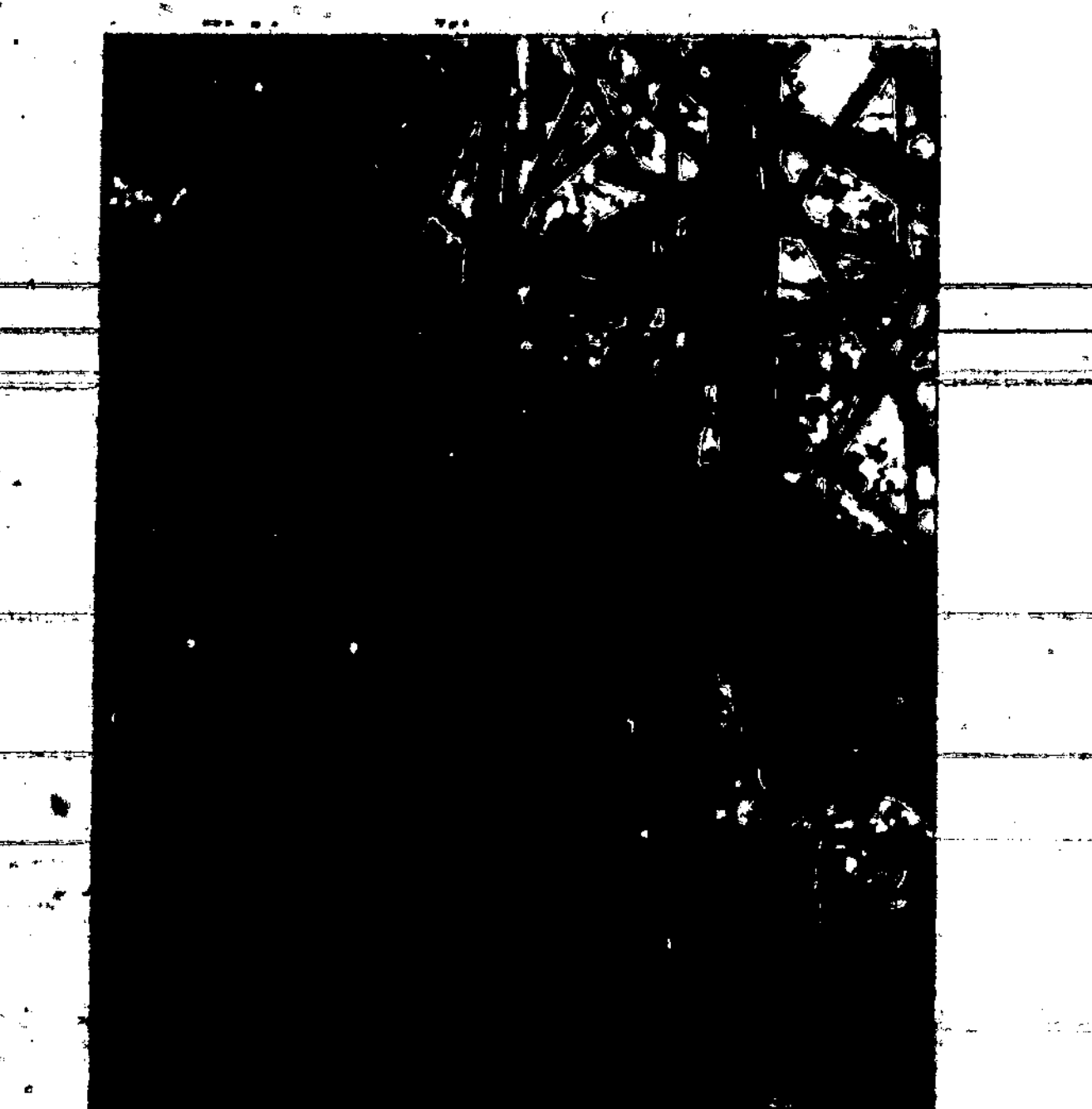

Located in the Gallinas Mts., six miles west of new Highway 54, the mine's main shaft has been sunk to a depth of 135 feet, exposing numerous veins of ore, carrying values in copper, lead, wolframite and fluorospar.

Saturday and Sunday's pageant reviewed the story of the Lincoln County War—as narrated by John Chisum to Anita as they sat in front of their adobe home in Lincoln town.

The stage was the village street, with a row of buildings, in the center of which was the Murphy store.

The pageant started with a colorful Spanish fiesta, replete with singing and dancing, joined in by young and old. But the holiday ended abruptly when gunmen rode in to shoot up the town.

