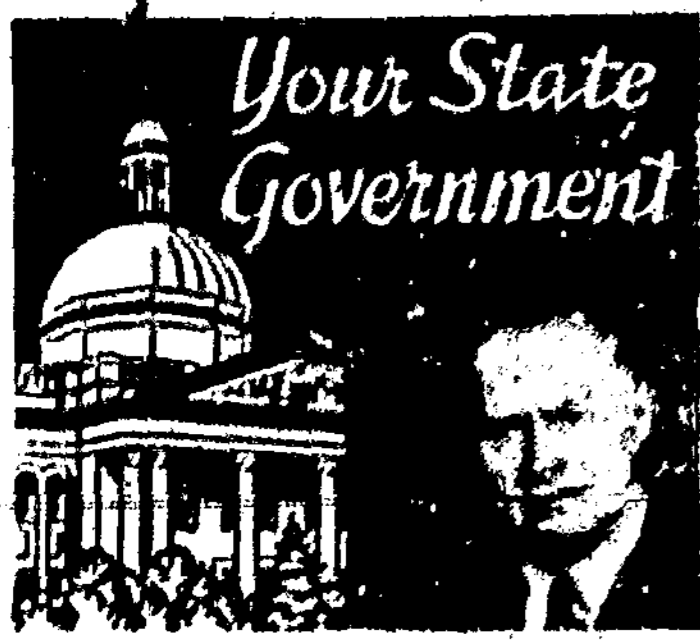

There is no disputing the fact that all the free world today in tense, and uncertainty and frustration confronts us wherever men—hoping and working for peace—turn. But out of it all comes the brighter picture of more unity, less partisanship and more dependence on our experts in the military and diplomatic fields. Let's hope and pray that a solution will be found, and in the meantime we civilians at home must prepare for our own defense.

Civilian defense against disasters of all kinds is one of the most important problems facing our state today. We were caught short in World War I; we were caught short at Pearl Harbor and we were again caught short in Korea. We must not be found unprepared in case of another worldwide catastrophe.

New Mexico's planning for civilian defense is progressing. At the present time most of the larger cities have completed a civilian defense organization. While the state civilian defense council and the civilian defense director are co-ordinating all work done by local organizations in the state, it is in the final analysis up to the local communities to perfect their own civilian defense plans; at least that is what we have been told by Washington up to this time. I am in hopes that Congress will give us more aid, particularly in the strategic spots like one or two we have here in New Mexico.

We hope that war is not just around the corner. We are merely buying insurance which we hope we will not have to use, but it will save countless lives should disaster strike our state.

I have been very gratified with the co-operation New Mexico has received from many organizations and groups, as well as from town and city councils. The Boy Scouts of America, the Girl Scouts of America, organized labor, the Medical Association, the Hospital Association, the American Legion and other organizations have come forward and offered the state their facilities and their co-operation in setting up a civilian defense program.

The Board of Finance has advanced sufficient funds to staff the headquarters of the state director of civilian defense. The board has also advanced funds to the New Mexico Western College at Silver City to conduct a statewide program for training fire fighters. Fires will be one of our chief hazards in case of emergency.

The next legislature will be called upon to provide funds for civilian defense activities and I hope adequate funds are made available.

The American Red Cross has offered its statewide services to all individuals who desire to take first aid training courses. It has also volunteered its services in training student nurses. Every adult in New Mexico should be trained to give first aid. Such training should be obtained even though there was no possibility of any general disaster.

If there is any community in New Mexico that desires to set up a civilian defense program and has not yet done so, the state office of civilian defense, headed by Brigadier-General Charles G. Sage, the adjutant general, and his assistant, Major Edward Oakley, will be happy to provide all possible help.

On October 30, the U. S. government announced plans to purchase 100 million pounds of clean wool—this, for stockpiling as finished cloth against possible military emergency.

cannot be attained until. Christianity is lived in all nations, becomes a flame in all men's hearts.

