### Apple Growers Order Equipment, Plan New Building

At a meeting on the Bonnell ranch at Glencoe March 25, of the White Mountain Apple Growers Association, an order for a grading, conditioning and packing machine was placed with Food Machinery and Chemical Corporation, San Jose, Calif. On hand to make arrangements for the purchase and explain the equipment to the group were Harold Sanburg, Albuquerque, sales representative for the firm, and Ivan Ross, San Jose, agricultural manager for the company. Also present at the conference was Harrison Beauchamp, Pecos, Texas, who has been placed in charge of the packing, shipping and marketing for the organization.

Plans were discussed for the construction of a building to house the machinery. It is proposed that the building be located at a central point in the three valleys, with Hondo suggested as the probable site. B. G. Robinson, building contractor, of Artesia, and a rancher in the Hondo Valley, submitted a bid for its construction. Plans call for a building 80 by 140 feet.

The proposed plant will have a capacity of 1,800 bushels per day, which is the production estimated when the orchards are at their peak. The apples will be graded as to size, color and form, and the 10 various grades of apples will be government inspected. The equipment now on order is the type used in all large apple growing centers both in this and foreign countries. It was pointed out the machinery now on order is absolutely necessary to make a first class apple growing region out of the three valleys. With the maturing of many orchards in Lincoln County, marketing has become a serious problem. Harrison told the group the more apples that are brought to the plant the better since he can sell them all if they are properly conditioned, packaged and government inspected.

Bert Pflingsten, Hondo, chairman of the association's executive board, expressed appreciation for the excellent turnout at the meeting, and stated it is his belief the project will be successful and bring a new era of prosperity to the three valleys. The cooperation of all orchard owners was requested and Pflingsten said "I want every person who grows an apple to have a personal interest in this project. We are going to need the support of all the apple growers to make this venture a success."

The association expressed its appreciation to Austin Albert, Carrizozo, county extension agent, who has played a major role in the organizing of the White Mountain group. He has given the members a great deal of time and assistance in the project.

Peter Hurd, San Patricio, well known artist, will design the label for the apples. The name of the organization was selected because it denotes altitude, and explains the locale of the apples which are raised in the mountains.

Mrs. Billie Villet Nicholson, Albuquerque, executive secretary of the New Mexico Society for Crippled Children, addressed the Carrizozo Lions Club at its regular meeting Wednesday night. Mrs. Nicholson spoke on the work and program of the society and how it helps handicapped children and adults in Lincoln County.

The official pointed out the five major projects of the society including the Cerebral Palsy Day School and monthly out-patient clinic; a diagnostic and treatment center for epileptics; speech and hearing rehabilitation clinics in four centers of the state; and the summer camping program for crippled children. The society maintains a wheel chair and crutch bank which provides for the loan of those appliances to persons throughout the state who need them.

R. E. Lemon, local county treasurer for the organization, stated every member of the Carrizozo Lions Club is interested in learning about the service provided by this organization through its annual Easter Seal sale.

### Another 17 Miles Of Highway 54 Scheduled For Early Completion

Roy Shafer, Carrizozo, and Cap Straley, Ancho, accompanied a group of Highway 54 boosters from other New Mexico counties who met with the State Highway Commission last week in Santa Fe. The group included representatives from Alamogordo to Tucumcari.

The Lincoln County delegation reported that Ralph Jones, Albuquerque, commission chairman, informed them 17 miles of the highway starting at a point six miles north of Carrizozo are ready for bids and a contract is expected to be let in the near future. Shafer said construction of the 17 miles will leave a dead end west of Ancho, but they were assured by the highway commission that the balance of the road (about 17 miles additional) will be let in a very short time. The total cost of the 34 miles of construction is estimated at \$1,300,000.

Members of the State Highway Commission were luncheon guests of the Highway 54 group at La Fonda Hotel.

Shafer stated he feels the commission is sincere about wanting to complete the road in the shortest period of time possible, and expressed the opinion the meeting is the most satisfactory one every held with the state group.

