## State Has First GOP Governor In 20 Years

More than 45,000 Democratic voters scratched their ballots on November 7 to combine with Republican and independent voters to elect Edwin L. Mechem, 38-year-old Las Cruces resident, as New Mexico's first Republican governor in 20 years. Mechem received more than 12,000 votes over his opponent, John E. Miles. Unofficial returns gave Mechem 94,913 and Miles 82,180 votes.

The voters, however, have given Mechem a Democratic legislative, with most of the Democratic candidates piling up majorities of 20,000 to 35,000 votes.

Mechem said Wednesday his victory "was made possible by the votes of members of all parties who are interested in good government." He added he plans to draft a program, immediately upon taking office, which will request governmental reforms indicated as necessary in the light of the vote by the citizens of New Mexico.

Unofficial returns at press time showed 837 out of 830 voting divisions as giving Tibbo Chavez, Democratic candidate for lieutenant governor, 57,779 votes against 53,429 for his Republican opponent, Paul Larrazolo.

Democrats are assured of control of the state House of Representatives where latest returns give them 43 of the 55 seats. They are also assured of the 10-5 majority they had in the Senate 1949 session as all 1949 senators hold over for 1951.

Tom Wiley, Democratic candidate for state superintendent of schools, proved the real vote getter of the campaign by rolling up a majority of almost 35,000 votes over his opponent, Mrs. Edna Rousseau.

Political observers were attempting to analyze the vote that swept out Miles, and gave all but one of the other Democratic candidates majorities of five figures. The consensus of opinion appears to be Miles lost ground on a personal appeal basis and as the center for the charges of machine politics. Republican charges of machine politics were centered on Miles in the general election campaign, and in the June primary, the forces of U. S. Senator Dennis Chavez (D., N. M.) leveled their charges at Miles.

Miles has not only suffered his first defeat in state politics in 24 years, but has also lost the post of chief of the most powerful faction within the Democratic party in New Mexico. In city politics Miles was defeated in his 1942 campaign for mayor of Santa Fe.

## Customer Appreciation Plan Inaugurated Here

The new Customer Appreciation Plan inaugurated last week by Petty's General Merchandise, Carrizozo, has been received with much favorable comment by the public. The local store reports the response to its announcement of the new plan is most gratifying and satisfactory.

## Mechem To Fire All 'Deadheads'

Governor-elect Edwin L. Mechem (R) stated this week 200 to 300 present state employees will be replaced after he takes office. "Those people who have been performing their jobs in a proper manner and not engaging in political activities will not be bothered," he said.

"Any big turnover," he continued, "would throw the machinery out of kilter."

"But the deadheads will go." Among those who political observers feel are almost certain to be replaced are State Purchasing Agent H. N. McDaniel, State Revenue Bureau Commissioner Louis Lujan and most of his division heads, including State Liquor Control Director Tom Montoya, and State Labor Commissioner Alda E. Joiner.

More than 2,000 state employees work under appointive heads, who are either named by the governor directly or by commissions of boards to which the governor names the members.

A number of the board and commission appointments are for specified times but board and commission members customarily offer their resignations to new incoming governors.

State law protecting tenure of commission and board members has been strengthened in recent legislatures and in at least some instances a forcible removing of members would require "cause."

In the case of a number of commissions and boards state law specifically requires that members be appointed from nominations submitted by groups with which the boards deal.

A few appointments require legislative confirmation. One of the commissions which has rigid tenure protection is the new five-man highway commission, which names the director of the highway department.

Governor Mabry has refrained from naming the two additional members of that board, although he can do so at any time before his term is up. The present members and the two new members, if they should be named before Mabry goes out of office, could appeal any removal attempt to the state Supreme Court.

A number of other important commissions have similar tenure appeal.

Among high personnel state departments headed by appointive directors are the state bureau of revenue and its 10 divisions, the state highway department, the state health department and the state welfare department.

