J. W. Elliott Dies After Short Illness

Carrizozoans and other Lincoln County residents were shocked to learn of the sudden and unexpected death of John William (Bill) Elliott, 44, of this village which occurred in his sleep about 3:30 A. M. Wednesday morning at the local hospital. The cause of the death of Mr. Elliott, who entered the hospital May 23, is attributed to bleeding ulcers and complications. His death came as a sudden and unexpected shock to friends and relatives, according to his father, Daniel S. Elliott, Carrizozo, who stated his son appeared to be feeling well at the close of the hospital's visiting hours Tuesday night, and that he had talked to the nurse about midnight.

Funeral services will be held Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock in the Carrizozo Trinity Methodist Church with Rev. C. E. Burch officiating. Interment will be at Alamogordo. Clarence Shaw, of the T. E. Kelley Mortuary here is in charge of funeral arrangements. Pallbearers are Marvin Burton, Jimmie Duncan, Fred Current, Joe West Sr., Eddie Fitzpatrick, all of Carrizozo, and Dink Myers, Tulare. Mrs. Mary Burns is preparing the song service.

The Carrizozo man, in addition to his father, is survived by two brothers, Daniel S. Elliott Jr., Corydon, Pa.; Eugene Elliott, Roswell; three sisters, Mrs. Charlotte (Goldman) of Los Angeles, Mrs. Margaret Stiemmer, Roswell, and nine nieces and nephews.

The deceased, employed by the local municipal power plant at the time of his death, was born in Carrizozo May 9, 1908. He attended local schools and was a graduate of Carrizozo High School. Except for brief periods of residence in Alamogordo and Dawson, he had made his home in this village. The Carrizozo man was a veteran of World War II, having enlisted in the early part of 1942. He served in Africa and Italy until about October, 1945, when he received an honorable discharge with a rating of sergeant first class. He was a member of the Carrizozo American Legion, and is believed to have belonged to a VFW organization.

Daniel S. Elliott Jr. is expected to arrive today (Friday) from Pennsylvania, and Mrs. O'Belmito and Mrs. Goldman will probably fly here from Los Angeles.

Carrizozo Youth Wins "Good Scout" Award

Joe Nowell, member of Carrizozo Boy Scout Troop No. 53, was presented with a "Good Scout" award at the annual camporee held May 17 at Bonito Dam. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Burley Nowell, Carrizozo. The 14 members of the local Scout troop attending the camporee represented the troop's three patrols.

Each of the three patrols won a first place award, and the troop in its entirety took second place for its camping. The Carrizozo Scouts report their troop had more members attending the camporee than any of the other troops represented. The local Scouts who camped at Bonito Dam declared the camporee a great success despite the rough weather.

Horton Murder Trial Scheduled June 17

June 9 is the opening date set for hearing a number of civil and criminal cases during a special term of District Court before Judge E. T. Hensley Jr., Portales, and Judge George Harris, Roswell.

The case of Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Horton, 29, charged with the April 20 slaying of her husband, Manuel Horton, in their home at Tinnie will come to trial June 17.

June 18 is the date set for the trial of Bill McTeigue, Hondo, accused of assault with intent to commit murder on charges filed by Rose Crane, Tinnie. The alleged assault is reported to have occurred on the night of May 6 between Hondo and Tinnie.

Both cases are scheduled to be heard by Judge Hensley.

Work Started On Hwy. 54

Employees of Brown Bros. Construction Company, Albuquerque, arrived here last week to start construction of 17 1/2 miles of Highway 54 between Carrizozo and Corona. It is expected that a contract on the remaining unpaved portion of approximately the same number of miles, which remains the only unpaved portion of the highway across the several states through which it passes, will be let sometime after July 1.

Residents of Lincoln County have looked forward to this construction within the county over a lengthy period of years, and have been ardent boosters of the National Highway 54 Association. The route, the shortest between Chicago and the West Coast, is a mild all-year one, and tourist bureaus and automobile clubs are predicting a considerable step up in travel over this road in the months to come.