A letter from Burton G. Dwyre, Santa Fe, state highway engineer, dated March 21, requesting approval by the county commissioners of resolutions to guarantee right of way on Highway 54, has been received in the Lincoln County clerk's office at Carrizozo. The letter stated copies of advance right-of-way maps will be forwarded. The commissioners are expected to pass on the resolutions at their next meeting on Monday, April 7.

### 3000 Attend Cattlemen Convention

More than 3,000 cattlemen and their families attended the recent convention of the New Mexico Cattle Growers Association in Albuquerque. Termed the most successful convention in the 38-year history of the association, the three-day session was attended by the largest group of cowmen ever to assemble in this state. Ed Herring, Clayton, the organization's new president, succeeds Roy Forehand, Carlsbad. Newly elected vice presidents include Rex Kipp, Lordsburg; E. O. Moore Jr., Carlsbad; George Ellis, Bell Ranch, and Kelsey Presley, Gallup. Horace H. Henning, Albuquerque, was re-elected secretary-treasurer for his 11th consecutive term.

The cattle growers unanimously reaffirmed their stand against any socialistic trend in the U. S. government, and urged the support of government candidates who have indicated by word and deed their purpose to "reverse the current trend toward socialism."

Other resolutions recommended by the cowmen included the adoption of a uniform federal grazing land tenancy act before passage of a bill currently before Congress which would consolidate the management of all public lands under the Department of Agriculture; commended Gov. Edwin L. Mechem for his efforts to "increase the efficiency and reduce the expenses of operating our state government"; opposition of any increase in taxes, either state or national, and complimented the State Tax Commission for its efforts to revise and equalize the basic valuations, assessments and tax structures. The association strongly opposed the transfer of some 90,000 acres in Rio Arriba and San Miguel counties, now under the Farmers Home Administration, to the U. S. Forest Service and proposed instead that the lands be transferred to the state of New Mexico; urged construction of a Coliseum at the State Fair Grounds in Albuquerque; endorsed a bill before Congress that would grant a 3 per cent royalty to owners of land on which the federal government owns the minerals; requested continuing appropriations for predatory animal control by the U. S. Interior Department; and the State Game Department; offered to meet with Game Department officials and sportsmen in an effort to smooth over past differences; and urged continued operation of the rail line between Tucumcari and French.

### Reorganization Of Co. Schools Being Studied

A study is being made of a proposed plan for the reorganization of the county school system. The proposed plan would reorganize the county into districts, decentralize the present county system, and place the schools directly under the control of the local districts. Haskell Smith, Las Cruces county superintendent from Dona Ana County and a member of the State Board of Education, met last Friday night with members of the Lincoln County Board of Education, Mrs. Lorine Samelson, superintendent in Lincoln County, and a large group of interested residents of the Hondo Valley at the Hondo High School. Smith explained the proposed plan and told them how it is working out in Dona Ana County, as well as a number of other New Mexico counties including Lea.

The plan, which was proposed by the State Board of Education, is under consideration and the various districts in Lincoln County will submit their approval or disapproval within the next few weeks. Another meeting is expected to be held prior to the budget hearing April 10.

Members of the Lincoln County Board of Education include T. E. Kelley, Carrizozo, president; Leroy McKnight, Capitan, vice president; Manuel Corona, San Patricio, and J. O. Payne, Capitan, members.

Reports on municipal elections in Lincoln County at press time show three mayors re-elected, two villages with new mayors, and a tie for the post of councilman in another town.

Marvin H. Roberts, local Ford dealer, is Carrizozo's new mayor, polling 218 votes to the 76 votes of his opponent, R. C. Withers. The latter returned to his home recently after being hospitalized for several weeks at the local hospital. Vernon Petty, present mayor, did not seek re-election. Roberts told the News-Outlook Wednesday he appreciates the splendid support given his candidacy, and will work at all times for the best interests of the village and its residents.

Clifton B. Zumwalt and Juan Martinez will fill the two vacancies of trustee for four-year terms. Zumwalt received 200 votes while Martinez polled 183. Candidates Leandro Vega and William H. Nickels for the posts drew 145 and 52 votes, respectively.

Mrs. Gussie Johnson, who had no opposition, was re-elected clerk with 191 votes.

