Phone Strike Stand Told

The Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company announced recently their position with regard to the requests of the leaders of the Communications Workers of America, CIO.

The company stated present contracts with the union require 30 days notice for termination, and neither the company nor the union has given such notice. According to the telephone company, strikes were first threatened for February 8, then February 24, and now scheduled for April 25.

W. F. Ratliff, local manager for the telephone company, has released the following basic wage rates for a 40-hour week in Carrizozo:

Operators with one year's experience earn a basic pay of \$34 weekly, or \$147.90 per month.

Operators with four years experience earn a basic pay of \$40 weekly, or \$174 per month.

Those who have advanced to the top rate for operators receive a basic rate of \$42 weekly, or \$182.70 monthly.

Service assistants (operators with additional non-supervisory responsibility) who constitute about 11 per cent of the switchboard operating force, receive about 18 per cent more than operators.

The above rates are for day work, 40 hours per week. Extra pay is given for scheduled evening, night, Sunday and holiday work.

In addition to the basic wages, the company states the following benefits are given to employees at no extra cost to them:

In accordance with length of service, sick and accident pay up to one year at full pay, and death benefits up to one year's pay. Pensions based on salary and service, but at least \$100 per month adjusted for social security for employees over 65 with 20 or more years of service.

Up to three weeks vacation with full pay.

Eight holidays without loss of pay.

The telephone company said too low wages are unfair to employees, and too high wages are unfair to telephone rate payers. They stated their belief the demands of the union should be settled at the bargaining table, and settlement based on facts and conditions present in the territory served by the company. The company said arbitration or fact finding is unsuitable as a substitute for collective bargaining.

School Children Intensify Drive For Clothing

Bags and cartons of used clothing mounted in New Mexico schools as over 100,000 New Mexico school children intensified their efforts to raise 100,000 pounds of clothing by Friday afternoon for distribution by Save The Children Federation in Europe, on American Indian Reservation, and in isolated rural areas of the South.

Charles L. Rose, New Mexico chairman of the Ninth National Children's Clothing Crusade, today urged New Mexico residents to go through their stored clothing and prepare bundles of good clothing that is outgrown or which they cannot use and send the bundles to school by their children or a neighbor's child. Cooperating with New Mexico's school children in the clothing drive is the New Mexico Motor Carriers Association who are donating free transportation for the clothing collected.

A. & M. Man Loaned To Census Bureau

Extension Leader Albert Travis, Jas. Cruces A. & M., has been loaned to the Bureau of Census to train additional census takers in New Mexico. He was in Carrizozo April 13 and 14 to meet with Mrs. Vera Queen and Mrs. Huffmeyer regarding training as census takers.

District Supervisor Mrs. Marjorie Schmid and her assistant, Clark Smith, were in Carrizozo and White Oaks April 12 to check on census progress in Lincoln County.

Two Escape Injury In Train-Track Car Crash

Jack Turner, Carrizozo, signal maintainer for the Southern Pacific Railroad, narrowly escaped death or serious injury last Tuesday in the collision of his track motor car and train 39. The collision occurred about 2:50 P. M. at Robsart, six miles east of Carrizozo.

No. 39, a doubleheader west-bound passenger train, was traveling about 60 miles per hour on the main track when it struck the track motor car. Turner was in charge of the car and had a helper with him.

They had been painting signals until their spray gun got out of order. Engrossed in the repair of the gun, they failed to notice the approach of the train until too late to remove the motor car from the main track. The men escaped by jumping but the motor car was demolished. No damage was done to the train, although the engine presented a somewhat unusual appearance as a result of being sprayed with the paint Turner and his helper had been using.

REA Claims Purchase Price Set With City

W. L. Wingfield, Cloudercroft, REA manager, said this week the city of Carrizozo and REA have been in agreement on the purchase price of the local power plant for more than a year.

Wingfield stated he and P. B. Hendricks, Cloudercroft, former manager for REA, had appeared before Carrizozo City Council sometime ago and that the council and REA were in agreement upon the price, but the sale is held up pending settlement of several legal questions. He added Carrizozo's power will come from a main line at Tularosa.

Wingfield also told The News-Outlook work was started this week on lines serving Alto, Angus, Bonita, Nogal and ranches in the area. He explained the lines are for distribution only and are not transmission lines. The lines will come to within six miles of Carrizozo, according to Wingfield, and about 40 men are needed for the work. He said seven of the crew have arrived at Capitán and that local men will be used wherever possible.

