Local Residents Urged To Boil Drinking Water

Residents of Carrizozo are boiling their drinking water after the State Public Health Department announced Tuesday samples showed positive for the coliform group. H. T. Miller, sanitarian with the State Department of Public Health, is expected to return to Carrizozo shortly for additional samples from the village's water supply.

A telephone call from Miller to the News-Outlook Wednesday indicated Southern Pacific Company officials are taking immediate action to insure the purity of Carrizozo's water supply. Miller reported F. D. Robinson, El Paso, division superintendent for the company, has promised he will "step up" chlorination and will cooperate fully with the state department. Robinson told Miller an engineer will be in Carrizozo to investigate the situation.

Earlier this week, the sanitarian informed the News-Outlook samples from the village's water system showed positive for the coliform group. As a result of the tests made by the state public health laboratory in Albuquerque, Miller stated the town's water supply is being carefully observed by both the State Health Department and the Lincoln County Health Department.

Dr. J. P. Turner, local physician, told the News-Outlook Tuesday night he advises residents of the community to boil all drinking water, and that if another test shows positive he will recommend vaccination. Circulars were distributed in Carrizozo Wednesday advising residents to boil all drinking water.

Sheriff S. M. Ortiz, who Tuesday released six prisoners held in the local jail, said he did so because there was no water for drinking or sanitary facilities for the prisoners. He added he will refuse to place any prisoners in the local jail until the deplorable sanitary conditions are corrected.

Miller stated he felt certain Southern Pacific officials will act immediately to insure a pure water supply for the community. The situation at present poses a health problem not only to residents of Carrizozo, but to passengers on the company's trains which stop here to replenish water supplies.

One report—that the breakdown in the chlorination process was due to the power failure this week—was proved unfounded when it was disclosed the samples of water which showed positive for the coliform group were taken about 10 days prior to the date of interruption of electrical service.

Miller reported he will be in Carrizozo again within a few days to take new samples from the town's water supply.

Lee Peek, newly appointed sanitarian for Lincoln County, accompanied Miller on his trip to Carrizozo this week.

Maybe Carrizozo Is Nearing Flood Stage

Recent chapters herein regarding the possibility of the sale of the Bonito Dam on account of the usage of the diesel engines on the Southern Pacific road has brought several letters, all of them highly informative, in regard to the situation concerning the water supply that is taken from the Bonito River, piped down the hill and then forced north as far as Pastura. All intermediate points, like Vaughn, have gotten their supply from this source for decades. It is a legend that there is no underground water anywhere along that more than a hundred miles.

From three notes received by this writer are gathered some startling:

A source of water has been found close to Carrizozo in underground wells, each of which will supply 2,000 gallons a minute, with a lift of less than 100 feet.

Adequate water has been found in less than 25 miles of Vaughn.

There is little difference in the amount of water used by a Diesel engine and a steam locomotive.

One of the large wells mentioned above at the door of Carrizozo is less than two miles from the railroad track.

While these new sources have water of some mineralization, it is all usable.

A majority of the people of Ruidoso are opposed to all except pari-mutual gambling.

In proportion many more people attend church in Ruidoso than in Roswell.

Publication of the entire letter, and the name of the writer is prevented by the request of the writer, but the information he gives may be accepted as correct, so good to his reputation for truth and veracity.

Certainly it is a good thing to get these items of information, so now that they may be said to be "just off the bat." The town of Ruidoso is making a gallant battle for its rightful place in the sun as a great mountain resort, and the more truth that is available the better. Certainly there is no adverse feeling on the part of this writer, who has been in touch with the creek for more than half a century.

County Schools Supt. Offices To Be Moved

Mrs. Lorine Samelson of Carrizozo, county schools superintendent, said this week arrangements are practically completed for removal of records and equipment from the county schools office to new quarters in the county library here.

Mrs. Samelson said approval of the district attorney, county commissioners and the county school board had been secured for the transfer, and that she believes it will promote efficiency and economy, inasmuch as it is a means for combining all records kept by the county schools office and library.

The offices of the Carrizozo Soil Conservation Service and Production Marketing Administration, which are now combined, will occupy the quarters vacated by Mrs. Samelson.

The cut for the above picture was received too late for last week's issue. Shown is one of the numerous leaks which have been occurring in the Southern Pacific Company's water line between the cutoff outside the village of Carrizozo and entrance into the town's water mains. The picture was taken Saturday morning, June 23, the day that the business district and 80 per cent of the residential district were without water. Railroad officials since that date have confirmed an earlier statement Bonito Dam (source of Carrizozo's water supply as well as that of other villages north to and including Vaughn and adjacent land are for sale. The company has stated its dieselizing program which should be completed anytime within the next two weeks to four months makes the Bonito Dam no longer essential to its operations. However, the week following that statement by railroad officials, the company without prior notice ordered the Carrizozo line "pinched" because water was needed for trains running out of the village. Bakery And Lunch Room Opens In Carrizozo

The bakery and lunch room which opened this week in Carrizozo is owned and operated by Mrs. Gussie Wanderer. The new business place is located next door to the local bank, and about a block from the courthouse.

Specializing in baked goods, it is equipped to serve short orders, sandwiches, coffee, tea and cold beverages. Bread and rolls made by the owner will also be served. A variety of baked goods is available for outside sales, and Mrs. Wanderer is prepared to accept special occasion orders.

It is planned to serve a "businessman's lunch" at a later date after all the lunchroom equipment has been received. A familiar term back in the middle western and eastern states, the lunch is built around one entree and varies daily.

Mrs. Wanderer plans to keep her lunch room open 24 hours a day.

Born in a small town in Pennsylvania, Mrs. Wanderer lived in New York City for a number of years, but was never satisfied with "big city" living after having known the friendliness of the village where she spent her girlhood.

In 1941, Mrs. Wanderer made her first trip to New Mexico and the far west and was especially pleased with the state known as "The Land of Enchantment." Her decision to make her home in New Mexico could not be fulfilled immediately because of business and personal reasons in New York City, and it was several years later before she could wind up her interests in the eastern city and move to this state.

