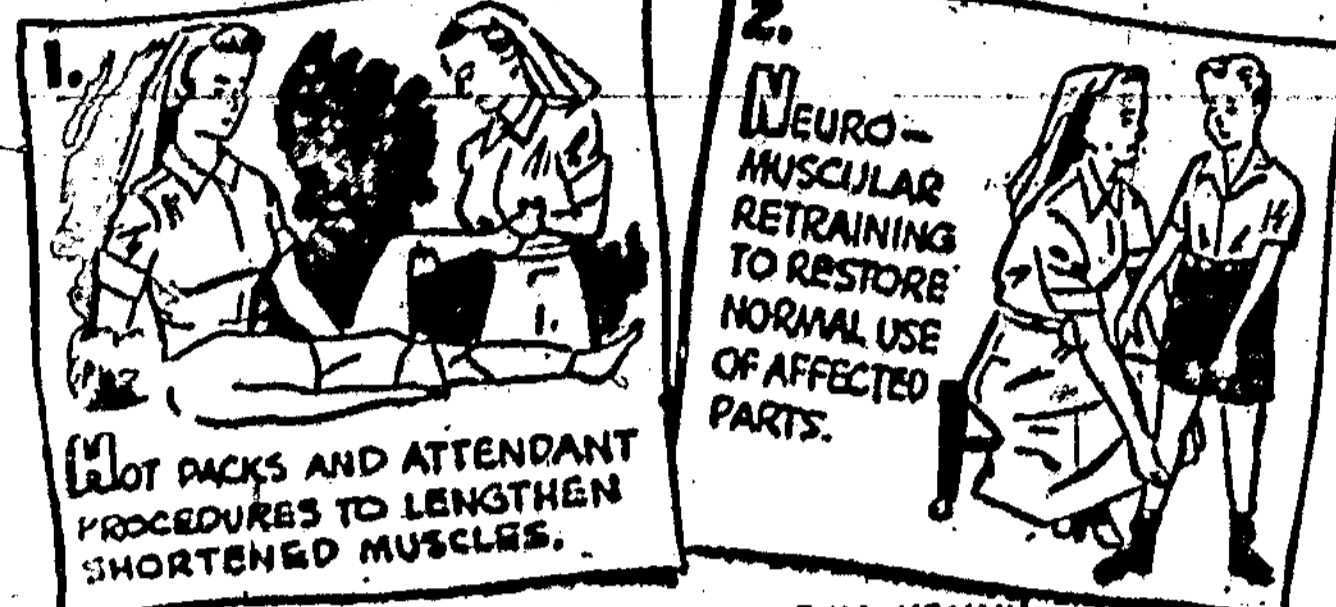

Frazier Drops Suit Challenging Grantham

Lake J. Frazier, Roswell, who dropped his suit against Everett Grantham, Albuquerque, challenging the latter's nomination as Democratic candidate for governor, was paid a personal visit recently by Grantham. Frazier said he withdrew the suit in order to give his opponent an opportunity to "carry the Democratic Party to victory in November." The two men got together at coffee in the Roswell man's home.

Grantham stated he made the trip to Roswell to thank Frazier for the withdrawal and to plan "Democratic campaign strategy."

He added that the Democrats must have a ticket which can beat the Eisenhower ticket. The former U. S. district attorney for New Mexico was awarded the nomination for governor by the state canvassing board on the basis of a 754-vote official margin. The certification followed recounts demanded by both candidates in 19 counties.