The work started at Hollywood. J. D. Neece is in charge of the crew of workers. Wingfield added they have experienced difficulty in locating housing in Capitán for their crew.

Wingfield stated he felt confident Capitán's power troubles have been eliminated by the repairs which REA has made on the Hondo Valley line. He pointed out Capitán electric rates under REA are approximately half those now current in Carrizozo.

Carrizozo's mayor, Vernon Petty told The News-Outlook REA men had talked with the city officials sometime ago and various surveys were made, but the city has not as yet received an offer from REA to buy the plant, and no purchase price has been quoted. Petty said the city had informed the REA by letter, after the initial verbal discussions, they were willing to consider any offer the REA might care to make. The mayor added the REA attorney had consulted with the bondholders, but no offer was made to the city officials.

Petty stated Carrizozo residents can be assured if and when REA makes an offer, it will be brought to their attention, and the city's offer to REA for proposal of negotiations is still open.

Woman's Club To Hear Talk On Decoration

At their April 21 meeting, the members of the Carrizozo Woman's Club will hear how they may be their own interior decorators through the use of paints.

A Phoenix representative of a paint concern is scheduled to appear before the group to speak on the importance of color in home decoration. He will explain how decorative color schemes may be achieved by skillful use of paints.

Arrangements for the speaker to come to Carrizozo were made through the courtesy of the Nickels Building and Hardware Company. Mr. Nickels reported the speaker is especially qualified to speak on the type of paints best suited to dry climates.

Postmaster Knows The Consequences

Some citizens of Truth or Consequences were up in arms this week over refusal of the U. S. Post Office Department to recognize the town's new name.

According to Vincent Burke, deputy assistant postmaster general, the town will continue as Hot Springs.

The town voted March 31 to change the name to Truth or Consequences in honor of the tenth anniversary broadcast in the health resort on April 1. Burke wrote Robert R. Smith, president of the chamber of commerce in T. or C., that it was "inadvisable" to use a three-word form on a cancellation and that it also was "inadvisable from a service standpoint."

"Too long a name?" Smith asked. "Maybe Mr. Burke should look in one of his well known postal books. Any postal clerk can tell you that much longer names are on post offices all over the United States. It's inconceivable that a man of Mr. Burke's stature can be so misled as to believe that he can arbitrarily say to us that we can't take any name we like and use it as a mailing address, and in effect that's what he's trying."

"We won't have a no-man's land in our federal post office building," Smith declared.

State Senator Burton Roach, secretary of the T. or C. Chamber of Commerce, and Mayor T. B. Williams pointed out there is no town in New Mexico legally named Hot Springs. The new mayor and council recently were sworn in as officials of Truth or Consequences.

Carrizozo Baseball Team Takes First Two Games

Playing before a large crowd in both games, the Carrizozo baseball team won hard fought battles from the Alamogordo Black Sox Sunday morning and the San Antonio team in the afternoon.

In the afternoon game, the Zoolites emerged from a slugfest as winners over San Antonio by a score of 14-11. The game was highlighted by the appearance of Jesus Gonzales, El Paso, as pitcher for Carrizozo.

Local Firm To Handle Westinghouse Line

Nickels Building and Hardware announces they are now handling the complete line of appliances manufactured by Westinghouse. They added this line includes the small as well as major appliances. Nickels stated they will also make service calls on Westinghouse appliances in need of repairs.

First Flood Control Contract Slated

Formal public signing of contracts for the first construction of the Middle Rio Grande Flood Control and Reclamation Project in New Mexico counties of Rio Arriba, Sandoval, Bernalillo, Valencia and Socorro will be celebrated in Albuquerque May 3, according to John P. Murphy, executive secretary of the Flood Control Association.

An attendance of 25,000 middle valley residents is expected at the elaborate ceremony to be held at the state fair grounds.

High point in the celebration will be the signing of contracts by an executive of the Corps of Army Engineers for construction of the first units of this project, authorized by the flood control act of 1948 and for which \$3,500,000 has since been appropriated. Ultimate cost of the project, designed to harness the Rio Grande from Espanola in Rio Arriba County to the headquarters of Elephant Butte reservoir in Socorro County, is estimated at \$73,000,000.

The contracts to be signed by Colonel Louis W. Prentiss, Dallas, division engineer, southwestern division, Army Engineers Corps, on May 3, cover only preliminary work on Jemez River dam and reservoir in Sandoval County, 20 miles north of Albuquerque. To that city and towns and villages throughout 180 miles of the middle valley project, it means an eventual end to the constant threat of floods which, in the past, have caused millions of dollars of damage.

