## Polio Victim Dies Here

Long hours of constant and highly trained care proved unavailing in the case of 3-year-old Priscilla Morales, who died Sunday afternoon a victim of the dread polio.

The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Morales, Hatch, the little girl was sent to the local hospital from Las Cruces when it was discovered the hospital there did not have the necessary facilities.

According to reports, the admission of the little Morales girl to the Carrizozo hospital caused considerable comment locally. The general trend of comment appeared to be the danger of starting an epidemic, or at least exposing the local population to the disease.

The first and outstanding reason for bringing the case to Carrizozo, stated Superintendent W. J. Hadley, was the fact the local hospital is equipped to treat contagious diseases. It has two rooms that can be completely isolated from the rest of the hospital, and there is absolutely no need for communication with the other rooms.

The fact the child's illness was known to be polio was the best protection against infection. While there is much to be learned about the cause and treatment of polio, Hadley states proper handling of a known polio case is no more dangerous to the hospital personnel than any of the common contagious diseases.

The Carrizozo case was cared for by a nurse from the National Foundation for Infantine Paralysis, and all other expenses will be paid by that organization. In fact, the expenses of this case will not even be charged against Lincoln County. The child became ill in Arizona where her father is employed in mine work, and the nature of the illness was not immediately diagnosed, the superintendent reported. Hadley said under the circumstances the expenses will be charged to the Arizona chapter for polio cases.

Carrizozo's hospital proved to be the nearest one with the room and facilities to care for the desperately ill small girl. Instead of fear of personal danger, which, at the most, is very remote, according to Hadley, Lincoln County residents should take great pride and gratitude in the fact the local hospital is an institution equipped for just such an emergency. By the same token, this county may know relief in the fact its own residents may avail themselves of this protection the hospital affords.

Another heart warming aspect of this case was the fact a modern respirator was brought here from Albuquerque within three hours after the call went out. On August 19, at 4:45 A. M., Sheriff S. M. Ortiz left for Socorro where he was met by state police who delivered the respirator to him. He was back at the hospital before 8 A. M. with the apparatus designed to ease the little girl's suffering.

The child's father stated funeral services and interment would be in Las Cruces.

## Pioneer Lincoln County Resident Succumbs

A resident of Lincoln County since 1901, Thomas Lindsey Wilder, 86, passed away in St. Ann's Hospital, Hot Springs, on August 18. Interment was at Angus August 18, with Rev. Jesse Allen, Carrizozo, officiating.

Mr. Wilder was born in Llano County, Texas, in 1864, and moved to this county in 1901. In 1902, he married Hannah Thomas Burns, to which union was born the most, Frank, Irwin, Elbert, James, Everett and Page, and two daughters, Jennie and Jewell.

The late Mrs. Wilder died a number of years ago, and on July 23, 1909, he married Grace Roberts, who survived. A son, Elbert, preceded him in death. In addition to the other children, there were six sons and a daughter, three of whom are deceased. He was survived by Mrs. Wilder, Mrs. J. C. Hardy, stepdaughter, Mrs. Charles Edward Williams and Mrs. Charles Scott and Martha Jettie Scott, and 11 grandchildren and three great grandchildren.

Mr. Wilder had made his home in Duncan, Ariz., before his death.

## Cupid Receives Cordial Welcome In Carrizozo

The bride-elect had arrived in El Paso only that morning on her way to marry the young soldier.

Sergeant Tyburski was granted a 36-hour pass and they headed north. In one town along their route they reported they found the marriage license clerk's office closed. They located the clerk at home, but, apparently, office hours are office hours, to her, and she refused to issue them a license, according to the young couple. Determined not to turn back without further effort, the two continued to Carrizozo.

In their quest for the county clerk they chanced upon this paper's editors who agreed to help them. J. G. Moore was located at home and graciously consented to return to the Court House and issue a license. Another call then went out—this time to Rev. Ollie Hall, pastor of the Trinity Methodist Church. Although he had already retired for the night, Rev. Hall was gracious in his acceptance of the request that he perform the ceremony.

