## REA Vote Delayed; City Studies Contract

Carrizozo City Council met in special session September 21 to discuss city finances and the REA contract which would go into effect if the people voted to accept the proposition.

Inasmuch as Councilman T. E. Kelley was unable to be present at the meeting, no formal action was taken on the REA contract sent to the village by the attorney for the Otero County Cooperative.

However, a reading of the contract disclosed that practically none of the major ideas, discussed by W. C. Cooper, manager of the cooperative, had been incorporated in the proposed contract.

Mayor Petty pointed out the talks made by Cooper and Wilbur Coe at a previous meeting gave the council the first concrete information they had ever had regarding REA, and added that before any decision is made, the exact value of the town's power plant should be ascertained.

Mayor Petty showed the council two surveys made by an Amarillo firm of attorneys in connection with purchases of power plants. These surveys gave a detailed overall picture of plant values, power costs, income and disbursements, as well as other details important to such power plant sales.

The Otero County Cooperative has Washington's approval to offer Carrizozo \$121,000 for the town's power plant, and leave the locker and ice plants to the village free of indebtedness.

Councilman Roy E. Shafer said the town had originally paid \$24,000 for the plant and added an additional \$10,000 for needed parts, etc., and, later, another bond issued for \$35,000 was sold to build the locker and ice plants.

Queen recommended a revision of the present rates, and said the town's commercial rates are high as compared with those of REA.

Some of the points raised by council at the September 21 meeting are:

1. The word "minimum" does not appear before the figure of \$121,000 for the purchase price.

2. The contract calls for the purchase of all the facilities of the plant even though in the general discussion it was agreed the city would retain its two trucks and pumping tools.

3. The location of the transmission line from Alamogordo is not clearly stated. Councilman Shafer believes the contract should incorporate the bringing of the line by way of the Tularosa Basin nearest the Southern Pacific tracks.

4. No provision is made for the maintenance of the present plant as a standby in case of emergency.

5. No mention is made of rate structure to be used in Carrizozo.

Council members were to meet again with Daniel Brenton, who is the village attorney, to discuss and clarify the foregoing questions. An official meeting of council will be held in the near future when all council members can be present to decide the city's course in the matter. (See editorial on REA.)

The council discussed ways and means to handle the payment on the city's bonded indebtedness which falls due October 1.

Lawrence Queen, utilities manager, presented a report on the utilities income and disbursements, but since the state comptroller has not yet approved the town's budget, a financial report cannot be published pending its receipt showing the various allocations of funds.

The Alamogordo firm of accountants which audited the town's books have submitted a form of financial statement which should be given to the council by the village clerk at each regular monthly meeting. Such a statement will show the city's financial status of the village; whether or not unnecessary expenditures are being made; and serve as a check on whether the various departments are losing or making money.

Mayor Vernon Petty pointed out the foregoing advantages of such a monthly financial accounting, and seemed to be unanimous in their opinion it is desirable and necessary.

## Answer Filed In Suit Brought By Socorro Firm

The village of Carrizozo, through local attorney George Zimmerman, filed an answer this week to the suit brought against it by the Socorro Steam Laundry and Dry Cleaners.

Tentative date for the hearing of the case in District Court at Carrizozo is scheduled for October 12.

The city has been sued by the Socorro firm in the sum of \$400, plus legal interests and costs of the suit.

The complaint filed by the plaintiff's attorneys, Grantham and Bratton, Albuquerque, alleges the Socorro firm has been paying under protest a local license fee of \$200 a year for the past couple of years. The complaint further alleges such license fee is "illegal, ultra vires and void" as far as the plaintiff is concerned.

The answer to the complaint (filed by the defendant) states the amendments, referred to in the complaint, are legal, within the power of the municipality, and are valid.

The answer further states the amendments are constitutional and grant the plaintiff equal protection of the laws; they do not deprive the plaintiff of property without due process of law, and that said amendments are liberal, just and reasonable.

Among other allegations contained in the defendant's answer are: the amendment is for the purpose of collecting an occupational fee and is for the purpose of licensing or regulating the business of the plaintiff; the purpose was not to deprive plaintiff of the right to conduct a legitimate business in Carrizozo; the amendments were never intended to be discriminatory and unreasonable; and that the purpose of such ordinance was for necessary protection and regulation of business transacted in Carrizozo.