Mrs. Wanderer, who came to Carrizozo only recently, was employed locally until she opened her bakery and lunch room.

Mrs. Wanderer has had considerable experience in bakery and lunch room work.

The new member of the community is enthusiastic about the Carrizozo climate and said she didn't mind the occasional wind and sand storms. More important to her than the wind and sand problems is the friendliness extended her by the Carrizozoans and other residents of Lincoln County. It has all helped, said Mrs. Wanderer, to make her feel she is "back home again."

Glen A. Snow Attending Reserve Officers Camp

Cadet Glen A. Snow, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Snow, Sr., Carrizozo, arrived at Fort Hood, Texas, recently to attend the Reserve Officers Training Corps summer camp.

Cadet Snow, major in biology at State College, will receive six weeks of intensive field training. Emphasis will be placed on the development of leadership qualities and tactical employment of the latest weapons and equipment. The cadets will participate in actual operations of a military unit under simulated battle conditions.

The camp is being conducted for nearly 1,000 advanced military students from 20 colleges, universities and military academies in 10 different states and the Territory of Puerto Rico. Satisfactory completion of summer camp and required military instruction at school will qualify Cadet Snow for a commission as a second lieutenant in the United States Army.

Carrizozo Attorney To Occupy New Offices

George L. Zimmerman, local attorney, will move into new office quarters July 9, it was announced this week.

The building, located on Highway 54 opposite the courthouse, which has been under construction by the Harley Lumber Company, is practically completed except for finishing touches. Styled in the California manner, with stucco and redwood exterior, it is designed to harmonize with its New Mexico setting.

The side and rear walls of the building are stucco and painted venetian green with redwood trim. The large picture window in the front of the building permits ample lighting in the reception room, and ceiling-high windows have been placed along the side walls to supplement it and the large window on the rear wall in the attorney's private office. The sloping modernistic roof has a facing of redwood for smooth blending with the exterior walls.

The interior of the structure is partitioned to provide two offices—the front office is designed for use by the attorney's secretary and as a reception room. The walls of this room are painted off green and point up the beautiful sheen of the birchwood doors. Built-in cabinets and woodwork are of pine wood. Zimmerman's office in the rear is finished in knotty pine with shelves lining the side walls from floor to the bottom of the ceiling-high windows. A rear entrance has been provided as a safety factor. Panel ray heating is provided in both offices.

A wash room opens off the front office and the flooring is cement covered with asphalt tile in mottled green with trim of mottled red.

Mrs. Mildred Hust is the local attorney's secretary.

Juveniles Apprehended

The five juveniles who are accused of breaking and entering property owned by Brack Cornett, Carrizozo, are scheduled to appear in court for hearing on July 23.

They are charged with stealing gunny sacks, destroying sacks of feed and pouring the feed on the floor of the building where it was stored.

New County Librarian

Announcement was made this week of the appointment of Mrs. Richard Cordes as county librarian. Mrs. Cordes, who has been residing in Albuquerque, assumed her new duties July 1. She was formerly employed in the county clerk's office.

Committee Named To Study Bonito Purchase

Commissioners Asked To Erect Hondo Bridge

A delegation of Hondo residents asked the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners at their regular meeting July 2 for a new bridge there. Lincoln McTeigue, Albert Richardson and Lupe Costillo told the commissioners there are holes in the bridge and that loose boards and faulty foundations make it dangerous for crossing. It was pointed out a safe and adequate bridge is needed at this time also in order for the farmers in the area to haul out their products now available. When told there is no money at present for such construction, the Hondoites said they will be satisfied if adequate repairs are made. The commissioners agreed to see that the bridge is refloored, guard rails erected and the foundation strengthened. It was reported the county road grader is in the area and will be used in connection with the bridge repairs. The Hondoites told the commissioners a group of residents from that community will assist with the repair work. The bridge, which children as well as adults are compelled to use, will be repaired in such manner as to definitely make it one-way only.

Manuel Corona, San Patricio, was present to tell the commissioners a culvert is needed at the point the school bus turns onto the main highway there. Corona said water drains off the highway and washes out the gravel. Upon questioning, it was learned that section of road belongs to the state and the matter is to be referred to their attention. Commissioner McKnight said that portion of the road should be built up in such manner school buses and other vehicles will have a parking area instead of having to pull up a steep hill directly onto the highway. It was pointed out visibility at that particular point is very poor.

Lloyd Gibson, member of the Ruidoso-Hondo Hospital board, and Dr. W. E. Huddleston, retired from the U. S. Public Health Service, were also present at this week's meeting of the commissioners. Dr. Huddleston showed the commissioners a telegram he had received from the chairman of the Ruidoso-Hondo Hospital board requesting that he submit his resignation for consideration of the hospital board at their June 25 meeting. Huddleston stated that nothing was done by the hospital board at that meeting but on the following Friday night he accidentally walked in on another meeting of board members and was informed he had been dismissed. Gibson claimed he had not been notified of the Friday meeting. Verbal charges were made by the two men but no evidence to substantiate their claims was presented to the commissioners.

Gibson and Huddleston appeared to think the county commissioners could intervene concerning the dismissal but were told the commissioners do not believe they have jurisdiction over the matter, inasmuch as the hospital board is in control. Gibson and Huddleston then asked if the commissioners would meet with the Ruidoso City Council, but a telephone call to that village revealed the Ruidoso councilmen appeared of the belief they have no jurisdiction in the matter either.

County, State Budget Hearings Scheduled

Hearings on 1951 county and municipal budgets in Lincoln County have been announced by Fred W. Moxey, Santa Fe, chief tax commissioner. The following itinerary is reported:

Carrizozo—Friday, July 13, 10 A. M., courthouse; 1 P. M., City Hall.
Corona—Friday, July 13, 2 P. M., City Hall, Carrizozo.
Capitan—Friday, July 13, 4 P. M., City Hall, Capitan.
Ruidoso—Saturday, July 14, 10 A. M., City Hall, Ruidoso.
The public is welcome to attend these hearings.

