RAMBLIN' AROUND

(George Zimmerman, Carrizozo attorney, is this week's guest columnist. He presents some of his ideas on an important subject—taxation. Articles by others on matters of local and county interest are welcomed for publication in the News.—Ed.)

Tactful and reasonable taxation will result in Lincoln County during 1953. If Assessor-elect Lloyd Vigil and his assistant, Frank B. Wright will carry into effect a proposed plan to help equalize the burden under existing law.

Heretofore business establishments and commercial enterprises, which have started operations in Lincoln County after the tax rolls have been forwarded to Santa Fe by the local assessor, have delayed, refused, forgotten or neglected to evaluate and assess their merchandise stock for taxation during the year the business or enterprise was started.

The merchants have delayed this legal requirement by resorting to the time-worn excuse that an audit would have to be made, or that a correct and accurate inventory would have to be taken before the merchant could arrive at a value for assessment of his personal property used in the regular course of business.

Despite the constant vigilance and extended investigation on the part of Retiring Assessor, Raymond S. Luna, and his assistants, some merchants have managed to obtain licenses from the county commissioners or from the municipal governing body of the respective villages but have been able to escape the tax responsibility imposed by law.

This free ride resulting in an intangible subsidy to a few taxpayers, and an increased burden to many taxpayers need not result in 1953 and thereafter. It will surprise many a merchant to see his name appear on the assessment roll for the first time, and the equalization procedure will be accelerated by the many merchants who have correctly assessed their personal property for many years.

The plan is not difficult to operate. It necessitates little work. The initial procedure is to prepare and publish a complete list of business establishments licensed in the County of Lincoln, or licensed by the villages of Greenlee and Ruidoso. The County Clerk has this information available at his fingertips, and the respective village clerks have an alphabetic list of enterprises and businesses duly licensed to operate within the respective village limits.

The Chamber of Commerce in Ruidoso is well acquainted with each and every business in that section of our County; the Lions Club of Carrizozo has utilized lists of merchants for their advertising and service campaigns; and the information is usually set forth in the telephone directories of the various municipalities.

If this method of compilation discloses a business or enterprise that is not licensed then the investigation has resulted in a secondary benefit whereby occupation and license taxes will be obtained. There are some now existing.

Against this list of business establishments will be placed the assessor's assessment list of commercial personal property for 1952 and the delinquents can be added to the 1953 tax roll. If the neglectful or busy merchant does not wish to assess and evaluate his commercial merchandise stock for 1953 assessment then the assessor will certainly pay the business a visit, make an intelligent appraisal, and place the personal property on the tax roll. If the merchant is dissatisfied with the valuation set up by the assessor and his assistants, then he may appeal the decision to the Board of Equalization.

Whether the assessor desires to investigate prior assessments, or lack of assessments, is his own business, but what takes place during 1953 is every taxpayer's concern. The amount of direct taxation received by the county helps to build our schools, develop their athletic programs, and equalize the responsibility of civic government. Plan Reconstruction Of Courtroom at Historic Building

On the drawing board are plans for reconstructing the courtroom at the Old Lincoln County Courthouse, Jack Boylan, custodian, told the News this week.

Assisting Mr. Boylan in reconstructing on paper the courtroom as it appeared in the early days, are Lloyd Hulbert and Bert Pfingsten.

Originally the courtroom was living quarters during the days when the structure was the Murphy-Dolan "Big Store." It became a courtroom after 1890 when the building came into use as Lincoln County's Court House.

At the time of the confinement and escape of Billy the Kid, Pat Garrett, sheriff, had his office in the south end of the courtroom.

This part of the courtroom, on which the reconstruction plans are in the making, includes the railing extending all the way across the courtroom from east to west, which fenced off the jury box and the judges' dais and table at which the opposing attorneys sat.

This part of the courthouse, as well as the entire second floor was a schoolroom from 1913 to 1936.

Ford Dealer to Attend Denver Meeting

Marvin H. Roberts of Carrizozo will leave November 29 to attend the Denver District Ford meeting in Colorado Springs. He will return December 3.

can become a powerful influence in the future affairs of Lincoln County. I believe the office is equal to the task.

It is hoped the treasurer-elect will make available for public scrutiny the purchasers of real property sold for delinquent taxes throughout the county during his term of office. The tax sales are scheduled to be held soon after the new county officers take over, and should not be the source of unjust criticism they previously have been.

The new county clerk will be expected to collect license and occupation taxes which have been delinquent during the election year, and to demand proper licensing throughout the county of enterprises or businesses which are operating with legal sanction. Sitting as a Board of Equalization the newly-formed county commission will have important responsibilities regarding the assessments returned for their approval. The probate judge will have to be alert to the problems of succession taxes which accrue to the state from the probating of decedent's estates within the county.

Taxpayers will demand that the sheriff-elect produce proper vouchers for expenditures of funds made through his office, and to account for all receipts and costs received by him in an official capacity. The public will demand that all of the county officials contribute their entire ability and time to the office for which they were elected. The responsibility of efficient government should be and will be cheerfully undertaken. Courtesy and consideration from the public to be served will be expected by the newly-elected office holders and this cooperation will be and must be given.

Taxation in the county throughout 1953 and subsequent years will be the subject of intelligent and candid evaluation, as will all of the affairs of public officials throughout our nation be subjected to the tests of honesty, reasonableness and competency.

"GET OUT OF TOWN" SAYS WARNING NOTE SIGNED 'KKK'

"We are giving you three days to get out of town" was the ominous content of a note received recently by Mrs. Gusie Wanderer, proprietor of "Gusie's Cafe in Corona.