On the other hand, "plenty" is a relative term in popular understanding. The word makes me recall the picture in my old school reader showing "The First Thanksgiving" as it was observed by the American pilgrims. The "plenty" in that picture was food—turkey and pumpkin pie and potatoes baked under the coals. The Pilgrims were thankful for their prospects in the new world, for their freedom, and for their "plenty" or sufficiency of food.

The Watchword
 Unquestionably the Pilgrims would have been only a little less thankful had their harvest of foodstuff been considerably less bountiful. Yet "bread"—meaning, in its broadest sense, a sufficiency of food, or "plenty"—has become the great political and social watchword in our strife-torn world. Some people have made "bread" a god. The Communist leaders are marshaling great masses of humanity to make war over it—a war they describe as the "Have Not" against the "Haves."

In sections of Europe, in Asia and especially in the Orient, I have seen countless millions of poverty stricken people whose every waking moment had to be concerned with seeking food for survival. Their agriculture had progressed little in the last thousand years. It is upon these people, uninformed and constantly at grips with hunger, that the Kremlin masters are waging their propaganda war. Had these masses achieved any substantial degree of "plenty" it is doubtful that the Reds would have succeeded so well in this effort.

Our "Plenty"
 Thus "plenty" is a practical stepstone toward peace on earth as well as a humane ideal. We in America have found a recipe for "plenty"—our freedom philosophy in government and our free enterprise economic system. It hasn't made everybody rich but the poorest American citizen is twice as well fed as 99 per cent of Asia's millions—and we are a nation of peace lovers. The degree and the wide distribution of America's "plenty" caused the Communist plotters long ago to give up the idea of violent revolution here. So "plenty" is a factor in war or peace.

Until world grinding, war making Communism is overcome, we need as a nation to concentrate our thinking, and planning, and action on that objective. But if we are victorious there is a great

challenging task awaiting—the expansion of "plenty" to the underdeveloped and unwisely used regions of the earth. We cannot do it by sending federal government funds and a handful of technicians to Borneo and Mandalay; or a steel plant or electric generator to Yugoslavia, or a combine to China.

The Great Hopes
 The two great hopes for future peace and plenty on earth (and the expansion of Christianity) are education and research. Once the world menace of international Communism is overcome, we could take a fraction of the amount of money spent in Europe on the Marshall Plan and bring a million college-age youth to America to learn, first hand, what makes America tick. Those with aptitudes could be kept here

for extended training in the ways American people get things done—in agriculture, in industry, in forestry and mineral development.

Think of what 100,000 Chinese with American agricultural and industrial knowhow, and with a first hand knowledge of our distribution and marketing system, could do in a generation in a free enterprise China! In 25 or 30 years such a force could bring that wallowing backward country upon the road of progress and plenty. The same thing could transpire in every other nation. And during that 30 years, American science, through research would be further exploring and developing the limitless possibilities of God's material blessings to the people of the earth—the natural resources.

New Mexico Magazine Features Villa Raid

Although more than 31 years have passed since Pancho Villa raided Columbus, N. M., "the real cause of the raid still remains an unsolved mystery," one of the eye-witnesses to the raid writes in the December issue of New Mexico Magazine.

Roy E. Stinson, M. D. of Tenaha, Texas, was serving as school principal at Columbus prior to graduation from medical school when the raid occurred on March 9, 1916. He tells how he and his wife "spent three hours of agony and terror listening to occasional bullets striking the house, and to fiendish shouts of 'Viva Villa! Viva Mexico. Muerte a los gringos.'"

The article goes on to describe the death and destruction, the heroism of the telephone operator, and descriptions of other eye-witnesses.

"The reason for the raid on Columbus are vague and unsatisfactory. Above them all stands clearly the fact that Villa intended no general massacre. There was every opportunity for this to have been a general massacre had it been so intended. While horrible deeds were perpetrated, here and there, yet there seems to have been a certain reluctance on the part of the bandits.

"One theory was it was an act of revenge against the United States for permitting Carranza to transport his troops over United States soil to Nogales (Arizona) where they were sent across the border to repel an attack by Villistas on Nogales, Mexico.

