Special Church Services Set

Carrizozo churches are holding special Christmas services this year.

The local Baptist Church held their annual Christmas service Thursday night with Jerry Graves in charge. The church members sang Christmas carols, and the small children presented a program of Christmas poems and stories.

Afterwards, the church members gathered around a decorated Christmas tree where gifts of candy, fruit and nuts were distributed to all the children.

The Baptist revival meetings will begin Sunday night and continue each night thereafter for the next two weeks. Rev. C. F. Booth, Floyd, N. M., is the evangelist who will officiate.

The Santa Rita Catholic Church will conduct Christmas masses as follows:

December 23, Ancho; December 24, Piecho, 6 o'clock; Hondo at 8 and Lincoln at 10; December 25, Carrizozo, midnight; Capitán, 6 and Carrizozo at 8.

Confessions: Saturday, December 23, 3 to 5 P. M., 7 to 9 P. M.; Sunday, December 24, 7 to 10 P. M.

The Methodists have planned a Sunday school Christmas program for Friday night, December 22, about 7 o'clock. Mrs. T. A. Spence Jr. is directing the members of the beginners, primary and intermediate classes in their pantomime on the story of the "Birth of Christ." Their presentation will stress good fellowship and love for all mankind, regardless of race, creed or color.

Miss Frances Degner will play the role of The Madonna.

The youth group, composed of high school students, will precede the players in a service of worship, which will be opened with a congregational hymn. Miss Elaine Shultz will read the scripture and will be followed by Yeda Lou Branum singing a Christmas song. Miss Carol Hadley will give the prayer, after which the special Christmas offering will be taken for the Methodist Home in Waco, Texas.

Miss Daisy Dickenson is directing the youth group.

Carrizozo Grizzlies Lose Two Games

The Carrizozo High School basketball team lost their second straight overtime game by a narrow margin in Friday night's contest here with the Tularosa Wildcats, 35-34. The Grizzlies have lost three games this season by a one-point margin.

The Zozites scored first and were leading at the end of the first period. The Wildcats tied the score at half, 14-14, and were ahead 26-20 in the third period. The Grizzlies came from behind in the last period to again tie the score, 33-33.

The local team scored first in the three minute overtime one a free throw, but the visiting cagers hit back with a basket to take a one-point lead which they held to the final horn.

Jimmy Barnett led the scoring parade for the Zozites with 22 points—eight baskets and six straight charity tosses.

A. Marrujo, Tularosa, was high with 15 markers for the out-of-town team.

The B game was a win for Carrizozo with the junior squad dumping the Tularosans, 34-26.

At half time the senior class at the local high school disposed of a fruit cake to raise funds for their annual trip.

The Carrizozo A game with Clouderot there on Saturday night followed the same pattern as seen by the Carrizozo fans this year. For the fifth time in eight games the Zozites lost by only three points. The final score of Saturday's game was 33-30. At half time the score was tied, 17-17.

The process of the game saw the score tied and the lead change hands at least a dozen times.

Clouderot has a good man in Norman Lane, who scored 25 of their 33 points. Jimmy Barnett was high for Carrizozo with 15 points. The Grizzlies bagged six out of 17 free throws for 38 percent while Clouderot netted nine out of 13 for 69 percent.

So far this season, the local team has lost five games by a total of eight points and played three overtime tilts.

Carrizozo Coach M. S. Mirimanian stated it is his hope that later in the season, especially at tournament time when games are even more important, the local team will be out in the lead, when the final whistle is blown, with the one or two points by which they have been losing so far this season.

Carrizozo's B team defeated Clouderot 25-20 Saturday night in a slow and deliberate game. The halftime score was 11-8, Carrizozo, with the Zozites displaying some of the polish which will be apparent by the time they make the varsity team.

Carrizozo's high point men were Ignacio Lopez, 7; Tino Lopez and Joe Lucias, 5 points each.

Lu Davis was high man for Clouderot with eight points.