Carrizozo City Council met Friday night in special session and approved a resolution appointing a committee of three to meet with similar committees from Corona and Vaughn within the next week to 10 days in connection with a possible purchase of the Bonito water system. Councilman Roy Shafer made the motion Carrizozo go on record to explore the feasibility of acquiring the Bonito Dam water system from the Southern Pacific Company. Members appointed to the local committee are Messrs. Frank A. English, R. E. Lemon and C. A. Snow. These men will meet with committees from the other two villages to discuss whether a survey of acquisition is to be made to determine the feasibility of such purchase. Mayor Vernon Petty will work with the local committee.

P. B. Harris, land and tax agent for the Southern Pacific Company at El Paso, at a meeting in Corona this week, confirmed the report that Bonito Dam and adjacent land are for sale as soon as the company is through with the property. Completion of the railroad's dieselizing program is expected sometime within the next two weeks to four months, he stated.

Representatives of the three villages at the joint meeting in Corona this week indicated the communities are very much interested in the possibility of purchasing the water system, since, at present, there is no known usable supply available to any of them. The committees will send letters to the railroad company requesting definite information concerning purchase price, time element, etc., as well as contact various state agencies relative to making surveys without cost to the villages. When the committees are ready to report on their findings, another joint meeting of the three communities will be held.

Mention was made at Friday's meeting of a bill passed by the last Legislature providing that two or more incorporated villages may go together to purchase a water system and acquire all rights from the former owner and operate it in the same manner or as may be determined by a board of directors to be appointed. As provided in the bill, financing would be by revenue bonds. The board of directors would be responsible for getting the water to each community concerned.

The resolution passed by the local council does not commit the village of Carrizozo to purchase the Bonito Dam water system, and is only to determine whether such purchase is feasible. It was pointed out that Harris, railroad

