
Each Lord's Day there will be Bible study at 10 A. M. and preaching at 11 o'clock.



**BREAKFAST BREADS**  
 Hot sweet breads and coffee cakes add variety and interest to breakfast, making it a meal that even the usual breakfast-skipper cannot resist. Here is a recipe for a basic dough which can be varied temptingly for different breads.

**Foundation Sweet Yeast Dough**  
 2 packages yeast, compressed or granular  
 1/2 cup lukewarm water  
 1 cup milk  
 1/2 cup sugar  
 5 cups flour (about)  
 2 teaspoons salt  
 2 beaten eggs  
 1/2 cup melted margarine  
 1 teaspoon grated lemon or orange rind

Soften yeast in lukewarm water. Soak milk; add sugar and salt to the hot milk; cool to lukewarm. Add 2 cups flour. Mix well. Add softened yeast, eggs, and grated rind. Beat well. Add melted margarine. Mix well. Add enough flour to make a soft dough. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead until smooth. Place in margined bowl. Cover and let rise until about doubled in bulk. Punch down. Shape tea rings, rolls, or coffee cakes. Let rise until doubled. Bake in a preheated moderate oven (325° to 375° F.) for 20 to 30 minutes, depending on the size. This will make two 12-inch tea rings, 3/4 dozen rolls, or 2 coffee cakes.

GOP Strategy

AT AN explosive Republican senatorial strategy meeting, the big GOP guns warned against tying the Republican party too closely to MacArthur's kite.

One of those who led the warning was Senator Taft, whose friends have been worried that MacArthur might crowd him as the GOP presidential candidate in 1952.

"We don't know what MacArthur is going to say when he gets here," Taft told the strategy meeting. "As a political party we should keep out of this."

Senator Millikin of Colorado chimed in that occasionally past "conquering heroes" had come home and put their foot in their mouths. He recalled that Admiral Dewey, the conqueror of Manila, got a hero's reception and was presented with a free house, then transferred the house to his wife. Millikin also cited Charles Lindbergh, who came home to a hero's welcome and later made some remarks that offended religious groups.

However, the sharpest Republican fire was concentrated on Senator Cain of Washington for putting the Republican party on the spot with his resolution declaring war on China.

Senator Wherry of Nebraska, who has been Secretary of State Acheson's bitter foe, actually snarled: "As far as the Cain resolution is concerned, I am on Acheson's side."

Senator Young of North Dakota warned that declaring war on China would do "more damage than anything that has happened in the Republican party in five years."

Cain Argues

However, Cain tried to defend his position by arguing that his real purpose was to "pin this war on Truman as Truman's war."

He pointed out that the President in his April 11 speech mentioned war 21 times. However, Cain's colleagues failed to follow his reasoning.

In the end, Cain insisted that he had promised to introduce the resolution and intended to go through with it. However, he agreed to make a statement that his only purpose was to focus attention on the China issue, since Truman had already got the country into war.

The most explosive outburst of the closed-door meeting came from Indiana's wild Senator Jenner. He was spurred out of his seat by a remark from Senator Taft that "no responsible Republican senator would advocate impeachment."

To this Jenner shouted angrily: "I may not be part of the responsible Republican leadership, but I have my own opinion."

He demanded immediate impeachment of President Truman and used considerable profanity in demanding it.

Senator Ecton of Montana tried to soothe Jenner by explaining that it was up to the house to bring impeachment proceedings and the senate was supposed to act as a jury. Ecton cautioned that it would be improper for a senator who was supposed to sit on the jury to express advance opinions about impeachment.

Beating Ejected Men

It has been hushed up by the navy, but the Norfolk, Va., shore patrol has been officially accused of kicking and beating servicemen and throwing them into the brig without their shoes.

These shocking charges were made in a confidential report by Rear Adm. F. N. Kivette, who was skipper of the aircraft carrier Midway until his promotion to admiral last month.

Kivette ordered his own investigation of the Norfolk shore patrol and sent a sharp report to the navy, charging that the Norfolk SP's were "arrogant, dictatorial, arbitrary, sometimes abusive and occasionally brutal."

Kivette's investigation was conducted by Ensign Robert E. Kenyon.

Commenting upon his subordinate's report, Admiral Kivette declared: "I believe these to be true and not isolated cases."

The admiral also added: "The very few but brief reports I have had concerning the condition of the shore patrol brig are calculated to induce nausea without a visual inspection."

Merry-Go-Round

SCANNING THE WEEK'S NEWS of Main Street and the World

Truman-MacArthur Fight Continues; Chinese Launch Spring Offensive

HOW DIVIDED THE NATION—There was no sign of a letup in the great quarrel on whether President Truman did right or wrong when he fired Gen. Douglas MacArthur from his Pacific commands. If anything, the man on Main Street was hotter under the collar than ever before following the general's impressive speech before congress. The line of dispute was clearly drawn: The general's supporters believed his proposed plan of action in Asia the only possible realistic one; his opponents were just as positive his plan of action would mean world-wide war. The great controversy caused many in the home towns to wonder just how divided can a nation become and still effectively battle communism?

