REA Proposed Contract Listed

The following is a preliminary draft form of the proposed contract between the village of Carrizozo and the Otero County Electric Cooperative given to us by the mayor, Vernon Petty, and reprinted here for your information:

Escrow Agreement
THIS MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT made and entered into this day of October, A. D. 1950, by and between the village of Carrizozo, hereinafter referred to as seller, and the Otero County Electric Cooperative, Inc., hereinafter referred to as purchaser, WITNESSETH:

Whereas, the seller is the owner of certain real estate on which is located an electric generating plant, and also the owner of a distribution system, in the village of Carrizozo, New Mexico; and

Whereas, the Board of Trustees of the village of Carrizozo has tentatively agreed to sell and convey all of its electrical facilities, except a cold storage locker plant, and ice making plant, to the purchaser for the sum of \$121,000, subject to a vote of the qualified electors of the said village, and subject to the approval of this agreement by the Administrator of the Rural Electrification Administration; and

Whereas, the seller has heretofore, in accordance with the laws of the state of New Mexico and by Ordinance No. 48, and by Ordinance No. 52, issued revenue bonds, pledging the receipts from said electric generation and transmission system to the payment of the said bonds; and

Whereas, it is necessary that said bonds be retired and paid off in order that clear title may be conveyed to the purchaser; and

Whereas, said bonds may not be callable until the years 1952 and 1954, respectively; and

Whereas, in order that the seller may be assured that purchaser will pay the purchase price, and that seller will convey title as per agreement, the parties have agreed to deposit certain sums of money in escrow.

Reservists May Receive Dependency Discharges

Army enlisted reservists with four or more dependents now under orders to report for active federal service may be discharged upon application, the New Mexico Military District announced.

Dependents are defined as children, spouse and parents, but no other relatives.

Applications must be supported by affidavits from the reservist and his dependents. Further information may be obtained from the military district, P. O. Box 1689, Albuquerque, or the nearest ORC unit instructor.

Hondo Parent-Teachers Hear Louis E. Diehl

Louis E. Diehl, El Paso, addressed a Parent-Teacher Association assembly October 10 at the Hondo Valley Union High School on the subject "The Influence of the Child in the Education of the Child."

Action Of Local Draft Boards May Be Appealed

A great deal of confusion exists relative to taking an appeal from any Selective Service local board action, according to Russell C. Charlton, state director.

All any registrant has to do is to write a letter or post card to a local board, saying, "I desire to appeal my classification."

Not only any registrant may appeal, but any person who has claimed his deferment, such as an employer or a dependent, may appeal.

However, appeals must be made within 10 days from the date the notice of classification is mailed to the individual. Local boards are authorized to grant an appeal at any time up to the date the registrant is ordered for induction, if the status of the registrant has changed and due proof is presented of the change.

The burden of complying with the Selective Service law is upon the registrant himself and not upon the local board, and if evidence such as dependency or occupation is not presented, one cannot expect the local board to go out and dig up the evidence, since Selective Service is not an investigative agency.

A Typical Day On Highway 54



The above picture shows a huge truck mired down on the practically impassable Highway 54 between here and Corona. Apparently, Mother Nature had conspired that day with the leaking water mains of the Southern Pacific Railroad to make this "highway" even more hazardous. The leakage from the railroad's water pipes have been instrumental in washing out portions of this dirt road. The mud and water filled ruts shown here are on "Highway" 54, a federal highway between Corona and Carrizozo. This is the same stretch of road to which State Highway Engineer Burton Dwyro referred when he said there was little travel over it, and implied lack of travel is the reason for its non-pavement. Judging from the above picture only the traveler with a weasel mode of transportation would feel safe in trying to navigate this road.



Shown above are two men attempting to get a truck load of cattle out of the ditch on Highway 54 between Ancho and Carrizozo. The truck was out of Kansas City with a load of registered cattle to be delivered to a Three Rivers ranch. It went into the ditch before 5 P. M. on October 4 and did not reach Carrizozo until October 5 at 2 P. M. The driver was forced to keep the cattle on the truck over the length of time allowed by the Interstate Commerce Commission for feeding and watering animals. In addition to being in the ditch because of the highway's condition, the cattle truck was also held up by the truck shown in the first picture. The latter, headed towards Ancho, foundered in the mire of "Highway" 54.



