Carrizozo Hospital Operates In Black

The annual financial statement of the local hospital was given to Carrizozo City Council by Vernon Petty, hospital board member, at its regular monthly meeting Tuesday night.

Petty commended the fine work of the hospital and its superintendent and pointed out that it is operating in the black with a cash reserve of \$2,941 on June 30. Salaries totaled \$29,000 with general fund expenses of \$28,000, or a total of \$57,000. Of the hospital's \$7,900 in accounts receivable, only \$1,075 were termed "bad" accounts and turned over to an agency for collection on a 50-50 basis.

Patients cared for at the hospital during the past fiscal year totaled 847 with the daily average of patients set at 10.3. There were 83 births and 10 deaths during that period. The budget of the village of Carrizozo includes a contribution of \$500 annually toward the hospital's operation.

John Wright, member of the Carrizozo Power Board, suggested village contact Ashley Clasen, El Paso engineer, before construction of the base for the new motor is started in order to insure proper erection, and placement of equipment, as well as make provision for future needs. Council agreed with Wright's opinion and Clasen will be contacted this week to ascertain when he can come to Carrizozo. It was also pointed out that the bonding company is interested in seeing that the expansion project meets with its requirements.

Mayor Marvin Roberts called attention to the huge water loss last month. The village paid for 1,366,325 gallons of water but sold only 1,505,190, which indicates there is a tremendous loss of water occurring through the town's water system. Marshall Barlow, vice president of the Omaha bonding firm holding the gas and power bonds, has promised to send an engineer to investigate the situation. Council is still unanimous in its desire to proceed with the drilling of test wells and eventually establish a source of water supply separate from the one furnished by the Southern Pacific Company. A federal official in Santa Fe is to be contacted concerning funds for this work.

Roberts indicated that railroad officials are optimistic about a plentiful supply for the village with the waning of the company's requirements which are at a peak during the period when large quantities of perishable fruits are being shipped. However, continued restricted use of water is urged in view of the fact that some residents in the southeast sector are without water for approximately 23 hours each day. Councilman Cliff Zumwalt said he knew from previous experience that water leaks could be detected and stopped, and action is planned to eliminate the excessive loss and waste of water in the village.

Frank Vega Jr. Injured While Chopping Wood

Frank Vega Jr., Tularosa, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Vega Sr., Carrizozo, suffered a badly injured left foot on July 30, about 5:30 P. M. when he was chopping wood at his home. He is reported to be making a satisfactory convalescence.

Twenty-four stitches were required over the instep of Vega's foot when the axe he was using slipped off a piece of wood and slashed through his shoe. The Tularosa man, employed at Holloman Air Force Base, was rushed to the office of a physician there by his wife. It was also discovered Vega had broken some small bones in the foot and he is expected to have a cast on shortly.

The former Carrizozo resident lost considerable blood in the mishap and is required to stay off the foot for approximately six weeks. His parents, who visited him this week, said his condition is entirely satisfactory.

Man Held In Vaughn Bank Robbery Attempt

James W. Skiver, 27, St. Louis, is in an Albuquerque hospital with two fractured legs sustained in a motor accident near Vaughn shortly after he is alleged to have attempted to break in the Citizens Bank of Vaughn, of which the local bank is an agency. Federal Attorney Maurice Sanchez, Albuquerque, said the filing of charges against Skiver are pending sufficient recovery for arraignment.

The injured man is reported to have confessed to FBI agents at Albuquerque that he planned to break in the Vaughn bank early Sunday and hold up an employee when it opened on Monday. His story was bolstered by equipment found in his car after the accident. State Patrolman James Clayton discovered three guns, three pairs of handcuffs and rolls of adhesive tape following Skiver's collision with a truck on U. S. 60 near Vaughn. Occupants of the truck who were injured are Arcenio Duran, 19, Vaughn, a student, and Manuel Arguello, 30, stationed in Georgia, whose condition was reported fair this week. Gilbert Story and Alfred Crestin, other occupants of the truck, were not injured.

Clotho Garcia, 60, the bank's night watchman, disarmed a man in the alley at the rear of the building, early Sunday morning after he heard the sound of glass breaking, and took him to the home of J. J. Gallegos, Vaughn, to call the sheriff's office in Fort Sumner. He escaped from the Gallegos home but later the two men, who went to Albuquerque, identified Skiver as the escapee.

Since the Vaughn bank is insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, the FBI has jurisdiction in the matter. Federal authorities expect to charge Skiver later with attempting the break in of a federally insured bank and attempt to commit a felony. State Patrolman Clayton was the man who tipped off the FBI agents when he suggested one of the injured men might be the person who had escaped from Garcia.