Carrizozo's percentage of free throws was poor, bagging only three out of nine for 33 percent; to Clouderot's eight out of 13 for 63 percent.

The local team is not scheduled to play again until January 5, when they meet Roswell there. On January 6, Eunace's cagers will come to Carrizozo for a tilt.

Carrizozon Returns From Korean Theater Of War

Home on a short leave is James Morris, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Morris, Carrizozo, who saw action in the Korean theater. Morris, who is in the U. S. Navy, reported there are many dirty and illiterate Koreans and that poverty is prevalent among them.

It is a common sight, the local man said, to see the natives taking their baths in the harbors, after work, and then putting back on their dirty clothes.

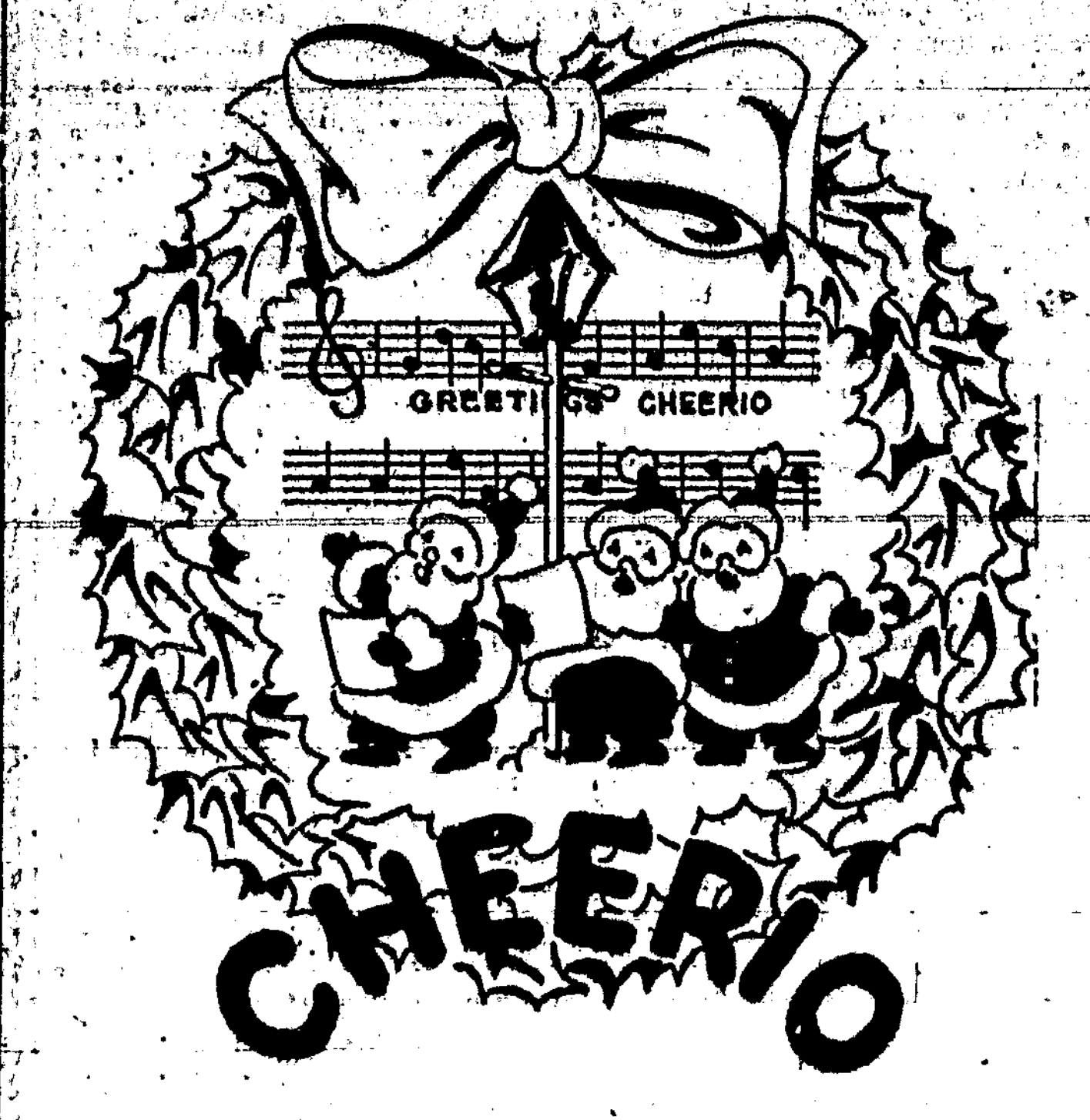
Morris said depression was rampant when he was in Fusan, a main shipping point. The Carrizozon said he also noticed a number of South Korean men, apparently physically able to be in the Korean army, who appeared to be just loafing.