The road in states outside New Mexico is completely paved and is now practically completed within the state. In view of the fact that New Mexico has for years been losing tourist travel to other states because of the condition of this highway, it is believed that the State Highway Department will not long delay final construction of the few remaining miles of unpaved road.

Not only has the state lost valuable tourist dollars as a result of the rough road which is impassable at times, but also, New Mexicans residing within its area have suffered economic loss. Loss of life has been reported during flash floods and even persons who required hospitalization have been delayed in reaching the hospital here because of the road's condition. Many families have hesitated to start out with relatives who were ill for fear of getting mired in the mud during bad weather and adding to the patient's suffering. With the many installations throughout the state, the road is fast becoming one of the strategic military highways in New Mexico. The State Highway Commission was informed of that factor at a meeting in Santa Fe more than a year ago. In view of all this, it is little wonder that the arrival of the crew to start construction on Highway 54 has been heralded with delight by Lincoln County residents. To them it means the beginning of a new era of growth and future prosperity.

The Loretto students have been doing considerable playing and singing for patients at the various El Paso hospitals.


To Decorate Graves

The first military family to live here, Captain White is in charge of the Oscura installation.

The Whites were previously stationed at Fort Bragg, N. C., where the captain was sent following four years service in the Far East. Mrs. White and their son, Bobby, joined him on Okinawa in 1948. They describe the typhoons which occur frequently on that island as rugged with wind velocity reaching as much as 175 miles an hour. They were fortunate in suffering no injury or property damage from the storms, but said that others on the island did not fare so well and commented on the homes destroyed during these typhoons.

Captain and Mrs. White are natives of Peoria, Ill., where they attended school and were married Sept. 2, 1939. Mrs. White is the former Miss Eula Clark, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D. E. Clark. The captain is the son of Mr. and Mrs. H. E. White and has been in the U. S. Army for the past 10 years, enlisting in 1942. He went overseas in 1946.

While at Fort Bragg, he was in charge of radar repair.

The State Highway Commission last Friday approved this county's program of road construction, in its entirety, as set up by the Lincoln County Land Use Planning Committee, a non-partisan group. The county's road priority schedule, the first to be completed since the land use program was reactivated by the Highway Department 18 months ago, was examined by department engineers and termed "excellent."

Under the land use planning survey, committees of local residents prepare road improvement priority lists for their counties which cover anticipated needs for the next 10 or 15 years. The studies and schedules are based on factors of population, traffic and numerous other points, and allocation of funds for road construction is granted in accordance with the approved recommendations of the committees and in the order of priorities outlined. The four counties that completed their schedules prior to the reactivation of the land use survey program are San Juan, Santa Fe, Hidalgo and Eddy. Austin Albert, Lincoln County extension agent who directed this county's land program and deserves much credit for his part in the work, also directed the program in San Juan County when he was with the extension service there.

The program in this county was commenced back in October, 1951, when C. O. Erwin, Santa Fe, now the state highway engineer but at that time engineer of secondary highways in New Mexico, and L. Z. Rowe, Las Cruces, economist for the State Extension Service, explained the workings of the plan to the county commissioners. Basic maps were prepared showing the present highway systems and available soils information. The county was divided into 13 areas based on traffic flow divisions and other natural or economic divisions. After a series of meetings with representatives of the 13 areas, during which residents of the various areas were interviewed, the group met again on March 7 of this year to present summaries of land use for the roads in their communities. On the basis of that information, the group set up

