Lincoln County residents may well be proud of Lincoln County Municipal Hospital, Carrizozo, which will celebrate the first anniversary of its official opening on February 1.

The efficient management by the hospital board and officials has made this first year one of truly remarkable progress. Although the records indicate the hospital has operated at only approximately 30 per cent of capacity, it shows a substantial net profit. Yet patients are treated at about one half the cost of larger town institutions.

The initial cost of hospitalization may appear higher today than in the past. When one takes into consideration, however, the shorter length of time spent by the average patient in a hospital now, it will be realized the cost has actually been lowered.

The ability of the average patient to return to gainful employment sooner than was formerly possible marks a substantial reduction in the overall cost. In 1930 the average time spent in a hospital per patient was 17 days as against 3.3 days at present. In 1930, the charge for a ward bed was \$3 or \$4 per day as against \$8 for that service now.

Another factor of extreme importance to possible patients is the local hospital's policy of not demanding advance payment or cash payment upon discharge. Officials report this policy is working out very well except in a few cases where there is laxity in payment of bills, and which in turn may force the hospital authorities to resort to legal means.

It is hard to understand why anyone would fail to cooperate with the generous policy of the local hospital. Very few of them operate on such a liberal basis and money is needed for their work just as in any other business. Few small towns have the facilities offered by the Lincoln County Municipal Hospital, and Carrizozo residents are doubly fortunate in having it located here. Only one who has had urgent need of a hospital's facilities can appreciate the meaning of having a good one close at hand.

Those who would hinder and tear down a hospital's operation by failure to cooperate in every possible way should carefully consider what its absence would mean to the community and to themselves.

Not only does the hospital supply a vital need of the community, but in this period of uncertainty and worry about possible all-out war, its value increases even more. Even though our community might escape the horror of a bombing attack, its hospital facilities would assume tremendous importance as a means of rendering medical aid to possible bombing victims from outside areas, and in case of a third world war, an attack in this area is not an impossibility.

One comes now to the dark side of the glowing picture of progress of our local hospital, and that is the condition of certain roads in this county. It is a sad fact that many persons who need hospitalization avoid it rather than travel over some of the roads in our county when they are seriously ill. These roads are not necessarily little used ones either. Highway 54 between Carrizozo and Corona is one of the roads in question. Designated as a main federal highway, it is not in as good condition as many private roads maintained by residents of the county.

One patient who was driven over Highway 54 recently had suffered a serious injury. Because of the jolting caused by the road's roughness, the patient had suffered great loss of blood by the time he arrived at the hospital.

There are many other cases of persons with broken bones and other injuries who must be driven over this rough highway thereby increasing their suffering and even possibly adding to the injuries already suffered.

The communities of Ancho and Corona are located on a federal aid highway which covers several states and is completely paved with the exception of some 50 miles between Carrizozo and Duran. At times this stretch is in such impassable condition

The beginning of the Southwestern Livestock Show in El Paso February 14 will start off with a bang when the biggest parade in El Paso's history winds through the downtown streets, H. D. Fulwiler, parade chairman, announced this week.

Mayors of 40 southwestern communities have been invited to participate in the parade of rancheros. Also the sheriff's posse of 44 communities have been invited to participate in making this an outstanding rodeo parade.

Production Authority Bans Commercial Construction

In its most sweeping and drastic action yet, the National Production Authority of the Department of Commerce banned almost all types of commercial construction. T. U. Purcell, district manager for the Department of Commerce in El Paso, announced.

The action was announced in an amendment to the old construction order, NPA Order M-4, which has been in effect since last October 26 and which prohibited the construction of amusement and recreational facilities. The amended order, which became effective at midnight January 13, prohibits the commencing of construction, except under direct authorization from NPA, of any building, structure or project to be used for, or in connection with, any of a long list of specified purposes.

Included in the list are: banks, credit institutions, brokerage establishments, community or neighborhood buildings, barber shops, beauty shops, undertaking and mortuary establishments, cemetery buildings, mausoleums,

crematories, garages, service stations, shoe repair shops, laundries, dry cleaning establishments, tailor shops, hotels, motels, motor courts, tourist camps, trailer camps, loft buildings, office buildings, outdoor advertising signs, printing and duplicating establishments, restaurants, retail stores, shopping centers, wholesale establishments with certain exceptions, gasoline filling stations, drug stores, soda fountains, florist shops, greenhouses and storage warehouse for personal effects. Schools, churches, hospitals and highway and road construction jobs are unaffected by the new order. The order provides any person

desiring to erect buildings or structures of the types enumerated may apply to the NPA for authority to commence such construction. It sets forth the various factors which NPA will consider in granting or rejecting such applications. The primary consideration will be whether or not the proposed construction will further the defense effort or is essential to the maintenance of public health, safety or welfare. Detailed information concerning the construction order, as well as all other NPA orders and regulations, may be obtained from the El Paso office of the U. S. Department of Commerce, 209 Chamber of Commerce Building, El Paso, Texas.