Soap is a prized item, according to Morris, and brings huge prices. Evidently, the Koreans are willing to use the soap if they can get it.

Many of the Korean women work in the fields with the men. At the time young Morris was there, it took 900 Korean yen to make a dollar in American money, and two cans of beer sold for 3,000 yen.

The common dress of Korean men consists of cotton shirts, work trousers and wooden shoes. Conditions are far from sanitary in many places, the local man said, with open sewers in cities and elsewhere. The majority of the people live in huts with mud walls.

Morris, who will return to the West Coast shortly for reassignment, said he was glad to be back in civilization.



Walker Air Base Soldier Rescued In Mountains

The rescue of Private William M. Moody, Walker Air Base, Roswell, about 7 P. M. last Sunday in the Capitan Mountains was effected by Sheriff S. M. Ortiz and Forest Ranger Dean Earl after Moody had been lost since about 11 A. M.

Ortiz received a call about 4 P. M. December 17 and went directly to the area of search where he was joined by Earl.

The Lincoln County men sighted the fire Moody had built, and came upon him shortly afterwards, huddled by the blaze to keep warm.

Moody, in company with four others from Walker Air Base, had been on a hunt for Christmas trees for the base.

The soldier wandered away from his party and was gone about 30 minutes when he realized he was lost. He traveled over a lot of territory in the mountains and built a fire at night-fall.

Moody was about one-half mile south of the Merchant ranch when found. As he sighted his rescuers, the soldier exclaimed, "Am I glad to see someone!" He had had nothing to eat since 7 A. M. Moody did not suffer physically, however, from his adventure.

Sheriff Ortiz stated Ranger Earl is familiar with every inch of the area, and the quick rescue was due to the great assistance given by Earl.

City Gets Civilian Defense Council

Carrizozo's mayor, Vernon Petty, announced this week the formation of a Civilian Defense Council for the village.

The mayor said, "The Civilian Defense Council is presently operating on a volunteer basis. Any person desiring to offer his or her services to assist the program may do so by contacting Alva P. Sliton Jr., director of personnel. Assignments will be made according to the requirements of each particular service, and, insofar as possible, to conform with the qualifications of the individual.

"At this time," Petty said, "it is not expected Carrizozo will be subjected to military attack of any type. Probably our major role would be confined to caring for large numbers of displaced and transient persons, a job which would require the combined and coordinated efforts of every individual in Carrizozo."

Members of the executive committee of the Carrizozo Civilian Defense Council are Vernon Petty, Alva P. Sliton Jr., Father Vito C. de Baca, Mrs. Lorene Casey and Roy Harmon.

Defense council committee and their chairmen are: Alva P. Sliton Jr., personnel; L. Z. Manire, supply; W. H. Nickols, communication; Dr. J. P. Turner, medical and health; B. O. Barnum, industrial and plant protection; Fay Harkey, rescue and clearance; Marvin Roberts, traffic and transportation; Sheriff S. M. Ortiz, internal security; Edith Crawford, housing; Lee I. Carl, air raid warning service; Lawrence Queen, engineering and public works; Rev. Ray Miller, auxiliary police; Carrizozo Volunteer Fire Department, auxiliary fire; Les Kinnard, publicity; Father De Baca, survey; Roy Harmon, evacuation, and Mrs. Lorene Casey, welfare.