Cars and a school bus, on their way to Carrizozo, are shown in the accompanying picture waiting for the truck, shown in the first picture, to be moved so they also may attempt to negotiate the morass of mud and water. The above pictures were taken on October 4 and show the hazards which are encountered in travel over this road. The tourist can and does avoid driving over it, but Lincoln County residents in that area are not so fortunate. Their children are forced to drive it twice daily Monday through Friday on their way to and from schools; ranchers must haul their produce to market over it, and others are unable to avoid it in traveling back and forth to the county seat of Carrizozo on routine business. Patients must travel it on their way to the hospital. A review of the above pictures will readily show why there is not much travel on the unpaved portion of Highway 54.

Tempera Boil In Schools; Break Seen In Relations

A possibility of the cancellation of athletic events between Capitan and Carrizozo High Schools looms as the result of the rough and unsportsmanlike brand of football displayed at last Friday's game between the two schools.

Officials report relations so strained between the two teams by the end of the game as to indicate disciplinary action may be necessary. It appears it may be a toss-up as to which team used the most unsportsmanlike tactics.

Capitan won an easy victory with a score of 36-0. The first score for the Tigers came late in the first quarter when Joe Navarro, Carrizozo, fumbled a Capitan kick on his own 20-yard line. In a series of six plays, Capitan carried the ball over the goal line for a touchdown.

Capitan scored twice in the second quarter: the first on a 20-yard pass play right down the middle and the second, late in the quarter, by a drive of over 60 yards. The first half ended 18-0 in favor of Capitan.

The Tigers made two more touchdowns on drives of 45 and 70 yards during the third quarter, and late in the fourth scored for the final time with a drive of 53 yards.

The Carrizozo team's rough playing in the second half resulted indirectly in two members being ordered off the field—one for talking back to the referee and the other for agitating the Carrizozo team to play rough. Bobby Hicks, Carrizozo, received a badly smashed upper lip in last Friday's battle.

The local team meets Ruidoso here today at 1:30 P. M. The visitors at this time are second in Class C conference, having been undefeated and with only 15 points scored against them to date. They won over the Artesia B team last week by 20-2.

Powelson-Baroz Named Honorary Captains

Bob Powelson and Andy Baroz, members of the Carrizozo High School football team, were elected honorary football captains by their teammates last Tuesday. As a result of their election they will assist in the crowning of the Homecoming Queen at the football dance October 21.

Bob, who is a senior, plays fullback and has done extremely well on both offensive and defensive playing. He kicks and runs with the best of them, as well as doing some passing.

Andy is in the junior class and is a guard on the school team. He shines on defensive action whether he plays in the line or as a line backer.

Powelson and Baroz will captain the two final games of the season—with Ruidoso today at the local field and with Socorro there on November 3.

Coach M. S. Mirmanian selects a different captain for each game during the season with the exception of the last two, which are elected by the football team and are considered the honorary captains for the games already played in the current season, as well as the remaining games to be played.

REA Topic Of Utilities Head

Nowhere is the old Arab proverb of letting the camel get his head into the tent more appropriate than in the case of letting the REA take over our electric plant. First, they use the taxpayers' money to get into business, and second, they use more taxpayers' money to make up appearing losses incurred by the fact that they run lines into areas where the consumer density is so low that by no stretch of the imagination could the co-op be made to pay. That, of course, is the reason the REA would like to have our local plant. We, here locally, would be penalized to pay for extensions that in themselves will not pay. To make it worse, we will lose the only village owned utility that is really paying and any possible saving that may arise from proposed lower power rates will be reflected in higher water and gas rates.

In addition, we have one of the nicest locker and ice plants in this part of the state and for a village of this size we should be proud of the fact that we have it. However, if we have to buy power to operate it, it will not show any profit. Under REA, in order to pay for power to operate the locker and ice plant it would mean an increase in the charge for processing, higher locker rates and higher price for ice.

