### The Political Pot

The political pot in Lincoln County is beginning to boil, with both parties planning their campaign strategies, and holding or scheduling meetings.

No report has as yet been received of a Democratic conference, but what will perhaps be of interest to the public is a meeting held by the county Republican organization Monday night at the courthouse in Carrizozo when the J. G. Moore faction apparently took complete control of the county machine.

It will be recalled there has been dissension since the last election among the local Republicans, with one faction led by Moore, who was reportedly trying to unseat William W. Gallacher as county chairman. The friction is alleged to have developed when Gallacher was handed the state political plum of an insurance premium for approximately \$27,000 last year and apparently grew worse when that amount was upped to about \$36,000 in 1952. It will be remembered that Moore runs an insurance agency, among other sideline lines, in addition to holding the fulltime office of county clerk.

This seems to bear out the reported friction among oldtime Republicans in Lincoln County who resent the fact that Moore migrated to New Mexico from a southern state a few years ago and lingered around Carrizozo for a period before going to Gallup, later returning to Carrizozo, where he was a candidate for and elected to the office of county clerk in 1948 by a narrow margin of some 8 to 12 votes. He is accused by certain Republicans of setting himself up as the czar of the Lincoln County Republican organization to the detriment of longtime members of the county group.

The long feud appeared to culminate Monday night when the Moore faction apparently took over complete control of the Lincoln County Republican Party. Reports of the resignation of Gallacher have been prevalent for more than a year, and the Moore faction apparently gained full power at the session Monday night when Moore reportedly engineered the acceptance of the "resignation" of Gallacher, and the election of Marvin H. Roberts, mayor of Carrizozo, to succeed him.

### Corona Public Schools To Open Monday

Corona schools open Monday, Aug. 25, with the selection of the faculty for the 1952-53 term completed. Sup't. L. W. Parker announced this week that the teachers will meet tomorrow (Saturday) for work in conjunction with the commencement of classes. School starts at 9 A. M. Monday with a general assembly program, and registration of students starts at 10 A. M. Buses will leave at 11 A. M. to return the students to their homes. Regular school sessions will commence at 9 A. M. on the following day.

A picnic has been arranged for teachers and residents of the community on Sunday, Aug. 24, at 1 P. M. in Red Cloud Canyon. An annual event, it is designed to bring together the teachers and other residents of the area in an informal get-acquainted meeting. Everyone brings a lunch to contribute to the picnic table.

Repairs on the school buildings are now complete with the auditorium refinished and new draperies hung. The grounds have also been improved, and Corona is reported to have one of the best equipped and maintained school plants for small towns in the state.

A 24-passenger activity bus has been provided for the students this year; the first time Corona schools have had such a vehicle.

Corona and Vaughn have arranged to offer student driver training this year for the first time. Vaughn will use the instructor and car the first semester and it will be available to Corona during the second term. Leandro Abeyta is the instructor for this class.

### Health Dept. Announces Immunization Waiver

An announcement from Dr. James E. Scott, Santa Fe, director of the State Department of Public Health, this week concerns the waiver of the immunization law requirements until later this fall. Dr. Scott has notified all school and health authorities to inform their public that immunization prior to entering the ensuing year's term of school be postponed until about Nov. 15, or until further notice. The postponement is due to the polio epidemic.

### Game Dept. Records Indicate Good Antelope Season This Year

Report from the State Department of Game and Fish indicate an excellent antelope season over the state this year. John Shaul, Captain, game warden for the Lincoln County district, said this week that the county's prospect for good antelope hunting will be better next year than this season. Since a survey indicates an increase in fawns of approximately 100 per cent.

In conjunction with the subject, Shaul warned of permitting dogs to run loose in the mountains and endangering deer and other animals. He also requested that fawns be left wherever found unless the person is certain the mother has been badly hurt or killed, or if the fawn has been hurt. Shaul pointed out that when fawns are removed from their natural habitat they may not live. It is believed the best course to follow, when a fawn is found by itself, is to notify the game warden. Ordinarily, when the fawn is left for any period by the doe, it will stay there until the mother returns, and to remove the fawn under such circumstances endangers both it and the doe. The warden indicated this is also true of all other young animals.

Game Warden Orville Luttrell accompanied Shaul during the Lincoln County survey. The men also reported a substantial increase in the number of quail.