AROUND THE HOUSE

Gilt frames never need any thing more than dusting as long as people understand they're supposed to be antiques. If you want to clean them up and forget the antique gag, it can be done by floating the frame with petroleum jelly. Let the jelly stay on about ten minutes before you rub it off with a clean cloth. Or boil a few onions and douse the frame with a cloth dipped in the water the onions were boiled in. Then rinse it off with a cloth dipped in clear water.

Or, have the area covered with a large piece of plate glass. Attach it with "corner brackets" or hang it like a mirror.

When painted kitchen walls get soiled and dull looking and a new paint job isn't forthcoming, wash them with soap and water, rinse with clear water, and wipe them dry with a soft cloth. Then you can restore a new look to the paint by going over it with the white, creamy type of furniture polish.

In kitchenettes where serving-table space is scarce, if you have the kind of ironing board that comes out of the wall, let it come out just before dinner's ready to be served. It'll give you added space on which to put serving dishes and such. If you're going to use it regularly, you might make an cloth cover for the board.

A shoe bag that's not being used for that purpose can be put to work in the kitchen. Hang it behind the kitchen door as a container for paper bags, wrapping paper, string, and the like.

If your breadbox gets rusty inside, clean it up by rubbing gently with emery cloth. To keep it clean use a coat of lard.

Spattered grease on the wall-paper behind your stove can be removed easily if you paint the paper, while it's new, with a coat of colorless shellac. To be more elaborate, you can hang an oil-cloth wall rug behind the stove.

SCRIPTURE: Mark 3:17-4:34
DEVOTIONAL READING: Matthew 5:1-12

The Great Teacher
Lesson for January 28, 1951

WE HEAR a lot about a "better world." God pity the poor lot who thinks the world as it is, is all right! And may God stab awake those who are afraid to try to make this world better. If you want to see a group of people who are not afraid, and are really working at this, go to your nearest Sunday school. There you will find teachers of religion. They may be doing a good job or a poor one; but anyhow they are trying. And when one of these teachers succeeds, even a little, in what they are all trying to do, the world has already been made a little better.

Greatest of Teachers
EVERY Sunday school teacher, or any other sort, for that matter, should study the methods of Jesus to see what good teaching can be. He is and will always be THE Teacher.

His object was not to teach science or history. The only technique he taught was the most important of all—the technique of fine living. His object was to teach "what we are to believe concerning God, and what duties God requires of man." In short, his subjects were Faith and Life, not separately but welded into one.

Down Where We Live
The method was always simple. He did not use long words, he did not "put his hat on such a high shelf that only intellectual giraffes could reach it," as Billy Sunday expressed it. Common people heard him gladly, because he taught in the kind of language they used, he spoke of things that were familiar to them.

So the good teacher today never teaches over the heads of the class. This means he has to have a good imagination, has to make believe to himself that he is one of the class instead of the teacher. He has to remember how the world looked to him when he was a boy, he has to stay young in heart.

Jesus could surely have taught more profoundly than he did. Indeed, he said at the end of his days, "I have many things to say to you, but ye cannot bear them now." However true a thing might be, he would not say it if his hearers were not ready for it.

Truth in Pictures
WHEN Jesus taught in pictures we call them parables. The best-loved and remembered parts of his teaching are the stories he told. Every one of them was simple; they were about the kinds of people his listeners knew or had often heard of.

The good teacher will always use illustrations. But the best ones will come right out of the experience of the pupils. Jesus never quoted from a book his hearers had not read. He never used illustrations that only a Ph.D. could understand. Furthermore, he never tried to teach two things at once.

A teacher, looking over a Sunday school lesson, may find it full of suggestive ideas; but it is generally better to pick out one truth and illustrate it in several ways, as Jesus did when speaking of the Kingdom of God, than it is to try to bring out everything that could be brought out, and so confusing the class.

Making Them Think
NOW some teachers, trying to be simple, succeed only in being dull. The good teacher must keep the class awake, otherwise no one can learn anything. There is a good motto which might be borrowed by all Sunday school teachers: "Nothing that is not interesting; not everything that is interesting; nothing merely because it is interesting."

Jesus gained attention and interest in various ways. One was the "cryptic" nature of his teaching; that is, it was often puzzling. There was often something that sent listeners away thinking: "Now what did he mean by that?" Confucius once remarked: "I give my pupil one corner of an idea. I cannot get the other three corners for myself. I do not want him for my pupil." So Jesus often gave out one corner of a truth and let his hearers find themselves wandering out the other three.