In three of these departments, however, the fact that the federal government supplies funds to the state department for its work would bar indiscriminate firing for political reasons. They are the highway department, the state health department, and the state welfare department.

There is no such bar in the state revenue bureau, which has for years been the center of attack against alleged deadheads.

About 245 persons are employed by the 10 divisions in that department.

In addition to the directors of these four departments, other state appointive officials include:

Adjutant general, state bank examiner, state budget director, state comptroller, state engineer, state game warden, state geologist, state labor commissioner, executive secretary, of the public employees retirement association, editor of the New Mexico magazine, state mine inspector, the three members of the public service commission, warden of the state penitentiary, park commissioner, purchasing agent, director of the economic board, chief tax commissioner, tourist bureau director, state police chief.

A number of those appointments, however, are made by members of commissions whose members would hold over unless they resign or were removed from office.

## Carrizozo To Be Site Of Gallery Tournament

Carrizozo will be the site of the gallery tournament next September 2 and 3, according to F. O. Brown, secretary of the Lincoln County Rifle and Pistol Club, which will sponsor the tournament. Marksmen from all parts of the United States are expected to attend.

The county club is affiliated with the National Rifle Association of America, that is sponsoring a program for basic small arms training schools and certified small arms instructors. The program is designed to enable the local clubs to render invaluable service to their communities and contribute to the welfare of the nation.

The purposes of the national association are to provide citizens with training in small arms under the guidance of competent and responsible instructors; to provide standard courses of instruction based on accepted training methods so that citizens given basic training as civilians will be better prepared to render services in defense of the nation whether in the armed forces, auxiliary police or home guard organizations, or as individuals, and to provide a method of training properly qualified civilian small arms instructors as a continuing contribution to the national defense and public safety.

Brown also announced the club's targets were completed last Sunday afternoon, and the members were able to do some target practice.

## Dr. Ziporyn Gives Violin Concert

Music lovers were delighted with the presentation of classical and semi-classical violin selections by Dr. Marvyn Ziporyn in an hour's concert Sunday afternoon at the Carrizozo Elementary School auditorium.

Dr. Ziporyn, who is stationed at the Fort Stanton Hospital, is a nationally known artist and one with exceptional talent.

The artist demonstrated a richly resonant tonal quality, and an impressive capability of shading and nuance in the more delicate passages. Especially captivating was the finesse of Ziporyn's legato and his subtle interpretative phrasing exhibited in the Mendelssohn concerto. Outstanding was the cantabile playing of the larghetto movement of this concerto.

The program opened with a majestic performance of Joachim's claric phantasy. Highly impressive was the vigor and forcefulness of this performance in view of the fact that the violin was unaccompanied and thus compelled to produce its own power and balance. In portions of the phantasy, the violinist actually performed violin and piano parts simultaneously.

During the second part of his program, Ziporyn transported his spellbound audience on a musical tour of Europe.

In spite of an unfortunate accident to his bow, the artist performed with consummate skill such time honored favorites as "La Cinquanteine," "Alcorno Al Serrento" and "Hejre Kafil." In the execution of these works, he displayed a sure and precise intonation, and a virtuosity that shone and sparkled.

Ziporyn's appreciative audience rewarded each selection with long and hearty applause, and were loath to permit him to leave at the conclusion of the concert. The apparently unanimous wish of the audience was that Carrizozo should be favored more often with artists of Ziporyn's ability.

The artist was presented under the auspices of the Lincoln County Democratic Central Committee, of which Carl Ness, Capitan, is chairman.

Immediately following the concert, a silver tea was held on the main floor of the school house by members of the senior class at Carrizozo High School. Coffee, tea and homemade cookies were served from tables covered with lace cloths and attractively decorated with colored crepe paper.

## GOP Wins Six Out Of Ten County Jobs

### City Sets Price On Local Power Plant

The valuation of the Carrizozo power plant and distribution system was placed at \$225,000 by City Council at Tuesday night's meeting.

