WHAT HAPPENED TO LITTLE ED? SANTA FE, Sept. 16 - State-house observers are wondering if Gov. Ed Mecham sanctioned the sacking of his comptroller, Ed Hartman, by the Santa Fe county grand jury.

GRIZZLIES LOSE TO CAPITAN'S TIGERS

The Capitan Tigers had too much power and finesse for the Carrizozo Grizzlies last Friday night, overcoming the county seat boys 47 to 0.

The Tigers showed the drive and smart ball handling that took them to the championship last year. The Zozoltes, on the other hand, were plagued with fumbleitis and except for a drive as the game opened, were unable to get going.

A crowd estimated at 1500 attended the game, played under lights installed by the Lions Club. Some youngsters swinging on the guy wires of a light pole caused the wires between poles to short-circuit and put one end of the playing field in semi-darkness before the end of the first half. However, I. V. Cook came to the rescue, climbed one of the poles and soon had the trouble corrected.

The Carrizozo High School cheer leaders and the student body did not lack for spirit and cheered the Grizzlies throughout the game, even though it was apparent fairly early in the game that Capitan's bid for victory was not to be denied.

The Grizzly secondary had its hands full stopping plays thru the line and around the ends, and their good defensive work prevented the Tigers from rolling up a larger score.

TRICKY KICK-OFF

Carrizozo made a short kick-off and recovered the ball at midfield. Wedell and Gallegos made a tuck down. A line play gained 3 and a lateral 2. Carrizozo was penalized 5 yards for

offside. A pass failed and Wedell punted 25 yards. Capitan took the ball on its own 20-yard line and went down the field, Wally Ferguson going over for a touchdown. Ferguson booted the extra point. Carrizozo fumbled the kick-off. Capitan recovered and marched down the field, losing the ball on downs on the Grizzly 18-yard line. Zozo punted out to midfield. Capitan took over at this point and in seven plays sent Ferguson over for his second touchdown. The try for point was no good. Carrizozo again fumbled the kickoff but recovered on the 10-yard line. They raked up a first down, then fumbled, Capitan recovering. In two plays the Tigers sent Ferguson over again. He kicked goal, making the half time score 20 to 0. As the half opened Capitan recovered a Carrizozo fumble on the Zozo 30-yard line and in three plays Ed Womack was over for the Tigers fourth TD. The Capitan score continued to mount as Garth Hyde, Dick Cox and Arthur Salas ran to touchdowns. Five conversions were scored, the fifth one as the result of a completed pass to left end Tony Archuleta.

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LETTER TO EDITOR

Editor, News:

I noticed there is an error in Mr. Roger's age in the paper. I'd appreciate a correction. His age was 57 not 64.

Editor, News:

Delay in answering your recent letter was due to absence from the office, which delay I regret.

I enclose herewith a statement (Congressional Record) I made at the time I introduced the two bills questioned in your letter in which I explained the main reason for the introduction of these bills. The Mescalero Indians had appealed to the Congressional delegation, to the Department, and to all officials having anything to do with the disposition of that land (Mt. Stanton's), for a hearing on their claim that the land in question is part of their reservation. Nothing was done to give them the opportunity of being heard and of presenting the evidence which they claim they have. I have no way of knowing whether their claim is or is not valid, but they certainly ought to be afforded the opportunity of presenting it.

To avoid being placed in the position of undertaking the championing of their claim, I simultaneously introduced a bill placing the property where the law intended it to be placed when no longer used as a military reservation. Both bills were intended to bring the matter to the notice of the committee which has jurisdiction over such matters. Too often department officials undertake to deal with these large tracts of land without any regard whatever for the views of the committee or the members of Congress from the State affected. The bills I introduced were not intended to reflect any opposition on my part to any other arrangement such as that suggested in your letter. I simply have not been consulted about any such arrangement either by the State or anybody else.

Offhand I think the land can be just as well administered by the State as by the Federal government, if the land were turned over to the State either for the benefit of this hospital or for the benefit of the public schools. I do not believe it should be operated by the hospital. I am quite familiar with the result of that kind of an operation from the examinations and reports made of it when it was so operated. Both the Appropriations Committee and I have had occasion to criticize the operation of the land by the hospital under the Public Health Service, and the Public Health Service had promised to divest itself of the land even if it had continued the hospital. A hospital should be a hospital and not a cattle ranch. A hospital has no more business running a cattle ranch than a cattle ranch has running a hospital. I do not believe in the State government going into the cattle business any more than I believe in the Federal government going into the cattle business in competition with private industry.