Since the young couple were alone, the editors offered their services as witnesses and attendants. The wedding took place at the Methodist parsonage, and the quiet sincerity and dignity of the ceremony, that was arranged so hurriedly is a tribute to Rev. Hall. Several of the Hall children live nearby, and that is one of the reasons that prompted Rev. Hall's decision to leave Carrizozo. The new minister, Rev. Miller, comes here from the Epworth Trinity Circuit at Franklin, Tenn. He is married to the former Marie McGhee, also of Tennessee, and is the father of Bette Rae, 7, and Boyd Irving, 5.

Rev. Miller received his B. S. degree at Austin Peay State College, Clarksville, Tenn., and obtained his master's degree at the Grove Peabody College for Teachers, Nashville. Graduate study was taken at Vanderbilt University, Nashville.

His ministerial career was interrupted by four years service in World War II. Included in Rev. Miller's ministerial work are one year in the North Carolina Conference and five years in the Tennessee Conference.

## Beauty Contest To End Saturday

A number of Lincoln County girls are entered in the Lincoln County Beauty Queen contest. The names of the entrants have not been announced.

Friday, August 25, at 5 P. M. is the deadline for applications. The Queen will be chosen by the judges at the grade school auditorium, Carrizozo, as the climax of a musical program which is being given by the local Woman's Club. The show starts promptly at 7 P. M.

Many of the towns entering contestants have been asked to serve as judges, and they will be assisted by Red Brown, versatile radio-artist on KRQD. El Paso-Brown has been giving the Lincoln County Beauty Queen contest publicity on his early morning program over KRQD.

Rules of the contest provide Beauty Queen contestants must be in the age range 16-28, inclusive, and must be sponsored by a business firm.

Contestants must be in formal attire when they appear before the judges. The registration fee for each contestant is \$2.50. The girls will be judged upon their posture, personality and natural beauty.

A small admission fee of 30 cents for children up to 12 years, and 60 cents for all others will be charged.

Immediately following the judges' decision, the successful contestant will receive her crown and title of Lincoln County's Beauty Queen, as well as other awards which will be disclosed later.

A dance will be held at the firemen's hall after the Queen has been selected. It is sponsored by the Carrizozo Woman's Club also, and the funds will be applied toward the indebtedness on the club's kitchen equipment. Admission is \$1.25.

## Republicans To Meet Here August 28

A Republican organizational meeting will be held in Carrizozo on August 28.

## State Teachers To Meet In Albuquerque Oct. 26

Adequate housing and meeting facilities will be assured for an estimated 6,000 teachers attending the state teachers convention in Albuquerque October 26-28, according to Fletcher Brumit, chairman of the Albuquerque Chamber of Commerce, convention committee.

Some delegates attending last year's convention were unable to obtain housing while others complained that several of the meeting rooms were cramped, Brumit said.

To prevent a recurrence of the situation, the chamber's convention committee is starting this week to line up tourist court, hotel and private home accommodations.

Also, a sub-committee will begin an immediate survey of existing auditorium facilities to insure adequate space for the convention's larger sessions.

Commenting on the situation, Chamber President Elmer Elliott said the needs of the teachers and cattlemen for a larger convention hall have been the strongest motivating force behind the chamber's efforts to obtain a municipal auditorium for Albuquerque. "And, we're going to get that auditorium within the foreseeable future, if the war doesn't curtail construction," he stated.

## Accident Near Green Tree Fatal To Texas Resident

The automobile accident which occurred on the Rio Ruidoso Bridge near Green Tree on August 16 proved fatal to Mrs. Asie Bailey of Snyder, Texas. Mr. Bailey, operator of the Rainbow grocery store in Texas, was seriously injured.

The Baileys were taken to the Ruidoso Valley General Hospital after the accident, and a call put in to Fort Stanton by the sheriff, Lawson Fish made a hurried trip there with plasma. Despite Fish's attempt to obtain and cross match blood, Mrs. Bailey succumbed early the following morning from internal hemorrhages. Mr. Bailey is still suffering from shock.

