Former Local Residents Buried in California

Memorial services were held in Hermosa Beach, Calif., recently for the late Mr. and Mrs. Robert Forsythe, former residents of White Oaks and Carrizozo. Interment was made at Inglewood Park cemetery.

Mrs. Forsythe, who was born in Belfast, Ireland, August 7, 1868, succumbed June 26, 1952 at her home in Redondo Beach, Calif. Her husband, also a native of Belfast where he was born April 15, 1871, followed her in death August 14, 1952.

The couple were in their early youth when they came to White Oaks where Mr. Forsythe's brother, Jack Forsythe, and his two sisters, Mrs. Oliver Peaker and Mrs. M. F. Wells, had already established homes.

The former county residents, who left here about 1937 to make their home in California, are survived by several nieces and nephews in New Mexico.

Advice For GI's

Veterans may now make their checks or money orders for government life insurance premiums payable to "Veterans Administration," VA announced today.

Heretofore, checks and money orders had to be made payable to "The Treasurer of the United States." As a result, many premium payments were sent to the Treasury Department rather than to the VA District or Central Office handling the insurance account.

Veterans were advised by VA not to send cash through the mails but to use checks or postal money orders. Cancelled checks or money orders stubs serve as premium receipts.

Carrizozo Boy Scouts Schedule Annual Patrol

Carrizozo Boy Scout Troop No. 53, has scheduled its annual patrol day for Saturday, September 20.

On that date, Boy Scouts will ask all pedestrians and vehicle drivers to pay a fine for any traffic violations. Mayor Marvin Roberts, State Patrolman Carlos Salas, and Sheriff S. M. Ortiz are cooperating with the scouts in their project.

All money received by the local scouts in their traffic drive will be used for the purchase of uniforms, insignia, and equipment for the troop. At present, it is reported, this project is virtually the Carrizozo's troop only means to earn money for its treasury.

Local scout leaders announced that no boy who is not in scout uniform may be paid a fine, and efforts will be made to prevent any individual from being fined repeatedly. The aim of the project is to promote safety and prevent traffic injuries or deaths in Carrizozo.

Troop No. 53 has completed a summer of activity, and have earned more than 100 merit badges. The scouts in the Explorer unit are now working on an astronomy assignment.

Other activities in which the troop participated include a hike to Orndoff's ranch, camporee, a week at Camp Wehinapay, learning to swim and how to save sinking swimmers at the Truman Spencer, Jr. ranch, flag raising ceremonies at the local high school and at the courthouse on Memorial Day, and assist the Carrizozo Woman's Club in holding its recent cake walk.

At the conclusion of their traffic enforcement duties Saturday, the scouts will gather for a welcome roast, at which time the name of the scout voted the most efficient and polite traffic officer will be announced. The winner will be given an award at a later date.

Captain To Select State Fair Queen Entrant

The State Fair Queen contest will be determined Saturday morning when judges, selected by the Capitan chamber of commerce, sponsor for the county entrant meet on the vacant lots just east of the courthouse in Carrizozo. The hour for judging has been set at 10 a. m. and Carrizozo was chosen by the neighboring town's organization as the most central location for the eliminations in the queen race.

Earl Harcrow, secretary of the Capitan Chamber, announced on Thursday that Jo Ann Straley, Ancho, senior at the local high school, is the only entrant to date in this year's contest. Harcrow also stated he understands there is a possibility several other contestants will be on hand Saturday morning if arrangements can be made for them to secure horses.

The State Fair Queen contest is the third annual one to be held in New Mexico, and previous entrants from Lincoln County have reported nine days of entertainment and fun beyond all expectations.

Judges are Hugh Emeritt and L. W. Clark, Capitan; E. E. Marr, Ft. Stanton; S. M. Ortiz and Wayne Withers, Carrizozo.

Duke City Council Hurt West of Carrizozo

Mrs. B. L. Lindsey, Albuquerque, suffered minor injuries, and her husband was taken to the local hospital suffering from what is believed to be a back injury, following a one-car accident Monday night about 7 miles west of Carrizozo on Hwy 380.

Officers said the car apparently hit a slick portion of the pavement and turned over when it went out of control. The vehicle was damaged extensively.

Henry Shields, Arthur Comanche, and John Dechlea, all from the Mesalero Reservation, were scheduled for arraignment before Justice of the Peace John Mackey yesterday (Thursday) in Carrizozo, on charges of driving on the wrong side of the road. Officers said the car left the road as it rounded a curve and struck a guard pole about two miles west of San Patricio on Hwy 70. Shields and Comanche were taken to the Ruidoso hospital but hospital authorities reported they were able to appear for the arraignment proceedings.

Adolpho Mendoza, Roswell, charged with grand larceny, was taken to Las Cruces Monday for trial, and was sentenced to one year in the penitentiary at Santa Fe. Officers said he has a record of previous convictions.

Manuel Chavez Quits As Justice of Peace

Manuel Chavez' resignation as Justice of the Peace, Precinct 14, was effective September 1.

