Last Rites For Mrs. Julian Held Sunday

The death of Mrs. Anna Julian 88, Capitan, on Saturday, June 28, marks the passing of a well-known pioneer resident of Lincoln County. Funeral services for the aged woman (known affectionately as Mother Julian) were held Sunday afternoon at Capitan with Vernon Payne, company servant of the Capitan Company of Jehovah's Witnesses, conducting the last rites. Interment was in Capitan Cemetery in accordance with the desire of the elderly woman who had planned the details of her own funeral some time in advance of her death.

Palbearers were Joe Wigley, Bill Randle, Bert Cheney, Hollis Cummins, Fred McDonald and Wallace Ferguson, all of Capitan. Honorary palbearers included A. R. Dean, Billie Ferguson, Mr. Norton, Louis Cummins, Frank Morris and Sam Bigger. Clarence Shaw of the T. E. Kelly Funeral Home, Carrizozo, took charge of funeral arrangements. "Happy Are the Merciful" was the title of the hymn sung in memory of Mrs. Julian.

The deceased, who had spent 30 years in the hotel business in Capitan, was born Dec. 12, 1864, in Montgomery County, Ark., the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ritchey. She married James B. Julian, Benton, Ark., when she was 23 years old. He preceded her in death a number of years ago. Mrs. Julian came to Lincoln County in April, 1901.

The aged woman, a member of the First Christian Church at Midland, Texas, was well known and beloved for her kindly deeds as well as recognized for her many abilities.

She leaves no survivors.

The "Little War"
Not counting those missing in action, the official tally now shows that 19,469 American fighting men have lost their lives in the Korean War.

By comparison—
The 1947 Texas City disaster, which shocked the nation, killed 512;

The 1941 Pearl Harbor attack, which sent us into a global war, killed 2343;

The total World War II overseas deaths of the U. S. Marine Corps—through the bloody campaigns of Guadalcanal, Tarawa, Saipan and Iwo Jima, and the others—amounted to 21,900, only 1500 more than our present score in Korea.

Council Accepts Queen Resignation; Names Nick Vega Day Marshal

It was revealed at Tuesday night's City Council meeting that Nick Vega is the new day marshal in Carrizozo in place of Clyde Atwood who refused the appointment.

Motion to accept the resignation of Lawrence Queen, utilities manager, effective Aug. 1, approved by council.

In conjunction with a dispute over payment of fee for building permit, the trustees will seek legal opinion regarding the boundaries of the village area.

Motion approved to renew note at bank for \$6,500 indebtedness outstanding against the local water system. Note due this month.

Council approved a motion to employ Tweedy and Allman to audit the village's books.

Trustees approved motion to have Buster Boone check town's locker plant to determine reason for excessive loss of iron. Approximately \$1,500 paid on out-of-town firm some months ago to check the loss, as well as install two new compressors.

One councilman suggested that city supplies be bought at available wholesale prices rather than continuation of purchasing retail. It was also felt that city employees could make minor repairs to village equipment rather than have the work done outside at extra cost to the village.

Bills for feeding city prisoners last October and December were presented. Council commented that it was expensive to house prisoners while they sobered up and several suggested that those unable to pay their fines be put to work cutting weeds, repairing tires, etc. It was suggested that the day marshal could do an effective job of seeing that such assignments were completed.

The village clerk informed council that M. J. Barlow, vice president of Robert Schweser & Co., Omaha, Neb., had told the Ashley G. Classen engineering firm at El Paso to continue with the survey for a local water system. The clerk volunteered the information after council members had indicated they wanted to ascertain if it is feasible for the village to have its own water system.

Representatives of the Fairbanks-Morse Company will be in Carrizozo Monday night to meet with council relative to the installation of the new motors.

Supreme Court Backs Campbell's Nomination

The State Supreme Court Monday approved the nomination of T. K. Campbell, Las Cruces, for district attorney, Third Judicial District, in a dismissal of the writ for mandamus filed by Allan D. Walker, Alamogordo attorney, who was contesting Campbell's election. The court said a written opinion will be filed.

The dispute involved the Anapra precinct ballots which were burned on election night, contrary to state law. Walker and George Shipley, Alamogordo attorney, argued only the results of a recount can be used after a recount is requested, and that a zero count be listed for each party on the Anapra vote.

Campbell and Assistant Attorney General Hilario Rubio contended the state canvassing board was bound by the county board's certification of Campbell. The incumbent district attorney argued the county board should have been named as a party to the suit and that Walker should have instituted contest proceedings when he found no ballots in the Anapra box.

Carrizozoans Urged To Conserve Water

Circulars were distributed this week urging Carrizozo householders to restrict their use of water to domestic purposes only.

The conservation is urged in order to equalize the distribution inasmuch as the Southern Pacific Company is again limiting the supply to the village in order to accommodate a heavy flow of seasonal business.

If is the hope of Carrizozo officials that the railroad's restriction on the use of water may be lifted shortly.

At Tuesday night's meeting of council, the urgency of the water situation in Carrizozo was brought out. Although Bonito Dam and Nogal Lake are reported to be full, it was revealed the water level in the reservoir outside of town is down to two feet.

It was reported some of the rotted pipe between the main line and the entrance to the local system has been replaced and that the remainder will be completed as quickly as possible. It was stated the pipe line between the source of water and the entrance to the village system is not sufficiently large to handle the necessary pressure. Several families in the southeast sector are without water approximately 20 hours out of 24 as a result.