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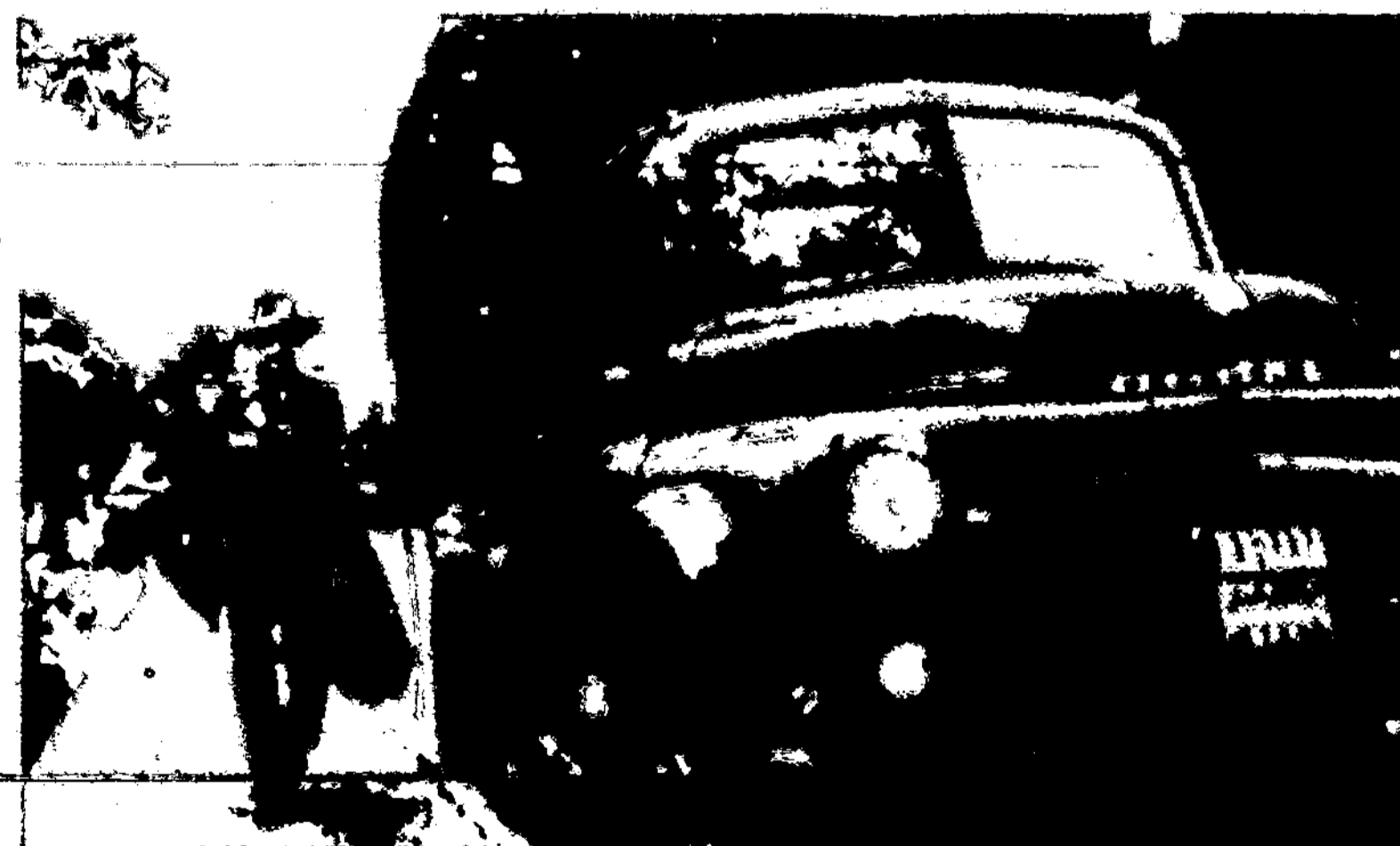

Aerial Acts Booked For State Fair

Les and Vera Kimrlis and Eddie Geyer, two sensational aerial acts, have been booked for the grandstand show of the New Mexico State Fair, Sept. 27-Oct. 5. Les and Kimrlis laugh at death from a rigging 90 feet high, supporting a miniature airplane from which two trapeze bars are suspended. The mechanism is geared to revolve at a terrific speed with the Kimrlis duo performing breath-taking antics and acrobatics that will fill the hungry spectators to the hilt.

Eddie Geyer's nerve jangling stunts are performed from the top of a 130-foot pole. They include one-hand stands, push-outs, assorted acrobatics and the balancing of all his weight to one side of the pole, causing it to bend in the middle, almost to the breaking point.