The two viewpoints on the Truman-MacArthur controversy were expressed by Senators Taft and Kerr. Senator Taft charged "the Truman administration is working both sides of the military and political street" and called for bombing of Chinese airfields and a naval blockade of her coast. Senator Kerr, on the other hand, said he is convinced MacArthur's military strategy "would hurl us downward to the awful road of total war."

THE MILITARY—General MacArthur in his speech before congress said the joint chiefs of staff concurred with his view on conduct of the war in Korea. This brought an immediate statement in which the joint chiefs said they had been unanimous in recommending the dismissal of MacArthur. The statement said: "Operations in the far east are being carried out in accordance with the views of the joint chiefs of staff. These views will be fully explained to the appropriate congressional committees. An analysis of the basic differences which exist between the joint chiefs of staff and General MacArthur will be presented at that time."

Ticker-Tape Blizzard

Never before in the history of the U. S., or possibly in the history of the world, has a returning hero received such acclaim as Gen. Douglas MacArthur as he drove through a ticker-tape blizzard to the shouting of 7,500,000 people in New York. It was the climax of welcome home celebrations which began in San Francisco when the general returned to his native land for the first time in 14 years.

THE UNITED NATIONS—Members of the United Nations, whether they were in agreement with General MacArthur's policy in the far east or not, were almost as impressed by the general's address as were members of congress.

But the general did not gain any votes in the U.N. for following his policy. His speech confirmed many delegates in the belief that a yawning gulf separates his concept of the way to defeat Communist imperialism and that of the United Nations. Only on one point was there any degree of accord—his demand for an intensified economic blockade of Communist China.

ON THE FRONT—And while the politicians ranted over how the Korean conflict should be conducted, the North Koreans and Chinese Reds opened their long awaited spring offensive. First reports from the front indicated a break-through in the mountainous central sector of Korea by an estimated 400,000 enemy troops. Approximately 300,000 others were reported attacking in other sectors of Korea.

First withdrawals amounted to as much as 15 miles. Allied officers reported, with the Chinese suffering heavy casualties. Nearly 9,000 Reds were killed or wounded by artillery alone on the first day of the attack, the eighth army estimated. Swarms of planes claimed an additional toll of nearly 2,000.

SALES TAX—The Committee of Americans, reportedly a nonprofit, fact-finding research-survey organization covering all 48 states and Hawaii, reports a recent survey indicated the majority of the nation's businessmen favor a retail-sales tax on the federal level.

The organization said it sent questionnaires to some 20,000 businessmen, of whom more than 15,000 replied. The businessmen were said to favor the sales tax by 62 per cent; 12 per cent for such a tax at the manufacturer's level; and 26 per cent opposed to any sales tax.

Whether or not the survey reached to the Main Street businessman was not indicated, but it could hardly be conclusive unless he was consulted.



Take Me Out to the Ball Game

Neither wars or threats of wars, politics or the acclaim of a conquering hero could dim the opening of the baseball season on the sandlots of the home towns in the major leagues. Sports-minded Americans took time out for the greatest game of them all.

MAIN STREET BUSINESS—Hardware, dry goods and general merchandise, and jewelry stores on Main Street enjoyed a dollar sales increase during March of 1951 over the same month last year, the census bureau reported.

Hardware stores recorded a 22 per cent sales rise; dry goods and general merchandise stores a 20 per cent rise and jewelry stores a 15 per cent rise.


The agency said its figures were based on reports from about 10,000 independent stores. The department gave out no actual sales figures.



Dramatic Geyser Follows Rules Arrives Unheralded But Is Well-Behaved

Like a geyser in your backyard! Well, chances are that you won't ever have one. That's what the National Geographic Society has to say near California's Lake City, where such a column of steam and hot water unexpectedly knocked off a cap of earth and began roaring in to the air—much to the surprise of local inhabitants.

Although a geyser usually comes unheralded and gurgles, spouts, or screams in the seemingly devil-may-care mood of a New Year's Eve party, it nevertheless follows a set of rules as rigid as Victorian conventions. Well-behaved geysers have never been seen except in neighborhoods which can claim the distinction of volcanic birth.

While the geyser can be found in many areas of the earth, its favorite resorts are limited to rather exclusive sections of Iceland, New Zealand, and the American West. In these widely separated locales are found the abundant hot water and complicated earthy plumbing systems necessary to geyser life.

More geysers play in Yellowstone National Park than in all the rest of the world. The "regulars" there number somewhat more than 100, but "transients" keep appearing and disappearing from time to time.

The most frequent fatal accidents to infants are those caused by the swallowing of foreign objects—nipples, pacifiers, safety pins, buttons, marbles, or other things left within the baby's reach, and from asphyxia caused by the regurgitation of milk and other liquid foods.

Snowplow Under Ground

In New York's new \$26 million dollar bus terminal a snowplow—35,000 feet of pipe buried in the concrete—will keep the ramp surface free from snow and ice. A new type of oil is used to keep the pipes warm enough to melt snow and ice.

