

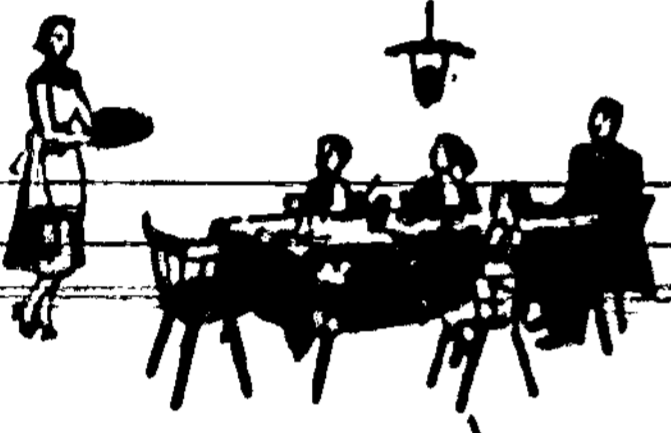
Mr. and Mrs. Ben Cain and children of Tandu were here last week visiting his brother, Lewis Cain.

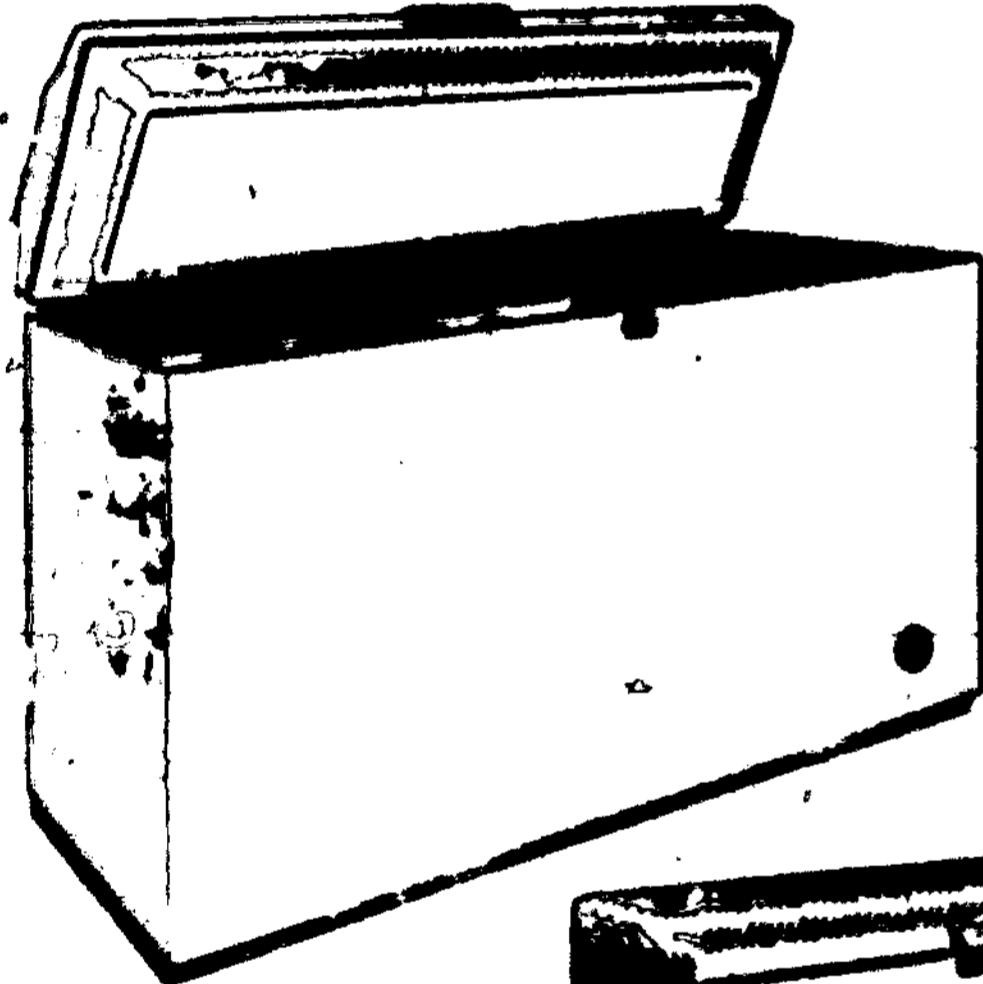
Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Vandell and daughter, Jo Evelyn and Carolyn, have moved into their new home across the street west of the Roberts' home.

