### NEW CARRIZOSO GRADE SCHOOL READY JAN. 5

The new \$145,000 grade school building in Carrizozo will be ready for occupancy January 5, L. Z. Manire, superintendent, announced this week.

The school has been examined and accepted by a board comprised of Pat Withers, Tino Lopez, Bill Nickels, Jason Moore, architect, and Mr. Underwood, the building's contractor.

The structure has eight classrooms and a large office for the principal.

At the rear of each room is a series of closets for storage of children's coats, books and school materials. There is a separate compartment for each pupil.

Each classroom has a walled-in play area, with doors opening directly to the outside. Doors also open into the main hall.

The floors of the building are of asphalt tile and there is a hot water heating system.

A public address system has been installed throughout the building.

### MANY COMPLEX PROBLEMS

Supt. Montes gave a brief address in which he stressed the discouraging aspects of the work of county superintendent and the many complex problems which faced her. On the brighter side, he stated that the results of the decision to unify the valley schools will have a far reaching influence and the progress made in taking this step would be the reward.

In reply, Mrs. Samelson expressed her gratitude to the teachers for their part in building the county schools and her belief that the people have every right to be proud of the progress of the valley schools under the reorganization plan.

The social side of the meeting had as its hostesses and host, Mrs. Thret, Mrs. Joiner, and I. V. Sanchez. Christmas gifts rotated around the table until the music stopped and each kept the gift he was holding. Refreshments of pumpkin pie, whipped cream and coffee were served.

### REA GRANTS PHONE LOAN TO HONDORUIDOSO VALLEY

The Ruidoso-Hondoro Valley is to receive better telephone service in the near future as a result of a recent loan of \$500,000 by the REA, the News was informed this week.

The loan funds will be used to build 685 miles of new line and install new automatic dial central offices at Hondo, Hollywood, West-Capitan, Mayhill, Cottonwood and Hope.

As a result of the new construction, modern service will be afforded the present subscribers and extended to 533 new without telephone. In addition, the cooperative will have as regular subscribers 27 families now receiving switching service only.

There will be no toll charge for calls between the Hondo, Hollywood and West-Capitan offices.

The completed system will consist of 685 miles of line furnishing modern telephone service to 637 subscribers. It is being designed to meet the needs of all potential subscribers in the operating area.

### Carrizozo Opposed to Football Playoff Plan

The proposed plan of a football playoff between the schools of New Mexico has received some opposition, although it is felt by some authorities that it will still go through, according to Larry Stockton, Carrizozo High School principal. He says that he will probably know one way or the other by January 10.

Most of the dissatisfaction stems from the fact that the North Central schools consider the plan might over-emphasize football. They voted down the idea since they believe that a study made at several states which have dropped this plan shows that football dominates the entire educational program.

"We in Carrizozo voted against having a playoff because we feel that it is the thing we want in New Mexico," Mr. Stockton said this week. "Also, that a handful of larger schools and communities should not dictate policies to the entire state."

"We did vote, however, for the division of schools into conferences."

### Two Critically Injured In Hwy 380 Accident

Three persons were injured late Saturday and early Sunday in two separate auto accidents on Highway 380. They are Mr. and Mrs. Warren Gaston, Capitan, in critical condition at the Ft. Stanton hospital; and Sgt. Robert Hernandez, Holloman Air Force Base, recovering rapidly at the HAFB hospital.

Mr. Gaston, a Captain service station operator, apparently fell asleep at the wheel. His automobile went off the road to the left, crossed back over the highway, and rolled over several times. Sheriff S. M. Ortiz investigated the accident at 4 a. m. Sunday.

The Gastons were still unconscious Monday evening. The accident occurred between Lincoln and Hondo.

Sgt. Hernandez lost control of his vehicle 7 miles east of Carrizozo around midnight Saturday when the car hit a soft shoulder, turning it over several times. He was only slightly injured and was removed to Holloman by a base ambulance.