Kimrlis, a former circus star, first came to public attention as a daredevil fighter pilot in the French Air Corps during World War I. During his war career he was shot down seven times and is reported to have shot down 33 enemy planes. His wife, Vera, is a former French movie starlet.

New State Fair Queen Rules Announced

Leon H. Harms, secretary-manager of the New Mexico State Fair, has announced that new rules will be in effect for the selection of a Queen to reign at the 1952 fair, Sept. 27-Oct. 5. This year, to be eligible to compete for the title of "State Fair Queen" a girl must be an active member of a 4-H club or Future Homemakers of America chapter, Harms said. Contestants must be single girls-between the ages of 16 and 19, inclusive.

"Because State Fair is predominantly of an agricultural nature, we feel it is more in line with the spirit of the fair to have a Queen with a farm or ranch background," Harms stated. Selection of the Queen in the finals is based 50 per cent on personality and 50 per cent on horsemanship.

One contestant from each county is permitted to compete in the finals. Each county representative will be the guest of the fair for the full nine days, with lodging and food provided in the fair's Youth Hall.

The State Fair has no requirements for the selection of a Queen contestant within each county, but only one girl from each county will be allowed to compete in the finals. County Queens may be sponsored by any organization or group of organizations. However, any girl selected to represent the county in the finals must meet the requirements of the State Fair rules.

The girl selected to reign as Queen of the fair will participate in opening day ceremonies, the State Fair parade, rodeo and other events. A beautiful sterling silver belt buckle is awarded to the Queen as a token of the honor.

GI Bill Enacted For Korean Veterans

A new GI bill has been enacted for veterans who served since the outbreak of fighting in Korea, on June 27, 1950. It includes five benefits, all designed to assist veterans in their return to civilian life. Included are education and training; guaranteed or insured loans for homes, farms and businesses; unemployment compensation; mustering out pay, and job-finding help.

More detailed information about education and training and guaranteed loans may be obtained from any Veterans Administration office. Information about unemployment compensation and job finding assistance may be had from any local State Employment Agency.

Dr. Irving Langmuir, Schenectady, N. Y., prominent scientist and Nobel prize winner, recently expressed the possibility of prevention of large scale droughts and floods within the next 10 years.

Dr. Langmuir explained, however, that uncontrolled seeding is dangerous in that flood or drought conditions may result if there is continued seeding in one spot.

believe Lincoln County is the only place they have the opportunity to regain their health, inasmuch as Fort Stanton is the only U. S. Public Health Service hospital located in this particular climate...

TB wards at the U. S. hospitals in Seattle, San Francisco and New Orleans are also reported full and that Detroit is the only location available at present...

They are firmly convinced that the ideal surroundings provided by the location in Lincoln County contributes greatly to their morale and ability to attain either an arrested status or partial recovery...

Fort Stanton patients were asking Tuesday night why, if the government planned the transfer of an economy measure...

Several of the hospitals which apparently are to remain in operation have daily patient costs of almost \$20. Others range from \$12 up to \$18 per capita daily cost.

It was also pointed out that the hospital produces its own meat and much of its other food, and that to abandon it would mean leaving an investment running into several million dollars...

While one out of every five patients are reported as never having returned, it is estimated that approximately 80 per cent of TB patients in the U. S. Public Health Service hospitals suffer relapse and are forced to again seek treatment.

Spokesmen for the group said it is difficult for them to understand why the government would grant billions in foreign aid, and then refuse to continue one small health sanitarium for some of its own citizens...

There are approximately 154 patients in the hospital and cottages at present, and while four of the hospitals to be closed are slated for use as clinics...

It was stated that commanding officers of Fort Stanton have constantly urged the expansion of this institution since it is recognized for an outstanding number of recoveries...

The protesting seamen said economy measures were first placed in effect at Fort Stanton about January of this year when they reported orders were issued to cut down on the "quality of the food" and to conserve on all utilities...