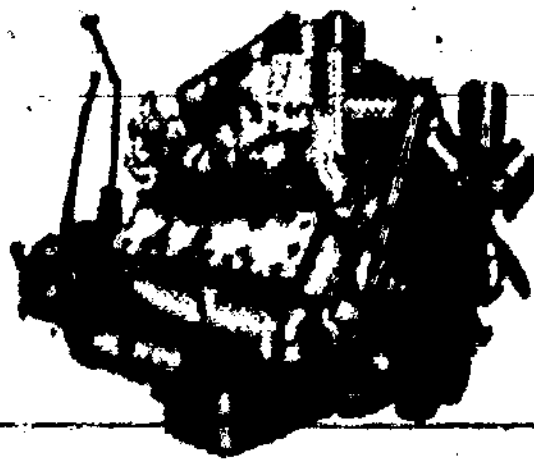

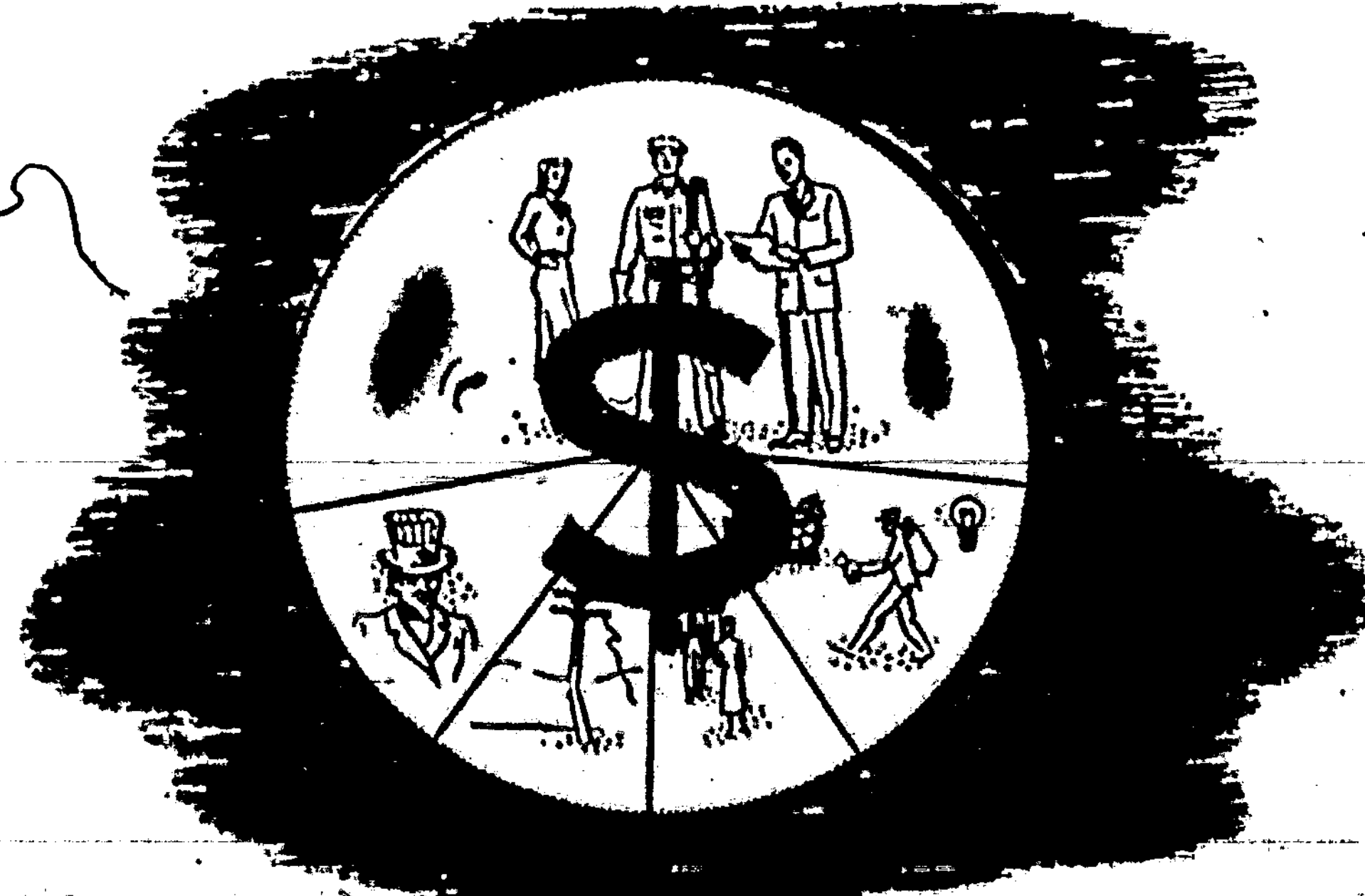

representative, had stressed his company had not as yet set a price on the property.
A brief on the pipe lines, furnished by the SF, indicates there are 152 miles of lines, and maintenance, etc., are problems which must be investigated by the committees of the three villages.
Mayor Petty told the group a crew from the New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology, Socorro, is in the area in an effort to locate a usable supply of water for the village. Data on the findings from this survey are expected to be available to the village about 10 days after completion of this work, he said. Dr. E. J. Workman, president of the Socorro school, offered the services of these men free of charge to the village. At this time, however, it is not known whether a suitable supply of water can be found in the vicinity of Carrizozo.
The mayor introduced Bert Pfingsten, Hondo, who said he is interested in purchasing the farm land in the vicinity of land already owned by him, either in combination with the villages or with other interested groups.
It was revealed three engineering firms have offered their services free of charge to Carrizozo.
Max Littell of the Roswell firm Allison, Littell & Burns, Inc., was introduced at Friday's meeting and explained his firm is interested in the development of the property as a resort area, but they do not want the water system nor the farming land. Littell is convinced that since the three groups are interested in different aspects of the property, a mutual benefit association could be formed and all interested parties secure their objectives.
He presented a rough contract drawn on the presumption that such mutual benefit association can be formed. The contract stated the Roswell firm represented Pat Farrar, Ruidoso, and Bert Pfingsten, "among others." Farrar also attended last week's special meeting. Littell declined at this time to name the "others" mentioned in the contract other than to say they are from Texas.
The Roswell man reported his firm had started its preliminary investigation last November concerning the purchase of the railroad property, and commented that even his city might someday

Consumer's View

PRESIDENT Truman has always felt that he made a mistake in yielding to cabinet advisers in October 1946 when he modified price controls on meat. This is one reason why he has become literally a personal crusader against the meat packers and for the consumer in the current battle over price controls.

Conferring privately with his congressional leaders last week, the President really let loose at the big meat packers.

"They are worried about losing some of their big profits," he declared. "But they have brought it on themselves by inflating prices and squeezing the consumer."

He added that certain vocal elements among the cattlemen do not speak for the livestock industry.

"I have some close friends in the business out in my area, which is the biggest cattle market in the world," Truman continued. "and they tell me that they are not at all disturbed by the government's controls on beef."

"These men came to Washington and talked it over with Mike-Di Salle. They want to make money like everybody else, but they are putting the national interest above selfish interests."

If the anti-price control lobby had its way and all price controls were abolished, the American consumer wouldn't be the only victim, the President emphasized. Many dairy and poultry farmers would be hard hit, he explained, since wealthy cattle interests could outbid them for feed grains, which are in short supply.

The same feed is required for chickens and dairy cattle as for beef cattle, Truman said, and beef producers would be willing to pay almost any price to fatten up their cattle for market, knowing they could pass the extra cost on to consumers if there were no controls.

"The trouble is we in congress are not hearing from the consumers on this," remarked Rep. Paul Brown of Georgia. "We are hearing a lot from the other side, which is against controls, but the consumer isn't saying very much."

"Oh, yes, he is," responded Truman. "I'm the representative of the consumer."

Marshall vs. MacArthur

Real fact about Secretary of Defense Marshall's trip to Tokyo was that he wanted to be in Korea at this particular time—the rainy season—because he is interested in the morale of the Japs.

The secrecy surrounding his trip was partly a test and had little to do with the enemy. Marshall has been misled over the leak of important secrets from the Pentagon, and wanted to see whether plans for his trip would also leak. He made the plans more than three weeks ago, but told only two or three people. They didn't leak.

It's significant that Marshall visited Tokyo almost immediately after General MacArthur left. It's no secret that the two men never got along well, Marshall having been a strong Pershing man and the young captain on Pershing's staff who worked out the strategy for the transfer of the American expeditionary force from Sa. Mi. Ichi to the Mento-Arigma front without the enemy knowing it. Marshall's report is pronounced this an amazing job.

While Marshall was an unobtrusive 36-year-old captain with Pershing, MacArthur was a spectacular 37-year-old brigadier general with the Rainbow division. After the war, MacArthur kept in the limelight, first as commander of West Point, later as a brigadier general in the Philippines, then as chief of staff. Marshall meanwhile was only a colonel—despite the fact that he had Pershing's potent backing.

However, Pershing and MacArthur weren't getting along well, and MacArthur, not Pershing, was on the upgrade in the army. Both were rivals at one time for the hand of Louise Cromwell, daughter of the J. P. Morgan partner, Edward T. Stotesbury. In the end, she turned down the widower Pershing, married the younger man—MacArthur. Meanwhile, with MacArthur in the saddle, Marshall remained a lowly colonel. It was not until 1933, after MacArthur had been transferred to the Philippines more or less permanently, that Roosevelt recognized Marshall's ability.

Aussie Friend of U.S.

Sir Keith Murdoch, who owns most of the newspapers in Australia and is a potent friend of the United States, visited Washington the other day on one of his annual trips between London and "down under."

Sir Keith's observations on the U.S.A. are worth noting. He found us: 1. The best-informed nation in the world; and 2. the nation with the freest discussion of problems in the world.

SCANNING THE WEEK'S NEWS of Main Street and the World

Korean Conflict Is One Year Old; World War May Have Been Averted

SOON, IF AT ALL—A few days ago—June 25—the Korean war was one year old. Today, after a year of fighting Communism in battle, the questions uppermost in the minds of most Americans is what are the chances for world peace? Is World War III nearer or more remote?

