George W. Coe has gathered and shipped five cars of apples, mostly Black Twig and Jonico varieties.

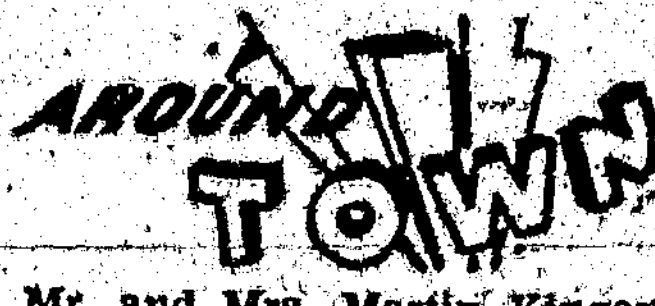

Federal Funds Received For Aid to Hospitals

SANTA FE, Nov. 10—Three million dollars in federal funds already has been received for the establishment of additional hospital facilities in New Mexico. It is anticipated that over four million dollars may be supplied by the national government for the same purpose during the next several years, according to the Taxpayers Association of New Mexico.

Allocated under the Hill-Burton program, the funds thus far received from Washington have helped make available 960 additional hospital beds in this state. In all, just over four million dollars in federal funds have been allocated to New Mexico for hospitals, with local sources contributing nearly seven million dollars for the same several projects.

One hospital project in Santa Fe received more than three-quarters of a million in federal assistance, while two Albuquerque hospitals received a total of almost as much.

Other counties which have received funds under the Hill-Burton program include Lincoln, Dona Ana, Otero and Socorro.

Proper application is the best way to keep roofing material from being blown off by high winds. Pictured above is a roof on which the asphalt shingles stayed in place although the wind was strong enough to rip the entire roof assembly off. To give extra wind-resistance to roofs on farm buildings and other structures in high-wind areas, one recommended procedure is to cement down shingle tabs with quick-setting asphalt cement. A second way is to use interlocking asphalt shingles which are made to lock together so tightly that the entire roof covering is, in effect, one piece and the wind cannot pry individual shingles loose.

Territory wools: 1/2 blood combing, 58-62: 2. Fuller Ranch, Pico; 3. Bill Sterrett, Roswell; 4. Floyd Lee, San Mateo. Sutherland's reserve champion fleece won first place in this class.

Entries from New Mexico were not eligible to compete in the commercial division.