It means also eventual return to production large acreages of farm lands which now are useless water rights because they have been subirrigated or turned into swamps by the meandering river bed.

The residents of the middle valley realize they have a long struggle ahead for the authorizations and appropriations required to complete the huge and costly project, but they look forward to the day of completion with confidence.

Federal Judge Sam G. Bratton, Albuquerque, is to be master of ceremonies. U. S. Senator Dennis Chavez, N. M., who spearheaded the fight for the project in Congress, will be the honor guest and principal speaker. Other speakers include business leaders from points along the Rio Grande in Colorado to West Texas, members of Congress, heads of several interested governmental agencies and state officials.

Prior to the formal program, representatives of nine Indian pueblos in the middle valley will be presented in their respective ritualistic dances.

Representatives of Army and Air Force bases at Kirtland, Sandia and Los Alamos Fields will join with veteran organizations in posting of colors. An invocation will precede the speaking program. The signing of the Jemez dam contracts by Colonel Prentiss concludes the program.

Bids for the preliminary work on Jemez dam and reservoir were opened by Army engineers in Albuquerque on April 20. A second contract to be awarded in June covers construction of the outlet works. Construction of the dam is planned for December, 1951, provided Congress appropriates the added funds to permit the work.

Child Welfare To Be Considered First: Welck

Too many high school teachers are more concerned with academic subject matter than they are with the welfare of their students, according to Dr. A. A. Welck, head of testing and counseling at the University of New Mexico.

By student welfare, Dr. Welck takes in every aspect of the development of the high school pupil: his intellect, emotions, physical being, moral values, skills and aptitudes, recreations, esthetic values, religious concepts, social adjustments, and his environment situation. Basing his lecture on the hope that counseling will soon become an integral part of professional training for all high school teachers, Dr. Welck outlined before the delegates to the south-central district of the NMEA meeting in Ruidoso, last Friday, 14 aims in dealing with all types of students.

Among the principal goals were: making the student feel at home in his school environment, create satisfactory living conditions in home and school, assist students in wise selection of studies, help students achieve a sense of being accepted by suitable groups, develop good mental and physical habits.

Aid in developing acceptable and effective ways of expressing emotions, develop lively and significant interests, learn value of time and money, and vice versa of each, urge progressively more mature vocational interests and plans, bring out individuality and a sense of social responsibility.

Foster sense of values, encourage flexibility and consideration for others, teach youngsters socially acceptable adjustments in dealing with opposite sex, and create a feeling of responsibility in assuming obligations as a citizen of the community.

REA Activities

Construction was begun Thursday, April 13, on 120 miles of Rural Electrification power lines in the region served by the Otero-Lincoln County Electric Cooperative.

Walker L. Wingfield, electrical superintendent and acting manager for the local REA cooperative, announced at the monthly board meeting in Cloudercroft April 12 that the REA in Washington had approved the bid for the construction submitted by the firm.

P. B. Hendricks Praised In accepting the resignation of P. B. Hendricks as manager of the cooperative, members of the board at the April 12 meeting expressed their appreciation to Mr. Hendricks for his loyal and efficient service to the cooperative.

Mr. Hendricks, during his three years service as manager, carried the cooperative through some of its most important developments. This included the planning of the line from Hollywood down the Ruidoso to Hondo; construction of a 33 K. V. line to Fort Stanton and Capitan, and the engineering and planning of the lines now under construction and others to be built in the near future.

Mr. Hendricks resigned as manager of the co-operative to devote full time to his real estate and other business interests in his home city of Cloudercroft, which has assumed new importance in the Southwest with the completion of a new modern highway built up the mountain from Alamogordo, and on through Hope, Artesia and Carlsbad.

Ranch Country Covered The 80 miles under construction in Lincoln County begins at Hollywood on the Ruidoso River and goes up Gavilan Canyon to Eagle Creek with taps running up to Alto, and down to the old Charlie Coe ranch. Northward the line continues, reaching the Bonito River at Angus and goes up the Bonito Valley to the Southern Pacific Railroad dam.

"In proportion as the structure of a government gives force to public opinion, it is essential that public opinion should be enlightened."—George Washington.

New Mexico's new official census figures will be available within the next few months. The census takers will promptly complete their job of gathering the information and it will then be a question of tabulating the great amount of data they have collected.

It might be interesting to take a look at the growth of our own state over the last century. The trend in population, we know, has been definitely westward since the railroads opened up this vast area to settlement, starting in 1879.