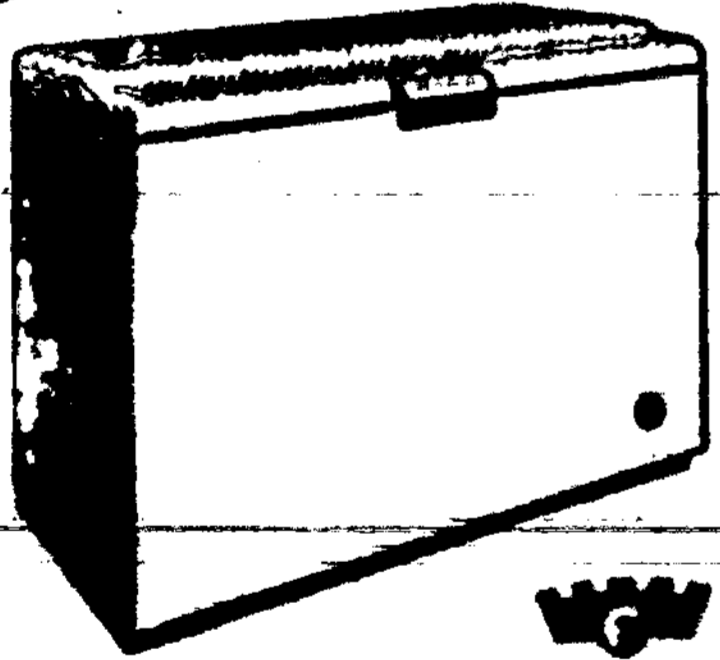

Illegal Possession of Deer Meat Draws Fines

Twelve construction workers at North Ocuila Peak were fined in justice of the peace court at Magdalena last Friday for illegal possession of deer meat.

The fines, levied by Judge Medley, ranged from \$25 to \$300, and totaled \$650, plus \$82 court costs.

According to witnesses the deer meat was being served at a boarding house which served the construction workers. The fact that they paid for their meals did not alter the offense. The heaviest fine—\$300—was drawn by S. M. Long, company superintendent. He was also given a 30-day jail sentence, which was suspended.

The violation is said to have been going on for some time. A posse of game wardens descended on the construction camp and served individual warrants. Included were district game wardens John A. Shaul of Capitan, Orville Luttrell of Alamogordo, L. A. Turner of Magdalena and W. A. Humphries of Las Cruces; District patrolman Virgil Jones of Capitan and Roy Snyder of Reserve, and two State police officers, Eddie Apodaca of Carrizozo and Don Hammond of Socorro.