A great many unknown factors and "ifs" arise with such questions. But there is a growing belief in the world today that a general war is more remote than a year ago. This reasoning is based mainly upon two points: (1) The free nations of the world are growing stronger every day; (2) the free world has demonstrated in deeds as well as words it will resist aggression.

There is one fact that none of the free nations of the world is overlooking. There is the possibility, in the face of the west's growing strength, that the Soviet Union realizes it must act soon—if at all. To wait would only give the west time to grow so strong that victory for Communism would be an impossibility.

The Korean war seems to have accomplished several things. It brought to life the west's lagging plans to marshal military, political and economic resources to meet future aggression. And these moves may have served as a deterrent to ambitious aggressors.

TEXAS TOUR—Gen. Douglas MacArthur flew to Texas for a number of official receptions and speeches. For three days he preached his doctrine of a realistic approach to far east problems. He went so far in a Dallas speech as to say "It is fantastically unrealistic to refuse to accept the fact that we are at war—a bitter, savage and costly war."

But the colorful general who has caused more controversy in a few months than many prominent figures do in a lifetime, departed from his main theme to take a slap at the domestic policies of the Truman administration.

"There are those who seek to make the burden of taxation so great and the progressive increases so alarming that the spirit of adventure, tireless energy, and masterful initiative which built the material strength of the nation shall become stultified and inert," he said. "There are those who seek to make all men servants of the state."

The departure from the main theme of his speeches since he returned to the United States increased speculation that the general may be planning a political career despite his assertion he is not interested in entering politics. The Texas visit has been called a test for future political moves.

GRAIN FOR INDIA—The long delayed grain bill, lending India \$190,000,000 on easy terms to buy to 2,000,000 tons of U.S. wheat and other basic foodstuffs, was signed into law by President Truman.

The bill was subject to months of heavy debate in congress before it was finally passed. Critics argued that India's opposition to some U.S. policies in Korea made her an ill deserving beneficiary. Backers said it had a humanitarian purpose and, besides, it would help line up India with the western world as opposed to the Communist bloc.

In the months of debate many forgot the fact that the food purchased by the loan will prevent famine in India. It was the only humane thing this nation could do.

PRICE CONTROLS—By the time this reaches print the defense production act which gives the government the power to control prices, wages and rents may or may not have been extended. In all probability it will have, but it will not contain the broader powers as asked by President Truman.

Special interests—the cattle industry, landlords, the building industry and others—have used every trick at their command to get amendments tacked to the act that would be to their advantage.

As a result, the house banking committee voted tentatively to knock out two future price rollbacks on live cattle planned by the office of price stabilization. Also, the senate banking committee voted to renew and extend the government's rent-control program. But the senate committee at the same time recommended a raise in some of the rent ceilings.

The committee felt that a 20 per cent increase should be allowed in some areas. Many of these areas already had from 10 to 30 per cent increases above 1942 levels.

As for the house vote on beef rollbacks, it was a direct slap at the administration's beef policies. The vote was in the form of an amendment that would limit future price rollbacks on all agricultural commodities to 50 per cent of prices on May 10, 1951.

Whatever its form, the new defense production act will be far from what President Truman asked.

MACARTHUR HEARINGS—Any day now the MacArthur hearings will close. It would be interesting to know what historians will make of the incident and read into the millions of words of testimony.

No hearing or debate in American history ever caused so much comment in the big towns and the home towns of the nation. And possibly no incident in modern history, excepting World War II and the Korean war, received such coverage in the nation's press. It made good reading in dailies and small town newspapers alike.

The debate may have been good for the nation, and certainly, was carried out in the best American tradition of free speech and thought. But there was one regrettable aspect of the hearing. Our potential enemies now know the inner thoughts and reasoning of American foreign policy. Our policies are an open book to the entire world.