The average power consumption for the locker and ice plant has been 11,500 KW per month. At 2 cents per KW (minimum cost from REA) that would be \$2,760 per year. The locker and ice plant will not show that much profit in a year. In fact, the total income from ice and locker plant the last fiscal year amounted to only \$9,534.22. Labor and supplies amounted to about \$3,500. No charge was made for water, gas and electric power. Should the village have to pay REA for electric power, one can readily see that there would be no profit whatsoever.

Another power item that would cost the village money under the REA is street lights. For example, Vaughn pays about \$70 per month to the REA for street lights. To furnish street lights for the village of Carrizozo would be slightly higher, around \$900 per year.

Mr. Brenton in October 9 paper stated that our engines are old and by REA standards, obsolete. This is, of course, true. Even so, they have been giving better service than the existing new REA lines in Capitan. In fact, Capitan has had more than twice as many power outages and for longer periods of time than the village has had in the past year. This cannot be attributed to poor management, nor poor equipment, but due to the fact that any utility having long lines is going to have line trouble. Let me quote from a current trade journal, "Diesel Progress," October issue. The title of the article is "REA Diesel Expansions Reaches Peak In 1950".

"In any event engineering considerations will carry proper weight in any determination of policy. One argument against the federation is that it serves to augment the danger of service interruptions through line failure, a danger to which the REA co-op was already inherently susceptible."

Another thing to think about is

Army Cancels Orders For Active Reserve Duty

Orders for U. S. Army Reservist J. M. (Ken) Ortiz, Carrizozo, who was scheduled to leave October 14 for Camp Hood, Texas, for further assignment, were canceled late Friday night when he received a telegram rescinding previous instructions.

Ortiz would have gone back into the Army with the rating of first class sergeant, his rating at the time of his discharge after World War II service.

Ortiz, who went from private to technical sergeant in a year's time, served as an infantry instructor at Camp Walters, Texas, from 1943 to 1946.

Upon his release in 1946, he and his brother, S. M. Ortiz, incumbent candidate on the Democratic ticket for Lincoln County sheriff at the November election, opened the Donut and Coffee Shop, which at that time was located across from the Post Office. The two worked long and hard hours, but achieved a large measure of success during the year and a half they ran the restaurant.

In January, 1947, the two brothers purchased the Colonel Jones garage station, located at Alamogordo and Tularosa streets. In about a year's time, they more than tripled the sales at this station.

During this past summer the station was extensively remodeled to give them triple the space they formerly had. The modernization of the station has been completed with the exception of one island which will be done in the near future. The brothers re-

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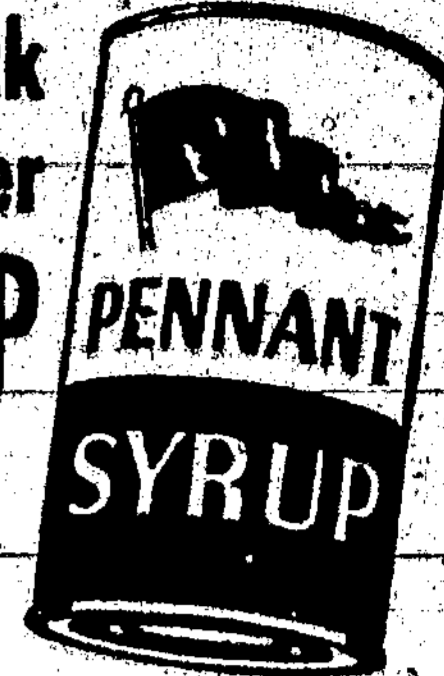