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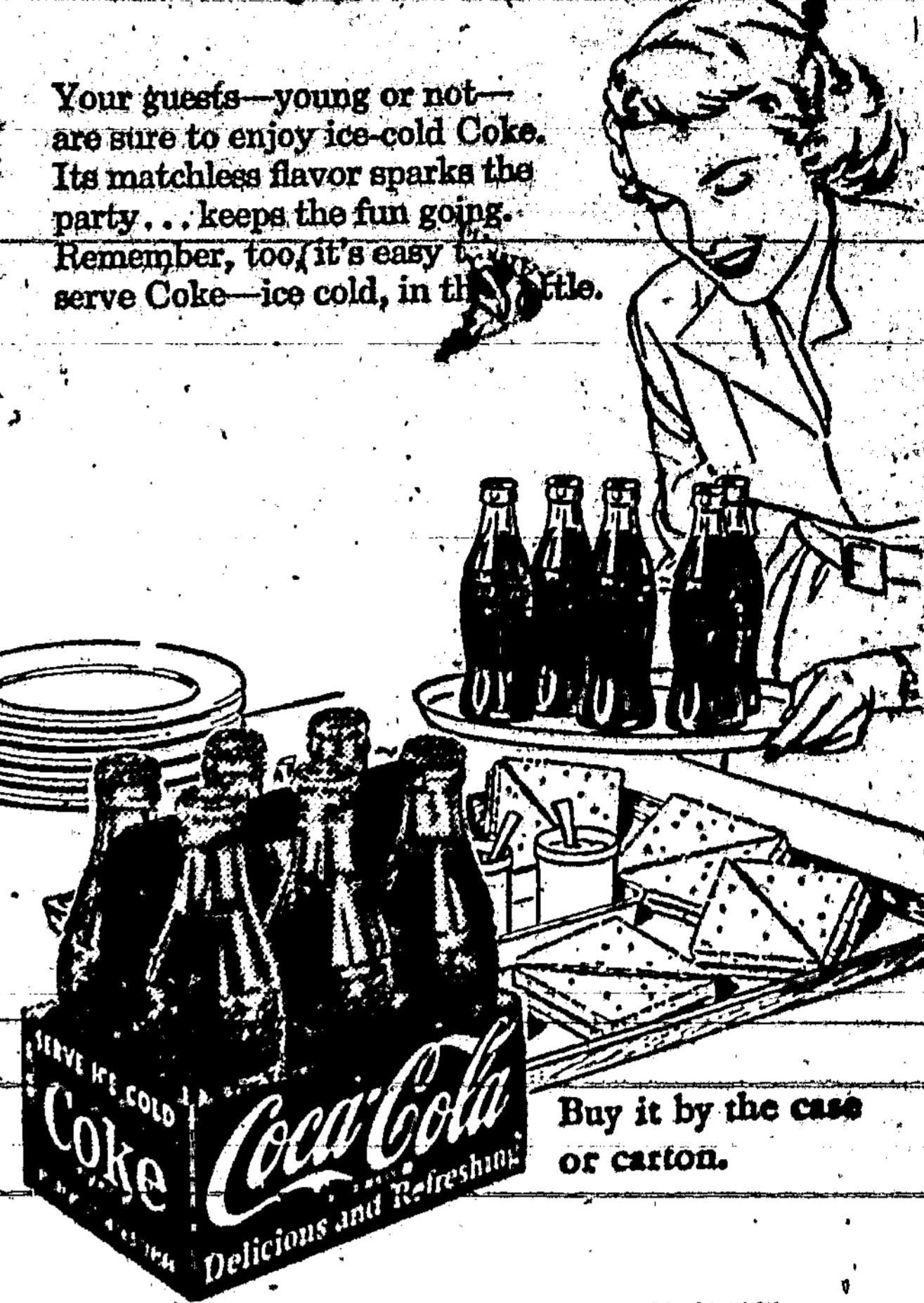
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Drawing for Antelope Permits Saturday

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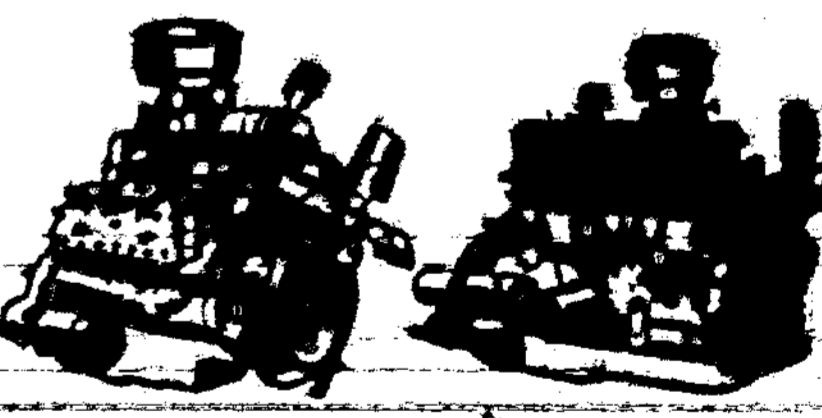
