RAMBLIN' AROUND

Not whom to vote for but whom to vote against is the puzzle confronting the Ruidoso News as it let go a blast last week aimed at candidates accused of being opposed to a road being built "quickly to serve the thousands of people who would traverse the route from here (Ruidoso) to Capitan and Carrizozo if such an all-weather, good surfaced road were available."

The pressure continues to build up (with election just around the corner) with the statement: "New Jim FOR the candidate who will put the need for a road from Ruidoso to 330 on the No. 1 priority that must be done for the good of ALL Lincoln County."

Continuing: "I'm not asking candidates to go as far as I'm going now in saying I'm FOR a road to Capitan. Here's why — a road to Capitan will cost less, is easier to build, is shorter, and will serve FOUR TOWNS DIRECTLY. It will give quick access between Ruidoso, Capitan, Carrizozo and Lincoln. At some future date a second improved route to Carrizozo can be built."

TO THE AUTHOR OF "WIT AND WISDOM"

The truth is there is very little farm to market use of roads to and from Ruidoso in ANY direction.

Now, why don't you get that road taken out of the "Farm to Market Federated Secondary System" of allotments for Lincoln county and get your money for it on the "New Mexico Highway" system, or if you think you are big enough maybe you can get it under the "Federal Aid Primary System."

These latter systems will justify the use of which you want the roads built to quote you, "TO SERVE FOUR TOWNS" and you will be asking your elected public servants to carry out good government and to use funds for the purpose they were appropriated.

Now look! Had Lincoln County had the "Land Use Road Program" at the beginning of the "Federal Aid Secondary" legislation in 1945 they would presently be building the road of your interest. As it is, all we've had is local fights and no roads, whereas Eddy and other counties have completed their first allotment of Federal Aid Secondary allotted mileage and are starting on the second round this year.

For your information, all you have to do to get a higher priority on that "Farm to Market" road is prove to the Land Use Committee that the road is used for agricultural purposes, more than the road you wish to be ahead of in the priority system. Your recommendations on those roads are Messrs. Guy Dabney, Virgil Jones and E. L. Luck. These men are ranchers who live along and use those roads and are three of a 13-man committee that set those priorities.

Do you want good government or do you want anything you can get? When you talk about Federal Aid Secondary Roads you are talking about "Farm and Ranch to Market" roads. Appropriations are made for this purpose and good government would require they be used for this purpose and this purpose only!

These roads spoken of that "go to neighbors" happen to serve large areas of ranches, as the statistics and maps show.

Now the road of your particular interest serves smaller areas; therefore it has a smaller claim on "Farm to Market" road funds.

Is building the Capitan farm-to-market road in Ruidoso the best way the ranchers take their cattle and sheep to sell? Does Ruidoso have feeds and supplies for ranchers to buy and take home to use in their production? Of course not.

I repeat, do you want legitimate dealings in government, or do you want anything you can get? If you want to sabotage Lincoln County's long-needed program for good roads, this is a good beginning.

Let's keep the roads out of politics. Lincoln county has a plan to build its roads in an ordinary manner, based on need. We should all pull together toward this end.

Bishop To Dedicate Capitan And Hondo Catholic Churches



The newly completed Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Capitan, N. M., will be dedicated in services starting at 10:45 a.m. on Sunday. The Most Rev. Edwin V. Byrne, archbishop of Santa Fe, will officiate in Capitan and also at the dedication of Our Lady of Guadalupe Church in Hondo at 4 p.m.

Two new Catholic churches in Lincoln county will be dedicated on Sunday, October 12, 1952.

The Most Rev. Edwin V. Byrne, Archbishop of Santa Fe, N. M., will be in Lincoln county on that day to officiate at the solemn dedication of Sacred Heart Church, Capitan, and also at the dedication of Our Lady of Guadalupe Church in Hondo.

Sacred Heart Church replaces an old church which was built about the turn of the century and which was in dilapidated condition.

The new church is built of concrete blocks, stuccoed inside and out. The building measures 22 by 65 feet and is built along modern liturgical lines. The interior is dominated by the liturgical altar, consisting of a flat table altar and covered with a velvet canopy. The dorsal curtain to the rear of the altar is of the same material.

Completion of Sacred Heart Church at this time was made possible by a large donation from an anonymous donor through the Catholic Church Extension Society of the United States, located at Chicago, Ill. Work was started on the church some time ago and was halted because of lack of funds.

10:45—Procession of the people leading the Archbishop to the door of the New Sacred Heart Church, Capitan, followed immediately by the ceremonies of dedication, consisting of the blessing of the church building inside and out by Archbishop Edwin V. Byrne.

