## Local Youth Polio Victim

All Carrizozo was saddened this week because of the loss of William Henry Blakely, 16, who died Sunday morning at the El Paso General Hospital, a victim of polio.

A public graveside service was held Wednesday afternoon at the Evergreen Cemetery.

Rev. H. T. Ray, pastor of the Carrizozo Baptist Church, was the officiating minister.

Out of respect for the youth a number of business houses in Carrizozo were closed Wednesday afternoon.

Young Blakely was admitted to the City-County hospital in Carrizozo October 10. His case was diagnosed as bulbar polio and the following day he was removed to the El Paso hospital, where he was placed in an iron lung. He succumbed on the morning of October 12.

William Blakely was the only child of Mr. and Mrs. Percy Blakely, Carrizozo, and was born and raised here. He was a member of the Freshman Class at Carrizozo High School.

Jerome Bartkus, Carrizozo High school music supervisor, arranged special music for the service. Bill's hobby had been music and he was making good progress on the marimba. Some of his classmates sang one of his favorite selections.

Palbearers were John Sandoval, John Sancedo, Tony Beltran, Billy Means, Donald Hobbs and Tom Barnett. All were classmates of the youth.

## Open House Oct. 26, Old Courthouse

John Boylan, custodian, and Mrs. Boylan, at the Old Courthouse at Lincoln cordially invite the public to attend a special exhibit they are arranging for Sunday, October 26, starting at 1 o'clock in the afternoon.

The exhibit will include historical material never shown before, such as old documents, photographs and newspapers.

Many of the documents are records kept during gold mining operations in White Oaks dating from 1890 when that village was a thriving mining town of over 1800 inhabitants.

According to Mr. Boylan, two newspapers were published during the boom days at White Oaks; there was an opera house and three churches.

Four large gold mines were in operation, of which Old Abe was the best known and yielded over \$3 million in gold. 1500 feet in depth, it was known as the deepest dry mine in existence, as no water was encountered in all that distance.

The three other mines were known as the North Homestake, the South Homestake and the Lady Godiva.

During the afternoon of the open house on October 26, Mr. and Mrs. Boylan will serve coffee to the visitors.

## Electrical Installations Up This Year

City officials are pleased with the upward in electrical service connections in Carrizozo. According to Mayor Marvin H. Roberts, 30 more meters have been installed to date than at the corresponding period last year.

Work is progressing on the improvements being made at the city's power plant. Both foundations are ready for the new Fairbanks-Morse generators, one of which is on the way from the East. These late model 450 h.p. low friction, short stroke generators will replace equipment in use for about 30 years.

The base has been poured for a new cooling tower at the plant and a new switchboard and other electrical apparatus is being installed under the direction of L. F. Topfitt, preparing for the arrival of the generators.

Work is being started on a new restroom and office for power plant personnel.

Mr. Topfitt, new utilities manager, has checked over the power system and made a number of recommendations to the village trustees and Mayor Roberts. Several improvements have already been made.

Carrizozo's electric service rate is in line with the average municipal rate in the State, as the following schedule shows:

No. 1 Rate—All residential and commercial users except cooking and/or hot water heating and power units of 2 h.p. and over: Minimum monthly charge of \$3 for 20 kilowatt hrs; for the next 30 kwh., 11c per kwh; for the next 50 kwh., 9c per kwh.

No. 2 Rate—Where consumer uses electric range, electric hot water heater or both: Minimum \$5 for 50 kilowatt hrs; for the next 50 kwh., 4c per kwh; for the next 100 kwh., 3c per kwh.

No. 3 Rate—All power and/or commercial refrigeration users; also commercial lighting and other uses where consumer has power units totaling 2 h.p. or over: Minimum monthly charge \$5 per 50 kwh; next 50 kwh., 9c; next 200 kwh., 8c.

**Social Security Permits Outside Earnings Up to \$75 Monthly**

Every person receiving monthly payments under the old-age and survivors insurance system of the Social Security Act will be interested in knowing that from now on they may earn as much as \$75 per month and still accept their benefit payment checks.

J. Hassler Strickland, manager of the Roswell social security office, states that amendments to the Social Security Act in 1952

provide that persons receiving social security must have their payments suspended the very first month they work and earn wages of more than \$75.

The procedure for persons who are self-employed is slightly different. They can earn \$900 from their business during the year and draw their checks for all 12 months; \$975 earnings will stop one month's checks; \$1050 earnings will stop two months' checks, and so on, until \$1800 earnings will stop the checks for the entire year.

The only exception is the 75-year beneficiary. Once a person becomes age 75, he can receive monthly social security benefits regardless of how much he earns.

Trustee C. A. Snow introduced the following ordinance, which was thereupon read in full:

ORDINANCE No. 61-A  
SERIES 1952

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE ELECTRIC LIGHT AND POWER SYSTEM OF THE VILLAGE OF CARRIZOSO, NEW MEXICO, AND CLARIFYING ORDINANCE No. 61, SERIES 1952, BY THE ADDITION OF A RECITAL SPECIFICALLY REFERRING TO THE ICE AND LOCKER PLANT OWNED AND OPERATED BY THE VILLAGE OF CARRIZOSO AS PART OF THE ELECTRIC LIGHT AND POWER SYSTEM FOR THE PURPOSES OF SAID ORDINANCE.