On one side was the Murphy crowd, on the other Billy the Kid and his followers. Then followed the killing of Tompkins, Sheriff Brady, Hindman, the fight at Blazer's Mill and the burning of McSween's home.

Approximately 1500 attended the pageant Saturday and Sunday night. During Sunday afternoon there was a full program of activities, with Wilbur F. Coe, master of ceremonies.

He introduced a number of old timers, including D. L. Jackson of White Oaks; Lloyd C. Hulbert of Lincoln; Wm. Ferguson of Captain; L. R. Lakay of Nogal; Mr. and Mrs. Paul Mayer of Ruidoso, and E. C. DeW of Carrizozo.

Mr. Coe highly praised all who took part in the pageant, including the actors, and the narrators, who had a large part in making the pageant a success; also all others who contributed in so many ways, such as lighting, stage setting, music, ticket selling and publicity.

County Schools Beckon Pupils

School Registration Aug. 24 in Carrizozo

It will be back to school again for the school children of District 7 on Monday, Aug. 31.

Teachers will hold their meetings and receive their assignments in Carrizozo on Monday morning and the children will report to classes in the afternoon.

High School students will go directly to the auditorium for a short meeting at 1 o'clock, following which they will report to their various advisors for class schedules and assignments.

R. G. Firman, superintendent, announces that a list of advisors, room numbers, etc., will be published in the News the week before school begins.

Registration will start Monday, Aug. 24. Elementary school children—those in grades 1 to 6—will be registered all week in the office of the principal in the new elementary school.

Parents are requested to register their children as early as possible in order to help the school administration in providing rooms and teachers to handle the various classes.

Parents are reminded that children are required by State law to be 4 years old prior to January 1, in order to start the first grade.

High school children may report to the office of the high school principal for registration on Thursday and Friday, Aug. 27 and 28. Students entering high school for the first time, or entering from another high school, are asked to bring along their report cards from last year.

Mr. Firman also announces that the hot lunch program will start Tuesday, Sept. 1. Individual meals will cost 35 cents for school children, but lunch tickets may be bought for \$4 in the various schools that will entitle the child to 20 meals, at a cost of 30 cents each.

He also calls attention to the fact that school will start at 9 o'clock instead of 8:30, and dismissal will be at 4 o'clock instead of 3:30. Grade school children will go home for lunch at 11:45, while high school children will be dismissed at 12:00. Both groups will resume school at 1 o'clock.

Highway Dept. Gives Green Light to Mal Pais Roadside Park Project

Mrs. C. A. Snow, president of the Carrizozo Woman's Club announced this week that progress is being made in the club's project of establishing a roadside park in the Mal Pais.

Ira B. Miller, maintenance engineer, and Jas. A. Bird, district engineer, of the State Highway Commission, made an inspection of Highway 380 through the Mal Pais on Wednesday of this week and picked a desirable spot for the roadside park.

They recommended to Mrs. Snow a site 1 1/2 miles from the west entrance to the lava formation, which is approximately half way through. From the east, or Carrizozo entrance to the Mal Pais, it is on the right-hand side of the highway.

The State highway officials informed Mrs. Snow that when the proper title is secured to the land, State equipment would fill and grade the site. They said the State would not assume the responsibility of maintenance of the park for a period of at least five years.

In furthering the project, Mrs. Snow is being given the cooperation of Ralph Dunlap, County agent; Rex Werner, soil conservationist and has been promised assistance by local clubs and individuals.

Lions Club Completing Athletic Field Lighting

A project of the Carrizozo Lions Club, undertaken shortly after the first of the year, is nearing completion—that of equipping the athletic field of the high school with outdoor lighting.

At considerable expense and with the combined efforts of members of the Club, eight poles have been placed around the field. The biggest remaining job is to string guy wires from the poles.

Truman Spencer Jr. and L. V. Cook have been in charge of the work. Mr. Spencer said this week that the Club hoped to have the project completed in time for the first football game.

Each pole will carry two 1500 watt bulbs and it is proved insufficient light—two more bulbs will be added to each pole.

Robert Weber, of the New Mexico State Bureau of Mines, was guest speaker at the August 5 meeting of the Lions Club. He told the members about the survey he is making of the Carrizozo quadrant for ground water and other geological formations.

WILL HARRISON'S Inside the Capital

SANTA FE, Aug. 12 — That special grand jury convened this week at Santa Fe is likely to put several public officials on the spot in the course of its investigation of the State penitentiary.