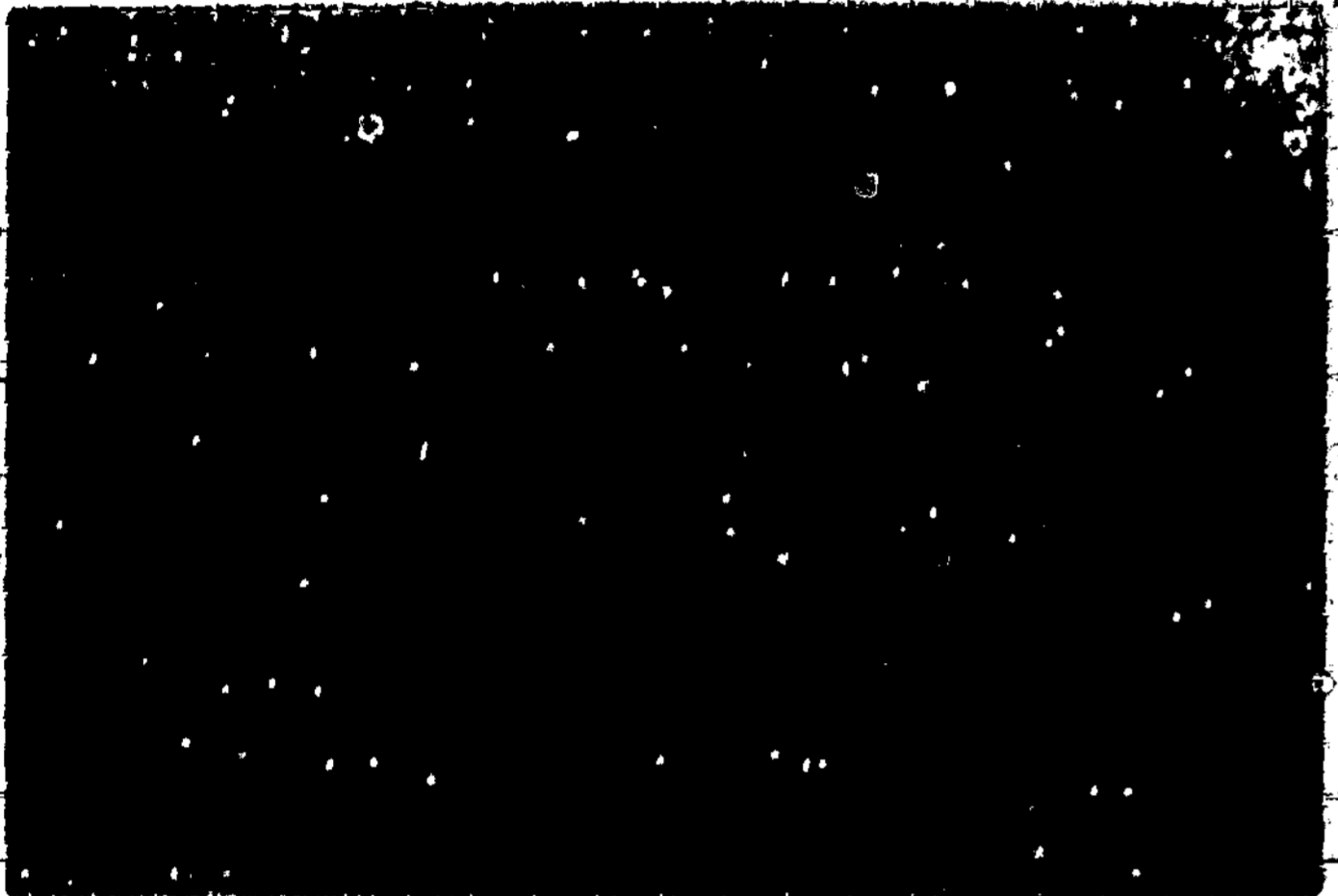

GREATEST POLIO EPIDEMIC

The polio epidemic of 1932 was little different in pattern than other epidemics of recent past. The tragedy was that there was so much of it. It approximately doubled the previous year in the number of persons stricken—and 1931 had been the third worst epidemic year in history. It was nearly 33 percent worse than the epidemic of 1949—the nation's most devastating outbreak, until now.