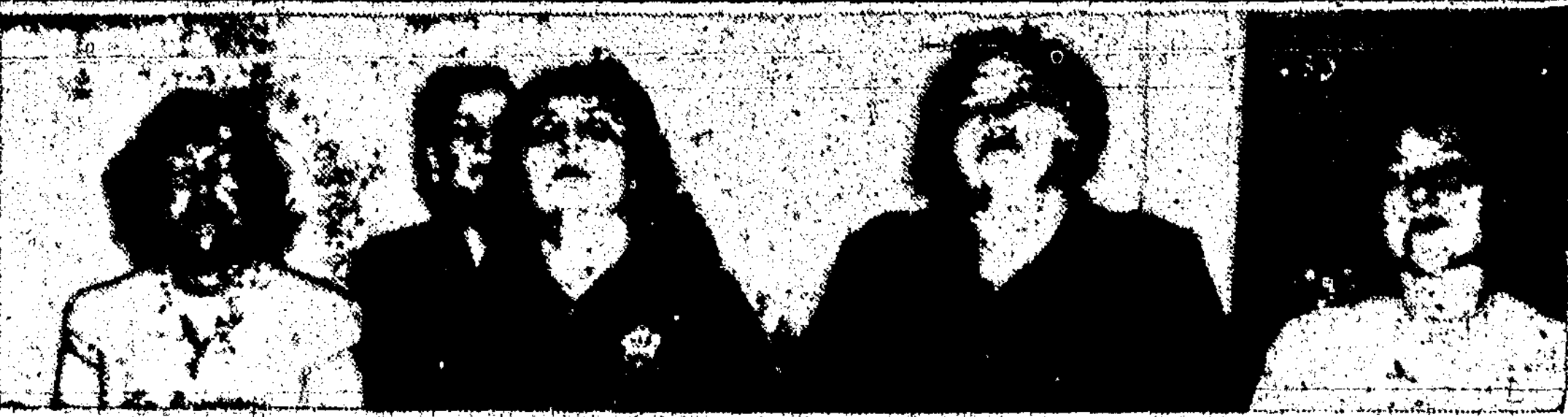

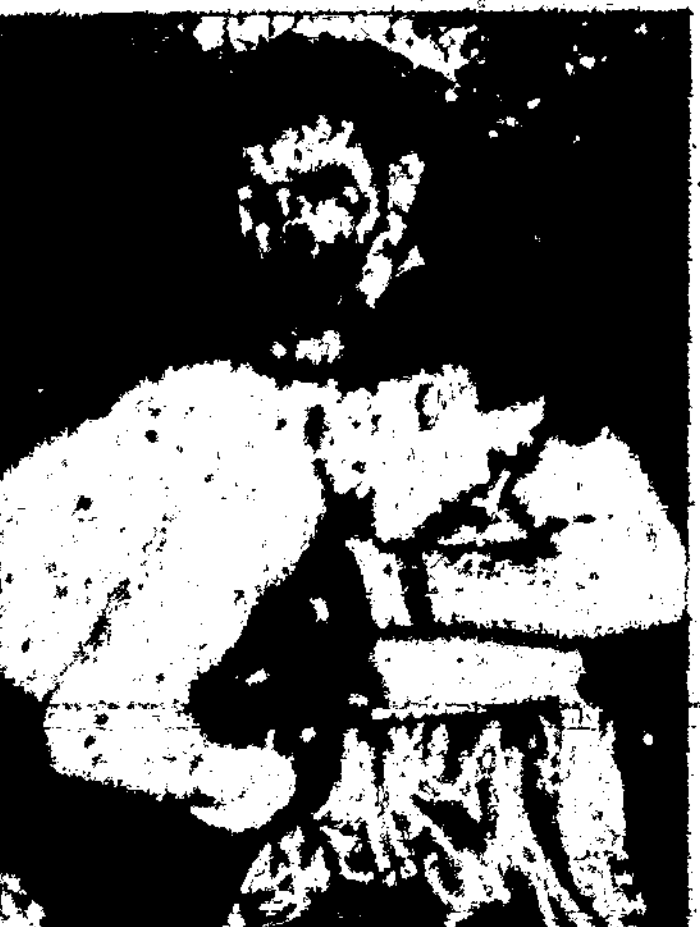

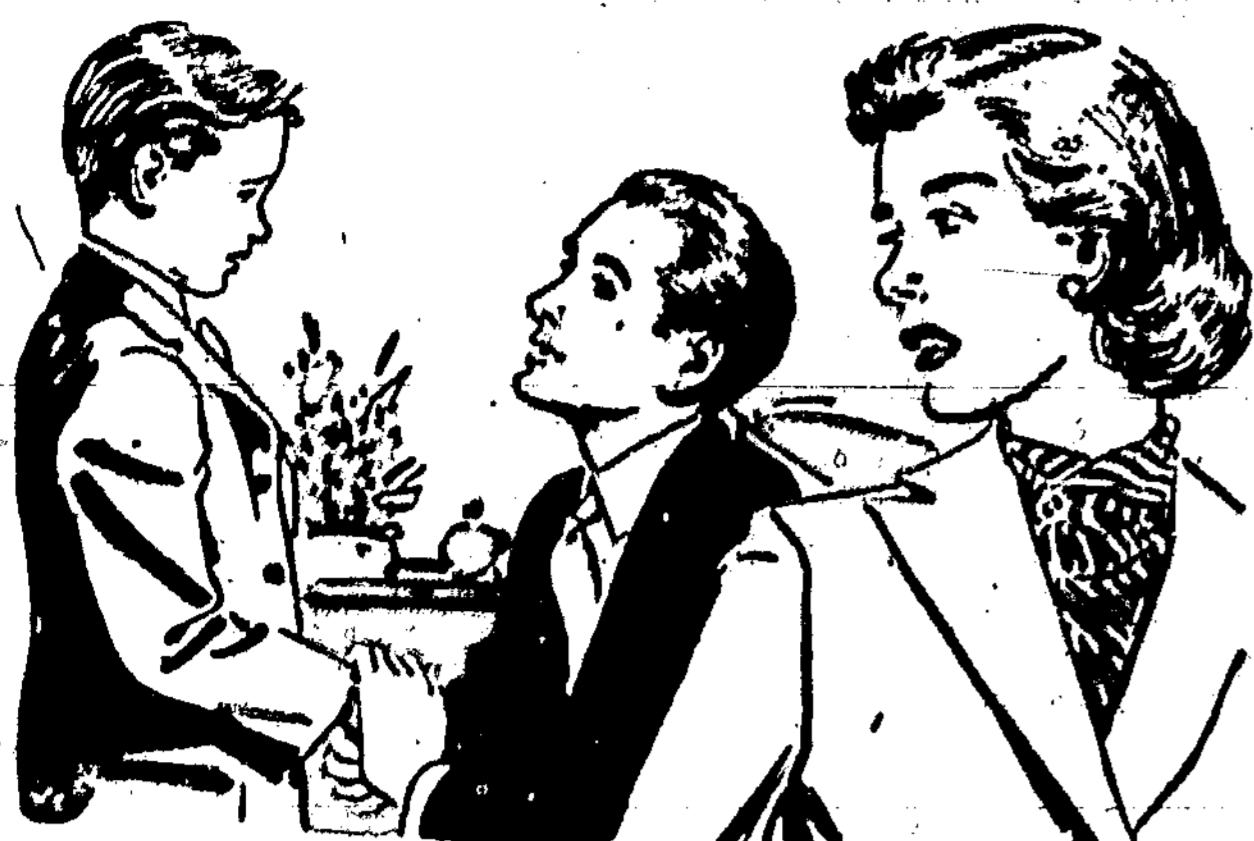

GRASSROOTS

GOP, Again Faced With Lack of Positive Platform

By Wright A. Patterson

THE REPUBLICANS have named a theme time and place, July 7, 1952, at Chicago. The especially important part of the next presidential campaign remains. I believe the most important is the party program, the stating in clear and definite terms what the party proposes to the American voters. In many ways, it is of more importance at this time than the selection of candidates.

That program must be of a positive nature. No longer can the party appeal successfully to the voters by merely "javeling with stars" the policies and actions of the opposition. What the voters want to know is what the Republicans will do if they are returned to power. They want the assurance that there will be a definite turn to the right; that our free enterprise system will be preserved; that the communists present in the bureaucratic army will stop, and the members of that army be dismissed.