Mayor Petty also reported circulars are being distributed to give residents of the village information concerning precautions to take in the event an A-bomb attack should be made. He stated L. Z. Manire, Carrizozo school superintendent, is making the circulars available to the students of Carrizozo grade and high schools through the teachers. The Sisters at the Santa Rita School will see that each student there is given one of these circulars, together with an explanation of it.

The local Boy Scout troop will assume the responsibility for house to house distribution of the circulars.

In the event of an emergency it is contemplated the Boy Scouts in Carrizozo will be used to perform messenger service and render any possible aid.

Alva P. Sliton Jr., local theater owner, has announced he will hold a special showing for the newly formed defense council of the film "You Can Beat the A-Bomb" which is scheduled at the Lyric today (Friday) and tomorrow. The exact time of the special showing of this film is not available as we go to press.

The next regular session will be held January 19 at 3 P. M. in the club house, with Mrs. W. H. Nickols in charge of the program.

Once again American armed forces are in action trying to protect and uphold the ideal of freedom. Once again the spirit of Christmas will be mocked by the hate and bloodshed of the battlefield.

In many American homes the roar of the cannon will make it hard to hear the ringing of the Christmas bells. That is to be deeply regretted, but throughout history the torch of man's dignity and freedom has been held aloft only through the sacrifice of its bearers.

We can do little to prevent such personal tragedies. But we can do a lot to prevent another kind of tragedy which is equally poignant at the Christmas season—and more cruel because it is needless.

We refer to the preventable tragedy of accidents. The National Safety Council has called for intensive accident prevention effort during the holidays—usually a very dangerous period of the year.

That is an objective which has our wholehearted support, not only because it is better to have a joyous Yuletide, but also because we cannot afford to waste the resources of manpower and material so necessary these days to our national strength.

The waste is enormous—much more than most persons realize. The American Medical Association has shown that accidents rob the nation of more working years than any disease, because accidents strike all age groups, not just those whose productive years are largely behind them.

The traffic accident problem this year is serious, with a death toll of 35,000 in prospect. That would be the largest number of automobile victims since the record year of 1941.

Rigid enforcement of the laws by state, county and municipal police, plus individual determination to play it safe, can keep the Christmas spirit—and all of us—alive this year.