If the Baileys' identification papers had carried a notation concerning their blood type, time could have been saved and perhaps Mrs. Bailey's life spared.

## Two More Sentenced In Lincoln Dance Brawl

Three more Roswell youths were rounded up in Roswell this past week by Sheriff S. M. Ortiz, charged with helping to create the brawl which occurred at the dance in Lincoln on August 12. Sylvester Gonzales and Stephen Sanchez, Roswell, received fines of \$25 each and sentenced to 30 days in jail.

Robert Romero, also of Roswell, who was picked up with the other two youths, was acquitted of the charge when he proved he had not engaged in the fight that took place.

## REA Man Explains Power Failure

In response to the query of a representative of the Socorro Christian, Tom Brown, Socorro REA manager, replied to questions Socorro residents have been asking since that town's power failure recently, which caused Socorro to be without service for approximately 18 hours.

The two principal questions were: Why does not the Coop maintain the old plant as a stand-by for use in emergencies and why was it possible for the outlying sections of the Coop's system to be served, while the city of Socorro was in the dark?

The answer to the first question, according to Brown, is that even though the distribution system of Socorro is divided into two main circuits, the old plant in its prime could not handle either circuit. For the Coop to keep a plant in readiness for emergencies would entail a capital investment of at least \$500,000, and a constant expense for holding operating personnel ready to run the plant.

In view of the fact the Bureau of Reclamation, Department of Interior has installed the most modern equipment to insure continuity of service, and because a study of the records of the reclamation service show a 99.98 percent continuous service with this type of equipment, the board of trustees of the Cooperative decided that the maintenance of a stand-by plant would put too great a burden on the members of the Coop, said Brown. He pointed out an accident brought on by lightning, such as the one recently, would just as likely put a plant out of operation as it did the sub-station. Within the last six months, there have been newspaper accounts of disruptions of service from lightning of many hours duration in both Albuquerque and El Paso, so it is evident more power lines than Socorro also have like troubles as occurred in Socorro.

Brown explained how the Cooperative has sectionalized its circuits for the protection of Socorro service from faults on the line outside Socorro. Now, however, because of protective devices and separate circuits, disruptions from outside faults are rare. Of course, when the fault occurs in Socorro, as recently, then the outlying districts get the benefit of these precautions.

## Mechem Favors Use Of Sales Tax For Education

Edwin L. Mechem, Republican candidate for governor, said he favors use of the state sales tax for educational purposes only.

"I do not see the necessity of any diversion of sales tax funds to any other purpose," the young attorney remarked.

Mechem pointed out the sales tax provides well over half the income for the entire educational system.

This fund is used for several essential purposes:

1. Maintenance of state educational offices.
2. Support of the teachers retirement system.
3. Distribution to county transportation system for free school buses.
4. Distribution to county school equalization fund on basis of average daily attendance.

"The people of New Mexico spend a greater percentage of their income on education than do the people of any other state," Mechem said. This permits a relatively poor state like New Mexico to keep its educational standards high, he added.

"Teachers are relatively well paid. Their salaries are in the top third of the nation. Our teachers and their superintendents are well qualified. Many of our schools are modern and kept in good condition. We have a fine bus transportation system for school children. All this is a result, directly or indirectly, of channeling the sales tax directly to educational purposes due to the alert watchdog activities of the New Mexico Educational Association.

"I propose to keep the situation as it is now because of its great success," Mechem concluded.

## Capitan Schools Get Major Improvements

## School Of Mines Secures Crystal Gazing Ball

A crystal gazing ball was purchased recently by the Thunderstorm Laboratory of New Mexico School of Mines, currently engaged in "rain-making" research. Asked about this fortune teller's specialty, Dr. E. J. Workman, physicist-president of the college, said "it's done with mirrors."

The scientists, it seems, need a reflector which will mirror the whole horizon at once for use in their photographic cloud studies. The 4 1/2-inch, "de luxe" model gazing ball will be coated with aluminum and suspended above a movie camera with lens pointed straight up, out of doors. The camera will record the reflected image of clouds all around the horizon.