Contrary To Opinions

American boys entering employment at age 18 have 66 chances in 100 of living to the retirement age of 65. For their grandfathers who started work around the turn of the century the chances of attaining age 65 were only 51 in 100.

Sweetness Mimics Calories

Tiny pellets of saccharin turn the chemical trick to provide sweetness in desserts without including the high calories of sugar. The synthetic sweetener, actually a condiment or flavoring agent, like salt and pepper, contains no food value.

The Flying Squirrel

The flying squirrel does not actually fly. It has a membrane or skin between the front and hind legs with the aid of which it can glide through the air for considerable distances.

New "Angles" for Angler

An all metal landing net has recently been made available to fishermen. This unique net may be obtained in two sizes, for boat and stream fishing. The net, or filler, is made of a single strand of Monel wire knitted into cylindrical form with hinge-type slitches which makes it easy to disengage hooks that may become caught in the mesh. The frame and hollow handle are made of duralumin.

Parks Added

Newton B. Drury, director of the National Park Service, reported that three new areas were brought into the national park system during the 1950 fiscal year: Effigy Mounds National Monument, Iowa; DeSoto Memorial, Fla.; and the parkway connecting Washington, D.C., and Suttland, Md.

Fay on Receipt

The familiar C.O.D. (collect on delivery) originated in 1841 with an express shipment and today some 7,000,000 such shipments are forwarded annually by the Railway Express Agency. The amount collected is promptly forwarded to the shipper.

Grew Your Own

The pot cleaner, Silvylocks, made of knitted Monel mesh which does not rust or splinter, is as much at home in the garage as in the kitchen. This household item has been found to work as well on a muddy tire as on a kitchen utensil.

Metal-Colored Glasses

A vaporized Inconel film on "Ray-Ban" sunglasses grades off from heavy at the top of the lens to light at the bottom. As a result the top eliminates the sun's glare, while light from objects at eye level is undiminished.







How Nations Decay

Lesson for May 13, 1951

THE mortality rate of nations is 100%. So Dr. T. W. Lingie used to put the fact that no nation yet has lived forever. They all die, sooner or later. What kills them? The student of history may delve into such books as Gibbon's "Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire" or Spengler's pessimistic "Decline of the West", or Toynbee's more optimistic six-volume "Study of History". Dr. Foreman But when the juice has been squeezed out of these learned and interesting volumes, the Truth's essence turns out to be much the same as what we can find by reading the Old Testament. True, the nations under the Old Testament lens are not big empires like Rome, still less like the British Empire; the kingdom of Israel was only about 100 miles long and 60 miles wide, while the kingdom of Judah was smaller than many an American county.

Promise

WHEN Solomon died, the kingdom he had inherited from David had already shrunk. After his death, what was left immediately split into two kingdoms, the one on the south called Judah and the one in the north called Israel. The nation of Israel, which lasted more than 200 years, began with great promise. Indeed, one of God's prophets (I Kings II) had given to Jeroboam, the first king, the same promise which had been given David, of an enduring kingdom on condition of obedience to God. Everything seemed to be favorable. Israel had more territory than most of her neighbors had, a far more productive soil, and easy access to transportation.

Crash

ISRAEL should have succeeded; but it failed. Only a little more than 200 years afterwards, no very great age as nations go, it crashed completely, never to rise again. When the walls of its "impregnable" capital city of Samaria, after a two-year siege, fell to the battering-rams of the Assyrian army, and over 27,000 leading citizens were deported, that was the end of Israel for good and all. How did this happen?

The Hebrew historian tells everything into a few words when he says that they wrought wicked things... they rejected God's statutes... they served idols.

But what were the details? What, in particular, did the nation of Israel do that was wicked?

Reading the prophet Amos will give many of the answers. At the time he preached, by all chamber-of-commerce standards Israel was at the peak of production and prosperity. But he foresaw doom around the corner, and he gave reasons. He called a spade a spade. Reading him, or even reading the bolder accounts in Kings, we can see the collapse was no mystery.

Other Gods

ONE thing fundamentally wrong with Israel was idolatry. This was not the simple matter of making carved images; it meant taking some other "god" to be the true God.

We know what the religions of Chemosh and Molech and Baal were like; they were thoroughly bad. In the law of the true God, life and purity were regarded as sacred; life and purity under these other gods were held cheap. But one can see from reading Amos that what the people of Israel really worshiped was still another idol--the woman--or mistress--was erected; their own pleasures.

Too many citizens didn't care what happened to the country, so long as they could get their liquor. Well, let us not read the Old Testament from mere curiosity. What about our own nation, our own people and times? The United Stewardship Council (now the Joint Department of Stewardship of the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U. S. A.) reports that every year since 1934, excepting 1936, has shown an increase in giving through the churches.

But--the percent of this increase is not so large as the increase of annual income. The increase of contributions through the church of God is less, far less, than the increase in spending for alcoholic liquors, soft drinks, candy, football games, jewelry, and a multitude of other things. We, like Israel, are getting God last!