They want to be assured that we will continue our war preparations, but will discontinue, for a time at least, the unnecessary home projects that we can get along without and by so doing, relieve the taxpayer of a considerable portion of the load he has been carrying.

Such are some of the definite pronouncements the voters are looking for. They will not be satisfied with only condemnation for the present, or any past, administration.

The YMCA began aiding servicemen during the Civil War when Y workers, called "Christians" by the soldiers, followed both armies to serve decently cooked hot meals, help tend the wounded and insist on the humane treatment of prisoners of war. In the Spanish American War, they introduced doughnuts and coffee to soldiers. At one battle they arrived with their rations some three hours ahead of the troops! During World War I, the Y, according to General Pershing, performed 90 per cent of the welfare work for soldiers overseas and during the recent conflict, as now, the YMCA comprised one-third of the soldier-service organization known as the U.S.O.

The best of the Y's hundred years of experience will go into the new five-part program designed to cover non-urban areas. The organization will work this way:

1. The Small City Association, to operate as independent units in cities under 25,000 population.
2. The Town and Country Association, covering both farms and small towns in a single county or group of counties.
3. The County Branch, covering a rural area centered about a large city.
4. The Outreach Program, extending from a thriving city YMCA to cover small neighboring communities.
5. The District Program, all rural, directed by the state YMCA organization but sponsored socially and financially by the area served.

FINANCIAL PROBLEMS, of course, will play a large part in the Y's scheduled rural drive. YMCA officials emphasize that the Y cannot and will not begin at the outset to construct large, streamlined buildings; with hotel space, gymnasium, meeting rooms and swimming pools in order to lure members. A YMCA, they explain, must first establish a firm spiritual foundation and a record for concrete service to the community before it can begin to think in terms of permanent headquarters.

Instead, the organization burden will fall largely on the rural secretary, a YMCA career man who has been given special training for his job and, more likely than not, been educated at one of the Y's twenty-five degree-granting colleges. He will begin, like the founder of the first YMCA in Boston in December of 1852, by ignoring social-minded members of the community in the Y movement. He may work through churches of all denominations or through the public schools. Depending upon how long he has been in the area he will spend three months to a year observing local conditions and then report lengthily to his superiors on how, in his opinion, the YMCA can best improve its foothold in your community and extend its services to the people who live there.

The stated purpose of the Y, which is to develop Christian leadership among the nation's youth, has already helped to mould the character of such YMCA alumni as President Truman, U.S. Supreme Court Justice Douglas, Gene Tunney, Senator Robert Taft of Ohio and thousands of other figures of national importance. Its fondest hope for the future is that it can help to build similar qualities in the young men and women who must see the nation safely through its next hundred years.

Return of Welsh 'Exiles' Moving Musical Rite

CARDIFF, Wales.—The "land of foreigners" is preparing a golden voiced welcome for an unparalleled number of its "exiles" in 1951. The "land of foreigners", as if you didn't know, is the Principality of Wales. The somewhat unkind term is the one by which the mountainous, mysterious land was known to the Anglo-Saxons for centuries after they, foreigners themselves, drove King Arthur and his native British knights into the hills, in spite of everything Merlin could do. The "exiles", of course, are any Welshmen unfortunate enough to live in more barbarous, uncouth lands, and, as far as the Welsh are concerned, that includes England, too.

The factor that made Wales "the land of the foreigners"—its inaccessibility for centuries—had an incidental effect which makes it one of the most interesting countries in the world today. To a greater extent than any of the other diverse peoples who make up the British population, the Welsh have preserved an ancient culture and language almost completely uncorrupted by outside influences. To visit the Eisteddfod, the great national festival of Wales, which will begin August 6 this year, is to be transported to the almost legendary world of 1,500 years ago.

Much Ceremony

The welcome to the exiles is one of the most moving of the traditional ceremonies of the Eisteddfod. The exiles, numbering more than a thousand, and headed by the Leader of the Welsh Exiles, are conducted to the stage in a ceremonial procession.

After the ritual welcome, whose origin is lost in the mists of antiquity, the whole gathering joins in the singing of Welsh hymns, and folk tunes. Since there are ordinarily more than 20,000 people present and since each of them, as are all Welshmen, was "born with a thrush in his throat", the great pean is an unforgettable musical experience.

This year, according to the British Travel Association, the Eisteddfod takes on added significance, for it has been designated one of the 29 major arts festivals being held as part of the Festival of Britain.

It's a safe bet that few of the others will rival it in the eyes of the visitor. The oldest cultural event of its kind in the world, it dates back in more or less its present form to the Twelfth Century, although it is believed that gatherings of the kind may have been held as early as the Fifth Century.

Cultural Expression

There's much more to the Eisteddfod than singing. It is the highest expression of the Welsh cultural tradition. Each day for a week, there are competitions between poets and prose writers, singers, musicians and artists of all kinds. In the evenings there are concerts by the magnificent choir of 700 voices, which has been training for two years for the occasion. This year the choir, drawn from the region of Llanrwst, the site of the 1931 Eisteddfod, will feature Dvorak's Sabat Mater and Brahms' Requiem.

The musical and dramatic events will be interspersed with rituals and ceremonies performed by bards in flowing white, blue and green robes. They will be culminated by the Chaining of the Bard (The Welsh Poet Laureate for the year).

The ancient Eisteddfod has recently acquired a young and lusty brother in the Llanelgion International Eisteddfod which will be held for the fifth time this year, during the week beginning July 5. The National Eisteddfod is strictly Welsh in character; the Llanelgion festival annually brings together outstanding choral and folk-dancing groups from all parts of the world. In their picturesque national costumes, they compete for a variety of prizes during the day and join together in the evenings for informal concerts and dances.

BLUEFIELD, Va.—The magic of good cooking was exhibited here recently.