1,000 Attend Annual Otero Co-op Meeting; New Directors Named

An estimated 1,000 persons attended the annual meeting of the Otero County Electric Co-operative at Cloudcroft on Aug. 2, when an election of board members was held. An unidentified representative of the REA from Washington, D. C., also attended the conference.

Wilbur McKnight, Hondo, who served as one of the counting judges, reported the following board members were elected: Charles Fuller, Pecos; Milton Mable, Tinnie; George Sienoros, Arabela; Fred Pellman, Mesquite; Jack Hobson, Alamogordo; Gilbert Langford, Alamogordo; Jack Vickers, W. A. Gage and Claude Reed, all of Cloudcroft. Reed also serves as secretary for the group.

The names of the other counting judges serving in Saturday's election as announced are: James Earl Harcrow, Capitan and Carrizozo; Ben Grelsen, Capitan; Edward Penfield, Lincoln; and Daniel Brenton, Carrizozo. Brenton was also named as the spokesman for the Lincoln County group of members in the co-operative.

McKnight, who added that several members of the cooperative were invited to watch as the ballots were counted, said Fuller polled the most votes with 720 cast for him, while Sienoros was next with 695.

A noon luncheon, preceding the meeting held at 2 P. M., was served to the Lincoln County group. A number of residents from various sections of the county brought beans, barbecue, salads and desserts, while the Capitan Woman's Club and the Capitan Chamber of Commerce extended material assistance in helping produce the delightful luncheon enjoyed by the Lincoln County group.

The election of new board members was the only matter of business reported discussed at Saturday's meeting. A conference of the board of directors was scheduled for Monday afternoon of this week, but at present time no announcement concerning any action which may have been taken by it had been received.

Carrizozo Schools To Open August 25

Schools in Carrizozo will open Aug. 25, at which time it is hoped to have the two additional high school rooms now under construction ready for use.