Regulations governing the handling of antelope permits for the 1952 season have been drastically revised, and the new system includes the following conditions: No deposit is required with the application; applicant must sign his own application; applicant must specify which one of three general areas he desires to hunt; persons killing an antelope in this state last year are not eligible for a permit this season; deadline for acceptance of applications is Sept. 2 at 10 A. M. in the state game warden's office (a public drawing will be held as soon as possible after that date to determine the successful applicants; successful applicants will be notified by letter and given until 10 A. M. on Sept. 18 to submit the required fee, \$10 resident, \$40 non-resident; unsuccessful applicants will also be notified; upon receipt of fee permit will be issued and the specific hunting area and season assigned (after permit is issued, no cancellation or transfer of permit or refund of fee will be permitted under any conditions); the permit belongs to the permittee for his use only just as a hunting license.

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### New Museum Curator Takes Part In "A Day In Old Lincoln" Pageant

John Boylan, who took over on Aug. 1 as the new curator at the Old Court House Museum in Lincoln, was introduced to residents of this area Sunday night when he participated in the "A Day In Old Lincoln" pageant held annually on the grounds of the museum. The new curator was one of the voices behind the scenes as episodes in the life of Billy the Kid, famous outlaw, were presented to a large audience seated on the hillside terraces back of the Court House.

Boylan and Mrs. Boylan, who assists him in his duties at the museum, are natives of Ohio, but have lived in New Mexico for several years.

Mrs. Boylan, the former Miss Nan Shryock, was born in Elyria, Ohio, and is the daughter of Mrs. Robert Shryock of that city. She holds a bachelor of arts degree from Western Reserve, Cleveland. Mrs. Boylan was curator at Harwood Gallery in Taos during the summer of 1940, and assistant to the registrar at Juilliard School of Music in New York City from 1948 to 1950.

Boylan was born Oct. 8, 1921, at Cleveland, the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Kenneth Boylan, Elyria, and reared in the latter city. He graduated from high school there before entering Oberlin College at Oberlin, Ohio, in 1939. He left there in 1942 to enter the U. S. armed forces in which he served until 1945. Boylan has studied at the University of Michigan, as well as the University of New Mexico, taking a degree in fine arts at the latter institution in 1947. From 1947 to 1950, he studied with the Art Student League of New York.

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### Chavez Says F. S. To Remain Open

The continued operation of the U. S. Public Health Service Hospital at Fort Stanton appeared to be assured following a statement Friday from U. S. Senator Dennis Chavez, New Mexico solon, in which he declared the hospital will remain open. Chavez made the announcement following a conference with Dr. Leonard Scheele, surgeon general of the USPHS.

Fort Stanton patients, in a protest meeting held Aug. 12 at their clubhouse on the grounds, said they would refuse to bulge even though ordered to do so. The meeting followed an announcement from Dr. Carl Mankinen, commanding officer there, that he had received orders to transfer or discharge approximately 64 patients in the "hill" cottages by the first of September. The transfer patients were slated to go to Detroit.

Maritime union officials, civic organizations, veterans groups and businessmen and residents in the hospital's area sent letters and telegrams of protest regarding the action. The patients had pointed out Fort Stanton is the only tubercular hospital in a climate considered the most desirable for regaining their health, and said they could not mingle with non-TB patients in other hospitals and would not have the freedom of spacious grounds such as they enjoy at this institution.

The men were sent messages of encouragement from U. S. Senators Chavez and Clinton P. Anderson and Representatives John J. Dempsey and A. M. Fernandez, as well as Governor Edwin L. Mechem.

It was Representative Fernandez who first revealed to the Fort Stantonites and the public that the Indian Bureau is negotiating with the USPHS for the care of a number of tubercular Indians at this hospital. Commanding officers have constantly urged the expansion of Fort Stanton's facilities, and this reported move could be a step in that direction. However, nothing was said concerning these negotiations at the meeting between Chavez and Scheele on Friday.

It has been reported an Indian Bureau official is traveling through the Southwest seeking to contract for the care of the ailing Indians and has been given the following cost per day per patient: Tucson, \$20; Denver, \$17.50; and another southwestern hospital offered accommodations at \$12 per day. The health service is quoted as asking \$14.50 from the Indian Bureau for its daily per patient care. The present operation of the hospital is reported as \$7.78 per day per patient.

### Ruidosoan Helps Care For Korean Casualties

Pfc. Clyde M. Ward, whose wife, Phyllis, lives in Ruidoso, is now helping care for the Second Infantry Division casualties at "Old Baldy" hill on the western Korean front.