Commissioners approve allocation of \$1900 for period of July 1, 1952 to June 30, 1953, for support of extension work in Lincoln County with following sources providing the indicated funds:

Auto Licenses \$90; Delinquent taxes \$30; Current taxes \$1790.

Approved purchase of G. C. 3/6 Gilbert and Barker burner for \$497.97 installed from Carrizozo Hdwe. Co. State comptroller approved purchase without request for bids since it is the only firm carrying this particular item and also has a service man available.

Firm's offer states installation can be made within 4 weeks after receipt of order and the price includes taking out the Iron Fireman furnace which now burns slack coal.

Commissioners request State Comptroller's permission to transfer funds temporarily with repayment to be made in December, 1952, as follows: Transfer from: Special road fund \$2500; Court bond fund \$1440; General county fund \$1450; Transfer to: Salary fund \$2500; Court fund \$1440; Agricultural agent \$400; Courthouse and jail repair \$400; Audit fund \$400; Health fund \$250.

Commissioners approve resolution to guarantee to State Hwy Comm. right of way for the bridge west of Tinnie on the Mondo.

Carrizozo schools supt. requests work on following school bus routes: White Oaks (O-Bar-O road), Moore said state refused maintenance but highway engineer authorized to use any available funds on it; Occura (revealed that road had been worked on within the last 30 days but roins had damaged it). Hester believes work can be done on the two school bus routes within the next 3 weeks.

County road construction of culverts, etc., now completed on top of Tuccon Mountains and Mick Vets. County road construction foreman, instructed to start next project back of the second scheduled state road construction on the Arabela road. Operators of fruit grading plant at Hondo requested several loads of gravel to fill in and eliminate muddy stretch from road. County willing to assist when gravel is available. County crew to work on a Hondo bridge approach which is reported as muddy at times and a serious inconvenience to several families who must use it.

Commissioners will investigate a place between Green Tree and Glencoe where work has been requested, and it is believed a culvert will be needed.

Commissioners question the practicality of building the number of culverts requested at San Patricio. It is thought it will be easier to blade a road from time to time. Commissioners do not know whether the county is financially able to supply concrete dips requested.

County Clerk Moore said about 40 culverts had been purchased originally and that approximately 30 of them have not yet been used. One of the commissioners expressed the opinion it would be wise to keep several available for use in emergency need.

A request for the grader to work Cocco Canyon—south of Picacho—was reported, and Hester said it might be possible to get the equipment there by the end of October.

WHEREAS, the Village of Carrizozo, in the County of Lincoln, and State of New Mexico, is a legally and regularly created, established, organized and existing municipal corporation, its full corporate name being "Village of Carrizozo," and has existed as such since February 23, 1917; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Carrizozo has heretofore issued its valid Junior Security Electric Light and Power Revenue Bonds in the aggregate principal amount of \$35,000.00, consisting of 35 bonds in the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, numbered from 1 to 35, both inclusive, maturing serially on October 1, 1944, or on any interest payment date thereafter; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Carrizozo has heretofore issued its valid Junior Security Electric Light and Power Revenue Bonds in the aggregate principal amount of \$35,000.00, consisting of 35 bonds in the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, numbered from 1 to 35, both inclusive, maturing serially on October 1, 1944, or on any interest payment date thereafter; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Carrizozo has heretofore issued its valid Junior Security Electric Light and Power Revenue Bonds in the aggregate principal amount of \$35,000.00, consisting of 35 bonds in the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, numbered from 1 to 35, both inclusive, maturing serially on October 1, 1944, or on any interest payment date thereafter; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Carrizozo has heretofore issued its valid Junior Security Electric Light and Power Revenue Bonds in the aggregate principal amount of \$35,000.00, consisting of 35 bonds in the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, numbered from 1 to 35, both inclusive, maturing serially on October 1, 1944, or on any interest payment date thereafter; and

WHEREAS, the owners and holders of said bonds have agreed to surrender said bonds upon the payment of the principal amount thereof with accrued interest to the date of surrender, said bonds to be thereupon cancelled, and in addition, the Board of Trustees of the Village of Carrizozo has determined, and does hereby determine, that the executed but unissued Junior Security Electric Light and Power Revenue Bonds dated October 1, 1944, consisting of bonds numbered 46 to 55, inclusive, held by or for the account of the Village should be cancelled prior to the issuance of the bonds herein authorized; and