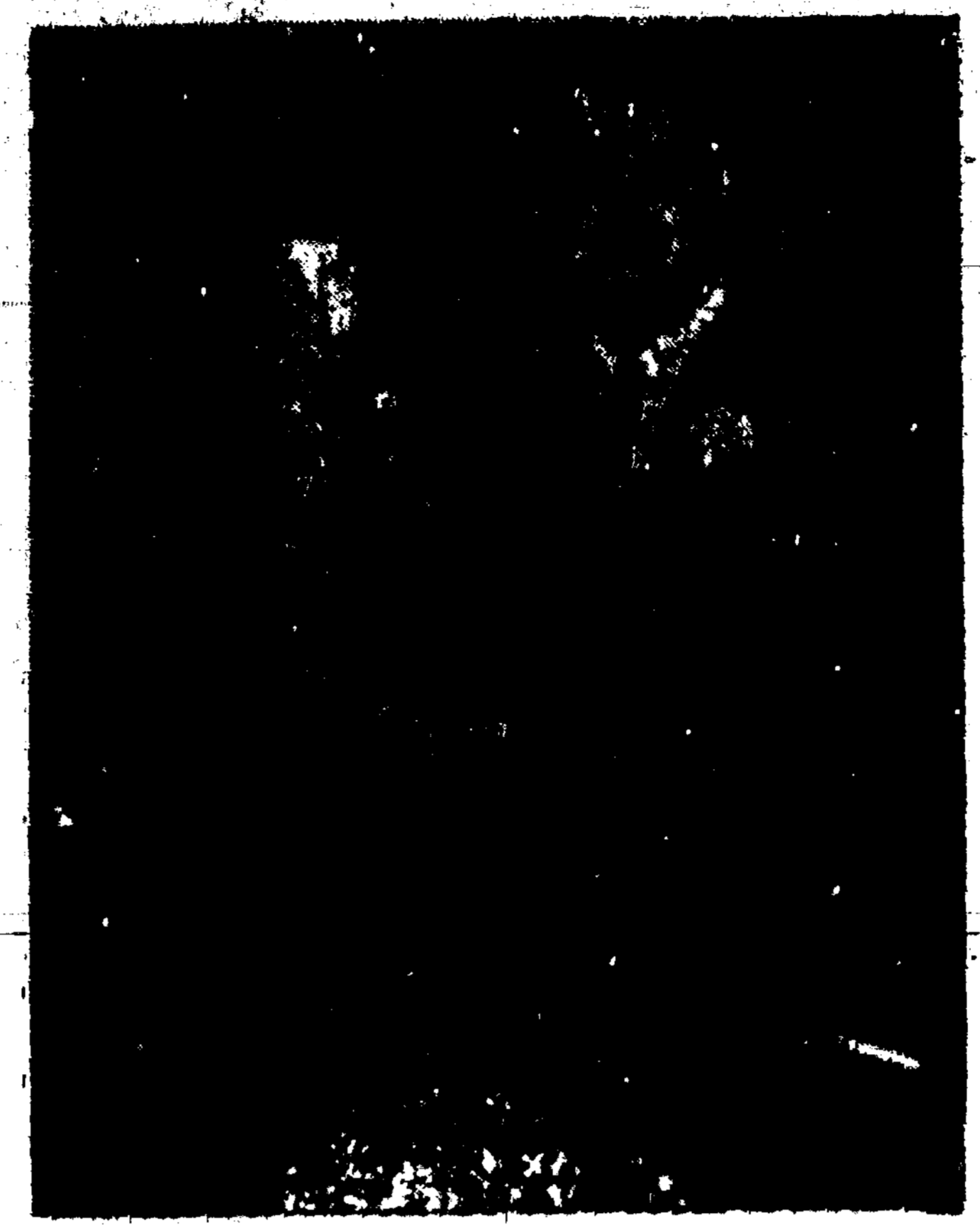

Angus Cemetery Carries Fond Memories

Every tree and tumbledown in the county seems to harbor some choice story of pioneer days to be dug out and told by the few who still remember. Have you ever stopped at the Angus cemetery up in the pines beside the old schoolhouse?

The schoolhouse itself carries fond memories for hundreds of people who saw grade school days there. The building is used for funeral and Memorial Day services, and for storing benches, a piano and picnic tables that are the property of the cemetery association.

Many of the tombstones above the graves are hewn of local slab rock that blends with the simplicity of the natural beauty of the forest surroundings. The land for the cemetery was deeded to the people of the county by P. G. Peters, one-time merchant of Capitan. The first person to be interred was a tiny babe from up the Bonito. Rev. John Skinner, father of Floy Skinner of Nogal, built the tiny rough board coffin from a wagon bed and spoke the consoling words to the family as the tiny one was laid to rest.

The bodies of persons buried in Bonito City were moved to Angus cemetery before the building of the dam. The earliest residents of Nogal Mesa, Ruidoso, Eagle Creek, Bonito and Nogal all laid loved ones to rest in the peaceful spot among the trees.

Each year, people come from far and wide to spend one day working to repair and maintain the facilities at the Angus cemetery. Bringing tools and a picnic lunch, wearing old clothes and with an eagerness to work together, people of the county will meet Saturday, August 9.

New Jersey Teachers In Auto Accident Here

An accident involving two New Jersey school teachers occurred July 31 about 7:30 P. M. when their car struck a hole in Highway 54 north of town at the end of the pavement. Miss Rita Gilchrist, Belleville, N. J., may have a fractured vertebrae as a result of the mishap in which her companion, Miss Barbara Wick, also of Belleville, escaped injury.

State Patrolman Carlos Salas, who investigated the accident, said the car turned over once after hitting the hole.

The two women, after spending a few days in Carrizozo, planned to return to New Jersey via plane since their car was damaged considerably.

Despite their mishap, they told L. Z. Manire, local superintendent of schools, they are enthusiastic about the state and would like to return to New Mexico next year after completion of additional courses which they plan to take.

Fruit Growers To Dedicate Building

Rancher Uses Plane In Weed Control Project

Of interest to Lincoln County ranchers with problems of weed control is a plot of 700 acres of cocclebur and other weeds on the R. C. Withers ranch west of Ocurra which were sprayed. The meadow land along the Mal Pais was sprayed Monday and Tuesday at the rate of 1 1/2 pints of Amine form of 2-4D, and the Ester form of 2-4D with the use of an airplane owned by "Sup" Hazel, sprayer, of Artesia. Withers reported this method is cheaper than spraying with ground sprayers or the use of mowing machines.

Looking over the area sprayed, an effective kill of annual weeds was noted. Predominantly, the weeds were bull thistle, horsetail, gourds and cocclebur. The spray also affected perennial plants such as mesquite, blueweed and chamise. Chamise and mesquite are harder and the kill will not be as immediate as it is with the annual plants. Usually it takes three or four applications to kill these plants.

Also on one small plot, the new formula 2-4-D was used. The sprayed area may be seen along the road through the Withers property in the grass meadows east of the Mal Pais.

This will be interesting to ranchers with such problems and will show an effective control of weeds that can choke out better grasses and use up available moisture.

Withers stated he will be glad to have interested persons visit the ranch and see the results. Visits should be made during the next few days to see the reaction of the plants.

These sprays are also effective in controlling a number of poisonous range weeds.

Baptists Hold Pioneer Week Of Leadership

Glorieta Baptist Assembly, 18 miles east of Santa Fe, where a \$5,000,000 project has been underway for the last 12 months, is now in a pioneer week of leadership training extending through Aug. 13.

It is open in general to Baptists throughout the state. Oklahoma Hall and the All-Southern Hall are finished and Texas Hall is nearing completion. New Mexico Hall is underway and the foundation has been poured for the dining hall and the auditorium.