20 YEARS AGO**

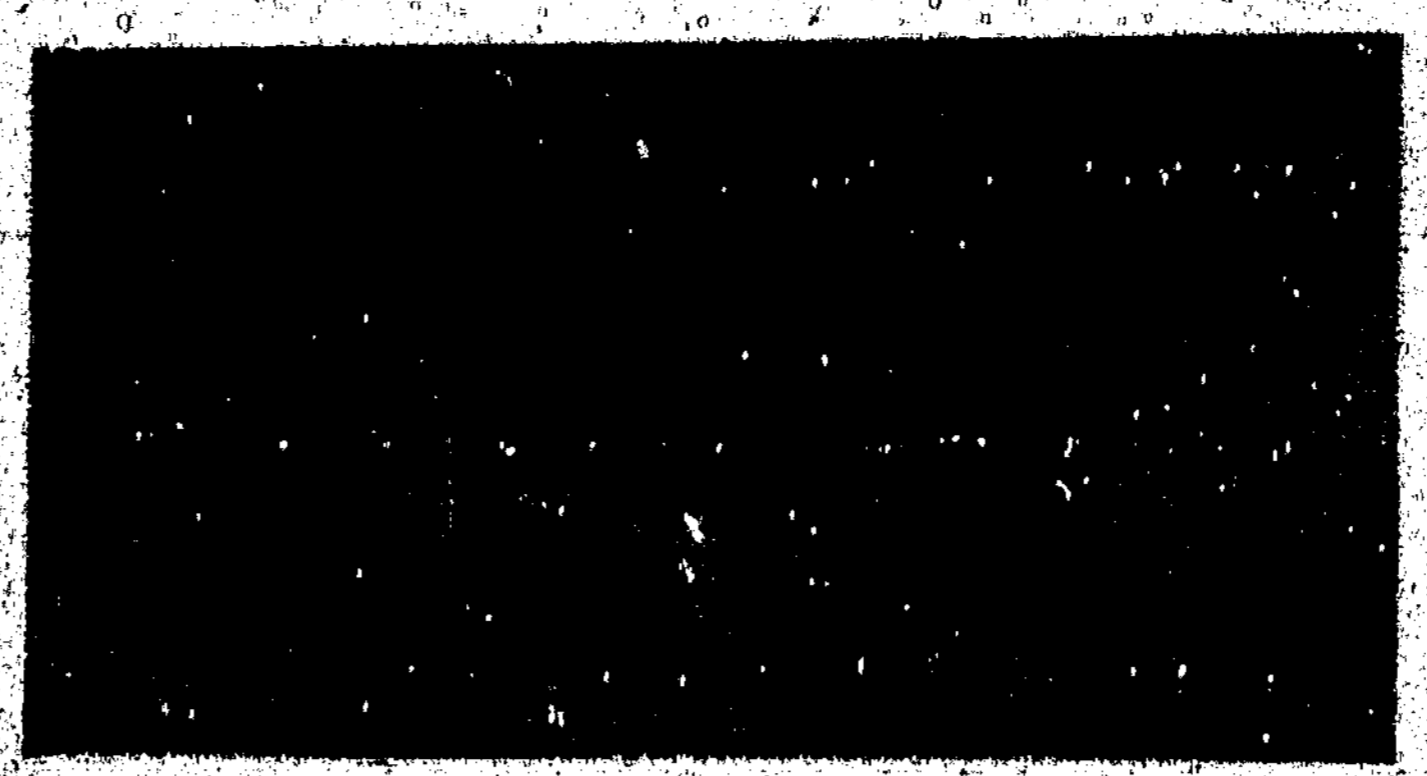
(From the files of the Lincoln County News, December 30, 1932)