It may call former Warden Howell Gage to testify on some financial tangles which developed during his administration. But it is certain to call the present warden, Morris Abram, who was chief deputy warden under Gage.

Also on a spot is District Attorney Bertrand Prince of the First Judicial District, among whose duties, under the law, is the investigation of reported violations of State law, and prosecutions thereof.

In the several publicized recent instances of dope selling at the pen and one admitted instance of moonshining there, no one has yet been brought to trial. (Felonies committed in the penitentiary are within the province of the district attorney, while other offenses there are handled by the prison authorities within the walls.)

The attitude which the grand jury may take toward such litigation remains to be seen at the conclusion of its investigation of this and other matters directly affecting the trouble-ridden State prison here.

An interim joint committee of the Legislature, chaired by State Rep. Hugh Horne (R, Albuquerque), also is conducting a lengthy survey of what's wrong at the antiquated penitentiary. (An investigation at the prison by the State Police following the most recent riot there apparently produced nothing on which to base an indictment, unless it remains to be revealed to the grand jury here. Such a deferred action could only be interpreted as a slap at the district attorney, regardless of what may issue statements to the contrary, from the governor's down.)

Meantime, plans are complete for the new prison plant to be started near here as soon as a suitable site can be found affording an adequate underground supply of water. Not some of the incidents which have been occurring at the present pen cannot be blamed on the fact that the existing plant is old-fashioned and too small for a convict population of more than 400.