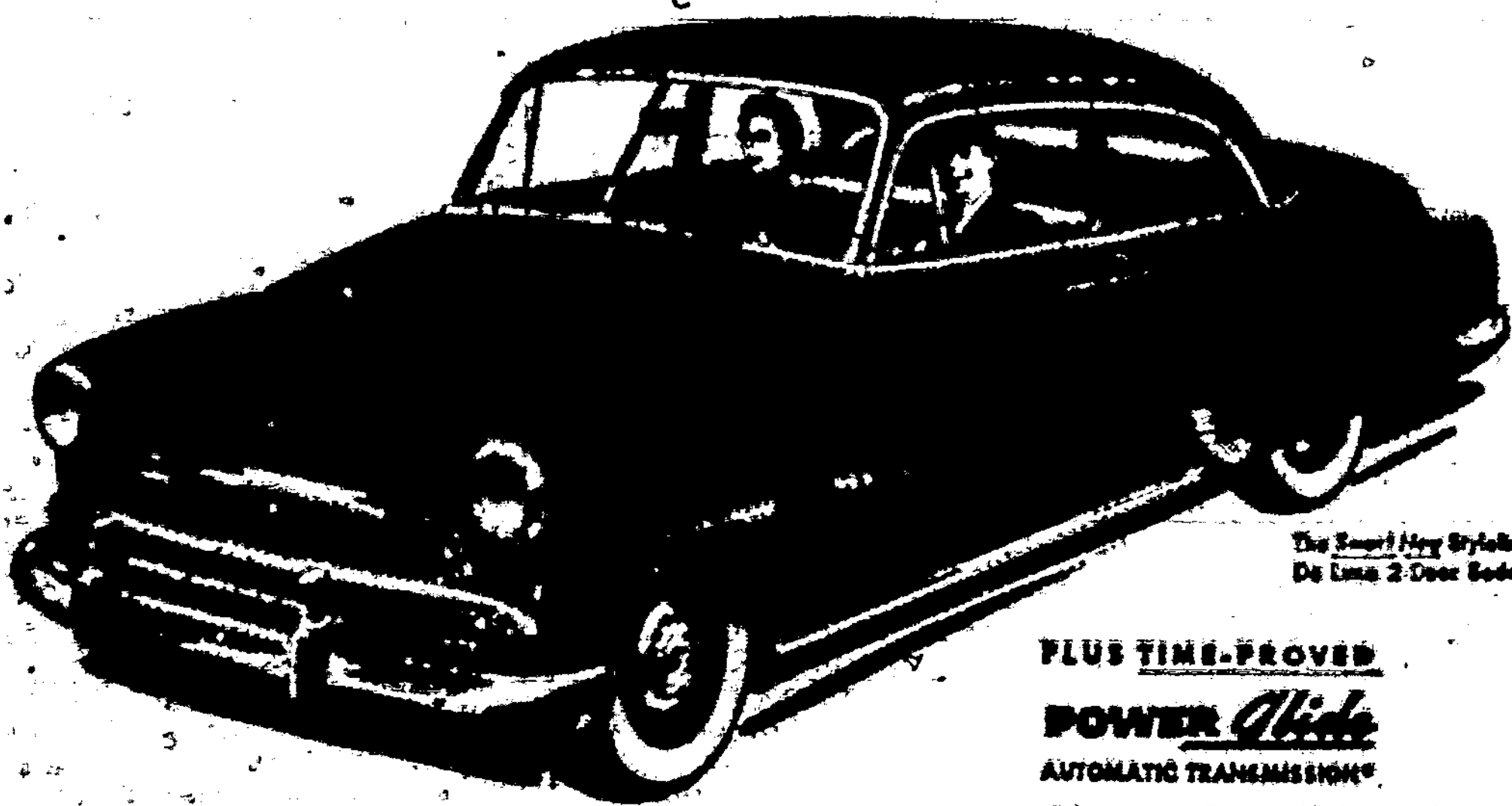

Lowell C. Like, manager of the VA hospital at Fort Bayard, warned that many patients will be endangering their own health as well as that of their families and communities, if they insist on taking a Christmas vacation.

Tuberculosis veterans who have an active infection will not receive permission to leave the hospital, the managers said. As in the past, however, when in the opinion of the doctors the patient has progressed beyond the infectious stage and for whom a brief interruption in treatment will not be harmful, passes will be issued. Such cases are in a small minority in both hospitals, they said. Furloughs for general medical and surgical cases will be considered also on the basis of medical feasibility but somewhat more leniently.

Minceat Pie Holds Wealth Of Tradition

A wealth of tradition is covered by the crust of the Yuletide minceat pie.

Although few people today know it, the pie represents the cradle of the Christ Child surrounded by the gifts of the Magi. It was made originally in oval form, to symbolize the cradle, and the varied ingredients were the gifts.

At one time minceat pie was banned, and at still another time in its history, it was the cause of Christmas itself being abolished for a brief period.

For many years in England during the time of Oliver Cromwell, the custom of feasting and drinking at Christmas was re-

garded as worldly and sensual, and the more strict Puritans refused to eat minceat pie during the holiday season. This prejudice was finally overcome after the Restoration.

In the New World, during the first half century after the Pilgrims' arrival at Plymouth, similar troubles caused the banning of minceat pies and Christmas. In 1659, and for several years thereafter, there was no Christmas in New England as a result of an argument over the shape and meaning of minceat pies. Eventually the indignation spent itself, and the ban was lifted.