"Another explanation, which in the light of subsequent events, seems to bear weight, is that it was part of a deep laid German plot to embroil the United States in a war with Mexico, and thus tie up a large part of our forces so that they would not be available in the event of our intervention in the war against Germany. On the other hand it may have been an expedition made merely for selfish plunder. Thirty-four years have passed since that night of destruction and horror, and still the real cause of the raid remains an unsolved mystery."

Veterans Administration Cautions In Home Buying

Veterans Administration cautions veterans buying homes to be sure they fully understand any contract or document they are asked to sign, before they risk a deposit or down payment on a house.

Inquiries to V-A from veterans indicate they have experienced a variety of difficulties in attempting to buy homes with the aid of V-A guaranteed loans. In most cases, V-A said, the difficulty arose from the veterans' failure to read and understand the sale contracts, and other papers which they signed.

"Most complaints center upon documents which veterans find later are only reservations to purchase, and not firm sale contracts, or upon 'escalator' and 'hostility' clauses included in sales agreements.

While there is nothing illegal in the action of the seller, V-A explained, complaining veterans are convinced they have been cheated, and have requested V-A to protect them.

Actually, there is little V-A can do once a veteran has entered into an agreement with a seller. A contract or sales agreement is a private matter over which V-A has no control. Consequently, V-A urges veterans to be careful, and get all questions fully and clearly answered by the selling agency or other qualified counsel before signing such agreements.

State Coal Reserves Total Sixty-One Billion Tons

New Mexico coal reserves totaling 61 billion tons, recently appraised by the Geological Survey, constitute an important source of energy for the state's present needs and for future industrialization of the West, Secretary of the Interior Oscar L. Chapman said recently.

The results of the Geological Survey's appraisal of New Mexico coal resources are contained in a new report summarizing in tabular form, data on New Mexico coal reserves in each coal field and each county, by rank, thickness of bed and overburden, and by the relative abundance of re-