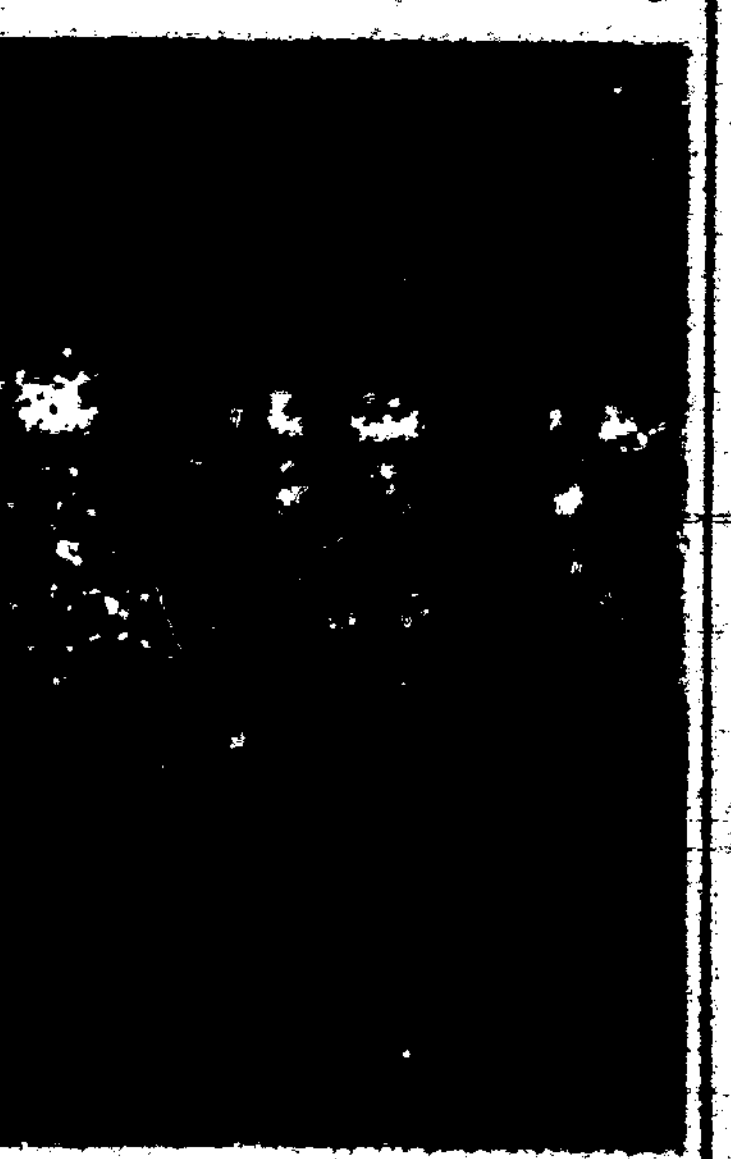
Hondo High Graduates To Enter College's

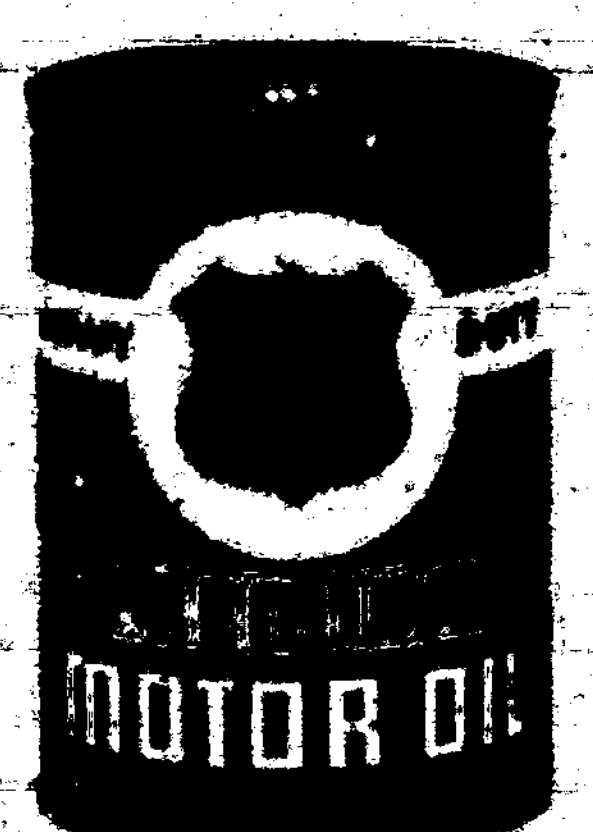

entire electric light and power system, after provision only for all necessary and reasonable expenses of operation and maintenance of said system, sums sufficient to pay, when due, the principal of and the interest on the bonds of the series of which this is one, and to create and maintain a reserve for such purpose, and the Village of Carrizozo agrees with the holder of this bond and each and every person who may become the holder hereof that it will keep and perform all the covenants of said ordinance, including its covenant against the sale or encumbrance of said system or any part thereof, unless provision shall be made for the payment of the principal of and the interest on the bonds of the series of which this is one, and its covenant that it will fix, maintain and collect rates for service rendered by said system sufficient to produce revenues or earnings to pay all operating and maintenance charges, and both the principal of and the interest on the bonds authorized by such ordinance.

If it expressly agreed with the holder of holders of this bond that this bond and the interest thereon are payable and collectible solely from the revenues derived from the operation of said electric light and power system the net income of which is pledged, and that the holder or holders hereof may not look to any general or other fund for the payment of the principal or the interest on this bond.