Undoubtedly, as you say, settlement with the Mescaleros can be accomplished, but I do not believe in giving them the brushoff merely because they

S. P. to Add 1250 Large-size Box Cars To Freight Equipment

Acquisition of an additional 1250 large 50-foot length box cars has been authorized by the Southern Pacific Company, Pres. D. J. Russell of the railroad has announced.

This further enlargement of the SP's rolling stock will raise to more than 41,000 the number of freight cars placed in service by the Company, or still on order, since the end of World War II. About 3500 freight-train cars remain to be delivered on previous orders.

The 1250 cars will be built in the company's shops at Sacramento, Calif., it was stated, where 9600 freight cars have been turned out, or are still under construction, since car building was resumed there in 1950.

Since January 1, 1946, capacity of Southern Pacific's freight car fleet in service has been increased by about 37%, it was pointed out, whereas the national average gain has been about 5%.

The estimated cost of the 1250 new cars will raise Southern Pacific's appropriations for post-war rolling stock to more than \$488,000,000, President Russell said. In addition to providing for SP's own purchases of new equipment, these appropriations include half the cost of 10,900 new refrigerator cars for Pacific Fruit Express Co., which is half owned by Southern Pacific.

are Indians and cannot help themselves. Since the Department did not give them an opportunity to have a proper hearing, I am thoroughly of the opinion that a Congressional committee should do so and this is mainly what I primarily desired to accomplish by the introduction of those bills. I shall ask the committee to set a date for hearing on both bills, and to notify the Mescalero Indians and their attorneys, as soon as Congress convenes.

If the Welfare Department, the Governor, or any other State authority think some other arrangement should be made, I have not heard from any of them. Lincoln County is one of several counties that has not entered a county booth exhibit at the 1953 New Mexico State Fair, it was disclosed this week by Leon H. Harms, secretary-manager of the fair.

In the competition for best county booth there are no losers—every county booth gets a cash award of at least \$25. First six places pay cash awards ranging from \$100 for first to \$30 for sixth. There is no entry fee. Mr. Harms pointed out that a 1951 State law permits Lincoln County to appropriate a sum up to \$1000 for purposes of sponsoring a county exhibit at the State Fair.

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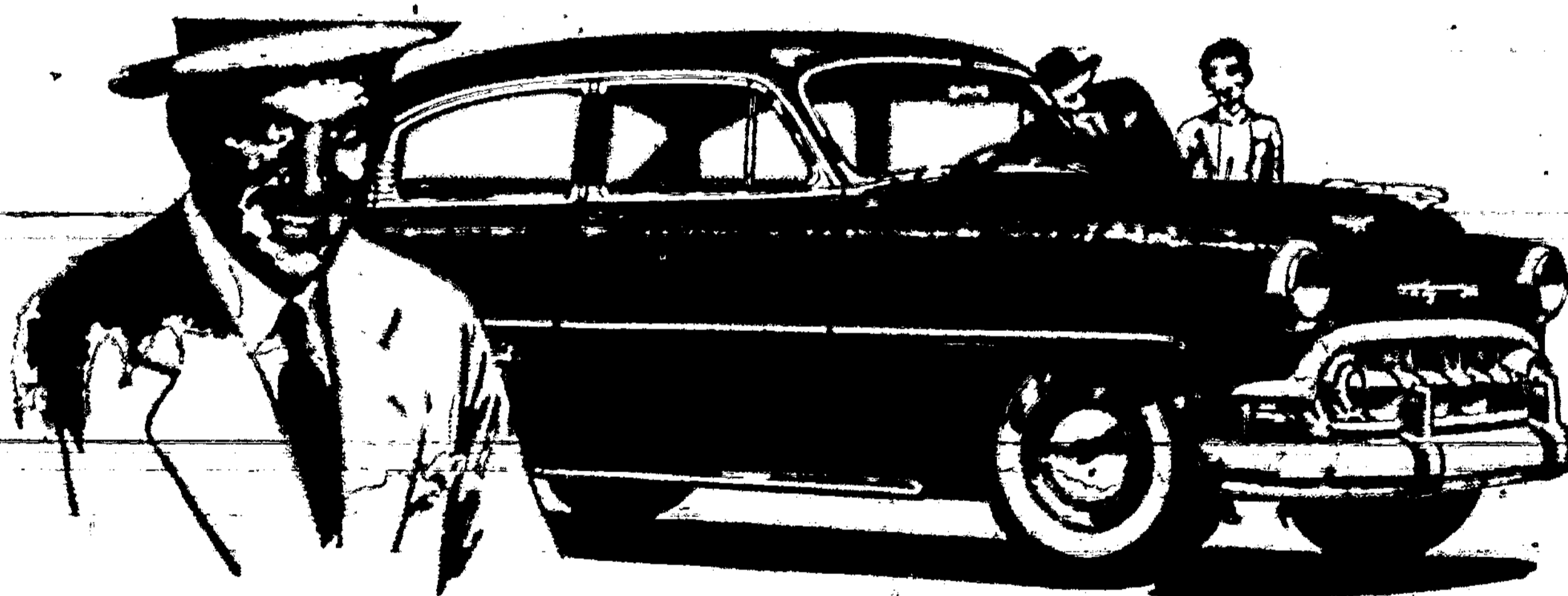
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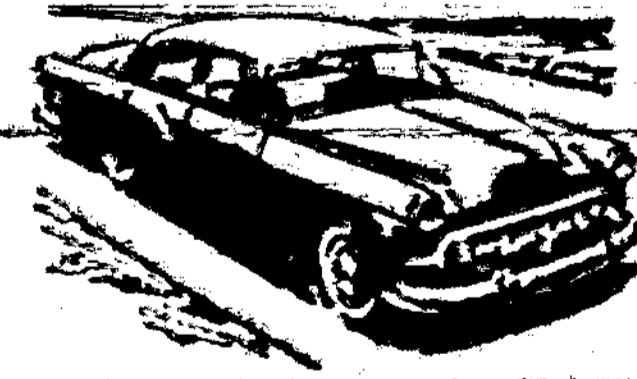