11:00—Celebration of the Mass of Dedication by the Rev. George J. Boenigghausen, and the dedicatory sermon by Archbishop Byrne.

2:00 p.m.—Public reception in honor of the Most Rev. Archbishop at the Capitan city hall.

4:00 p.m.—Dedicatory services of Our Lady of Guadalupe Church, Hondo. These services will be the same as those in Capitan with the exception of the dedicatory mass which will be celebrated by Father Boenigghausen on Thursday, Oct. 16.

The public is cordially invited to attend these dedicatory services.

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KILLER COYOTE STILL AT LARGE

A killer coyote, which has slain 300 lambs on the Wilbur McKnight ranch at Hondo, over a period of months, is still at large.

The wily animal thus far has eluded Marcus L. Neu, State hunter, who has had the coyote No. 1 on his list for the past month.

Bloodhounds have been used in tracking and their behavior convinced Mr. Neu that the killer was a coyote and not a mountain lion, as it was thought at first.

Many traps, with scented bait, have been set near the McKnight ranch and the hunt is still on.

An effective method in disposing of predatory animals in the past has been the use of "10-80," a potent poison injected into horse meat, but this method is not being used at the present time.

Miss Jo Ann Straley, 16, of Ancho, took second place in the clover leaf race. Her time of 20 seconds was close to the winning time of 19.6 seconds. In this race the riders circle three barrels, forming a clover leaf.

Miss Straley was Lincoln County's Queen in the State Fair contest.

Corona Motor Company garage was broken into Sunday night. The front door lock was pried open with a tire tool. The McCaskey register and account system was taken out a few miles north of town and the lock forced open. Only a few dollars in change and an Elgin watch were taken from it.

The safe was left beside the road with contents, including over \$300 worth of checks, charge accounts and valuable papers.

Besides the safe, which was recovered, three hunting rifles were taken — one a Mauser 30-06 sporter, one Marlin 32 special, and a Remington 12A-22 pump.

Mr. Mulkey, owner of Corona Motor Company, says the guns are worth a lot to him and he is offering \$100 for the return of any one of the guns, or clues leading to the recovery of the guns.

Sen. Chavez Addresses Local Demos

Fort Stanton will not be closed, U. S. Senator Dennis Chavez assured his audience last Thursday night at a Democratic rally in Carrizozo, at which he was one of the speakers.

"All facilities are at Fort Stanton; it looks like a paradise; the climate is ideal; why change it?" Senator Chavez asked.

Prior to the address of Senator Chavez, R. C. Nunez, Lincoln County Democratic Chairman, assisted by Eddie Penfield, Lincoln, introduced State and County Democratic candidates.

Tom Campbell, district attorney spoke, as did Truman A. Spencer, Jr., candidate for state senator.

"If elected, I will serve not only Lincoln county, but the whole of New Mexico," Mr. Spencer said.

Ike Wingfield, candidate for county commissioner for District 1, in a brief talk said his father was assessor of Lincoln county when it was the largest county in the United States.

C. A. Jones, candidate for county commissioner, District No. 2, said he "determined some time ago as a private citizen to take more interest in politics" and that he would work toward "making a wonderful county out of Lincoln county."

DEMOCRATS TO OPEN HEADQUARTERS IN CARRIZOZO

Democratic headquarters are to be opened this week in Carrizozo. It is announced by R. C. Nunez, Lincoln County Democratic chairman.

RALLY OCTOBER 11

A Democratic rally is to be held the evening of October 11, in the Legion Hall in Capitan.

Other speakers were Manuel Corona, candidate for probate judge; Tom Roberts for county commissioner, Dist 1; Arval Eganwood for county clerk; Clyde Atwood for sheriff; Wallace Fraquez for assessor and Mrs. Edith Sheehan for county treasurer.

Mr. Fraquez made short talks in both English and Spanish.

"POLITICS NOT A GAME"

In opening his talk, Senator Chavez said "politics is not a game; it is a matter of civic duty, wherein a man tries to serve his fellow man within the capacity of the position with which he is entrusted. All are working for the common weal."

Speaking of the development of the state's resources, Senator Chavez mentioned the millions of tons of uranium ore on the Navajo reservation, the billions of feet of natural gas and millions of tons of coal, as well as oil; also the well-known developed from mines at Ancho.

The Ancho ore, he said, is 48 per cent iron. This ore is hauled to Pueblo, Colo., for smelting. It is no idle dream, he said, to use the great deposits of coal in New Mexico to refine this ore within the state, as near the site of the mine as possible.