The subject of the recent mass meeting held in Carrizozo and attended by representatives of the Otero County Electric Cooperative was brought up by the village dads who agreed the matter should not be left hanging fire.

The \$225,000 valuation of the plant is based upon the original cost, income derived, and present property value. Council's plans are to inform the Otero Cooperative they have placed the foregoing valuation on the plant, and if the cooperative is willing to pay \$225,000 the village is willing to negotiate further concerning other portions of the proposed contract as outlined at the mass meeting.

The village dads are of the opinion the contract should include stipulations concerning a standby plant, a consideration for the 25-year franchise requested, as well as other considerations to be determined by council.

Any further negotiations for the proposed sale are contingent upon the Otero County Cooperative being willing to pay \$225,000 for the local plant.

Otherwise, council is in favor of dropping the entire matter as they do not believe they can conscientiously recommend that citizens of Carrizozo accept less than \$225,000 for the power plant and its distribution system.

Other matters discussed by council included the cost of the Socorro Steam Laundry and Dry Cleaners against the village. Council agreed to accept the decision handed down by Judge W. T. Scoggin Jr. in district court, which stipulated a yearly license fee of \$50 to be paid by the Socorro firm to operate in Carrizozo and that both parties pay their own attorney fees and court costs. The plaintiff was not awarded a refund of any moneys paid in excess of \$50 a year for license fees.

A new ordinance covering the reduction of license fees for out-of-town firms operating in Carrizozo is to be prepared and submitted to council. The village dads have taken under consideration a proposition whereby it may be possible to purchase the town's fuel oil at a cheaper rate. Further details are expected at next month's meeting.

Carl Degner, Carrizozo, appeared before Tuesday's meeting of council to protest against any property within the city limits being used as a junk yard. Council will check on ordinances which govern restrictions on property within the city limits.

### Truck Loaded With Cattle Overturns Near Capitan

A truck, loaded with bulls and driven by Joe Herrera, Carrizozo, for Leonardo Vega, also of Carrizozo, overturned Sunday morning about 10 miles from Capitan on the Encinosa road.

The accident occurred when the bulls started fighting and caused the truck to overturn.

Although the truck was badly damaged, Herrera and the cattle escaped injury. The cattle were being driven from the Block Ranch near Capitan.

### Steak House Reopens Under New Management

The Steak House, a Carrizozo restaurant formerly operated by Henry Shores, reopened Saturday under new management.

Mr. and Mrs. T. A. Akins of Los Angeles, Calif., are the new managers and are operating it for the Western Commissary Company of El Paso.

The Akins are originally from San Antonio, Texas, and Mr. Akins has been engaged in the restaurant business for more than 30 years.

The couple have one daughter, Mrs. Billie Moore, Rivera, Calif.

In the election campaigns decided at the polls on Tuesday, J. G. Moore, incumbent Republican candidate for Lincoln County clerk, and S. M. (Sally) Ortiz, incumbent Democratic candidate for county sheriff, received overwhelming majorities against their opponents, Bracell Fresquez and S. E. (Ben) Grelsen, respectively. Unofficial returns gave Moore a lead of 610 over Fresquez, while Ortiz was ahead by a total of 606 votes.

Out of 10 county offices, Tuesday's results placed the Republicans in control of six which were won by substantial majorities.

In the race for state representative, Sixteenth District, L. S. (Heavy) Drake was ahead of his opponent, John C. Davis, by a majority of 106 votes, according to unofficial returns.

Davis was selected late in the campaign to run in the place of Frank Boyce, who resigned to accept a position with a New York investment concern.

Candidates re-elected to second terms include: J. G. Moore (R), county clerk; Elerdo Chavez (D), probate judge; S. M. Ortiz (D), county sheriff; Ramon Luna (D), county assessor, and Mrs. Maudo F. Eshom (D), county treasurer.

All the Republican candidates for the county commissioner offices were elected and include: Granville Richardson, District 1; A. Corbin Hester, District 2, and Wilbur L. McKnight, District 3.