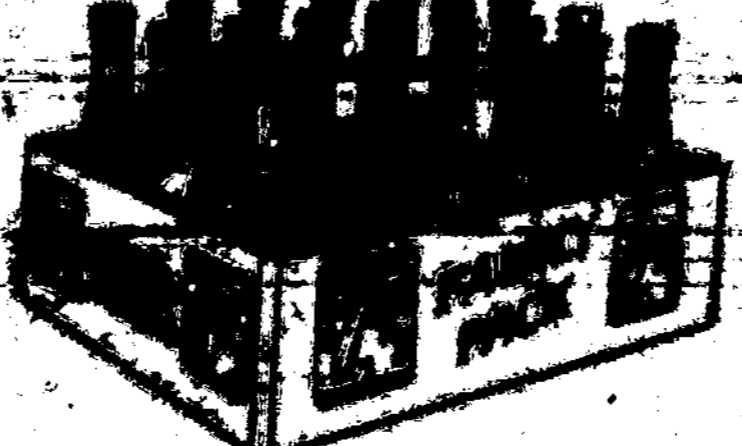

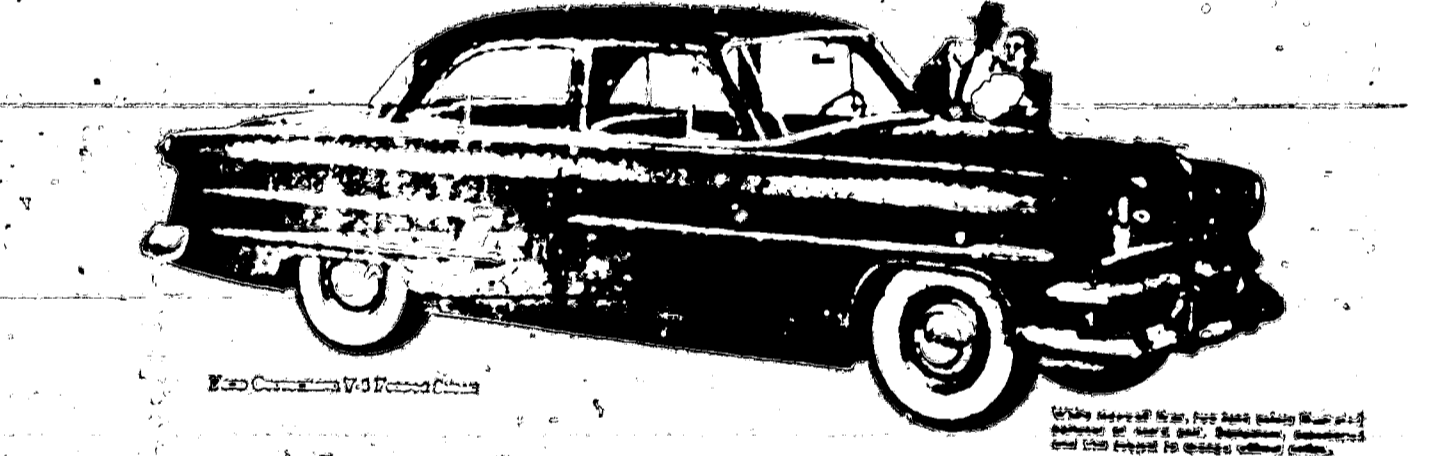

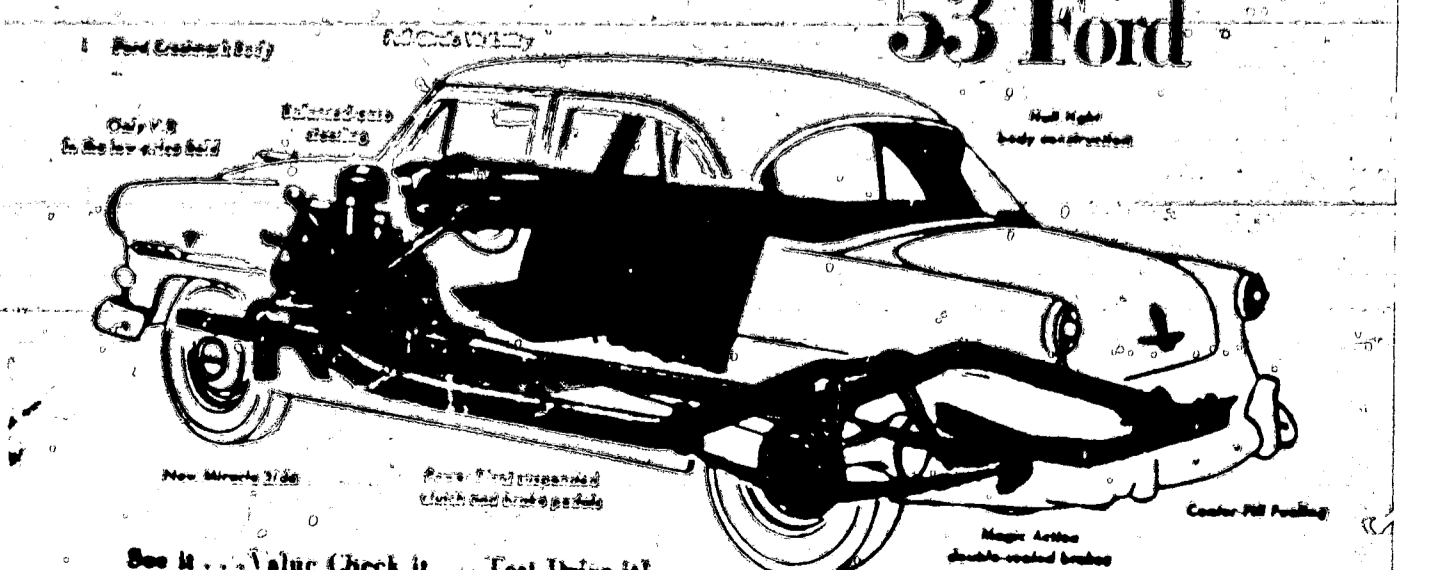
