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Hurley Visits Carrizozo On Election Tour

Major General Patrick J. Hurley, Republican candidate for U. S. senator, accompanied by his campaign manager, Steve Alex, both of Santa Fe, made an overnight stop in Carrizozo Tuesday. The two men discussed campaign strategy with county Republican leaders, following a tour which included Deming, Lordsburg, Silver City, Las Cruces, El Paso, Alamogordo and Tularosa.

In a conference Wednesday with Marvin H. Roberts, county Republican chairman, Hurley stated, "I am supporting the candidacy of every Republican of the state and county tickets, as well as the election of Dwight D. Eisenhower on the presidential slate." Eisenhower, a close friend was Hurley's personal aide when the latter was secretary of war and since that time they have remained in close contact.

Hurley, born in Choctaw Indian territory (Okla.) in 1883, is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Pierce Hurley. Orphaned at 11 years of age, he subsequently mined coal and punched cows all over Lincoln County and other parts of New Mexico. He worked his way through Bacone Indian University and George Washington University, ultimately taking his degree of law at the latter college.

The senatorial candidate was instrumental in building the first oil refinery in this state, located at Roswell and now known as Malco Refinery. He practiced law in Santa Fe, later served as national attorney for the Choctaw Indian nation, and has held a number of U. S. posts in addition to that of war secretary, including ambassador to China, minister to New Zealand, envoy to Russia and numerous others.

Hurley was an artillery officer in World War I, attaining the rank of full colonel at its end. At the outbreak of World War II, he requested active duty and was sent to Australia as a brigadier general, to help liberate U. S. prisoners bottled up in the Philippine Islands. He suffered a head wound at Darwin, Australia, when he was strafed by a Japanese fighter plane.

During the second war, Hurley was under the command of Eisenhower, his former aide.

Alex, campaign manager for Hurley, has encountered considerable excitement in his own life since his birth at Carlsbad on Nov. 22, 1919. Educated in schools at Silver City, St. Michaels College, Santa Fe, and the University of New Mexico, he was a member of the state National Guard before its transfer to the New Mexico 200th Coast Artillery. Enlisting in January, 1941, with that outfit, he was sent directly to the Philippines where he was later captured by the Japanese in the fall of Corregidor.

Alex has vivid memories of the Bataan Death March and his four years of imprisonment at Mukden, Manchuria. Released in August, 1945, he returned to the United States and six months of hospitalization at Beaumont General Hospital, El Paso.

He later served under General Eisenhower for about three months prior to his honorable discharge as a captain in July, 1946, following which he worked for the El Paso Times until February, 1947, and then went to the Denver Post as a night editor. Early in 1948, he opened his own advertising agency and at present is on the board of directors of the Magnuder Advertising Agency of that city.

To Attend Convention

H. G. Barnum, Southern Pacific roadmaster at Carrizozo, leaves Saturday for Chicago where he will attend the convention of railroad roadmasters in this country. The Conrad Hilton Hotel is the headquarters for the convocation to be held Sept. 15-18.

Barnum, one of two roadmasters in the entire Southern Pacific system selected for the trip, has been with the company since 1936, starting as a member on the extra board in Tucuman. He has held the position of roadmaster for the past 10 years.

Relative Of County Resident Killed In Auto Accident In Oregon

Funeral services for Charles Gordon Snell, 19, Dumas, Texas, whose death resulted from injuries suffered in an automobile accident near Roseburg, Ore., on Aug. 31, were held in the Texas city Sept. 5, at the First Baptist Church. Rev. Leon Smith, pastor of the First Christian Church in Dumas, officiated in the absence of Rev. M. G. Upton, who was ill. Interment was at the Dumas cemetery. Snell had a number of relatives in Lincoln County, and with his family, had been a frequent visitor here.

Full details of the accident could not be ascertained since Snell was alone in his car when the mishap occurred, but it is believed that a tire blowout may have been the cause of the mishap which involved only the one vehicle.

The deceased, who was unmarried, is survived by his mother, Mrs. Agnes Snell, Dumas; his father, Tom Snell, Hereford, Tex., and three brothers, Tommy and Donald Snell, Dumas, and Leon Snell, Roseburg, Ore.