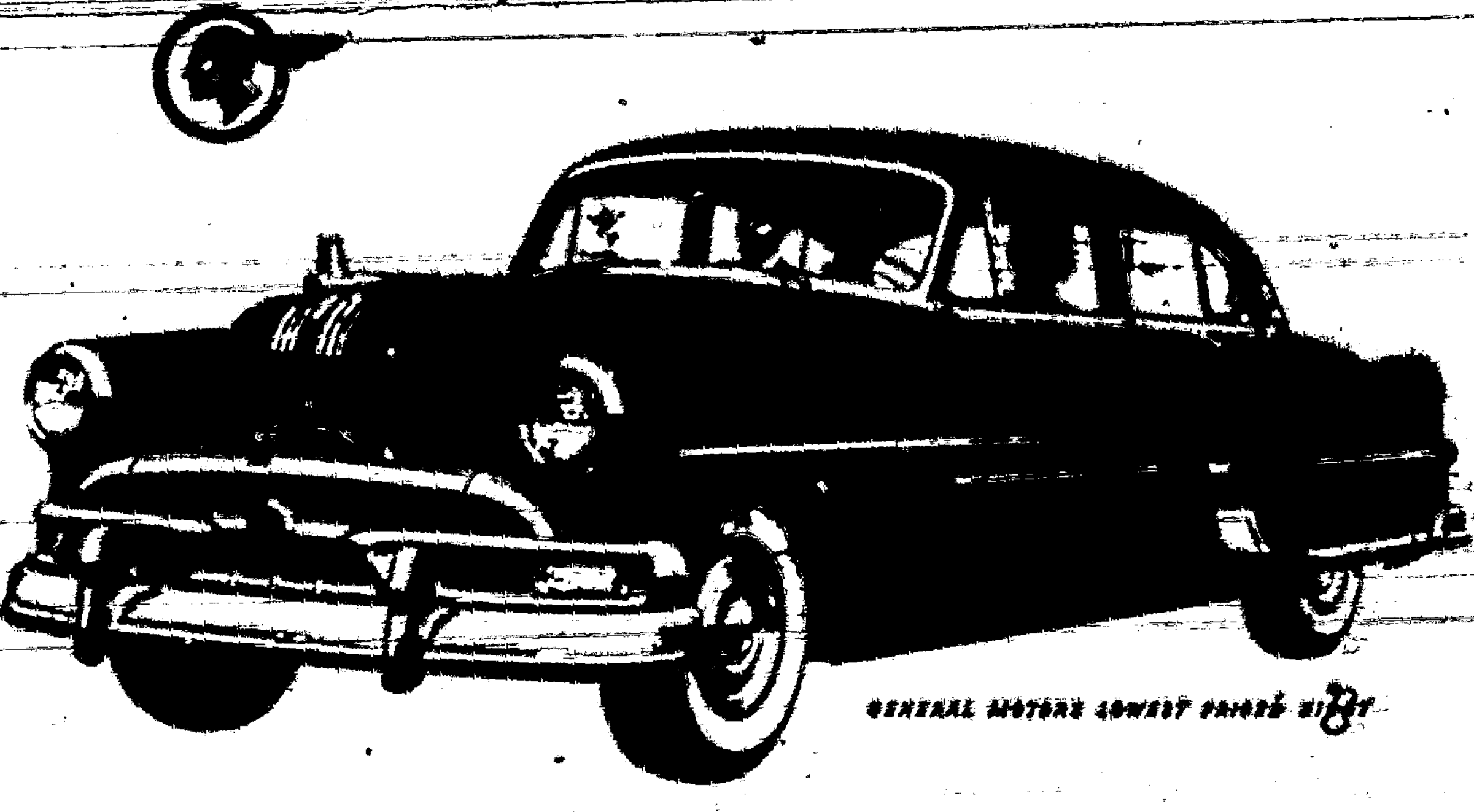

ORDINANCE No. 63
ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTIONS 5, 6, AND 7 OF ORDINANCE No. 44 ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND LEVYING AN EXCISE TAX UPON THE SALE OF GASOLINE WITHIN THE VILLAGE OF CARRIZOZO, NEW MEXICO," AND AMENDING SECTION 3 OF ORDINANCE No. 50. BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Carrizozo, New Mexico:

Section 1. That Section 5 of Ordinance No. 44 passed and approved on June 4, 1940, as amended by Section 3 of Ordinance No. 50, passed and approved on July 11, 1944 be and the same hereby is amended to read as follows:

Federal Tax Bill for Average New Mexico Family \$1,168 in 1954

The 1953-54 budget recently approved by Congress will mean a payment to the Federal government of some \$211,730,000 by New Mexico taxpayers. This was brought out in a study of tax liabilities of the Pacific Southwest states made by the Research Council of the National Association of Manufacturers, according to H. C. McClellan, NAM vice-president in Los Angeles, who called for further Federal economy and tax reduction. New Mexico's per capita tax payment for fiscal 1954 is estimated at \$292.04, the NAM report shows, including direct and indirect taxes, this means a tax bill of \$1168.16 for the average four-person family. Biggest item in the '54 appropriation of \$61 billion is Department of Defense, which will cost New Mexico taxpayers upward of \$106,551,771 or \$146.97 per capita.

proved on June 4, 1940, as amended by Section 3 of Ordinance No. 50, passed and approved on July 11, 1944 be and the same hereby is amended to read as follows:

Section 5. That all such monies for taxes so collected under the provisions of this Ordinance may be used only for the repair, maintenance and improvement of streets and alleys within the limits of the Village of Carrizozo and, where necessary, for the costs of collecting the taxes imposed under the provisions of this Ordinance, including attorneys fees.