The message was signed "Ku Klux Klan." Mrs. Wanderer sent the threatening note to the FBI, U. S. Department of Justice in Albuquerque, and also notified Sheriff S. M. Ortiz that she had been annoyed by youths opening the door of her cafe and shouting impudently.

Sheriff Ortiz found the boys who were implicated and gave them a stern warning.

Mrs. Wanderer was advised by the FBI that "the facts which you present do not come within the investigative jurisdiction of the FBI."

Rubble Still Shows In Cities of Germany

Joe West, recently returned from Germany, where he was a member of the occupation forces in the American zone, thinks Germany may have learned a lesson from World War II and will be slow getting into another one.

During his six months overseas, the ex-serviceman traveled over most of western Germany, including the Bavarian Alps. Bremerhaven, he said, is almost entirely rebuilt, but the rubble still shows in other cities. Trees and shrubs are growing from remaining rubble.

Though the people are not outspoken, he said, there seems to be an underlying resentment against the American occupation, in spite of the good treatment given them by the Americans and the work that has been done in helping rebuild bombed cities.

Mr. West plans to enter college in Las Cruces in February, taking a three-year course in electronics. "He has had seven years' experience in radio and radar work."

\$1050 CHECK SWELLS FUNDS FOR COUNTY MARCH OF DIMES

A March of Dimes check for \$1050 has been received by the Lincoln County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis to help provide care for polio patients here, it was announced today by Mrs. J. P. Turner, Chapter chairman.

Mrs. Turner explained that when March of Dimes funds are raised each January, half of the total amount remains with the local chapter and half is sent to National Headquarters to finance scientific research, professional and public education and to provide emergency aid such as that just received.

Although the once-impregnable barriers surrounding polio are toppling one by one before scientific attack, the chairman declared, the tide of polio continues to rise higher across the nation, leaving ever-increasing burdens on the chapters of the National Foundation.

"We have in Lincoln County," said Mrs. Turner, "a clear example of how a polio outbreak can quickly exhaust the resources of a chapter. In the 1952 March of Dimes we raised approximately \$900. By October 1, 1952, this was all gone and we had to appeal for emergency aid from National Headquarters."

"Once more the nation is confronted by a serious polio problem. During the first six months of 1952, incidence was higher than during the comparable periods of 1949 and 1950, the worst polio years on record."

The Lincoln County Chapter at present is providing funds, in whole or in part, for the care of nine patients stricken this year.

Traditional Thanksgiving Feed for Navy Men

NEW ORLEANS, La., Nov. 21.—Our modern Navy will have an old-fashioned Thanksgiving dinner.

"The Navy has few old-fashioned things in this atomic age," said Lt. Comdr. H. G. Dericks, USNR, commanding officer of the USS Haas, a destroyer escort, based at New Orleans.

"But we will have a dinner just like our mothers' cook," he added.

"And I doubt if anyone will ever improve on roast turkey, especially if it has a mushroom dressing," he continued.

The captain of the Haas is a naval reservist from Tulsa, Okla., one of thousands of men who have been called to active duty during the present emergency.

Commissaryman First Class George A. Stuedlein presides over the Haas' spotless white galley.

This will be the twenty-third Thanksgiving dinner which he has prepared while serving in the Navy.

The menu will be as follows: Turkey-rice soup, roast Tom turkey, turkey gravy, mushroom dressing, Virginia ham, cranberry sauce, mashed potatoes, buttered green peas, applesauce, lettuce and tomato salad, bread, pumpkin pie with ice cream, fruit cake, mixed sweet pickles, ripe and stuffed olives, milk, coffee, mixed candy and cigars.

The dinner will be similar aboard other ships and stations in the Eighth Naval District—the states of Louisiana, Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Arkansas.

Five 20-pound turkeys will be cooked in twin electric ovens aboard the Haas.

Stuedlein and his cooks will arise early to prepare the feast. During the morning he expects many of the members of the 120-man crew to stop by to inquire concerning the cooking of the stuffed birds—just as if they were at home.

They will dine at noon—cafeteria style—and may go back for as many "seconds" as they desire.

"The meal will be kept hot for another six hours and men will snack buffet style through the afternoon," Comdr. Dericks said.

"Our kitchen is just as modern as mother's and even in roughest weather we don't have to lash the turkeys to the oven," Stuedlein explained.

Slain War Hero

ALAMOGORDO, N. M., Nov. 21.—Funeral services for Willie Estrada, Alamogordo hero of the Korean war, were held in Alamogordo at the Immaculate Conception Church at 9 a. m. Friday, November 21.

Full military rites conducted by the Alamogordo American Legion Post will follow at the Catholic cemetery.

Estrada, who was commander of an army tank was killed in action when grenades thrown at his tank exploded before he could throw them off. According to word received by his family here, he had been warding off a grenade attack from his post in the tank and was unable to get to one of them in time.

For his bravery, Estrada has been posthumously awarded the distinguished service cross, second only to the Congressional medal of honor in United States military awards.

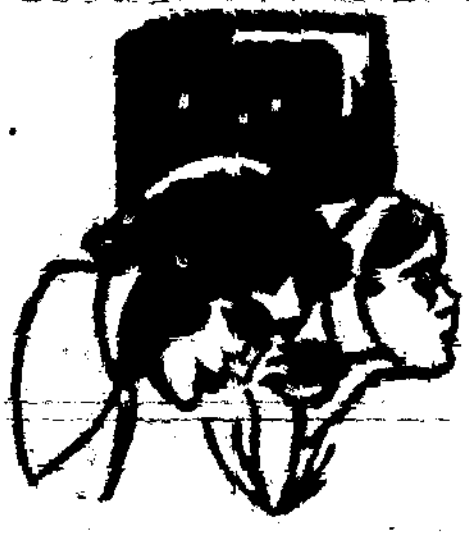
