Commission.

Pledges support for federal legislation for assistance to the needy.

Pledges continuation of rural electrification and rural telephone systems.

"Fair and equitable administration of veterans affairs."

Calls for strengthening of state labor department to enforce existing laws regarding working conditions, wages, workmen's compensation and improved safety regulations.

Favors constitutional amendment providing for non-partisan State Board of Education and "protection of funds and sources of revenue dedicated to, or earmarked by law, for financing public elementary and secondary schools."

Supplemental resolutions: Urged Congress to expand the Voice of America radio programs to countries beyond the Iron Curtain.

Urged Congress to provide protection for property rights of men called to military service and to set up dependency allotments for their families.

Pledges aid in setting up local civilian defense organizations.

Recommend "individuals actively engaged in agriculture" be represented on all state boards and agencies administering agricultural policies of the state.

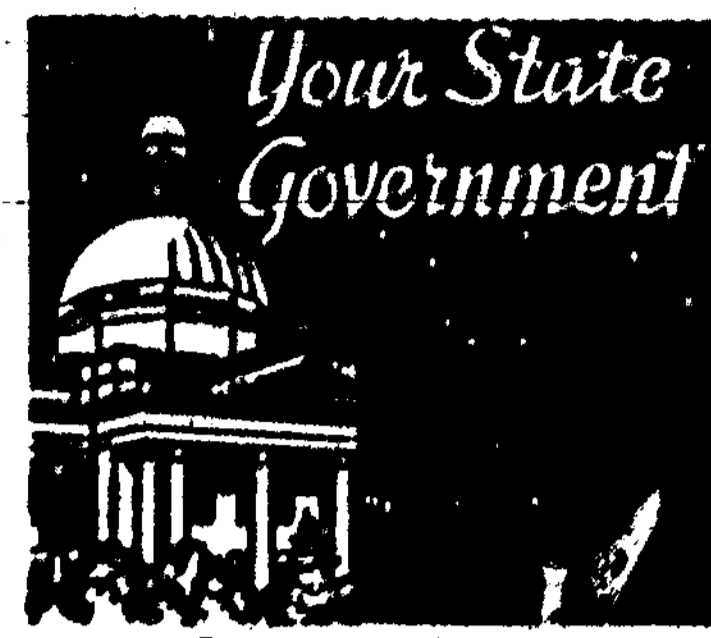

THE LINCOLN COUNTY NEWS and CARRIZOZO OUTLOOK

Last week, I wrote the first of two articles regarding the cost of our state government. This is the second of the series.

In last week's article, I pointed out that the total amount of the state's budget was approximately \$57,000,000 for the last fiscal year. I further stated that of this amount, some \$49,000,000 went for institutions of higher learning, highway construction, health and welfare. I showed that only approximately \$4,000,000, or 7 per cent, of the total state budget, went for purely administrative offices. This sum of money supports some 40 departments—executive and appointive—charged with the enforcement of various laws.

When all of us interested in reducing cost of government talk about reducing such cost, we usually think of these administrative departments. Not many of us will admit that we want to give up any of the services performed by the other agencies of our state, such as public health and welfare, construction of highways and support of our educational institutions. So let's look at the record.

The actual administrative branch of state government costs approximately \$4,000,000 a year, or 7 per cent of the total state budget, even though the work of these departments has vastly increased in the last few years. I would like to point out—as an example—that the revenues collected by the Bureau of Revenue has increased from about \$15,000,000 in 1912 to around \$40,000,000 for the last fiscal year. This bureau has had a tremendous increase in the number of business establishments it must service. For example in 1916, there were only 17,311 business units to service, compared with 47,338 in 1919. It would not be surprising if the state government had a point where the department cannot do a good job. Below are listed various departments that come under the administrative branch of the government, and all of which together take only 7 per cent of the total state budget. Education, educational budget auditor, attorney general, state auditor, bank examiner, budget director, Bureau of Revenue (which in-

cludes income tax, motor vehicle tax, sales tax, compensating tax, drivers license fees, motor transportation, luxury tax, severance tax, liquor tax and the gasoline tax), state comptroller, adjutant general, corporation commission, courtesy and information, state engineer, state finance board, governor, governor's approval committee, Interstate Crime Commission, Labor and Industrial Commission, State Land Office, State Park Commission, state police, Public Service Commission, liquefied petroleum, publications, purchasing agent, secretary of state, Tax Commission, state treasurer, Veterans Service Commission, Supreme Court and custodian.

As I have said, if all of the administrative costs of all these government departments were wiped out, there would be a saving of only 7 per cent in the total state budget allowances. It can be readily seen, therefore, that it is not the administrative departments that really cost; it is the extras and specialties that the people have demanded. Until we ourselves want to give up these special services, there cannot be much decrease in the cost of government. We can, however, begin to think in terms of consolidation and reducing some less essential services. This is something for the next Legislature to think about.

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

terially increasing our own needs for water which is absolutely essential to these vital movements.

"There are other factors that affect this whole situation, rather too lengthy to handle by correspondence, and so that you may be more fully informed, Mr. P. D. Robinson, superintendent of our Rio Grande Division, will call upon you soon to review the matter with you in detail. Meanwhile you may rest assured that it is our earnest desire to do all that can be done, consistent with our primary obligation as a transcontinental common carrier, to assist.