The young accident victim was born July 4, 1933, at Dumas where he was reared. He was a member of the Baptist Church and the last rites were conducted in the same church in which he had been baptized as a child.

Relatives from Lincoln County attending the funeral services in the Texas city included Mr. and Mrs. Fred Current and Mrs. Walter Lenard and daughter, Miss Velda Lenard, and son, Bobby Lenard, all of Carrizozo; Gilbert Snell, Nogal; Mrs. Virginia Jones, Captain Mrs. Bill Harcrow, Alamogordo, another relative, accompanied the local group.

Young Snell, who was employed in a Roseburg grocery store, had made his home with his brother, Leon, for the past year and a half, but was planning to return to Dumas at the time of his death. His mother, who had also been living in the Oregon city, moved back to her home in Dumas about two months ago.

Mrs. Mattie Littleton, Carrizozo, is an aunt of the deceased, while Walter Snell and Albert May, both of Nogal, are uncles.

El Paso Couple Die In Highway 54 Accident

Private George L. Casey, 22, and his wife, Mrs. Margaret J. Casey, 19, El Paso, were killed instantly early Sunday morning when they were hurled from their car as it overturned on U. S. Highway 54 about eight miles north of Tularosa. The car was demolished.

State Patrolman Bob Cook, Alamogordo, who investigated the mishap, said it is believed Private Casey dozed at the wheel. The El Paso couple were reported by relatives to have left the border city late Sunday night but their destination was unknown.

Private Casey and his wife, who had been married only two months, both sustained broken necks. The young soldier had spent 13 months in Korea with the 10th Army Corps.

The bodies were removed to a mortuary in Alamogordo and subsequently sent to El Paso, where services were conducted Monday.

Former Lincoln County Sheriff Charged With Being Drunk, Disorderly

Joe Sargent, Carrizozo, owner of the Yucca Bar, filed charges of drunk and disorderly conduct and the use of profane language against Nick Vega, also of this village, former sheriff of Lincoln County and former state liquor inspector in this district, Monday morning in the local justice of the peace court. Sargent, who said that the incident occurred in his bar early Sunday morning, also requested that Vega be put under peace bond as he feared bodily harm. The two cases come up for hearing before Justice of the Peace John Mackey Saturday morning, Sept. 13, at 10 o'clock in the sheriff's office at Carrizozo.

Another case filed with Mackey Monday morning was that in which State Patrolman Carlos G. Salas charged a minor with the unlawful purchase of liquor. Officers said he bought the liquor at the Yucca Bar but refused to comment on the details of the alleged purchase. The youth's bond was set at \$300.

Local officers reported Thursday they did not know when the case will be heard since the youth left Thursday for induction into the U. S. Army.

Luis Campos Loses Second Appeal

The second appeal of Luis Campos, in his efforts to win release from the life term sentence imposed when a jury convicted him of the Feb. 24, 1950, murder of Pierre Nalda, prominent Lincoln County rancher, was denied this week by the State Supreme Court.

The former Corona man's petition for a writ of habeas corpus was denied following an earlier rejection by the Santa Fe District Court.

Campos and Valeriano Alaniz, Mexican national, were convicted in 1950 in the Lincoln County District Court for the murder of Nalda. Alaniz received the death sentence for his part in the crime, but in a new trial held last spring, following his appeal to the Supreme Court, he drew life imprisonment. The second trial was held in Las Cruces.

The petition of Campos stated he was held illegally and had suffered loss of his constitutional rights when he was put on trial.

Rex Werner, Carrizozo, conservationist for this district, told the Lincoln County News Tuesday no dance has been scheduled by his organization. He added that future events planned by the service definitely do not include the sponsorship of a dance.

Corona Wins Grid Opener

Carrizozo's Grizzlies bowed to Corona High School football team in that village Friday when it emerged on the losing end of a 27-6 score in the first game of the 1952 season.

All four of Corona's touchdowns were scored on passes with the first tally coming in the initial period, two in the second quarter and one in the third.

The local team's score came in the beginning period with a 55-yard run by Sam Wedell. Although the Grizzlies threatened in the second and third periods of the game, their efforts failed to materialize despite the fact the Zoolites were inside the opposition's 30-yard line during the entire fourth quarter.