Mrs. Lorine Samelzon, Republican candidate for county superintendent of schools, was successful over her Democratic opponent, Mrs. Elva Wilson.

Unofficial returns show approximately 2,700 votes cast in the county election with the major portion of the offices going to the Republicans.

Republicans were in control of the offices for county commissioner from 1933 until 1949 when Democrats replaced them. The 1950 election shows the voters have reversed themselves and swept the Republicans into all three of these offices.

The normal trend in county elections over the past few years outside of these offices for county commissioners, has been Democratic one time and Republican the next.

Unofficial returns and with the results from three precincts unknown gave 136 votes for the primary convention law and 573 against.

The lead part of Candy Norton in the play, "Half Past Teen" to be presented by the junior class of Carrizozo High School, will be played by Elaine Shults.


Miss Betty Lou Grogan, home economics teacher, is directing practice for the play which the class expects to present early in December.

**Your State Government**

"When we combat despair with hope, hunger with food, misery and sickness with substance, we enrich the hearts and souls of men so that no room is left for anti-democratic ideologies."—Anon.

Now that the election is over we can all settle down to work again. We need have no fear that the dire campaign predictions of political and moral bankruptcy, unless our own slide won, will materialize. New Mexico will move forward. She will have the help and best wishes of the victor and the vanquished alike. And, it would have moved along pretty well if the other fellows had won.

It's a fine tribute to our system of free elections and the good old American way of life, that we can recover from the effects so quickly, if not too completely.

During the remaining weeks of my term I want to go on with my weekly report on how your state government operates.

Public health work is seldom spectacular but it is one of the most important functions of our state government.

This service, among other things, seeks out and destroys the breeding places of mosquitoes which carry malaria. It keeps a close check on the water supplies of all cities and towns to detect and prevent pollution of any kind. It also works with the public schools to prevent illness and to discover cases of sickness so that epidemics can be prevented and measures taken to control any outbreak of contagious diseases.

Because of the work of the Public Health Department, and of our doctors and physicians, most diseases of an epidemic nature have now been brought under control. Smallpox is almost unknown. Diphtheria is not the dreaded killer of babies that it once was, and malaria has virtually been eliminated.

The federal government helps pay the cost of the public health programs. It is generally recognized that good public health is a national asset and since disease knows no boundaries no community is safe until all communities are safe.

The Health Department at the present time has the largest staff in its history. There are a total of 180 persons employed in the various divisions. This is an increase of 24 employees during the last five years. One of the big increases has been in the number of sanitarians now in service throughout the state. A few years ago, low salaries kept many of the positions for sanitarians vacant, but now with better starting salaries most of the places are filled. These men work in the field and it is largely because of their work that we are sure of having a pure supply of milk and of water. We are also fairly certain that the breeders of contagion, such as city dumps, garbage disposal areas and similar places, are properly protected against incubation of harmful germs.

I do not believe any one in the state begrudges the money which the legislature has appropriated to carry on the work of the Department of Public Health—at least, I have heard no complaints.

The meeting was a good thing REA members need to meet more often and learn about their business. REA is the most important single improvement that has come to these counties in the last decade. The rural people have at last learned that by cooperation only can they have the comforts and benefits of living at a price they can afford to pay. We must work harder to strengthen our community spirit and neighborhood relations for unity in our counties and state. Let's all join together in an effort to extend our lines and improve the service of our great cooperative.

In the discussion to, or not to sell to a cooperative, consideration should be given to the long time service to the community. In terms of ultimate rates and conditions that will meet emergency demands of sudden increase in population or the establishment of an unexpected industry.

It is not overstressing the imagination to assume that military operations may extend northward in a single project enough to make residences in Carrizozo desirable for many of the workers, and personnel. In such cases government may be expected to take care of the housing problem, but only at such points where utilities are readily available. It would at the present time take Carrizozo months to bond, to purchase and install any source of electric power wholly adequate for even present security.