Section 2. That Section 6 of Ordinance No. 44 be and the same hereby is amended to read as follows:

Section 6. If the reports required by Section 3 herein are not rendered by the 10th of each month on the gasoline sold during the preceding month, a penalty of 10% shall be added to the tax due for said preceding month. If the tax herein provided for is not paid on or before the 10th day of the month upon gasoline and motor fuel sold during the preceding month as in this Ordinance provided, together with penalties, the same shall thereupon become delinquent and a penalty of 10% shall be added thereto. Thereafter if delinquent tax with penalties is not paid by the first day of the following month, an additional penalty of 10% shall be added thereto. If attorneys are employed to collect such delinquent tax, a reasonable attorneys fee, not less than 15% of the tax and penalties, shall be added thereto as part of the costs of collection.

Section 3. That Section 7 of Ordinance 44 be and the same hereby is amended to read as follows:

Section 7. Any person, firm, corporation or association who shall make a false and fraudulent report to the Village of Carrizozo, as required herein shall be subject to a penalty of 50% of the tax due, which penalty shall be added to the amount of tax due. 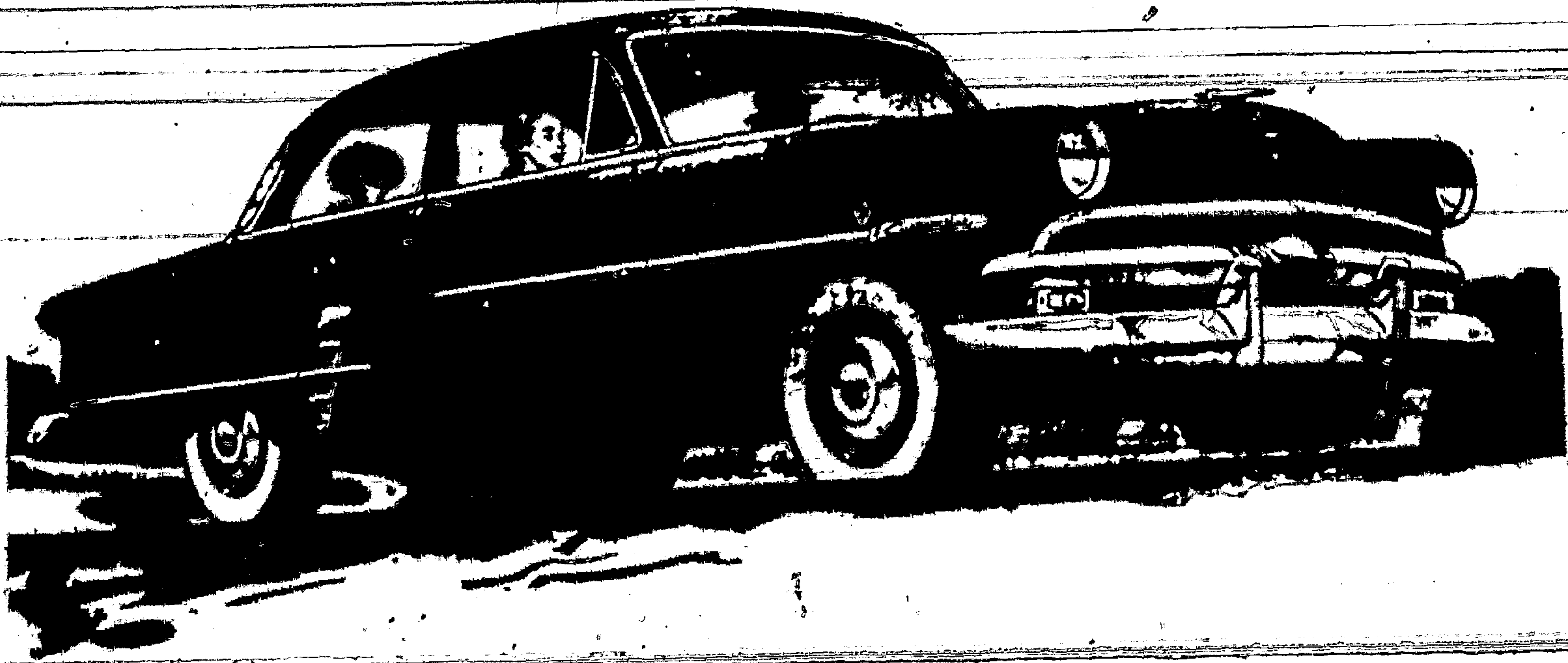