Displaying good defense on ground plays with hard tackling, the Grizzlies proved weak in offensive tactics with frequent fumbling of the ball.

The local team again faces rugged competition when it meets Capitan this (Friday) afternoon on the latter eleven's home field.

Coach Larry Hamilton, newcomer to Carrizozo this year, has been working this week to correct the errors and weak spots which showed up in last Friday's game. The Grizzlies' new mentor is handicapped by loss of several players due to low grades last year, as well as lack of sufficient experience and skill in some of the positions on the squad.

The new coach, although disappointed with the initial showing of his team, is nevertheless convinced that hard plugging plus cooperative teamwork on the part of every member of his squad will result in a creditable showing when the final scoring for the season is tallied.

Hamilton, in addition to getting acquainted with a new school and students and having to round up his football squad in short order, was faced with locating a home. With the housing shortage existing in Carrizozo at present, that last task was not an easy one.

School authorities are hopeful the community will make every effort to attend the football games this fall and give the team vocal support in sparking its efforts for victory.

Schools Functioning Under Reorganization Program This Year

Rural, independent and union high school districts in Lincoln County are functioning this year under the new reorganization setup proposed by the New Mexico State Board of Education. The program was initiated following a series of meetings in the various school districts where the plan was explained to parents and teachers by state officials and members of the county's board of education, Mrs. Lorene Samelson, county schools superintendent, also attended the meetings held in conjunction with the reorganization program.

Capitan, Carrizozo, Corona, Hondo and Ruidoso comprise the five school districts under the new plan. Capitan district includes the Capitan, Enclencho and Lincoln schools with a board comprised of members from Capitan, Enclencho, Fort Stanton and Lincoln to serve until the next regular election.

The Carrizozo school district continues as previously with the addition of Ancho.

The Corona and Ruidoso consolidated school districts retain their existing status.

The Hondo school district takes jurisdiction over Arabela, Hondo, Picacho, San Patricio and Tinnie.

Board members for each of the foregoing districts were appointed by the State Board of Education to serve until the next regular election.

Unless the average daily attendance falls below the required level, the schools now in existence at Lincoln, Hondo, San Patricio, Tinnie, Arabela, Picacho, Ancho and Enclencho are to be maintained.

The reorganization plan also provides that all teachers in the original districts retain their tenure status.

Hitting a downdraft as he took off from an improvised field near Questa, the plane lost altitude and struck a fence. One wing was sheared off and the propeller and landing gear were damaged.

James E. Harcrow, secretary of the Capitan Chamber of Commerce, said this week that his organization has agreed to sponsor a contest to determine the Lincoln County entrant in the State Fair Queen race. The county event previously has been sponsored by the Carrizozo Lions Club.

Harcrow announced the contest will be held in Carrizozo Saturday morning, Sept. 20, at 10 o'clock on the vacant lots just east of the courthouse. The lots are county property. Judges for the event are Hugh Bancroft, president of the Capitan chamber; L. W. Clark, school superintendent; both of Capitan; E. E. Marr, Fort Stanton; S. M. Ortiz, and Wayne Withers, Carrizozo.

Eligibility to compete for the State Fair Queen title requires active membership in a 4-H club or Future Homemakers of America chapter, and contestants must be single girls between the ages of 16 to 19, inclusive, and reside in Lincoln County.

No horses will be provided in the county competition and each contestant must be responsible for the transportation of her horse to and from the county seat on Sept. 20, the date of the local contest. Selection of an entrant for the state contest is based 50 per cent on personality and 50 per cent on horsemanship, and the winner must comply with all State Fair rules.

The county entrant will be provided with lodging and board at the fair's Youth Hall during the nine-day period, but she must furnish her own bedding. In addition, she is responsible for the feeding of her horse and the transportation to and from Albuquerque. Since stable space is at a premium, officials said stables are allocated to only those horses entered in other fair contests. State Fair Queen entrants whose horses are not entered in such contests should contact fair officials to arrange quarters for them as soon as possible prior to the opening date on Sept. 27. It is possible that some of the horses may have to be housed outside the fair grounds.