## Otero County Sheriff Injured In Auto Accident

Otero County Sheriff Wayne McCommis is in the Alamogordo hospital and reported in fair condition from injuries received in an automobile accident on Highway 380 a few miles west of Carrizozo in Lincoln County about 5 A. M. September 22.

McCommis was returning from Santa Fe where he had testified in the trial of Hubert W. Beasley, state police chief, who was recently convicted by a federal court jury of violation of the civil rights of another person. (Beasley has since resigned his state position.)

The Otero County sheriff struck the rear end of a car parked on the pavement without lights. The lights of another car parked on the pavement on the opposite side of the highway were reported to have obscured McCommis' vision.

McCommis received chest injuries, three broken ribs, and a badly lacerated right knee. He was taken by ambulance to the Alamogordo hospital. His new Ford special police car was demolished.

Occupants of the other cars escaped injury. Although the other car involved in the accident was badly damaged, the driver was able to make repairs and proceed. The occupants of the other cars were reported as deaf mutes from Hot Springs.

## New Mexico Draft Quota Finished Until October 23

State Selective Service has halted the induction of men to armed service until October 23. Since September 18, the state has sent 200 men to the services.

Orders for induction went during this month to 255 men, but state draft headquarters said it would be a week or 10 days before it knew whether New Mexico's quota of 233 men was filled. Twenty-two extra men were sent orders to try to make certain the quota was filled.

The next round of inductions ends October 27 and next month's quota also is 233.

## Eastern State Fair Opens At Roswell

The Eastern New Mexico State Fair, which will be held in Roswell October 4 through 8, has traveled a long way since its inception in the early twenties with a total of 3,000 feet of exhibit space. Today, with more than 60,000 feet of space in buildings, etc., superintendents of the various departments are asking for more. In addition, the mid-way area includes 15 acres and fairgoers will have a brand new rodeo arena this year.

The official opening of the fair is scheduled for 10 A. M. October 4 with the annual parade which includes floats, novelty entries, school bands from a dozen New Mexico communities, and several military units.

The second annual Chaves County Sheriff's Posse Rodeo is one of the highlights of the fair. Paul Kann, publicity director, rates it as the outstanding rodeo show in New Mexico this year.

Beutler Bros., Elk City, Okla., known nationally, will provide the stock for the show which means it will be second to none in the United States.

The famous "Boomtown Quadrille" from Burk Burnett, Texas, will present their unique square dancing on horseback using two mounted sets. There will be a special cutting horse exhibition with Monty Foreman and Marlon Bridges participating on their famous cutting horses "Chacho" and "Echucha Ladd."

The inauguration of the new permanent home of the posse is also slated. The fine rodeo arena was built through the cooperative efforts of all members with much of the work being done by them. This new arena is second to none in the Southwest, and members of the posse are justly proud of their achievement.

Night shows which start at 7:30 each evening will be well lighted, full of color and pageantry, and many of the other posse and mounted patrol groups from over the state of New Mexico will participate with the local group and contestants in the grand entry.

The events planned for the shows include: Bareback bronc riding, \$500 purse; calf roping, \$500 purse; saddle bronc riding, \$500; bulldogging, \$500, and bull riding, \$500.

Rodeo headquarters will be the Nickson Hotel in Roswell. Entries close at 6 P. M. October 3 and Monte Reger of Beutler Brothers is secretary for the show. All communications, inquiries or entries by mail should be addressed to Hal Gambrell, Box 150, Roswell, N. M.

## TB Association Meets Here

An organizational meeting of the Lincoln County TB Association was held at the Court House in Carrizozo at 7:30 P. M. September 22.

More than 40 people attended the meeting with John Dorman, State Health Department, in charge. Out of town guests were: Dr. Russell, state health director of tuberculosis control; Richard Tomlin, executive secretary; Mrs. Emma Fuller, nursing consultant; and John Griffith, field director, all with the T. B. C. division, of Santa Fe; Dr. R. G. M. Ehlers, district health officer, fourth district, Las Cruces, and Tom Hyde, sanitarian for Lincoln and Otero counties, Alamogordo.