This bond is one of a series of two hundred and fifty-two bonds of like amount and date authorized for the purpose of improving, extending, repairing and bettering the electric light and power system in and for the Village of Carrizozo, in the County of Lincoln and State of New Mexico and for the purpose of refinancing, refunding and paying its valid Electric Light and Power Revenue Bonds dated June 15, 1942, and its valid Junior Security Electric Light and Power Revenue Bonds dated October 1, 1944 and is issued pursuant to and in strict compliance with the constitution and laws of the State of New Mexico, and particularly under the terms and provisions of Article 35, Chapter 14, New Mexico Statutes, 1941, and all other acts amendatory thereof and supplemental thereto.

In addition to the bonds of the series of which this is one may be issued when authorized in accordance with law and subject to the limitations contained in said ordinance, payable in whole or in part from the net income and revenues to be derived from the operation of the system, and having a lien thereon on a parity with or junior to, but not superior to, the lien of the series of bonds of which this is one.

This bond is subject to the condition, and every holder hereof by accepting the same agrees with the obligor and every subsequent holder hereof, that (a) the delivery of this bond to any transferee shall vest title in this bond and in the interest coupons attached hereto; in such transferee to the same extent for all purposes as would the delivery under like circumstances of any negotiable instrument payable to bearer; (b) the obligor and any agent of the obligor may treat the bearer of this bond as the absolute owner hereof for all purposes, and shall not be affected by any notice to the contrary; (c) the principal of and the interest on this bond shall be paid, and this bond and each of the coupons appertaining thereto are transferable, free from and without regard to any equities between the obligor and the original or any intermediate holder hereof, or any set-offs or cross-claims; and (d) the surrender to the obligor or any agent of the obligor of this bond and of each of the coupons shall be a good discharge to the obligor for the same.

This bond does not constitute an indebtedness of the Village of Carrizozo within the meaning of any constitutional provision or limitation, but is payable solely out of the special fund identified as the "Village of Carrizozo Electric Light and Power Extension and Refunding Revenue Bond Fund."

It is further certified, recited and warranted that all the requirements of law have been fully complied with by the proper officers of said Village in the issue of this bond.

Section 7. That there is hereby created a special fund to be known as the "Village of Carrizozo Electric Light and Power Fund" (hereinafter sometimes referred to as the electric light and power fund). So long as any of the bonds hereby authorized shall be outstanding, either as to principal or interest, and after making provision for all reasonable expenses of operating and maintaining the system (which shall include, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, all proper charges of the paying agent) the following payments shall be made from said fund:

1. Into a bank account with the First National Bank of Santa Fe, Santa Fe, New Mexico, to be kept separate from all other accounts and to be known as the "Village of Carrizozo Electric Light and Power Extension and Refunding Revenue Bond Fund" (sometimes hereinafter referred to as the bond fund) the following:
 - a. Monthly commencing on the first day of September, 1952, and monthly thereafter, not less than one-sixth of the amount necessary to pay the next maturing installment of interest on the bonds herein authorized.
 - b. Monthly commencing on the first day of September, 1954, and monthly thereafter, not less than one-twelfth of the amount necessary to pay the next maturing installment of principal on the bonds herein authorized.
2. After making the payments required to be made by paragraph one of this section, into a bank account with the First National Bank of Santa Fe, Santa Fe, New Mexico, to be kept separate from all other accounts and to be known as the "Village of Carrizozo Electric Light and Power Extension and Refunding Revenue Bond Reserve Fund" (hereinafter sometimes referred to as the bond reserve fund), not less than \$250.00 a month, commencing on the first day of October, 1952, until the amount so deposited under paragraph 2 of this section 7 of this ordinance equals or exceeds \$35,000.00. Such payments so deposited in the bond reserve fund shall be and constitute a continuing reserve to meet possible deficiencies in the bond fund and, if need be, additional payments shall be made into said bond reserve fund from the net income of the system so that at all times the amount in said bond reserve fund, after the reserve has reached \$35,000.00, shall be maintained in that amount. Whenever necessary, moneys in said bond reserve fund shall be used to pay the principal of and the interest on the bonds hereby authorized.
3. If in any month the Village shall, for any reason, fail to pay into the bond fund and the bond reserve fund the full amounts above stipulated in paragraphs one and two of this section 7 of this ordinance, then an amount equal to any deficiency in the amount of amounts paid into

said funds in such month shall be added to the amount of amounts otherwise required to be paid into said funds in the next ensuing month. Payments into the said funds may be made either in cash or in direct obligations of the United States of America, and all moneys in said funds may be invested in direct obligations of the United States maturing, not later than two years from the date of purchase. The moneys in said funds shall be used solely and only for the purpose of paying the principal of and the interest on the bonds herein authorized, and shall be continuously secured by direct obligations of the United States of America at least equal to the amount in the bond reserve fund and in the bond fund less the amount required to meet the principal and interest requirements for the current year.