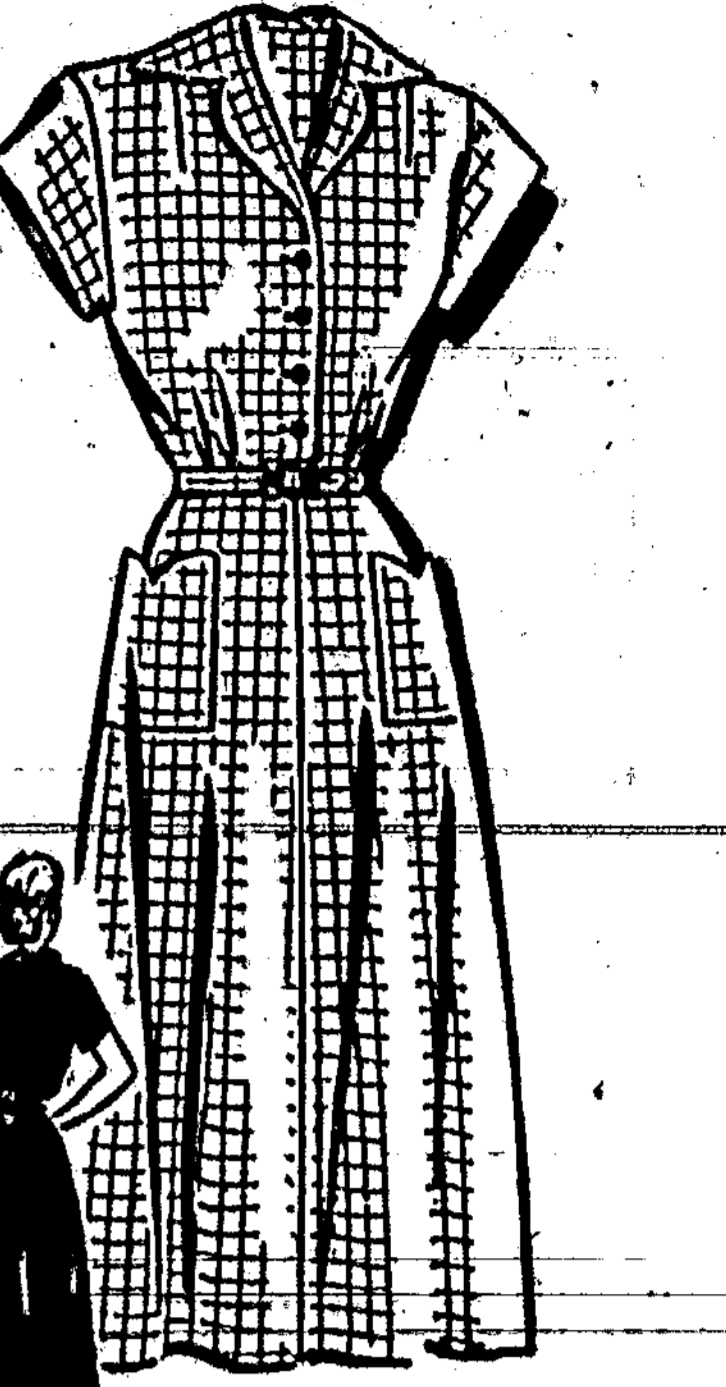

Learning to Say 'We'

Lesson for July 8, 1951

The "We-Feeling"
GOD INVENTED the family; that is what is meant by calling it a "divine institution." It is part of God's plan for each of his children that he shall learn how to live, not in a lonely cell by himself, not as a lonely wolf fighting against all comers, but as a member of a family.

The family is enormously important in many ways. There is room to speak of only one of them. Students of personality have found a new but simple name for something that every one ought to have, but not every one does have: it is called the "we-feeling."
The lone-wolf type of person never really thinks "we." His mind divides the world into two armed camps; on the one side is "I" and on the other side is every one else.

He goes through life assuming that nobody is for him, nobody is with him, and he in turn is for nobody and with nobody. His "hand is against every man," as the Bible says. Even if he teams up with others for a while, he will double-cross them if he thinks he will make something out of it. He is your typical criminal, "anti-social" as teachers and sociologists call him.

CHILDREN usually begin life without much we-feeling, if any. They don't naturally share their toys or their dinners or anything else. They grab all they can and they don't like to be grabbed from. The process of growing up—really growing up, not merely getting older and bigger—is a process of developing a healthy we-feeling. Nearly every one develops this to some extent, of course; but when some people say "we" they don't mean very many.

We have all heard of the man who prayed: "Lord, bless me and my wife, my son John and his wife. Us four, no more. Amen!" He doesn't make a very good citizen.

But as the "we"-circle grows wider and wider we get a more and more public-spirited and service-minded citizen, till at the high point of the we-feeling we see a man like St. Paul who calls himself a debtor to all men, or like John Wesley who said, "The world is my parish," or a modern international citizen and statesman such as John R. Mott.

How the Family Helps
THE very best place to learn the "we-feeling" is in a good family. This does not necessarily mean an aristocratic family or a wealthy one. Many good families, perhaps most good ones, are quite poor and obscure, as the family of Jesus was.

But whether it is in the city or the country, or however large or small it may be, the good family is one that helps every member of it to grow up into a healthy adult we-feeling. Living in a family teaches the meaning of "all for one."

In a good family, all are proud of what any one accomplishes; the big brothers and sisters are just as pleased with little brother's first steps as little brother is himself. When father wins a prize at the state fair, or when mother is elected an officer in her church society, or when Molly makes the honor roll in school or Jim makes the basketball team, everybody in the family is just as pleased as if they themselves had received the honor.

When any one of the family gets into trouble, they all stand by to help.

The Best Families Are Christian

THE best families are those where a religion is real; and if we believe that the Christian religion is the best, then we shall agree that Christians ought to have the best families.

Remember that in a Christian home Christ is the real head of the house. If ever any one had the "we-feeling" in its purest form, it was Jesus. No one can ever live long in his company and stay selfish.

So in the home where he is not only the best-loved guest but the true head of the house, every one from oldest to youngest learns to say "we" and loves to say it; and means it and lives it. From such homes come the best citizens and neighbors.