He is a member of the medical clearing station that is operating a few hundred yards behind the lines. Wounded men are brought to the station by ambulance or flown directly from the battlefield by helicopter.

The more seriously wounded are transferred to an Army mobile surgical hospital approximately 10 miles farther to the rear. The less serious are returned to duty directly from the clearing station.

Ward, a light truck driver at the station, probably thinks longingly of Ruidoso's "Old Baldy" peak while going about his duties in the Korean theater.

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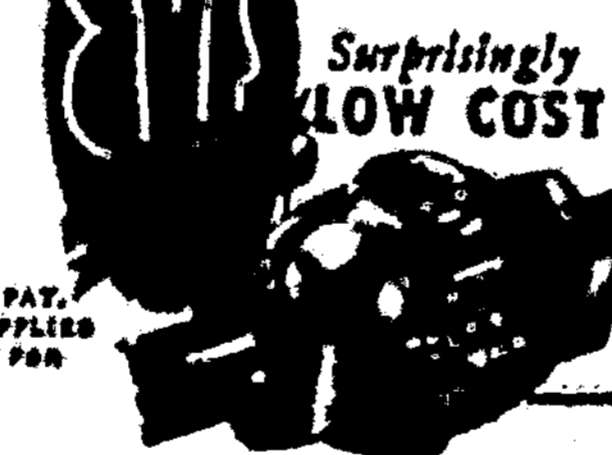
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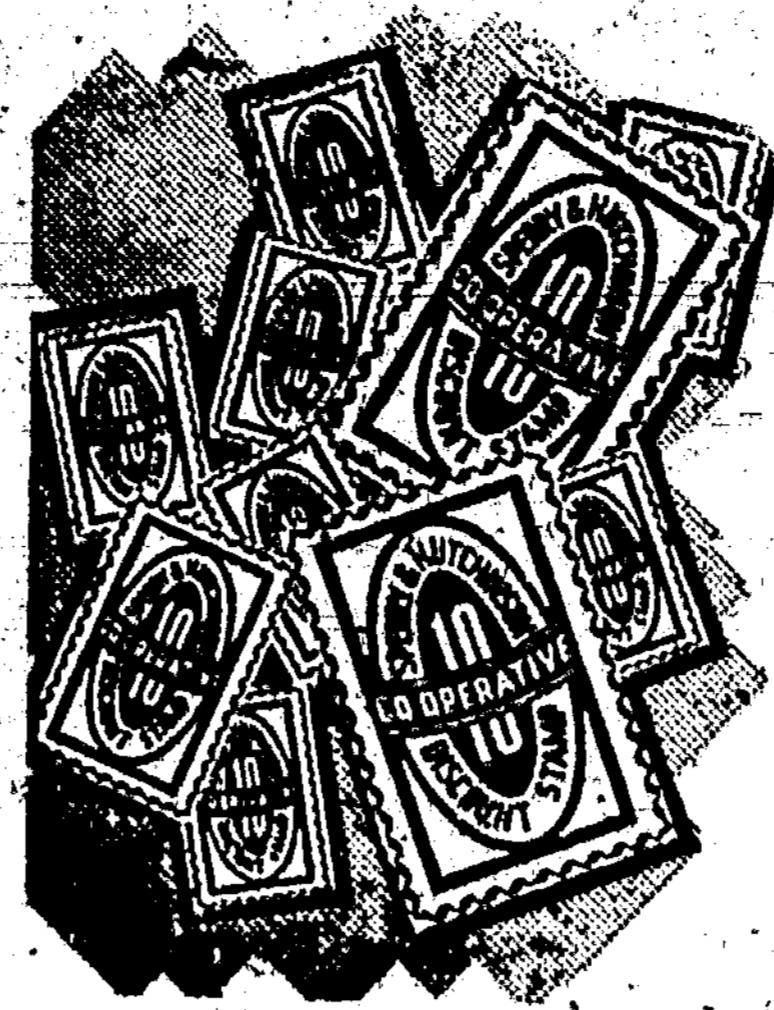