The first census held after New Mexico became a part of the Union, was just 100 years ago—1850. In that year, our population totaled 61,547. During the next decade, we gained 32,000 people, but between 1860 and 1870 our population dropped about 2,000. From that time on, however, growth has been steady.

In 1900 we had 195,000 people in our state and the present census I am sure, will show more than 700,000.

It might be interesting to note that only one of the original 13 colonies, Virginia, had a greater population, when George Washington took office as President, than New Mexico has today.

New Mexico is not the only western state that has experienced a line growth. The West Coast states will perhaps show the biggest total population gains of any area in the country, but on a percentage basis New Mexico will be among the leaders.

In 1940 we ranked forty-first in population, the second fastest growing state in the Union. Because of our great area, there is still only an average of less than six persons per square mile in our state. That gives us plenty of room for future growth and development. During the last 10 years we had a natural increase in population of well over 75,000. This means that births exceeded deaths by that number. This natural increase alone would give us a healthy addition. But we can be certain that more than this number of persons were attracted to New Mexico because of our business and industrial opportunities, and because the military forces have selected our state for so many of their activities.

We have been fortunate in that our growth has been consistent, and is founded on sound economic factors. We have had no boom and no bust. From all indications we will continue to grow in the same orderly, healthy manner.

During the last 30 years, New Mexico's development has been rapid. Our gas and oil fields have been brought in during this period. Potash mining was developed on a large scale and our system of good roads and good schools have grown up. We have all the factors which make for a fine state in which to live and rear a family.

Our state development will be limited only by our water supply. With progress in the atomic field, flood waters from other areas, or perhaps de-salinated water from the ocean itself, will give us an unlimited supply of this vital resource. When that day comes, there will be virtually no limit to the population that New Mexico can support.

However, we must continue to strive for low taxes, good and economical state government if we want to support this rapid growth and continued prosperity.

Republican Chairman Urges Voters Register

State Republican Party Chairman John W. Knorr this week urged New Mexico citizens to make certain they are registered to vote in the coming primary.

He said that in the recent municipal elections, many who thought they were registered found they could not vote.

"Some found they had been assigned to a different precinct. Some found that their names had been purged from the voting lists. Still others realized too late their names did not even appear on registration books," Knorr said.



PUBLIC PROCLAMATION CALLING A PRIMARY ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO ON THE 5TH DAY OF JUNE, A. D. 1950

WHEREAS, the Primary Election Code of the State of New Mexico, in Section 2 of Chapter 88, Laws of 1943, provides, in part as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the Governor of the State of New Mexico, by public proclamation issued by him and filed with the Secretary of State of the State of New Mexico, on the first Monday in April of each even numbered year, to call a primary election to be held in each county and precinct in the State of New Mexico on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in June of such even numbered year, and he shall state in said proclamation the names of the political parties to which the primary shall apply, together with the offices for which each such political party shall nominate candidates, and such proclamation shall also contain the date on or before which the declarations and nominating petitions of candidates for such nominations shall be filed, and the offices wherein such declarations and petitions shall be filed, in order to entitle the candidate for such nomination to have his name printed on the official ballot of his party at such primary."

WHEREAS, said Primary Election Code provides that said Act shall apply to all political parties for any of whose candidates there was cast at the last preceding general election as many as fifteen per centum (15 per centum) of the total number of votes cast for the candidates for Governor by all parties at such election; and

WHEREAS, at the last general election, the Democratic and Republican parties were the only political parties for any of whose candidates there was cast as many as fifteen per centum (15 per centum) of the total number of votes cast for the candidates for Governor by all parties at such election; and

WHEREAS, said Primary Election Code provides that the said Act shall apply to the offices of United States Senator, Representative in the Congress of the United States, Presidential Elector, and to all elective state, district, legislative, county, and precinct officers in the state who are elected at the general election; and

WHEREAS, said Primary Election Code provides that candidates desiring to participate in the primary for any office must file their declarations of candidacy during the period commencing at 9:00 A. M. on the first Tuesday of April of each even numbered year and ending at 5:00 P. M. on the thirtieth day before the date of said primary; and

WHEREAS, said Primary Election Code provides that the declaration of candidacy, together with supporting nominating petitions, shall, in the case of precinct and county offices and legislative offices filled by one county, be filed with the county clerk of the county wherein the declarant seeks office; and, in the cases of offices filled by the state at large, and districts comprising more than one county, such declarations and petitions shall be filed with the Secretary of State.