After making the payments required to be made under paragraphs one, two and three of this section 7 of this ordinance, any balance remaining in the electric light and power fund may be used to pay interest accruing on revenues of the system but constituting a lien thereon junior to the lien of the bonds herein authorized to be issued, or any such balance may be set aside in a fund to be known as "Village of Carrizozo Electric Light and Power System Depreciation Fund" and may be used from time to time as the Board of Trustees may determine in making good any depreciation in the physical properties comprising the system, including extensions and improvements; provided, however, that the amounts so set aside in any one fiscal year shall not exceed ten percent of the gross revenues derived from the operation of the system in the preceding fiscal year.

After making the payments required to be made under paragraphs one, two and three of this section 7 of this ordinance, and after making the payments or expenditures authorized to be made under paragraph four of this section 7 of this ordinance, any balance remaining in the electric light and power fund may be used to purchase in the open market bonds authorized by this ordinance at the best price obtainable not higher than the call price, or such surplus may be applied to the prior redemption of bonds as authorized by this ordinance. Any bonds so purchased or redeemed shall thereupon be cancelled.

Nothing in this section 7 of this ordinance shall be construed as requiring the Village of Carrizozo to make any payments into the bond fund, or the bond reserve fund if the amount then contained in said funds shall equal the entire amount of the outstanding bonds hereby authorized, both as to principal and interest.

Section 8. That the Village of Carrizozo hereby covenants with the holders of any and all of the revenue bonds hereby authorized to be issued that said Village will prescribe, revise and collect rates, fees or charges for services furnished by the electric light and power system (which shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America) sufficient to produce revenues or earnings to pay all reasonable expenses of the operation and maintenance of the system, and both the principal of and the interest on the bonds authorized by this ordinance, and to create the reserve fund as provided in section 7 of this ordinance. The Village further covenants that no free service shall be furnished by or through the system and that any use thereof or of the services rendered thereby by the Village of Carrizozo or any department thereof will be paid for monthly at the reasonable value of the services so rendered, the income so derived to be deemed income derived from the operation of the system and to be used and accounted for in the same manner as other income derived from the operation of the system.

Section 9. That all bills for service rendered by or through the system shall be rendered to customers on a regularly established day of each month next succeeding the month in which the service was rendered, and in the event said bills are not paid within forty days after they are due, service shall be discontinued. The Village of Carrizozo shall have a lien upon any lot or parcel of land for legal charges for the product of such electric light and power utility used or consumed thereon by the owner thereof, and such lien shall be perfected by the appropriate Village officials in accordance with

Section 14.3503, New Mexico Statutes, 1941, and all acts amendatory or supplemental thereto. All Village officials handling funds in connection with the operation of the system and the administration of this ordinance shall, insofar as practicable, be required to give bond in the amount of the funds reasonably anticipated to be in their custody.

Section 10. That nothing in this ordinance shall be construed in such a manner as to prevent the Village from issuing additional bonds, authorized in accordance with law, for the purpose of improving, extending, repairing and bettering the system and payable in whole or in part from the net revenues and income of the system and having a lien thereon on a parity with, but not superior to, the lien of the bonds authorized by this ordinance, provided that no such additional bonds shall be issued having a lien on the income or revenues of said system on a parity with the lien of the bonds herein authorized unless the net revenues derived from the operation of the system for the twelve months immediately prior to the issuance of such additional bonds shall be sufficient to pay an amount at least equal to one and three-fourths times the average annual principal and interest requirements of both the bonds herein authorized to be issued and then outstanding, and the bonds proposed to be issued. Any additional bonds authorized to be issued for the purpose of improving, extending, repairing and bettering the system may be made payable in whole or in part from the net revenues and income derived from the system, and the proceedings authorizing such additional bonds may provide for the creation of a fund or funds for the payment of the principal of and the interest on the additional bonds, including a reserve fund or funds, provided such proceedings shall not authorize the prior redemption of bonds thereunder prior to September 1, 1962. The provisions of section 7 of this ordinance shall not be construed so as to prevent the issuance of such additional bonds nor the creation of funds for their payment, provided that such additional bonds shall constitute a lien against net income and revenues, after the payment of all reasonable expenses of operating and maintaining the system.

Nothing contained in this section shall be construed in such a manner as to prevent the Village from issuing bonds for the purpose of refunding all or a part of the bonds herein authorized. If bonds are issued to refund a part of the bonds herein authorized to be issued, such refunding bonds shall be on a parity as to lien with the unrefunded bonds; provided, however, that if only a portion of the bonds authorized by this ordinance is so refunded, and if such bonds are refunded in such manner that the interest rate on the refunded bonds is increased or that any refunded bond matures or becomes callable at a date earlier than the maturity date or call date of the corresponding bond refunded thereby, then such bonds may not be refunded without the consent of the holders of the unrefunded portion of bonds hereby authorized to be issued, nor shall anything herein contained be construed in such a manner as to prevent the Village from issuing additional bonds payable from the net income and revenues to be derived from the operation of the system but constituting a lien thereon junior to and inferior to the lien of the bonds herein authorized to be issued; provided, however, that no such junior lien bonds may be issued maturing prior to the last maturity date of the bonds herein authorized to be issued and then outstanding.