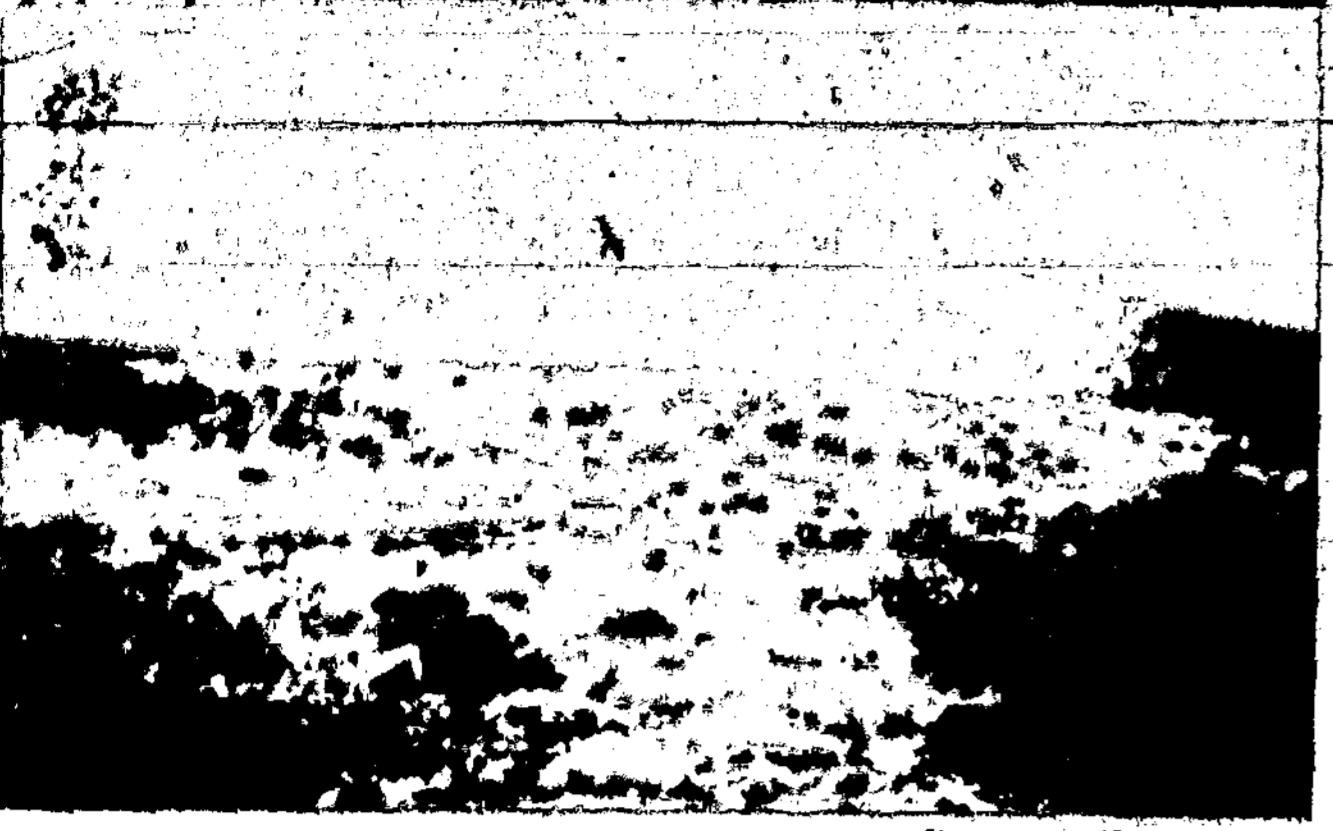

Ways to Stretch Drought Relief Feeds

With many ranchers planning to feed drought relief feeds, here are a few suggestions for making the best use of these feeds and yet keep your livestock in better shape.

If feed is very short the livestock should receive a good green alfalfa hay either in the cube mixture or separately. The green hay will furnish Vitamin A and calcium to the livestock. Feed about 7 pounds a week to a cow or 2 to 3 lbs. to a ewe.

Another way to stretch the feed and add the bulk is by adding cottonseed hulls to the feed mixture but do not include too much in the mixture.

Salt should be before the livestock at all times and about 10 lbs. could be added to every ton of feed mixture. Molasses could be added to the cube mixture very readily as it will help the cubes stick together better and furnish food at the same time.

The corn and wheat are likely to be 3-5 years old and will therefore be hard. To get the most good from these, ranchers should grind or roll the corn and wheat.

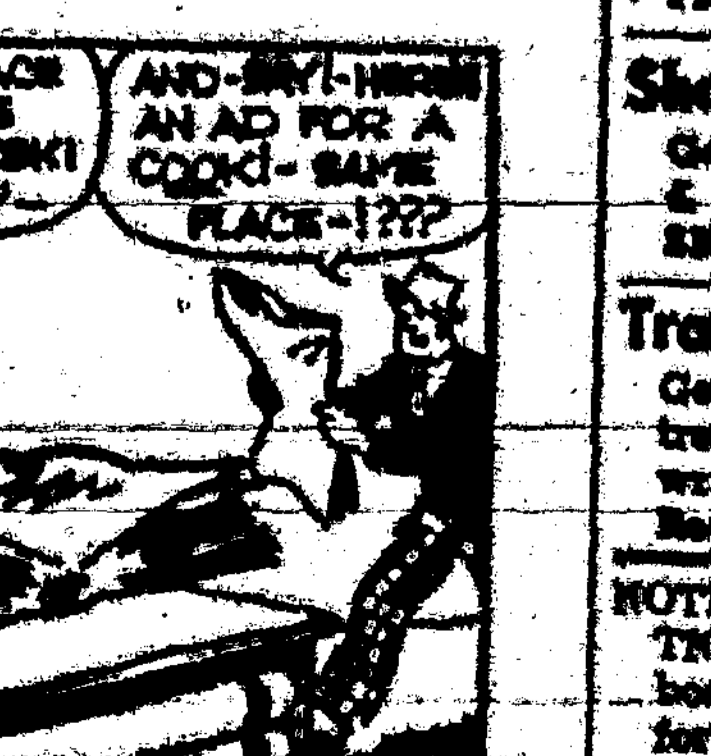

There were 23 departments, each with numerous subdivisions.

My immediate superior within the attendants department was less than 10 years ago a professor in the University of Texas at Austin, now in full time circuit-service work.

Another friend, a trained Abtractor, is now a missionary in Venezuela. To prepare the camps in New Jersey where some 30,000 stayed, farmer-brothers harvested the crops for the farmers that leased to us. Well drilled brothers put

Others surveyed the streets, lots shopping centers, sanitary systems, etc. Carpenters, plumbers and electricians by the hundreds, and numerous truckers, mechanics, "cat" skimmers and others all together made the camp click. We look forward to a complete report of the convention to be printed soon.

Why all this planned effort? The Bible at Proverbs 8 gives a quick answer: "Wise men lay up knowledge." Knowledge brings understanding if it is the right kind. Understanding brings the strength of hope. The Bible is the real deadly enemy of totalitarianism and communism. It is the "Sword of the Spirit" which we widely wield, and purpose to wield more widely.

Communism may overrun corrupt nations, but it will never overrun a New World Society, cleansed by close guidance from the word of Jehovah, the great Superior Authority.