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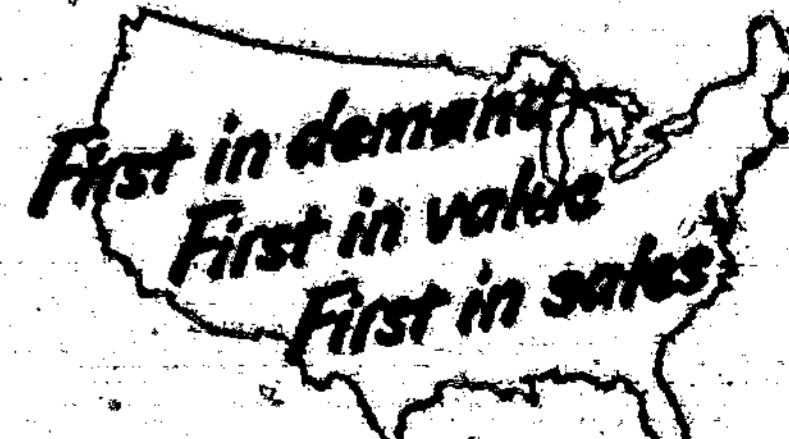

Medicos Name Committee To Hear Complaints

The American Medical Association announced 34 of its 48 constituent state medical associations and the District of Columbia Medical Society now have committees which will hear complaints from the public.
 Purpose of these committees, according to Dr. George E. Lull, Chicago, secretary and general manager of the AMA, is to "iron out any misunderstandings between the public and the profession." He said the committees are another expression of the physicians' constant concern for the welfare of their patients.
 Under the committee setup, any patient who is dissatisfied with service rendered, who feels he has been overcharged, or who is dissatisfied for any other reason, may take his complaint to the medical society. The committee on professional conduct, as these patient complaint committees are commonly called, will consider his charges, discuss them with the physician concerned, and recommend a solution.
 "Experience has shown that most complaints arise out of misunderstandings that are quickly and amicably settled," Dr. Lull said, adding: "In cases involving fees, many difficulties occur solely because the physician and the patient neglect to discuss charges. Patients often do not realize that many tests and treatments are included under the simple heading 'For Professional Services Rendered.' After a committee arranged conference between doctor and patient, these troubles usually evaporate."
 "Even in the cases where a committee finds that the doctor has erred, little difficulty is experienced in settling complaints. Committee after committee has reported to the AMA they have never had a doctor refuse to accept their recommendations."
 If more stringent discipline should be required, however, the medical society has the power to expel the physician involved from membership, or if charges warrant, can even go so far as to request revocation of his license by the state licensing board.
 The New Mexico Medical Society was one of the first five state medical associations to organize such a committee. Its committee to guard professional ethics, known as the board of supervisors, has been functioning since August, 1949.
 During the first year that the committee has functioned, eight complaints have been received, reports Dr. C. P. Dunch, Artesia, chairman of the board. "Five of these complaints were disposed of by advisory letters to the complainant and the doctor complained against. One case was referred to the county medical society board of censors, and two cases were referred to the board of medical examiners, since they concerned unlicensed practitioners," Dr. Dunch added.

New Mexico To Observe United Nations Day

The blue and white flag of the United Nations will fly alongside the Stars and Stripes in every city, town and village in New Mexico on October 24, United Nations Day, if the flag making program under the direction of the extension service of New Mexico A. & M. College meets its goal.
 Women and girls in home extension clubs, 4-H clubs, as well as city, church, veterans, schools and other interested groups are now making United Nations flags which they will present to local officials for flying on United Nations Day. The purpose of the flag making project, according to G. L. Boykin, associate extension director, is "to lead to a better and more unified understanding by local groups of the United Nations, as an instrument through which free people may express a determination for world wide peace."
 The modern Betsy Rosses will make the flags in blue with a white globe surrounded by laurel branches in the center. They will buy the material, sew the design, and prepare the flags to be flown in public places as part of their club work. Another purpose of the program is to make the average American familiar with the United Nations flag under which our forces are fighting in Korea.
 The program of making and flying the flags was officially launched at the State Fair in Albuquerque recently when New Mexico 4-H'ers presented a homemade United Nations flag to Governor Thomas J. Mabry. The flag was a gift of the New Mexico Association of Home Extension Clubs.
 Every interested organization is invited to participate in the United Nations flag program, which is sponsored by National Citizens Committee for United Nations Day. Widespread recognition of the United Nations emblem and general understanding of the significance of the United Nations program is hoped for as a result of the activity, the extension service explains.