WHEREAS, the bonds authorized by Ordinance No. 61, Series 1952, have not been issued nor delivered; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Village of Carrizozo consider it desirable to clarify said ordinance by the addition of a recital specifically referring to the ice and locker plant owned and operated by the Village as part of the electric light and power system for the purposes of said ordinance.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF CARRIZOSO, LINCOLN COUNTY, NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. That Ordinance No. 61, Series 1952, be and the same is hereby amended by the addition of the following recital immediately after the second recital in said ordinance:

"WHEREAS, the Village of Carrizozo also owns and operates as an integral part of its electric light and power system an ice and locker plant, which plant, for the purposes of this ordinance, shall be deemed and considered as included within the term 'electric light and power system' wherever used, with the result that the net revenues of said ice and locker plant will be pledged to the payment of the bonds authorized to be issued hereunder."

Section 2. That if this ordinance shall for any reason be questioned or held invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the provisions of Ordinance No. 61, Series 1952.

This ordinance was adopted by the affirmative vote of not less than three-fourths of the entire membership of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Carrizozo, New Mexico, and approved by the aforesaid examination as Mayor of said Village, and attested by the Clerk and the corporate seal of said Village affixed on the 11th day of October, 1952.

Three members of the Board of Trustees having voted in favor of said motion, the presiding officer declared said motion carried and the rules suspended.

Trustee Roy E. Shafer then moved that said ordinance be passed and adopted as read. Trustee Clifton B. Zumwalt seconded the motion. The question being upon the passage and adoption of said ordinance, the roll was called with the following result:

Those voting Aye: Clifton B. Zumwalt, C. A. Snow, Roy E. Shafer.

Those voting Nay: None.

The presiding officer thereupon declared that three members of the Board of Trustees having voted in favor thereof, the said motion was carried and the said ordinance duly passed and adopted.

On motion duly adopted, it was ordered that said ordinance be published and recorded according to law.

Thereupon the meeting adjourned.







Sketch of the DEERADROUGHT, most famous Atlantic packet, whose record passage across the Atlantic made in 1802 still stands, according to the American Board of Marine Insurance. Her last passage between New York and Liverpool was 23 days, 15 hours, 2 for 17 from the 1st day, 10 hour record established by the new superliner UNITED STATES. Her 1802 passage the DEERADROUGHT was the champion of the Atlantic before she was pulled to other service. Her name was DEERADROUGHT because it was a national hero, the hero of the Revolution, wrote W. L. Morrison in his book "The American Merchant Marine." The DEERADROUGHT lived up to her name in no uncertain manner. She sailed a reputation for sailing with full crews in all weather conditions.

**MORE ON CONSERVATION**

**The Dunning Ranch**

Back in the fall of 1949 when Mrs. Leonard Dunning (nee Winters) bought the Jimmie Garner ranch, the need of water distribution was evident, as well as the plugging of gullies. In the northwest part of the ranch a dike was built to branch out into the area that flooded, and where the water was destroying the grass and causing considerable damage. The dike, a quarter mile in length, was brought along a rock ledge, and out onto a mesa that had not previously flooded and provided water for approximately an additional quarter section of land.

Pipes were installed to permit the slow spread of water over the entire area. Sub soil marks were placed on contours about 12 feet apart, which permitted the land to absorb considerable water without runoff. Increased moisture was thus made available for the re-seeded area and grass production was spurred. Eventually a total of 960 acres were reclaimed in the same manner.

Elsewhere on the ranch a diversion dam was built that spread water over some 160 to 200 acres which has at least doubled grass production since the purchase of the ranch. An additional 409 acres are slated for installation of this water spreading system in the near future. Additional watering places have been provided for better distribution of livestock. The Dunning's aimed to provide "living water" so that, whether the season was dry or wet, a sufficient supply of water for stock would be available at all times.

To provide "living water" wells were drilled and water piped into steel storage drinking tanks. There is one main storage tank feeding several small cattle drinking places. One hundred thousand gallons of water can be stored at all times. Four main storage tanks are filled from two wells. Each pasture on the ranch—seven large ones and five small ones—have water. Mrs. Dunning has started in

an educational film on Western life, as well as collected numerous ribbons and trophies at rodeo and livestock shows. "Honey Dun," her quarter horse, won the champion mare class at Albuquerque in 1950, and champion of all breeds at Roswell the same year. Although born in Michigan, Mrs. Dunning has spent most of her life in Arizona and New Mexico.

Mr. Dunning was a resident of Montana most of his life until he came to New Mexico in 1949. His father, Forrest Dunning, of Billings, Mont., is a state brand inspector.

New Mexico chose the split season this year with dates as follows: First—noon, October 14, and closes one hour before sunset, November 6. Second season—noon, December 18, closes one hour before sunset, January 10.

Bag limits remain the same as last year.

**"ADOBE DOORWAYS" REVEALS WORLD OF LAUGHTER AND CONTENTMENT IN NEW MEXICO.**

By Dorothy Pillsbury, 199 pp. Albuquerque, University of New Mexico press. \$3.50. (Reviewed by Ruth Laughlin.)

We step through Dorothy Pillsbury's ADOBE DOORWAYS into a world of laughter, contentment and beauty. It is the vivid-hued world of northern New Mexico, bounded by squat, sun-stepped adobe homes whose inhabitants are Indians, Spanish-Americans and Anglos. Their common bond is their conviction that a snug adobe house is the most satisfying dwelling on earth.

The lure of far western horizons takes us through Adobe Doorways in Indian country to watch the incomparable spring dances when the irrigation ditches are open for life-giving rain, on through the summer Green Corn Ceremony and the mellow harvest dance at Jemez, to the star-studded winter night roofing the Navajo's Yelbechal ritual. The doorways are open for us, too, in remote Spanish-American villages where the individual response of love outweighs efficient organized charity. Here, in northern New Mexico, are three distinct peoples living side by side and evolving a common way of life.