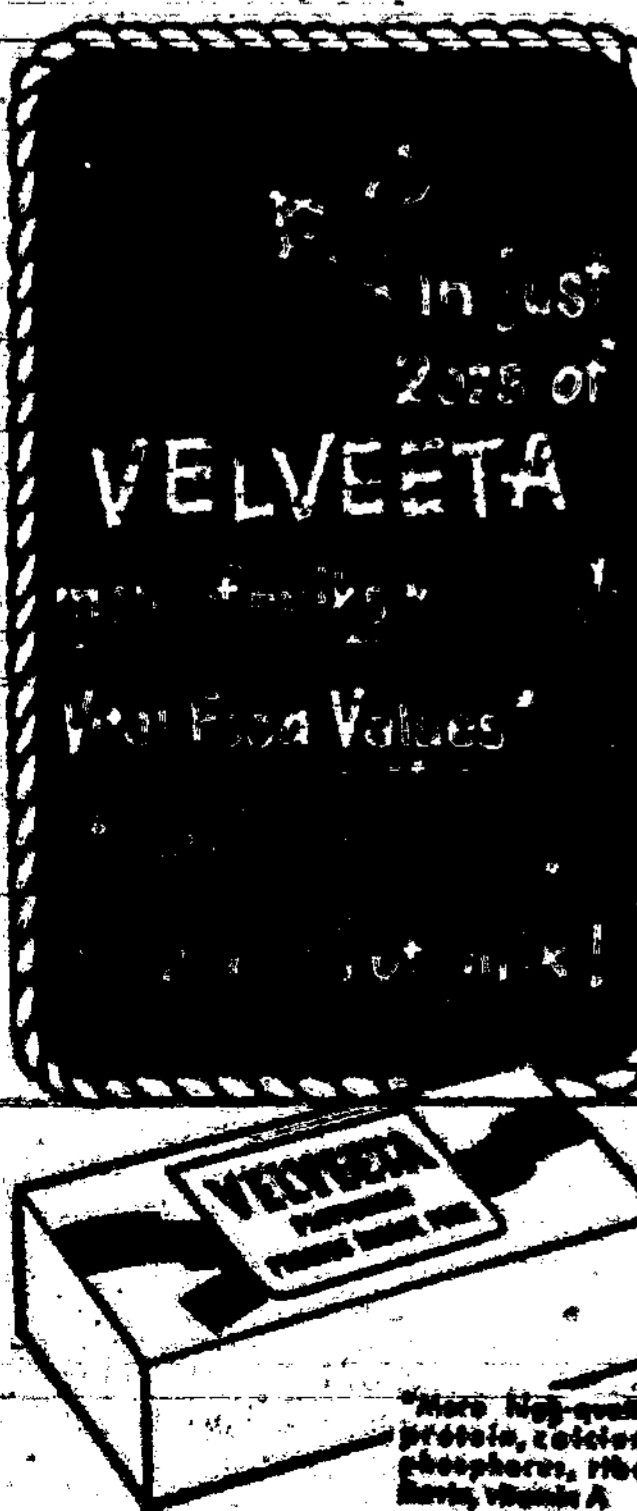

NEWS FROM THE COUNTY AGENT

Protect Flower Gardens From Insect Pests

Don't let insects take a toll in your flower garden. Control is a matter of knowing the insects and their habits and understanding what it takes to prevent or destroy them.

For instance, the bagworms are thriving right now in their tough cocoon-like cases on trees. These worms usually become full grown about this time of the year. Your best control measure now are hand picking or spraying with lead arsenate. The

bagworms should be burned as they are collected.

Ants which attack flowers and ornamental shrubs can cause extensive damage. For best control, locate the nests and dust the hills and immediate vicinity thoroughly with a 5% chlordane dust.

Aphids are small soft-bodied sucking insects, dark brown, yellow or green, and are usually found on the underside of leaves. Spray the plants with one and a half teaspoons of nicotine to a gallon of soapy water, or dust with eight teaspoons of nicotine sulphate to a pound of hydrated lime.

Caterpillars feed on flowers and shrubs. To control either the smooth skinned or the hairy type of caterpillars, dust plants regularly with 5% DDT or 5%

