Kefauver To Visit Duke City Sunday

Estes Kefauver, candidate for the Democratic nomination for president, will meet New Mexico's Democratic leaders in Albuquerque on Sunday, May 25. Calvin Horn, permanent chairman of New Mexico's Estes Kefauver for President Committee announced this week.

Senator Kefauver, nationally famous for his outstanding investigation and report on nationwide crime, will fly into Albuquerque Sunday noon and will be met by Horn and other Democratic leaders.

While in Albuquerque, Senator Kefauver will speak at a rally starting at 3 P. M. at the University of New Mexico's Carlisle Gymnasium; hold a press conference at 5 P. M. at the Alvarado Hotel; and meet Democratic leaders at a reception from 6 to 7 P. M. also at the Alvarado.

Plans are being made by the New Mexico Kefauver group for a strong drive to secure New Mexico's Democratic delegation to the national convention for the Tennessee senator.

Senator Kefauver served in the U. S. House of Representatives prior to his election as U. S. senator from Tennessee. Kefauver's record in Congress is highlighted by his nationwide crime investigation a year ago.

Capitan American Legion To Sell Poppies

Distribution of the crepe paper poppy flowers in Capitan tomorrow (Saturday) will be under the supervision of Mrs. Tom Utterback, poppy chairman of the James A. Hipp American Legion Auxiliary unit.

Women and girls, unpaid volunteers, of the Capitan Legion Auxiliary will be on the streets from early morning with baskets of the crepe paper poppies made by disabled veterans at Fort Day, and replicas of the famous poppies of Flanders Fields which took root and bloomed in the raw earth of the battle graves in Europe during World War I to provide nature's floral tribute to the heroic dead. Since that time, the crepe paper poppies have been worn annually throughout the English speaking world as a symbol of remembrance and to raise funds for the aid of disabled veterans and children of veterans. 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Trout Season Opens May 25; Fishing "Fair"

The 1952 trout season opens at 3:51 A. M. Sunday, May 25. Fred Thompson, director of fisheries, estimates early fishing as "fair" barring any sudden change in weather. Streams are generally running clear although high water can be expected near the mountains. The trout season will continue until Oct. 31. Fishing hours are one hour before sunrise until one hour after sunset.

For a sunrise-sunset timetable, see the back page of the 1952 "Digest of Hunting and Fishing Laws and Regulations." Bag and possession limit remains at 15 fish, or eight pounds and one fish.

Cousin Of Mrs. Roselle Wins Pulitzer Prize

Louis La Crosse, St. Louis, editor and vice president of the Globe Democrat, and a cousin of Mrs. A. E. Roselle, Carrizozo, was recently awarded a Pulitzer prize for his editorial entitled "The Low Estate of Public Morals," which appeared in his paper Aug. 6, 1951.

The editorial reflected La Crosse' indignation at corruption and low standards of honesty and integrity in American public life. The discharge of 90 West Point cadets accused of cheating on examinations was the inspiration for the editorial which developed into sharp criticism of what La Crosse termed "distorted attitude toward old-fashioned honesty and integrity that pertains not only in our schools but in America's social and political life."

"The more I thought of it," he recalls, "the more indignant I became."

The 62-year-old writer, a veteran in his field, was born in Erie, Pa., but broke into the newspaper field as a cub reporter on the Kansas, a publication of the University of Kansas, where he received a bachelor of arts degree in 1912. After a brief residence in California, he returned to the Middle West and joined the staff of the Kansas City Star.

Subsequently, he worked briefly for the Parsons, Kan., Sun before joining the Associated Press. Since the early 1920's he has been in St. Louis, first as a reporter and feature writer and now vice president of the Globe Democrat. La Crosse has a staff of five writers to assist in preparing the daily editorial page of that paper.