In determining whether additional bonds may be issued, as aforesaid, consideration shall be given to any probable reduction in operation or maintenance expenses that will result from the expenditure of the funds proposed to be derived from the issuance and sale of said bonds. A written certification of a certified public accountant, to be employed by the Village of Carrizozo, to the effect that said earnings are sufficient to pay the amount herein specified for the issuance of additional bonds having a parity lien, shall conclusively be presumed to be accurate in determining the right of the Village to issue such bonds.

Section 11. That so long as any of the bonds issued hereunder remain outstanding and unpaid, the Village hereby covenants and agrees with each and every holder of any bond issued hereunder:

- a. That it will continuously operate said system and will make such extensions, improvements or additions

thereto as may be necessary or advisable to insure its economical and efficient operation at all times and to an extent sufficient to supply electric power and energy to the Village of Carrizozo and the inhabitants thereof.

- b. That it will maintain insurance on said system of the kind and amount such as would be normally carried by private companies engaged in a similar type of business.
- c. That it will keep separate and proper books, records and accounts of the operation of said system which shall be similar in form to those approved by the Federal Power Commission for private utilities. That the holders of any of the bonds herein authorized to be issued shall have the right at all reasonable times to inspect the said system and all records, accounts and data relating thereto. That the Village will send to Robert E. Schweser & Company and to the holders of twenty-five percent of the bonds hereby authorized, if requested in writing to do so, monthly reports in reasonable detail covering the operations of the system during the preceding month, and showing the number of customers of the system by class, the revenues per class of customers, and a detailed statement of operating expenses. The Village will furnish, not more than sixty days after the close of each fiscal year, to Robert E. Schweser & Company and to the holder or holders of twenty-five percent of the bonds hereby authorized, if requested to do so, a complete financial statement of the system covering said fiscal year, and certified as correct by a certified public accountant. The cost and expense of preparing such reports and statements shall be considered as part of the cost of operating and maintaining the system.
- d. That it will not sell or otherwise dispose of or encumber the system or any part thereof, and that it will not create nor permit to be created any charge or lien on the revenues derived therefrom except as in this ordinance permitted.
- e. That it will promptly pay the principal of and the interest on every bond issued hereunder and secured hereby at the place, on the date, and in the manner specified herein and in said bonds and in the coupons appertaining thereto according to the true intent and meaning hereof. Such principal and interest are payable solely from the revenues derived from the operation of the system, and nothing in the bonds or coupons or in this ordinance shall be construed as obligating the Village of Carrizozo to pay the bonds and coupons except from the revenues of the system.
- f. That it will at all times endeavor to employ in connection with the operation of said system in executive and managerial capacities only persons competent thereof by reason of training and experience, and that it will administer the system in accordance with sound business principles. That the non-partisan board now serving in an advisory capacity to the Board of Trustees of the Village and known as the Electric Light and Power Committee will be continued in existence in order to assure the efficient and economical operation of the system. That the manager of the system shall be appointed by the Board of Trustees of the Village subject to the approval of Robert E. Schweser & Company.
- g. That the Village will not grant any franchise, license or permit to any individual, partnership or corporation for the operation of an electric light and power system within the Village of Carrizozo.

Section 12. That the proceeds derived from the sale of said bonds shall be deposited promptly upon the receipt thereof in a separate account or accounts in a bank or banks which are members of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, and the Village Treasurer is hereby authorized to deposit such proceeds in such bank or banks, and such proceeds shall be used solely for the purpose of paying the cost of improving, extending, repairing and bettering the electric light and power system in and for the Village of Carrizozo and for the purpose of refinancing, refunding and paying the outstanding Electric Light and Power Revenue Bonds of the Village dated June 15, 1942, and the outstanding

Junior Security Electric Light and Power Revenue Bonds dated October 1, 1944, as herein provided, but the purchaser of said bonds shall in no manner be responsible for the application or disposal by said City or any of its officers of any of the proceeds derived from the sale of said bonds.

Section 13. That any holder of any one or more of said bonds or any of the coupons representing interest thereon may, either at law or in equity, by suit, action, mandamus or other appropriate proceeding in any court of competent jurisdiction protect the lien created by this ordinance on the revenues of the system, and may by suit, action, mandamus or other appropriate proceeding enforce and compel the performance of any duty imposed upon said Village by the provisions of this ordinance, including the making and collecting of sufficient rates and charges and the segregation of the income and revenues of said system and the proper application thereof.

The Village further covenants and agrees that if any default be made in the payment of the principal of or the interest upon any of said bonds, then upon the commencing of suit by any holder of said bonds or coupon any court having jurisdiction of such action may appoint a receiver to administer said system on behalf of the Village with power to charge and collect rates sufficient to provide for the payment of all bonds and obligations outstanding against said system, and for the payment of all operating expenses, and to apply the income and revenues derived from the operation of said system in conformity with the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 14. That the officers of the Village of Carrizozo be, and they hereby are, authorized and directed to take all action necessary or appropriate to effectuate the provisions of this ordinance including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the printing of said bonds and the execution of such certificates as may be required by the purchaser or purchasers thereof relating to the signing of the bonds, the tenure and identity of the municipal officials, the assessed valuation and indebtedness of the Village of Carrizozo, the receipt of the bond purchase price, and the absence of litigation, pending or threatened, if in accordance with the facts affecting the validity thereof.