CARRIZOZO TO BANGOR, ME.

Speaking of Highway 54, the senator said it would not be long before Highway 54 is completed, "closing the last gap between Carrizozo and Bangor, Me., if you want to go that far."

He urged a program of waste conservation on the San Juan river, in which flows 700,000 acre-feet of water belonging to the State of New Mexico. "More water flows in the San Juan than down the Rio Grande," he said.

"San Juan county is entitled to every bit of water it can use economically; the balance is for use within the State of New Mexico."

URGES ALL TO VOTE

Senator Chavez urged every registered voter to cast his ballot in the coming election. "Election day is your day," he said. "It is your duty as an American to express your opinion so you can say 'I am glad to live in a free country.'"

State Treasurer Robert D. Coe spoke on state finances, stating he believed that "the \$100,000,000 spent last year in New Mexico taxpayers' money could have been used more advantageously."

Johnny Walker, candidate for land commissioner, said he was "not fighting the catfishes." He said the last session of the legislature passed a bill reclassifying lands. "It was endorsed by the Cattlemen's Association," he said. "I was blamed," he continued. "The land should be reclaimed so that all will pay in proportion."

Fire Prevention Week Scheduled Oct. 5 to 11

Oct. 5-11 are the dates for this year's observance of Fire Prevention Week. Emphasis is being put on recent increases in "needless" loss of human life.

Direct deaths from fire totaled over 12,000 last year, the National Fire Protection Ass'n reports. This was an increase of about 2000 from the average loss of 10,000 lives a year during the preceding decade. About one-third of the deaths were in rural areas.

NFPA records show that fully 90 per cent of all rural fires would be prevented if common fire hazards were eliminated. "Human carelessness" is blamed as the underlying cause of nearly all fires on the farm.

Excerpts From State Law on Compulsory School Attendance

Following are excerpts from the State Law in regard to compulsory attendance at public schools and responsibility of the parent:

"Section 55-2203, Art. 12, Chap. 55 — Children who have passed their sixth birthday shall until they have reached their 17th birthday, unless a child has previously graduated from high school, attend public schools of the state, for as many weeks as the public schools in the district in which such children reside shall be in session, except that children actually attending private or denominational schools maintaining courses of instruction approved by the State Board of Education; those physically or mentally unfit or incompetent, and those residing more than three miles from public schoolhouses and to whom no free public means of conveyance to and from school are furnished shall be exempt from the provisions of this act.

"Section 55-1210, Art. 12, Chap. 55 — Parents, guardians and persons having control of children subject to the provisions of this act are hereby made responsible for the public school attendance of such children, and any parent, guardian or person aforesaid who shall violate any of the provisions of this chapter, after any school authority shall have given public notice of the substance of the provisions of this act, upon conviction, shall be fined not less than \$3.00 nor more than \$100 or imprisoned in this county jail for not less than five nor more than 90 days, and in addition to the penalty aforesaid any parent, guardian or person having control of children subject to the provisions of this act who shall violate the provisions hereof shall be subject to the writ of mandamus issued out of the district court of the county, at the instance and in the name of the county or municipal boards of education or county or city superintendent of schools, without consent of the attorney general. 





Schools Adopt New Policy Regarding Student Solicitations

The new procedure requiring proper authorization from school officials before students are permitted to make purchases for school organizations from class and club funds, which was begun this year, has been augmented by a new policy for the solicitation of donations and advertisements.

A letter to Carrizozo merchants from Larry O. Stockton, high school principal, reveals that students are now permitted to solicit advertisements for the school annual and the spring band concert program only.

The letter indicates that those events are considered as having educational value, and that the community's businessmen and residents are willing to support them if the solicitations are held to a minimum.

School authorities request local merchants secure a requisition, signed by L. S. Manire, superintendent of schools, or Mr. Stockton, from any student wishing to purchase materials for a school class or club groups before making the sale. The purpose of this new procedure is an educational plan to stress individual responsibility and the process of handling funds.

Authorization from either of the two school officials is also required for the solicitation of funds for the school annual and the spring band concert.

J. G. MOORE STATES ISSUES AT HONDO RALLY

J. G. Moore, Republican candidate, opened his campaign for the State Senate Saturday night in Hondo, calling for increases in public assistance to the needy and dependent children and to the needy aged of the State. He complimented the present state administration for their raise of 20 per cent in the assistance granted to the aged, but stated that under present inflated living costs that this was not nearly sufficient to take care of the people in a manner that would provide proper food and proper housing.