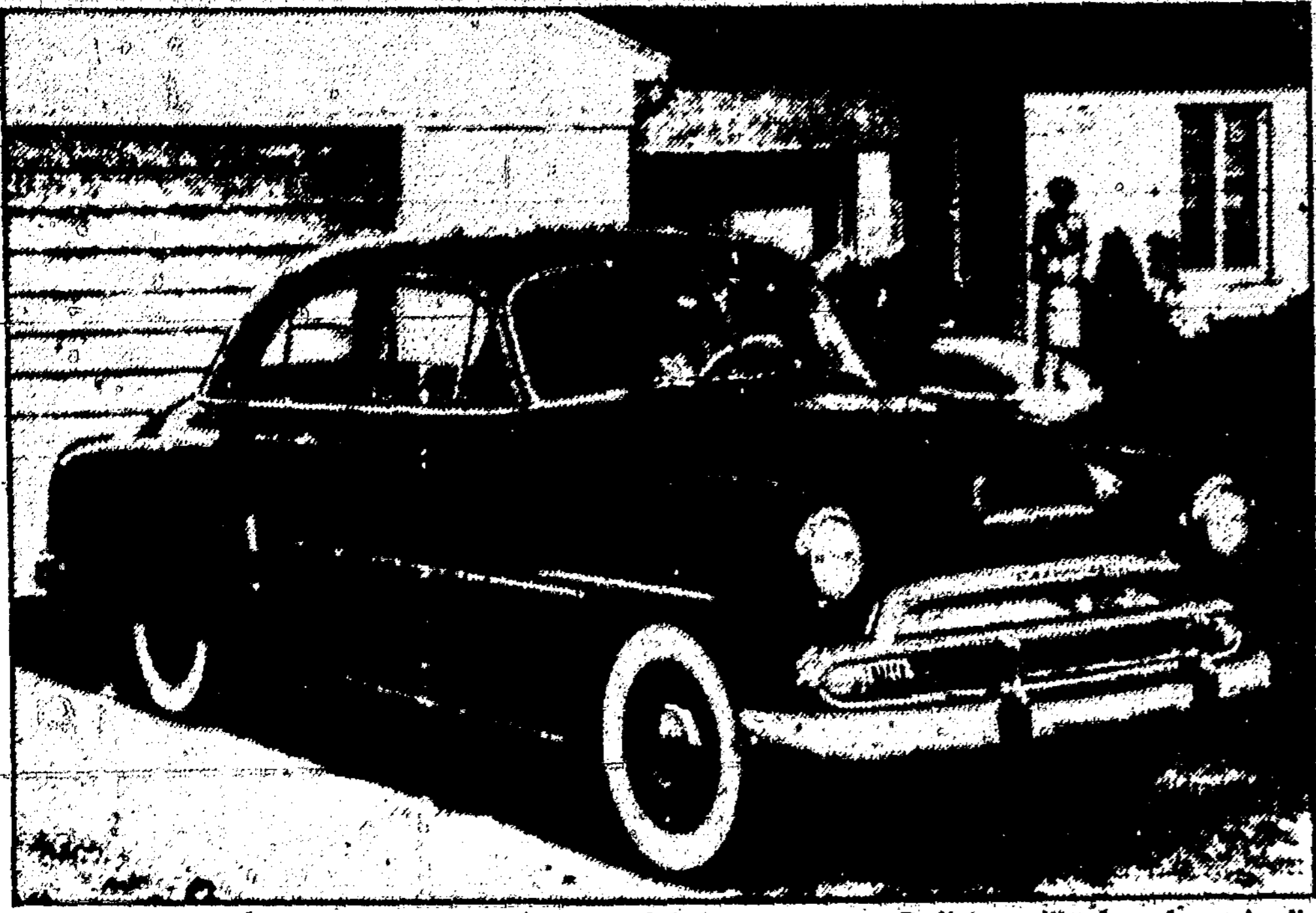

Household Workers To Be Under SS January 1

Now the housewife who hires a maid can breathe more easily. Rumors of elaborate account keeping, report filling and other time consuming obligations under social security are set at rest. The Bureau of Internal Revenue and the Social Security Administration have unwrapped their plan for reporting regular household workers who come under social security on January 1.

J. Haasler Strickland, manager of the Roswell office of the Social Security Administration, displayed a small envelope. It is a one-piece, pre-addressed return envelope. There is space on the inner flap for the essential but brief items on the employer's wage, and a pocket for transmitting the social security tax. That's all! Strickland estimates that about 3,000 housewives in New Mexico will need this envelope form. They will be used for making the first reports on regular household employees in April, 1939.

Under the new social security law, household workers who are paid as much as \$50 by one employer in a calendar quarter and who have worked for that one employer on 24 days or more in that quarter, or the preceding quarter, will have their wages count toward old age and survivors insurance.

Before January 1, every regularly employed household worker should have a social security account number card. The Roswell Social Security Administration office is the place to get it. Right away, every housewife should read the booklet, "Do You Have A Maid?" Copies of it may be secured free of charge from the social security office in Roswell. The back page of this informative booklet is a postage free post card addressed to the Collector of Internal Revenue, Albuquerque. When mailed, it will place the housewife on the list for the March mailing of the envelope report form.

Rifle Association Extends Program To Air Rifles

The National Rifle Association has announced the extension of its junior rifle marksmanship program to include the air rifle. The extended NRA program will make available to the young users of air rifles the same adult supervised competitive shooting program which in the last quarter century has trained more than 2,500,000 teenagers in high schools, prep schools and organized shooting clubs, the safe handling of .22 caliber rifles without an injury.

All NRA shooting will be done under adult supervision. First the youths will be taught the safe handling of the gun. Then he will shoot through the qualification courses going from tyro to marksmanship to sharpshooter to expert to distinguished rifleman. All phases will be properly recognized by the NRA with medals, bracelets, etc.

The long range program will offer a competitive picture in which the young marksmanship will shoot for club, district, state and national team and individual championships. The matches will be conducted both on a pistol and shoulder-to-shoulder basis with the proper trophies and prizes.

According to NRA officials, the entire program was designed to instill the spirit of clean competition in the youngster to make him conscious of the potentialities of his gun and to make his chosen sport a national asset instead of a dangerous liability.