Section 15. That notwithstanding any provisions herein contained, the term "revenues" of the system shall include all revenue derived by the Village of Carrizozo from the operation of the electric light and power system, whether resulting from additions, improvements or betterments to said system or otherwise, and shall include all revenues received by the Village from the furnishing of service from the system to consumers outside the Village limits as well as within the Village limits.

Section 16. That so long as any of the bonds herein authorized to be issued are outstanding, the Village of Carrizozo will not mortgage, pledge or otherwise encumber the system or any part thereof, or the revenues thereof, except as herein provided, and will not sell, lease or otherwise dispose of any substantial portion of the system and will not issue any obligations for the payment of which the revenues of the system are pledged, except as in this ordinance provided.

Section 17. That any holder of any one or more of the bonds herein authorized, or any of the coupons representing interest thereon, shall have the right and power for the equal benefit and protection of all holders of the bonds herein authorized:

- a. By mandamus or other suit, action or proceeding at law or in equity to enforce his rights against the Village and its Board of Trustees and any of its officers, agents and employees, and to require and compel the Village or its Board of Trustees or any of its officers, agents or employees to perform and carry out its or their duties and obligations under the law, and its and their covenants and agreements with the bond holders as set forth in this ordinance;
- b. By action or suit in equity to require the Village and its Board of Trustees to account as if they were the trustees of an express trust;
- c. By action or suit in equity to enjoin any acts or things which might be unlawful or in violation of the rights of the bond holders; and
- d. To bring suit upon the bonds.

No right or remedy conferred by law or by this ordinance upon any holder of the bonds herein authorized is intended to be exclusive of any other right or remedy, but each such right or

remedy is cumulative and in addition to every other right or remedy which may be exercised without exhausting and without regard to any other remedy conferred by law.

Section 18. That if any one or more sections, sentences, clauses or parts of this ordinance shall for any reason be questioned or held invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remaining provisions of this ordinance, but shall be confined in its operation to the specific sections, sentences, clauses, or parts of this ordinance so held unconstitutional and invalid, and the inapplicability and invalidity of any section, sentence, clause, or part of this ordinance, in any one or more instances, shall not affect or prejudice in any way the applicability and validity of this ordinance in any other instances.

Section 19. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed to the extent only of such inconsistency. This repealer shall not be construed to revive any ordinance or part of any ordinance heretofore repealed.

Section 20. That this ordinance may be amended or supplemented by ordinances adopted by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Carrizozo in accordance with the laws of the State of New Mexico, and without the receipt by the Village of any additional consideration, with the written consent of the holders of two-thirds of the bonds authorized by his ordinance and outstanding at the time of the adoption of such amendatory or supplemental ordinance; provided, however, that no such ordinance shall have the effect of permitting:

1. An extension of the maturity of any bond authorized by this ordinance; or
2. A reduction in the principal amount of any bond or the rate of interest thereon; or
3. The creation of a lien upon or a pledge of revenues ranking prior to the lien or pledge created by this ordinance or on a parity therewith, except as herein provided; or
4. A reduction of the principal amount of bonds required for consent to such amendatory or supplemental ordinance; or
5. The establishment of priorities as between bonds issued and outstanding under the provisions of this ordinance.

This ordinance was adopted by the affirmative vote of not less than three-fourths of the entire members of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Carrizozo, New Mexico, and approved by me, after due examination, as Mayor of said Village, and attested by the Clerk and the corporate seal of said Village affixed on the 17th day of September, 1952.

It was then moved by Trustee Roy Shafer and seconded by Trustee C. A. Snow that all rules of this Board which might prevent, unless suspended, the final passage and adoption of this ordinance at this meeting be, and the same are hereby, suspended for the purpose of permitting the final passage and adoption of this ordinance at this meeting. The question being upon the adoption of said motion and the suspension of the rules, the roll was called with the following result:

Those voting aye: Clifton Zumwalt, Roy Shafer, C. A. Snow.

Those voting nay: None.

Three members of the Board of Trustees having voted in favor of said motion, the presiding officer declared said motion carried and the rules suspended.

Trustee C. A. Snow then moved that said ordinance be passed and adopted as read. Trustee Clifton Zumwalt seconded the motion. The question being upon the passage and adoption of said ordinance, the roll was called with the following result:

Those voting aye: Roy Shafer, Clifton Zumwalt, C. A. Snow.

Those voting nay: None.

The presiding officer thereupon declared that three members of the Board of Trustees having voted in favor thereof, the said ordinance duly passed and adopted.

On motion duly adopted, it was ordered that said ordinance be published and recorded according to law.

Thereupon the meeting adjourned.