Also reproduced below are the statements made by Page and Robinson a few months ago wherein they denied there was a shortage, and then in the next paragraph told how and when the shortage would be alleviated.

The following is taken from a statement by Page in the June 17 issue of the El Paso Times:
'Residents of Carrizozo, N. M., which is undergoing a water shortage, will have more water next week, F. A. Page, water superintendent of the Southern Pacific Rio Grande Division, said Friday.

"The water shortage developed when the Southern Pacific closed its reservoir for repairs. Water is now being piped into the town at the rate of 56,000 gallons a day from Bonita Dam.

"Page said that if there is a water shortage, it has been caused by the residents' inability to conserve water by cutting down on unnecessary usage.

"He added that the reservoir will be in operation next week and that the town will be able to use as much water as it needs then. The town normally receives 77,000 gallons of water from the reservoir daily."

In the June 17 issue of the Albuquerque Journal appeared the following statement by P. D. Robinson, Southern Pacific division superintendent:

"Division Superintendent P. D. Robinson insisted there is no water shortage. He said the railroad pumps so much through the pipelines and if towns along the line use too much, the levels of the reservoirs drop, and water must be rationed.

"However, he said, there is still plenty of water in Bonita and other dams."

"Robinson said the railroad supplies only surplus water from the dams to communities along its route, and the communities contribute it."

For approximately six weeks, city officials have had the water cut off on one side of town three hours per day in order to give residents of the southeast sector an opportunity to draw a reserve.

With the exception of the hours 7 A. M.; 9-10 A. M. and 3-4

P. M. daily, those residents are practically without water. Yet, according to Page the completion of the reservoir repairs was supposed to give Carrizozo all it needed—perhaps Page forgot to mention that by "all it needed," was meant all that S. P. deemed the town needed.

Judging from the vice president's letter, S. P. is, apparently, worried over what may occur in 1951 if the snow pack this year isn't sufficient. However, the irony of that reasoning is obvious when one considers that the railroad official carefully avoided the subject of the waste of thousands of gallons of water daily as the result of leaks along their pipelines. Not only are they wasting water when the state of New Mexico is spending thousands of dollars to develop underground and above ground water resources, but such leakage of water is washing away what little of the so-called "Highway 54" we have between here and Corona.

City Council will continue to work on the problem of developing the town's own water system, as well as endeavor to alleviate the immediate need for an additional amount above the 37 gallons per minute now being granted by Southern Pacific.

There have been several offers to sell water to the city, but as yet no concrete facts have been given to help council determine their feasibility.

The State Health Department has O. K.'d the safety aspects of the water supply offered by the Carrizozo Country Club. However, the latter organization has not as yet given council the additional facts necessary for consideration of their offer. The Health Department also offers the town some suggestions in planning for its water system. They state it is advisable for Carrizozo to have at least two wells and be in full control of at least one of them. They advise necessary precautions in using any water that may possibly be obtained from the Country Club or elsewhere. It is also possible, according to the Health Department, a well either south or west of the club may be feasible.

Mayor Petty emphasized the fact Carrizozo must continue to strive for its own water system and explore all possibilities to that end, while endeavoring to solve its immediate need for an additional supply. He pointed out the town must develop its own water system in order to provide for any eventualities that may arise, and stated there are several sources which might be possible to develop. In the meantime, the mayor will contact P. D. Robinson to determine whether the town can obtain more water immediately.

To add to the city's present

woes, Saera Brothers have reported an increase of 1 cent per gallon on butane and 1/2 cent per gallon on propane.

It was also reported at Tuesday night's meeting the Alamogordo and El Paso papers had carried news items on the approval of the Otero County REA Cooperative to offer \$121,000 for the purchase of the Carrizozo power plant. The mayor stated Allan Walker, attorney for the cooperative, wanted to make a report to council concerning the matter, but as Councilman C. A. Snow is out of town it was preferred a meeting be held when all council members could be present.

The members present at this week's meeting indicated they were not inclined to be interested in the offer unless REA could prove to them the town could benefit, and they had not had such proof to date. The mayor said he is in favor of hearing REA's offer, but that the proposition has been hanging fire since 1947, and indicated no concrete facts and figures have been submitted for the town's consideration.

Other business transacted included approval of an application to build a bathroom on property owned by A. J. Scharf, and approval for payment of routine bills.

Dr. Workman Sees 25-50 Pct. Increase In Rainfall

Dr. E. J. Workman, president of the New Mexico School of Mines, told Albuquerque Rotarians it will be possible to increase the rainfall of arid New Mexico 25 to 50 per cent.

"This increase is possible immediately as contrasted to possible long range results, from studies being undertaken by the Department of the Interior to determine the feasibility of removing salt from sea water, Workman said.

He announced the newest goal of the rainmakers is to find a sublimation nucleus upon which condensation will take place at about 15 to 17 degrees centigrade. Isolation of such chemical nucleus would then permit the rainmakers to moisten the state with heavy snowfalls instead of thundershowers, Workman predicted.

Problems of flash floods and other heavy surface runoffs would thus be eliminated, he said.