Mr. Moore stated that he believed that increases to proper living levels could be made through savings in administration and through further elimination of ineligible people from the relief rolls.

Continuing, he said conditions at the State's mental institution and also at the State's Old Peoples' Home, both in Las Vegas, were badly overcrowded and that they were in need of additional buildings and additional equipment. He pledged, if elected, to make every effort to provide funds for the additions needed to take care of the needy at these institutions.

Outlined briefly were the candidate's thoughts of changes in administration of some school funds; definite plans for a revision of the tax structure in regard to building and equipment for schools in the counties and districts with low tax value to provide equal educational opportunities not only in teaching but in equipment and other facilities for all children, state-wide. Continued building of roads at local level started during the Mechem administration about two years ago was advocated by Moore and on a schedule to be accelerated as fast as funds become available.

In closing his talk Moore advocated a change in our tax exemption laws to allow veterans of the Korean war the same tax exemption which is allowed to veterans of World War I and World War II; he also advocated a change in our voting laws to permit absentee voting with special emphasis toward providing this for members of the Armed Services.

Mr. Moore, who is serving at the present as the clerk of Lincoln county, is married and has four children. He was born in Florence, Ala., in 1910 and moved to Carrizozo in 1940 from Albuquerque. Mr. Moore's oldest daughter, Patsy, received her master's degree from Highlands University at Las Vegas, N. M. in May of this year and is now employed as a teacher in the schools of Belen, N. M. He has two daughters, both being seniors in Carrizozo High School—Mrs. Moore and the young son, Joe, 4, complete the family.

Mr. Moore has engaged in the general insurance business at Carrizozo since 1947.



MORE ON SOIL CONSERVATION

America has undergone more than a century of land use and abuse. Approximately 100 million acres of formerly good crop land have been ruined by erosion for any further food production. Another 100 million acres of cropland have been seriously damaged. Topsoil is still being "applied" or created. Crop production has been increased in the United States, largely by increasing crop acreage.

Our farms are just as wild and just as long as they ever were but are only two-thirds as thick and getting thinner every day. A third of our nation's topsoil has washed away. Topsoil is the basis of America's wealth and greatness. All of our food, clothing and shelter comes from the soil. When our iron, coal, oil and other natural resources are gone we will have to devise substitutes from products grown from the soil, because the soil is one natural resource that does not "leave to wear out or be used up."

At least three billion tons of soil materials are washed out of the fields and pastures of the United States each year by water erosion alone. It has been figured that to move such a bulk of American soil on rails would take a train of freight cars 475,000 miles long, long enough to circle the planet 38 times at the Equator. To hold this soil.

"The Dust Bowl has caught the attention of the whole nation; Four million acres, an area two-thirds the state of Maryland exclusive of its water surface, practically ruined. . . 60 million more acres going. That is bad. It represents a waste so stupendous that the human mind is incapable of comprehending it. Yet water erosion has ruined eight Marylands . . . and another 300 million acres have been in some part hurt."—Gerald W. Johnson in the Baltimore Evening Sun, 1930.

"That surface run-off and soil erosion were controlled by plant cover for centuries is shown by the stable condition of the areas that still have protective vegetation. This indicates that if the land resources are to be preserved the lands must have a protective plant cover."—Charles K. Cooper, and Bernard A. Hendrich, Soil Erosion and Stream Flow and Forest Lands of the Upper Rio Grande Watershed in Relation to Land Resources and Human Welfare.

Law Enforcement Officers to Meet at Roswell October 20

J. G. Ellsworth, special agent in charge of the FBI, Albuquerque, announces that the FBI, in conjunction with the New Mexico State Police, National Automobile Theft Bureau and local law enforcement officers, will hold a series of one-day conferences throughout New Mexico concerning automobile thefts.

For law enforcement officers in this section of the state of New Mexico a conference will be held in the City Commission Room City Hall, Roswell, on Oct. 20, 1952, commencing at 10 a.m. All duly constituted law enforcement officers in this area are requested to attend.

Mr. Ellsworth stated that according to national statistics, the crime of automobile theft is steadily on the increase and that during the year of 1951, 196,960 automobiles were reported stolen

in the United States. This presents a serious problem to all law enforcement agencies. The following subjects will be discussed at these conferences: motor vehicle inspections, organization of records and index of stolen automobiles, fictitious automobile registrations, laboratory examinations as to fictitious registrations and bills of sale. Appearing on the program with Mr. Ellsworth will be Joe Roach, chief of New Mexico State Police, Santa Fe; Guy W. Shirley, special agent in charge of the National Automobile Theft Bureau in Denver, and local law enforcement officers.