Other election returns in the county are as follows:

Corona—Cleve Brown was re-elected mayor with 33 votes. He had no opposition. Walter M. Pfeiffer and Mrs. Callie C. Franke received 34 and 31 votes, respectively, for the two posts of councilman. Mrs. Eula F. Maya, without opposition, was re-elected clerk with 35 votes, which was the total number cast at Corona.

Capitan—S. E. Grelsen, incumbent Republican mayor, defeated R. E. Aldrich, Republican, 118-32. In that race, Leo Anderson, Democrat, and L. E. Cummins, Republican, tied for the one job of councilman for a two-year term when each one polled 70 votes. The two posts of councilman for four-year terms went to Fletcher Hall Jr. and Hugh Bancroft, who tallied 121 and 114 votes, respectively. S. M. Cozzens, who campaigned for one of the four-year jobs of councilman, drew 42 votes.

Green Tree—Alton Gray received 92 votes for mayor to his opponent's, J. C. Harris, 53. The vote for trustees tallied: Sam Sanchez 92, W. R. Long 91, A. E. Eckart 90, J. G. Harris 60, C. E. Staples and Mr. Gazaway, 57 votes each. For clerk, Mary Basinger drew 69 while her opponent, Dee Simpson, received 61 votes. The bond issue vote was 53 against and 53 for.

Ruidoso—W. D. Ratliff re-elected mayor with 214 votes while Mr. Swearingin, his opposition, received 171. Hedgecock and Brown took over the posts of trustee with 235 and 195 votes, respectively. Morgan received 196 votes while Phillips drew 153. Culver was named village clerk with 157 votes as his opponents, Smith and Graham, tallied 107 and 57, respectively.

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**Australian Youth Seeks Information On 'The Kid'**

The following letter written by young Barry Patterson of the "land down under" (Australia), in which he requested information about Billy the Kid, famous resident of Lincoln County in years gone by, was received recently by Carrizozo's mayor, Vernon Petty. Mayor Petty turned the letter over to Mrs. Caroline Davis, curator at the museum in Lincoln, who sent the lad the desired data. Mrs. Davis said the youth's request is typical of hundreds received at the Old Courthouse over a year's period, and that each one is answered by sending a pamphlet which gives a brief history of the area and additional information if necessary. Although a large expenditure of time and money is involved, the curator reported, it is believed that careful attention to such inquiries is an important factor in the dissemination of accurate information, which the Lincoln County Memorial Commission considers in its principal duty.

Dear Sir:  
No doubt you will think it a bit silly of me sending a letter over five thousand miles to you just to ask you this, but like thousands of other youngsters I am very, very interested in a man who lived in your town about 72 years ago. His name was William Bonney, or Billy the Kid, as he was known. The few facts that I have read about him was that he lived in your town and that he carried his name on one of the buildings in the town. I belong to a club of boys here, a sort of fraternity club, and we are having a competition. We have to state in our opinions who was the greatest outlaw in America's old west and we have to get as many facts about them as possible. In my opinion, Billy the Kid was the greatest ever, so I was wondering if you could get me the true facts such as: Did he really carve his name on one of your buildings, and how did he die, and who killed him, and could you tell me how old he was when he died, and could you give me some description of him? I know that I am asking a lot of you, but I do want to know about him, otherwise I would not have taken the liberty of writing to you. Believe me, well, sir, I will close now, hoping very much that you will help me.



### Cattlemen Hold Most Successful Convention In 38-Year History

Director of the Tax Foundation, New York City and Washington, D. C., told the convention that in 1951 the American people paid \$335 per capita for food and \$575 for all government. He warned against further taxation, saying the nation's economy cannot survive continued excessive taxing and spending, and that government expenditures can and should be cut.

Dr. George H. Hart, Davis, Calif., head of the school of veterinary medicine at University of California, discussed range improvement progress in California through burning undesirable brush. Contrary to common belief, said Dr. Hart, brush and trees are not as effective in controlling soil erosion as is grass. He related that experience in California has proved conclusively countless acres of useless brush land can be reclaimed and turned into productive range land through brush burning.

