The Capitan Chamber of Commerce wishes to express concern with a situation which has arisen in connection with the Capitan schools.

Unfavorable comment through the press from neighboring towns involving transportation facilities of our schools would appear to indicate negligence and mismanagement by those charged with such responsibilities.

It further appears that unwarranted sources of friction as between interested persons tend to discredit the high standards of excellence which we believe exist in our local school system.

It is not presumed that the Chamber of Commerce should attempt to interfere or to assume a position of authority now delegated to a legally constituted body for the administrative duties of our schools, but rather to adhere to a general policy of promoting the public welfare of the community which it represents.

From this position, the Capitan Chamber of Commerce through its directorate, respectfully submits its wish to cooperate with the citizenry of Capitan and the patrons of the Capitan schools in arriving at the true causes of such disturbances and the continued confidence in our school system and administration. George (Fox) Fuchs Of Ruidoso Candidate For Commissioner

George (Fox) Fuchs, 39, Ruidoso, entered in the race for Lincoln County commissioner from District 3 which comprises Carrizozo, Capitan and Ruidoso, will compete with Sam J. Bigger, Capitan, and Dee L. McDaniel, Carrizozo, for the Republican nomination for that office in the May 6 primary. The winner will oppose Ike N. Wingfield, Ruidoso, Democratic candidate for the post in the November general election.

The candidate, who has never before sought public office in this county, promises that if nominated and elected, he will strive for the most efficient operation of the county's business, as well as the best interests of the entire county.

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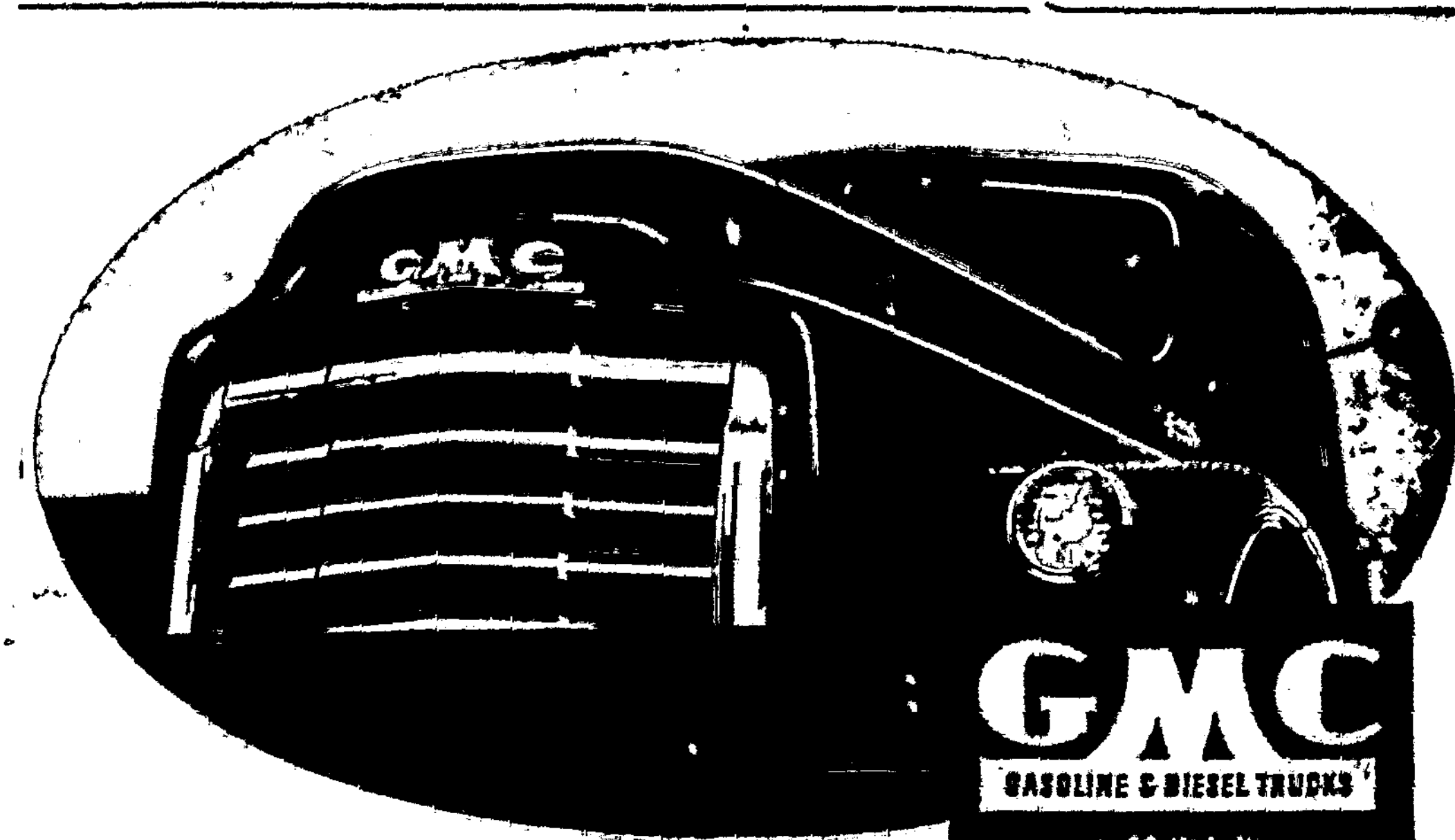
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