NOW, THEREFORE, by virtue of the authority and duty in me vested by law, I, Thomas J. Mabry, Governor of the State of New Mexico, do hereby publicly proclaim as follows:

- 1. That a primary election be, and the same is hereby, called to be held throughout the State of New Mexico, and in each county and precinct thereof on the 5th day of June, A. D. 1950.
2. That the said primary election shall be applicable to the following political parties, to-wit: The Republican Party and the Democratic Party.
3. That said primary election shall be for the purpose of permitting the said Republican and Democratic parties to nominate candidates for the following elective offices:

5. Declarations of candidacy and nominating petitions for all offices herein enumerated may be filed in the proper office at any time hereafter, after April 4, 1950, at 9:00 A. M., but not later than 5:00 P. M. on the 8th day of May, 1950.

PROCLAMA PUBLICA CONVOCANDO UNA ELECCION PRIMARIA PARA CELEBRARSE EN EL ESTADO DE NUEVO MEXICO

EL DIA 5 DE JUNIO A. D. 1950

POR CUANTO, el Código de Elecciones del Estado de Nuevo Mexico, en la Sección 2 del Capítulo 88, Leyes del 1943, administra, en parte, como sigue:
"Será el deber del Gobernador del Estado de Nuevo Mexico, por medio de proclama pública por el expedida y registrada en la Secretaría del Estado de Nuevo Mexico, el primer Lunes de Abril de cada año par, de convocar a una elección primaria que debe ser celebrada en cada Condado y Precinto del Estado de Nuevo Mexico, el primer Martes despues del primer Lunes en Junio de tal año par, y declarar en tal proclama los nombres de los partidos políticos a los que la primaria debe aplicarse, junto con los cargos para los cuales cada partido político nombrara candidatos, y tal proclama tambien debe contener la fecha en que o antes de que las declaraciones y peticiones deben registrarse, a fin de conceder al candidato para tal nominación a que tenga su nombre impreso en la boleta oficial de su partido en tal primaria."

POR CUANTO, dicho Código de Elecciones suministra que dicha Acta se aplicara a todos los partidos políticos por cualquiera de cuyos candidatos se deposito en la ultima elección general precedente tanto como el quince por ciento (15 por ciento) del número total de votos depositados para los candidatos a Gobernador por todos los partidos en tal elección; y

POR CUANTO, en la ultima elección general, los partidos Democrata y Republicano fueron los únicos partidos políticos para cualquiera de cuyos candidatos se depositaron tanto como el quince por ciento (15 por ciento) del total de los votos obtenidos por los candidatos a Gobernador por todos los partidos en tal elección; y

CONSIDERANDO, que el Código de Elecciones primarias debiera aplicarse a los cargos de Senador de los Estados Unidos, Representantes al Congreso de los Estados Unidos, electores presidenciales y a todos los electivos oficiales del Estado, distritos, legislativos, de condado, y oficiales de precinto en el Estado que con electos en las elecciones generales; y

POR CUANTO, que dicho Código de Elecciones primarias suministra que los candidatos desearios de participar en las primarias para cualquier cargo deben llenar sus declaraciones de candidatos durante el periodo que comienza a las 9 A. M. el primer Martes de Abril de cada año par y termina a las 5 P. M. del día trigesimo antes de la fecha de dicha primaria; y

CONSIDERANDO, que dicho Código de Elecciones primarias suministra que la declaración a candidato, junto con las peticiones de soporte para la nominación, deberan, en el caso de cargos de precinto, condado o legislativo, ser llenados en la Secretaría del Condado donde el declarante aspira el cargo; y, en los casos de cargos llenados para todo el Estado, o los distritos que comprenden mas de un Condado, tales declaraciones y peticiones deben ser registradas en la Secretaría de Estado.

POR LO TANTO, ahora, en virtud de la autoridad y deber en mí investido, yo, THOMAS J. MABRY, Gobernador del Estado de Nuevo Mexico por esta proclamo lo siguiente:
1. Que una elección primaria sea, y la misma es por eso convocada, para celebrarse en todo el Estado de Nuevo Mexico, y en cada Condado y Precinto del mismo el día 5 de Junio, A. D. 1950.
2. Que dicha elección primaria debe ser aplicable a los principales partidos políticos, a saber: El Partido Republicano y el Partido Democrático.
3. Que dicha elección primaria sea con el propósito de permitir a dichos Partidos Republicano y Democrático la nominación de candidatos para los siguientes cargos electivos:

POLITICAL EXPEDIENCY AND DEBT

If by some miracle out of a Thousand And One Nights, the genie of Aladdin's fabulous lamp were to appear before me and grant one wish—and one only—I think I should wish that the financing of government be removed from the realm of expedient politics for at least the

next 10 years. It would be the greatest blessing that could come to the 150,000,000 people of America in these crucial times. But Aladdin's Lamp is merely a beautiful fairy tale. And big spending politicians are a bold reality, as yet unbridled.