Lincoln County is the last of the state's 32 counties to have the survey. Based on population, the lowest percentage X-rayed in any one county is 15 per cent, while the highest percentage of X-rays taken in any one county is 64 per cent. The local association hopes the percentage of persons X-rayed in Lincoln County will be more than the high to date of 64 per cent.

The local association was formed in May of this year and is sponsoring the X-ray survey which is county-wide.

### Local Football Team To Meet Ruidoso Today

The football team of Carrizozo High School goes back into action today at Ruidoso, after injuries canceled last week's game with Roswell. The game is scheduled to start at 2:30 P. M.

With the Carrizozo team crippled by the loss of several players, any injuries in today's tilt may force the cancellation of the local team's remaining games of the season.

The Carrizozo squad's injured members are recovering satisfactorily, but the majority of them will not be back in the lineup until the end of the season, if then.

The local team has been beset by injuries since before the start of the current football season. Dillon Lovelace broke a leg in practice before the opening game, and Jimmy Barnett suffered a broken leg in the first game of the season played in Corona.

In the Capitan meet on September 8, five of the team's players were injured, including Jerry Kennedy, broken leg; Tony Adler, broken arm; Bobby Hicks, chipped bone in thumb; Lee Straley, cracked rib, and Bob Powelson, concussion.

Adler and Barnett are the only two lettermen left from last year and out of 21 men reporting for football at the start of the season, only 15 are left, the other six being out of the lineup from injuries.

The Zoolites made an excellent showing last year, losing only three out of eight games. Scores of two of the lost games were 9-0.

### Corona Man Convicted On Assault Charge



It has come to the attention of The News-Outlook there are residents of Carrizozo and elsewhere who believe this paper is actively sponsoring the purchase of the town's power plant by REA. So there may be no misunderstanding regarding the stand of The News-Outlook in this matter, the following is the policy of this newspaper:

We will continue to maintain the present power plant is not adequate or conducive to the future growth and prosperity of Carrizozo. Nevertheless, we do not know that REA is better or worse than our present plant. We have never resided where REA operates, and have no first hand knowledge.

Naturally, City Council wants to make the most profitable deal possible for the town, and to insure satisfactory power service for residents should the local plant be sold.

The News-Outlook is unalterably opposed to the city dads giving REA or anyone else a blank check for the purchase or sale of anything pertaining to the city and involving the taxpayers' money. It is also proper that City Council refuse to buy a "pig in a poke" or accept verbal promises without having them reduced to writing.

We agree with council the REA contract, as submitted, does not incorporate the major issues as discussed by council and REA representatives, Wilbur Coe, W. C. Cooper and Allan Walker, at a previous meeting.

There is no galling against the present indebtedness against the plant is large; the maintenance, both forscen and unforscen, involves additional expenditures; and that the plant needs re-vamping to bring it up to modern standards.

As pointed out at the last meeting of council, a clear and concise monthly record of the town's financial status is definitely needed so city officials may know whether or not all departments are on a paying basis, and, if not, why not, so they may correct errors of operation as they appear.

It is City Council's job to protect the interests of the town's residents, and, if the power plant is sold, they feel they must be sure they have secured the best contract possible for the town.

In conclusion, we wish to point out that we are not sponsoring the purchase by REA of the village power plant. Neither are we opposing it.

We do, however, offer the columns of The News-Outlook for the presentation of arguments both pro and con, pertaining to REA or any other transaction of such magnitude that it affects the lives of the entire population.

Our present opinion is that the proposed contract submitted by REA and read before City Council does not cover all the factors required to insure the type of service necessary to the future growth and prosperity of the community, and we can readily understand why City Council is reluctant to act until the points in question are clarified.

It is possible the insistence of Carrizozo upon the adherence by REA of certain requirements in case of sale would also mean better service for outlying districts brought into the cooperative.

Christmas Seal sales by mail will be conducted in each of New Mexico's 32 counties by local groups which are affiliated with the New Mexico Tuberculosis Association.

Mrs. Clyde Brewster heads the campaign in Lincoln County.