Ancho Man Named Chief Lincoln County Deputy

The appointment of Ben Smith, Ancho, as chief deputy sheriff in Lincoln County was announced this week by Sheriff S. M. Ortiz. Smith's appointment has been approved by the county commissioners, Ortiz added.

The new deputy replaces Clyde Atwood, who is in the U. S. military service and stationed at Fort Knox, Ky.

The proposed act would serve as a basic law to govern grazing on all public lands in the West including both forest and public domain.

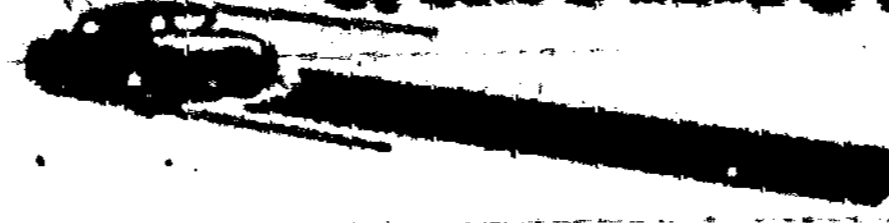

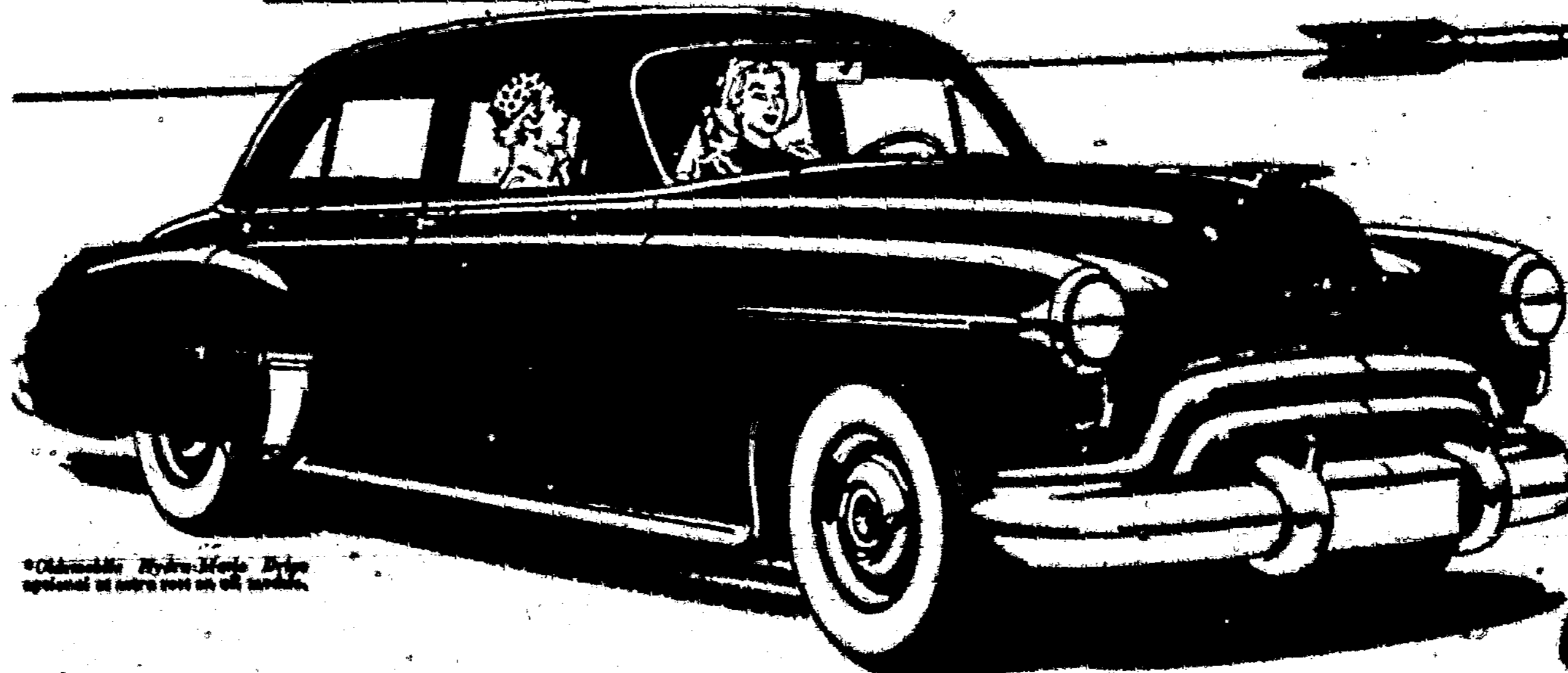

there," Roberts said, "and I wouldn't go. "But Barlow drank a heap and he was half shot at the time. He went right into the trap and was killed, not me."