Motion pictures thus obtained are projected on a circular screen marked with radiating lines and concentric circles representing a map of the Socorro area where studies are being made. By this means the scientists can study the formation, growth and movement of clouds—information vital to the understanding of weather phenomena. The project is part of a large research program undertaken by the School of Mines to determine "when, where and why does it rain?"

The crystal ball will be coated by a special process called "sputtering" wherein the ball is placed inside a vacuum jar. Melting of aluminum inside the vacuum causes atoms of metal to fly into space, where they cling to any object they strike. This method can be used to provide a metallic coating on glass and other non-conductors which cannot be electroplated readily.

## Greatest Parade To Inaugurate State Fair

In the history of the New Mexico State Fair are going forward under the direction of six state-wide junior chamber of commerce organizations, announces Pat Hill, fair publicity director.

The merchants of Albuquerque and surrounding towns will undertake a campaign to turn the residents of the area out in western dress. All merchants in Albuquerque, through the Chamber of Commerce and the Albuquerque Retailers Association, have initiated a campaign to see that all their employees dress western for the fair, and will hold a "Days of '49" promotion prior to and during the nine days of the state exposition.

## One Entered In Queen Contest

At press time only one entry in the State Fair Queen contest in Lincoln County was on file. She is Veda Lou Branum, Carrizozo. The contest is sponsored by the Carrizozo Lions Club and September 6 at 5 P. M. is the deadline for candidates' applications—after that date it will be too late.

Some girl in Lincoln County may have the fun of nine whole days at the State Fair in Albuquerque, expense free. The only requirement of the successful candidate in the county contest is she must provide her own horse, and she must furnish transportation for her horse and self to Albuquerque and return.

The State Fair Queen contestant from Lincoln County will ride in the Grand Parade Saturday morning, September 23, with successful candidates from other counties in New Mexico. The county representatives will witness the official opening of the State Fair by Governor Thomas J. Mabry, after which one of their number will receive the crown of State Fair Queen for the nine-day reign.

When the Queen is chosen, the other county entrants will be designated as the Westernettes, and, with the Queen, will ride in the Grand Rodeo entry each night. To the Queen and her Westernettes will go the honor of assisting in the awarding of ribbons and trophies to contest winners.

In addition to the thrilling possibility of reigning as State Fair Queen or one of the Westernettes that awaits the successful Lincoln County candidate, there is another exciting feature planned. A talent scout from Hollywood is scheduled to attend the festivities during State Fair week. Who knows—he might decide the Lincoln County girl to be the most photogenic personality there.

**PROGRESS IN MEDICINE**

A child living down the street from our house was ill with pneumonia. The infection had developed from a cold. The fever climbed and congestion appeared. But nobody got excited, not even the parents. The doctor was called. Penicillin and one of the sulfonamides were administered. The doctor came away from the bedside cheerily confident. There was absolutely no cause for undue anxiety, he said. The father went back to work, the mother to her household. Sisters and brothers went back to play.

The incident harkened memory to the occasion some 30 years ago when another child had fallen critically ill with pneumonia. Then our town was aroused. A specialist was rushed in from a distant city; oxygen equipment was flown from the state capital. There followed many anxious days for everyone who knew the family. The crisis came. The child died. In 30 years since then the American medical profession has erected some remarkable milestones in life saving and health building.


**Pneumonia Whipped**

As the doctor drove away from our neighbor's house I halted him down to discuss the miracle of this now commonplace victory over pneumonia. He said his young patient had bronchial pneumonia—the milder type—and would be completely free of infection within 48 hours. Then he said an amazing thing. He has a big practice and I happen to know he spends hours each week in public health clinic work and on charity calls, yet he said he'd not seen a single case of lobar (deep-seated) pneumonia in the past three years!

What had become of this one time major killer? Penicillin and the sulfas, now administered routinely in all upper respiratory infections, had done such a wonderful job, he said, the disease just never had a chance any more to get to the critical lobar region of the lungs. This doctor believes also that the general use of these great drugs has killed off a lot of the pneumococcus organisms and rendered far less virulent the spores still alive.