Last Rites For L. W. Harmon Held Monday

A resident of New Mexico since 1897, Leslie Walton Harmon, 77, Carrizozo, succumbed late Saturday afternoon (May 17) at the home of his son, Roy Harmon, after a long illness. Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at the Carrizozo Trinity Methodist Church with Rev. R. E. Dickerson officiating. Mrs. F. O. Brown and Mrs. Marlan Schlarb, accompanied at the piano by Mrs. F. E. Kelley, sang "Rock of Ages." Pallbearers were Roy Harmon, R. L. Sherrill, Lee Carl, Albert Roberts, Elmer Eaker and Pete Johnson, with interment at White Oaks Cemetery.

Surviving are a son, Roy, Carrizozo; three daughters, Mrs. Earl (Dixie) Reeves, Springtown, Tex.; Mrs. Ross (Mabel) Martin, Big Spring, Texas, and Mrs. Jack (Daisie) Graves, Carlsbad, and 10 grandchildren.

The deceased, a rancher for many years, was born August 6, 1874, at Paris, Texas, the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Trox Harmon. He came to New Mexico in 1897 to work for the well known Block ranch and lived in Roswell for several years. In 1904, he married Miss Ollie Fewell of Texas Park near White Oaks, and the couple lived on a ranch there until moving to White Oaks in 1914. They subsequently established a home in Carrizozo in 1923. Mrs. Harmon preceded her husband in death a number of years ago.

After retiring from ranching, the late Mr. Harmon operated a livestock commission business here and during World War II, was a guard at the prisoner of war camp at Fort Stanton. An incident of the deceased's personal integrity is related which concerned a business transaction handled by Mr. Harmon in which he refused to agree to an alleged price hike after the matter had reportedly been settled. As a result, he was subsequently given other business by the party who was impressed with his honesty.

Spring Horse Fair To Be Held At Fair Grounds

The first annual Spring Horse Fair is scheduled to be held at the New Mexico State Fair Grounds, Albuquerque, June 13-15. All major light or riding breeds will compete in halter, performance and special classes for the \$5,000 offered in cash premiums. The fair is approved by the American Quarter Horse Association, Palomino Horse Breeders of America, Inc. and the American Horse Show Association. All classes are officially licensed and approved by the respective association.

A special attraction will be an open Cutting Horse contest approved by the National Cutting Horse Association. A purse of \$500 with entry fees added is offered in that event. In addition to the \$5,000 in cash premiums, special trophies and ribbons will be offered in each class.

Leon H. Harms, secretary-manager of the New Mexico State Fair, pointed out the horse fair will be the first in New Mexico to offer complete and official classes for American Saddle Breeds, Tennessee Walkers, Hunters, Jumpers, Morgans, Appaloosas, Arabs, Half-Arabs, Quarter Horses and Palominos in one big show.

The fair starts June 13 with a special junior horse show for youngsters from tiny tots to 17 years of age. All junior classes will be judged only on horsemanship with trophies presented to each first place winner and rosettes to fifth place.

New Mexico Tops In Support Of Education

General recognition is given that New Mexico stands at the "head of the class" in its support of education in relation to the income of its people.

A comparison made recently by the New Mexico Taxpayers Association between Utah and New Mexico indicates the former state has 688,862 population while the latter has 681,187. Utah's assessed property valuation is \$903,031,056 with New Mexico's set at \$642,889,694. Utah has been ranked as having the most efficiently administered educational system among all the states. In 1950-51 Utah had 5,565 teachers, principals and supervisors, while this state had 5,838. Average daily attendance in Utah was 147,819 and 126,844 in New Mexico. The ratio of students to teachers, principals and supervisors was 28.5 in Utah and 21.7 in New Mexico. Total expenditures during year 1950-51 were \$37,100,756 in Utah, and \$35,810,493 in New Mexico with the per capita expenditures in average daily attendance \$250 in Utah and \$280 in New Mexico.

The average salary for principals, supervisors and teachers was \$3,111 in Utah and \$3,390 in this state. According to a release from the Research Division of the National Education Association in November, 1951, New Mexico ranks 14th among all the states as to average salary for teachers, principals and supervisors in 1950-51. During the current year, the state will probably rank with the dozen states paying the highest salaries. Those states are: Arizona, California, Connecticut, Delaware, Illinois, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, New Jersey, New York, Oregon and Washington.