The funds raised by the sale of Christmas Seals are used to control tuberculosis through case finding, health education and rehabilitation. Ninety-four per cent of all money raised through the sale of Christmas seals remains in New Mexico. Six per cent is sent to the National Tuberculosis Association to conduct medical research and the national program of tuberculosis control.

something wrong with our tax assessment methods.

It simply did not make sense that with the great growth in population and wealth in New Mexico that our total property valuation for tax purposes was twenty million dollars less in 1946 than it was 23 years earlier! Some were escaping taxation and others carrying an unfair burden.

This survey is not perfect, of course. Nothing has troubled the state and local governments over the years more than the problem of finding the formula for fair and equitable real and personal property taxation. But if by the survey we have gotten millions of dollars worth of hidden or omitted property on the tax rolls; have straightened out property descriptions and double assessments, and have generally equalized the tax burden on homes and business properties of our people, we have made progress.

The local equalization boards can straighten out any inequities appearing from the general survey, and there must be many. But, we don't burn the barn to kill the rats.

The important thing to remember, however, is that the greater the value of property on the tax rolls, the lower the tax rate for all of us should be.

Our Republican friends will have difficulty making a political issue out of this tax survey. Any such effort will surely kick back, since it was largely the Republican leadership in the state which really gave the Democratic legislature the thought which inspired this honest effort at tax equalization.


VFW Post Urged To Support X-Ray Survey

Choking Cattle Should Be Securely Tied

Cattle choke, caused by attempts to swallow large chunks of feed, calls for immediate restraint of the animal. Like a human being who has something lodged in his throat, the choking cow fears she will suffocate and may get so excited she will harm attendants, herself and property unless she is tied securely.

Animals so affected rarely die, so there is plenty of time to handle the condition calmly and properly. In some cases, they may calm down enough to dislodge the offending object without any help. If not, a veterinarian should be called to give a hypodermic injection. This quiets the animal and relaxes the muscles, making it easier for the object to be coughed up or passed down to the stomach.

Bloating may be a serious consequence of choke, since feed lodged in the throat will prevent belching. If the choke-causing feed is not removed within a reasonable time, surgery will be

According to reports, residents of Ancho and vicinity became enraged last Saturday over the condition of Highway 54. Recent rains have made it almost impassable with mud from six inches to a foot deep.

The Anchotes point out they are weary of election promises that are never fulfilled, and urge the contract be let immediately. They add they have waited 20 years with the road steadily getting worse and communities' progress at a standstill as a result.

For the information of our readers, the Ancho people refer to that section of Highway 54 between Corona and Carrizozo which is not good at any time, and in bad weather is positively hazardous.

In rainy weather, deep dips in the road fill with water, making it dangerous for the unwary motorist. Fatal accidents have occurred on this stretch of highway over which school buses must travel daily.

Residents of Lincoln County report they have tried vainly for 20 years or more to get this particular stretch of road paved, but have only promises to show for their efforts. Just recently, in answer to letters from several Lincoln County residents, Governor Thomas J. Mabry, through Burton Dwyre, state highway engineer, denied he had promised to pave the stretch of Highway 54 between Corona and Carrizozo provided this county supported the passing of the 2 cent tax on gasoline.

Whether or not the residents of Lincoln County who believe they were promised this highway are mistaken in that belief is beside the point. The fact remains the so-called "highway" is a menace to life and property. There are approximately 50 miles left unpaved on this shortest route between Chicago and the West Coast.

Tourists are being advised to avoid this section of Highway 54, and, as a result, they are detouring via Oklahoma and Texas, and New Mexico is losing many dollars in tourist business.

Other tourists who fail to secure information regard Highway 54 between Corona and Carrizozo arrive indignant that no signs are posted warning them of the condition of the road. A Chicago family reached Carrizozo recently after having spent practically a day between Corona and here (81 miles). The driver said he would have plenty to tell the travel agency that routed him this way.

Tourists from Arizona, who were recently given assistance over the muddy and practically impassable road, were astounded that a main highway such as 54 remains unpaved, and said they would warn friends not to travel in New Mexico again.

Death Sentence Appeal Goes To High Court

The Texas firm was low bidder for the installation which the Reclamation Bureau is building there as a link in its Rio Grande power system.