History, tradition and its own merits have made minceat pie one of the most interesting of all food products—rightfully occupying its place of honor at the Yuletide feast.

An Samuel Pepys stated in his famous diary about his 1662 Christmas dinner:

"We had, besides a good chine of beef and other good cheer, 18 minceat pies."

3. Toilet articles such as shaving lotion, comb, hairdressing soap and the like.
4. Stationery, pens, pencils,

greeting cards and other similar items:

5. Handkerchiefs and socks.
6. New phonograph records after a patient's musical tastes have been learned.

Gifts in the following categories are not required, and should not be sent patients:

1. Used books, magazines, playing cards, puzzles and games. Items such as these are secured new and in sufficient quantity by the hospitals.
 2. Candy and cookies to individual patients who, in many cases, are on special diets. Bulk gifts of candy and cookies, however, may be sent to a hospital, where they will be distributed to those who can eat them.
- As another "don't," VA asked that names of patients not be requested for the purpose of sending gifts or correspondence. The agency is not permitted to furnish such names to the public.

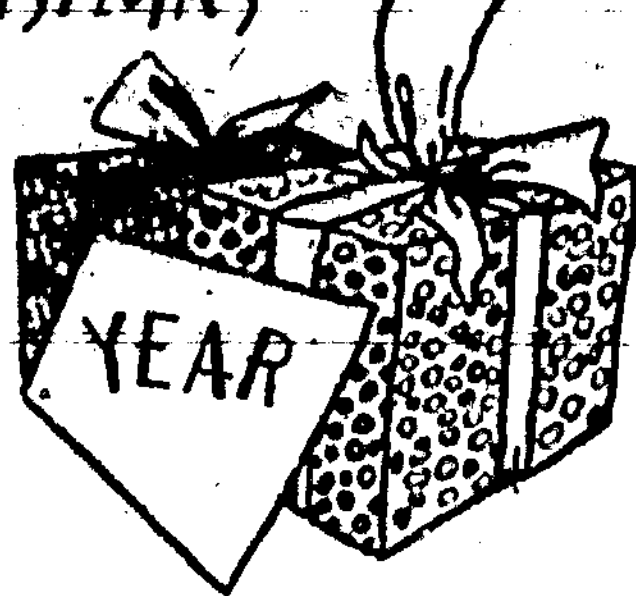

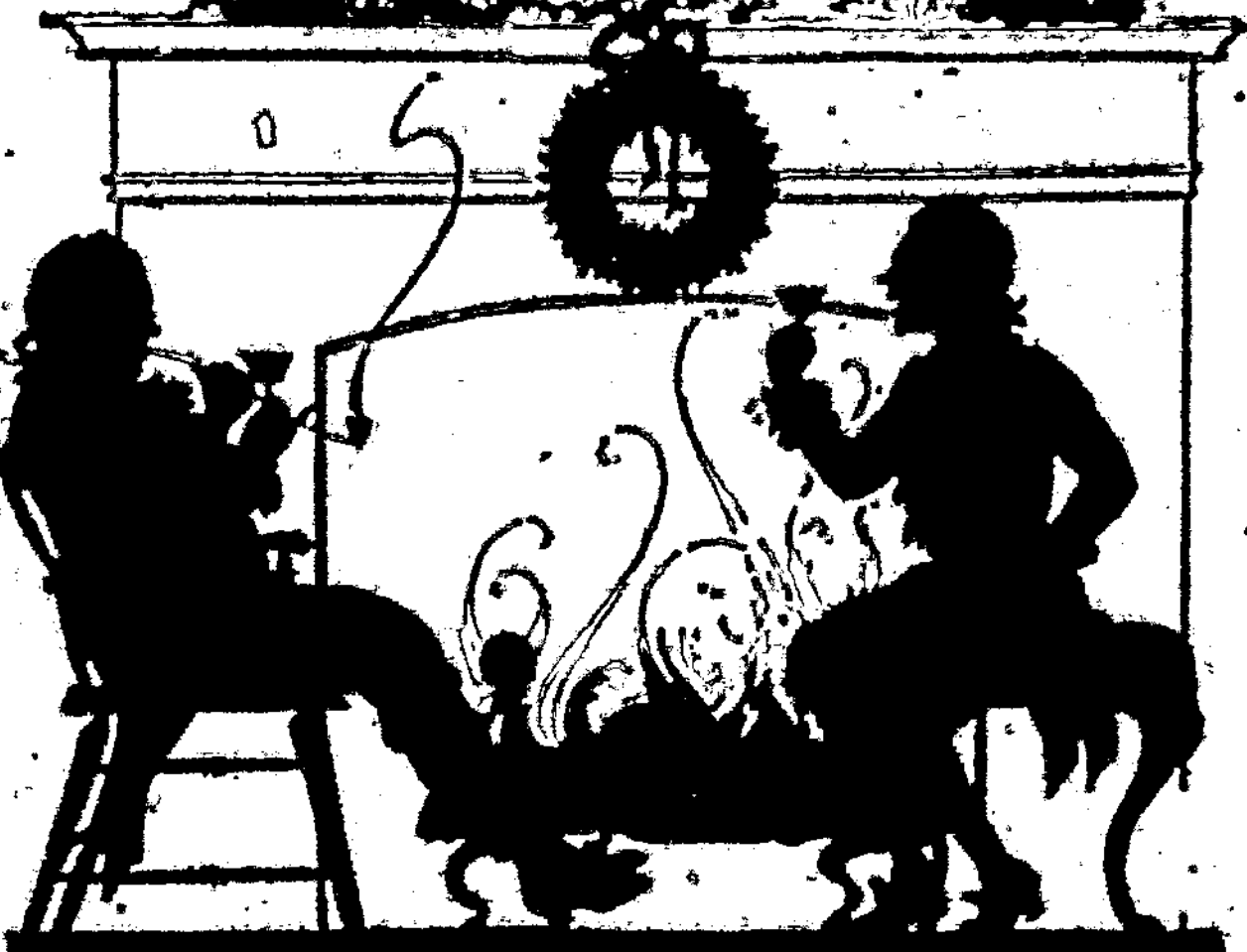

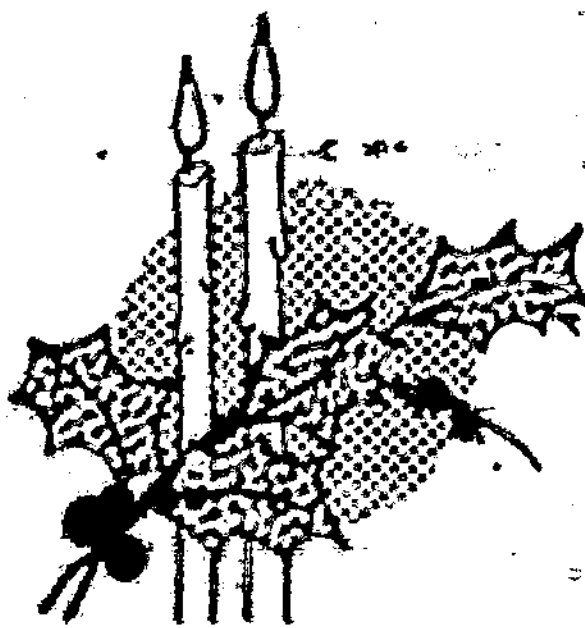

The rinse consists of nine ounces of borax, four ounces of boric acid and one gallon of warm water. Mix the borax and half the water until dissolved, then mix the boric acid with the rest of the water. Combine the two and dip the garments to be flameproofed in the mixture.

Anything that's safe in water can be rinsed in the solution. It should be applied each time the material is washed, since the mixture washes off. For heavy drapes or furniture upholstery, the solution can be sprayed on.