Better than 83 per cent of the state's teachers, principals and supervisors had college degrees representing four years of training beyond the high school courses. Practically all of the other teachers had two or three years of college courses. Ninety-two per cent of principals, supervisors and teachers in municipal schools and 61 per cent in rural schools had college degrees.

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



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

PROPOSED NEW BOYS RANCH BUILDING



The above sketch is the artist's conception of a new building to be constructed on the New Mexico Boys Ranch at La Joya, 17 miles south of Belen on the east side of the Rio Grande River at U. S. Highway 60. The ranch contains 850 acres of irrigable land under ditch, and 2,200 acres of grassland. The ranch is operating at full capacity and funds are needed to provide more dormitory space and other necessary buildings, as well as for the drilling of two additional wells to irrigate idle land that can produce paying crops. It is necessary to complete the wells before the embargo against drilling more water wells in the Middle Rio Grande goes into effect.

New Mexico Boys Ranch was founded to combat juvenile delinquency in the belief that most wayward boys are either homeless or victims of unfit surroundings and that by placing such boys in the atmosphere of an average ranch-type home, they can grow and develop under normal conditions into valuable citizens. At present, there is a waiting list of 30 boys and officials of the admission board are hopeful facilities can be provided for them before it is too late and they may possibly wander into delinquency, become wards of the state, or perhaps be sent to correctional institutions because of associations brought about by lack of proper home conditions.





Letter to Editor

Editor, News-Outlook: I read the very interesting letter in your paper of last week from Herbert J. Shear Jr. of Alamogordo. Mr. Shear makes the statement that he was only taking pictures of the school house. That's odd, for when the lady whom he called "Mrs. Herbert Fulmer" (there is no such person in White Oaks) went down to the school house she found that he had removed a number of things from the shelves and was in the process of packing them in a box. He forgot to tell how insultingly he talked to this lady.

The people of White Oaks are getting just a little bit "fed up" with outsiders coming into their town and taking away just anything that may happen to strike their fancy. Some have even come in trucks and removed furniture and antiques. Just a short time before Mr. Shear's visit some other people had been down at the school house, "just to eat their lunch," they said. They, too, packed a box with dishes and other things that definitely did not belong to them and when they were apprehended hid the things on the road between Carrizozo and White Oaks. That cost them a fine, too.

I called Mr. Shear on the telephone and he readily admitted what he had done. I told him that I had a complaint signed by one of the members of the Ladies Aid of White Oaks, and the offense charged. I asked him if he would come in voluntarily and he said he would. After giving Mr. Shear a break I "back-fired" on me. I should have taken care of this matter according to law. He should have been arrested, lodged in jail in Alamogordo, transported from Alamogordo to Carrizozo and lodged in jail here, and let him pay all the costs. I assure him that it would have been much more than \$17.

As to checking the clerk in my office about the charge against him, she never puts out any information of that kind without instructions from me. Don't fool yourself, Mr. Shear, that I had to hunt up a charge against you after you got up here, your case had been discussed with the members of the "Ladies Aid of White Oaks" very thoroughly and they had given me to understand that they did not want to be too hard on anybody but that they were very tired of outsiders coming in up there and going in and out of the houses and ransacking the places. Are you in the habit, Mr. Shear, of entering just any house that is unoccupied? That seems to be a habit with some of the people. Several of them have done that at White Oaks and as far as the people there are concerned they don't care about having people with these habits come up there. It is a good thing, Mr. Shear, that you have warned the people there what to expect from the White Oaks community because if it continues somebody will be made an example of and they will not get off as lightly as you did.

I did think I would try to explain to Mr. Shear something of the law and politics in our county, but apparently it would just be a waste of time and effort. It takes very little time and effort to trace any car license number and it may be well to say that every car that comes in to White Oaks will most certainly have the license number taken, and any further depredations in that community, or any other in my county, will be prosecuted if I have my way.