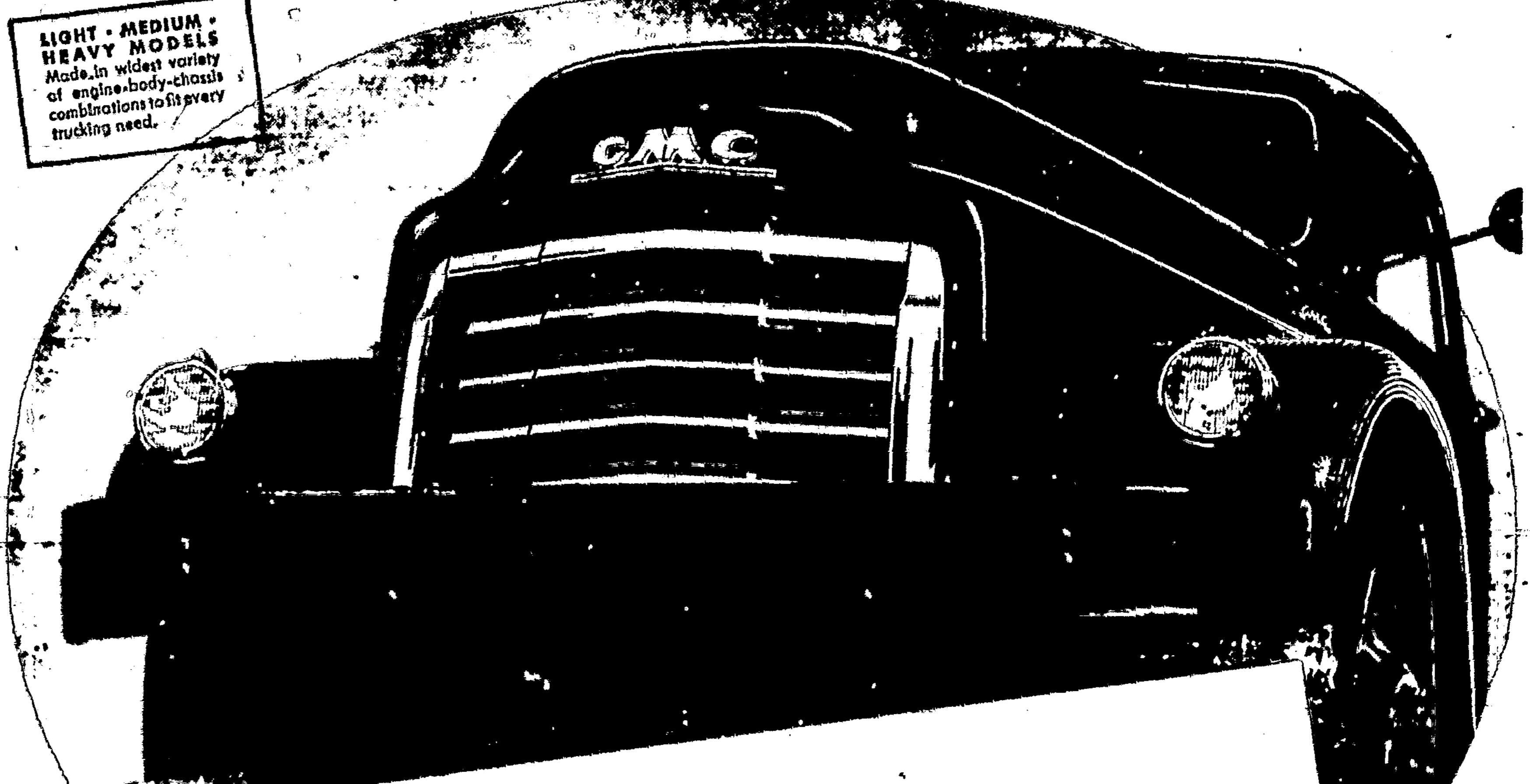

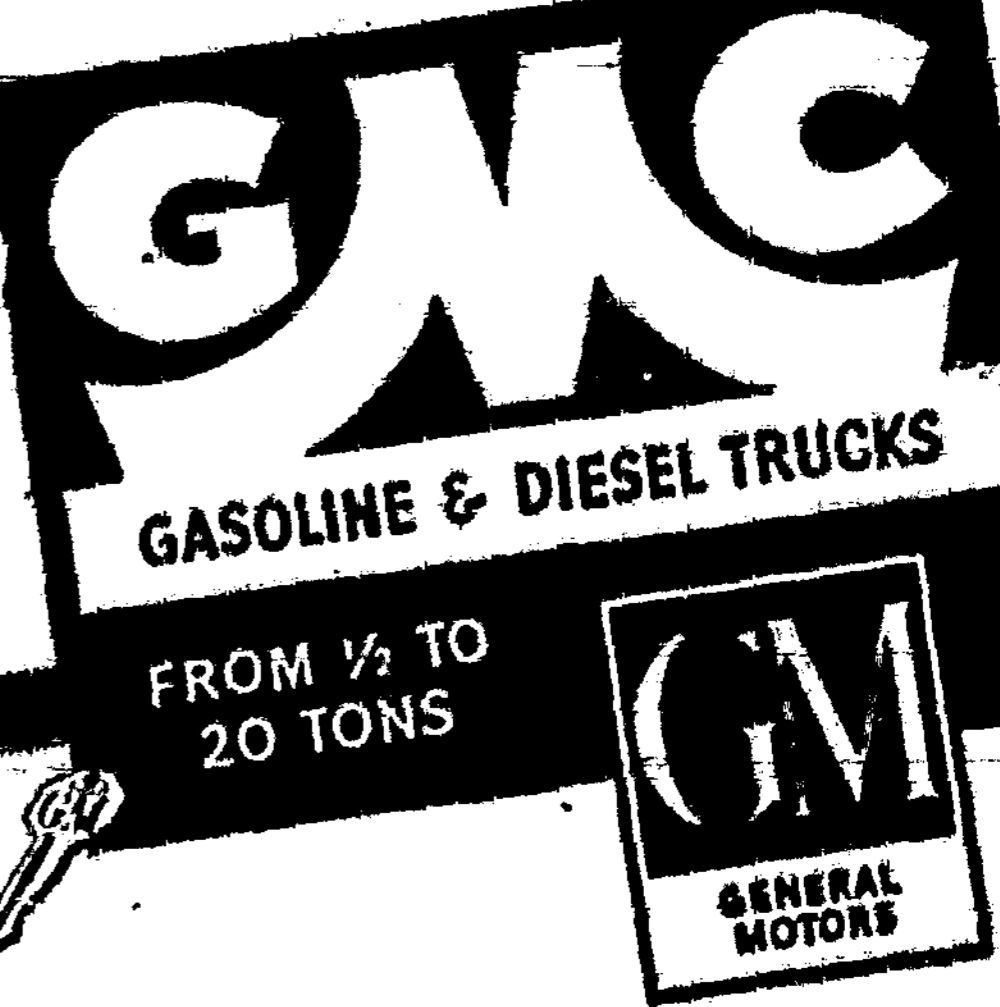

tain moneys with an escrow agent, hereinafter named, and to make proper deeds and bills of sale for the conveyance of said facilities:

NOW THEREFORE IT IS MUTUALLY UNDERSTOOD AND AGREED AS FOLLOWS, TO WIT:

I The parties hereto hereby designate the First National Bank of Santa Fe as escrow agent for the purpose of this transaction.

The parties further authorize the said escrow agent, the First National Bank of Santa Fe, to pay from the funds hereinafter provided for: First, the interest on both issues of said bonds being (a) Electric Light and Power Revenue Bonds of the village of Carrizozo, dated the 15th day of June, A. D. 1942, and (b) Junior Security Electric Light and Power Revenue Bonds of the village of Carrizozo, dated the 1st day of October, A. D. 1944, and second, to pay the principal of such bonds as may become due or at an earlier date if possible from the funds deposited with it.