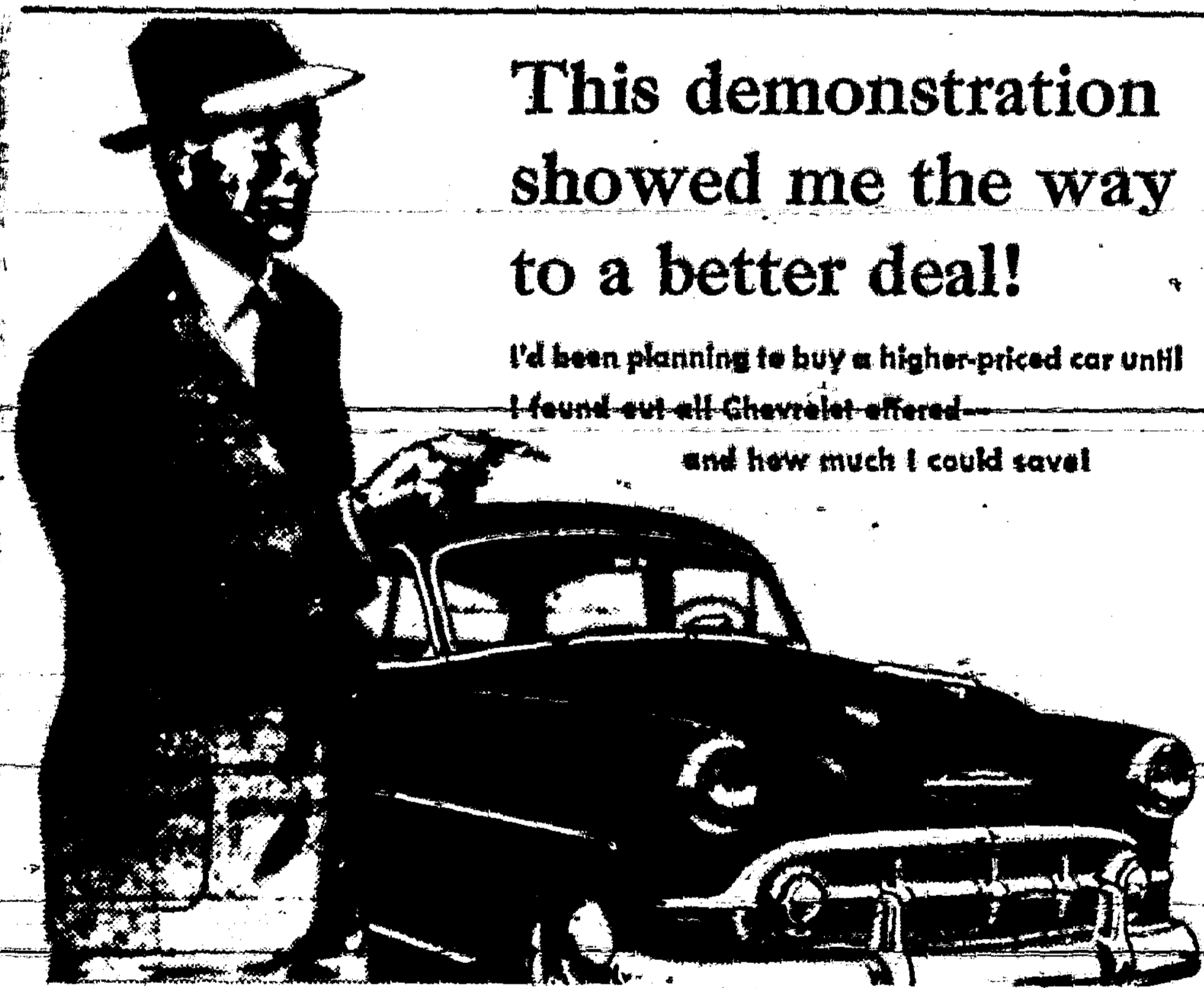

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