**Other Diseases Cornered**

The stilling of the deathhand of pneumonia is but one of the many victories recorded in the recent past by American medicine—physicians, surgeons, nurses, researchers and pharmaceutical manufacturers. A baby born in America today has a life expectancy of nearly 70 years, at least 15 more than could have

The New Mexico state police has made an excellent reputation since its creation in 1933. The primary function of the state police is to help apprehend criminals using our highways, the enforcement of state traffic laws against reckless driving, speeding, driving while intoxicated and other dangerous driving habits which are a menace to the life and property of others using the state highways. And, to encourage highway safety habits generally is a part of their job.

For years, the state police was been expected 30 years ago. Most of the major disease killers have been cornered and rendered far less potent by our medical men, and surgery has advanced to almost unbelievable capabilities.

Local and state medical societies, working with hospitals, businesses, industries and citizens, are constantly expanding insurance plans which bring good hospitalization, medical and surgical services within the reach of most Americans. By next January approximately 75,000,000 will be covered by plans which pay an average of 80 per cent of hospital expenses; 40,000,000 will be enrolled in plans which pay the major portion of surgical fees, and about 25,000,000 will be enrolled in year-round medical care plans.

**Voluntary vs. Compulsory**

For the price of a package of cigarettes a day, any American family can be free from worry over financial difficulties arising from illness. An example of what industry and a great many business are doing in cooperation with their employees and the medical profession is Bethlehem Steel's program which provides 70 days full hospital care for its 125,000 employees and their families—at a cost of \$2.95 per month, half paid by the company, half by the employee.

In spite of the rapid, wholesale growth of such voluntary medical care plans and the magnificent progress made by our medical profession in its battle against the major disease killers, there are a few people who wish to establish a politically controlled compulsory health program and socialize the profession of medicine. Their spokesmen use the same lure used by England's Socialists. The English people got "free" medicine—and, to boot, a tax-heavy, freedom crushing, stagnating Socialist "austerity" that has reduced the nation virtually to beggary.

greatly understaffed and worked under the handicap of lack of quick communication. In 1949, under my recommendation, the state Legislature increased the department's appropriation so that the number of uniform police was increased from 41 to 57—still short of the required force, however.

The state has provided radio equipped cars which keep all patrolmen in constant touch with headquarters in Santa Fe, and the local law enforcement officials who have radio equipment. For a state as large as ours, even 57 policemen are inadequate to maintain constant patrol of the highway system on a 24 hour basis. We have more than 8,000 miles of highway under state maintenance.

People who see the highway patrol cars only occasionally probably have little idea of the tremendous volume of work these men perform. In a typical year we find that the state patrolmen investigated some 1,700 automobile accidents. They lent assistance of one kind or another to 30,000 motorists rendered first aid in 390 cases; removed 8,500 obstructions from the highways; made some 3,000 investigations; gave 17,000 warnings for minor traffic violations; served 139 orders for the department of financial responsibility; recovered 147 stolen automobiles and other stolen property valued at \$18,000; gave nearly 9,000 drivers examinations, and collected more than \$110,000 in various fees and fines. They also made 2,223 arrests and drove about 1,250,000 miles on patrol duty. They also



**PROGRESS IN MEDICINE**

The incident harkened memory to the occasion some 30 years ago when another child had fallen critically ill with pneumonia. Then our town was aroused. A specialist was rushed in from a distant city; oxygen equipment was flown from the state capital. There followed many anxious days for everyone who knew the family. The crisis came. The child died. In 30 years since then the American medical profession has erected some remarkable milestones in life saving and health building.

**Pneumonia Whipped**  
 As the doctor drove away from our neighbor's house I halted him down to discuss the miracle of this new commonplace victory over pneumonia. He said his young patient had bronchial pneumonia—the milder type—and would be completely free of infection within 48 hours. Then he said an amazing thing. He has a big practice and I happen to know he spends hours each week in public health clinic work and on charity calls, yet he said he'd not seen a single case of lobar (deep seated) pneumonia in the past three years!