In the field of industrial possibilities an ore mill has mushroomed at Corona ready for operation before a majority of the population were aware of its existence. And of a magnitude that will double the local demands on our plant. Without sufficient power it could not have been established.

Decentralization of industry will give most western settlements a chance to absorb a part of the migration, but only so far as utilities are readily expandable to meet the demand.

It is certain that a cooperative, well established and well managed, will do more in the way of rates and services than any small community can do for itself.

Perhaps there are other ways to supply a dependable source of sufficient power, or other cooperative alignments possible. But assuredly the cooperative way with REA assistance seems to be the best answer to a small community's power problems.



## 4-H Recreation Program Is Active In New Mexico

Thousands of 4-H club leaders and members realize the importance of providing recreation for leisure hours of farm and ranch folks. Plans have been worked out during the past three years whereby adults and youth interested in directing recreational activities in their clubs and communities can take a special course set up for that purpose.

This training and club participation, according to L. S. Kurtz, state 4-H club leader for the agricultural extension service at New Mexico A. & M. College, has been brought about through the 4-H recreational and rural arts program now in full swing in New Mexico.

While they are having fun, the 4-H'ers are also working hard to make a good showing for themselves and their club. They receive instruction in group singing, dancing, games, sports, handicrafts and many other activities.

To encourage these endeavors, U. S. Rubber Company provides funds for leader training clinics, club, and individual awards. These awards include \$25 cash awards to counties and Chicago 4-H Club Congress trips to eight national champions.



## Inequities In Reserve Call Charged By VFW Head

Inequities in present regulations regarding the call to active duty of reservists and guardsmen and of men drafted for the armed forces were scored this week by Commander-in-Chief Charles C. Ralls, Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States.

Ralls said that the present system of calling National Guardsmen and reservists, without regard to family ties, former disabilities or other causes for which draftees are deferred, is not compatible to the VFW.

He called for early revision of these regulations so that a more balanced and justifiable program could be arranged in building up armed forces personnel.

"Men who have served their country," Ralls declared, "have never hesitated to answer that call again; but we do feel that there should be an equalization between those who have never worn a uniform and those men who have previously jeopardized their safety in the nation's interest."

"One glaring inequity seems to be that inactive reservists with service disabilities ranging up to 30 per cent or more are being recalled and placed on limited active duty. Certainly, some of the deferred draftees could also serve on limited duty where some physical qualities may be lacking."

"The VFW is also on record as favoring the advance of the draft age to 35 years and tightening up on deferments which might give the Selective Service boards a greater opportunity to work out a justifiable program," he said.

"While I understand that the House Armed Services Commit-

## New Mexico Allotted \$373,161 Lunch Program

New Mexico will be allotted \$373,161 for the operation of the National School Lunch Program during the 1950-51 school year, according to the Production and Marketing Administration of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Funds are apportioned on the basis of a formula which takes into account the number of children of school age and the per capita income of each state. These funds are used to reimburse participating schools in part for their local food purchases.

In addition to the funds apportioned in states and territories, \$17,250,000 is available to the department for the purchase and distribution to states of foods needed to meet specific nutritional requirements of school children.

The law requires that each dollar, of which Representative Carl Vinson is chairman, has under consideration corrective legislation to present to Congress upon its return to Washington on November 27, the VFW feels that something should be done for those who have already been inducted under this unequal setup.

"It seems to us to be eminently unfair to call reservists and guardsmen regardless of age or disability, dependences and jobs which they now hold, and then to exempt from the draft men over 25 years or with a dependant. Most of these reservists have already seen active military service in World War II."

"This manner of selection," Ralls continued, "for armed forces duty seems to place the burden pretty much on the veterans, many of whom have already served a number of years on active duty—and in combat."

"The Veterans of Foreign Wars sincerely hopes that Chairman Vinson and his committee will wipe out these inequities and see to it that the disparity now prevailing between the two groups will be ended," Ralls concluded.