New Press Installed By Lincoln County News

The installation of a Lee press in the plant of the Lincoln County News last weekend developed into a series of headaches for the publisher, which started when the truck that was hauling the equipment broke down near San Antonio Friday night, and did not arrive in Carrizozo until Saturday afternoon. Repairs to the truck were not completed until Saturday night, and the press could not be moved before Sunday. Bob Means, Carrizozo, towed the truck in and later assisted in the removal of the old press and the installation of the new one.

The problems encountered in the installation of the machine were made more difficult with a complicated hookup for the motor, which was not accompanied by an instruction chart.

Herbert E. Reeves, new electrical contractor in Carrizozo, solved the knotty problem of the correct hookup for the network of wires in the press variable-speed motor, and rescued the publisher from a particularly harassing spot.

George McBride, Captain, is doing the remodeling of the building that houses the plant. Owned by Mrs. Era B. Smith, former publisher of the Lincoln County News, the remodeling of the back wall to permit the press installation is the first step in the modernization of the building. It is expected to complete the major portion of the remodeling by November.

Purchase Authorizations In Effect at High School

Carrizozo school officials announced this week a new regulation which has been put in effect this year at the high school.

The new regulation states that no student shall make a purchase to be paid from class or club funds without a requisition from the principal's office for authorization of the purchase. The new ruling provides that any student making such purchase without authorization is responsible for any expense incurred.

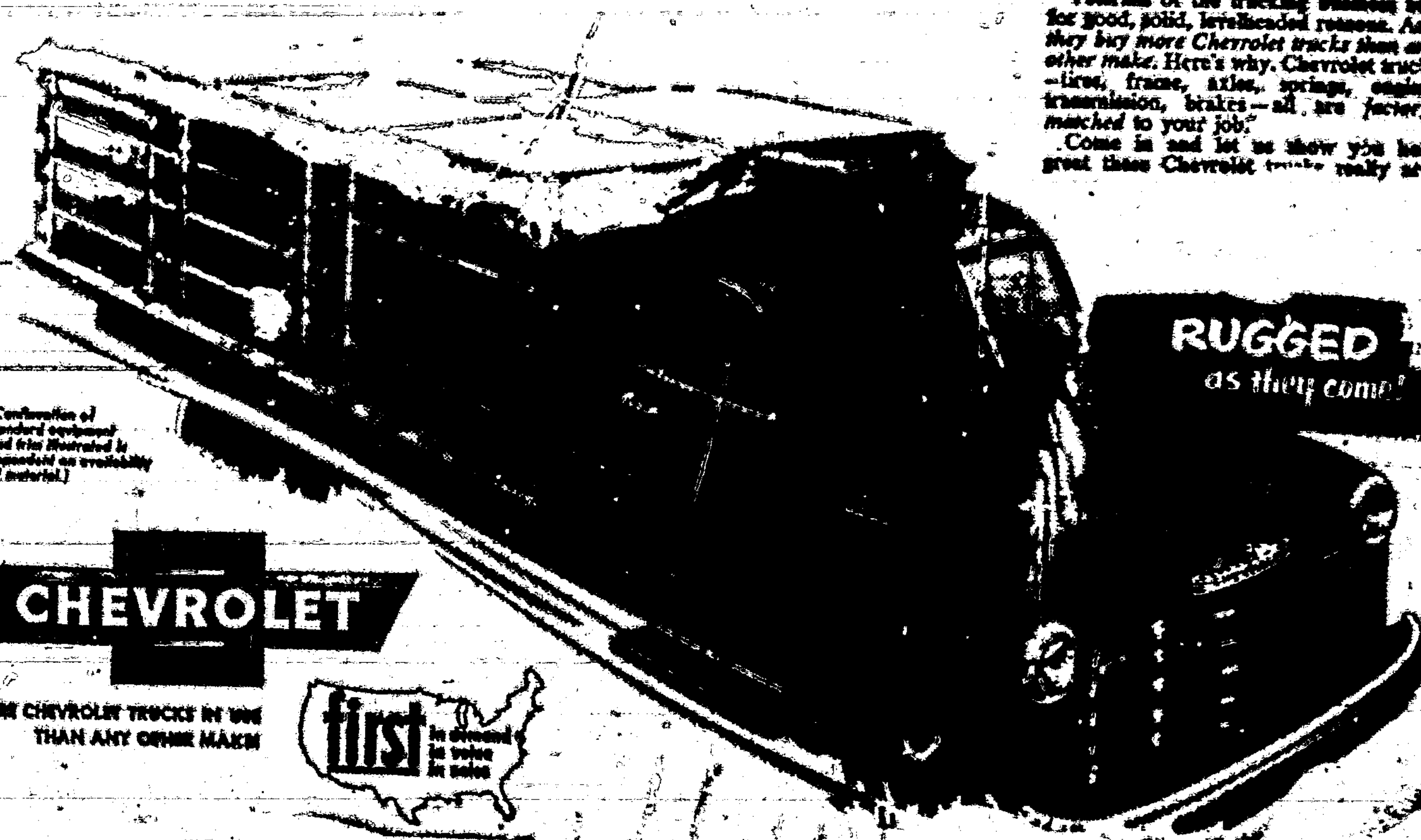