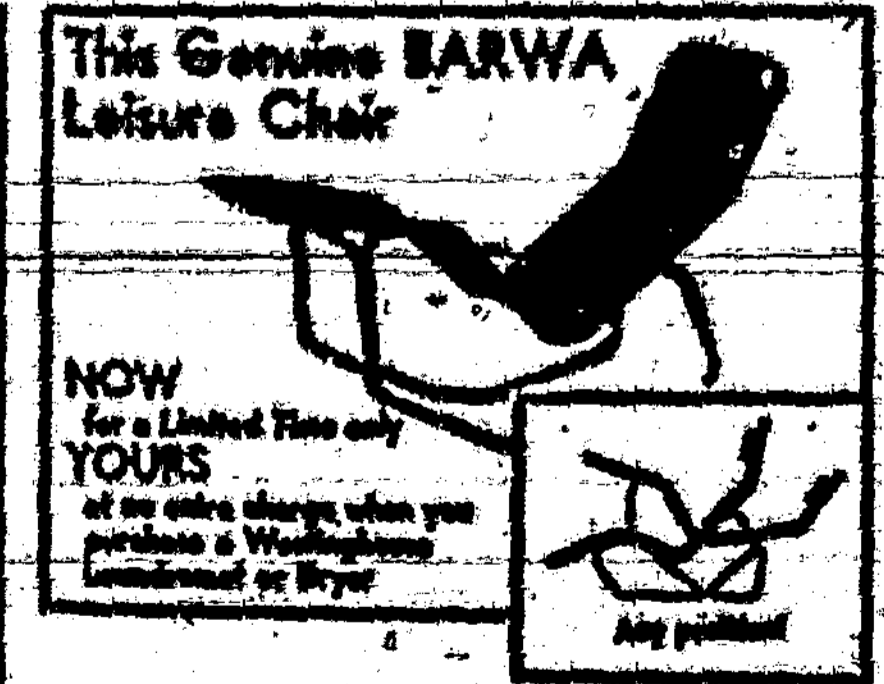
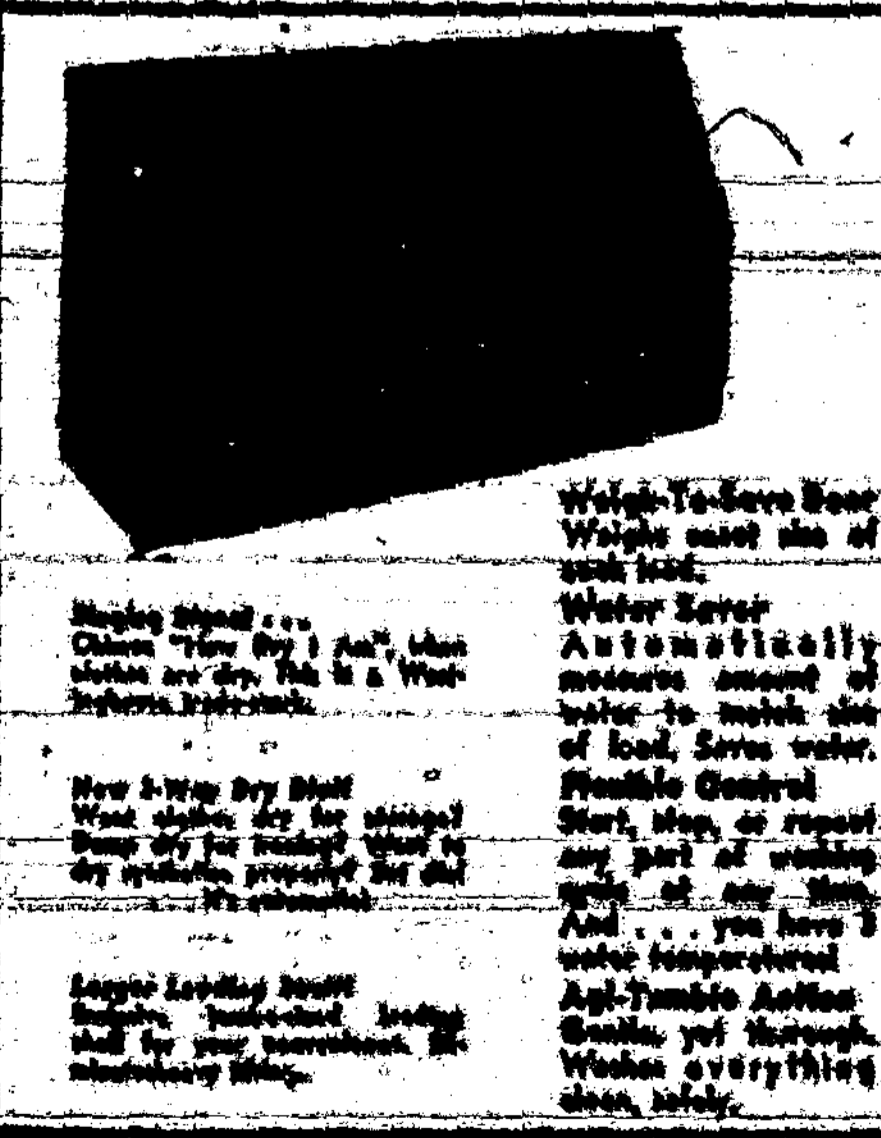