The groundbreaking will take place at 3:30 P. M. August 12 and will be followed by a chicken-fry dinner at which time Governor Edwin L. Mechem, an official of the Santa Fe Railway, the managers of public utilities, the secretaries of chambers of commerce of nearby cities and the Baptist executive secretaries of several western states will be present for testimonials and addresses.

When completed in 1935, the Glorieta Assembly will accommodate more visitors in New Mexico, it is reported, than any other institution within the state except Carlsbad caverns. An estimated 50,000 will be present for each summer season.

The general public is urged to be present for the special ceremony August 12.

Involved In Accident

Nevo Vallejos, Carrizozo, was fined \$5 and costs this week, the sheriff's office said, for failing to report an accident. Vallejos is reported to have lost control of his car near Nogal Hill, causing it to go off the road and down in a ditch. The Carrizozoan escaped with only scratches and a bruise over the eye. The motor vehicle was not badly damaged.

The grand opening of the new building for the White Mountain Fruit Growers, Inc., at Hondo, is scheduled for Saturday night at 8 o'clock.

Vernor Morris and his White Mountain Ramblers have been engaged to play for dancing. The family orchestra is a Lincoln County group. Other prominent musicians from southwest points, including radio artists, have also promised to attend the festivities. Bert Pfingsten, Hondo; Fred McTeigue, Tinnie; Ralph Bonnell, Glencoe, and Tom Babers, San Patricio, are in charge of arrangements.

The new building constructed by J. E. Iwig, Carrizozo contractor, is 64 feet wide and 136 feet long with a stucco exterior and superlite block exposed interior.

The outside of the building is painted white while the interior has been left in its natural form. Iwig stated the building, which is constructed according to the most modern concepts, employs the latest feature for lighting. The new sky lighting is indirect lighting through government tested colored glass. Air vents in the ceiling require only the smallest breeze to afford adequate ventilation. The only windows used in the entire structure, the contractor added, are those in the restrooms.

The plant, which is to be used for sorting, grading and packing Lincoln County apples, is located on Highway 390 approximately 300 yards east of Bradley's Garage at Hondo. The land on which the building stands is reported to belong to the railroad, and provides parking space for approximately 20 trucks.

The grand opening of this building marks the culmination of almost a year of planning. To Austin Albert, Carrizozo, county extension agent, goes a great deal of credit for interesting the Lincoln County fruit growers in the project. With the assistance of agriculture experts from State College, Las Cruces, the possibility of putting the apples on the national market under U. S. government gradings was explained.

At one meeting, movies on the growing, processing and shipping of the famed Washington apples were shown to illustrate how this county's fruit could be handled. It was brought out that the individual grower in Lincoln County was handicapped last year by lack of sufficient markets. Subsequently, a number of the fruit growers banded together to provide a building where the county's apple crop can be brought for sorting, grading and packing and then

necessary material for street repair work is on hand and the work will get underway as soon as possible. Recent showers have prevented city employees from getting ahead with the work.

A letter from the superintendent of a power plant in Missouri regarding an appointment as head of the local utilities. The Missourian was suggested by Glenn Parker of the Fairbanks-Morse Company.

Council approved applications for occupation licenses from Bob Flickinger, in the Lordsburg-Deming area, plumber (plans to locate in Carrizozo, if suitable location can be found); C. A. Morris, Captain, electrical work. R. E. Reeves and J. E. Iwig, electrical contractors.

In reply to a question, which came up after the formal adjournment of council, concerning the reported resignation of Nick Vega, Carrizozo day marshal, to work for the county highway department, Mayor Roberts said the officer is working for the county on installation of culverts on various roads under its jurisdiction. He added that the day marshal has been on call at night in the absence of John Littleton, night marshal, who has been off duty because of knife wounds suffered recently while acting in an official capacity. Roberts said Vega will resume his day patrol when the county road work, considered temporary, is completed. Vega draws a salary of \$150 a month when on duty as day marshal.

A check with the county clerk's office indicates Vega went to work July 15 for the county as foreman of construction at a salary of \$250 per month. The job is scheduled to continue until completion of approximately 48 culverts ordered by the county commissioners.

shipped to the national markets properly identified to conform with government regulations. Experienced men who are familiar with these methods for marketing fruit will be in charge of the plant, and a contract has been signed with a broker who has the responsibility of locating the necessary markets for disposal of the apples.

The Lincoln County apples are noted for their excellent flavor, and it is a foregone conclusion that once the national markets have sampled this fruit, there will be an increasing demand for the apples. It is the opinion of many that this county's apples surpass those from other states, both in flavor and quality. Iwig said it is hoped the factory man will arrive in time for the apple processing machinery to be set up for demonstration at the grand opening Saturday evening.

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