What had become of this one time major killer? Penicillin and the sulfas, now administered routinely in all upper respiratory infections, had done such a wonderful job, he said, the disease just never had a chance any more to get to the critical lobar region of the lungs. This doctor believes also that the general use of these great drugs has lifted off a lot of the pneumococcus organisms and rendered far less virulent the spores still alive.

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

Association Says School Procedures Obsolete

New Mexico is still trying to run its public school system—a new \$4 million dollar business—by obsolete procedures set up in 1911 when the annual expenditure was less than a million, according to a recent publication of the New Mexico Education Association entitled, "A Sound Business Administration for the New Mexico Public School System."

The booklet, which will soon be distributed to organizations and taxpayers over the state, reveals the present obsolete and inefficient administration of the state elementary and secondary public school system has particularly handicapped the education of children in the rural areas. A recent study made in five counties where most of the children are in rural schools showed that less than half of the pupils reached the eighth grade and that less than 10 per cent graduated from high school.

R. J. Mullins, executive secretary, stated the education association would direct all of its legislative activities towards aiding the people of New Mexico to secure efficient use of state school funds through a reorganization of the state department of education. He said this would require an amendment to the state constitution.

He said the proposed amendment would provide for a non-partisan board of education with power to select a state superintendent who would meet legal minimum professional requirements. This state superintendent would remain in office at the will of the board.

The proposed nine-member board of education—one member from each of the nine judicial districts—would be appointed by the governor, with approval by the Senate for staggered terms of nine years. Terms of office would be arranged so that one expires each year and members could be removed from office for cause only under prescribed legal procedures.

An alternate plan provides for the election of these nine board members by the people of each judicial district.

The present state board of education consists of the five members appointed by the governor and the governor and state superintendent as ex-officio members. The law provides the five members shall serve for staggered terms of four years, but precedent requires all the members resign on the inauguration of a new governor. Mr. Mullins said.

This and the fact the governor and the state superintendent are

elect for two years and can serve only two more years if re-elected makes it impossible to have any continuity of policy or planning in the state school system, officials of the education association stated.

"Under our present obsolete organization, funds are wasted and our children are being short changed," Mr. Mullins said. "The schools belong to the people of the state, and if they want a full return on the money they invest, they have the power to secure it by bringing the state school organization up to date."


## HAVE A BETTER KITCHEN

One of the prime considerations in kitchen remodeling is the condition of the pocketbook. But you will be pleasantly surprised at the convenience gained by the addition of a few strategically placed pieces of equipment which meet even the minimum budget.

## HAVE A BETTER KITCHEN

Summer is kitchen remodeling time and thousands of homemakers are taking advantage of the opportunity to make their kitchen dreams a reality. Because a new kitchen is frequently a major investment, it is well to choose the new equipment with care, keeping a sharp eye out for lasting beauty, efficiency and wearing qualities.

Because modern steel kitchen cabinets require less space, many homemakers are selecting cabinet sinks and storage cabinets from the wide variety of models and sizes now offered in their dealer's store. Completely finished when they reach the site, these units can be installed quickly and require no expensive finishing or fitting, thus helping to keep costs within the family budget.

Special care should be taken in choosing the cabinet sink, for it is in the sink area that the homemaker spends more than 80 per cent of her kitchen hours. Most popular are the double bowl models which take much of the drudgery from the dishwashing chore. Under-sink cabinets have drawers for cutlery and linens, and large storage compartments for cleaning supplies and large pots and pans.

Plenty of storage space is a "must" for the new kitchen. This is supplied by base cabinets with drawers and storage shelves, and by wall cabinets above. In planning the new kitchen, utmost efficiency will be gained by placing base cabinets and their counter surfaces adjacent to the room's major appliances—the sink, range and refrigerator.

Standard height of base cabinets is 30"; they are 24" front to back and front 18" to 24" wide. Wall cabinets are either 18" or 24" high, 12" front to back, and from 18" to 42" wide. When wall cabinets are placed above base cabinets, kitchen planners recommend a clearance of 18" from top of the counter surface to bottom of the wall cabinet in order to provide adequate working space.