chlordane dust. Red spiders are tiny mites, red or yellow in color. They are commonly found on the underside of leaves and stems of the plants. Best control is obtained by dusting sulphur twice at seven-day intervals. There are some commercial insecticides which are effective when used according to the manufacturer's directions.

Thrips, the slender insect—less than a tenth of an inch long, are yellowish to dark in color and are found in buds and blossoms. To control thrips, recommended practice is to keep all the old blossoms removed from plants and dusting the plants with a 5% DDT dust.

New Mexico Needs Soil Conservation

Over 74% of New Mexico is included in a soil conservation district. Three out of every four acres can be helped by conservation technicians working for locally operated districts.

Every district is working on a program developed by their own elected supervisors. Farmers and ranchers who know local problems are directing the activities of experienced soil conservation technicians.

This combination of local know-how and expert assistance is paying good dividends. And it pays a better income too. Income per farm has been increased as much as 30% by conservation methods.

Gov. Edwin Mechem has proclaimed September as soil conservation month in New Mexico.

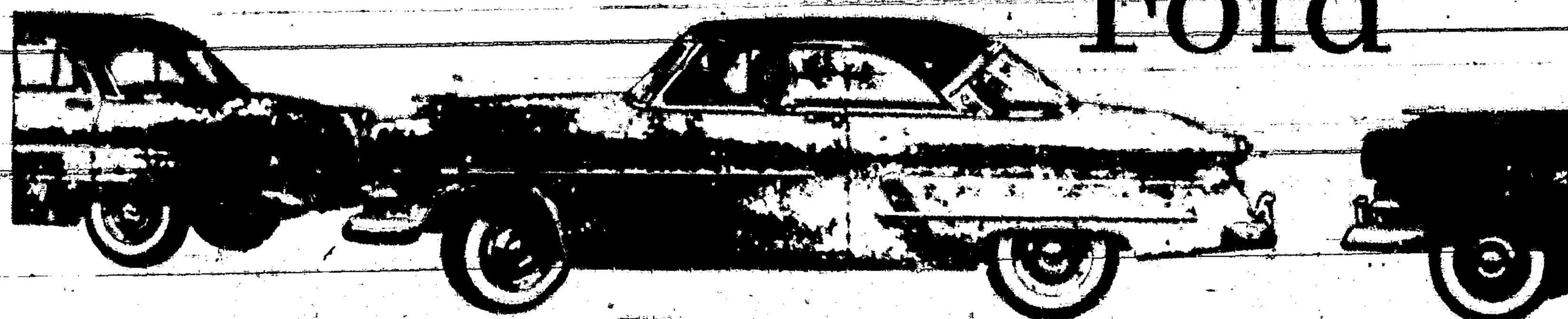