Help Limit Federal Taxes

What can the individual taxpayer do to limit federal spending? The answer is simple. Write to Senators Dennis Chavez and Clinton P. Anderson, and to Representatives John J. Dempsey and A. M. Fernandez, to support H. R. 371, and H. R. 7318. The first (H. R. 371), limits federal spending to \$71 billion, which is the estimated revenue available. President Truman has recommended \$85.4 billion. The second (H. R. 7318) puts the pay-as-you-go policy expressed in H. R. 371 into permanent statutory form, under which the federal government could spend only what it receives and no more, except during a national emergency. That is like our so-called Bateman Law in New Mexico. Then urge Representatives Dempsey and Fernandez to support a bill sponsored by Senator McClellan (S913) creating a joint committee on budget, which would help Congress regain control over federal expenditures. This bill has passed the Senate by an overwhelming majority, and it will pass the House if taxpayers will write lots of letters to their representatives, urging them to support these bills. Remember these three bills, H. R. 371, H. R. 7318 and S. 913.—New Mexico Tax Bulletin.

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

USDA Revises Peach Standards June 15

Revised U. S. standards for fresh peaches will go into effect June 15, the U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced. The revised standards will replace those in effect since 1933.

Principal changes in the revised standards include a requirement that any variety of peaches of fancy grade show one-third of the surface covered with pink, blushed or red color; 50 per cent of the peaches in the U. S. Extra No. 1 grade show not less than one-fourth of the surface covered with pink, blushed or red color; the addition of a tolerance of 15 per cent for over-size; amendment of the "application of tolerance statement" to make the tolerances applicable to peaches packed in consumer packages; rewording of "standard pack" requirements to make them applicable to new types of packages and the latest packing practices; and a revision of the definition of "well-formed."

Fish and Game Notes

The Department of Fish and Game established checking stations on each road leading from Conchas Dam recently for intensive law enforcement and fish studies investigation of conditions in that area. Ray Bell, chief field warden and former Lincoln County game warden, was in charge. Because of adverse weather, the expected record crowd did not materialize, but the checkers were kept more than busy by the throngs who swarmed to the dam on Sunday during the checking period for the excellent crapple fishing. Of the 371 cars passing through the stations on that day, 136 vehicles were from out of state. The total catch came to 3,121 crapple, 65 bass; 187 bluegill; 173 catfish, and 66 pike, and 285 fishermen volunteered their fish for the biologists' inspection.

The fieldmen found a score of flagrant law violations which were turned over to the local district warden. The worst offense involved four non-residents who were discovered fishing at night with artificial light and live bait from the deck of their cabin cruiser. Arresting officers found 55 crapple, three bass, and a catfish on board. Fines and costs for the party totaled \$340.

priorities for the federal aid secondary system, other state roads, and local roads. The entire plan was summarized by Albert for submission to the county commissioners who approved it on April 14.

The survey indicated that Lincoln County has an approximate land area of 3,109,760 acres. The agriculture census of 1950 reported the agricultural production of the county as: sheep 112,550; cattle, 30,031; fruit, approximately 100,000 bushels; dry land beans about 2,000 cwt., and a variety of field crops. In addition to the agriculture, the tourist business is of economic importance in the county. The Ruidoso and Pine Lodge area have been developed to a great extent as mountain summer resorts, sometimes serving as many as 25,000 tourists during the summer months.

Committee members who cooperated wholeheartedly and worked so harmoniously to achieve a road program geared to the most urgent needs in Lincoln County are: Charles Jones, Encino and Capitán; George Shanks, Lon; John Cooper, Arabela; E. L. Luck, Angus-Ruidoso-Alto; Walton Wilson, Ancho; Guy Dabney, Nogal; Archie Perkins, Corona; Edward Penfield, Lincoln; Mrs. Sydney Bonnell, Glencoe; Ed Nelson, Peacho-Tinnie; Albert Snow, White Oaks; Virgil Jones, Angus-Capitán, and William Nickels, Ocuca.

The road program in its order of priority is: 1 1/4 miles Alamo Crossing; 1 mile Corona north to county line; Tinnie-Arabela; Ruidoso Airport to Angus; Angus to Junction FAS 24 and U. S. 380; Angus to Capitán; White-Oaks to Junction U. S. 54 and county line west.