It's doubtful that there are more than a handful of people outside Washington who know the full facts about the spending program being persistently pressed on Congress by the executive department. To get the facts and correlate them would require a considerable staff of specialists. And to present the findings in an objective manner, justifying public acceptance, would require nonpartisan handling. Fortunately, such a study has been made and such an objective report has been presented—by the staff of the Senate's own committee on executive department expenditures.

Shocking Facts
The facts revealed are enough to shock every free and independent person in the country. If the Congress should enact the 15 new major spending programs being urged by the President, the aggregate annual cost within the next five years would exceed \$25 billion. The committee staff added this figure to the requested regular budget of \$40-plus billion and got \$65-plus billion—or about 30 per cent of the earnings of all the people in the U. S. A.

Some of the costliest new items being urged are: national health insurance, \$7 billion a year; social security expansion, costing \$6 billion; housing and public works, \$1.4 billion; the Brannan farm program, \$6 billion; aid to education, \$560 million (to be very rapidly expanded), etc. The total new \$25 billion is recommended in spite of the fact that the executive department is already deficit spending to the tune of \$5 or \$6 billion a year, and the national debt has climbed beyond the quarter trillion dollar mark (\$250 billion).

The People Must Pay
A report on the committee's findings was made to the Senate by Committee Chairman John L. McClellan (D., Ark.). The committee's study of the new program costs and the present budget showed, he said, "that to

support such expenditures on a pay-as-you-go basis will impose a tax burden of \$433 annually for every man, woman and child in America. This, added to the amount of taxes already levied for state, county and municipal governments will make the annual tax obligation of the American people more than 40 cents out of every dollar they earn."

"So far as I know," said Senator McClellan, "only one other nation today, among the free peoples of the world, have a tax obligation in comparison, and that is England—and England, as we all know, now has an austerly standard of living which we, by gratuities of a billion dollars a year, are helping her to support. The prospects of our traveling the road that England has taken are appalling."

No Aladdin's Lamp Available
The executive department has just recommended costly new increases in unemployment compensation payments (to \$120 monthly) and a revision making it possible for idle workers to draw the payments six months out of the year. One commentator who reported the news from Washington said political observers considered the recommendations as a gesture "for making political capital for this year's congressional elections. But I think we'd better take it a lot more seriously than that."

Certainly there can be no question about the fact that too much government spending, at all levels of government, is based on a prime consideration of political expediency. To heap new spending programs on top of the present staggering federal budget is outrageously unsound. Though, there isn't any Aladdin's Lamp, if the public actually becomes awakened to the seriousness of this they will put a stop to it.

the value of paved roads in relation to a community, and stated travelers would drive out of their way in order to use a paved highway.

An open forum was conducted by Colonel Earp during which several points of interest were brought up. Bonner of Oklahoma informed the delegates many tourists were being directed to the west via highways other than 54. He said not enough travelers were aware of the existence of Highway 54. Bonner added tourist bureaus and attendants at filling stations do not have information concerning Highway 54 to give the traveling public.

Lloyd Bloodworth told the group about the work the Highway 54 Association has been doing and said Highway 54 Association should get more information to the public.

It was pointed out tourist business is a competitive one, and must be sought.

Colonel Earp quoted the increase in travel over Highway 54 from 1947 through 1949 as 153 per cent. He also said 1950 will be the most competitive year for tourist business to date. Earp congratulated Mrs. Lillian Bagwell, Alamogordo Chamber of Commerce, on the splendid work of that organization in making the convention a success. It was also announced maps and stick-

ers are available for distribution to towns and tourist courts so they may have information regarding Highway 54.

Mr. Long, advertising manager for the association, gave an outline of his department's work in giving out publicity on the highway. He also suggested a "booster bus" be sent to Chicago and acquaint towns along Highway 54 with the work of the association.

The delegates from the towns along the highway should meet with the various chambers of commerce and tourist bureaus, according to Long, and present their complete information on the advantages of Highway 54. The convention later appointed a committee to make arrangements for the suggested trip by the booster bus.