Roberts refused to answer questions about being wounded in gun battles at Mocking Bird Gap and at Stinking Springs. These were put to him by Will Robinson, pioneer New Mexico newspaperman who is himself past 80 and known as a historian of the Lincoln County war.

Morrison, meanwhile, told newsmen he first became interested in the Billy the Kid case while he was associated with the N. F. Roberts accounting and law firm at Beaumont, Texas. He said Roberts and the man who claims to be Billy the Kid are distant relatives.

"We are satisfied," Morrison said, "that this man is not an impostor but is the real Billy the Kid."

Morrison and Roberts headed back to Albuquerque after the interview with the governor.

Morrison would not comment on what he intends to do now in the affair.

Will A. Keleher, Albuquerque attorney and former newspaperman, who has made an extensive study of Billy the Kid's history, said he believed the governor's decision to disregard the latest pretender's attempt for recognition was correct. He said:

"I'm not surprised to learn the death of Billy the Kid was confirmed once more. If the Kid wasn't killed at Fort Sumner on July 14, 1881, a lot of intelligent people living at that time were badly fooled."

He continued: "Two nationally known writers investigated the death and wrote about it. Emerson Hough, one time resident of White Oaks, in Lincoln County, had a book called 'The Story of the Outlaw,' published and Walter Noble Burns, who wrote the 'Saga of Billy the Kid.'"

Other old timers who knew quite a bit about the days when the 21-year-old outlaw was riding high in Lincoln County, were inclined to agree with Keleher.

Ruidoso Site Of Athletic District Meeting Monday

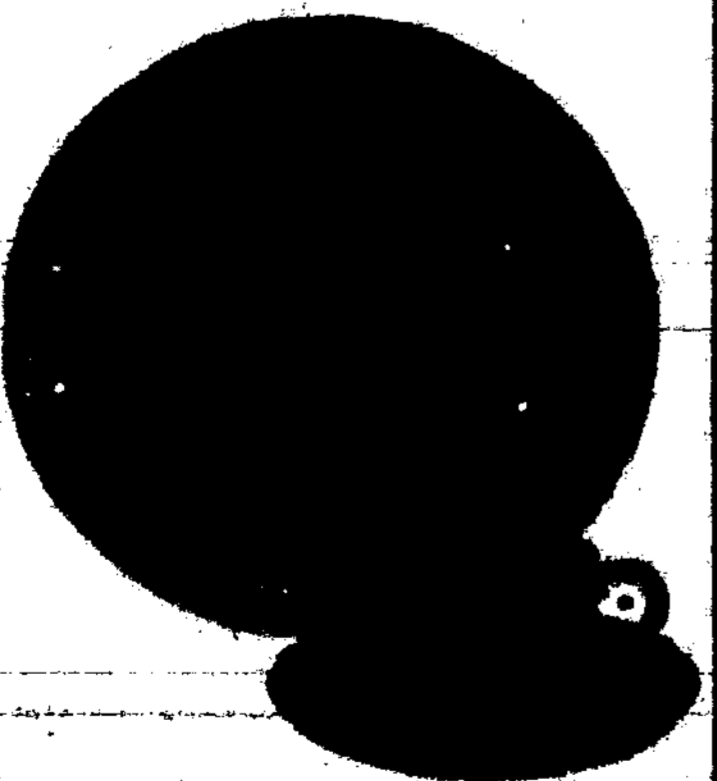
A meeting was held in Ruidoso Monday evening concerning the new district which was voted in by the Athletic Association of New Mexico.