Said escrow agent is further authorized to, on the 15th day of June, 1952, redeem all of the said bonds dated the 15th day of June, 1942, and, on the 1st day of October, 1954, redeem all of said bonds dated the 1st day of October, 1944, should it not be able to redeem said bonds before maturity.

At such time as all of said bonds shall have been redeemed, said escrow agent is further authorized to cancel the same and deliver them to the clerk of the village of Carrizozo, and to deliver to the purchaser the deed and bills of sale as hereinafter provided for.

III The purchaser agrees to place with the said escrow agent hereinabove named, for the retirement of the said bonds and as purchase price of the facilities hereinafter described, the sum of \$121,000.

The seller agrees to deposit with the said escrow agent the sum of \$13,005, being the amount necessary to pay the interest from this date until the said bonds are redeemed in full.

The escrow agent agrees to cooperate with the seller in paying off any of said bonds before maturity date and thereby save all moneys possible from the interest fund if it is found feasible, and to return any such interest money to the seller after all bonds have been paid in full together with interest.

IV The seller agrees to convey by good and sufficient warranty deed the following described real estate, to-wit:

Lots 1, 10, 11, 12, 22 and 23, in Block 16, of the O. P. Addition of the village of Carrizozo, Lincoln County, New Mexico.

together with all improvements thereon situated, and to convey by bill of sale all equipment, tools, stock, and all other facilities used in connection with the generation and distribution of electric power within the village of Carrizozo, and surrounding territory, excepting one truck and one pickup now used by the village and to remain the property of the village and not to be included in this contract. Said deeds and bill of sale shall be deposited with the escrow agent and delivered as hereinabove provided.

The seller guarantees to furnish a good merchantable title to the said real estate and to all such chattels as may be conveyed. As soon as this agreement shall have been executed by the village of Carrizozo and the Otero County Electric Cooperative, Inc., an inventory shall be taken of the various chattels which shall be included in the bill of sale to be delivered.

The Board of Trustees of the seller agrees that it will submit to the electors of the village of Carrizozo the proposition as to whether or not the electric facilities as hereinabove described shall be sold, and if the said electors shall vote favorably upon said proposition, that they will convey all of said facilities to the purchaser in accordance with the terms of this agreement.

VI The seller further agrees that it will grant to the purchaser, in the event said sale shall be consummated as contemplated, a 25-year franchise to operate within the village of Carrizozo.

VII The purchaser shall not assume any liabilities of the seller, except that it will assume all responsibility to furnish electric power to the inhabitants of the village of Carrizozo and comply with the existing lawful con-

tracts which shall be assigned by seller to purchaser.

VIII The seller agrees that it will allow purchaser to inspect all of its original books and records pertaining to the property agreed to be sold between the time of the execution of this agreement and the time that possession may be delivered to the purchaser.

IX Seller agrees that it will continue to operate the said system in a good and business like manner between the date hereof and such date as possession may be delivered to purchaser, and that it will not sell or otherwise dispose of any of its facilities.

X Among the improvements to be made by the purchaser, should this contract be signed and approved as herein specified, it agrees to construct a transmission line, carrying 60,000 volts, from the sub-station of the Reclamation Service at Alamogordo, New Mexico, up Highway No. 53 to Carrizozo, New Mexico.

It further agrees to retain the present electric light and power plant as a standby plant and to construct a business circuit to provide the business district, consisting of business houses and the hospital, with lights should there be a power interruption on the main feeder line to the village.

The purchaser further agrees that it will put into effect the usual Otero County REA rates established for villages as published, at least in part, in The Lincoln County News in the October 13, 1950, issue.

XI Purchaser agrees to admit to membership all consumers receiving service directly from the system who shall make appropriate application for membership and shall pay the regular membership fee.

XII Seller agrees that it will be responsible for any losses by reason of damage by fire, or any other casualty which may occur to the system between the date hereof and the date of delivery of possession of the system.

