Clubwomen Join State Federation

The Carrizozo Woman's Club has been approved for membership by the State Federation of Women's Clubs, and new by-laws were endorsed by the local group at its September meeting.

Mrs. Marjory Burns, press reporter, announced the district conference will be held in Ruidoso on Oct. 11 with the Women's Clubs from that village and Glendale entertaining the delegates and visitors. The two delegates from Carrizozo chosen to represent this village at the meeting are Mrs. C. A. Snow, president, and Mrs. Lewis Farris, alternate.

Other delegates are Mrs. R. E. Lemon and Mrs. Roy Shaffer. All club members are eligible to attend the convocation and membership in the local group now grants the privilege of visiting a federated woman's club in any state.

Mrs. J. P. Turner was in charge of the program, the theme of which was "Past Presidents' Day." Past presidents at the meeting and their years of office included Mrs. J. P. Turner, 1929; Mrs. C. A. Snow, 1931; Mrs. Clifford B. Zumwalt, 1932; Mrs. R. M. Shaffer, 1929, and Mrs. Lewis Farris, 1931.

Mrs. Farris, reading a federated club paper, gave the definition of a parliamentarian. Mrs. Shaffer and her sister, Miss Anna Gallacher, played a novelty arrangement of "Sheepskin Blues."

Capitan FFA Sells First Steer For \$365

Clifton Keith, a member of the Capitan Chapter of Future Farmers of America, this week sold the first steer ever fattened by an FFA member in this county to Hollis Cummins, Capitan, and Truman A. Spencer Jr. of Carrizozo. The 900-pound animal brought \$365.

The Capitan youth bought the steer earlier in the year from Herbert Lowery, owner of the farm and ranch where Keith's father is foreman five miles south of Capitan.

Selling the animal did not leave Keith without a project. He still has a nice ewe lamb on feed and 10 pigs. With profits from the steer, Clifton plans to prepare his other projects for market. He has also selected a registered bull calf which he plans to buy and raise for show purposes.

Last spring four members of the Capitan Chapter purchased two gilts (female pigs) from the Artesia FFA Chapter at a cost of \$25 each. The chapter raised the purchase price by gathering and selling scrap iron. The gilts were given to Edward Hall and Clifton Keith who initiated the "gift chain." That is, when the gilts farrowed and raised litters to 9 weeks of age, they would give one of the young females to another member of the Capitan FFA who in turn would keep her until she farrowed and then give another away to keep the chain in motion.

The original sows have farrowed and Hall has seven pigs now 4 weeks of age; Keith has nine about 5 weeks old. Hall will give a gilt to Marvin Morris in about five weeks and Keith is to give one to Cipriano Griego. Morris and Griego have their pens and equipment ready for the gilts.

A. J. Bivens, Capitan teacher, is the group's leader.

Ike Wingfield Seeks Commissioner Post

Ike N. Wingfield, Ruidoso, Democratic candidate for Lincoln County commissioner, District 3, has lived on the Ruidoso since his birth at the Old Dolan Mill in 1887.

He is the son of the late Charles W. Wingfield, pioneer settler in Ruidoso, who was county assessor in 1890 and subsequently elected to the office of county commissioner, holding the latter post until his death in 1910.

The candidate from Ruidoso married the former Miss Lulu Robinson, also of that village, in 1911, and the couple have two daughters, Mrs. Jim Hale, Ruidoso, and Mrs. Jack Smith of California. A son, Leslie Wingfield, died in 1931 following an accident.

Wingfield opened the first store in Ruidoso and has served as the mayor of that village. He was the postmaster there for 15 years. Civic posts include 16 years as president of the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce; school trustee for 12 years, and a past president of the Ruidoso Lions Club.

The candidate has taken an active part in the activities of the community of Ruidoso, as well as Lincoln County, and has a host of friends in this area.

Mr. and Mrs. Wingfield donated 10 acres of land upon which the summer residence of the Southwestern Children's Home, El Paso, is located, and have devoted both time and money for development of the summer retreat, as well as taken a personal interest in the children from that home.

Several prizes are to be awarded at the November event, with the first winner to be given a choice of a 300 Savage rifle or a boat with trailer. The individual in second place will be given the remaining prize. A pump action 30-06 rifle will go to the best marksman at the matches on Nov. 2.

B. G. Barnum, president of the group, said this week that qualification shooting has been concluded for this year with each member showing a much better score than previously held. Five members made expert this year, the first in which any of the group has earned that rating. Members who qualified as experts include E. L. Barnum said guns are available for individuals who do not own one, as well as facilities for pistol shooting.