Food Mart Sponsors Medical Radio Program

The new radio program, "Doctors Orders," arranged by Gordon W. Foster, El Paso, president of Food Mart, with the assistance of the El Paso County Medical Society, will be heard Monday through Friday at 12:45 P. M. over station KEPO in the border city.

Members of the medical society will answer questions on subjects of general interest in the field of medicine which are sent in by the public. The program includes a 10-minute dramatization of a medical case history with a five-minute period for answering the medical questions.

Council Votes To Purchase Motors

Carrizozo City Council voted unanimously June 23 in special meeting to proceed with the purchase of two new motors for the local municipal power plant. Councilman Juan Martinez was not present at last week's meeting.

Revenue bonds will be issued to purchase the motors which have been under consideration for sometime, and which will cost approximately \$250,000. Issuance of revenue bonds does not require that an election be held to determine whether the villagers are in favor of the proposition. Councilmen reported that due to the serious condition of the present motors an emergency exists and they did not want to risk a complete breakdown of power facilities for the village. The trustees had been negotiating on a proposed sale to the Otero County Electric Cooperative, and a contract calling for a purchase price of \$135,000, which was for the power plant only and did not include the ice and locker plant, had been approved by Washington, D. C., officials. However, at a meeting of the board of directors of the Otero cooperative held recently in Cloudercroft, the offer was repudiated, and a substitute proposal of approximately \$101,000 submitted. The amount covers only the outstanding indebtedness against the plant.

The second offer was not satisfactory to officials of this village who decided they could no longer risk a complete breakdown in power facilities in further negotiations with the cooperative. It was reported that officials of the Bureau of Reclamation at Amarillo told the village, when approached upon the subject of purchasing power direct, it would probably be necessary to deal through the Otero cooperative.

M. J. Barlow, vice president of the bonding firm of Robert Schweser & Co. of Omaha, Neb., attended the special meeting last week. The Omaha firm holds the bonds for the indebtedness now outstanding against the local power plant and will finance the new bond issue. Barlow told councilmen his company is willing to do the best for the village it can do, and that it is willing to "go along" with any program decided as necessary for the town. The Omaha man expressed the opinion the plant should not be sold inasmuch as it has been a profitable venture. He stressed the point that his firm had no desire to be arbitrary in the matter and that the decision was up to the village, but added he felt

further delay could be tragic. The bonding company is willing to finance a package deal for utilities expansion, including water, gas and power, but the water proposition would probably be kept a separate issue. Barlow explained a saving could be effected if the entire deal was handled at one time. No official action regarding the gas and water utilities was taken, however, since council wishes to investigate further before making a final decision.

The Omaha man said a further study of the present rate schedule indicates a downward revision of 1 cent per KWH can be made in all classifications under Schedule 1, but that the rates in Schedules 2 and 3 would have to stand. The minimum for service under Schedule 1 would remain at the present figure also. The total anticipated income under Schedule 1 would be reduced from \$37,260 to \$34,382. According to Barlow, the rate schedules are based upon an anticipated reduction of about 2 per cent every five years. He stated he realized that \$250,000 is a large sum but the village is a going concern and the present plant is a constant source of expense. He believes the cost of operation can be reduced for a number of years with the purchase of the new motors. He commented that the expected growth of the town might make the plant inadequate in the next few years, but that would be a "healthy condition." One councilman expressed the opinion the village had delayed too long thereby resulting in the loss of its bargaining position and the remaining avenues had run out. Barlow doesn't think the town need have any qualms regarding the purchase of the motors, and that rather than consider it is the only thing they can do, the councilmen should feel it is the proper action to take.

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The Lincoln County News has noted with interest the following item which appeared in last week's issue of the Ruidoso News: "REPRESENTATIVE GOES TO STATE CAPITAL AFTER ROAD FUNDS" State Rep. L. S. (Heavy) Drake left Monday for Santa Fe to confer with state highway officials and Gov. Ed Mechem to ask for some of the \$1,800,000 in federal funds given New Mexico for improving laterals or "farm to market" roads for the Ruidoso area. Expense of the trip for Drake is being cared for by the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce out of its highway fund.

We were under the impression that the road situation in Lincoln County had been thoroughly thrashed out during the long range planning period. However, the attention of various "roads" groups already received the approval of the State Highway Department, who termed it "excellent." Since the Federal Bureau of Public Roads to our knowledge has not yet been received but it was the belief of the state agency that the program would meet with the approval of the federal bureau. If the newspaper article is correct we are wondering why Mr. Drake should take it upon himself to promote road building in one section of the county over another after priorities for such construction have already been established. We thought he was elected to represent the entire county. We also question the ethics of Mr. Drake accepting expense money from an organization to promote the interests of one section of the county over the others while holding an office that calls for representation of the entire area.

Proper notice was given the various sections of Lincoln County prior to the series of meetings of representatives from each area. In addition newspaper articles carried notices of the various conferences. If any residents of the Ruidoso area were not satisfied with their priorities for road construction they should have voiced their complaints at those conclaves. To the best knowledge of this paper, the road program was deemed a satisfactory one even though some may have desired to see their areas assigned higher priority.

It is our belief that interference in this long range road program over which a number of Lincoln County residents spent several months of hard work per seeling can only result in the delay of constructing badly needed roads in this county. The federal bureau cannot help but wonder at the apparent inability of Lincoln County to decide on a road program if interference is attempted at this stage.

It is the belief of the Lincoln County News that for an elected official to accept expense money from a group seeking to promote the welfare of one section only is not in accord with the requirements of his public office which provide that he represent the entire area under his jurisdiction. We rather think if the article in the Ruidoso News is correct that residents of other sections of Lincoln County will take a dim view of Mr. Drake's action.
