Commissioner Charles A. Jones, in Santa Fe last week on Highway 54 business, was given full cooperation by the State Commissioners, who ok'd all requests for access roads, and cattle guards, as requested by property owners along the proposed new stretch of highway.

The purchase price to be paid per acre is the final remaining problem that the Commissioners are trying to settle in time to meet the February 13 date for advertisement for bids.

"Performing beautifully," way the new Fairbanks-Morse engine is described. The unit is operating steadily on the line, turning out electricity for Car-

Mayor Marvin H. Roberts this week said the new engine is using slightly more than half the amount of fuel formerly consumed by all the old units put together. There is also a considerable saving in oil consump-

The engine is equipped with a master self-winding clock, which when final adjustments are made to arrive at the correct number of cycles per minute, will keep electric clocks in town running in perfect time.

The new engine is now pulling the load, except for peak hours, when one or more of the old motors are used. A companion unit to the new engine has been shipped from the factory.



There has been no dislocation of the kind that normally might be expected. This is due to the fact that 75% of the House membership in this Congress was in the 82nd Congress. It appears that what changes have been cut without injury to proper gov- north. ernment functions, including the defense program.

.It was brought out in the House, for instance, that investigation by the Bonner Sub-Committee on Expenditures in the Executive Department has found numerous places, just as did the Hebert Committee in the last session of the Congress, where waste is rampant in the defense program. One item alone which Colorado. was brought up for discussion showed that the Defense Department has been engaging in purely civilian-type operation such as coffee roasting and blending and that it had resulted in wasteful expenditure of approximately 100 million dollars. It was pointed out further that the Defense Department is engaged in dozens of similar civilian activities, which, if eliminated, could easily result in saving several billion dollars.

It is my firm conviction that no government agency should be permitted to engage in such business which is purely the province of private enterprise.

There appears to be no question whatever that the budget will be cut to the point where it will be balanced and bring about an end to deficit spending—an end which many of us have been seeking for a long time.

On the opening day of the 83rd Congress I introduced HR 14, a bill which amends the Federal Aid Highway Act of 1952 by increasing the amount authorized for the Interstate Highway system from 25 million doliars to 225 million dollars.

The purpose of this legislation is to expedite the modernization of the interstate highways, which, because of such liazards as narrow bridges, sharp, blind curves-and too narrow traffic lanes are making too great a contribution to the death and damage toll which last year took\_about 38 thousand lives on the Nation's highways. This is not legislation which would violate in any way the drive for economy. It merely would prevent the diversion of the additional 200 million dollars from a total of about 2 billion dollars collected annually in excise taxes as a result of highway use. .The Federal Government has been diverting about 75 per cent of these excise taxes each year while the Nation's highway system has been deteriorating terrifically.

New Mexico's Congressional Delegation has been continued on the same committees as in the last Congress. This means that I will continue to serve on the Public Works Committee and on the sub-committees on roads and flood control. Although the New Mexico Congressmen and Senators are now on the committee minorities and hold no chair-manships, it still means that our State is represented on as many important committees as before.