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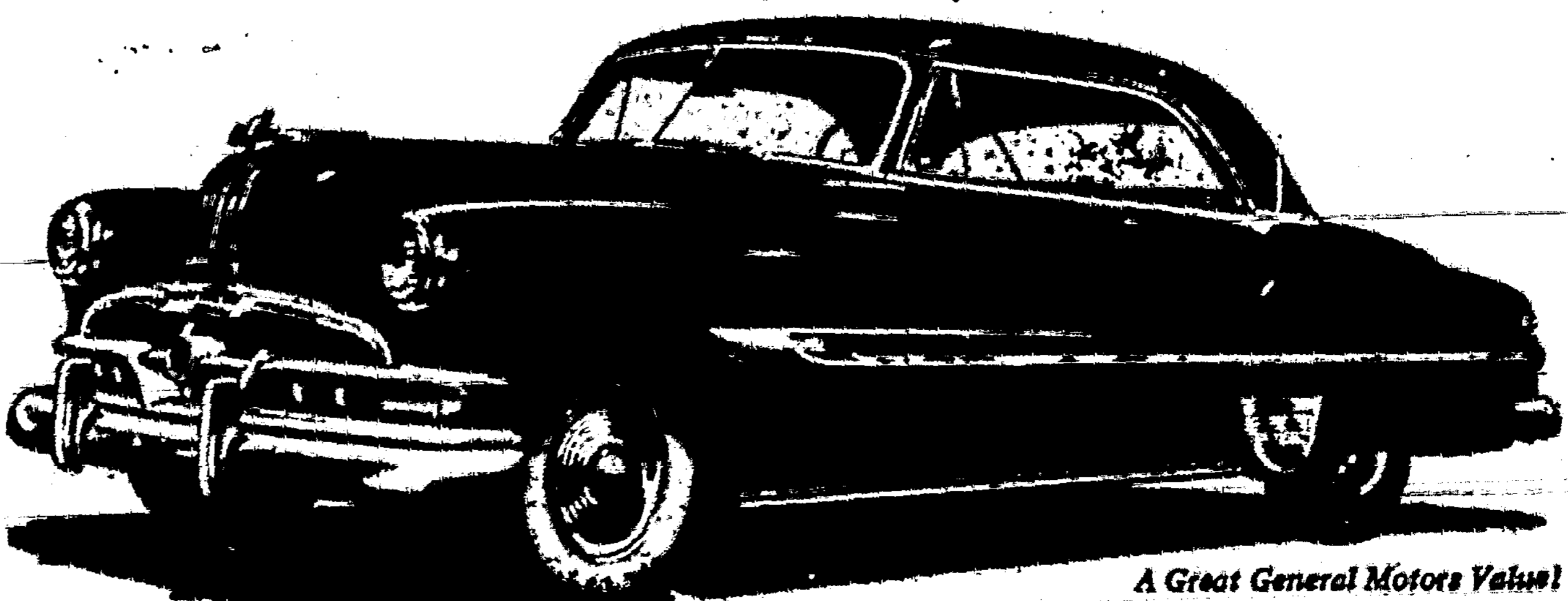

Ilcan candidate for the office of county clerk, when he announced the resignation of Gallacher, highly informed sources report the major duties of secretary of the county Republicans have been transferred to Harcrow, who is a fulltime employe in Moore's office. Mrs. Mabel Vigil, an employe at the local hospital, and whose husband is the Republican candidate for county tax assessor, is still officially the secretary of the county group, but she has reportedly been relieved of the bulk of her duties in that capacity. The same sources report Moore stated at Monday night's meeting that Mrs. Vigil might, in view of her position at the hospital, be subject to criticism for transacting political business during working hours, and suggested the work of the secretary be transferred to the county clerk's office where a telephone is available and where letters may be written at anytime.

Informed sources also report that several leading Republicans of long standing in this county did not appear at Monday night's meeting, and that others took a walk because of the maneuverings of the Moore faction.

The question now in the minds of many Carrizozo residents is that regarding the eligibility of Roberts to head a political party while at the same time serving as mayor of this village. It is believed in many circles that the two offices are incompatible, and wonder if he may not find himself behind the 8-ball. They wonder if it is possible for him to conscientiously serve two masters.

A search of the statutes of New Mexico reveals that "incompatibility between offices is an inconsistency between the functions of such offices, as where one is subordinate to the other, or where a contrariety and antagonism would result in the attempt by one person faithfully and impartially to discharge the duties of both."

While a county political chairman might not be classed as holding a public office, he will certainly be forced to make decisions and recommendations that affect the entire county. It is entirely possible that some of those recommendations will not meet with the approval of the majority of Carrizozo residents, and he, as mayor, would then be forced into the position of protesting his own decision.

The vote cast for Roberts when he was elected mayor of Carrizozo indicates overwhelming confidence in his integrity and qualifications for that office. However, the advisability of his accepting the responsibilities of both offices at the same time is looked upon with grave doubtfulness by many.