XIII Consumers' deposits shall all be paid to purchaser and considered as membership fees, or shall be refunded by seller to its various consumers at the election of seller.

XIV The terms of this agreement shall be conditioned upon the obtaining by purchaser within 30 days from the date hereof of the legal approval of this agreement by the administrator of the Rural Electrification Administration, and the obtaining by the purchaser of a loan from the Rural Electrification Administration in an amount sufficient to finance the purchase of the system pursuant to this agreement and to build a transmission line from the sub-station of the Bureau of Reclamation at Alamogordo, New Mexico, to Carrizozo, New Mexico.

XV Seller shall discontinue the operation of the system when possession is delivered to purchaser and shall not thereafter, without the purchaser's written permission, sell electric energy conveyed in the territory of the system.

XVI This agreement and any and all ancillary agreements entered into pursuant hereto shall be binding and inure to the benefit of the respective successors and assigns of the parties hereto.

XVII IT IS FURTHER MUTUALLY UNDERSTOOD AND AGREED that the seller shall, as soon as convenient, submit said proposition of sale to its residents at a duly called election of the electors of the village of Carrizozo, and that if said election is favorable, this agreement, together with the moneys herein provided for and the deed and bill of sale herein provided for, shall be deposited with the escrow agent, and that at such time the seller shall immediately deliver possession of all facilities to the purchaser, after which time the purchaser shall be responsible for the operation and maintenance of, shall put into effect the rates used in connection with its distribution system.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the said parties have signed, sealed and delivered by their duly authorized officers, as of the day and year first hereinabove written.

the fact that although we are getting out of one bonded indebtedness we are getting into a bigger debt. We will trade the \$100,000 indebtedness for whatever the co-op pays for the existing system plus the cost of a line from Tularosa, estimated at \$175,000, plus their existing indebtedness. If we were sure the new co-op would pay off that might be all right, but it looks to me like we are jumping out of the frying pan into the fire.

The House committee on expenditures has come out with the following facts regarding the REA: I will quote only those paragraphs applicable to our discussion.

"Paragraph V—Poor management has frequently contributed to the operating losses sustained by the borrowers. Out of 991 enlarged borrowers 247, or almost 25 per cent, operated at a book loss in 1949."

"Paragraph VI—in the two-year period, ended December 31, 1949, the number of borrowers with yearly operating deficits on accrual accounting basis increased almost 50 per cent and the average of the book loss per borrower almost doubled. In recognition of the potential seriousness of this situation, REA has intensified its efforts to improve management, effect economies, and increase revenues of borrowers in financial difficulties or approaching such difficulties." Paragraph VII goes on to state "The number of borrowers reported as delinquent is misleading because of time extensions granted, which removed the grantees from technical delinquency."

This does not paint a very pretty picture regarding the REA. In short, if they do not show a profit the rates given us now will have to be raised or more money will have to be borrowed to operate on.

Another thing that is not generally known, and without trying to discredit anyone connected with it nor detract from the good it has done, the TVA has lost money consistently and in an area where the consumer density is very heavy, a farm to every 40 acres. The taxpayer originally put up \$300,000,000 to start with and this "yardstick,"

to quote our late President, was to be self-liquidating in 16 years. It has piled up \$119,579,000 in loss. This information was from "Electric Light and Power" and was obtained from various governmental agencies and business organizations.

Regarding the cost of modernizing the existing plant, Mr. Brenton thinks the cost would be around \$125,000. One new Fairbanks-Morse diesel with alternator, power boards, complete with all meters, etc., quoted price by Mr. Walters, field engineer for Fairbanks-Morse and Company, is \$46,000. This is for a 300 KW machine. Our total output for the three engines that we now have is 411 KW. This one engine will fit on the same base as the smallest 100 KW engine we now have, so we would have no problem on enlarging the plant.

In closing, I would urge the village of Carrizozo to keep their electric plant and, if necessary, revise and modernize their rates. These rates were set up in 1943 and are entirely out of date. Incidentally, these rates were set up by an REA man, Mr. Moore, who is currently employed at Lovington by the REA.