Governor Howard W. Rye of Arizona warned "politics has become an unsavory thing. Its intolerance is a festering cancerous sore on the body politic that must be eradicated." New Mexico's Governor Edwin L. Mechem was another guest speaker on the program.

George F. Ellis, one of the newly elected vice presidents, was named "New Mexico Livestock Man of the Year" in the first selection of a person for outstanding contributions to the state's livestock industry.

The New Mexico Hereford Association met in annual session just prior to the opening session of the cattle growers' conclave. E. N. Jeffers, Springer, was re-elected president, while Bert C. Roy, Rogers, and Roy R. Largent, Grenville, were re-elected vice presidents. Parley Jensen, Albuquerque, was again chosen for the group's secretary-treasurer. Roy Forehand, Carlsbad, and Horace Bounds, Santa Rita, were named as new directors for three-year terms.

Albuquerque was selected as the site for the next annual conclave with Portales hosting the next quarterly conference.

Other groups meeting in the three-day period were State Fair Commission; New Mexico Boys Ranch; New Mexico Quarter Horse Association; New Mexico Palomino Exhibitors Association; New Mexico Junior Cattle Growers Association; Taxpayers Association of New Mexico; Policy Committee of New Mexico Wool Growers Association; New Mexico Sheep Sanitary Board; New Mexico Cattle Sanitary Board; and Albuquerque Production Credit Association.

### REA Pays \$27,266.75 In Delinquent Principal

At a meeting in Washington, D. C., on March 31, in the office of the administrator of REA, W. C. Cooper, Alamogordo, manager of the Otero County Electric Cooperative, Inc., gave Biggs Sheppard, assistant REA administrator, a check for \$27,266.75 in full of the delinquent principal amount which has been owed by the cooperative. Others attending the meeting included F. E. Hamlin, management section, and Ernest Stefan, Richard Bell and R. P. Richter of the A-L section.

The Otero County group was organized and incorporated just prior to World War II and reported that due to wartime restrictions, its expansion program was delayed which was the prime reason for the delinquent debt. The cooperative said a debt of \$48,000 was accumulated by Jan. 1, 1951, but that approximately \$21,000 was paid during that year, leaving the balance which has just been retired. Cooper reported that during the past two years members of the cooperative and board of trustees have worked hard to bring about a change in the financial position of the group without which the debt could not have been cleared in this period of time.

Original incorporators of the group were Ray Daniels, L. A. Hendricks, John J. Merston, Charles Bell, Mrs. Ora Swope, J. M. Walker, Bryan Ruryan, M. D. Brantley and Mrs. A. L. Clevé. The cooperative now services between 500 and 600 miles of electric lines serving approximately 1,500 consumers.

The most recent development by the cooperative, according to Cooper, is the irrigation service rendered in the basin country north and south of Alamogordo. Twenty-two farms are receiving irrigation service at present, and it is expected many more will ultimately have the advantage of such electric service.

### City Council Hold Brief Session On Tuesday

Trustees of the village of Carrizozo met in brief session Tuesday to take up routine matters of business. Several building permits and applications for licenses were approved as were the bills for operation of the village.

George L. Zimmerman, attorney for S. C. Snow, local building contractor, submitted a plot of the building project, now underway by Snow, for the approval of council. The contractor proposes to give all alleys and streets in the project to the village. It was pointed out a discrepancy apparently exists in the location of an alley in the proposed plot as against the map on file with the village. Both surveys were made by the same person and since it appears to be only a technical discrepancy, the trustees agreed to approve the plot subject to the surveyor's recheck.

Zimmerman also requested the council to approve Mayor Vernon Petty's acceptance of a summons in conjunction with real estate against which the village holds a lien for paying taxes. However, the statute of limitations has outlawed the village's claim, and the signing of the disclaimer of claim is merely a technicality, the attorney explained, in the suit to quiet title.

The trustees were also told at Tuesday night's meeting the village's permit to purchase Class A material in conjunction with the proposed installation of the new motors expired this week. Council decided to ask for an extension of time since no further information has been received from the engineering firm of Ashley G. Classen and Associates, El Paso, concerning the proposed refinancing agreement with the present bonding company.