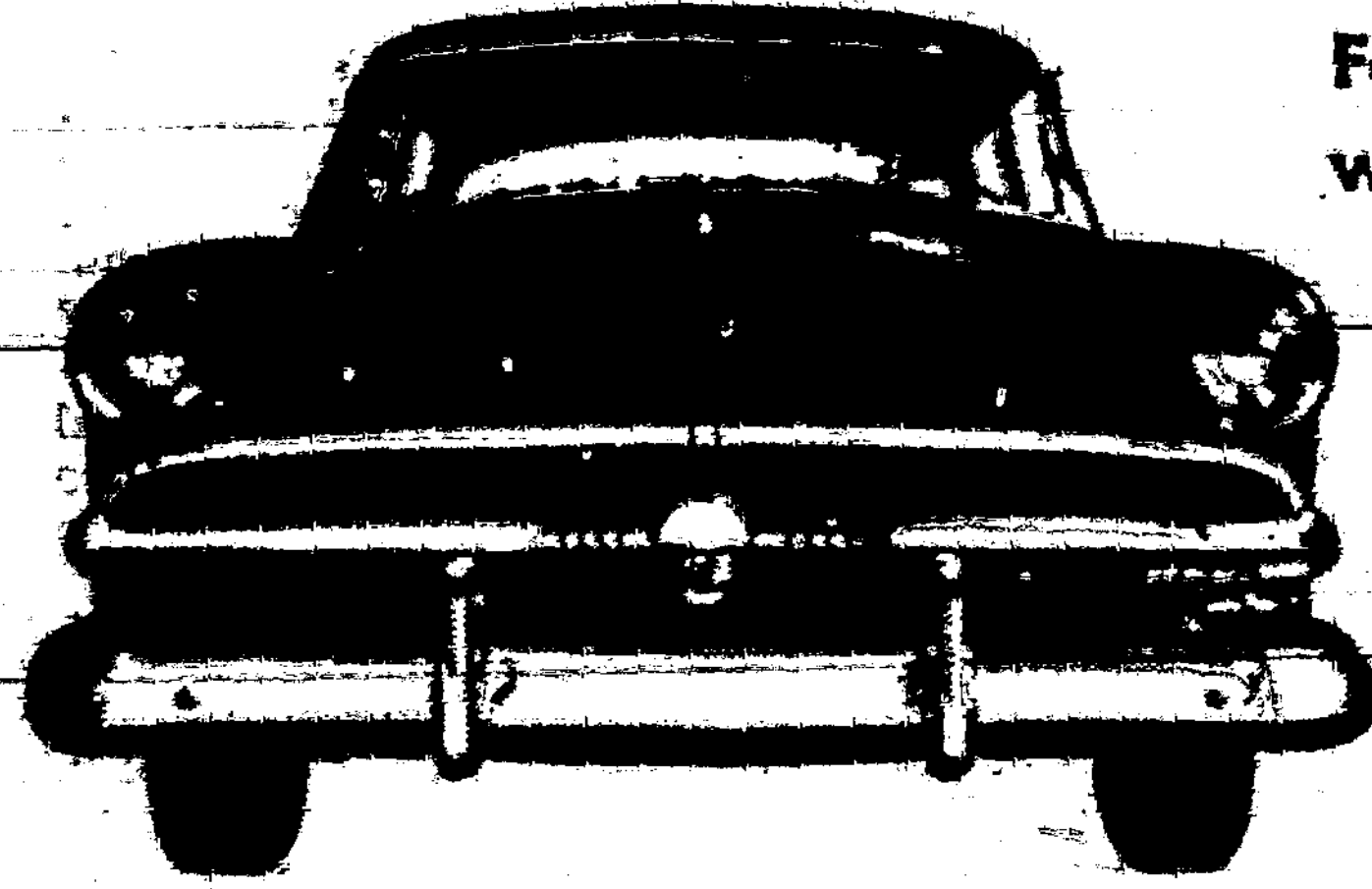
